LIAT receives warm welcome from Antigua, Dominica



November 1 was a historic day for LIAT and a momentous occasion for the government and people of Antigua and Barbuda and the governments and people of the Caribbean.

LIAT returned to the sky during a flight from Antigua to Dominica on Sunday after a seven month long break in operation. The airline was greeted by a water cannon salute as it taxied the tarmac at the V. C. Bird International Airport before beginning its journey to Dominica.

Upon arrival in Dominica, LIAT Flight 401's staff and passengers received an official welcome from

Dominican officials.

Dominica's Minister for Tourism, International Transport and Maritime Initiatives, Denise Charles, gave the commitment that their government would continue to support the airline. She said her government stood firmly with Antigua and Barbuda in the effort to revive LIAT.

LIAT returned to Antigua on Sunday evening.

For now, the airline has indicated that it will operate on a limited schedule when it fully rolls out in a few weeks.

Antigua and Barbuda's Minister

for Tourism, Charles 'Max' Fernandez said he was delighted at LI-AT's return.

Fernandez said LIAT's importance to the nation's economy must never be understated as,in addition to providing employment to hundreds of people, it also provides a vital link to countries across the region. This he said strengthens Antigua and Barbuda's standing as a regional hub for international air travel.

Regional COVID-19 increase bursts "travel bubble", delays LIAT comeback

The Caricom "travel bubble" has burst.

This was the declaration of Antigua and Barbuda's Prime Minister Gaston Browne who on Saturday discussed the region's struggle with the surge of new COVID-19 infections.

"The situation with the spread of COVID is not limited to Europe and North America. Right here in the Caribbean we are seeing more countries having community spread. The most recent would have been Saint Lucia [which]

within the last week, I'm told, would have had over 34 new cases of COVID. So it's evident that Saint Lucia now has community spread."

The prime minister explained that the reality of community spread of COVID-19 in countries across the region "has forced a change in the travel arrangements within Caricom. So whereas a few weeks ago we had agreed on a Caricom travel bubble, in effect the bubble has burst."

agree on common protocols. The Spice Isle will now require anyone coming into the country to present a negative COVID-19 PCR test and quarantine for seven days.

Montserrat had already announced at the end of September that it would not participate in the Caricom travel bubble over safety concerns. Premier Joseph Farrell explained that his government was concerned that Montserrat could be exposed to the disease by persons entering the country from high risk countries.

Antigua and Barbuda celebrates

The nation of Antigua and Barbuda celebrated its 39th Anniversary of Independence this year against the backdrop of the coronavirus pandemic.

Many of the activities normally associated with the annual independence celebrations were scaled down because of the pandemic as stringent safety regulations limited public gatherings. The devastating effect of the pandemic on the local economy also necessitated a less grandiose observance.

During the ceremonial parade held on Sunday afternoon at the Sir Vivian Richards Stadium, awards were presented to several individuals and one organisation in recognition of their outstanding contributions to the nation.

This year, Health Minister, Molwyn Joseph, was bestowed the title Knight Grand Cross, The Most Distinguished Order of the Nation (KGCN) for distinguished and outstanding contribution in the field of politics and development. Henceforth, he will be known as Sir Molwyn Joseph.

Also receiving top honour was Supervisor of Elections, Lorna Simon, who was bestowed the title Dame Commander of The Most Distinguished Order of the Nation (DCN). She will now be known as Dame Lorna Simon.

The other awardees were Winston Kenneth Nehemiah Gomes of the Antigua Port Authority; sports official, Clancy Mack; sports official, Keith Frederick, and the nation's oldest steel orchestra, The Hellsgate Steel Orchestra which was accepted by Veron Henry.

Awards were also presented COVID-19 Frontline Workers who were recognised in a separate category. The awardees were Anderson Joseph of the Customs Division, Nurse Soria Dupie-Winston, Corporal Timothy Philip Jr., Avery Henry of the Airport Authority, Wesley Simon of the Immigration Department and Lt. Carla Patreace Thom-

Prime Minister Gaston Browne, offered three cheers to the nation and its people and congratulations to the awardees for their outstanding contributions to Antiqua and Barbuda's development.

Willoughby Bay project details revealed

The committee spearheading the planning phase of the proposed development at Willoughby Bay has presented its plans to the public.

The Technical Committee, which is operating under the aegis of the Economic Recovery Committee (ERC), said the timing of the release was intended to coincide with the celebration of Antigua and Barbuda's 39th Anniversary of Independence.

Head of the Technical Committee, Ambassador Daven Joseph, said publicising the Willoughby Bay project plans at this time is a demonstration of the wherewithal of Antiguans and Barbudan's in spearheading the nation's development.

"This press conference is

called on the eve of our Independence to show the nation that as a people we have the capacity to develop our country and take on all the challenges associated with development and emerge with a project that will benefit every single one of us in a sustainable manner," Joseph said on Friday.

Joseph said the project will move forward with the goal of encouraging maximum private sector involvement as the government does not wish to 'monopolise' the development.

The Willoughby Bay project will involve a variety of elements including agriculture, hotel and hospitality, light-manufacturing, heritage tours and a marina.

Over three thousand acres of

land, both private and public, are earmarked for the project which will be developed in phases over a period of up to 15 years.

Joseph said the government will incentivize local participation in the development by making lands in the area available at attractive prices, specifically targeting nationals of Antigua and Barbuda.

The Technical Committee head also gave the assurance that consultations with the public will be prioritised by his committee and the ERC and confirmed that the first consultation will be held shortly.

"We are open to any suggestion from the public on how we

can pursue this project in a manner that all will be proud. On the issue of consultation, we are not there yet as currently we are in the formative stages of the project, however, I wish to reassure the nation that consultation forms an integral part of how we plan to approach this development."

Joseph underscored the significance of private sector involvement in the development and indicated that the Antigua Barbuda Chamber of Industry and Commerce and several prominent business people are playing critical roles as members of the planning committee.

Chief Executive Officer of George W. Bennett Bryson's, Patrick Ryan, gave full support to the project and has given his backing to any project intended to stimulate economic activity.

"I am happy to be part of this committee and to be part of putting together our own development plan in these difficult times where we are looking at our own recovery and not waiting on the rest of the world to recover and we follow suit," Ryan said.

General Manager of Antigua Motors Limited, Paul Ryan, remarked that the development will provide the opportunity to reverse some of the losses associated with the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Business has receded quite a bit since COVID, and this opens an opportunity for major growth in the country for many years to come," Ryan said.

According to Ryan farmers, and others who operate in the area, will receive a prominent seat at the planning and implementation table.

He fully embraced the project as one which takes national prominence and which he believes supersedes 'red and blue' politics.

The layout of the Willoughby Bay project will be officially debuted during a virtual investment forum on November 26. Consultations with the public and stakeholders will begin soon after.

New Jamaican Consul installed



Jamaica's Honorary Consul to Antiqua and Barbuda, Onika Campbell, has been cleared to begin performing duties on behalf of Jamaican nationals residing in Antiqua and Barbuda.

Last Friday, Campbell, and a Jamaican delegation, met with Foreign Affairs Minister, E. P. Chet Greene, who presented her with an exequatur.

An exequatur is an official recognition by a government of a consul, or other representative of a foreign state, authorising them to exercise office.

During the ceremony, Minister Greene discussed the commonalities among Caribbean people

and expressed his issues. continued desire for increased engagement between Antiaua and Barbuda and Jamaica. Не further expressed his intention to foster deeper bilateral relations and to strengthinterconnectivity between Caribbean nations.

Campbell expressed her desire to work along with the Government of Antiqua and Barbuda and indicated her readiness to engage in development and cultural activities to the benefit of Antiquans and Brarbudans and Jamaicans.

"The relationship between Antigua and Barbuda and Jamaica is strong and long lasting. The interests of both countries converge and correspond in many areas. These include trade, law enforcement, support for human rights globally, education, culture strengthening civil society, countering and mitigating the effects of global warming, and many other

"Being CARICOM member states, this means that our two countries work together very closely on many of the most important and pressing issues of our time. Jamaica is a steadfast partner to Antigua and Barbuda," she declared.

Campbell noted that the Consulate of Jamaica will seek to refresh strong regional ties within Antiqua and Barbuda.

"We will seek to work with the government and its affiliate agencies and a very diverse mix of stakeholders. In addition to a vast array of NGOs, businesses, cultural institutions to ensure a continuous and harmonious relationship between both countries.

"We believe close relations are based on openness and the expression of honest opinions and will seek to ensure that our nationals who have made Antiqua & Barbuda their home understand and appreciate the privilege and courtesies that are extended and stay within such boundaries," Campbell declared.

A small microbe has brought all nations - rich and poor, large and small - to their knees.

We, in Antigua and Barbuda, a place from which no major disease has ever erupted, have become one of its victims in ways that none could have imagined.

Our nation is at war with an invisible enemy.

Our economy is badly weakened through no fault of our own. But, our nation did not survive hundreds of years of slavery, and another hundred and fifty years of colonial exploitation, to surrender all that we achieved.

We did not rise from our knees to stand as equals in the councils of the world, to turn back the hands of time. We did not make of ourselves, a nation with one of the highest per capita incomes globally, to be cowered in the face of a pandemic, however menacing.

Cowardice has never been - the way of our people.

We get up. We stand up.

And fight unrelentingly until we conquer the struggles and achieve our objectives. That is how we have overcome the challenges of the past, consistently creating a better life for our people.

And, that is the way we will continue - cautious but courageous, careful but determined, vigilant but robust.

We should recall that, as like all things, this too shall pass.

Therefore, on this 39th anniversary of our independence, let us not crouch down in fear; let us not shiver in dread.

Instead, let us do what, as a people, we have always done.

Let us look ahead with absolute certainty that darkness is dispelled by light.

In so doing, let us celebrate our nationhood with hope and optimism, eschewing all fear. Let us set our feet firmly on a path to recovery, girding our loins with purpose to overcome and setting our eyes on the single goal of snapping back and building back better.

None can deny with any sense of fairness and objectivity, that we have succeeded in containing the might of the COVID-19 pandemic.

We have protected lives and livelihoods, saving hundreds of lives and putting thousands back to work, by reopening our economy on June first of this year.

We, in Antigua and Barbuda, are better off than most of the people in the world.

Globally, there are almost 1.2 million deaths and increasing: in Antigua and Barbuda we have contained our loss of life to only 3 persons.

Across the world, there are about 45 million infected persons; in our country, we had a total of 124 persons, of whom the majority have all recovered, leaving us only with 8 active cases.

By any measure, our performance has been outstanding and exemplary.

While one death is one death too many - and we mourn each of them - as a nation we have kept our people safe.

My Government acted immediately and comprehensively to contain the virus and to halt its spread.

There was no dithering, no dallying, no indecision.

We acted promptly, decisively, and in a big enough way to make a difference.

Our decision to reopen our borders on June 1st, to receive passengers by air and sea signified confidence in the ability of our people to manage the risks associated with COVID transmission and was an inspiration to the entire Caribbean region.

The lives and health of our peo-

ple came first and remain first.

We protected our nation against the worst cruelties to the health of our people.

Without any help from the international financial institutions, we allocated scarce funds to build a fully equipped Infectious Diseases Centre; we expanded the number of hospital beds to three beds per thousand of population; and we invested heavily in equipment and other medical supplies to include rapid test kits.

China, India and the Jumby Bay Fund were outstanding in their provision of medical supplies and we will always remember their friendship.

Even as we celebrate our independence, it is good to know that, in times of crisis, we have committed friends.

Cuba is among them.

Cuban medical personnel readily joined our own doctors and nurses, and others on the front-lines of confronting the virus.

Our nation is indebted to all our health workers and all the others on the frontlines.

They are our warriors on the front-line of the battle, and they deserve our praise and our thanks.

When the economic circumstance of our country changes for better, as I am confident it will, my Government will remember these champions and will do our best to reward and honour them for their special service.

The global impact on tourism has affected our economy badly.

Yet, my Government ensured that we would not suffer complete economic collapse, or widespread misery.

We kept all government workers employed, giving most families a bread winner.

We looked out for the poor and

vulnerable by making welfare interventions that included provision of subsidized utilities, cash grants, food hampers and other necessities.

Our Government continues to help through initiatives, supported by the corporate sector, civil society, and citizens.

My brothers and sisters

We all know that the pandemic paralyzed the world. It forced mankind to abandon, or significantly reduce the freedom of roaming, of socialising, and of physical communing.

Across the globe, mankind has been forced to remain in their habitats, conducting business and maintaining contact through a virtual world. The latter is by itself a measure of mankind's great creativity and innovation.

It is also a tribute to our country's vision and determination, not to be left behind in the availability of telecommunication facilities.

My government considers the provision of affordable broadband services as a public good. That is why Antigua Public Utilities Authority (APUA) is investing over \$100M, in expanding its broadband services at affordable prices.

Those facilities have kept us as an active participant in the global financial and trading systems. Thus, we used information and communication technologies as effective tools for governance, diplomacy, education, business, office work and social connections.

We also used them to earn revenues through our Citizenship by Investment Programme, and more recently our Nomad Digital Residency Programme.

Our investment in modern technology ensured that we achieved the twin objectives of saving lives and maintaining key aspects of our national life and livelihood. Much of that capacity has been attained only since independence just 39 years ago.

That realisation should instill in all of us, not only recognition of what we have achieved as a nation; it should also assure us that we have the ability to carry on achieving; and that we have the power to continue our journey to progress and prosperity, which have been interrupted by COVID-19 only temporarily.

My Brothers and Sisters.

As your Prime Minister, and a fearless optimist, I remain confidently optimistic about the future of our country. I do not believe that there is any challenge that a vigilant, creative, innovative and entrepreneurial people cannot overcome.

Our history has proved that we are such a people. In that sense, we can cast aside every weight and run with confidence, the race that is set before us.

Who we must contemptuously ignore, are the false prophets, who prey upon fear for their own political advantage. They are creating fear, painting a picture of doom and gloom, through false claims; that the government's policies have brought our economy to its present pass.

They are seeking to create a culture of fear, so that they can fool you into believing that they represent your salvation and deliverance.

The irony is, they themselves are mired in personal and professional failures and are in need of redemption.

We must always remember that not all winged-creatures are anaels.

The distraught passenger shared voice clips with the deceased man's son appealing to Puerto Rican authorities to

allow his father's body to continue to Trinidad.

Around 1am local time, the passengers were ordered to disembark the aircraft.

Martinique records 28,000 dengue cases, 12 deaths

Dengue is a mosquito-borne viral infection.

The infection causes flulike illness and occasionally develops into a potentially lethal complication called severe dengue.

The World Health Organisation (WHO) observes that the global incidence of dengue has grown dramatically in recent decades.

About half of the world's population is now at risk, the WHO says.

"St. Vincent and the Grenadines, we have already cut our taxes from US\$40 to US\$20, Grenada has announced that they are doing that. I know Roosevelt

Skerrit, the prime minister in Dominica, is talking the same thing. Prime Minister [Allen] Chastanet [of St. Lucia] is talking the same thing. Though Antigua and Barbuda has a departure tax, plus this other kind of development levy or fee.

'There is I think a general acceptance that we have to lower the taxes. It means that the governments will have to put more money from the Consolidated Fund in the short run to operate their airports and move into a model to make them places to do business in addition to just being locals for the movement of passengers," said Gonsalves, who has lead responsibility for transportation within the quasi-CARICOM cabinet.

Regional economist, Dr, Justin Ram, who also participated in the programme, commented regarding infrastructure that "the airports that we have in the region are huge cost centers and it is actually one of the reasons we have high taxes and fees".

Typhoon Goni: Philippines hit by year's most powerful storm



Typhoon Goni is barreling across the Philippines, bringing with it "catastrophic" winds and rain. At least seven people have died amid reports of storm surges, flash floods, power outages and blown-off roofs.

Goni made landfall as a super typhoon at Catanduanes island on Sunday at 04:50 local time (19:50 GMT Saturday) packing winds of 225km/h (140mph).

It has since weakened, but is still wrecking damage across the main Luzon island, home to the capital Manila.

Mark Timbal of the Philippines' national disaster agency said that 19 million people may have been affected by the path of Goni. "This 19 million already includes the populations in

danger zones for landslides, flooding, storm surges and even a lava flow," he told the BBC.

Goni - known as Rolly in the Philippines - is the most powerful storm to hit the country since Typhoon Haiyan killed more than 6,000 people in 2013.

The BBC's Howard Johnson in Manila says there is concern for the small town of Virac on Catanduanes island, home to some 70,000, where contact has been lost since Goni made landfall.

Video footage showed storm surges through coastal towns, and local governors spoke of power supply outages, roofs torn off evacuation centres, damage to infrastructure, flash flooding and blocked roads. Seven people, including a five-year-old child in Albay province, are reported to have died; two drowned, another was swept away by volcanic mud and another killed by a falling tree.

"The winds are fierce. We can hear the trees being pummeled. It's very strong," Francia Mae Borras, 21, told AFP from her home in Albay's coastal city of Legazpi.

Forecasters on Sunday morning had warned of "catastrophic violent winds and intense to torrential rainfall" as Goni made landfall in eastern Luzon. By Sunday evening, Goni was moving westward at 25km/h, with maximum sustained winds of 125km/h, forecasters said.

Search for Turkey earthquake survivors continues as death toll rises

Rescue teams in the Turkish port city of Izmir are continuing to search for survivors of Friday's powerful earthquake, as officials say the death toll has increased to at least 64

Sixty-two deaths have been confirmed in Turkey, while two teenagers died on the Greek island of Samos.

Dozens of people remain unaccounted for

following the quake. A 70-year-old man was pulled from the rubble of a building in Izmir after being trapped for some 33 hours.

The US Geological Survey (USGS) said Friday's quake was 7.0 magnitude, but Turkey put it lower at 6.6. The shallow tremor triggered tidal waves that hit coastal areas and islands in both Turkey and Greece.

Rescue teams were searching through the rubble of collapsed buildings in western Turkey for a third day on Sunday, hoping to find survivors. Thousands of personnel were deployed to help with the rescue efforts, using mechanical diggers to remove blocks of concrete.

On Sunday, the country's Disaster and Emergency Management

Presidency (AFAD) announced the new national death toll of 62, all in Izmir. It said more than 900 people had been injured, though the majority have now been discharged from hospitals.

Eight people are reported to be in intensive care.

Two dead in Quebec after attack by man in medieval clothes

At least two people have been stabbed to death in the Canadian city of Quebec by a man armed with a sword and dressed in medieval clothing, police say. Five others were wounded in the Halloween night attack.

A man in his mid-20s was arrested shortly before 01:00 (06:00 GMT) on Sunday. Police said an initial probe found the suspect was not affiliated with any extremist groups.

The attack took place in the historic Old Quebec neighbourhood.

Prime Minister Justin

Trudeau said on Twitter: "My heart breaks for the loved ones of the two killed in last night's horrific attack in Quebec City. I'm also wishing a full recovery to the injured. We're keeping you in our thoughts and will be there for all of you."

He also thanked first responders for their critical work.

The identity of the suspect has not been made public.

At a news conference on Sunday, Quebec City Police Chief Robert Pigeon said it was believed that the attack was premeditated, adding that the suspect, from the Montreal suburbs, came to Quebec City with "the intention of doing the most damage possible".

"Dressed in medieval costume and armed with a Japanese sword, everything leads us to believe he chose his victims at random," Mr. Pigeon added.

The suspect had spoken of conducting an attack "in a medical context" five years ago but was not known to police and did not have a criminal record, police said.


First reports of the

incident near the French-speaking city's national assembly came through shortly before 22:30 local time on Saturday.The suspect was arrested near the Espace 400e business park.

Quebec's Le Soleil newspaper reported that he was lying on the ground, barefoot and hypothermic, when he was arrested. He surrendered to police without any resistance, it said.

Following his arrest, the suspect was taken to hospital for "evaluation".

Missouri officials cover noose near polling booths



Officials have covered up a noose on display near polling booths in Missouri, after local Democrats argued it could intimidate black voters. The incident is one of a number of controversial occurrences in the final days of the US election campaign.

Meanwhile a Democratic campaign bus

in Texas was encircled by supporters of President Donald Trump, a Republican and a rally to promote voting in North Carolina ended with attendants getting pepper-sprayed and arrested.

There are widespread fears across the country of post-election violence, whether the election is won by Mr. Trump or his Democrat voter turnout in over a challenger, Joe Biden.

Businesses in downtown Washington DC have been seen in recent days boarding up their premises amid concerns about looting.

Mr. Biden currently has a solid lead in opinion polls, but his advantage is narrower in swing states that could decide the election.

Both men have been criss-crossing the country in the final days of the campaign in a last-ditch effort to gain votes but more than 85 million people have voted early, 55 million of them by post, setting the country on course for its biggest

century.

Democrats in Stone County, Missouri, drew attention to a noose in a room containing voting booths, describing it as "clear intimidation" of black voters.

"This symbol's purpose is to stoke the fires of racial prejudice and strike fear in the hearts of people of colour," said Missouri party acting chair Clem Smith in a statement, adding that it was a painful reminder of lynchings of black Americans.

It was "offensive, inappropriate and outrageous" and should be taken down, he added.

Pogba is the most high profile figure in the United midfield that World Cup winner Stiles used to operate in. But the Frenchman had a day to forget, giving the ball away too cheaply when his side attacked and needlessly fouled Bellerin to turn the contest Arsenal's way.

The Gunners now have 12 points and are up to eighth and United remain in 15th on seven points.
