EDITORIAL: The pandemic and children



The pandemic and children

There was an interesting article in Tuesday's New Yorker Magazine, 'Children of Quarantine: What does a year of isolation and anxiety do to a developing brain?'

The article explored in detail the impact of living in quarantine on young children in the United States. One of the conclusions arrived at was that the impact on children will likely last long after the pandemic is over and our lives return to some sort of normality.

Reading the article brought into sharp focus what our own children here in Antigua and Barbuda have endured, silently in some cases, as they too had their lives dramatically disrupted for reasons which they are not fully able to comprehend.

For several months, national attention has been focused on the economic impact of pandemic and the the toll it has taken especially in relation to employment in the hospitality sector, the decline of government revenues and the severe strain placed on statutory bodies such as the Social Security Scheme.

While it is important that attention be paid

to these areas, as a society we must also examine the impact the pandemic has had on our children.

For example, a large percentage of hospitality workers are female and many of these women are sinale parents. Taking care of their children in the best of times can be an uphill task, but under the conditions created by the pandemic, it has become, in some instances, almost impossible.

Doctors, nutritionists and others in the health and wellness community remind us often of the importance that consuming balanced meals in the formative years has on a child's development. Research has proven that malnourished children often suffer lifelong learning disabilities.

Given the crisis the world has been plunged into, it is fair to conclude that many children are being denied the nutritious meals critical to their development and future productivity. It is inevitable therefore, that for many of these unfortunate voungsters, there may be a negative developmental outcome down the

road.

Apart from nutritional issues, there are other concerns that have been expressed about our children in this COVID-era. The 'new normal' is taking its toll on parents, teachers and the students as they adjust to the reality of extensive protocols in school and public places. Parents have had to adjust to shortened school days in a time when they can least afford to be away from work or afford after hours child care services.

Under the new prochildren are tocols, being asked to 'social distance' from each other. This comes at a time that is critical to their development of the social skills required to serve them throughout life. Even the practice of singing nursery rhymes, a key learning tool for children, has been curtailed as some believe that this may help to aid the spread of the coronavirus.

Already, at least one case of a child becoming infected has been reported.

Schools have introduced 'mask breaks' for children during which they may remove their face cover-

ing for a short period, but wearing the mask throughout the day is itself quite a challenge for children as part of learning involves reading and understanding facial expressions. The visual element of oral communication is particularly important for children with hearing disabilities as they must acquire the ability to read lips to increase critical language and comprehension skills.

Another factor which we must consider is the disparity that exists in the country between children with ready access to the internet and internet capable devices and those who do not. This a challenge which the government recognised early in the pandemic and acted quickly to address.

In conclusion, it is pellucid that the difficulties being faced by many families as we all struggle to cope with the pandemic cannot be overstated. The issues are real, the suffering is real and as a society we must be mindful of the need to take care of the most vulnerable among us; our children.

Nothing less will suffice.

PM congratulates female business owners

Second phase of Barbuda housing programme set for January

The second phase of the European Union (EU) financed housing programme in Barbuda will begin in early January with the construction of an additional one hundred and ten homes.

Head of the Office of the National Authorizing Officer (NAO), Dr. Clarence Henry, said twenty individuals have already received the keys to completed homes and arrangements for the start of the second phase are well underway.

"The Beneficiary Selection Committee (BSC) just completed a meeting today (Tuesday) as we looked at who will be the successful candidates for houses in the next phase. We are meeting again next Friday following which we should be in a position to identify the would-be recipients," Dr. Henry told PointeXpress.

According to the NAO, the BSC has had to reduce the number of houses it planned from 150 down to 130. He said this is because of the rise in the cost of building materials since the start of the project which forced the committee to reduce the number of houses planned. The EU is providing five million Euros to finance the programme. The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) is the agency managing the project, which is supervised by the NAO.

Dr. Henry said the UNDP rules mandate that the contract for the construction of the remaining houses must be subjected to a tendering process. He added that the tender panel will meet shortly to select a contractor. The NAO only has an observer role in the selection process. Asked about the criteria for awarding the houses, Dr. Henry explained that those selected must have been residents of Barbuda at the time of the 2017 hurricane. Those who resided in Antigua, or elsewhere in the world at the time do not qualify.

First responders - firefighters, police officers, teachers, nurses - and parents with children will be prioritised to receive houses once they become available.

Dr. Henry explained that the BSC has been keen on attaining a high level of construction of the first twenty houses and wishes to maintain that standard going forward.

The BSC comprises the ONAO, the UNDP, the Development Control Authority, the Office of National Disaster Services (NODS), the Ministry of Works and the Barbuda Council.

Police say new roundabouts will improve the flow of traffic

Head of the Traffic Department, Assistant Superintendent of Police (ASP) Rodney Ellis, believes several new roundabouts installed around the island will result in an improved flow of traffic.

As part of the government's road rehabilitation programme, at least five roundabouts have been installed at junctions where roadways have been repaired.

Ellis said that the roundabouts will make for a better flow of traffic when compared to the traffic lights which were removed from these areas.

"I believe so because you have to cater for the number of vehicles on the road. That special junction there - Sprugoos - and we notice that when the lights are not working the traffic flows better. So now you have the roundabout persons just have to understand and follow the rules of the roundabout. Once you do that then the traffic will flow better," said Ellis.

Ellis is also warning against misplaced road courtesy. According to him, having spent several hours at one of the roundabouts observing the flow of traffic, he noticed that some motorists are showing courtesy by allowing other drivers to proceed when they do not have the right of way to do so.

The head of the Traffic Department said this should not be done at a roundabout.

"You cannot do that at the roundabout. Once you hit the roundabout you proceed and the other person who is coming from your left would have to wait until the roundabout is clear. So some persons still have to go back now and understand how the traffic flows around the roundabout. It is clear once you're entering a roundabout you must give way to traffic on your right. Once the person enters that roundabout you have to yield and wait until that person clears the roundabout before you proceed and once you follow that the traffic would flow much better," Ellis said.

Ellis said that more officers will be on patrol to ensure that traffic laws are being followed and to assist persons maneuvering the roundabouts.

Greater food security needed in the fisheries sector

Tricia Lovell, the Deputy Chief Fisheries Officer, says the coronavirus pandemic has highlighted the need for increased food security within the fisheries sector.

Lovell said that more support needs to be given to fisherfolk since Antigua and Barbuda currently imports a significant quantity of its seafood requirements.

"When we think about food security in terms of the seafood products that we consume in Antigua and Barbuda a lot of it is unfortunately imported. So when you look at your import figures you are seeing a significant amount of seafood products being imported. A lot of these are temperate species-some of your cold water species like your salmon et cetera." Lovell said.

According to Lovell, there is, however, a significant amount of seafood that is landed by fishers in Antigua and Barbuda.

She said one of the issues which the current economic situation has highlighted is the need for the residents to continue to support fishermen and the fishing industry as a whole.

"It really has brought a light to the need for us to ensure our food security because obviously once you have situations where your borders might be compromised [and] imports are not coming in as they should or used to, then we really need to be able to feed ourselves.

"So I think COVID-19 2020 has really highlighted the need for us to ensure our food security, the need for us to ensure our fisheries are able to support us, first nationally and then other sectors like tourism and exports et cetera," Lovell said.

World Fisheries Day was observed on November 21.

Tremendous response for Thursday's investment forum

There has been 'tremendous' interest in the investment forum which the government will hold this Thursday.

Ambassador Daven Joseph who heads the planning committee said the response from businesses and individuals at home and in the diaspora have exceeded expectations.

"We have a wide cross section of the society which has called asking how they can become involved in the developments being proposed by the government. These include the private sector, the religious community, civil society and other entities," he reported.

The government is making available investment opportunities in the proposed new Willoughby Bay development, Paradise Bay, formerly Dredge Bay, and the Entrepreneurial Development Enterprise.

Investments in accommodation such as hotels, villas and private homes, a marina and ancillary services to serve mega yachts, agro-processing, light manufacturing such as furniture, beer and aerated beverages are all being encouraged among the local population.

The forum will be held virtually, but arrangements have been made for a small in-person audience to whom Prime Minister Gaston Browne will deliver the feature address.

Speakers scheduled to participate include businessmen, Paul Ryan, Patrick Ryan, Victor Michael and Dr. Errol Cort. The Chamber of Commerce, the Employers Federation and trade unions will also be represented.

Also expected to attend are Environment Minister, Sir Molwyn Joseph, Trade Minister, E. P. Chet Greene and Investment Minister, Charles Fernandez.

The parliamentary representatives from both St. Phillip's North, Sir Robin Yearwood, and St. Phillip's South, Lennox Weston, whose constituencies border Willoughby Bay, will also be in attendance.

Antigua and Barbuda "shocked" by latest CDC travel rating

Antigua and Barbuda is initiating discussions with the US Center for Disease Control (CDC) after the American body classified the country as 'very high risk' for exposure to COVID-19.

Foreign Affairs Minister E.P. Chet Greene says that the government is "shocked" at the CDC's rating of Antigua and Barbuda which was released on Monday.

The CDC's travel advisory to American citizens identified Antigua and Barbuda as Level 4 or 'very high risk' for exposure to coronavirus. The previous CDC advisory issued a month ago categorised Antigua and Barbuda as Level 3 or 'high risk'.

Minister Greene noted that Antigua and Barbuda has devised and implemented strict protocols for curbing the coronavirus.

"Consequently, we have no community spread and no clusters", he said.

Greene continued that "the level of infected persons remains relatively low at 139 with declining active cases, and only 4 deaths". The minister also observed while he is pleased that regional neighbours Barbados and St. Lucia have been placed at Level 2 or 'moderate risk', he could not help but be perplexed as their COVID-19 statistics stand at 259 cases and 7 deaths, and 220 cases and 2 deaths respectively.

Of 14 Caribbean territories named in the CDC advisory, eight are "very high risk", three are "moderate" at Level 2, and three are "low risk" at Level 1.

Minster Greene disclosed that on Tuesday he made contact with Antigua and Barbuda's Ambassador to the United States, Sir Ronald Sanders, who was asked to initiate contact with the CDC "to ascertain the basis on which the country has been placed in a 'very high risk' category for travel".

The minister declared that "if something is not being done which our authorities need to be aware of, then CDC has an obligation to inform us, so that we can remedy it, but putting us on a 'very high risk' list without notice, explanation or consultation cannot be right".

Minster Greene said another statement on the matter will be issued once Ambassador Sanders receives a response from the CDC.

Sandals Grande Antigua hosts diabetes and prostate cancer screening initiative

Sandals Grande Antigua Resort & Spa hosted an employee health fair on Tuesday with special focus on diabetes and prostate cancer.

During the four-hour event, a steady flow of employees availed themselves of the opportunity to have their blood sugar and prostate checked.

In order to fully comply with the government's COVID-19 protocols, only three people at a time were allowed in the testing area and social distancing was maintained.

The initiative was a collaboration among the resort, the Medical Benefits Scheme, Dr. Dwayne Thwaites and Dr. Sean Blackburn. Drs. Thwaites and Blackburn provided prostate screening services.

Dr. Blackburn underscored the importance of prostate screening, stating: "Once you get to age 45 and up, it is always best to start checking your prostate. A lot of men do not think it is important and they do not realise they have prostate cancer until it is too late."

He said early detection is crucial as prostate cancer is "very prevalent" in Antigua and Barbuda.

The general practitioner suggested that lifestyle changes such as quitting smoking and reducing alcohol consumption can help to decrease the likelihood of prostate cancer.

As for blood sugar testing, one employee explained why she decided to get checked.

"I know my family history of diabetes and I used the opportunity to get checked because I want to know my levels," she said.

Training and Development Manager at Sandals Grande Antigua, Matara Murphy, highlighted the company's directive to stage events which will promote employee well-being.

"As a company, we have a mandate under Sandals Corporate University to do a signature event every month," she said. "We've decided to look at what's happening each month."

Murphy added, "World Diabetes Day was observed this month [on the 14th] and November has been recognised across the globe as Men's Health Awareness Month. We therefore decided to have an event which focuses on both diabetes and prostate cancer."

She revealed plans for an AIDS testing initiative in December as World AIDS Dayis recognised globally on December 1.

The prostate and blood sugar screening event followed breast cancer screenings held in October during Breast Cancer Awareness month.



CARICOM Energy Personality Series

Churchill Norbert recognised as CARICOM Energy Personality; takes sustainable tourism to new heights for Antigua and Barbuda

Community development has long moved beyond a buzz phrase for Churchill Norbert: it is unquestionably a revered act of national service that he continues to undertake with great pride in his dayto-day personal and professional pursuits. A father of two brilliant children and a doting husband, Norbert was born in St. Lucia - which he describes as a gem of an island.

"St. Lucia has a lot of natural beauty. We talk about The Pitons, the rivers. If you love nature, that is the island for you," he explains.

With similar adulation, he refers to Antigua and Barbuda's relatively flat topography as a geographical signature of the twin-island.

"As many may have heard before, the beauty of our beaches in Antigua gives visitors 365 choices," he says of the island which has been his home for the last 18 years. "We also have a very multicultural environment; it's like a melting pot of beautiful people from all over the Caribbean and the world. When you speak about Caribbean integration and different nationalities within the CARICOM region, you will truly find that here in Antigua," he effortlessly notes.

Almost as a second nature, tourism is a conversational and experiential strong-suit for Mr. Norbert, having worked with the award-winning Sandals Resorts International in both St. Lucia and Antigua.

As a Chief Engineer who has worked in the industry for almost three decades, he has completed training and attained designations in a number of key areas - including Facilities Management, Electrical Engineering, Energy Management, Renewable Energy and Project Management.

With scholastic certifications obtained at the tertiary level in Las Vegas, Jamaica and Canada, Norbert has worked assiduously to improve the electrical systems and process of arguably the most renowned hotel chain in the Caribbean Region.

"When I first got started in the energy industry, the technology was very different. Looking at the options in terms of efficiency, the control devices, automated systems; a lot of what we had to do back then was done manually," he explains of the early 1990's.

Bringing that infrastructure up to speed, some of Norbert's impressive achievements with Sandals include the implementation of infrared testing systems; the design and installation of Reverse Osmosis Plants and the realization of a robust energy-efficient system at the hotel properties.

"Sandals was really the foundation where I truly got deep into the sustainability and energy aspect of my career. A lot of what we did was based on the shared corporate vision on our priority list," he elucidates.

Praising the Preventative Maintenance Program at the Electrical Department within the organisation, Norbert also focused on the training and development components, noting that, "a lot of the certifications I was able to acquire was done through investing in me, as well as the employees, to ensure that we were capable of responding to the demand of the resort."

Global certification programmes such as "Green Globe" allowed for a laser-focus on annual targets to reduce energy consumption by three percent.

"It was a challenge, so we thought about various projects that would reduce that quantity. Some of the first things we looked at were monitoring sub-metres and consumption in specific areas; paying attention to key performance indicators and starting retrofits when the technology became available, such as pool pumps and shifting from conventional air-conditioning split units into the inverter units that were much more efficient."

Those activities paid off in not only significantly reducing usage, but also in increasing a culture of awareness that balanced human resource building with the technical capacity.

"The team always saw these measures as adding value to the business product," he summarises. "You overdeliver, exceed the guests' expectations, and you noticed a direct benefit of improving the guest experience. That was a way to measure customer satisfaction which was very positive in gaining loyal, repeat customers."

As an adjunct Lecturer at the University of the West Indies Open Campus, Norbert has brought similar value to the "Introduction to Facilities Management" programme, which he calls an absolute joy.

"The interest level and burning desire for knowledge is very high, not just for the students, but the private and public sector workplaces that sponsor their academic involvement," he says. "It's about wanting to know more to do more, and the need to have very good, trained professionals who can now look after the proper management of these facilities and make sense of the best practices and standard operating procedures."

Acknowledging that there is still more work to be done on the sustainable energy front, Mr. Norbert continued his contributions by bringing that wealth of hospitality experience to another important role – as Coordinator for the Energy for Sustainable Development in the Caribbean Buildings Project, which was completed in September 2020. With the involvement of give member-states – Antigua and Barbuda, Belize, Grenada, St. Lucia and St. Vincent and the Grenadines - he describes the regional project as 'very well-developed', with the collective goal of implementing capacity building, codes and standards for the region's collective benefit.

"Each country was responsible for one key component of the project, and Antigua and Barbuda handled the public awareness arm of energy efficiency and renewable energy, with demonstration sites that could be replicated in other islands."

Norbert underscored the recent catastrophic hurricanes that battered the Region and explained that state leaders agreed that it is time to establish policies, standards and codes that would help to strengthen the resilience of the Caribbean.

"We also developed policy instruments and grade manuals that would help us look closer at the institutional framework to support and promote energy efficiency and to make more environmentally-friendly decisions, as it relates to buildings" he justified.

By 2030, Mr. Norbert's hope is that Antigua and Barbuda can reduce its carbon footprint by 38 per cent, confirming that the country is on the already right track with its environmental management systems to support that upward trajectory.

"The national contributions will be reviewed [in Cabinet] very soon, but when I look at the activities on the ground as a Project Coordinator with the Department of Environment - the pipeline of activities that are being done that focus on interventions to improve on renewable energy standards, we're on stream," he asserts.

Looking at public and private schools, health clinics, desalination plants and other key sites, a critical component will be securing buy-in from all stakeholders to move forward and to create a smooth transition away from fossil fuels.

"For some people, it's still not a reality. Looking at the average citizen, the energy efficiency challenge has been the financial impact of procuring and installing energy efficiency appliances, so the solution starts with lower interventions and behaviours," he says. "As time goes by, my hope on the renewable energy front is that we can look at introducing a flexible tariff for bigger commercial systems for private sector that incentivizes these changeovers to make it more attractive."

In reimagining the intersectionality of energy efficiency and hospitality during the COVID-19 pandemic, Mr. Churchill Norbert is looking to future generations to action the sense of urgency throughout the CARICOM Member-States to help build a regional vision that will withstand the test of time.

"Now more than ever, the economic gains and environmental benefits for a more sustainable Caribbean will come from more private-public partnerships at all levels," he summarises. "The children are an integral part of the process and involving them through education at a very young age makes them the best promoters of behaviour. This is how you will know that tomorrow's future will be secured."

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Showdown in the making between Grenada gov't and busmen

(The New Today): The Grenada National Bus Association and the Keith Mitchell administration appear to be headed for another showdown over plans by the government to attach criminal records to traffic offences as well as their exclusion from the Transport Commission.

The bus operators began wearing red ribbons on Monday in protest, following a decision late Sunday.

The Mitchell administration is passing a Bill in Parliament that adds an element of criminality to traffic violations.

On the weekend, the National Bus Association said they are calling on the government to reconsider this amendment to the Traffic Code because they consider it to be excessive and they are also asking for a voice on the commission that is responsible for making decisions regarding national transportation policies.

Under current laws, magistrates will have discretion to fine up to ten times the value of an issued ticket and the bus association has said this penalty is already sufficient as a deterrent to traffic violations.

A spokesman for the bus operators has said they consider the legislation to be a method of instilling fear in the population and forcing people to hand over cash to the government even when they believe they are not guilty.

Public Relations Officer for the National Bus Association (NBA), Derek McKenzie said the government also refused to agree to their request for a copy of the draft Bill but they were able to get their hands on a copy using other avenues.

They feel that the government has again disregarded their position by refusing to consult with

them before taking the Bill to Parliament.

McKenzie said that all the bus operators they have spoken to have great difficulties with the plan to attach criminal records to traffic violations.

They are also challenging a decision by the government to exclude them from the seven member board of the Transport new Commission which has replaced the National Transport Board.

According to Mc Kenzie, the excuse given for their exclusion on the board is a conflict of interest, but they are concerned that they are being disregarded since both the insurance industry and the police are represented on the commission.

He said the former Minister of Transportation, Gregory Bowen, told them that the government would "meet them at a lower level as stakeholders".

They don't believe that their interests can be properly represented in the current makeup of the Commission.

The bus association has said they are willing to be represented by an individual who is not a bus driver and that they also want to be the ones to choose the person who will represent their interests.

T&T opposition leader says no support for gov't bills until procurement legislation

(Trinidad Guardian) - "No failed?!" procurement legislation, no Anti-Gang bill support! If you don't bring the Procurement legislation, we'll isolate you! We'll not support you!" said UNC leader Kamla Persad-Bissessar Monday night.

Unbending in her firm declaration, she maintained the UNC's trade-off position on the two pieces of legislation despite criticism and calls for the Opposition to work with Government and bring the Anti-Gang bill back to Parliament.

Calls arose last Friday and continued yesterday from business groups - after the Opposition blanked aovernment's amendment to extend the Anti-Gang bill for 30 months.

At Monday night's UNC meetina Persad-Bissessar said, "pro-PNM elements in the media" had a field day complaining about the outcome, but she said it was a "total lie" that gangsters will go free because of the bill's defeat and she noted the DPP had said cases wouldn't collapse if the law wasn't passed.

Persad-Bissessar said there are laws that cover offences listed in the Anti-Gang law.

"Except for the offence of being a gang leader or member, you don't need this law to lock up someone for murder, wounding, trafficking, robbery. So police do your jobs and enforce the law as it stands, you don't need this draconian law it's failed. Why should we support something that's

Persad-Bissessar said the procurement legislation was needed since the Police Commissioner had said last year, gangs were getting state contracts. She admitted in the COVID-19 pandemic "not many contracts were going out" but she insisted the "procurement leaislation was needed for fighting the gangs."

She then spoke about the sale of the Guaracara refinery and planned sale of Petrotrin non-core assets and bungalows. She said "given PNM's track record on property disposal," procurement legislation was also needed for that.

Persad-Bissessar reiterated her concern on the 97 times she said Attorney General Faris Al-Rawi and National Security Minister Stuart Young recused themselves from Cabinet meetings last term.

Listing property matters she alleged Al-Rawi recused himself for, she added it was wrong for Cabinet to sanction property matters linked to ministers even if they recused themselves.

"We say bring on the procurement legislation. It'll deal with gangs and white-collar gangs and 'friends and family'! No procurement law, no support for Anti-Gang law! We won't allow for raiding of the Treasury!"

Throwing words on the UNC's election, she also advised the "haters to get a life, do something nice, spend some time with your wife and children."

Barbados fines visitor \$800 for breaching quarantine

(Barbados Nation) - A visitor who went out with a friend instead of going into immediate guarantine after arriving in the island, was fined when he appeared in the District "A" Magistrates' Court vesterday.

Rhys Hutson Blumenshein, 25, of Haynesville, St. James, admitted he refused to carry out a lawful order imposed by the Chief Medical Officer (CMO) on November 8.

Chief Magistrate Ian Weekes to the hotel but did not check in fined him \$800 forthwith or three months in prison.

The money was paid.

Prosecutor Sergeant Victoria Taitt told the court the visitor arrived from Canada with a negative COVID-19 test and was informed by the CMO that he was to guarantine for seven days at one of the designated hotels.

Blumenshein agreed and signed the document. He was transferred immediately.

Instead, he called a friend who collected him outside the hotel and they left.

He returned an hour later and then checked in. The matter was reported to police.

The prosecutor told the court Blumenshein, who was represented by attorney Sian Lange, received a second negative test a few days later.

Mobile fingerprinting a core tool in US deportations report

Boston, US, (AP) - A mobile fingerprinting app US immigration agents use to run remote ID checks in the field has become a core tool in President Donald Trump's deportation crackdown, a pair of immigration rights groups say in a new report based on a Freedom of Information Act lawsuit.

The 2,500 pages of documents obtained through the 2017 lawsuit show that the app, known as EDDIE, has helped Immigration and Customs Enforcement agents ramp up deportations of migrants not intentionally targeted for removal, the report states. Such people are often detained as "collaterals" picked up in operations aimed at others, the activists say in Monday's report. They say that field use of the app exacerbates racial profiling in immigrant communities.

For instance, an internal agency newsletter released with the documents described immigration agents using the app during traffic stops in collaboration with local police in Escondido, California, in 2017. That report credited the operation with "333 illegal alien arrests" in a 12-month period, although it provided scant additional context.

Used routinely by US immigration and border agents, mobile fingerprinting figures in a biometric data collection scheme the Trump ad-

ministration is seeking to broadly expand in its final weeks. A regulation proposed by the Department of Homeland Security on September 11 would formalise the collection of face, iris and palm prints of non-citizens, as well as their DNA, in addition to the fingerprint data now collected.

"EDDIE is a way to bypass oversight and accountability," said Paromita Shah of the nonprofit Just Futures Law, which produced the report with the immigrant rights group Mijente. "It allows agents to do the booking, to do the interrogations out of sight, out of the public's view," she said. "And in those places, abuse is most likely to occur."

ICE spokesman Mike Alvarez rejected those allegations. He said field use of the mobile app, which is paired with Bluetooth-enabled fingerprint readers, does not replace detention booking at a local office. "There is no way to know" whether its use increases collateral arrests, he said, because the agency doesn't collect such data.

The app allows field agents to remotely check fingerprints they collect against those registered in DHS and FBI databases. Courts have questioned federal databases' reliability when used as the sole basis for detention decisions. WEDNESDAY, 25 NOVEMBER, 2020 POINTE PRESS

Both sides claim gains in Ethiopia war, Tigrayans accused of massacre



ADDIS ABABA/NAI-ROBI (Reuters) - Ethiopia's state-appointed rights watchdog accused a Tigrayan youth group on Tuesday of killing hundreds of civilians as federal and local forces both claimed advances in a three-week war in the country's mountainous

north.

Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed's government said enemy soldiers were surrendering as it advanced towards the regional capital, but the Tigrayans reported they were resisting and had destroyed a prestigious army division. The Ethiopian Human Rights Commission published findings into a November 9 attack in Mai Kadra in southwest Tigray - first reported by Amnesty International - where it said a youth group called Samri killed at least 600 people of the minority Amhara and Wolkait ethnic groups in the town.

They were beaten to death, stabbed, set on fire and strangled with ropes, the report said, though some residents protected neighbours by hiding them in homes. The commission accused local forces of colluding in the "massacre".

The Tigray People's Liberation Front (TPLF) was not immediately available but has previously denied involvement.

Reuters has been unable to verify statements made by either side since phone and internet connections to Tigray are down and access to the area is strictly controlled.

Since fighting began on November 4, hundreds have died, more than 41,000 refugees have fled to Sudan, and there has been widespread destruction and uprooting of people from homes.

The war has spread to Eritrea, where the Tigrayans have fired rockets, and also affected Somalia where Ethiopia has disarmed several hundred Tigrayans in a peacekeeping force fighting al Qaeda-linked militants.

Biden presents team as Trump allows transition

US President-elect Joe Biden formally introduced the first people he has chosen for his cabinet as the transition of power gathers pace.

Many of the choices, already announced, are Mr. Biden's colleagues from his years in the Obama administration.

John Kerry will be climate envoy, while foreign policy veteran Antony Blinken is nominated for Secretary of State.

President Donald Trump has finally agreed that the transition process should start, after weeks of wrangling.

The General Services Administration (GSA), the federal agency overseeing the handover, said it was now acknowledging Mr. Biden as the "apparent winner" of the November 3 election.

The move grants the Democrat access to millions of dollars in funds, as well as access to national security briefings and government officials, so he can properly prepare to take over the presidency on 20 January.

Mr. Trump said the GSA must "do what needs to

be done", but still refuses to concede the election, repeating unsubstantiated claims of a "rigged election".

Mr. Biden is projected to beat President Trump by 306 votes to 232 in the US Electoral College when it meets to formally confirm the winner on December 14. This is far above the 270 votes he needs.

On Tuesday, Governor Tom Wolf said he had certified the victory of Mr Biden in Pennsylvania, one of the key swing states. Another, Michigan, certified the same result on Monday. A statement from the transition team said those being nominated "are experienced, crisis-tested leaders who are ready to hit the ground running on day one".

It said: "These officials will start working immediately to rebuild our institutions, renew and re-imagine American leadership to keep Americans safe at home and abroad, and address the defining challenges of our time - from infectious disease, to terrorism, nuclear proliferation, cyber threats, and climate change."

Cubans receive last of remittances via **Western Union**

HAVANA (AP) (Jamaica Western Union. Gleaner) – Western Union closed its 407 locations across Cuba on Monday, a sanctions-driven move that will leave thousands bereft of remittances on an island that depends heavily on them or force them to use less reliable ways to bring in money.

The closure of offices that have operated for more than 20 years in Cuba resulted from a barrage of sanctions that the administration of US President Donald Trump imposed while courting conservative Cuban-American voters in Florida ahead of the November 3 election.

"The problem is not the closure of Western Union, but that Western Union is practically the only US-to-Cuba provider of remittance payments," said Manuel Orozco, Director of the Center for Migration and Economic Stabilisation at Creative Associates International, development-oriented advisory firm in Washington, DC.

"The impact will be felt." While Cuba doesn't publish figures on remittances, economists estimate it receives billions of dollars a year and Orozco said that roughly half comes from the United States and 20 percent of the overall total through

Some Cubans said they were taken aback by the imminent closures despite the sanctions being announced in late October.

Eighty-two-year-old retiree Luis Nuñes said he found out when his son called him on Sunday night and deposited \$200 for him.

Many lamented the closures and the need to find less convenient or more costly alternatives.

Family and friends abroad can still use other banks, agencies and small informal businesses to send money to people in Cuba, or relay it through visitors travelling to the island through Havana's airport, which reopened this month.

They've even used cryptocurrency, noted Cuban economist Omar Everleny Pérez.

Granma, the Communist Party's official newspaper, said Monday that the closures hit the safest way to send money to Cuba for those who cannot travel frequently to the island or don't want to rely on third parties.





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South Africa cricket divides team to prevent COVID-19 spread

Leading up to their limited overs match against England, South Africa are training in two separate groups to limit the risk of further coronavirus infections.

Two players have been placed in isolation while another two have tested positive for the virus.

The Proteas have also cancelled intra-squad warm-up games.

Fast bowler, Kagiso Rabada, said the new training conditions are quite bizarre but they have to take that extra precaution.

The first of three Twenty20s will take place on Friday, with three One Day Internationals being played from 4 December.

Rabada said the team is training in two groups - non-contacts and close contacts - and the team is doing well sticking to the strict rules.


The series will be played behind closed doors in Cape Town and Paarl with matches and training being the only occasions in which the players will leave their hotel.

Rabada, who is experiencing his second straight bubble in quick succession after playing in the Indian Premier League (IPL) in the United Arab Emirates, likened their quarantine to living in 'luxury prisons'. To cope however, he says he reminds himself of how fortunate he is.

"People are struggling at the moment and we must be grateful for the opportunity to earn money and do what we love. We stay in great hotels, but it's like a spoiled kid not getting what they want at the candy store," added Rabada who captured 30 wickets in the IPL where he was the leading wicket taker.

The powerfully built fast bowler said they are surrounded by four walls most of the time which has an impact mentally. He continued that once play begins, it removes the desolation of the situation.

Darren Bravo: "I enjoyed my time in the middle"

Darren Bravo was happy with the time he spent in the middle during the West Indies opening match on the tour of New Zealand against the Black Cap's reserves.

The left-hander scored a classy 135 in his only innings in the three-day warm-up match on Saturday at John Davies Oval, but the Windies middle order batsman valued the time spent at the crease over his century because it presented an opportunity to adjust to the conditions which he believes will work in his favour in the Tests series.

Bravo said the coach asked him to bat as long as possible and he did that and it worked out on a pitch that was not bouncy. Bravo, 31 with 54 matches behind him, said he enjoys batting in New Zealand because the pitches tend to play true. His highest Test score of 218 was against the Blackcaps seven years ago at University Oval in Dunedin.

The Trinidadian said in the nets he is trying not to get out, even though it's limited time, and constantly he is challenging himself to lift his game and helping other players.

West Indies face the Blackcaps reserve again in a four day match, starting this coming Thursday at the same venue.

The first Test is December 3 at Seddon Park in Hamilton and the second Test will bowl off on December 11 at the Basin Reserve in Wellington.


