Belt tightening measures on the horizon

difficult to explain the severe impact of the pandemic COVID-19 on the world economy, and more so, the economy of Antigua and Barbuda to even the so-called 'manon-the-street'.

Every facet of the economy has been hit hard by the fallout of the pandemic. We see it every day; thousands of people have been unable to return to their jobs in the hotel sector, drivers sit idle at taxi-stands in the city and even the once bustling Vendors' Mall now seems to be moving in slow motion.

The pain that many have experienced this vear is real. Many people, once proud of their ability to take of themselves care and their families, now reach out to charities in the hope of finding assistance to make ends meet.

The government has reported that its revenues have declined sharply and statutory bodies have not been exempted as the Social Security Scheme, upon which thousands of elderly depend for monthly pension, a has also suffered tremendously.

The government has

It should not be too been creative in trying to come up with ways to minimise the effects of the pandemic on the economy. Unfortunately, with many of the far reaching implications of the pandemic out of the hands of the government, it has been powerless to affect change.

As if the impact of the pandemic was not enough, two weeks ago Antigua was deluged by unusual rainfall from an anomalous weather system which eluded the predictive capability of meteorologists. It caused widespread flooding in many parts of the island, particularly in the low lying communities in and around St. John's and in West Palm Beach, Bolans which has been long known as a floodprone development.

The island is still counting the cost of the damage to property and to the agricultural sector. Early estimates indicate that more than 500 homes have been affected by the floods. When the final tally is in, the cost of the recent weather system to homeowners, agriculturalists and the government may very well approach \$500 million if lost productivity is

also factored in.

The COVID-19 pandemic coupled with the freak storm of November has been a double whammy for Antiqua and Barbuda, both events whose severity no one could have predicted.

As with the pandemic, the government has had to turn to its very limited resources toward helping people affected by the flood. Homes must be repaired, new furniture sourced and people made to feel safe again.

Many of these homeowners were without insurance, therefore they turned to the government for help. No caring government could turn its back on people in dire need and so the government went to work providing whatever assistance it could.

It came as no surprise, given the current circumstances, when the prime minister announced that the aovernment has been forced to consider austerity measures which will be implemented in 2021. This is less of a surprise too, when the forecast that the decline in revenue decline this year will be close to half a billion dollars.

No one likes to hear the term austerity, but we all have to be realistic. There is no way that things can go on the way they have given the reduction in government revenue.

The measures that are being contemplated have obviously been subjected to a great deal of thought and consideration and at a glance, it appears that their impact will not negatively affect the average person.

One expects that the government will introduce these measures and calculate their effects long before more stringent measures that will impact a greater cross section of the populace are introduced.

At this point, we are all hopeful that the that have vaccines shown so much promise will be widely available in as short a time as possible. This in turn, will pave the way for life to return to some normality.

Only when travel returns to the pre-COVID-19 era will we see economies such as ours in Antiqua and Barbuda resume growth and expansion attendant with the benefits to us individually and collectively.

Government considers austerity measures for 2021

The government is seriously considering introducing several austerity measures in the new year as the economy continues to suffer the negative impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Prime Minister and Minister of Finance, Gaston Browne, said the proposed measures have become necessary as the country has seen a sharp decline in revenues since the pandemic brought economic activity to a virtual standstill.

On this week's Browne and Browne show, the prime minister said revenue generated in the first quarter of 2020 were set to set a national record, but the arrival of the coronavirus in the country at the end of March and subsequent lockdown crippled economic progress and slowed revenue generation significantly.

According to the finance minister, revenues for the first quarter of this year outstripped revenues for the same period in 2019 by approximately \$200 million. By the end of September 2020, however, revenues were \$200 million less than in the corresponding period last year.

"What this means is that there has been a \$400 million turn around in our revenues and while we fully anticipated that revenues will amount to over \$1 billion by the end of the year, we will be happy if we are able to collect about \$750 million by December 31," he 3explained.

He noted that at the end of September revenues amounted to just \$562 million against the \$765 million collected during the same period last year.

"We were on track to record one of the best years ever for the economy, but unfortunately due to COVID all our gains have since been eroded and this has been a severe strain on the level of government's cash flow," Browne explained.

Faced with the harsh reality of the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the world's economy, and the possibility of further losses until a vaccine is widely distributed by the middle of next year, the prime minister said that the Cabinet considered the matter.

"We have no choice going into 2021 but to realign revenues with our expenditures. Last Wednesday, Cabinet looked at some options that we are contemplating to adopt into the upcoming year. There are no final decisions yet on these measures, but I feel that it is important to alert the public on these possibilities," he stated. PM Browne said whatever measures are put in place, they will not affect government bond holders as he is keen to ensure that confidence in the government's security remains high.

Similarly, arrangements with local banks will not be affected.

The measures include the following:

> Reducing real estate rentals by government from an average of 3 to 5 percent to 3 percent over the next 36 months.
> Reducing the rate of rental of heavy duty equipment, backhoe and trucks etc., to 33.33 percent.

• Strengthening property tax collection by ensuring that all properties are captured. This is expected to significantly increase the yield.

• Enhance the collection of all taxes. Focus on AnB properties ensuring that they pay their ABST

• Reduce supplier-creditor credit by 50 percent including converting a portion to government bonds.

• Consider swapping government lands to write off some debts in some cases.



More people seeking assistance from PDVCAB's social support programmes

There has been a slight increase in the number of persons seeking assistance through the PDV Caribe Antigua and Barbuda Limited (PDVCAB) programme, according to Operations Manager Laurie Louard.

The programme, which is a subsidiary of the Petro-Caribe agreement between Antigua and Barbuda and Venezuela, provides a number of benefits to pensioners including a "Utility Subsidy Programme" that contributes \$100 monthly towards their utility bill.

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic many people, including pensioners, have experienced difficulties meeting their financial obligations.

Louard said that many people are now expressing an interest in the food subsidy programme, especially by the unemployed many of whom worked at hotels which were forced to close down their operations due to the pandemic.

"PDVCAB is still rolling along. We are of course seeing a slight increase in numbers of persons coming in requesting assistance. Well this would be persons not registering so much but visiting the office asking how the assistance goes, how can I participate in the programmes offered by PDV Caribe," Louard said.

PDVCAB's food subsidy programme, which is commonly referred to as the "Peoples' Benefit Programme', provides approved beneficiaries with just over \$200 monthly which can be redeemed for food and personal items from authorised vendors.

"Now so far, since I would say about May or June, there has been a slight increase. It's noticeable for persons coming in asking for assistance for, like I said, basically or primarily through the food subsidy programme and we have persons who would have lost their jobs, most of them in the hospitality sector as you would imagine because that is our main industry, and we have a few other persons as well who are coming in wanting to apply to the food subsidy programme - checking to see if they would qualify to receive assistance for the "Food Subsidy Programme".

So we have seen an increase since, I would say, about June or so of persons coming in requesting assistance," he said.

Louard also disclosed that people who were on the programme before, but came off because their situations improved, are returning for assistance.

Meanwhile, the operations manager said that registration of new pensioners to the 'Utility Subsidy Programme' is underway.

Registration commenced on November 3 and is expected to run until the end of the month.

Pensioners who have registered with the Social Security Scheme and have received their pension cards are eligible to apply for the programme.Registration may be done at Social Security's Long Street office between 9am and 2pm Monday to Friday.

"We have also seen some persons now that we are registering for the Utility Subsidy Programme who did not. They have been pensioners for a few years now and they didn't take up the offer before, but they are coming in now based on everything else that is happening. Since COVID, persons in the household are either on reduced hours, or they have been laid off, or some have lost their jobs up to this point and so they are seeking assistance with those bills so they are registering with the 'Utility Subsidy'.

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"Previously, even though they would have been a pensioner for years now, they are coming in now to register to participate in the 'Utility Subsidy Programme'," Louard said.

Presently, there are 1,950 persons registered for the 'Food Subsidy Programme'. 7,200 have signed up for the 'Utility Subsidy Programme'.

There is also an LPG subsidy programme which operates in Barbuda.

Each month, PDVCAB spends just over one million dollars on social programmes in Antigua and Barbuda.

Petro Caribe was created by the late Venezuelan President, Hugo Chavez, as a means of sharing his country's oil wealth with its neighbours in the Caribbean and Latin America.



ERC investor forum planned for Thursday

A major investor forum is taking place on Thursday as the government rolls out its policy plans for the development of three areas in which it hopes nationals will assume lead roles.

The hybrid forum will be held virtually in part while participants attending at the Sandals Grande Resort will receive in-person facilitation.

The forum is a joint undertaking of the government and the Economic Recovery Committee (ERC) which together will guide Antigua and Barbuda out of the economic morass brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic.

"This forum will highlight the investment opportunities available in three major areas of development in Antigua and Barbuda: the Dredge Bay Development, now renamed the Paradise Bay Development; the Willoughby Bay project and the Entrepreneurship for Development," the ERC stated.

It said the government recognises the need to make investment opportunities available in order to build and develop the national economy.

Member of the ERC sub-committee planning the event, Paul Ryan, said the committee is very aware of the economic costs that many people have had to bear due to no fault of their own. He highlighted the loss of jobs in the hospitality and travel industries as examples. With this in mind, Ryan said reviving the economy and giving nationals the opportunity to reap greater rewards from development in

the country has been one of the main concerns of the committee.

Making specific reference to the Willoughby Bay Development, Ryan said the plan involved the development of three thousand acres of land into a thriving urban centre with amenities including hotels, banks, insurance companies, supermarkets and a marina. There will also be green areas, walkways and areas for parking.

The businesses that will be prioritised include agriculture and agro-processing, tourism and hospitality, property rentals, light manufacturing, commercial services and entertainment.

Developed with technicians from key government departments playing lead roles, the plan will be developed in stages over of period of ten to fifteen years in what is known as Transit Oriented Developments (TOD's).

The development will start with one specific area with the other areas added over time, however, at the heart of the development is the central role of nationals.

Thursday's investor forum will allow the committee to present their plan to would-be investors and the public who will be able to view on a number of live streams.

The Paradise Bay project calls for development of several attractions to complement the expansion and redevelopment of the St. John's Harbour. There, opportunities will be available for individuals to set up businesses.



Only proven, effective COVID-19 vaccines will be imported

The COVID-19 vaccines that have recently been developed and are showing tremendous promise against the current pandemic are not exactly new, according to a local medical practitioner.

Dr. Courtenay Lewis, who appeared on Pointe FM's Browne and Browne Show on Saturday, explained that coronavirus vaccines have been under development, trial and use for a very long time since that family of viruses is well known to medical science.

Dr. Lewis was explaining why Antiguans and Barbudans should not be fearful of taking the vaccines developed by Pfizer and others once they are cleared for clinical use and become available in Antigua during the first half of next year.

"People are skeptical about this particular vac-

cine because it's new, because the illness is new and they are scrutinizing the time it took to actually develop it because we did not have a global pandemic until earlier this year.

"So how is it that within a year you can have a vaccine ready for distribution?

"This vaccine isn't new because we've been trying to develop vaccines against other types of coronaviruses in terms of treating SARS [severe acute respiratory syndrome] and the Middle Eastern variant, MERS, etc. All they had to do was take the existing technology that they've had so far, use the global attention that the illness is getting right now to spearhead getting as many labs as possible, as many professionals as possible, as much funding as possible, to help in moving forward the process of getting the vaccine finished," he explained.

Health authorities here have already pre-ordered 20,000 doses of the COVID-19 vaccine in the first instance, through the World Health Organization (WHO). It was also announced that the vaccine will be administered only to those who volunteer for inoculation and no one will be compelled to accept it.

Dr. Lewis pointed out that all vaccines must go through a rigorous process of testing and trials before they are approved for clinical use. This means that they are administered only to willing patients under strict medical evaluation and supervision.

"What's important for the population to know as well, we're talking about the Pfizer vaccine or the Moderna vaccine, because these are the people who are at the forefront of being ready for distribution. They are by no means the only ones that are making a vaccine. There are hundreds of vaccines in development right now, because there's no shortage of funding to produce one. They've all come to see the economic benefits of making a vaccine, so they're all trying to develop one as soon as possible.

"A vaccine doesn't get produced just because it can be monetarily productive for a company. That's not how it works. This vaccine has to go through a lot of scrutiny, a lot of trials, a lot of tests. There's a conversation going around in our population right now that we're going to be guinea pigs and they're going to be testing out this vaccine on us. That is not true, and no leading body, no leading organisation, no government, no leader in their right mind who is not psychopathic, would want their population to be quinea pigs."



Court to rule in Asot, ABLP matter on Wednesday

The High Court will deliver its ruling on Wednesday in a matter brought by Member of Parliament for St. Peter, Asot Michael, against the Antiqua and Barbuda Labour Party (ABLP).

The ABLP activated its Tribunal, its disciplinary committee, to hear and render a decision regarding several instances in which Michael is accused of violating the party's Code of Ethics.

If Michael was found guilty by the tribunal, a number of disciplinary actions, from a reprimand to expulsion from the party, could be recommended.

Michael, however, turned to the court to intervene as he contends that based on the Constitution of the ABLP, the Tribunal is operating without authority as the party has not convened a normally biennial convention in over two years.

Michael's attorney, Hugh Marshall Jr., has argued that the Tribunal has no legal standing and is therefore incapable of deliberating the issues related to his client before or handing down a decision.

Michael identified ABLP General Secretary, Senator Mary Clare Hurst and head of the Tribunal, Lionel 'Max' Hurst as the respondents in his claim. They are represented by Dr. David Dorsett.

Last Friday Judge Rohan Phillip heard arguments that lasted 90 minutes. The judge agreed to submit his decision on Wednesday at 9:00am.

Immigration chief projects improvements into 2021



Chief Immigration Officer, Katrina Yearwood, is projecting that her department will establish itself as the leading immigration department in the Caribbean as it continues to grow and improve its services.

Speaking at the opening of the department's new headquarters in the Sealy Building on the Sir George Walter Highway, Yearwood said this is achievable as Antigua and Barbuda is both a travel hub in the Caribbean with a unique demographic.

"There is no other Caribbean country like Antigua and Barbuda in terms of our demographics. We will also have first will equipment at our borders in terms of E-gate, Kiosks, and other equipment that will enable us to better detect fraudulent documents. Additionally, we are moving to have seamless movements through our ports of entry," she stated.

Since she assumed the office three years ago, Yearwood said her focus has been on improving staff competences through intense training and introducing incentive programmes to improve morale.

During her tenure, the department added three new departments: Intel which focuses on gathering information on persons visiting the country; the Rover Unit which removes persons deemed unsuitable to remain in the country and the NDR programme which will oversee the Nomad Residency programme.

Yearwood also wants to expand the use of technology to improve the overall efficiency of the department. This includes moving to a paperless operation over time.

It is also her intention to collaborate with international agencies to provide additional training for her staff in several key areas.

Also addressing the gathering was minister responsible for Immigration, E.P Chet Greene, who underscored the key role of the department which is to provide a service. He admitted to chiding the department in the past over reports of subpar service, but on this occasion offered compliments to the department in recognition of their noticeable improvement.

"I wish all to be aware of the premium that we place on the service that we provide to the public. It is the raison d'etre of our very existence," he declared.

He recalled that the department was transitioned from the police to a civilian operation in 1998 by former Prime Minister Sir Lester Bird in the hope of providing a 'softer' touch to the country as its reputation as a tourism destination grew.

This, Greene said, has been achieved.

Access to Cooks Landfill impeded by recently heavy rain

Daryl Spencer, the general manager of the National Solid Waste Management Authority (NSWMA) says difficulties are being encountered getting to the Cooks Sanitary Landfill to dispose of bulk and household waste.

Spencer said this difficulty is the result of the heavy rain experienced two weeks ago.

Once the weather holds, however, he said it will become much easier for trucks to maneuver the area.

"It has become rather difficult to traverse the roadways at Cooks. So there is some difficulty in moving both the bulk waste and residential waste into the landfill site, but as the weather holds conditions are improving," Spencer said.

Spencer said that a long term solution would be the resurfacing of the road which leads to the landfill. In the short term, however, the landfill manager has made arrangements to have the road to the disposal site improved.

According to Spencer, the waste material generated by the tyre shredder, which is located at the landfill, have been used to improve the integrity of the road and areas where there is slippage.

"That has assisted quite a

bit. We have also used the landfill equipment to prop up the roads, to clear it, to remove the excess clay and that kind of stuff and that too has assisted.

"The conversation of improving the roads at Cooks is an ongoing conversation and I am sure within short order we should have some very definite responses as to how we will move forward with that one," Spencer reported.

He further confirmed that discussions on correcting access issues to the landfill have been taking place at the technical and policy levels.

ABSIP to spearhead development projects to improve street vending

Antigua and Barbuda will enter into a project with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Development (DFATD) under the Canada Fund for Local Initiatives (CFLI) project to improve street vending operations.

The project is a key recommendation made by the Subcommittee for job creation and economic diversification. It includes creating new enterprises, new markets, and accelerating e-commerce to enhance street vending operations and increase innovative productization.

The Government of Antiqua and Barbuda observed that since COVID-19 there has been a proliferation of street vending with many persons selling fruits and veaetables, and other commodities. The practice has become a double edge sword, on one hand, the increase in vendors contributes to food security by ensuring adequate provision of fresh produce with

high nutritional value, on the other hand, the method of a tray in the hot sun open to the elements leads to several issues including overcrowded streets of vendors, traffic congestion with patrons, phytosanitary concerns and expose venders to harmful health concerns. As a result, the government sought the assistance of the international community and has secured guarter-million-dollar a project to begin addressing this situation.

Using a phased approach, the initiative will take place in the following phases:

Phase 1 will see a number of activities aimed at assessing the street vending operations in and around the city area of St. John's, to determine the number of vendors plying their trade, the type of products being sold, the main areas utilized for vending activities, etc.

Phase 2 will see 25 vendors identified for participation in an investment forum and exhibition. The vendors will get an opportunity to not only showcase their products but will also get exposure and opportunities for investment.

Phase 3 will see the commencement of several capacity building and development sessions, starting with a two-day workshop for at least 25 vendors that will take the form of a soft introductory session, introducing key areas such as health and safety, costing and pricing, and customer service.

Following the workshop, there will be at least three training sessions held on different topics to include packaging, presentation, and export. It is envisaged that at least 100 vendors will be fully trained on operational efficiency by the end of the project.

Phase 4 will see the procurement of kiosk/ stalls to improve vending operations to include standardization of vending structures to ensure phytosanitary conditions, alleviate the burden vendors' face in transporting goods back and forth daily, and improve the presentation along the major highways to make for better optics.

The final phase of the project will focus on supporting the facility at Dunbar's designed to conduct product testing, sample creation, research, and development to support agro-processing initiatives.

The Antigua and Barbuda Science Innovation Park (ABSIP) will serve as the main steering body for the project, providing support to the implementing entities as needed. ABSIP will work with key stakeholders such as the Chamber of Commerce, the Antiqua, and Barbuda Investment Authority (ABIA), and the Department of Analytical Services (DAS) and the Development Control Authority (DCA) to ensure efficient implementation of activities.



JCI Antigua awards 10 young entrepreneurs in 2020 YEP Awards



On Saturday evening, ten young Antiguan and Barbudans were awarded JCI Antigua's Youth Empowerment Program COVID-19 Entrepreneur of the year.

The fourth annual event, due to COVD-19 heath protocols, took a slightly different approach.

The gala took place in a mixed virtual setting with only the awardees and production team at the Office of the Prime Minister while over a thousand viewers and supporters tuned into the live feed on Facebook.

According to Co-Chairpersons of the YEP Committee, Samara Emmanuel and Derrica Watson, despite the difficulties caused by the pandemic, the annual event was a pivotal endeavor for the committee.

"This year, the awards meant so much more because we have all recognized the resilience of our young people across the island. And what better way to recognize them, than to join with the corporate community to award these entrepreneurs," Emmanuel said.

Watson continued, "The 10 Entrepreneurs awarded that night, the young professionals in Antigua and Barbuda who, despite these unpredictable and unprecedented times, have managed to put their entrepreneurial skills to use during the COVID-19 pandemic, we say to them, continue to blaze a trail that will inspire others to follow."

The ten awardees were all between the ages of 18 and 40. A 19-year-old was the youngest recipient. According to committee members, however, the highlight of the gala were the stories of trial and triumph told by the awardees.

"I stopped selling Mangoes by mid-May and by faith used my last \$100 to buy ingredients needed to make ice cream."

Eldica Samuel of El's Bowls & Blends, which opened in July 2020, also received an award. Although employed by the government, Eldicia said she needed to find ways of augmenting her income to help support her family.

Twenty-year-old Javhone Miller, also received the auspicious award as he started his retail business, 'TopBrands268' in August 2020. Javhone admitted that running a business has not been easy, but it is quite rewarding.

Mother of two, Kishma Joseph-Dupuis of 'Kishee's Treats and Things' which started in June 2020 went into business after she recognised the importance and sustainability of retailing snacks and household items at an affordable rate. Brandon Matthews of

'Bridged Ideas' graphic design became a financial victim of the pandemic after his place of employment was forced to close for several months due to COVID-19.

Brandon, the COVID-19 Entrepreneur of the year, said this downtime finally gave him the opportunity to create his own business which was launched in August this year.

28-year-old Kesra Pelle of Ray of 'Sunshine Garlic Butter' was also a victim of the economic fallout of COVID-19. After losing her job at a hotel, Kesra decided that she would begin to produce garlic butter to fill this void in many local supermarkets due to import issues. Since launching in August 2020, Kesra's product can now be found in over fifteen retail stores across the island. Kesra also received the COVID-19 Entrepreneur of the year.

Also receiving the award was Tomeka Cole, the 28-year-old owner of 'To-Meeks Retail Outlet' which started in May.

Sharieta Charles of 'Shae Organic Soaps' shared the most emotional testimonial.

"For several years, particularly throughout my school life, I was scorned and looked at differently because of my skin. I used several products and soaps in an attempt to help to no avail. Thus, in June 2020, although met with several challenges and being unemployed, I decided that I would be the best person to get my skin where I wanted it to be!"

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Caricom to assist Caribbean countries with environmental concerns

Caribbean Now - The Caribbean Community (CAR-ICOM) will assist 79 Caribbean nations to tackle environmental concerns in the period of five years.

In a release, CAR-ICOM said that the Secretariat and the United Nations Envi-Programme ronment (UNEP) Cartagena Convention, along with the Food and Agriculture Organisation of the United Nations (FAO) are jointly implementing the fiveprogramme in year an effort to strengthen the response and to enhance capacities to fully engage in the Multilateral Environ-**A**greements mental (MEAs) implementation.

"This programme will support and quide Caribbean countries as they address the challenges associated with the sound management of chemicals and waste, marine pollution, coastal erosion and loss of biodiversity."

Funded by the European Union the programme is entitled Capacity building related to Multilateral Environmental Agreements in ACP Coun-

News tries Phase III (ACP- tion and loss of crit-MEAs)

"The MEAs play a critical role in achieving sustainable development; they guide national and regional action on environmental issues and provide a legal basis at the global level to address ecological concerns. The coherent implementation of environmental treaties contributes to the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) environmental and targets established by countries in the region. However, transforming commitments these into tangible on-theground results remains a challenge for many Caribbean countries. This is due to a lack of adequate financial and human capacity to address the scientific and technical issues that have become increasingly complex."

CARICOM likewise said although progress has been made to address environmental threats and conserve terrestrial and marine ecosystems, the momentum has not been enough in the Caribbean to reverse the continued trend of environmental degradaical biodiversity.

"As a community with islands identified as the world's top biodiversity hotspots, these changes impact our unique species and increase habitat loss and vulnerability of extinction of valuable ecosystems for goods and services. Consequently, despite all our advances, we will always remain dependent on healthy and vibrant ecosystems for our water, food, medclothes, icines, fuel, shelter and energy."

CARICOM emphasized that through the ACP MEA Phase Project, Caribbean countries are being supported in their efforts to strengthen their regulatory processes, and mechanisms to influence environmental actions and outcomes including local, national and regional institutional capacities to meet these goals and secure a sustainable future.

Some of the priorities for the Caribbean under the project include the effective integration of environmental concerns addressed in MEAs into national and regional

policies and laws.

This also comprises strengthening regional negotiation skills, awareness-raising, support to the development of information systems, environmental assessments, the establishment of marine protected areas and sharing of relevant experiences.

"In addition, the better management of coastal areas and oceans; carrying out measures for the conservation and sustainable use of marine biodiversity; and effectively implementing the related regional seas conventions. In order to substantially reduce marine litter levels, it will be essential to develop appropriate programmes and measures to stop waste from entering the marine environment, both from seabased and land-based resources."

Along with the UNEP Cartagena Convention Secretariat and FAO, CARICOM said it will continue to empowkey stakeholders er to address environmental challenges and achieve improved environmental management at the national and regional levels.

Trinidad & Tobago deports 16 Venezuelan children moments before court hearing

Trinidad Express - Min- orders for the children utes before an emercourt hearing gency on Sunday at 12.30pm, 16 Venezuelan children were forced to board to Trinidad a week ago two piroques to take them back to Venezuela.

Attorney Nafessa Mohammed said it is an inhumane act to place these children in an uncovered pirogue and speedily shuttle them back to Venezuela in full knowledge that an application had been made to the court on their behalf.

She said this is an abuse of power, authority and total disrespect for the court process.

On Saturday Mohammed appealed to the authorities to not deport 16 Venezuelan children, including a four month old baby, on a boat from Cedros.

She made an emergency habeas corpus application to the court on Sunday to stop the deportation.

Despite this, orders were given to bring in the pirogues and the children were taken from the Cedros police station to the treacherous seas and rainy weather.

Mohammed said there is need for an investigation on who gave the to be shipped back to Venezuela mere minutes before the court matter.

The 16 children came and were held by police in Chatham. They were taken to the Erin police station where they have been for the past week.

Saturday, On thev were transported to the Cedros police station where arrangements were being made to put them on a boat and send them back to Venezuela.

Mohammed said these children have relatives in Trinidad who are registered and have Trinidad and Tobago registration cards.

She said they were all tested for COVID-19 at the police station and the results were negative.

She pleaded for authorities to have a heart as these children have already endured the trauma of surviving a treacherous sea journey to Trinidad and then detained at a police station for days.

Mohammed's plea fell on deaf ears as the children were deported from the country on the pirogues on Sunday afternoon.

Barbados Hotel & Tourism Authority: "Tourism can't survive without workers"

Barbados Nation - The Barbados Hotel and Tourism Association (BHTA) will not tolerate members who do not conform to proper industrial relations practices.

Chief Executive Officer, Senator Rudy Grant, said no business could be successful without its workers.

"All persons must adhere to good labour relations practices and where that does not occur, we will take the necessary action. We will not endorse, nor will we embrace any situations where members do not conform to the best labour practices. It is critical and important that in this very challenging pandemic environment that we are all able to work together," Grant said.

He was speaking during a joint press conference with officials from the BHTA, the Barbados Workers' Union and the National Insurance Department that was hosted by Prime Minister Mia Mottley at the Llovd Erskine Sandiford Centrebon on Saturday.

Grant said the Ministry of Tourism and the Barbados Tourism and Marketing Inc. would be working with the BHTA to expand the staycation offerings for locals.

He noted there were some Barbadians who did not believe they were able to participate as they would like and tourism officials should use this opportunity to make it inclusive and beneficial to all Barbadians.

Meanwhile, BHTA chairman Geoffrey Roach said they identified employee welfare as an issue and concern, because tourism could not survive without the workers in the industry.

He said they also recognised some hoteliers were not following good industrial relations practises to "ensure a climate of harmony is maintained" not only between the worker and employer, but the BHTA and the BWU. He said it was in this vein that scheduled meetings were held with the BWU to address issues that might arise.

Roach said it was only in a spirit of collaboration that tourism could move forward out of the "crisis" now affecting the industry.

St. Kitts and Nevis records first COVID-19 case since October 31 border reopening

St. Kitts Nevis Observer - St. Kitts and Nevis has recorded a new case of COVID-19. This takes the total number of confirmed cases to 20, 14 in St. Kitts and six in Nevis, since the first case was reported in late March.

The individual is in a stable condition and is the lone active case of COVID-19 in the Federation.

The 20th case arrived in the Federation on a charter flight on November 8, announced Chief Medical Officer Dr. Hazel Laws on November 21, during a special briefing of the National Emergency Operations Centre (NEOC).

The individual has been in quarantine since arriving on the island and is now in isolation.

Dr. Laws said that the Laws. travel health and safety measures designed to contain the spread of the novel coronavirus are workina.

"We want to assure the general public that the protocols have been followed along the corridor of containment between the airport and the arrival of the individual at the accommodation site," she said.

Dr. Laws announced that health authorities have conducted supplemental/ refresher training sessions with the staff of the accommodation site where the individual is housed. The training took place earlier today on November 21.

"We underscored all the protocols that are to be followed as they host international travellers," said Dr

Similar training sessions are being offered to staff at other quarantine sites as health authorities work to flatten the curve of any new cases that may be imported into the twin-island state.

St. Kitts and Nevis reopened its borders to regional and international travellers on October 31. All travellers must submit a negative RT-PCR test three days prior to their travel date before being allowed to travel to the Federation. They are then tested on arrival and placed in guarantine. Depending on the length of stay, they will be tested again at least once before being released from quarantine. Each person must have a negative PCR

test before being released from quarantine.

The last two cases of COVID-19 in St. Kitts and Nevis were announced on September 18. No deaths have been recorded in St. Kitts and Nevis as a result of COVID-19 infection.

Americans could get COVID-19 vaccine in early December

BBC News - The first Americans to receive a COVID-19 vaccine could get it as soon as 11 December, according to the head of the US coronavirus vaccine programme.

Dr. Moncef Slaoui told US network CNN the plan was to "ship vaccines to the immunisation sites within 24 hours" of a vaccine being approved.

The comments come amid a surge in coronavirus cases across the country.

The US has recorded more than 12m cases and 255,000 deaths, according to data compiled by Johns Hopkins University.

These are the highest tolls registered anywhere in the world. American pharmaceutical company Pfizer and its partner BioNTech submitted an application on Friday for emergency authorisation in the US of their COVID-19 vaccine. Data from an advanced trial showed the vaccine protects 94% of adults over 65.

Pfizer hopes to produce up to 50 million doses in 2020 and up to 1.3 billion doses in 2021. Each person needs two doses.

A Food and Drug Administration (FDA) vaccine advisory committee is set to meet on 10 December to discuss whether to authorise the vaccine.

Dr. Slaoui said the vaccine could be rolled out "maybe on day two after approval, on the 11th or the 12th of December".

He said the vaccine would be distributed based on each state's population. States will be responsible for deciding who gets the vaccine first, but it is recommended that priority be given to those most at risk, like front-line workers and the elderly.

Dr. Slaoui said that by May, the country could achieve "herd immunity" with 70% of the population vaccinated.

US officials earlier granted emergency authorisation for an experimental antibody treatment, developed by Regeneron, given to President Donald Trump after his COVID-19 diagnosis.

Ethiopia crisis: Ethiopia troops to 'encircle and shell' Tigray city

BBC News - The Ethiopian army has told residents of the northern region of Tigray to "save themselves" as government troops advance on the capital, Mekelle.

The military plans to encircle the city - home to 500,000 people - with tanks and fire artillery, Col Dejene Tsegaye, a military spokesman, told state TV.

"Free yourselves from the junta... there will be no mercy," he said.

The Tigray People's Liberation Front (TPLF), which controls the mountainous region, has vowed to keep fighting.

TPLF leader Debretsion Gebremichael told Reuters news agency that his forces had managed

The conflict has reportedly killed hundreds and displaced thousands in recent weeks.

The UN has warned it could trigger a humanitarian crisis. On Friday, South Africa's President Cyril Ramaphosa, in his capacity as the African Union Chairperson, announced the appointment of three former presidents to lead talks to end the conflict, but Ethiopia has rejected the offer because it sees the operation as an internal "law enforcement" mission.

"We don't negotiate with criminals... We bring them to justice, not to the negotiating table," Mamo Mihretu, a senior aide to Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed told the BBC.

The conflict is rooted in longstanding tension between the Tigray People's Liberation Front (TPLF), the powerful regional party, and Ethiopia's central government.

When Mr. Abiy postponed a national election because of coronavirus in June, tensions escalated. The TPLF sees the central government as illegitimate, arguing that Mr Abiy no longer has a mandate.

On 4 November the Ethiopian prime minister announced an operation against the TPLF, accusing its forces of attacking the army's northern command headquarters in Mekelle.

TPLF has rejected the claims.

Its fighters, drawn mostly from a paramilitary unit and a well-drilled local militia, are thought to number 250,000.

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G20 leaders promise fair access to coronavirus vaccines
