The Living Word

Read: John 4:4–14

Tom and Mark's ministry refreshes lives. This is clear in the video they share of a group of fully clad children laughing and dancing in the refreshing water of an open shower—their first ever. The mer work with indigenous churches to install water filtration systems or wells in Haiti, easing and lengthening lives as diseases connected to contaminated water are prevented. Access to clean, fresh water gives the people hope for their future.

Jesus referred to "living water" in John 4 to capture a similar idea of a continual source of refreshment. Tired and thirsty, Jesus had asked a Samaritan woman for a drink (vv. 4–8). This request led to a conversation in which Jesus offered the woman "living water" (vv. 9–15)—water that would become a source of life and hope within them, like "a spring of water welling up to eternal life" (v. 14).

We discover what this living water is later in John, when Jesus said, "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me and drink," declaring that whoever believed in Him would have "rivers of living water [flowing] from within them." John explains, "By this he meant the Spirit" (7:37–39).

Through the Spirit, believers are united to Christ and have access to the boundless power, hope, and joy found in God. Like living water, the Spirit lives inside believers, refreshing and renewing us.

How has Jesus satisfied your thirst through His Spirit? How will you share what Jesus has done for you?

Dear God, thank You for leaving us Your Spirit. Work in us so that our lives point others to You.

Health Minister, Molwyn Joseph, is clearing the air regarding the decision made more than a week ago to turn back a cruise ship, Aida Perla, from docking in Antigua and Barbuda.

Joseph was speaking in parliament on Tuesday where he rose to issue a national update on measures instituted by the government to combat a possible outbreak of the coronavirus (Covid 19) should an infected person arrive in the country.

The minister refuted suggestions from the president of the Cruise Tourism, Nathan Dundas that the vessel was turned back because of a decision made in another country.

Joseph said this was not the case, in fact the decision to turn back the vessel was based on the absence of proper information from the cruise ship. "Two days before the vessel arrived in Antigua, we were told that as many as 90 passengers were experiencing respiratory problems. When it was due to dock in St. John's the number was down to eight," the health minister told parliament.

Based on the uncertainty, Joseph said he asked for a report from the ship regarding the true situation on board. According to the minister, the information did not reach the ministry in a timely manner a proper assessment to take place.

"If we are not going to get the information on time then there will be consequences as the ship will not be allowed entry into the country," he declared.

Joseph, a former minister of tourism, said he quite understands that the indus-

"Its one thing to talk about economic benefits, but as the minister of health, my first duty is to the people of Antigua and Barbuda and I will not deviate from that responsibility," he stated.

The minister informed his colleagues and the nation that the World Health Organisation (WHO) has warned that the Covid 19 virus is knocking at the door of every nation in the world. Based on this warning, he said sometimes tough decisions must be made.

"When we take tough decisions, residents of Antigua and Barbuda should appreciate that this is done based on what we believe is in the best interest of the country after careful analysis of the situation," he contended.

He said his ministry remained very concerned as the number of infected people around the world continues to grow. WHO, he said, has confirmed 79,331 cases globally with 2,069 of these in countries outside of the people's Republic of China. There have been 2.618 deaths.

Thieves have set back the timetable for the completion of the Margetson Ward at the Holberton Hospital, which is being readied to serve as a quarantine area for anyone affected with the coronavirus (Covid 19) in Antigua and Barbuda.

Work has been ongoing for about two weeks to complete the ward by the end of the month. However, health Minister Molwyn Joseph has disclosed that when he visited the site on Tuesday morning, he was informed that the site has been broken into and the culprits made off with several items.

PointExpress newspaper visited the site Tuesday morning and learnt that missing included one a/c unit, one vacuum, two buckets of paint with several tool items was stolen.

It is believed that the



thieves entered from the eastern side of the building and left footprints in paint as they went through all the rooms.

Minister Joseph said the development was a 'distressing piece of news', noting that the act will likely setback the completion date. Fortunately, during the parliamentary discussion, Works Minister, Lennox Weston gave a commitment to double up the work men assigned to the task in a bid to have the work completed by the end of the week.

"We have procured additional necessary equipment and supplies for early detection and infection control such as thermometers, masks and gloves," he reported.

He added that the ministry has fully established communication links with students and other nationals who are currently residing in China. A few have returned and have been quarantined, he stated.

According to the minister...19 who traveled between China and Antigua have been quarantined. Five have been repatriated. Ten of the quarantined have been students of Antigua and Barbuda studying in China. Four have been Chinese nationals resident in Antigua. There are currently eight people in quarantine; two Chinese diplomats and 6 students.

All are monitored daily and their temperatures taken...none has developed respiratory symptoms.

The Civil Registration (Vital Statistics) Bill 2020 was one of the pieces of legislation considered by the House of Representatives at its sitting on Tuesday.

Minister for Information Technology, Melford Nicholas, hailed the bill as paving the way for the establishment of "a first world system for the provision of civil registration, vital statistics and personal identification management in one solution".

He went on to explain why improvement of the Civil Registration process was of such critical importance. He said there were several duplicate registers under the previous district-based registration, which the new system would make a thing of the past.

Using the sister isle as an example, he illustrated his point thus: "Persons born at the Hanna Thomas Hospital, or perhaps born to a visiting district medical practitioner in Barbuda, there was a certain delay; and even with the extraction of vital information from the registry – let's say a birth certificate or a marriage certificate - it necessitated a visit over to mainland Antigua for them to be able to have it; so we have good news to speak about today."

Nicholas said "the whole labour intensive process to



produce certificates from the registry was a problem", but the new system contains a full range of foundational information that could be utilized for manifold purposes such as birth certificates, drivers licenses, social security registration, and ease of doing business as just some examples.

He said automation of the civil registry would be a first for Antigua and much of the region when it came to "civil registration, vital statistics and personal information management in one solution".

Nicholas said this would make the compilation of reporting of statistics pertaining to births, deaths, divorces and such matters becoming much easier to compile and report – as required by many international bodies to which Antigua and Barbuda was a signatory member.

"We will seamlessly produce vital statistics for decision making. We can augment census processes with key bits of data collected through the various civil registration processes; and other agencies will be able to benefit from the data, rather than have to collect data on their own," Minister Nicholas stated.

New home construction starts in Barbuda

Work is now in progress on reconstructing houses for the first twenty beneficiaries under the European Union (EU) funded Housing Support to Barbuda project.

Led by the Antigua and Barbuda Government and implemented by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), the project aims to repair or rebuild 150 residential structures of the most vulnerable persons in Barbuda using the "Build Back Better" (BBB) approach.

Earlier, the UNDP signed a contract with Harrigan Building Construction for commencement of the work on the 20 houses. Local contractors will also share in the work. The project will facilitate the return of displaced families following Hurricane Irma, increase the resilience of the community and ultimately support the sustainable development of Barbuda.

Beneficiaries were selected by the Beneficiary Selection Committee (BSC)



using criteria which placed emphasis on the most vulnerable households. Significant preparatory activities were advanced by UNDP in collaboration with ONAO prior to the start of construction. The BSC comprises of officials from the follow-

ing organisations: Office of the National Authorising Officer (ONAO), Barbuda Council, Development Control Authority (DCA), Public Works Department (PWD), National Office of Disaster Services (NODS), and Ministry of Barbuda

Affairs.

The UNDP serves as technical advisor to the BSC. The project also includes the purchase of a shredder for debris management, capacity building, technical assistance, and greening through tree planting.

ASC acting principal sent home

News has reached PointExpress Hyram Forde. newspaper that the acting Principal of the Antigua State College has been relieved of her duties and sent home temporarily.

Word is that the acting head of the Na-AjeleGadija institution, Williams-Buffonge, was appointed to the post by the Public Service Commission (PSC) effective December 18, 2019, following the departure on retirement of long-serving principal,

It is alleged that Williams-Buffonge was involved in an incident that also involved Minister of Education, Michael Browne.

Reports indicate that officials in the ministry of education dealt with the matter initially and forwarded a report to the PSC.

The reports also say she was served with a letter on Monday by the permanent secretary in the ministry acting on the instructions from the PSC.

The report said an investigation is currently underway and the acting principal has been sent on special leave pending the outcome of the investigation.

The information suggests that based on the outcome, she may be asked to continue or asked to revert to her substantive position of Head of the A-Level Department since she was on probation in the acting position.

"The UAE is the melting pot of the region and it is important for us to have a solid presence in representing our economic and cultural interests," shared Hon. Gaston Browne.

Located in the central Burj Khalifa District, the Economic Office will act as liaison between the two countries and streamline the sustainable development of future projects and economic activities.

With a growing surge of investment opportunities in Antigua and Barbuda, whether in real estate

Trinidad: Two cops held for human trafficking

Two police officers are among three people charged with trafficking of a child for the purpose of exploitation. Acting Insp Rajesh Gokool, 47, and acting Sgt Richard Lalbeharry, 43, both of whom were assigned to the Central Division, were also charged with receiving a benefit knowing it resulted from the offence of trafficking of a child, supporting a gang in the commission of gang-related activity and misbehavior in public office. Gookool was also charged with sexual penetration of a child.

Also charged was Matthew Ross, 39, a bar manager of Freeport. He was charged with supporting a gang in the commission of gang-related activity. The three men are expected to appear before a Chaguanas magistrate on Wednesday. They were charged on Monday. They were among four suspects arrested by officers of a special task force put together by the Commissioner of Police, in conjunction with the Counter-Trafficking Unit, during an anti-crime exercise conducted in the Central Division on Friday. The special task force was assisted by officers of the Special Operations Response Team and the Inter-Agency Task Force. Police said investigations into the suspected trafficking in persons, mainly minors, from Venezuela, are ongoing.

Cruise Ship With Patient In Isolation Denied Docking At Ocho Rios

An MSC Meraviglia cruise ship that arrived in Ocho Rio, St Ann Jamaica from Miami this morning has been ordered to remain at sea over health concerns.

The decision was taken after it was discovered that a crew member, who has a travel history to countries with cases of the Coronavirus, was placed in isolation aboard the vessel.

"We saw that there was somebody there who is in quarantine because that person came from the Philippines and the 14 days have not elapsed," public relations and advocate officer at the North East Regional Health Authority, Angenice Whyte, told The Gleaner.

"They have that person in quarantine but that was not told to us before the ship docked, so as part of our public health standard and regulation handed down by the Ministry of Health on how we deal with communicable diseases, we did not allow persons to leave the ship," Whyte explained.

She said currently there is no Coronavirus threat to Jamaica or Jamaicans as no one from the ship has been allowed to leave and there is a possibility that no passenger or crew member will be allowed on land.

According to the MSC schedule, the MSC Meraviglia would have left Miami on February 23 and after spending a day in international waters, would dock in Ocho Rios on February 25 at 9:00 a.m. and depart at 5:00 p.m.

The vessel is then scheduled to continue its Caribbean cruise, heading firstly to Grand Cayman, then to Cozumel in Mexico and The Bahamas.

The MSC Meraviglia has a capacity to carry 5,400 passengers and a crew of 1,500.

CARICOM mounting election observation mission for Guyana's Elections

Members of the CAR-ICOM Election Observation Mission (CEOM) began arriving in Guyana on February 24, to monitor the country's Regional and General Elections early next month.

The full complement of the 14-Member Mission will be in Guyana on February 27, and will be on the ground until March 4.

In November, the Minister of Foreign Affairs of Guyana, Hon. Dr. Karen Cummings officially informed the CARICOM Secretariat of President H.E. David Granger's proclamation that General and Regional Elections will be held March 2. The CARICOM Secretariat was also invited to mount the CEOM, to ensure the transparency of all electoral processes

and to invest confidence in the results of the elections.

Ms. Cynthia Cleopatra Combie Martyr, a national of Saint Lucia is leading the Mission which includes electoral management experts from Antigua and Barbuda. The Bahamas. Barbados, Haiti, Jamaica, Saint Lucia, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, Suriname and Trinidad and Tobago. The Observation Mission will be assisted by Mr. Brian Bellevue, Ms. Serojnie Seetaram and Ms Denise Morgan of the CARICOM Secretariat. The Chief of Mission will depart Guyana on March 5.

IMF Credits CIP for Positive Economic Performance of OECS Countries with the Programme, Local And Regional Authorities React

Regional Citizenship by Investment (CIP) countries are welcoming positive statements made by the International Monetary Fund (IMF) on the impact of the CIP to the socio-economic structure of participating countries.

The IMF is remaining consistent in recognizing the programme as a significant contributor of revenues and it lauds the programme for assisting in reducing national debts, as well as its contribution to the country's gross domestic product.

CIP Head for Saint Lucia and Chairman of the Citizenship by Investment Programme Association (CIPA), Nestor Alfred, supports the IMF's statements and seeks routes for the programme's sustainability to create a positive assurance to developed countries.

Alfred cites OECS's founding CIP countries St. Kitts and Nevis and the Commonwealth of Dominica as examples of economies which would have been disastrously impacted had the CIP been terminated. The two countries have been involved in CIP programmes for 35 and 25 years respectively and CIP programmes have contributed in excess of 50% of the countries' GDP.

Still, on the subject of collaboration, the Governor of the Eastern Central Banks (ECCB), Timothy Antoine is calling for unity of CIP countries as an attempt to strengthen the region's CIP product.

Currently, there are five CIP countries - Antigua and Barbuda, the Commonwealth of Dominica, St. Kitts and Nevis, Saint Lucia and Grenada. However, each of these countries host programmes unique to their territory.

Antoine continued that the ECCB's view is that the region is seen as one

CIP brand despite what individual countries do.

Speaking on the ECCB's call for collaboration, Nestor Alfred comments that the ECCB would be the most qualified institution to speak on the impact of CIP programmes on the economic development of the OECS islands.

Leading CIP experts, Henley and Partners supports the IMF's statements and agrees with the ECCB's calls for collaboration. Managing Partner for Henley and Partners Saint Lucia, Mark Maraj states that we should be encouraged by the IMF and ECCB to continue the steps that we are taking to harmonize the region's CIP programmes.

Both Henley and Partners and the Citizenship by Investment Programme Association collectively accept the IMF's endorsement and agree that the OECS CIP countries will benefit from greater opportunities by forming alliances.

CIPA is therefore willing to work with the OECS Secretariat and the ECCB to ensure that the collaboration is successfully executed.

Coronavirus: Iran's deputy health minister tests positive as outbreak worse

AROUND THE WORLD



Iran's deputy health minister and an MP have both tested positive for the new coronavirus, as it struggles to contain an outbreak that has killed 15.

The country is one of three hot-spots outside China causing concern that the virus could be becoming a pandemic.

The deputy minister, Iraj Harirchi, on Monday denied covering up the scale of the outbreak. He appeared in physical discomfort as he spoke to reporters.

Iran has reported 95 cases, but the actual number is thought to be higher.

The director general of

the World Health Organization (WHO) has said the sudden increase in cases in countries outside China is "deeply concerning".

US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said on Tuesday that Washington was concerned that Iran may have concealed "vital details" about its outbreak and urged all nations to "tell the truth about the coronavirus".

More people have died in Iran from the virus than anywhere else outside China. The two countries have strong trading links.

The other countries currently in the spotlight are South Korea and Italy, where cases have surged in recent days.

More than 80,000 cases of the Covid-19 respiratory disease have been reported worldwide since it emerged late last year. About 2,700 patients have died - the vast majority in China.

But the situation in Iran - home to holy sites that attract millions every year and in a region where several countries have weak health systems - has caused great concern about a potential mass outbreak in the Middle East.

Of the current hot-spots outside China, Iran is the most concerning because of the lack of an accurate picture of how widespread the outbreak really is, said Dr Nathalie MacDermott, an expert in infectious diseases at King's College London.

Most of the reported cases have been people who are elderly and dying, she said. "It seems like we're hearing about the tip of the iceberg and missing that chunk underneath who may be younger and may not be particularly unwell."

What happened to the Iranian official?

"I had a fever as of last night and my preliminary test was positive around midnight," Mr Harirchi said in a video released on Tuesday.

"I've isolated myself in a place since... and now I am starting medication. "We will definitely be victorious against this virus in the next few weeks," the minister added.

Mr Harirchi's positive test for Covid-19 was announced a day after he took part in a news conference, where he coughed occasionally and appeared to sweat heavily. During the briefing, the minister denied a claim by a member of parliament for Qom - the centre of the outbreak - that the authorities were engaged in a cover-up.

Ahmad Amirabadi-Farahani alleged that Covid-19 had arrived in Qom three weeks ago and that 50 people had died in the city alone.

The death toll was rejected by Mr Harirchi, who vowed to resign if it could be proven that even half that number had died. Mr Amirabadi-Farahani subsequently refused to retract his claim, saying he had sent a list of 40 people who had died to the minister and awaited his resignation.

The secretary of the Supreme National Security Council of Iran Ali Shamkhani, said on Tuesday that he had asked the prosecutor-general to "check the validity" of the MP's allegation. Meanwhile, an MP from the Iranian capital Tehran, Mahmoud Sadeghi, said he had also tested positive for the virus



House candidate in Arizona suspends campaign after drug overdose

(CNN)A combat veteran running for US Congress in Arizona suspended his campaign on Monday after a relapse and drug overdose.

"Today, I have suspended my campaign for the US House of Representatives and am seeking treatment for substance abuse disorder. I will fully cooperate with local authorities on any matters arising from my recent relapse and overdose," Chris Taylor, a Safford, Arizona, city council member, told CNN in a statement. The Arizona Republic reported Monday that Taylor was suspending his campaign after a heroin overdose last week.

"I'm not going to hide from this. I'm not ashamed of what happened. I wish to sincerely apologize to the amazing people who have supported me," Taylor said.

He added, "I don't know

what went wrong. I recently relapsed after having so many solid years in sobriety. I have to figure out where I went wrong."

Internationa

Taylor, a father of two, said, "The only thing I can do is face this head on in complete humility and put one foot in front of the other so that I can get the help needed to be the father and husband that my family deserves. I'm human and I have never pretended to be anything but."

Taylor, who enlisted in the US Army in 2007 and served two combat tours in Afghanistan, has been open about his past addiction to drugs.

"The horrors I witnessed on the battlefield came home with me and like many veterans, I didn't know how to cope. I sought help at the VA but fell victim to a government that forgot its promises. I began misusing prescriptions and developed



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an opioid addiction. It was a long road to recovery," he said in a congressional campaign video.

Taylor also founded a nonprofit, Desert Eagle Addiction Recovery, to help individuals, including combat veterans, with drug addiction, according to his campaign website's biography.

Taylor was seeking the Republican nomination for Arizona's 1st Congressional District, which is currently held by Democratic Rep. Tom O'Halleran. O'Halleran won reelection in 2018 with about 54% of the vote.



Ethiopia to free high-profile prisoners 'for the national good'

Among those to be released are from National Movement of Amhara, an opposition group blamed for attacks last year.

Ethiopia has announced it would release dozens of high-profile prisoners from jail, including opposition activists held over an alleged coup and other high-ranking government critics.

A spokesman for the attorney general's office said on Tuesday that investigations had been dropped against 63 individuals and they would be released from custody later this week "for the national good".

"The Ethiopian govern-

ment hopes to widen the political and democratic space in the country with the freeing" of these individuals, the spokesman, Zinabu Tunu said.

Among those to be released are cadres of the National Movement of Amhara (NAMA), an ethno-nationalist opposition group blamed for attacks last year that the government described as a regional coup attempt. Hundreds were arrested in the aftermath of the June violence in Ethiopia's north that left five high-ranking officials dead and heaped pressure on a government struggling to cope with ethnic tensions.

Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed, who had been praised for loosening control in long-authoritarian Ethiopia, and was later awarded the Nobel Peace Prize, was accused at the time of using the violence as a pretext to jail critics.

NAMA chairperson Belete Molla said their officials should never have been imprisoned in the first place and welcomed the announcement of their release.

"We consider their imprisonment a politically motivated act intended to weaken Amhara nationalism," he told AFP news agency.

Among others scheduled for release are activists from

the Sidama ethnic group, which voted in November to form their own regional state after a long campaign for more autonomy.

Biniam Tewolde, a former deputy director of Ethiopia's cyberintelligence agency INSA, who was jailed in 2018 for corruption, is also among those to be pardoned, his lawyer Haileselassie Gebremedhin told AFP. Authoritarian tendencies Critics have accused Abiy of authoritarian tendencies, including locking up opponents, even as he embarked on sweeping reforms to foster a more open political and media environment. Ethiopia is scheduled to hold elections in August and Abiy hopes to secure a mandate to pursue an ambitious agenda of political and economic reform.

But opposition parties and civil society organisations have questioned whether the elections will be peaceful and credible. Ethnic violence has persisted since Abiy was appointed in 2018 following several years of anti-government protests.

Nearly 30 people were injured on Sunday in an explosion at a pro-Abiy rally in Ambo, roughly 100km (60 miles) west of the capital, Addis Ababa.

Delhi clashes: Thirteen killed as Hindu and Muslim groups clash

The clashes first broke out on Sunday, between protesters in favour of a controversial new Indian citizenship law and those against it.

The violence has taken on religious overtones, with Hindu and Muslim groups fighting each other.

The clashes have come during US President Donald Trump's first official visit to the country.

The violence is centred on Muslim-majority neighbourhoods in north-east Delhi - about 18km (11 miles) from the heart of the capital, where Mr Trump has been holding meetings with Indian leaders, diplomats and businessmen.

The Citizenship Amendment Act (CAA) - which critics say is anti-Muslim - has sparked massive protests since it was passed last year, and some of those have turned violent. But the demonstrations in Delhi have been peaceful until now.

When asked about the violence during a press briefing, Mr Trump evaded the issue, saying the incident was "up to India" to handle.

However, he said he had brought up the issue of religious freedom in the country and was impressed by the government's response.

Correspondents say the current unrest is an embarrassment to Prime Minister Narendra Modi as it has

taken the spotlight away from Mr Trump's visit.

BBC reporters in northeast Delhi saw Hindu mobs throwing stones and shouting slogans, with some in the crowd shouting "shoot the traitors".

Our correspondent Yogita Limaye saw plumes of smoke rising from a tyre market that has been set on fire.

In another incident on Tuesday afternoon, а mosque was vandalised in the Shahadra area. Widely shared footage showed men trying to rip the crescent from the top of the minaret.

Where is the violence? It broke out in three Muslim-majority areas in northeast Delhi on Sunday and

has continued since. Protesters are split along religious lines, and each side blames the other for

starting the clashes.

But the violence has been linked to a BJP leader, Kapil Mishra, who had threatened a group of protesters staging a sit-in against the CAA over the weekend, telling them that they would be forcibly evicted once Mr Trump left India.

Delhi police spokesman MS Randhawa told reporters that the situation was under control and a "sufficient number of policemen" had been deployed.

However, BBC reporters in the area said that mobs continued to chant slogans and throw stones.

Mr Randhawa said police were deploying drones and scanning CCTV camera footage. He action would be taken against troublemakers.

Orders that limit the gathering of four or more peo-

ple have been imposed in the area.

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Eyewitnesses said they saw charred vehicles and streets full of stones in areas like Jaffrabad and Chand Bagh on Tuesday morning. Police were allowing people to enter only after checking their identity cards.

Some metro stations have also been shut.

Who are the dead and iniured?

Thirteen people have been killed in the violence, according to hospital officials. The dead include Muslims and Hindus, as well a police constable, Ratan Lal.

Two journalists belonging to the NDTV news channel were badly beaten on Tuesday morning.

Another reporter from a local channel called JK24x7 was shot at and wounded.

Sports Feature POINTE PRESS **Kaila Charles gets inspiration from** her mother, an Olympic sprinter Ruperta Charles knows what it's like

to be away from home for long periods of time, missing family milestones and home-cooked meals. So every year, when the Fourth of July rolls around and the members of the Maryland women's basketball team are still on campus and yearning - either for good food or family or anything that's not the inside of their apartments in College Park - it's guard Kaila Charles's mother who feeds them.

For a Sunday gathering, the cooking begins Friday. In the Charles household in Glenn Dale, there is no catering allowed.

Ruperta whips up the same food she cooks for her own family, the food she ate growing up in Antigua and Barbuda: barbecued chicken, curried goat with roti, macaroni and cheese, rice and peas, oxtail, and casserole, to name a few dishes. Kaila's teammates leave with full bellies and paper plates stacked with food.

"Well, you see, I thought since Kaila is local, she's home, that's the perfect opportunity to have the girls over," Ruperta said, laughing. "One girl, Stephanie [Jones], is [also] from Maryland, but everybody else is so far away from home. My idea behind that is giving them the opportunity to get a little home feel."

Ruperta knows all the good a little taste of home can do for a college athlete — not just because she has raised three of them, but because she was one herself. A former sprinter, Ruperta is a two-time inductee to Howard's Hall of Fame. She competed in the 1984 Olympics, where she and her 4x400-meter relay teammates finished eighth.

Now she serves as a de facto team mom for the seventh-ranked Terrapins and as a mentor for her youngest child,

Kaila, one of four seniors along with Jones, Blair Watson and Sara Vujacic who will be honored in Tuesday's senior night ceremony before Maryland (23-4, 14-2 Big Ten) faces Purdue (17-11, 8-8).

It will be Kaila's final regular season game at Xfinity Center, her final go-round as Maryland's longtime centerpiece. The 6-foot-1 guard leads the Terps at 15.0 points and 7.6 rebounds per game as they speed toward the postseason as the top-ranked team in their conference.

Kaila has shined for the Terps for the better part of four years with her scoring talent, ballhandling and all-around game. But it's her outstanding quickness - her ability to lead Maryland full-throttle in its transition offense or change speeds while driving for a layup — that perhaps dazzles most.

That's all Ruperta.

"I brag about her. She's the original GOAT," Kaila said, using the acronym for greatest of all time. "Just seeing how hard she's worked, what she's accomplished, I'm so proud of my mom and I'm so glad she's mine."

Ruperta started running at 13, streaking through the grass and dirt tracks on her tiny home island at a time when it was far from the norm for girls to dedicate themselves to sports. A talented netball player before she caught the eye of regional track coaches, Ruperta was only allowed by her parents to train and travel full time when they understood a college scholarship could be at stake.

She ran well enough at the bigger track meets held among different Caribbean states that scholarship offers from Tennessee, Arizona and Howard rolled in. Ruperta chose Howard because it was the closest to home, but even then, when she arrived in Washington at 17, the only people she knew were a few Bison track teammates she cont'd on pg 21

had met through competitions.

"It was hard. I was away from home," Ruperta said. "I also got here in the summer and everything was green, so it wasn't so different, but winter - something that shocked me was how life just went on when it was snowing, when it was raining. Nothing stopped."

Dealing with the difficulties of being away from her family for an extended period for the first time, Ruperta took solace in her sport. She ran the 200 meters in 24.09 seconds to set a Howard record in 1983 that stood until 2018. She competed in the 1983 World Games in Finland and in the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics before marrying Walter Charles, a fellow Howard student who himself was an immigrant from Trinidad and Tobago.

When her four children were young, Ruperta purposefully kept them from track until high school in an effort to give Darron, Afia, Akil and Kaila something she didn't have in her

youth: weekends off and summer vacation. As a result, the Charles siblings drifted among activities until they found a sport they loved. The talent, of course, came naturally - Afia eventually decided in high school to run track for Central Florida, Akil played college basketball in Canada, and for Kaila, basketball won out over dance and volleyball.

"I tried not to really push them, but they just had a natural ability and they just developed a love. That made it easier," Ruperta said. "My husband, he played soccer, too [growing up]. He likes to think that mentally, the mental toughness came from him. But I say, 'Okay, if you want to claim something, that's fine.' But of course, everybody knows where it really came from."

Kaila may not run track like her mother and sister, but Ruperta's experience as a college athlete shaped her own. She originally wanted to go farther from home for school - she initially loved Duke — but at the last minute she decided to stay close by.

In College Park, Kaila is far enough from home that she has space when she wants it and close enough that she can drive home and have sleepovers with her grandmother on a whim, as she did the weekend before senior night. She has watched her three nieces grow up and was nearby when her first nephew was born last week.

"I know next year I might be in a whole different state, a whole different country," Kaila said. "So I'm just trying to cherish every little moment that I can get because things aren't going to be like this ever again. I'm so glad I can play for my hometown."

As for Ruperta, watching Kaila succeed in college has been like watching a dream come true a second time. She fears she and her husband will have withdrawal once Kaila graduates but she has decided that for any Terrapins player who might be craving a home-cooked meal, her kitchen will remain open.

"I think we'll keep cooking," Ruperta said, "for anyone who asks."

Dominica's LaFond Makes History as First OECS Woman To Hit Tokyo 2020 Mark

The Commonwealth of Dominica has hopped, stepped, and jumped out to the forefront of the push for participation in the 2020 edition of the Olympic Games, with the republic's top female triple jumper making the minimum standards for this year's showcase.

Turning 26 in April, Thea LaFond reset her Organisation of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) women's record in February, clearing 14.33 metres at the 2020 University of Albany Winter Classic Competition in New York. That mark puts the 1.73m-tall University of Maryland graduate in pole position to return to the Olympics, having previously competed at Rio 2016.

For this iteration of the Summer Olympics in Tokyo (24 July to 9 August) the qualification system for athletics has been tweaked by global governing body, World Athletics. Qualification standards have been set, but there will also be a maximum field. In other words, no more than a certain number of athletes will be entered in each event, based on the world rankings at a particular cutoff date.

In any case, LaFond should be safe. Dominica's first and only Commonwealth Games medallist, with a 13.92m bronze in triple jump at Gold Coast 2018, LaFond is ranked 21st in the world at the time of writing. A total of 32 athletes will be entered for women's triple jump.

Having moved to the USA with her family as a child, LaFond only got into athletics because her family could no longer afford to pay for her dance classes. The younger La-Fond starred in multiple events, and even multiple sports at John F. Kennedy High School in Silver Spring, Maryland. Her mother had earned her PhD whilst pregnant, a feat that earned her daughter's admiration.

In 2019, LaFond set the OECS outdoor record of 14.38m, before sustaining a season-ending injury. She is clearly getting back to her best early this season. Her 7 February mark at the Ocean Breeze Athletic Complex in New York City surpassed the Olympic standard by a centimetre. But La-Fond, the first woman from the OECS to make the Tokyo 2020 standard, aims to improve further still.

Triple jump featured for Dominica at the country's first Olympic appearance, Atlanta 1996. But for the most part, participation has been in track events. In what will be the nation's seventh appearance at the Summer Olympics, La-
