# Potters man killed

An alleged family dispute has left one man dead and another man nursing wounds at the Mount St John Medical Centre.

Dead is 28-year old Philip Lugg who was allegedly involved in an altercation with his uncle Nathaniel, who is now in a critical condition at the hospital.

A police report says they are investigating an alleged wounding incident at Potters that happened in Potters just before midday on Sunday.

The incident, which reportedly stemmed from a domestic dispute, occurred

around 11:30am on Sunday around 1pm. 7th June. A medical doctor pronounced the man dead

According to the reports the wounded man is currently under police watch receiving medical treatment at MSJMC.

## More relaxing of curfew possible

The government will be taking a closer look at the possibility of further relaxation of the curfew hours to benefit some businesses.

That's the word from Prime Minister, Gaston Browne, who said he will raise the matter at this week's Cabinet meeting on Wednesday.

There have been calls to start the curfew an hour or two later than the current 9:00 pm, and the prime minister said he is not opposed to the idea. "There are some businesses that will benefit from a later closing time than the 9:00 o'clock hour and that is

something that I will raise with my Cabinet colleagues on Wednesday," he stated.

According to the prime minister the nation's security forces are not in favour of a later start to the curfew. It is felt that the obvious reduction in criminal activity may have influenced their view on the matter. However, final determination rests with the cabinet of Antigua and Barbuda.

Under the state of emergency, the curfew hours are from 9:00 pm to 5:00 am.

The state of emergency was introduced in late March to combat the spread of the coronavirus in the community.

# Court appearance for the officers charged

The four members of the security forces – one police officer and three from the defense force – who face murder charges, are expected to make their first court appearance at the magistrate's court, possibly, today.

On Saturday, the police filed charges against one of their own, Jason Modeste and three defense force officers have been charged with the murder of Falmouth resident, Bruce Greenaway. In a statement issued Saturday, the Police said they have arrested and jointly charged Modeste, 44, and Shakiel Thomas, 25, both of Swetes, along with Armal Warner 20, of Pares and Aliyah Martin, 20, of Jennings for the alleged murder of Bruce Greenaway.

Following the recommendations from the Director of Public Prosecutions, the police served each accused with a copy of the charge, after completing extensive investigations. They are expected to make their first court appearance at the All Saints magistrate's court today or tomorrow.

The police administration thanked the family of Bruce Greenaway and by extension the general public for their patience in this matter. They also commended the Major Crimes Unit for the level of work that was done throughout this investigation.

On Monday, April 13, Greenaway's lifeless body was discovered near the shoreline of Indian Creek. He was reported missing a few days earlier. Residents of the area reported that he was last seen alive in a pickup truck used by members of the security forces who were patrolling the area to ensure compliance with the curfew.

Meanwhile, parliamentary represen-

tative for the area, E.P Chet Greene, has expressed satisfaction with the latest course of events. "In an earlier statement I commended the investigators working on the Bruce Greenaway murder case and encouraged attention to detail and dispatch in arriving at this day when the perpetrators would be cited for this most senseless and heinous crime," a statement issued by the member of parliament read.

He said that as the case heads for the courts for the determination, "my community, including the family members

of the deceased and by extension the entire island community, acknowledge the impartiality of the police investigators, the professionalism of the DPP and the calm of the Police Commissioner in discharging his duty under law."

Greene added that as a people and a democracy, there are many important lessons to be learned from Bruce's life and death and the legal phase of this case is a most important next step.

In a separate statement, the Antigua

and Barbuda Defense Force (ABDF) stated that at all times it cooperated with the police in the conduct of the investigation into Greenaway's death including turning over three of its officers to the police who were subsequently charged.

"The ABDF stands firm by its core values of discipline and integrity and is committed to seeing the judicial system exercised. We expect that the individuals will be allowed due process under our system of natural justice and we await the outcome of the judicial process," the statement added.

The Antigua and Barbuda Defense Force statement continued by saying, "it however notes with concern that the ABDF personnel alleged to be involved in this matter have been tried in the court of social media and public opinion. We strongly believe that the public must allow for due process to take its course."





## PM Browne renews appeal

The staged reopening of the country in an effort to stimulate economic activity sees Prime Minister, Gaston Browne, returning to his repeated calls for vigilance and self discipline in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic.

In an early morning message on Sunday, Browne described the virus as an 'invisible and formidable foe' yet he appealed to the nation not to live in fear, paralysed by terror and rendered helpless in the face of the enemy.

Noting that there's no other viable option at this time, he said the continued closure of the country's borders would destroy the economy and plunge citizens and residents into long term unemployment and poverty.

"We have taken on a heightened level of risk to protect livelihoods and this requires extreme vigilance and strict adherence to the health protocols by all.

So far, we have tested approximately sixty tourists who came in on the first

American Airlines flight and they all tested negative for COVID," he reported.

The prime minister holds the view that the key to averting domestic transmission and ultimately, community spread, is vigilance and self discipline by all; to wear a mask as mandated by law, practice good hygiene etiquette, and social distancing as appropriate.

"At the end of the day, it is my fundamental belief that as a nation, we will not perish; we will rise like a phoenix from the ashes and will flourish once again. Stay safe and healthy," he concluded.

PM Browne has been on

a campaign to encourage all residents to continue observing the health protocols as set out by the Ministry of Health. In particular, he wants all residents to continue to wear their masks in public places at all times.

There has been a marked let up in the public's adherence to the protocols as many in the community felt that the coronavirus pandemic was over.

Browne has gone to pains to tell people that this was not so. He noted that while there has been containment, there has been no eradication of the virus here in Antigua and Barbuda or elsewhere.

## More hotels reopen

Four of the country's hotel resorts have opened as Antigua and Barbuda returns to a sense of normality amidst the coronavirus pandemic that forced the closure of the borders in March.

A ministry of tourism spokesman said the four properties are Sandals Grande, Tamarind, Hodge's Bay Club and Bucaneer hotel.

Late last week, a series of inspections were carried out at a number of properties and according to the spokesman several more hotels are likely to open their doors for business this week.

Additional inspections are slated this week, with hotels in the English Harbour area earmarked for today, Monday, and properties on the southern section of the island listed to be completed this week.

The spokesman said each property must put in place new health protocols established by the Ministry of Health prior to getting the green-light to reopen.

The tourism ministry spokesman noted that the industry is not expected to return to full activity immediately nor are the staff members expected to return at full complement. However, it is expected that as the head count at the properties increase, then additional staff will be added as required.

Since the country reopened last Thursday, only a few flights have landed so far with a large portion of the load being returning nationals. However, as other airlines return to the country and the number of tourist increases, it is expected to hotel staff that has been idle for months, will slowly return to work.

# Churches resume service in full

All church denominations resumed regular or corporate services over the weekend following the lifting of the ban on such gatherings as the country came to grips with the spread of the coronavirus.

All denominations have accepted the new health protocols that have been established by the Ministry of Health and the churches have had to submit to inspections from the Central Board of Health (CBH).

Individual churches had to ensure that they put in place hand-washing stations as well as take steps to ensure social distancing and temperatures of congregants are taken as they enter the edifice.

One church group, the Moravians, announced that it was suspending the sacrament of Holy Communion



until further notice. Additionally, it advised that the aged, those with existing health conditions that made them vulnerable as well as children under 12 years should remain at home.

“Your health is of great importance to us and we have asked our pastors not to exceed 90 minutes for any

service. We are also placing a limit on the number of hymns used per service; these are limited to two in an effort to restrict singing,” Rev. Bonny Smith, the Superintendent of the Antigua Conference of the Moravian church said.

She noted that all the sanctuaries (church build-

ings) have been sanitized including the bathrooms. This extensive cleaning takes place before and after each service.

Other denominations have made similar adjustments to fit their particular circumstances. For example, at the St John’s Cathedral limits have been placed on the number of worshippers attending each service.

These changes have become necessary as Antigua and Barbuda and the rest of the world put in place drastic measures to halt the spread of the COVID-19 that has infected approximately six and a half million people with more than 400-thousand deaths worldwide.

From the desk of the chairman of the Ecclesiastical Commission, we say thank you to all the Pastors and Church Leaders and congregants for the successful implementation of the protocols that are estab-

## Nation celebrates its centenarians

The nation of Antigua and Barbuda is today taking a pause...a lengthy pause to celebrate members of a special group, the 100 Years Club.

Numbering 27 in all, the twenty females and seven males are the focus of Centenarian Day 2020, an initiative of the Community Development Division in the Ministry of Social Transformation.

Newly appointed Minister of Social Transformation, Dean Jonas, in his remarks to commemorate the day said, "Today, our nation recognizes a special group of citizens and residents of Antigua and Barbuda. This elite group ranges in age from 100 to 106 years old. In other words, for every three thousand persons in our population, there is one who is named in this elite group."



The minister drew attention to the fact that this special group of people has lived passed the national life expectancy by an average of 25 years. "The latest data published by the World Health Organization for life expectancy in our islands. According to this data females normally outlive men with a life expectancy of 77.5 as compared to 72.5 years," the minister disclosed.

Jonas noted however, that while in the past celebrations such as National Centenarians Day have been marked with several activities, in this case, the current COVID-19

pandemic has forced the ministry to curtail much of the events planned.

"Our Ministry is playing a major role in reducing the negative impact of this disease particularly as it relates to providing support for the needy and the vulnerable including our elderly. I commend our ministry's hard working administrators and community officers who are providing care, food and other supplies for the needy. These care packages have been made possible through the generous donations of a number of organizations, companies and private donors to whom we are deeply grateful," the social transformation minister stated.

He also thanked their Excellencies, Sir Rodney and Lady Williams for their involvement with the programme to

honour centenarians over the years.

Acting Director of Community Development, Dale O'Brien said, "In Antigua and Barbuda, the Community Development Field Officers are responsible for the 5 Zones to include Barbuda and are required to monitor the wellbeing of the elderly within the communities from age 90 and older and provide guidance to the families in planning and preparing for celebrations for those who attain their 100th Birthday. We have a goodly number of centenarians who are still in good health and quite alert."

Centenarian day 2020 is being marked with officials of the department making media appearances highlighting the work of the CDD and the centenarian programme it administers.

# St Lucians flock to beaches in pursuit of capsized

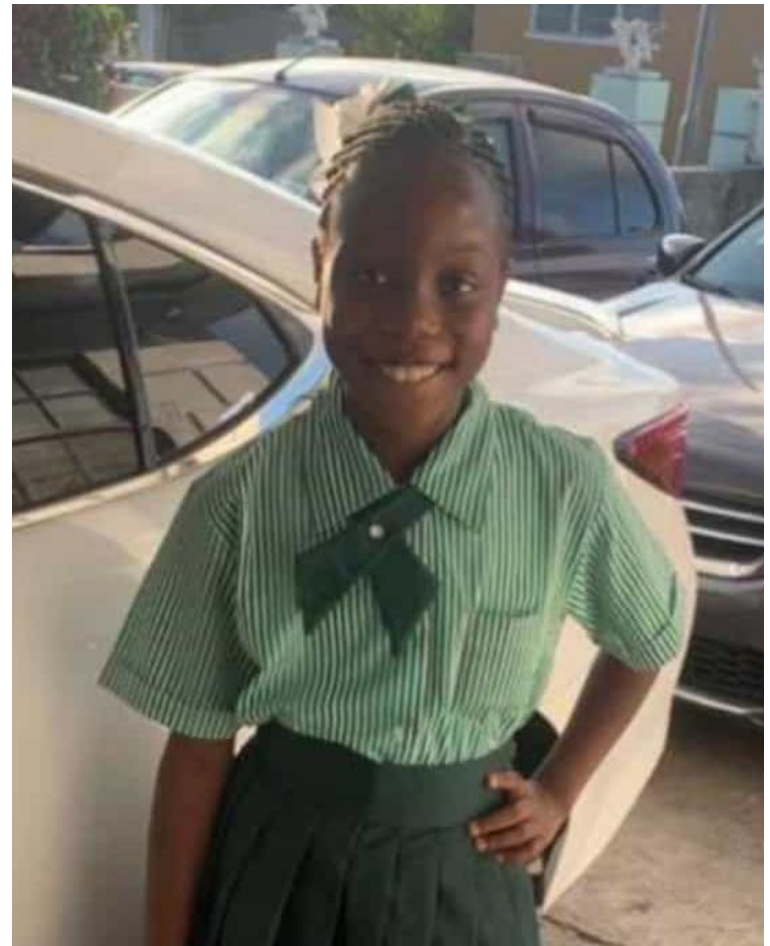


Saint Lucians converged along the Cas-en-Bas and Dauphin beaches in the north of the island in search of a significant amount of capsized money.

According to reports, three

men pulled up in front of the home in a gold vehicle and opened fire on the group.

Two men and the child were shot in the process.

Lorencia’s father Leran-zo Walkes told Eyewitness News that the family is still in “disbelief” over the news.

The young girl was in the 5th Grade at Sybil Strachan Primary School.



## Barbados: Police stop Bajan George Floyd protest outside US Embassy

The Royal Barbados Police Force (RBPf) brought the solidarity protest to be held at the US Embassy in Wilkey to a halt before it even started officially. Protesters and organisers became upset at the news that they would no longer be allowed to carry out the protest as intended after members of the RBPf informed them that the permit for the protest was revoked.

This news came after the Force also said that only ten persons would be allowed to participate in the protest on the Embassy location.

However, in the face of such push back Denny was sticking to his guns that it was understood to be 10 persons at a time at the Embassy location.

"I am not happy with the decision and this is a clear cut case for us from the Caribbean Movement for Peace and Integration to write the United Nations Human Rights Committee and to write to the Government of Barbados, which would be the Prime Minister, to express our disgust against police harassment in Barbados," Denny said.

Protesters remained outside the Embassy grounds but were told by authorities that they had to disperse as the large assembly was in contravention to COVID-19 guidelines.

Chairman of the Pan African Coalition in Barbados, Wayne

Onkphra Wells was present at the assembly and made a statement in support of the protest and condemning the actions of the RBPf.

Wells said:

"If it is one time that Barbados should be proud of its sons and its daughters it should be this morning.

"Look at these people come out to express solidarity with

the universal pain that we Africans suffer regardless of where we are. We as a people we are saying enough is enough. And instead of the Royal Barbados Police Force using a hard hand, it is so easily that they can compromise the situation and say ok give us the right to rotate. Because this is not a situation that should be stopped by force but a situation that should be

encouraged."

The protesters remained until 12.45 pm when they were told by the organisers that it would be best to disband the protest as they believed a strong statement still had been made.

Suggestions were made that the possibility of another protest may still happen but Mr Denny said that was yet to be determined.

# St. Kitts PM Harris Sworn-In, Pledges to Keep Campaign Promises

Prime Minister of St. Kitts and Nevis Dr. Timothy Harris has been sworn-in for a second term in office and indicated the work begins promptly to fulfill campaign promises to the people of St. Kitts and Nevis.

Dr. Harris said, "I promised I would not let you down and promised the administration that I would lead will not let down the people of St. Kitts and Nevis."

He said that it was an honor for him to have the opportunity to be sworn in for a second time as Prime Minister.

"We shall create the modern history in St. Kitts and Nevis by making the example of the best managed small island state. That is my pledge and that is my commitment."

Dr. Harris hailed the outgoing Team Unity cabinet and commended the work of Vance Amory, who is retiring, and Ian "Patches" Liburd who was unsuccessful at the polls. He also pledged that this would be his last term serving as Prime Minister, a promise he made in 2015, then saying he would only serve two terms if elected.

He said their success at the polls on June 5 is a vindication of their excellent work on behalf of the people. "Our performance really lived up and indeed some will say surpassed the promise we had made. Friday we the people of St. Kitts and Nevis made his-

tory again as the first coalition government in the Federation to return after an election with an increased majority."

He said they made history winning the larger share of the vote this time around and securing a National swing to Team Unity of around six percent

He said in his constituency it was the strongest result of the 27 years of his representation.

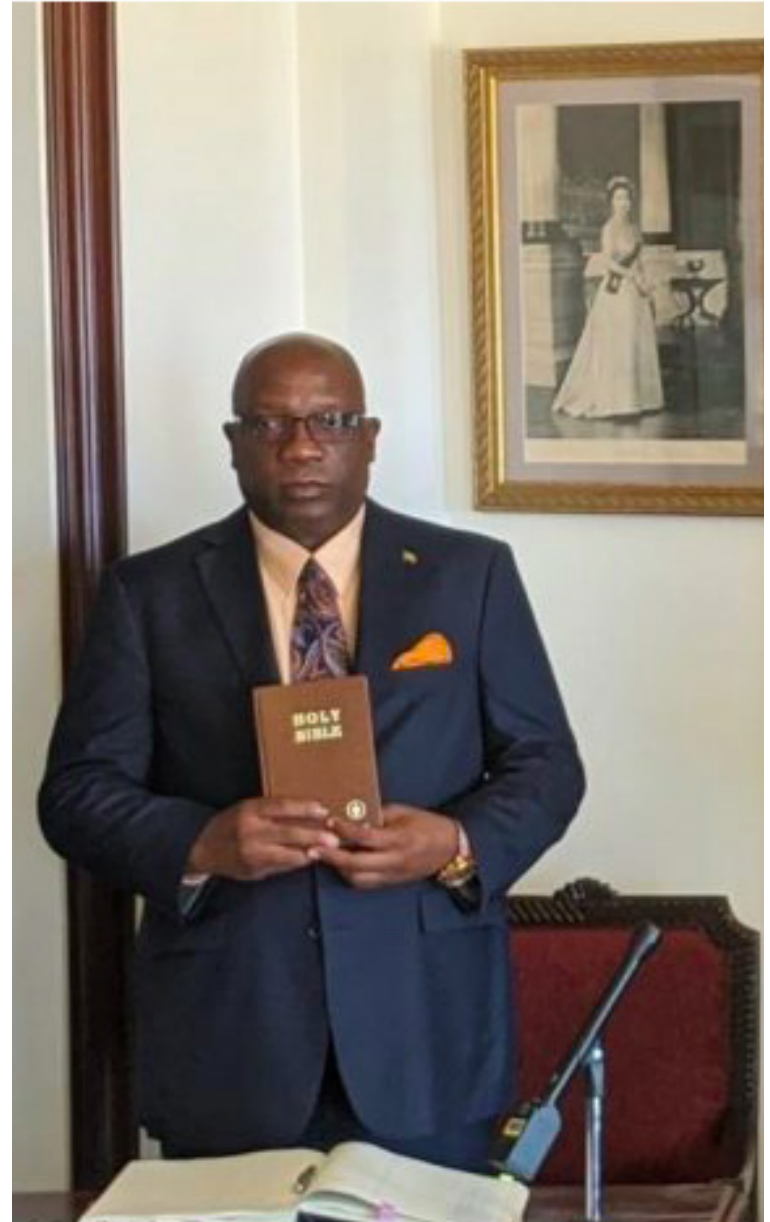
"I want to personally thank from the bottom of my heart the 1,870 voters who voted for me and I commend the 607 who voted for an alternative for their participation in the democratic process."

Dr. Harris noted that the general election was a consensus on how the population wanted the country to be run.

"At the national level, I believe the result of the general election was a repudiation of the old ways of doing politics. Of grievance by some when they don't get their own way, it was a repudiation of the government by unsustainable debt and gimmicks and tricks of the old order of politics.

"It was a repudiation of the bitterness and selfish agenda of those who sought to dictate to the government, not recognizing that ultimately it is to the broader electorate to which an elected government must respond."

The effort will now be made

to deliver on the promise of a stronger and safer future according to Dr. Harris.

"We are all honored and humbled by the faith and confidence which you have reposed in us. I promise I would not let you down and promise the ad-

ministration that I will lead will not let down the people of St. Kitts and Nevis.

He said the cabinet of ministers will be announced in the coming days.



## Protesters in Bristol pull down a statue of slave trader Edward Colston

A slave trader's statue in Bristol has been torn down and thrown into the harbour during a second day of anti-racism protests across the UK.

It comes after largely peaceful demonstrations in London on Saturday ended in some clashes with police.

Metropolitan Police Commissioner Cressida Dick urged protesters to find another way to make their views heard.

But thousands of protesters massed for a second day outside the US embassy in London before moving towards Whitehall.

Other protests have been taking place in Manchester, Wolverhampton, Nottingham, Glasgow and Edinburgh.

In Bristol, protesters used ropes to pull down the bronze statue of Edward Colston, a prominent 17th Century slave trader, who has been a source of controversy in the city for many years.

Colston was a member of the Royal African Company, which transported about 80,000 men, women and children from Africa to the Americas.

On his death in 1721, he bequeathed his wealth to charities and his legacy can still be seen on Bristol's streets, memorials and buildings.

After the statue was toppled, a protester posed with his knee on the figure's neck - reminiscent of the video showing

George Floyd, the black man who died while being restrained by a Minnesota police officer.

The statue was later dragged through the streets of Bristol and thrown into the harbour. The empty plinth was used as a makeshift stage for protesters.

Home Secretary Priti Patel called the tearing down of the statue "utterly disgraceful", adding that "it speaks to the acts of public disorder that have become a distraction from the cause people are protesting about".

"It's right the police follow up and make sure that justice is undertaken with those individuals that are responsible for such disorderly and lawless behaviour," she said.

In a statement, Avon & Somerset police confirmed there

would be an investigation into the "act of criminal damage".

Historian Prof David Olusoga told BBC News that the statue should have been taken down long before.

He said: "Statues are about saying 'This was a great man who did great things.' That is not true, he [Colston] was a slave trader and a murderer."

In a statement the Mayor of Bristol Martin Rees said he knew the removal of the statue would divide opinion but it was "important to listen to those who found the statue to represent an affront to humanity".

Aerial footage in London showed thousands more protesters flooding the roads outside the US embassy in Vauxhall, south London before marching towards Parliament

Square and Downing Street.

They appeared to be ignoring warnings from both the police commissioner and Health Secretary Matt Hancock not to congregate and risk spreading the coronavirus.

But free masks, gloves and hand gel were being handed out by volunteers.

In Parliament Square, the statue of Sir Winston Churchill was sprayed with graffiti, and a Black Lives Matter sign attached - an act described as "stupid and counterproductive" by foreign office minister James Cleverly.

In Warwickshire protesters caused the closure of the M6 for around an hour following on from the demonstrations in Coventry city centre.

## Ex-Republican Powell backs Democrat Biden for US president



*'I cannot in any way support President Trump this year,' Powell said*

Trump has 'drifted away' from the US Constitution and posed a danger to the country and its democracy, Powell says.

Former Secretary of State and Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Colin Powell has endorsed Democratic former United States Vice President Joe Biden, becoming the first important Republican to publicly back President Donald Trump's rival ahead of November's election.

Powell, who led the US military during the 1991 Gulf War in Iraq under then-Republican President George HW Bush and later led the Department of State under President George W Bush, said Trump

has "drifted away" from the US Constitution and posed a danger to the country and its democracy.

"I cannot in any way support President Trump this year," Powell, who did not vote for the Republican president in 2016, told CNN. Asked if he would vote for Biden, he added: "I will be voting for him."

In a tweet, Trump called Powell "a real stiff".

Powell is the latest former top military officer to rebuke Trump in the wake of sweeping mass protests aimed at fighting racial injustice spurred by the May 25 death of an unarmed Black man, George Floyd, in Minnesota.

"We are in a turning point,"

Powell said, blasting Republican senators for not standing up to Trump.

"He lies about things. And he gets away with it because people will not hold him accountable."

Former Secretary of Defense Jim Mattis and other retired officers have condemned Trump in recent days.

"Donald Trump is the first president in my lifetime who does not try to unite the American people, does not even pretend to try. Instead, he tries to divide us," Mattis said.

A few Republican members of Parliament have also spoken out against Trump's handling of the outcry and have raised questions about their

support for his re-election bid, though most have remained quiet or continued to voice support for the president.

Last week, Senator Lisa Murkowski told reporters she was struggling over whether she would back Trump in the November 3 election and praised Mattis's strong words as did fellow Republican Mitt Romney.

Powell, who is Black, was one of the few prominent Republicans to denounce Trump during the former reality television star's 2016 presidential run and publicly endorse Trump's then-rival Hillary Clinton.



## Kenyan police 'killed 15' since start of coronavirus curfew

Police in Kenya have reportedly been involved in the killing of 15 people since the government imposed in March a dusk-to-dawn curfew as part of a series of sweeping measures to combat the spread of novel coronavirus.

The Independent Policing Oversight Body (IPOA) said in a statement seen by AFP news agency on Friday that it had received 87 complaints against police since the curfew and heightened security measures were rolled out on March 27.

The complaints included deaths, shootings, harassment, assaults, robbery, inhuman treatment and sexual assault.

"After preliminary investigations, 15 deaths and 31 incidents where victims sustained injuries have directly been linked to actions of police officers during the curfew enforcement," the policing oversight body said.

The IPOA statement was released earlier this week as the United States was gripped by anger over police brutality and racism following the killing of another Black man, George Floyd, at the hands of white officers.

Activists on social media have drawn parallels with Kenya's scourge of police brutality, which often goes unpunished.

Kenya's police force is often accused by rights groups of using excessive force and carrying out unlawful killings, especially in poor neighbourhoods.

In April, Human Right

Watch (HRW) accused the police of imposing the curfew in a "chaotic and violent manner from the start", sometimes whipping, kicking and tear-gassing people to force them off the streets.

It described the case of 13-year-old Yassin Hussein Moyo who died in the capital, Nairobi, on March 31 after being shot while standing on his balcony as police forced people into their homes on the street below.

In others, a tomato seller died in western Kakamega after being hit by a tear gas canister, while four men were beaten to death in different parts of the country.

"It is shocking that people are losing their lives and livelihoods while supposedly being protected from infection," Otieno Namwaya, HRW's senior Africa researcher, said at the time.

In a February report detailing the killing of at least eight people in Nairobi's low-income neighbourhoods, HRW said police "continue to kill crime suspects and protesters in cold blood despite persistent calls to end the killings and the use of excessive force".

Interior Minister Fred Matiangi on Friday criticised police excesses, but "took exception to painting the entire service with the same brush", his office said in a statement.

"We have challenges in our law enforcement, and we must all rise and start dealing with them collectively instead of

creating a stigma around the police," Matiangi said.

According to the statement, the country's chief prosecutor Noordin Haji has formed a specialised unit to speedily handle cases of police violence, and is currently working on 171 cases of such brutality, 81 of which are in court.

On Thursday, the IPOA announced six police officers would be arrested and prosecuted, one for the killing of Moyo, another for shooting dead a secondary school teacher while responding to a burglary at a market in western Siaya, and four others for seri-

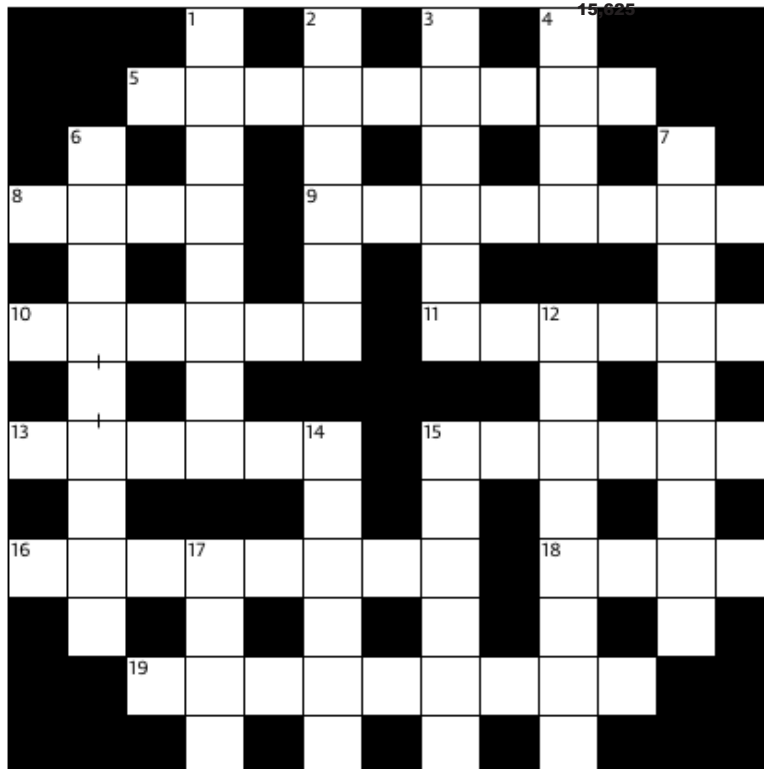
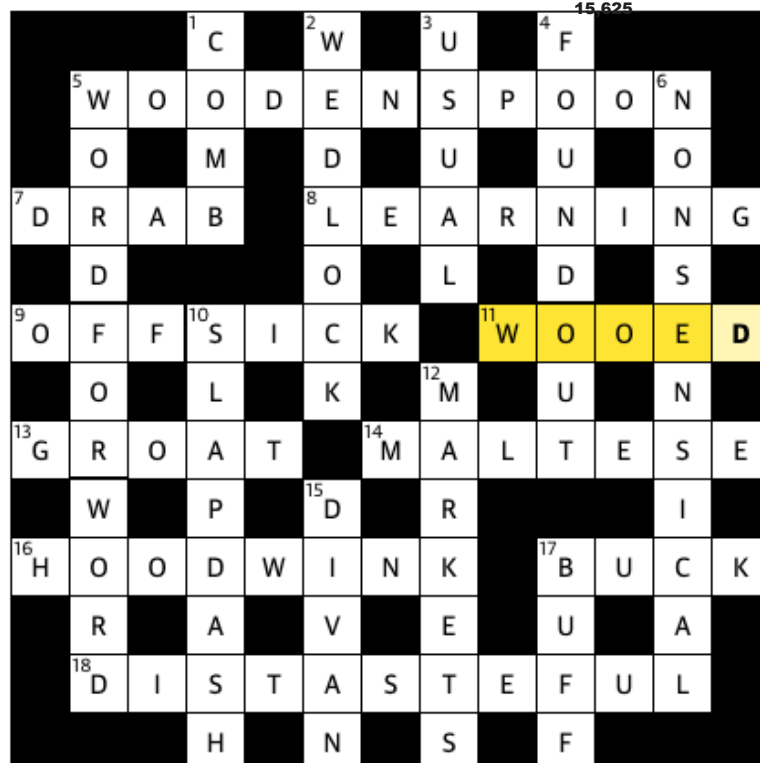
ously assaulting a man during an arrest.

In early April, President Uhuru Kenyatta apologised for the violence following the enforcement of the curfew.

"I want to apologise to all Kenyans for ... some excesses that were conducted," he said at the time. "But I want to assure you that if we work together, if we all understand that this problem needs all of us, and if we pull in the same direction, we will overcome."

To date, Kenya has confirmed 2,474 coronavirus cases and 79 related deaths.

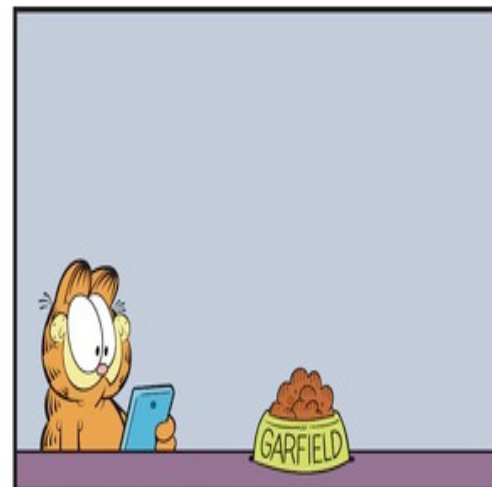

er, who has been selected in the West Indies 14 member squad to face England in the UK, says his preparation has been good but he is waiting to arrive in Manchester to assess the conditions before setting his goal for the three match test series.

The regional team will leave Antigua today on a chartered flight to the UK where they will quarantine

for 14 days while training before playing their first game on 8 July.

What's your favorite version of the game Cornwall was asked, "test because it's pure cricket and it gives you more time to develop and correct your errors, T/20 is more hit or miss," the strongly built all-rounder said.
