The Living Word

Read: John 4:4–14

Tom and Mark's ministry refreshes lives. This is clear in the video they share of a group of fully clad children laughing and dancing in the refreshing water of an open shower—their first ever. The men work with indigenous churches to install water filtration systems on wells in Haiti, easing and lengthening lives as diseases connected to contaminated water are prevented. Access to clean, fresh water gives the people hope for their future.

Jesus referred to "living water" in John 4 to capture a similar idea of a continual source of refreshment. Tired and thirsty, Jesus had asked a Samaritan woman for a drink (vv. 4–8). This request led to a conversation in which Jesus offered the woman "living water" (vv. 9–15) — water that would become a source of life and hope within them, like "a spring of water welling up to eternal life" (v. 14).

We discover what this living water is later in John, when Jesus said, "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me and drink," declaring that whoever believed in Him would have "rivers of living water [flowing] from within them." John explains, "By this he meant the Spirit" (7:37–39).

Through the Spirit, believers are united to Christ and have access to the boundless power, hope, and joy found in God. Like living water, the Spirit lives inside believers, refreshing and renewing us.

How has Jesus satisfied your thirst through His Spirit? How will you share what Jesus has done for you?

Dear God, thank You for leaving us Your Spirit. Work in us so that our lives point others to You.

Yacht fire at dockyard

A 125-foot yacht anchored at Nelson's Dockyard was partially damaged by a fire Thursday afternoon that is believed to have been caused by an electrical problem.

The All Saints Fire Station received a call about the distressed yacht at 3:42 pm and immediately rushed to the scene where they were able to contain the fire thus saving the multimillion dollar yacht.

Reports are that the electrical panel was destroyed as the fire spread to the engine room and guest areas. The entire cabin was smoke-filled and the smoke damage is said to be extensive.

However, the quick action by the



firemen is believed to have saved the vessel from being destroyed by the fire.

The owner of the yacht is reported to be in Germany, but three crew members were living aboard the vessel at the time.

Although it is believed that the fire originated in the electrical panel, Fire Chief Elvis Weaver said an investigation will take place nonetheless to determine the precise cause.

Meanwhile, St John's firemen rushed to Bendals Thursday afternoon to put out a bush fire. No individual was hurt or property damaged by this bush fire.

Total fire calls for the year for all four fire stations – St John's, All saints, Johnson's Point and Coolidge – stand at 44.

Alarm sounded about dangerous ganja-coke combo

A bizarre and previously unheard of technique of marijuana cultivation is reported to be one of the latest means by which young men are wrecking their sanity.

The Government of Antigua and Barbuda, in its latest post-Cabinet briefing notes, said the Attorney General reported to his colleagues this week that "several young men who have ingested a mixture of illicit drugs have become deranged."

During the weekly post-Cabinet press briefing on Thursday morning, the Prime Minister's Chief of Staff, Ambassador Lionel "Max' Hurst, expanded on the initial revelations which

noted that "the adverse effects of the drugs cause permanent harm to the brain, and cause the men to suffer continuing hallucinations."

According to Hurst, "It appears to be a mixture of cocaine, marijuana and some other anti-depressants that seemingly provide them with some ecstatic experience. But it is at a tremendous cost to them."

He said apart from being "unlawful and illegal", the drug cocktails make those who ingest them "do crazy things" necessitating emergency commitment to institutionalized psychiatric care and supervision.

"They are taken to Clarevue [Psychi-

atric Hospital] and subdued when their behavior is outside of normalcy and sometimes even violent," Hurst stated, before adding, "We need to dedicate some additional resources to ensure they can be treated and seek recovery."

Then came the bombshell revelation by the Chief of Staff who said, "As I understand it, they are now planting marijuana ... and are placing crystals of cocaine in the soil so that they become a part of the plant itself ... apparently, the plant then reflects this mutation that takes place when the cocaine is added to the soil ... It forms a very dangerous substance that can harm them for life."

Rodney confirmed: Dedication to duty unchanged

Newly appointed Commissioner of Police, Atlee Rodney, said his dedication to duty will not change now that he has been confirmed in the post.

Commissioner Rodney explained that he has been a police officer for over 38 years and that he has served in all positions of the force. "My attitude towards policing remains unchanged as I am still committed to such qualities as honesty, integrity coupled with strong beliefs in good customer service.

Noting that crime in Antigua and Barbuda is relatively low compared with other Caribbean states, Rodney said moving forward the force will build on the successes of the past while at the same time come up with carry out their duties. new strategies to further reduce crime. "Someone is affected by crime in society so it is our duty to do our best to keep criminal activity at a minimum," he remarked.

One of his priorities is improving the human resources of the police force by providing opportunities for officers to improve their skills. Another is to improve the state of the buildings from which police officers

"There is need to improve the infrastructure as our buildings need repairs. In fact, some of the buildings housing police stations in the rural districts are in dire of disrepair," he noted.

He noted that the police within the force is not unique as on a weekly basis different categories of government workers take industrial action over poor working conditions.

Haitian FM statements on Venezuela condemned

Antigua and Barbuda's Prime Minister Gaston Browne is taking issue with statements made by the Foreign Minister of Haiti regarding the current situation in Venezuela. In their communique issued Wednesday following their intersessional meeting in Barbados, Heads of Government agreed to dispatch a mission to Haiti to observe the situation there. Indian fugitive, Mehul Chinubhai Choksi, who makes Antigua and Barbuda his current home after he acquired citizenship under the country's Citizenship By Investment Programme (CIP) has been accused of harming the image of the programme.

That's the view of the Indian High Commissioner to Guyana, Antigua and Barbuda and St Kitts-Nevis, Dr. K.J Srinivasa, who spoke to journalists at a press briefing during his current visit to St John's. He said Choksi decision to travel to Antigua and Barbuda under the CIP was an abuse of the system.

"His action is not only an abuse of CIP, but it also conveys an image of the programme that is not in the best interest of Antigua and Barbuda," Dr. Srinivasa contends. He said India wants the experience of Choksi to be a 'one-off' and he believes the Antigua and Barbuda government wants the same too.

He said the 60-year old businessman is wanted by the Judicial Authorities of

India for criminal conspiracy, criminal breach of trust, cheating and dishonesty including delivery of property, corruption and money laundering. He accused Choksi of taking 'tax-payers' money from India and while his government wants a speedy resolution of the matter, he fully understands the position of the Antigua and Barbuda government of non-interference in the judicial process.

"Both countries are democracies and as such, we respect each other's sovereignty and integrity. We understand from the Antigua and Barbuda government that the matter is being given due consideration at the highest levels. We are told the matter is before

the court in various stages with a recent hearing held on February 13," he stated.

The diplomat said his country is careful in how it handles this case as it doesn't want to give the appearance that it is putting pressure on another sovereign country. He said the evidence against the fugitive is 'overwhelming' and once the case runs its course through the legal system 'we would be happy to take custody of Mr Choksi'.

Asked if the matter involving Choksi has harmed the relationship between Antigua

munity, PM Browne said Foreign Minister, Bocchit Edmond, is seeking to justify Haiti's brown-nosing of the policies of others, in lieu of their protection, to keep Moïse and his regime in power.

"Unfortunately, while the protectors of the regime turn a blind eye, the crisis in Haiti is rapidly deteriorating, making the situation in Venezuela pale in comparison," he opined.

Under the circumstances, Browne is

and Barbuda and India, Dr. Srinivasa said 'no' that this was not the case. "We cannot let years of friendship become strained because of one man," he declared.

He said rather than strained relations, India has committed to increase its assistance to Antigua and Barbuda in the areas of education, culture and technology.

India is increasing the number of scholarships it is offering students from Antigua and Barbuda to sixteen, up from four. He disclosed that fourteen students are already in India with two more due to leave next month.

India also wants to send yoga practitioners to teach this form of meditation and exercise to people in Antigua and Barbuda. Global attention to Guyana has focussed on the current campaigning for general elections due on March 2. Reports indicate a vigorous campaign with the country's newly found resources in oil and gas very much on the minds of the contesting political parties.

While the election campaign is proceeding and the electorate awaits the date on which the majority will decide which party forms the next government and who will be the President of the country, the long-standing contention between Guyana and Venezuela has been ambling its way through the International Court of Justice (ICJ) at The Hague.

Three weeks after the general election, the ICJ

and international law will begin four days of legal arguments, between 23 and 27 March, from Guyana and Venezuelan teams on whether the Court has jurisdiction to pronounce a judgement. It is important to emphasise that this hearing is to determine whether the Court has jurisdiction; it is not yet concerned with the merits of the case which the Court will hear if it decides that it is properly vested with jurisdiction.

The Venezuelan Government disputes the ICJ's jurisdiction. In a statement issued on 29 November 2019, the authorities in Caracas said it "reiterates its historical position on the lack of jurisdiction of that international body". Calling the Guyana application to the Court "absurd and disturbing", the Venezuelan government revealed that it had informed the ICJ of its position in a memorandum the day before.

Conveniently ignored by the Venezuelan government is the binding international Award of 1899 that established and demarcated the boundary between Guyana and Venezuela. That boundary had been accepted, respected and even protected by Venezuela for almost 60 years until 1965 when Guyana's independence from Britain was set to take place the following year. Venezuela resurrected an unsubstantiated claim, attributed to one of its long dead lawyers from the 1899 arbitral process, that the US Chief Justice one of the Arbitrators - had been bribed. It is upon this shaky and shady allegation that Venezuela asserts the nullity of the 1899 award.

Guyana-Venezuela

In any event, it was the ICJ that had decided it wished to hold a hearing on the matter of jurisdiction, inviting Guyana and Venezuela to submit arguments. Having informed the Court on 18 June 2010 that "Venezuela would not participate in the proceedings", the Venezuelan government nonetheless submitted its memorandum. However. it remains unclear whether legal representatives of the Venezuelan government will turn up to make arguments before the Court in accordance with the Court's advice.

What is clear is that the Venezuelan government does not want any legal arbitration of its territorial claim; instead it wants Guyana to halt the ICJ proceedings and "to recommence the negotiation for a definitive solution". That negotiation would be between the Venezuela and Guyana governments – one that has been on-going in different formats since 1965 and which made no progress because there was no shift from the Venezuelan position that it has "historic and legitimate rights over the 'Guayana Esequiba' since its own birth in 1810".

Venezuelan governments have not been averse to flexing their military muscle by invading Guyanese territory and seizing ships in Guyana's territorial waters. These instances are well-recorded.

It should be noted that the Maduro government's continuing claim to two-thirds of Guyana is matched by the position of leaders of opposition parties, including Juan Guaidó who some governments regard as the President of Venezuela.

Venezuela has traditionally wanted negotiations with Guyana instead of arbitration by international legal machinery because successive governments have felt that their larger population, superior military might, and greater wealth (from oil and gas) placed them in a powerful position. Bigger and more powerful countries, regardless of their ideological stripe, prefer to deal directly with weaker countries precisely because the strong can bully the weak and, in so doing, get their way without regard to justice.

Throughout the entire period of this Venezuelan claim, Guyana has been relatively poor, lacking in military strength and of no particular strategic interest to the hemispheric or international community. All of Guyana's options for development were constrained by that reality. In part, it explains why the Guyana government was anxious to settle a deal with Exxon Mobil and others for the production of oil and gas.

As of 2020, Guyana officially joined the ranks of petroleum-producing states, and a big one as well. While Guyana is still a militarily weak nation, its economic standing will improve on the back of oil and gas reserves. Further, there will be far greater international interest in the preservation of Guyana's sovereignty and territorial integrity than there was before.

But the risk posed by Venezuela remains, despite its current weak economic situation and its fragile military circumstances. In time, these conditions could change while the ambition for claiming two-thirds of Guyana remains. That is why the Guyana government is right to pursue legal recourse at the ICJ as many other nations have done from the time of the Court's inception. Settlement of the issue will come only from lawful resolution.

The 15-nation Caribbean Community (CARICOM) countries have always stated their support for Guyana in the territorial claim from Venezuela, notwithstanding the close relationship that developed between some of their governments and the Chavez/ Maduro governments because of the benefits of the now defunct PetroCaribe arrangements.

At their Thirty-First Inter-Sessional Meeting in Barbados on 18-19 February, CARICOM Heads of Government repeated their "full support for the judicial process that is intended to bring a peaceful and definitive end to the long-standing controversy between the two countries". They did so while reiterating "their firm and unswerving support for the maintenance and preservation of the sovereignty and territorial integrity of Guyana".

This unanimous decision of the meeting - to stand up for a determination of the Guyana-Venezuela boundary under the rule of international law by the world's highest Court – was one of its better outcomes, showing real value for membership of the treaty organisation.

'Fort James will remain completely ours' – Hurst

The traditional and very popular recreational activities that take place at Fort James every year on Labour Day will in no way be restricted, curtailed or compromised by a major tourism development planned for the area.

That assurance from the Government of Antigua and Barbuda was given by the Prime Minister's Chief of Staff, Ambassador Lionel "Max" Hurst, during the weekly post-Cabinet press briefing on Thursday morning.

The Fort James Development is a collaborative undertaking between Government – through the Ministry of Tourism and Investment – and Royal Caribbean Cruises, which operates a majority of the numerous cruise ships that visit Antigua and Barbuda every year during the annual cruise tourism season.

Royal Caribbean has committed to investing millions in the Royal Beach Club that is expected to feature an amusement park and other entertainment facilities to considerably increase and improve the tourism experience for cruise passengers who visit Antigua and are desirous of treating themselves to some landside or offship fun and enjoyment of the destination.

On Thursday morning, Ambassador Hurst responded to a reporter's question about the exact location of the planned Royal Beach Club and whether this would limit the access that locals have hitherto been granted in that area.

"The beaches will continue to be accessible to the entire public at all times," Hurst stated categorically. "But the object is to ensure that on Labour Day there is nothing that will impede the large numbers of people who drive there and who celebrate on Labour Day.

"This has been going on since 1951 and, as a consequence, you can imagine that it is not an event we hope to bring to an end."

He noted that while "Fort James is historic ... it is also decrepit ... The object is to bring it back to life again and ensure that this important part of our history is not lost as a result of carelessness.

"We are going to invest millions of dollars in Fort James. Royal Caribbean Cruises is also going to be investing somewhere close to US\$100 million."

Hurst stressed that locals would also have access to the Royal Beach Club when it becomes operational.

Accord reached on protocols for cruise ships

Officials from the Florida Caribbean Cruise Association (FCCA) and the government have arrived at a consensus on how to handle passengers visiting aboard a cruise vessel who may show signs of infection with the coronavirus.

This happened this week when the FCCA team visited the country for talks with officials in both the public and private sectors.

Chief on their minds was the protocols that have been

put in place by Antigua and Barbuda to counter the spread of the coronavirus (Covid 19) especially as it pertains to cruise vessels visiting St John's Harbour.

Sources close to the talks said the prior arrangement when anyone took sick aboard a visiting cruise ship, the vessel's medical officer would contact their local agent, who in turn would notify the Ministry of Health.

However, during this

week's talks, it was agreed that the ship's medical officer would speak directly with the Chief Medical Officer, who will discuss the situation with a team that includes the ministers of health and tourism.

That team will make a determination on whether the ship is allowed to dock and passengers are allowed to come ashore dependent on the medical risk as assessed by the CMO.

The FCCA team also met

with representatives of the Hadeed Group to discuss the tourism project development at Side Hill, which the prime minister announced during the 2020 National Budget presentation.

A spokesman for the group said the discussions went 'very well'.

"They liked the project we are proposing to undertake to further boost the country's tourism development." The spokesman stated.

There is an outpouring of quiet across the country following the news that Lady Ava Lake-Ramsey has died.

The widow of the late Dr. Prince Ramsey passed away in Jamaica on Wednesday, where she was receiving medical treatment.

Lady Ramsey reportedly suffered a heart attack approximately two weeks ago and was warded in the Intensive Care Unit of Mount St. John's Medical Centre (MS-JMC).

Thereafter, she reportedly suffered a series of heart attacks and had to be sedated before arrangements were made for her to be medivac to Jamaica for advanced treatment.. News came on Wednesday that she passed away. Lady Ava Ramsey was quiet, and unassuming, a permanent fixture alongside her late husband. She was a career banker and retired after decades of service to the Bank of Nova Scotia.

Her passing comes nine months after Dr. Prince Ramsey lost his battle to cancer. One of her last public appearances was in Paradise View when the local government department of the Ministry of Social Transformation named a street in her late husband's honour.

CARICOM wants inter-governmental tax body to set standards, rules

CARICOM Heads of Government have reiterated the call for the creation of an "appropriate intergovernmental tax body with the adequate means and powers to set standards and rules" which support an equitable and universal approach to an international tax governance infrastructure.

The call was made Wednesday against the background of the blacklisting of countries by the European Union (EU). The strategy of blacklisting and de-risking leads to the withdrawal of correspondent banking services. The EU has used its tax good governance standard to label some Caribbean countries as non-cooperative tax jurisdictions, despite the fact that the countries in question are not designated as non-compliant by the relevant regulatory authorities, such as the Financial Action Task Force and the OECD Global Forum.

At their just-concluded 31st Intersessional Meeting in Bridgetown, Barbados, CARICOM Heads of Government dealt with the subjects of blacklisting, derisking and correspondent banking. They have deemed blacklisting as an existential threat to the economic security of CARICOM Member States.

According to the Communique is-

sued at the conclusion of the Meeting, the Heads of Government stressed that the defensive tax measures threatened by the European States could have serious financial repercussions on vulnerable CARICOM States and their ability to attract the investments needed to build resilient economies.

"The measures have the potential of causing devastating economic, social and political consequences for our States as a result of the harm that will be inflicted on our global image, our economic competitiveness and resource mobilisation efforts," the Communique read.

The Region has been consistent in its characterisation of blacklisting and its domino effects on Member States and has been intensifying its advocacy against the EU's stance. Late last year, for example, Prime Minister of Antigua and Barbuda, the Hon Gaston Browne led a high-level delegation to a Round Table with the United States Congress Financial Services Committee. The "mutuality of interest" of the Caribbean and the US was acknowledged during the Round Table. Prime Minister Browne argued that the process of de-risking which has led to a withdrawal of relations by some US

banks from Caribbean banks, posed a serious threat to the Region's welfare, including its capacity to import goods from the US. There was acknowledgement also that the impact of withdrawal of correspondent banking relations was felt not only in financial terms, but in the critical role it plays in global trade, investment and other financial services.

tee to address the deleterious impact of de-risking on CARICOM Member States. That meeting resulted in a number of outcomes aimed at building the capacity of respondent banks in the Community and changing the risk perception of CAR-ICOM States by US Government agencies. Heads of Government commended the CARICOM Ambassadors in Washington DC, USA, for their sterling work in advancing the CARICOM Advocacy against De-Risking," the Communique said.

The Round Table was but one of the interventions CARICOM has been making. From Bucharest to Basseterre, Heads of Government, the CARICOM Secretary-General and other Community spokespersons have been bringing attention to the matter, seeking understanding and international advocacy of governments on the Community's behalf. As the Heads of Government were meeting, the EU's Economic and Financial Affairs Council announced that several CAR-ICOM Member States had met the requirements of tax governance.

Of the 16 jurisdictions the EU's Economic and Financial Affairs Council (ECO-FIN) removed from Annex II, five were CARICOM Member States – Antigua and Barbuda, The Bahamas, Barbados, Belize, and St. Kitts and Nevis, and two were Associate Members – Bermuda, and the British Virgin Islands.

The countries, ECO-FIN said, had "managed to implement all the necessary reforms to comply with EU tax good governance principles ahead of the agreed deadline and are therefore removed from Annex II". Member States welcomed the news.

"This news of our removal from the EU list affirms that The Bahamas takes its position as a global financial center very seriously. Coming off this list was not an easy process. We engaged many stakeholders and executed a comprehensive strategy to not only address the EU's concerns but also to defend the jurisdiction against recent attacks on the legitimacy of our financial services business," said Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance of The Bahamas, K. Peter Turnquest.

Amazon says it will begin collecting 17.5 per cent vat

After several false starts, the Mia-Mottley administration appears to have made another major breakthrough in its bid to collect Value Added Tax (VAT) on online purchases.

Multinational e-commerce giant, on Monday informed customers of Amazon Web Service (AWS), its subsidiary, that from March 1, 2020, it would begin to charge Value Added Tax at a rate of 17.5% to Barbadian customers. in which it noted that the new measures are consistent with tax legislation which came into effect on December 1, 2019. The company said that a tax compliant invoice would be issued to Barbadian customers from April 1 this year.

The correspondence was reportedly sent to all AWS customers whose records indicate that their Billing Address or Contact Address is in Barbados. It explained to their details by visiting the Billing Address and Contact Address page of the AWS Billing Console.

"Tax invoices will appear in the Bills page of the AWS Billing Console along with your anniversary and subscription summary invoices starting on April 1, 2020," the email further explained.

"If you receive your anniversary or subscription invoices via email today, you will also receive tax invoices

AWS provides on-demand cloud computing platforms and APIs to individuals, companies, and governments, on a metered pay-as-you-go basis. The Seattle-based company detailed its intention in an email correspondence titled "Important Announcement" customers that the website calculates taxes based on the customer location, which is determined by Amazon's Account Location hierarchy. To ensure compliance, Amazon has urged Barbadian residents whose accounts are not listed in Barbados, to update via email starting on April 1, 2020," it added.

Barbados TODAY's efforts to reach Minister in the Ministry of Finance and Economic Affairs Ryan Straughn for a comment on the developments were unsuccessful.

The measure known as the

"Amazon tax", announced during Prime Minister Mia Mottley's June 2018 budget was initially to begin in October of that year but was shifted two months later to December 1 and then to December 15th.

The following year, legislation was introduced to allow the Barbados Revenue Authority (BRA) to outsource tax-collecting powers to an online third-party and the measure was to be introduced by July 1. This also was unsuccessful.

When first introduced, numerous businessmen including former Chamber of Commerce and Industry (BCCI) President, Eddy Abed praised the move for placing local wholesalers retailers and on a level playing field with their overseas counterparts. Smaller businesses, however, complained that the measures could cripple their chances of survival by significantly increasing their costs.

Nevertheless, changes were made to the Value Added Tax Act last December adding further scrutiny to the VAT collection process.

Shortly after, current BCCI president Trisha Tannis expressed concern about compliance from popular international online companies like Amazon, Wal-Mart, Alibaba.

Russia is looking to help Trump win in 2020, election security official told lawmakers

Washington (CNN)The intelligence community's top election security official delivered a briefing to lawmakers last week warning them that the intelligence community believes Russia is already taking steps to interfere in the 2020 election with the goal of helping President Donald Trump win, three sources familiar with the matter tell CNN.

Last week's briefing, led by election security official Shelby Pierson and first reported by The New York Times, addressed the overall picture of Russia's efforts, including hacking, weaponizing social media and attacks on election infrastructure, one of the sources said.

The briefers said Russia does favor Trump, but that helping Trump wasn't the only thing they were trying to do as it was also designed

to raise questions about the ence played a role in his integrity of the elections process, the source added.

Internationa

Trump became irate in a meeting with outgoing acting Director of National Intelligence Joseph Maguire last week for allowing the information about Russia's meddling efforts to be included in the briefing, a White House official said.

Russia's interference in the 2016 election -- which the US intelligence community believes was aimed at boosting Trump's candidacy and hurting his opponent, Hillary Clinton -- led to special counsel Robert Mueller's investigation. The prospect of further interference in 2020 will further test US defenses against foreign meddling, which Trump has repeatedly downplayed as he has dismissed any suggestion that Kremlin influelection.

Pierson's briefing was not well received by either Trump or House Republicans who were present, sources tell CNN. When Trump learned of it, he seemed most frustrated that House Intelligence Chairman Adam Schiff, a Democrat who has been a prominent critic, was included in the briefing, according to a person familiar with the matter.

believed Trump that Schiff in particular would use the information to try and undermine him over the coming months as he runs for election, the person said, and Trump blamed Maguire for the information getting to Schiff.

On Wednesday, Trump announced he was naming Richard Grenell, a staunch loyalist and current US ambassador to Germany, as acting DNI despite him not having experience in intelligence. A source familiar with internal discussions said White House officials saw Grenell as a good stopgap solution for the acting DNI vacancy as time was running out on Maguire's time in the position and because of Trump's dissatisfaction with Maguire due to the intelligence briefing.

Grenell was already being considered for other White House positions when filling the DNI position became a pressing need, the source said.

James Clapper, who served as director of national intelligence under President Barack Obama, told CNN's Wolf Blitzer on "The Situation Room" Thursday evening that it is "quite predictable" Russia would again try to interfere in the election.

"This is not a big surprise, but it illustrates the tremendous challenge that the intelligence community has where they're teeing up facts that our President doesn't want to hear, and with a result that the messenger got shot in the form of Joe Maguire being asked to leave," Clapper said.

Ethiopian 18th Century crown returns home from Netherlands

Internationa

An 18th Century Ethiopian crown has been returned home after being hidden in a Dutch flat for more than 20 years.

Ethiopian Sirak Asfaw, who fled to the Netherlands in the late 1970s, found the crown in 1998 in the suitcase of a visitor and realised it was stolen.

The management consultant protected it until he alerted a historian and Dutch police of his discovery last year. On Thursday, Ethiopia's Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed received the crown, thought to be one of just 20 in existence. The crown has depictions of Jesus Christ, God and the Holy Spirit, as well as Jesus' disciples, and was probably given to a church by the powerful warlord Welde Sellase hundreds of years ago.

In a tweet, Mr Abiy said he was grateful to Mr Sirak and the Dutch government for the return of the "precious crown".

Trump ally Roger Stone sentenced to 40 months in prison



The longtime Trump adviser was convicted last year of witness tampering and lying to US Congress.

Donald Trump's longtime adviser Roger Stone was sentenced to 40 months in prison as part of a case that has roiled the Justice Department and drawn the US president's ire. Stone was convicted on charges including lying to a congressional panel investigating Russian interference in the 2016 United States presidential election.

US District Judge Amy Berman Jackson handed down the sentence after Stone's lawyer asked that the veteran Republican operative receive no prison time.

Stone's belligerence and lies represent "a threat to our democracy", the judge said in a stern lecture during the hours-long sentencing hearing. "He was not prosecuted - as some have complained - for standing up for the president. He was prosecuted for covering up for the president," Jackson said. "There was nothing unfair, phoney or disgraceful about the investigation or the prosecution," Jackson added, citing words that Trump has used.

The judge also said Stone "knew exactly what he was doing" when he posted an image on social media last year that positioned a gun's cross-hairs over her head.

"The defendant engaged in threatening and intimidating conduct toward the court," Jackson said.

"This is intolerable to the administration of justice," she added.

But its flagship policy on Irish unity is likely to be a top issue if it gains power.

It wants a referendum on uniting the two parts of the island within five years.

Raphael to return for AUA Rohrman Triathlon

The reigning French Sprint Triathlon Champion Aurelien Raphael has confirmed his return to Antigua to defend his title in the AUA Rohrman Triathlon on Saturday March 7th 2020.

Raphael, a former European Junior Champion will also take part in the Jumby Bay Rohrman Barbuda on Sunday March 8th.

Raphael won the Antigua title in 2019 in stunning fashion, breaking the two hour barrier and setting a course record of 1 hour 57 minutes, and 21 seconds, for the 1,500 meter swim, 40km bike, and 10k run.

Raphael's confirmed presence has already attracted a contingent of over 20 French amateur athletes who will test themselves against him, in one of the only triathlons in the world which allows amateur triathletes to race side by side with pro athletes.

The AUA Rohrman Antigua features 10 triathlons including junior age groups of 6 and un-



der, 7-8, 9-10, 11-12 and 13-15. The adult's events include Olympic, Sprint and mini distances both available in the individual or team formats.

The event continues with a second day for the Jumby Bay Fund Rohrman Barbuda which involves running events along with fun activities such as tug a war.

The Rohrman is a triathlon festival named in honour of the late Jonathan Rohr, a former triathlete and AUA student.
