APUA to embark on major expansion

The national utility company – APUA – is about to embark on a major expansion programme after it successfully negotiated a loan from a local bank.

Prime Minister, Gaston Browne, said APUA secured a consolidation loan from the Antigua Commercial Bank for approximately \$170-million. The money will be used by the utility company to upgrade much of the services that it offers to consumers.

Of the amount, \$130 million represents new money that will enable APUA to build out better broadband infrastructure and improve its water distribution system.

"APUA will be investing in fibre to home network as well as investing in the underwater cable so that it doesn't have to rely on Cable and Wireless/FLOW with what in my view is usurious arrangement for rental of their underwater cable," the prime minister emphasized.

Under the current arrangement, APUA rents the use of the cable from FLOW, but is able to offer internet services than the company; an arrangement the prime minister describes as 'vulgar'.

In addition to offering its customers even cheaper internet services, the loan will also assist with the digital business framework which the government is seeking to establish.

With the new financing in place, hope is coming for those APUA water customers who have been complaining about inconsistent water supply as well as a discoloured water supply.

"The APUA loan will help it build out the water infrastructure that will improve the water distribution network.

"Two new reverse osmosis plants will be commissioned within nine months and a third in eighteen months.

"This will bring water production to 10 million gallons daily, enough to meet the daily demand," Browne reported.

He said the money will also go towards the re-piping exercise now underway by APUA.

"All those old pipes that have been underground for decades in places like the Point, Ottos and other parts of the island, will be replaced with funds from the loan," he added.

Half-a-million dollars to gov't COVID-19 Food Relief Programme

The Calvin Ayre Foundation has donated EC\$594,000 to the Ministry of Social Transformation towards the Grace Initiative COVID-19 Food Relief Programme.

The relief program centers around providing relief support for vulnerable families who have been adversely affected by the economic fallout of the COVD-19 pandemic.

At the cheque handover ceremony, Corinna Delowsky, Executive director of the CAF underscored the importance of the foundation's role in helping the twin-island state navigate the financial crisis COVID brought on the economic climate. "We are all navigating unchartered waters," said Executive Director of the CAF. Accepting the donation on behalf of the Ministry, Minister of Social Transformation, Dean Jonas expressed his gratitude for the donation which will further assist the program in ensuring the most vulnerable who are affected by COVID-19 obtain some level of support.

"The generous donation of the Calvin Ayre Foundation has assisted the Government and in particular the Ministry of Social Transformation, in achieving its mission to help those who are struggling to survive in very circumstances," difficult Min. 'Missing vessel' not found

Head of the Defense Force is expressing concern over what, so far, appears to be a hoax call about a missing vessel that was reported last week.

Head of Defense Staff, Col. Telbert Benjamin, under whose command the Coast Guard falls, was providing an update on the call issued by the coast guard for assistance in locating a missing vessel.

In a media release, the coast guard reported that on Wednesday, it received an alert from a station in Montserrat that intercepted a distress call from a vessel which goes by the name Love Lane and captained by Christian Ferguson.

With the assistance of French authorities, the ABDF Coast Guard carried out several search efforts on Wednesday and Thursday but came up negative in locating the missing vessel.

The ABDF Coast Guard therefore appealed for the public's assistance in verifying that the named vessel, Love Lane and occupant, Christian Ferguson, really do exist and were in fact in distress at sea.

"All of us are a bit concerned that up to Sunday there was no word from anyone regarding the vessel. We are hoping that this was not a prank call that has resulted in wasting our limited resources," Col. Benjamin stated.

According to the Chief of defense Staff the entire matter has been 'rather strange' as no one seems to be aware of that particular name of a vessel or the supposed 'captain'.

He is advising the public that prank

calls are not tolerated because of the seriousness of the action and the cost and manpower involved in searching for missing vessels and occupants.

Meanwhile, the First Antigua Barbuda Regiment (1ABR) successfully conducted training exercises over the period June 13-14, 2020, in the Christian Valley to Old Road Areas.

In related news, the Antigua and Barbuda Defense Force has answered a call issued by Prime Minister Gaston Browne for the army's farm to make a contribution to the nation's food security.

Commanding Officer of the 1st Antigua and Barbuda Regiment Major Troy Lake, reported that production at the army's farm at Crabbs had doubled in the last month, with the *cont'd on pg 5*



Water Distribution Update

ST. JOHN'S, Antigua, June 11th, 2020 - The past two (2) months, April and May, have been recorded as one of the most intense periods of drought within the last eighty (80) years. This has not only affected the availability of water in natural catchments, but also resulted in the rapid depletion of storage for residents as well. In light of this, the demand for water produced by the Authority has increased whilst production remains the same.

Over the past few weeks, specific areas of the island have experienced delayed delivery of water service and prolonged periods of water suppression for various reasons. There has been a sharp increase in demand due to COVID-19 protocols and more frequent fractured mains as a result of the shifting of mains as a consequence of the unprecedented dry conditions. The Antigua Public Utilities Authority (APUA) Water Business Unit would like to advise customers that efforts are being made to produce a more consistent and reliable service to customers with the introduction of a water conservation schedule for challenged areas.

APUA joins with fellow water production companies throughout the region who aggressively attempt to mitigate the impact of drought to consumers. St. Lucia, Grenada, Nevis and even larger territories such as Jamaica and Trinidad and Tobago and further abroad in California and parts of Florida in the United States have resorted to the introduction of water conservation schedules or legislatorial restrictions on water usage.

The APUA Water Business Unit recognizes its obligation to provide potable water to customers and to improve its communication in this regard. In the coming week, customers will experience adjustments to their regular times that water service is received as the Authority seeks to initiate the implementation the 2020 Water Conservation Schedule and monitor its effectiveness and efficiency. This schedule will be released on Friday, June 19th 2020 during a scheduled press conference.

PM urges compliance

Prime Minister Gaston cautious in determining Browne is pushing back against suggestions that returning nationals are treated less than tourists visiting the island since the opening of the airport two weeks ago.

The prime minister was responding to a chorus of complaints from returning nationals who take issue with the requirement for them to undergo a 7-14 day quarantine at one of the government's bio-secure facilities.

He disclosed that the government has certified a number of hotels as bio-secure places and in order to achieve this designation, these properties have had to put in place strict protocols to protect their guests as well as the local population.

"When you see the lengths that these properties go to protect staff and guests, these conditions do not exist in most homes. Therefore, we are very

who can self quarantine at home. They must first convince the health authorities that it is safe where they are to do so," Browne declared.

Unfortunately, according to the prime minister, rather than recognizing that the government is taking these steps to protect the domestic population, the returning nationals are making an issue of it.

"They are fussing about everything; even to make a contribution towards their meals," he noted.

Browne wondered aloud why would these returning nationals who are unsure of their COVID-19 status, want to return to the country, live among their relatives and potentially spread the virus.

"They are creating an unnecessary amount of discord that is totally unhelpful. They ought to recognize that the most responsible thing for us to do

is to take steps to protect the domestic population," he remarked.

The prime minister said the protocols that have been put in place by the

Andrew explains that though the business officially came on the market in

According to the entrepreneur, "AllMart, was conceptualized back in May 2018 after sitting with my brothers and sister one evening discussing the need for a complete shopping experience because of the difficulties faced when shopping in the Caribbean. These conversations sparked different ideas and after some months, with much deliberation and research, the end goal of enabling and empowering merchants in our developing country of Antigua was born."

This unique shopping experience is said to have been specifically inspired "to transform the shopping experience for the consumer, but also to take merchants of all kinds into the digital world with ease, with no investment or risk, and without ever having to worry about the complexities of technology."

Speaking with Andrew we learned that with this platform, merchants who partner with them get the opportunity to enhance their shopping experience, thereby generating more sales and building a happier, more loyal customer community.


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"I wouldn't quite say there were any other businesses like AllMart at the time we became operational. Sure, there are many delivery service companies out there. And, fortunately for Antigua, more and more have been popping up seemingly every day since the start of COVID-19. However, AllMart takes a significantly distinct approach. I would never merely consider AllMart a delivery service. Matter fact, delivery is only a small portion of what makes us who we are. AllMart caters to everyone by aiming to be the world's most inclusive e-commerce platform. You can think of it as 'The Shopping Mall in your Pocket', he illustrated.




increased number of merchants and customers. This makes community support and local patronage more important than ever before," Andrew summarized.

Statutory bodies hit hard by COVID-19

Several of the government statutory bodies have been hit hard by the COVID-19 pandemic and they have had to turn to the central government to bail them out.

And according to prime minister and finance minister, Gaston Browne, this is a double whammy for the government as its own revenues are down significantly because of the crisis.

Browne said the government's well-crafted plans for economic growth of around 5-percent this year have been upended by the pandemic and it now has to turn to borrowings to pump money into to the economic to stimulate economic growth.

He said the government plans to borrow as much as \$150-million to help stimulate agriculture and other productive sectors of the economy such as construction.

"We are finding it extremely difficult to pay public servants and when you add this to subsidizing various statutory bodies it is not easy.

"For example, in March we had to give Social Security \$5 million and last month the amount was \$4-million," he remarked.

The prime minister revealed that the social security scheme is not the only statutory body that his government has had to bail out in recent weeks.

"Even Medical Benefits is looking for some levels of subsidy now as their revenues, too, have reduced significantly.


"Additionally, the St. John's Development Corporation has turned to the government seeking a monthly subvention of \$400-thousand," he explained.

Browne describes the impact of the pandemic as creating 'a most difficult time to govern' but he expressed the confidence that his government has the wherewithal to tackle the problems it created head-on.

He emphasized the vulnerable nature of the country's economy due to two main factors; its high debt burden and its near total reliance on tourism.

The prime minister referenced a Caribbean Development Bank report that stated that Caribbean economies could contract from 15 to 30 percent based on tourist arrivals between March and September.

He said one reason why the government went ahead and reopened the economy was to avert much of this impact.

The Antigua-based Eastern Caribbean Civil Aviation Authority (ECCAA) says it is working assiduously towards regaining its Category I status after the U.S Federal Aviation Authority downgraded it to Category 2 about a month ago.

Director General of EC-CAA, Donald McPhail. said the organization is working on the matter with what he termed 'a serious amount of speed' to regain Category 1, which means that the airports it serves will carry that status.

"There were fourteen areas of deficiency identified when the recent survey was conducted that led to the downgrading to Category 2. Of that number, the EC-CAA office corrected eleven with three left outstanding," he revealed.

One the three, main rec-



Director General of ECCAA, Donald McPhail ommendation was for all the ECCAA member territories must pass legislation empowering the Director General to make regulations. This will remove some of the powers from the minister as currently constituted under the legislation.

"The recommendation is for the minister to continue making economic regulations while all regulations dealing with safety

will come from the director general, the technical person in this regard," PcPhail explained.

He confirmed that Antigua and Barbuda was ahead of the other territories with passing the necessary legislations that is a prerequisite for a return to Category 1. The director general declined to name the countries that lag behind with passing the required legislation.

However, he noted that correcting the deficiencies, including passing the necessary legislation 'requires a fair amount of work'.


The ECCAA head said the main impact from losing Category 1is that none of the organisation's members can operate new airline services into the United States, "We have all the same privileges as under Category 1, but we cannot offer new ones," he reported.

The government reported that last week. Minister of Aviation, Sir Robin Yearwood, had informed the Cabinet that assistance is forthcoming from the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) to place the nation's airport back into a Category 1 status.

The countries of East Caribbean Civil Aviation Authority were downgraded to a Category 2, about one month ago. Every effort is being made to ensure that the OECS states - all members of ECCAA-are returned to a Category 1.

However, an official familiar with the subject, said despite Antigua and Barbuda's best intentions, regaining the Category 1 status does not rely on the actions of the Antigua and Barbuda government alone.

The official said the civil aviation authority headquartered in St. John's is an OECS entity therefore the downgrading affected all the countries served by the authority.

Our attitude toward COVID-19 and its uncertainty should be marked by the Christian virtue of measured concern not panicking but heeding our Saviour's encouraging warning, "Do not be anxious about your life ... Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul"

Secondly the Fear Factor: Let's be real: everyday fear is a companion joining us whenever we venture out to supermarkets, pharmacies, hospitals or just to get a basic service, as wearing a mask would always remind us. So much about coronavirus (COVID-19) is outside of our control. Not just the virus itself, but all the other aspects of life that might be impacted, from work and finances to socializing and travel. Give yourself credit as you cope with this tough time and recognize that dealing with this challenge

Jamaica Is Fighting 'Super Gangs' Says PM

Gangs, which are responsible for 80 per cent of murders in Jamaica, are evolving, says Prime Minister Andrew Holness.

Speaking during an emergency press conference to announce states of public emergency in the Central and West Kingston divisions this morning, the prime minister underscored that gangs are no longer community-based, but forming networks to strengthen their organisations and target state projects.

"They are going across formerly and geographically defined political areas," said Holness.

"Their collaboration and alliances lend themselves to the formation of, what I call, 'super gangs'. They create the platform for the insemination of more nefarious kinds of activities, including cyber activities, and other kinds of criminal activities that would be considered foreign to the Jamaican context," he explained.

Minister of National Security, Dr Horace Chang said two thirds of all gangs in Jamaica are rooted in the Kingston Central, Kingston East and Kingston West divisions, which are responsible for most of the murders in the Corporate Area. The Kingston Metropolitan Region, which includes, parts of St Catherine, accounts for some 55 per cent of the country's murders; and Kingston and St Andrew alone, are responsible for 42 per cent, according to the police commissioner.

There are some 134 gangs operating from Bull Bay in the east, to Ferry, on the St Andrew/ St Catherine border, in the west, Chang outlined; or two thirds of the 389 active gangs in Jamaica. And, he says, the level of cooperation among them has been increasing.

"They struggle over spoils, extortion or imported weapons and other criminal activity that feed the economy of the gangs. It generates increasing homicides and certainly for this year we have seen the number of murders in the KMR region stand at more than 55 per cent of the total for the island," Chang said.

The police commissioner, Anderson, said there has been a spike in violent activities in the Kingston West and Kingston Central divisions, as gangs network and fortify to benefit from activities, such as extortion.

"Within the last quarter we have seen a spike as gang members and gang organisations seek to benefit from extortion in the market district and have created alliances that extend from St Andrew South all the way across to Kingston East," he said.

South Coast Highway project being targeted

Holness said the issue of extortion is particularly "worrisome," as the situation takes place in a context where busi-

nesses are struggling due to the recession. He revealed that the St Thomas leg of the South Coast Highway was also being targeted by criminals.

"And we are also very particularly concerned that a national road project has started and we are seeing signs of gangs, including politically connected persons, operating in such a way as to seek to extort and to disrupt or to prevent work from taking place," he said.

"I want to make it clear that this is a national project and we will not allow thugs to disrupt our national project," the prime minister insisted.

He said the evolving nature of gangs requires a coordinated approach from the state to retard them. He said the states of public emergency will allow the security forces to move across the divisions along with the gangs.

"As they move from one community to the next, to the next, we can move along with them within this zone," he said.

Chang, noting that the response to criminal activities in the division required extraordinary measures, was optimistic that the security forces will be able to weaken and destroy gangs in the divisions.

"We want to assure the public that the security forces will expand and increase their activities; the government will seek and ensure that they are provided with the requisite legislative, fiscal and other facilities to improve their efficiency and ensure they can deal with the level of gang activity in Jamaica," he said.

Guyana's Granger hints at state of emergency if elections are scrapped because gov't needs money

President David Granger on Sunday hinted that a state of emergency would have to declared to pave the way for the reconvening of a Parliament and the approval of funds for government spending, if the Guyana Elections Commission (GECOM) scraps the March 2, 2020 general and elections.

"It is possible...I know it has been done before. It is not an option that I would embark on without receiving agreement of all the parties concerned. I don't think it should be undertaken lightly or arbitrarily," he told reporters at State House.

He recalled that the Parliament had been recalled in 1990. That was when then President Desmond Hoyte had dissolved Parliament to hold general elections, but later reconstituted it to allow for electoral reforms, including house-to-house registration, and elections were called in 1992. Faced with a "massive shortfall" in revenues and a "massive increase" in expenditure, Granger said there was a huge gap that he hoped would be partly closed by the convening of Parliament after the elections cycle concludes. "Right now, we are not running on empty but we are running with very low funds," Granger said.

The President said the reconvening of Parliament would require "some form of agreement" or legal mechanism. In 1990, the elections had not yet been held unlike now. Granger conceded that Guyana would face "uncharted territory" in finding a way for Parliament to approve funds if GECOM annuls the elections.

Granger appeared to stress repeatedly that the GECOM Chairman would say that alleged fraud and other irregularities were so severe that she would be unable to deliver a result from a credible election. "I think they can very well say that- that we cannot make declaration because the information indicates that the process has been badly flawed," he said.

Asked where would that leave Guyana, the President said that would be a matter for the Commission or the Courts because "we would be in a legal noman's land" as the country has never had a situation where there has been no declaration. "I do feel that in this case it is not impossible that the Election Commission will say that based on the evidence that was presented, we cannot declare because the information indicates that there has been widespread fraud or that the process is flawed," he said.

Granger repeatedly cited a bloated list as the primary route for so many irregularities.

Chief Elections Officer, Keith Lowenfield told GECOM Chairman Claudette Singh in a report that based on impersonation and other regularities, only 185,302 votes are not tarnished and of that the People's Progressive Party (PPP) would get 56,627 votes and A Partnership for National Unity+Alliance For Change (APNU+AFC) will get 125,010.

Of the 460,352 valid votes cast, the incumbent A Partnership for National Unity+Alliance For Change (APNU+AFC) has won 217,920 and the People's Progressive Party 233,336. The three 'joinder' parties- A New and United Guyana (ANUG), Liberty and Justice Party (LJP) and The New Movement (TNM) got a total of 5,214 votes.

Royal Saint Lucia Police Force considering action against unlawful Black Lives Matter protest

Despite being denied permission by police, Black Lives Matter protestors gathered earlier today at Constitution Park to voice concerns over police killings. Assistant Commissioner of Police Wayne Charlery told Loop News that it was "very much a possibility" that action would be taken against the organizers of the protest for proceeding despite not receiving approval for the event. "That is a consideration that is on the table right now," said Charlery.

Charlery reacted to a Loop News story in which organizer Aaron Alexander said that he had dialogue with the police during the protest and they were allowed to continue until a specific time. Charlery said: "It was not really that the police ever gave them any time or it was ever allowed."

"In instances of this where there's an unlawful gathering, the police needs to dialogue with them using all the persuasive skills that is possible so that the crowd can disperse.

So you would have seen that I was speaking to Mr Isaac and Mr Alexander, throughout that time they would be asking 'give us more time' and I would tell them you need to finish this off. I was trying as peacefully as possible to have the crowd disperse by speaking to the obvious two leaders at the time."

Charlery noted that the activity continued for a bit longer than he wanted but he was satisfied that police were able to have the crowd disperse without exerting any higher level of force.

Alexander previously told Loop News: "Nowhere around the world people are getting permission to march. People just march and protest and that's what we did."

However, organizers did write to the police for approval, which was denied. Acting Police Commissioner Milton Desir released a statement explaining why he was not able to approve the protest during the pandemic: "On Wednesday, June 10, 2020, an application was received from organizers of Black Lives Matter Saint Lucia, with the subject "Black Lives Matter Saint Lucia Rally" seeking permission to hold a rally at Constitution Park, Castries, on Friday, June 12, 2020, commencing at 9 am for a duration of three hours.

The application indicated that approximately 300 persons were expected to be in attendance.

We have realized that permission may be granted for other activities such as religious services, etc. on a case by case basis under the strict protocols of the Chief Medical Officer.

In consultation with the Chief Medical Officer, the decision to not approve the application at this time was taken based on the current law in relation to the Emergency Powers (Disasters) (COVID-19) (NO. 8) Order 2020 on restrictions for mass crowd events and also factoring the health risk.

The current law does not allow the Commissioner of Police to approve such an event, at this time, scheduled for Friday, June 12, 2020.

The Acting Commissioner continues to have further consultation with the Chief Medical Officer on the stages in which Saint Lucia will be permitted to hold mass crowd events in a safe manner, during COVID-19 pandemic, with the required amendments to the law to permit these events."

"Once the laws can safely be relaxed, the Acting Commissioner will be in a position to legally approve such mass crowd events.

In the interim, he urges Saint Lucians to feel free to share their solidarity with the Black Lives Matter Movement, via other mediums with the rest of the world, until such time that we can publicly express our views safely through a mass crowd event."

Jamaica: Employers Who Breach Redundancy Regulations To Be Prosecuted



The Ministry of Labour and Social Security is reminding employers that redundancy exercises implemented without properly notifying the minister, will result in prosecution.

In a release, the ministry said under the Redundancy Payment Regulations, employers must notify the minister in writing within 21 days of the date the redundancy will take effect. It says employers who breach the regulations will be subject to a fine, not exceeding \$250,000, or a prison term of three months, or both fine and imprisonment.

The reminder comes as several sectors seek to implement measures to weather the economic recession caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The tourism industry has been worst affected to date, with thousands laid off as restrictions on travel and movement caused businesses in the sector to close their doors. The industry has projected earnings of US\$1.4 billion to US\$1.5 billion this year, far from the US\$4.4 billion that had been expected pre-COVID-19.

The industry is expecting to pick up some steam with the reopening of the country's borders to non-nationals tomorrow, June 15.

Bahamas: Sandals' November Reopen To Have 'Devastating Effect'



NASSAU. BAHAMAS -Trade Union Congress (TUC) president Obie Ferguson said last night he was trying to understand Sandals' rationale for pushing the reopening of its Royal Bahamian Resort on Cable Beach to November, while warning that the move will put some 600 workers at 'serious risk'. Ferguson told Eyewitness News last night that he was unaware of the planned November 1 reopening date. The company's Emerald Bay property in Exuma is set to reopen July 2. In a response to Eyewitness News inquiries, a Sandals representative said: "As with all our countries where there exists more than one resort, we have undertaken a phased re-opening process, guided by demand. Reminder that all dates announced are indeed subject to change."

Back in March Sandals said it would provide its employees with two weeks fully paid vacation, maintain partial salaries and retain established benefits during what at the time was intended to be a temporary closure until May 15. The TUC is the umbrella union for the Bahamas Hotel Bahamas Hotel Maintenance & Allied Workers Union (BHMAWU), which is the bargaining agent for the Sandals Royal Bahamian employees.

"I got a couple of calls from a few of the workers about it and I have been trying to verify if what was said to me is in fact so," Ferguson said. "I have not been able to verify whether what was told to me is in fact the position. What I can say is that workers, while they are anxious to return to work have this fear regarding potentially coming into contact with guests who may have the Coronavirus. That seems to be a major concern among the members. They are anxious to return as they are not earning any money and have commitments." On the potential November reopening of the Royal Bahamian property, Ferguson said: "That really puts the workers at serious risk and would cause some other issues that would have to be addressed.

"You are talking about not having any income for another few months. If that is the case I'm trying to find the rationale for the company opening up in November because that's a really long time."

Family want answers after Black man found hanging in California

Amid protests against racial mistreatment and injustice across the United States, the family of a 24-year-old Black man found hanging from a tree in Palmdale, California have called for answers over his death.

On Saturday, hundreds of people marched in Palmdale following the death of Robert Fuller, who was found hanging from a tree near City Hall early on Wednesday. During the demonstration, Los Angeles Supervisor Kathryn Barger formally called for an investigation into the death by the state's attorney general.

Authorities initially said Fuller's death appeared to be a suicide, but are awaiting the results of an autopsy. Community members have questioned how they came to that determination so quickly.

"Everything that they've been telling us has not been right," Fuller's sister, Diamond Alexander, who was among the protesters, said, the New York Times reported. "We've been hearing one thing. Then we hear another. And we just want to know the truth."

"My brother was not suicidal. He wasn't," she added.

Protesters have taken to the streets regularly in small and major cities across the US since the May 25 death of George Floyd, an unarmed Black man who died after an officer in Minneapolis kneeled on his neck for nearly nine minutes. The four officers involved in the death have since been terminated and criminally charged.

The Friday night killing of Rayshard Brooks, who was shot during a tussle with police in Atlanta after they were called on him for falling asleep in a fast food drive-through restaurant lane, has further stoked the unrest in the country.

'We have a history with nooses'

The city of Palmdale, in a statement on Saturday, said it "joined the family and the community's call for justice, which includes a full investigation into [Fuller's] death".

"The City will settle for nothing less than a thorough accounting of this matter," the statement said.

In her statement on Saturday, Los Angeles Supervisor Barger said an independent investigation "will lend additional expertise and oversight into this important investigation and provide the community with the answers they deserve".

The responses come after community members confronted city officials during a Friday night news conference, according to local media.

During that meeting, many asked why authorities were so quick to label the incident a suicide given the lack of video cameras in the area to capture the death, according to the Los Angeles Times.

Some community members also detailed examples of what they described as racism in the

city, including the presence of Confederate flags, the newspaper reported. "We have a history with nooses. We don't like ropes around our necks," said one man, according to the newspaper, referencing the practice of white mobs committing extrajudicial killings of Black people, often by hanging, that existed prominently in the US throughout the 19th and 20th centuries. Fuller's death has also brought attention to the death of another Black man found hanging from a tree on May 31 in Victorville, a desert city 72km (45 miles) east of Palmdale.

A sheriff's spokeswoman told the Victor Valley News that foul play was not suspected in 38-year-old Malcolm Harsch's death, but the man's family have also cast doubt on the findings and expressed fears the death would be too quickly labelled a suicide.

French leader rejects racism but colonial statues to remain

French President Emmanuel Macron has vowed Sunday to stand firm against racism but also praised police and insisted that France wouldn't take down statues of controversial, colonial-era figures, as he addressed the issues for the first time since George Floyd's death in the U.S.

In a televised address to the nation on Sunday evening, Macron called for the nation's "unity" at a key moment when the country is trying to put the coronavirus crisis behind while being shaken by a series of protests against racial injustice and police brutality. Echoing American protesters, demonstrators in France have expressed anger at discrimination within French society, particularly toward minorities from the country's former colonies in Africa. Unusually for a French leader, Macron acknowledged that someone's "address, name, color of skin" can reduce their chances at succeeding in French society, and called for a fight to ensure that everyone can "find their place" regardless of ethnic origin or religion. He promised to be "uncompromising in the face of racism, anti-Semitism and discrimination." However, he insisted that France will not take down statues of controversial, colonial-era figures as has happened in some other countries in recent weeks. Amid calls for taking down statues tied to France's slave trade or colonial wrongs, Macron said "the republic will not erase any trace, or any name, from its

history ... it will not take down any statue." "We should look at all of our history together with lucidity" including relations with Africa, with a goal of "truth" instead of "denying who we are," Macron said. He didn't address accusations of police violence but said forces of order deserve "the nation's recognition." Meanwhile, his government is facing growing pressure to confront racism and police violence. At least 15,000 people demonstrated in Paris on Saturday, the latest in a string of French protests galvanized by the May 25 death of Floyd – a black man who died after a white Minneapolis police officer pressed a knee to his neck — and the Black Lives Matter movement, but increasingly focused on France's own tensions between police and minorities. In response, the government banned police chokeholds and vowed to stamp out racism among police - but that has now angered police unions, who say they're being unfairly painted as white supremacists and staged protests of their own. Government minister Sibeth Ndiaye - a close Macron ally and the most prominent black figure in current French politics - wrote an unusually personal essay Saturday in Le Monde calling for France to rethink its colorblind doctrine, which aims at encouraging equality by ignoring race altogether.

"We must not hesitate to name things, to say that a skin color is not neutral," she wrote. She called on the French to

"confront our memories" about their history and find a "shared narrative" with former colonies. Macron's speech also sought to "turn the page" of the virus crisis, as France will reopen nearly everything starting Monday. Restrictions had started being gradually eased on May 11 after two months of stricter lockdown. "We are going to get back our way of life, our taste for freedom." Macron said. "In other words, we are going to rediscover France fully again." Restaurants in the Paris region will be allowed to open indoor spaces starting on Monday — instead of outdoor seating only. Macron vowed to make from saving as many jobs as possible his top priority.

A forecast last week from the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development showed France's economy will suffer more than most from the coming recession. The economy is expected to shrink at least 11% percent this year, pushing many out of work and torpedoing Macron's goals of bringing down unemployment, rehauling the retirement system and making France more globally competitive. France is reopening its borders with other European countries at midnight and will start allowing visitors from other continents on July 1.

Despite having one of the world's best health care systems, France was dangerously short of all kinds of masks and testing capacity as coronavirus patients overwhelmed intensive care wards in March. More than 80 lawsuits have been filed accusing his government of manslaughter, neglect or otherwise mishandling the virus crisis. Macron sent in the army to help and ordered strict lockdown measures that slowed the spread. But nearly 30,000 people have died, about half of them amid residents of nursing homes, and more than 150,000 have been infected. More than 200 new virus clusters have emerged since France started reopening May 11, according to the national health agency.

"Dozens of thousands of lives have been saved by our choices, our acts," Macron stressed.

Coronavirus: India to use 500 train carriages as wards in Delhi

India is to convert another 500 railway carriages to create 8,000 more beds for coronavirus patients in Delhi, amid a surge in infections.

Home Minister Amit Shah announced a package of new emergency measures for the capital, including a rapid increase in testing for Covid-19. Nursing homes will also be requisitioned.

He met Delhi's Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal to address the crisis.

India's daily number of confirmed new cases has reached almost 12,000.

The total number of 320,922 officially confirmed cases puts India fourth in the world - after the US, Brazil and Russia - in the pandemic.

The death toll in India stands at 9,195, according to data compiled by Johns Hop-kins University from official sources.

The Hindustan Times reports that Delhi is the third worst-hit state in India after Maharashtra and Tamil Nadu.

It reports that Delhi's bed capacity across private and government hospitals for Covid-19 patients stands at 9,698, of which 4,248 beds are vacant.

Mr Kejriwal's government plans to use 40 hotels and 77 banquet halls as makeshift hospitals.

India began converting railway carriages into quarantine or isolation wards in April, when large parts of the rail-

way network were suspended owing to the pandemic.

Last month the national government announced plans to end a national lockdown that began on 25 March.

Road and plane traffic in-

creased as restrictions started to ease, and many businesses and workplaces reopened. Markets are crowded again.

The lockdown has imposed huge economic costs on India, throwing millions

of people out of work, especially migrant workers in precarious, meagrely-paid jobs. Food supply chains were also put at risk.

Mexico desperate to reopen 11 million-job tourism industry

An irony of the coronavirus pandemic is that the idyllic beach vacation in Mexico in the brochures really does exist now: The white sand beaches are sparkling clean and empty on the Caribbean coast, the water is clear on the Pacific coast and the waters around the resort of Los Cabos are teeming with fish after 10 weeks with no boats going out. There are two-for-one deals and very eager staff. It's all only an airline flight - and a taxi ride, and a reception desk - away, and that's the problem.

There are a number of ways to think about it: Might it be safer to travel than stay home? How much is mental health worth, and, if people are going to socially distance anyway, why not do it in a beautiful, isolated place?

On the other hand, despite the pandemic, flights are often crowded, even hotels in Mexico that bend over backward to disinfect everything have little capacity to actually test their employees, and while fellow guests are likely to be few and far between, they also probably won't be wearing masks.

It was all on display as the first excited tourists arrived at the Moon Palace beach resort near Cancun last week, to the sound of mariachis and welcoming employees lined up — at a safe distance — to greet them.

"The customers all took off their masks as soon as they came into the hotel," said Gibran Chapur, vice president of Palace Resorts. "You can't be all covered up when you are on vacation, thinking you have to be in reclusion. If you wanted to do that, you would have stayed home." The Moon Palace staff, however, kept their face masks on. With only about 300 tourists on beaches that can hold thousands, it seemed a good place to practice social distancing. "What better place to be than someplace where there is nobody, as opposed to being in New York, where there are 500 people everywhere you look," Chapur said.

In Quintana Roo state, where Cancun is located, tourism is the only industry there is, and Cancun is the only major Mexican resort to reopen so far. Mexico's tourism income crashed in April, when it was only 6.3% of what it was one year ago. Hundreds of thousands of hotel rooms were closed. Tourism provides 11 million jobs, directly or indirectly in Mexico, and many of those workers were simply sent home to wait it out.

The situation is so desperate that Mexico's tourism secretary proposed making the industry one of Mexico's "essential activities," so that it could reopen just as the construction, mining and automotive industries have already started to do. But federal health officials were less enthusiastic, noting that tourism implied travel, crowds and being outdoors.

The delay in reopening anywhere else but Cancun has created a desperate situation. At the Pacific coast resort of Huatulco, dozens of vendors who run seaside fish and curios shacks defied lockdown measures to reopen their businesses, saying their money had run out and they couldn't take it anymore.

Other beach resorts are drawing up plans for limited reopenings as early as next week.

"It has been very difficult," said Armida Castro, the mayor of the twin Baja California resorts of Los Cabos,

"We had a list of needy people, elderly people and disabled people" to whom the government distributed aid packages, she said.

But then beach vendors, waiters and musicians who had lost work were added and the list swelled to 50,000; and the local government increased food packages and all available official vehicles were recruited

for distribution.

Castro said she can't remember seeing Los Cabos, known for its beaches, deserts and sport fishing, so deserted. The normally bustling marina at Cabo San Lucas now has plenty of room.

While Los Cabos hopes for a soft reopening in June or July, with limits on hotel capacity, it's hard not to look at this as a lost summer.

"October will be the big test," Castro said, referring to the month when cruise ships traditionally return and sport fishing tourneys host around 350 boats angling for marlin or dorado. The fish are definitely biting, Castro said, noting: "It has been nine weeks now without any sport or commercial fishing, so that should be attractive and interesting for sportsmen and fishermen."

The attractions at Mexican resorts are better than ever, and it's not just due to less crowd-ing.







Sports News FIFA allow transfer windows to open across two seasons

FIFA have given official flexibility, and allow MAs permission for football leagues across the world to be allowed to open transfer windows before their current seasons.

The green light is contained under new measures announced last week and approved by the Bureau of the FIFA Council in response to delays to leagues restarting because of the coronavirus pandemic.

"In order to give priority to clubs to complete their 2019/20 season with their original squad, provide

(member associations) to properly plan their football calendar, those associations following a dual-year calendar are permitted to commence the first registration period for the 2020/21 season prior to the completion of the 2019/0 season, subject to certain conditions," the rules now state.

COVID-19 has thrown the usual summer window into disarray with months of action put on hold.

The new measures could



prompt a change of thinking among elite clubs in Europe, most of whose leagues were not planning to sign players before their seasons end.

Another significant amendment from FIFA relates to the number of

clubs one player is permitted to register for and represent in official matches.

That number has traditionally stood at two but will now be increased to three in order to avoid any concerns regarding unemployed players.

CWI to host West Indies professional players draft 2020

Cricket West Indies (CWI) will host the West Indies professional players draft for the Colonial Medical Insurance Super 50 Cup and the West Indies Four-Day Championship today (Monday) June 15, 2020 via a Zoom meeting.

The draft shall be conducted over two rounds and each franchise must pick a player in each round. Based on CWI's draft structure, each franchise will contract a minimum of 15 players, 13 pre-selected and two from a player pool during the live draft.

The event will be monitored by CWI's auditors KPMG to ensure that the process is carried out efficiently and smoothly CWI's Cricket Operations, manager Roland Holder said.

For the 2020/21 season, each franchise will be allocated a picked number according to their final league position and performance of the franchise in the 2019/20 West Indies Championship

They will have 90 seconds in each round to make a pick. Where a selection is not made within the time period, the franchise will miss their turn and will have to wait until all their other franchises have made their selection in that round, before making its selection.

The CWI Board of directors has agreed that the requirement to contract at least 2 players from outside of the franchise territory will not apply to 2020/21 season.
