Five new COVID-19 cases confirmed

The Ministry of Health has reported that there are five new cases of the coronavirus in the country.

That brings the number of persons confirmed with COVID-19 in the country to one hundred and six (106).

In a statement issued overnight, the ministry said latest statistics come by way of testing conducted by the Mount St. John Medical Center (MSJMC) and confirmed by the Caribbean Public Health Agency (CARPHA).

The results reflect the data available up to Wednesday 30, September, 2020 at 6:00 pm.

Subsequent to the publication of the dashboard on Wednesday 30th September, 2020 with the cut off time of 6:00 pm, twenty-three samples were processed at the MSJMC Laboratory which

increased the pending results from fifty-four to seventy-seven.


All twenty-three samples processed by MSJMC yielded negative results and are reflected in the total samples taken and total tested columns of the dashboard.

Of the fifty-four samples processed by CARPHA, five returned positive while forty-nine were negative.

Investigations are currently ongoing.

Meanwhile, two new recovered cases have been recorded bringing that total to ninety-four. Consequently, the total number of persons with laboratory confirmed COVID-19 cases in Antigua and Barbuda is one hundred and six (106) with nine (9) active cases.

The dashboard has been updated to reflect these changes.



Transportation of prisoners under review

The head of the prison service has confirmed that discussions aimed at changing the way prison inmates are transported are underway.

This follows a vehicular accident on Thursday morning that resulted in several inmates and prison officers being taken to hospital for medical evaluation.

"There was an accident on the Cedar Valley road involving the prison truck that was carrying prisoners and being driven by an officer. All six inmates and the officer were taken to Mount St. John's Medical Centre for treatment. Four we treated and immediately discharged while two others and the officer were kept longer for observation, however, by late afternoon all were released by the institution. There were no broken bones or other serious injuries," Lieutenant Colonel Eugene Philip, Chief of Prisons reported.

The circumstances that led to the accident are not clear, but the canter truck carrying the inmates toppled after the driver reportedly maneuvered

to avoid colliding with an accident involving two other vehicles.

Colonel Eugene Phillip said discussions with the Permanent Secretaries of the Ministry of Works and the Prison Service are to secure a vehicle with cover that will prevent a recurrence Thursday morning's incident in which the inmates were thrown from the canter truck.

According to Phillip, he is hoping that out of these discussions the prison will receive a minibus in which inmates can be transported.

Greene sets accusers right about Chinese arrivals

Allegations that a plane filled with Chinese nationals was allowed to enter Antigua and Barbuda without being processed by immigration authorities has been shut down by the government.

Minister of Foreign Affairs and Immigration, E. P. Chet Greene, responded to the allegation which was made in a social media post by a former United Progressive Party administration minister and another opposition activist. According to them, the Chinese passengers, who arrived on Wednesday afternoon aboard a chartered China Eastern airline flight, were allowed to bypass immigration.

The accusing posts were

accompanied by photographs which showed the disembarked passengers clustered together as they awaited entry into the V. C. Bird International Airport arrivals terminal.

The UPP activists also used the photographs to support their claim that social distancing protocols were not being observed by the Chinese nationals or being enforced by local authorities.

The critics, who gave the number of arriving Chinese as 170, further speculated on whether the incoming passengers would be allowed to dispense with the fourteen day mandatory quarantine that is required under Antigua and Barbuda's COVID-19 health regulations for the global pan-

COVID-19 originated in the People's Republic of China.

Greene called Pointe FM's morning programme, Starting Pointe on Thursday to refute the allegations and

disclosed pertinent facts.

"What happened Wednesday was nothing more than the rotation of staff by the China Construction and Engineering Company (CCEC). That's the cont'd on pg 5

company that we all know is responsible for building the Port Authority's new port facilities [at the Deep Water Harbour].

"That's the company we all know is responsible for building the new Chinese embassy, the same company which, it was announced recently, has agreed to head-quarter its operations here in Antigua and Barbuda," Greene stated.

"So if we start on that premise of information already shared with the public, then the devil is taken out of what is nothing more than a political attempt to make it seem as if something dastardly has happened or is happening," Greene said.

The minister continued that the arriving CCEC workers all came with proof of their negative PCR tests for COVID-19.

"All are subject to the laws of Antigua and Barbuda in this regard. I refer to the fourteen day quarantine period before they can start any work with their [employer] here."

He also confirmed that the negative PCR tests which the Chinese workers presented have all been verified by local medical authorities.

Regarding the exact number of passengers that had arrived on the China Eastern chartered flight, Greene said it was 156.

Of that number, 15 were transiting Antigua to Dominica, leaving a net of 141 who were admitted into the country on Wednesday. The


minister further reported that 163 Chinese nationals departed Antigua and Barbuda that same day.

He said this rotation of Chinese workers should give the people of Antigua and Barbuda further confidence in their government's responsible management.

"The typical Chinese rotation or movement of workers into Antigua for any project, be it the stadium, Multipurpose Centre, the new Knuckle Block project, would have used commercial airlines through the UK, through the US, through Canada, wherever.

With border closures, the company opted to do a charter, which gave the added advantage or benefit of having all those workers come to Antigua in a bubble, so to speak, as they travelled together.

"So there was no possibility of any of them contracting the virus while transiting any country or any airport, because of how they came to Antigua in a single charter flight," Greene explained.

Harris Paints to expand its retail outlets

The Chief Executive Officer of Harris Paints says by October, the company will expand their retail footprint in Antigua adding six new retailers to its distributor network making it even easier to access the Harris brand.

Ian Kenyon said they will always be looking to expand their wide ranging brand portfolio into locations that are fully committed to supporting the brand and its values, but for the time being, they believe they have the right balance of accessibility combined with the right level of professionalism and customer focus offered by recent additions to the Harris team.

Harris Paints issued a statement on Thursday in response to local paint retailers who expressed the fear that they would be pushed out of the market with the arrival of Harris Paints.

Kenyon stated that less developed countries within CARICOM have been discussing steps to create an incentive to attract investment for almost 20 years and during this time any manufacturer could have invested in Antigua or any of the other Less Developed Countries (LDC) economies.

He pointed out that because Harris already had plants in Dominica and St.



Lucia, both LDC countries, Harris was already uniquely positioned to supply the Antigua market duty free.

Kenyon added, "Other paint companies could have launched in Antigua, but they chose not to do so. That was their decision but we saw tremendous potential in Antigua and acted accordingly.

"It should be no surprise either that our ambitions also extend beyond Antigua because Antigua is in an excellent geographical location supported by world class port facilities which makes it the ideal base to develop export markets in the northern Caribbean."

He continued that it is a well known fact in the paint community, that Berger also has a paint plant in LDC Grenada, which means that Berger, and its other brand Sissons, are equally well placed to supply paints to Antigua tariff free both now and in the future.

He also challenged the concern that Harris would become a monopoly as it is available in 50% of Antigua's major retailers and as its biggest competitor is able to supply paint, duty free, from Grenada.

The Harris Paints CEO said that the government had been very supportive in assisting Harris in starting its operations quickly and applauded its efforts to attract investment to the island, to develop local business, provide jobs and stimulate the economy.

Harris, Kenyon pointed out, has every intention of sticking to its winning formula of manufacturing premium quality coatings that are made by locals for their local communities. He added that the company is now completely focused and energized on making this vision benefit every Antiguan.

Barbuda Council's case against Paradise Found heads to Privy Council

The Barbuda Council has won the right to challenge the constitutionality of the Paradise Found Act, passed by the Antigua and Barbuda parliament in 2015, before the Privy Coun-

On Wednesday, the Appeal Court granted the Barbuda Council leave to appeal to the Privy Council in London. The council took issue with the Paradise Found Act even though it received the approval of parliament.

The Barbuda Council first won the case in the High Court. The government appealed the decision before the Eastern Caribbean Court of Appeal which ruled in its favour. The Barbuda Council will now present Peace, Love and Harmony project at its case before the country's highest appellate court, the Privy Council, in the hope of reversing the Eastern Caribbean Court of Appeal decision.

The Barbuda Council hopes through its legal action to have the agreement between the government and the developers of the proposed Paradise Found resort project nullified.

The attorneys in this case include former Attorney General, Justin Simon.

In another matter that came up on Thursday, the High Court granted an injunction filed by the Barbuda Council that will affect work at the

Palmetto Point.

Parliamentary representative for Barbuda, Trevor Walker, said the basis of the Barbuda Council's cases centres on what it considers to be the destruction of the environment by the developers.

They have found support for their case in the form of a letter written by Chief Environment Officer, Ambassador Diane Black-Layne, dated August 31, 2020, in which examples of environmental degradation at the site were cited.

The matter will be heard on October 13, 2020.

Appeals Court dismisses drug offenses case

The Appeals Court, sitting virtually in St. John's, has dismissed an appeal by Camara Swift who was convicted last year on several drug offences.

In July 2019, Swift, who

was found guilty by a jury of trafficking, possession of illegal drugs and possession of the drugs with intent to supply, was sentenced in August to nine years on the drug trafficking charge and three years on the two other offences to run concurrently.

He moved to appeal his conviction, but it was dismissed by the Appeals Court.

Swift was appealing on the grounds that the sentence was unjust and that the judge erred in his direction to the jury, but Director of Public Prosecution, Anthony Armstrong responded that the judge's direction pertaining to knowledge, an ingredient required to prove a drug case, was sufficient and that the evidence on which the jury could return with the verdict of guilty was provided.

Armstrong cited that the direction given by the judge in respect to lies was adequate and that a full locus direction was not required, as the defense claimed.

The appeal was heard by Justices of Appeal Davidson Baptiste, Paul Anthony Webster and Gretel Thom.

Antigua and Barbuda still planning to host Carifesta

"If culture, music and the arts are to be large contributors to the economy of Antigua and Barbuda, they must have reach. We can't be just backyard bullies within Antigua and Barbuda and expect to have impact on the regional and global scene that would generate huge economic benefits for Antigua and Barbuda."

Those were the words of the Minister of Sports, National Festivals, Culture and the Arts, Daryll Matthew, when he appeared on Thursday's edition of Pointe FM's morning programme Starting Pointe.

The Minister was responding to a question concerning marketing and expansion options for local music, culture and creative arts amid the restrictions occasioned by COVID-19 have practically which eliminated attendance and participation by live audiences.

This has led to serious curtailment of revenue that would have been collected through ticket sales and gate receipts by event organizers and as sales by vendors at physically patronized venues.

Matthew said that in response to this new normal, "We now have to do a few things to prepare ourselves and prepare our artistes

to be able to capitalize on any opportunities that may arise."

He said these adaptations involve, "Training and teaching local artisans to not be just, say, a calypsonian or singer within Antigua and Barbuda, but to see themselves as entrepreneurs and businessmen and businesswomen so that they can produce music that resonates worldwide."

Matthew continued that musicians from other territories such as Trinidad and Tobago are learning those lessons and putting them into practice by "morphing and tweaking their music", sometimes "just a little bit so that it has greater international appeal."

Minister Matthew lamented that Antigua and Barbuda performers of times past who did not have the technology for global access and interconnectedness at their disposal, as do contemporary musicians, were still able to market their music internationally and gain a measure of popularity, recognition and acclaim that today's artistes are unable to or struggle to replicate.

He suggested that if music and other areas of the creative industries are to become meaningful contributors to the country's economy, the accomplishment of forerunners such as King

Short Shirt, King Swallow and Burning Flames will have to be sustained, repeated and built upon as the facilities and avenues to do so exist and are available or accessible.

"The cultural development division has been doing quite a bit of training with the staff to teach them to be teachers, to help them put the curriculum together on how they can help our young people understand how to handle craft, how to think of themselves as more than just singers or dancers or cooks, but to see themselves as entrepreneurs with unique skill sets."

Causion to hold Thank You Mission Concert

Antigua and Barbuda's internationally acclaimed reggae artist, Causion, is set to take his Thank You Mission project on a musical journey.

He will be the sole act in a concert to complement the existing platform.

The initiative was launched as a fundraising platform designed to offset the medical costs associated with his colon cancer treatment.

It is intended as a long term project which will support artists from around the world who face similar challenges.

In an interview on Ras Kimba and Kenny Nibbs' weekly Saturday programme, 'Conscious Vibes' on Pointe FM, Causion briefly shared information concerning his battle against colon cancer.

He said he now calls the date he received his diagnosis, November 19, 2019, his new birthdate. His mental fortitude was clear as he was positive and upbeat throughout the interview in which he declared, "My father did not give me this to deal with just so.

"My faith is the most powerful tool and I am channeling positivity."



The genesis of the Thank You Mission, he explained began as he lay in hospital undergoing treatment watching his life's savings drained away by medical bills.

His financial plight was increased as he had no health insurance to provide relief and his family to sustain all while bills continued to roll in.

Having no desire to utilise fundraising avenues such as GoFundMe, he decided to create a self-sustaining project that he could be part of which would be imbued with positivity and that would speak life to others.

This gave birth to the Thank You Project. Causion said it was important to him to develop something that would be original and have an impact on lives other than his own while also supporting other artists who find themselves in need of assistance.

During the interview he remarked, "Many musicians may find themselves in situations where they have given so much time creating, touring, writing, constantly on the grind that there is often little time or attention paid to matters such as medical insurance."

Artists, he observed, are

unfortunately often without adequate savings to effectively address major medical issues.

The concert will be aired on Saturday 10th October on several platforms including Facebook.

It will feature a performance of his latest single 'Thank You' which was written during his current health battle. 'Thank You', Causion explained, exudes the positivity and gratitude guiding his spirit.

doubt in his mind that, "We do have the talent here and we have done it in the past, but we seem to have lost our way somewhere along the line. "We are having a meeting with Caricom next week, and Carifesta obviously will be front and center on the agenda. Once we have these discussions next week, we will know where it goes from there, but we continue to plan for our Carifesta celebrations, we continue to position Antigua and Barbuda to develop an excellent Carifesta.

"The team has been working hard, and I have no doubt in my mind that when we do host Carifesta, it will be memorable for all the right reasons."

How a slaver's memorial ended up in a Dorset church

Why a plaque celebrating planned return to the West one man's role in the deadly suppression of a slave rebellion in Jamaica came to be on the wall of a Dorset church is not entirely clear, but the memorial stone marking the exploits of 18th century plantation owner, John Gordon, will now be removed from St Peter's in Dorchester following a vote by church leaders.

The plaque commemorates Gordon and his role in Tacky's War, a slave rebellion in which hundreds were killed.

Scottish-born Gordon owned more than 400 slaves who worked on his plantations in Jamaica.

He died in Dorchester in 1774, aged 46, after returning to England to write his will.

It is not known why he

Indies, nonetheless, he was buried at the church and a memorial was erected.


The inscription uses offensive language and praises Gordon for being "signally instrumental in quelling a dangerous rebellion".

Tacky's War

The uprising from April to July 1760 was led by a former West African chief who had been sold into slavery by rival leaders following his army's defeat in modern day Ghana.

Tacky and his men began taking over plantations and killing the owners, with hundreds more slaves joining the revolt as it spread to





Mounted militia moved to suppress the uprising and Tacky was shot, beheaded and his head displayed on a pole. Others faced horrific executions.

The rebellion continued to inspire further uprisings across the island, all of which were brutally suppressed. By the time order was restored many months later, between 400 and 500 slaves had been killed and many hundreds more were transported and re-sold.

About 60 white people lost their lives.

In a statement to the parish council, the group said: "The plaque is nothing to do with history or education. It is about what we are supposed to admire and revere. It is an approving commemoration of an event, the suppression of a revolt by enslaved people, resulting in the deaths of around 450 enslaved people, some tortured and put to horrible deaths.

"Go in any church and you see monuments to the great and the good, many of whom got their wealth from

slavery, but this is different. It is a blatant and explicit glorification of white domination and the suppression of enslaved people."

Campaign group member, David Rhodes, who also attends the church, said: "It has been there on that wall quite prominently for two and a half centuries and what bothers me is that people have got used to it. It has become normalised. Every Sunday the gospel of Jesus would be read more or less from underneath that plaque. It is offensive and has no place in public view."

Church Warden, Val Potter said: "We are not going to destroy this monument, but its story should be told in a museum rather than on a church wall. We've been aware of it for quite some time. The only negative comments we get in the visitors book in the church are of that monument. The intention was always to put some kind of notice up next to it so we are really pleased that the Black Lives Matter movement raised the sense of urgency."

Guyana: Evidence from Berbice teens' murder sent to St. Lucia for analysis

(Guyana Chronicle) Evidence gathered from investigations into the murders of West Coast Berbice teenagers Isaiah Henry, Joel Henry and Haresh Singh has been sent to St. Lucia for analysis, President Dr. Irfaan Ali has revealed.

During an interview with media personnel at his office, the President said: "We have a team that has left for St. Lucia with some of the evidence to do more detailed analysis, so that is going on at the same time.

"For confidentiality reasons, the regional body has asked to have certain things respected from their perspective and we are sticking to that.

"There are components of the MoU that can't be made public."

While noting that there is a cost attached to the support Guyana is receiving from the regional body, he added that the matter of cost "is a small issue in relation to what we hope to achieve and that is bringing these people [perpetrators] to justice."


The five-member team of investigators from the Regional Security System



(RSS) on Tuesday commenced its investigations to assist the Guyana Police Force (GFP) with the three high-profile murders in Berbice.

The team, which is led by an assistant commissioner of police, comprises officials from countries within the Regional Investigative Management Systems (RIMS).

Their visit is within the framework of a Memorandum of Understanding between the Government of Guyana and The Caribbean Community Implementation Agency for Crime and Security (CARICOM IMPACS).



It follows a decision by President Dr. Irfaan Ali to seek regional assistance to investigate the West Berbice murders.

Police Press Officer Assistant Commissioner Royston Andries-Junor said the visiting team will be assisting with the investigation and has been given scope to review and explore all avenues necessary to find answers relating to the murders.

On September 6, the bodies of teen cousins Isaiah and Joel Henry were found in the backlands of Cotton Tree, WCB, almost one day after they were reported missing.

They had left their Number Three Village, WCB home to pick coconuts in the backlands, but did not return home.

Their butchered bodies were found in clumps of bushes partially covered in mud, after relatives went in search of them.

The news of their deaths sparked protests across several villages along the West Coast Berbice corridor and several commuters were beaten and robbed. With blocked roads, some vehicles were also torched.

Grenada: Spike in leptospirosis cases for 2020

(NowGrenada) There is a spike in leptospirosis — the blood infection caused by the bacteria Leptospira — according to epidemiological data from the Ministry of Health.

Records show that as of 19 September 2020 there were 15 confirmed cases, a significant increase when compared to the data of 2018 and 2019 in which there were 12 and 11 cases respectively.

Classified as a vector-borne disease, the reservoir for this disease in Grenada is the rat.

"In Grenada, the main means of contracting this disease is from rats, and so people need to starve the rats and don't provide an avenue for them to survive and breed.

"The goal should be keeping the environment clean," said Kenny James, a senior health environmental officer in the Ministry of Health.

He warns that persons should not use any product that has been bitten or urinated on by rats. "As the



reservoir of the bacteria, anything a rat encounters can become a transmitter for disease and so people have to throw away these products," he said.

"Proper sanitation and keeping the environment clean is the best way to reduce the chances of getting this vector-borne disease.

Rats do not survive in

a clean environment, so my advice is for people to clean up the place and deprive rats of foods."

Signs and symptoms of the disease which can cause death if not treated early, can range from mild symptoms such as headaches, muscle pains, and fevers to severe with bleeding in the lungs, or

meningitis.

The increase in leptospirosis is observed at a time when the country is dealing with an outbreak of dengue which is also a vector-borne disease.

"What is important to note is that for both vector-borne diseases, keeping the environment clean is important to reduce the spread," James said.

The Ministry of Health confirmed that 133 persons have been diagnosed with dengue so far for the year, with the month of September recording a significant jump in confirmed cases. There were 126 cases in 2019.

SVG: Gov't approves papaya leaf extract for dengue treatment

(IWNSVG) Following consensus derived from a meeting of pharmacy, medical and nursing professionals on Tuesday evening, the Pharmaceutical Services, Ministry of Health, Wellness and the Environment, is advocating the use of papaya leaf extract in the management of dengue fever. This is based on evidence that the plant extract has proven to be effective and, therefore, useful in the improvement of patient outcomes in persons affected by the Dengue infection.

Papaya leaf extract is now being widely used as a treatment for dengue fever in many countries, in many cases with the approval of their health authorities e.g. Sri Lanka, India, Pakistan, among other Asian countries.

Papaya leaf extract is becoming popular as an unlicensed herbal remedy purported to hasten recovery in dengue infection. The remedy is already in use in St Vincent and the Grenadines as a homemade preparation and is becoming an important adjunct treatment in the face of our present dengue fever outbreak.

platelets. Platelets, pieces of a very large type of bone marrow cell, are found in the blood and spleen and help form blood clots to slow or stop bleeding. Papaya leaf extract seems to reverse all of these processes and the associated inflammation in quick time.

Trinidad: Commissioner apologises to the PM over 'private property' tiff

(LoopTT) Commissioner of Police Gary Griffith has formally apologised to Prime Minister Dr Keith Rowley for the comments he made regarding the police's jurisdiction on private property.

Griffith said since the incident, he's issued a written apology to the prime minister and made it public during today's weekly media briefing.

"It was in no way appropriate for me to make such a comment that could allude to the comments I made to the prime minister. Since then, I have written to the honourable prime minister, I have apologised and I wish to take this time openly to let the public know that I do apologise for the comments I made," he said.

The commissioner added that while he still stands by the spirit of his comments, he acknowledged that his delivery was unsavoury.

"Even though the message was accurate, how the message went about became lost because of how I said it.

"It came from my strong degree of passion, but again that is no excuse, it was completely unacceptable. I apologise to the

country for the comments that I made," he said.

Griffith said that despite seeking to ensure that the constitutional rights of citizens were upheld, he understands that his comments were inappropriate.

"There was this perception that the police service wasn't doing all that we could.

"My strong degree of passion for making sure that I serve the country and I serve my citizens as well as looking after my police officers," he said.

The commissioner's apology follows a meeting that he had with Dr Rowley and Minister of National Security Stuart Young on September 14.

A few days prior, the prime minister publicly called on the commissioner of police to distribute the law fairly not paying attention to class or race. Griffith responded with a scathing perspective.

Griffith said at the time: "He does not have a concern when we release 27 persons who actually broke the law in Sea Lots, swimming in a public place, escaping and trying to evade police captivity, that shows hypocrisy, that is not democracy."

The leaders were at loggerheads over whether police could enter private property where occupants could be in violation of COVID-19 regulations.

Lebanon asks Interpol to detain two Russians over Beirut blast

(Aljazeera) The lead investigator into the August blast at Beirut's port that killed almost 200 and wounded thousands has issued arrest warrants for the captain and owner of a ship that carried thousands of tonnes of ammonium nitrate to Beirut seven years ago, the state-run National News Agency (NNA) said.

Nearly 2,700 tonnes of ammonium nitrate stored at Beirut's port exploded on August 4, killing 193, wounding about 6,500, and leaving nearly 300,000 people homeless.

On Thursday, judge Fadi Sawwan referred the case to the state prosecution that asked Interpol to detain the two Russian citizens.

NNA did not give the names of the two men but Boris Prokoshev was the captain who sailed the MV Rhosus from Turkey to Beirut in 2013. Igor Grechushkin, a Russian businessman residing in the Mediterranean island of Cyprus, bought the cargo ship in 2012 from Cypriot businessman Charalambos Manoli.

Grechushkin was questioned by police at the request of Interpol's Lebanon office in August.'

More than two dozen people, most of them port and customs officials, have been detained since the blast which is considered to be one of the biggest non-nuclear explosions ever recorded.

The ammonium nitrate arrived in Lebanon in September 2013, on board a Russian-owned cargo vessel flying a Moldovan Flag. The Rhosus, according to information from the ship-tracking site, Fleetmon, was heading from Georgia to Mozambique.

The cargo was then offloaded and placed in Hangar 12 of Beirut port, a large grey structure facing the country's main northsouth highway at the main entrance to the capital.

The ammonium nitrate remained at the warehouse until it exploded. The Rhosus never left the port and sank there in February 2018, according to Lebanese official documents.

The blast further rattled a nation grappling with its worst crisis since the 1975-1990 civil war.

The economy is collapsing after decades of state waste, corruption and mounting debt. Banks have frozen people out of their savings and the currency has crashed.

Meanwhile, Lebanon is also struggling to deal with the spread of the novel coronavirus.

Schools have not yet reopened after a spike in cases, which have risen in the wake of the explosion to more than 35,000 infections including at least 340 deaths since February 9.

After Pompeo criticism, Vatican asserts right to go its own way on China

(Reuters) The Vatican's number two said on Thursday after talks with Mike Pompeo that the two sides' positions on China remained far apart and firmly asserted the Holy See's right to pursue an accord with Beijing denounced by the U.S. Secretary of

Pompeo met Secretary of State Cardinal Pietro Parolin and Foreign Minister Archbishop Paul Gallagher on Thursday on a visit to Rome marked by Vatican irritation over Pompeo's public criticism of a Holy See accord with Beijing on the appointment of bishops.

Vatican officials have said they were "surprised" by Pompeo's comments, made last month, and particularly that they were published in a conservative U.S. Catholic publication that has called Pope Francis' pontificate a failure.

Parolin, second only to the pope in the Vatican hierarchy, spoke to reporters on the sidelines of a book launch on Thursday night. He was asked if the positions were still distant.

"Yes, even though the purpose of the meeting was not to bring the positions closer," he said.

In an article and a series of tweets in September Pompeo accused the Vatican of putting its "moral authority" at risk if it renewed an agreement with China over the appointment of bishops. It sparked a minor diplomat-

Vatican officials suggested Pompeo was trying to drag the Catholic Church into the U.S. presidential election by

Pompeo has denied this.

"He (Pompeo) explained his reasons for making those statements and we explained our reasons why we intend to move ahead on the path we have already chosen," Parolin said.

Parolin said the Vatican "asserts (the right to move forward) with a choice that has been thought through, reflected on, prayed over, a choice the pope has made, therefore the freedom to move forward."

The Vatican's two-year-old accord with Beijing gives the pope final say over the appointment of Chinese bishops. Parolin said the Vatican would renew it when it expires this month.

Vatican officials say the agreement is not perfect but establishes a

denouncing its relations with China. dialogue with Beijing after decades during which Chinese Catholics faithful to the pope were driven underground.

> Parolin said Pompeo had expressed "understanding for the way the Holy See approaches these issues."

US Senate subpoenas heads of Google, Facebook and Twitter

(BBC) The US Senate Commerce Committee has voted to subpoena the heads of Google, Facebook, and Twitter.

It means that Sundar Pichai, Mark Zuckerberg and Jack Dorsey face being quizzed by senators about their policies on different types of content.

One focus will be the legal protections they enjoy regarding what they leave up and take down on their platforms.

They are also likely to be challenged over controversies about privacy and misinformation.

Republicans and Democrats on the committee voted unanimously to summon the chief executives.

However, each side is likely to have different priorities - with some Republican members speaking about the alleged censorship of conservative views online, while Democrats focus on competition and misinformation.

"There has never been such an aggregation of power in the history of humankind as big tech enjoys today, with money and monopoly, power and the hubris that comes with the unchecked use of power," Republican Senator Ted Cruz said following the vote.

The subpoenas follow

an earlier hearing in July when Amazon, Apple, Facebook and Google's chiefs testified to a House committee about competition issues and claims of bias.

Protected status

Currently, social media platforms and other websites are protected from prosecution under Section 230 of the Communications Decency Act.

It means, in effect, that the platforms are not liable for what is posted by their users if they take things down once notified, unlike traditional newspaper publishers.

But the protection has been thrown back into the spotlight this year after President Trump argued it should no longer apply if social networks were engaged in "an editorial role" - such as when Twitter began adding warnings and labels to some of the president's tweets.

Edward Snowden's book earnings should go to US gov't, court rules

(Reuters) The United States is entitled to more than \$5.2 million from former National Security Agency contractor Edward Snowden's book royalties, a federal court ruled this week, according to the U.S. Department of Justice.

In a statement, the department said the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Virginia on Tuesday also ruled in favor of setting up a trust for the government for any future earnings from Snowden's book, which had been the subject of a federal lawsuit.

A lawyer for Snowden did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

In September 2019, the U.S. government sued Snowden, who resides in Russia, over his publication of "Permanent Record", a book which the United States says violated

non-disclosure agreements he signed when working for both NSA and the Central Intelligence Agency.

The United States alleges that Snowden published the book without first submitting it to U.S. agencies for pre-publication review, in violation of agreements he signed when working for the agencies. U.S. authorities did not seek to block publication of Snowden's book but rather to seize all proceeds.

Last December, a federal court in Virginia found that Snowden did breach his obligations to the CIA and NSA but reserved judgment on possible remedies.

In an order issued on Tuesday, the court entered a judgment in the U.S. government's favor for more than \$5.2 million.

The civil litigation over the book is separate from criminal charges prosecutors filed against Snowden under a 1917 U.S. espionage law.



US sanctions on Huawei on national security grounds have created a challenge for the company - one of the world's biggest phone manufacturers - which says it will begin using its own non-Android operating system next year.



Lakers Beat Miami Heat 116-98 in Game One of NBA Finals

LeBron James says the Los Angeles Lakers still have "a lot more work to do" after they comfortably beat the injury hit Miami Heat 116-98 in game one of the NBA Finals.

Anthony Davis scored 34 points for the Lakers, with James adding 25 points and nine assists. Jimmy Butler had 23 points for the Heat who lost point guard Goran Dragic and forward Bam Adebayo to injury.

James said: "The job is not done. We're not satisfied winning one game."

Speaking after Thursday's game, he added: "You have to get a feel for how hard Miami plays.

"We got a sense for that. We got more work to do. It's that simple."

The Lakers went into the series as overwhelming favorites to land a record equaling 17th NBA Championship title, 10 years after



their last finals appearance.

However, it was the Heat who began the game on top, racing into a 13-point lead in the first quarter.

That advantage would not last long, though, as the Lakers scored 11 three-pointers to complete a 30-point turnaround by the end of the first half before surging clear in the second.

"They're a great team. They're here for a reason," said Lakers forward Davis.

Miami's evening made worse by Dragic and Adebayo both being forced out of the game.

Dragic, Miami's leading scorer in the postseason, suffered a foot injury in the second quarter, while Adebayo left with a shoulder strain in the third.

Butler was also forced to leave the court with a sprained ankle, but was able to return in the fourth quarter.

"I'll be OK. Some treatment and I get ready to go again. I've got to be ready to go," he said.

Game two of the best-ofseven series is on Friday.

COVID-19 has decimated sports

Minister of Sports, Daryll Matthew, says COVID-19 has decimated sports in Antigua and Barbuda.

Matthew, who appeared on Starting Point on Pointe FM on Thursday, noted that European nations and the United States of America, whose business models revolve around broadcast sales, have utilized bio-secure environments to resume major sport events.

The former president of the Antigua and Barbuda Basketball Association noted however, that in smaller nations, including Antigua and Barbuda, where sports events generate minimal financial return and centre more on entertainment and bragging rights, bubble environments are not feasible.

"It's almost impossible for small nations to finance a bio-secure atmosphere," Matthew said.

"We in Antigua and Barbuda have been fortunate that through the hard work of our frontline workers, the Ministry of Health and the government, we have kept our count low, our quarantine centers open and have been able to identify, contact trace and contain coronavirus cases quickly.

"Because of the low count the government took a decision to allow recreational sports in all disciplines within certain protocols," Matthew noted.

The minister is appealing to sports enthusiasts to follow health and safety protocols in order to keep the number of participants in sporting activities low.

"There is no need to have fifty people on a field. Break it up into seven a side and be reason-

"It's a collaborative effort that's required and the government can't be held responsible where people thew flaunt the protocols, do as they please and get infected," Matthew said.

"Exercise, take advantage of the opportunity we have, but do it within the protocols that have been established." Matthew concluded.

Meanwhile, Matthew indicated that Antiguan and Barbudan athletes who were preparing for this year's Olympics in Tokyo, Japan will now have to wait until 2021 to compete in the rescheduled games.

Despite the delay, Mat-Olympics will take place next year.
