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VACCINATION PROGRAMME AT THE CROSSROADS

After a very promising start towards the end of February and well into the month of March, the vaccination roll-out exercise had gathered momentum with up to two thousand individuals presenting themselves to be vaccinated in a single day.

Antigua and Barbuda had reached a higher rate of distribution and uptake than any other country in the Caribbean at that point. We were all certain that at the current pace of the first few weeks of the roll out, the country would have achieved the state of 'herd immunity' by the month of June.

Unfortunately, there was one major factor over which the country had absolutely no control: availability of the vaccine. The government of India, in a remarkable demonstration of generosity, made available to several Caribbean countries varying amounts of doses of

the Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine. Here in Antigua and Barbuda our amount was forty thousand. With the uncertainty over when additional vaccines would arrive, and recognising that each person needed two shots of the vaccine to be fully inoculated, just over twenty-six thousand doses of the vaccine were administered. Additional vaccines did arrive, but not before the exercise was placed on a hiatus to await those vaccines. During this period of a lull in the roll-out, an aggressive misinformation campaign was launched, exploiting the fears and uncertainties about vaccines generally among many in the community.

Admittedly, much of this misinformation has caught root and has resulted in a higher than expected number of people who have decided to opt out of the exercise and who are refus-

ing to be vaccinated.

It is inevitable, some may say, that there appears to be some political mischief making that has somehow been able to wound its way into the misinformation and the sowing of seeds of doubt. Much as it is widely accepted that the vaccination exercise is in the best interest of the country and at least in their public politicians discourses of all colours and hues have voiced support for the programme, one wonders if perchance there are not those who view a potential failure of the roll-out as an opportunity to score political points. It really is a sad day that in matters as fundamental to the well-being of the country there may be some people who are playing on the genuine concerns of some people to achieve a political outcome.

It bears repeating that Antigua and Barbuda is among the top ten most tourism-dependent countries in the world. In this edition of the paper is an article quoting the chairman of the Antigua and Barbuda Hotels and Tourist Association stating unequivocally that potential visitors are inquiring about the rate of vaccination in the country as well as the status of people at the various properties. This is not a game! Tourism is this country's lifeblood. The pandemic has caused severe harm to the industry and to the country generally. Our only way of returning to positive economic growth that benefits all is by up to seventy per cent of the adult population being vaccinated. This is not a scare tactic! This is not a joke; the nation stands at the crossroads of development or economic depression. How we decide collectively will determine the path we take!

On the heels of healthcare workers receiving their second dose of the COVID-19 AstraZeneca vaccine, members of Cabinet gathered at the Office of the Prime Minister to receive their second dose, officially making them fully vaccinated against COVID-19. Their vaccination took place with the presence of the media in an effort to help inspire the general population to get vaccinated.

According to the Ministry of Health, Wellness and the Environment, "Health officials are reminding members of the public that it is important to obtain the second dose to increase the efficacy of the vaccine and boost protection against COVID-19. The COVID-19 vaccine prevents serious illness, hospitalisation, and death."

Dr. Courtney Lewis, Medical Director of Dr. Lewis Medical and Associates, issued a public service announcement reminding the public to get vaccinated. "Getting your second dose ensures you get your maximum protection against COVID-19 as well as the longest protective

effects of the vaccine. I am also imploring our young adults to go out and get vaccinated. We can't get to herd immunity without you." Dr. Lewis said.

The general public is asked to pay attention to dates given within their vaccination card for their second dose. A subsequent announcement will be made for the second dose schedule for uniformed bodies and targeted groups.

To date, Antigua and Barbuda has vaccinated over thirty thousand citizens and residents.

According the post-Cabinet briefing



notes circulated by Office of the Prime Minister, "The promoters agreed that vaccination of the promoters, their patrons, and their guest artistes is a prerequisite to holding those parties and fetes during the Carnival holiday period and beyond ... After intense discussions, it was agreed that a vaccine regime for all fans and events' organisers, requiring the presentation of vaccine certificates and a government-issued identification, in order to enter."

The statement added that, "Tickets are to be purchased in advance of the events and the names of the purchasers and the date of their vaccination must be provided in order to purchase the tickets. There will be no

switching and the patrons will be provided coloured bracelets upon entry to ensure that they can mingle freely while obeying the protocols established."

Alluding to a definite timeline taking this major step to some resumption of normality, following the suffocating restrictions occasioned by the pandemic since March 2020, the statement announced thus: "If all the systems are put in place, the first of these events will take place on July 16, 2021, the start of the Carnival season. Everyone is encouraged to be vaccinated, and everyone [intending] to attend these fetes must also be vaccinated almost immediately and not await the days before the events."

During the live post-Cabinet me-

dia briefing on Thursday morning, Information Minister Melford Nicholas provided some further elaboration.

"We are satisfied now that the promoters are indeed aligned in their efforts and their approach, and in the observance of the protocols, to ensure that the first of those events – all things being considered equal – could be staged as early as mid-July ... This will be a first case and a test which will not involve extremely large numbers. The optimal number will be about three hundred in the first instance."

Nicholas added that this would help "to make a determination as to how large these events could become as more and more persons become vaccinated."



Owners of alcohol-serving bars and clubs can breathe a sigh of relief that the long period of forced closure they have had to endure because of the COVID-19 pandemic is about to be lifted.

This is according to a statement issued on Thursday morning by the Cabinet of Prime Minister Gaston Browne, following the



apex executive body's weekly meeting the previous day.

The post-Cabibriefing net notes state that, "Bars and clubs will open next Wednesday, May 19, 2021." It explained that this was the result of operators "having assured the Ministry of Health, the Chief Health Inspector and other enforcement agencies that all the protocols agreedto are in place and obeyed. Several meetings have been held with the owners of the bars and they have put acceptable forward arrangements, the basis of which provides them the opportunity to open."

These "acceptable arrangements" include all the bar and club

operators being vaccinated; patrons complying with all requirements for temperature checks, hand-washing and sanitisation; and physical distancing facilitated by the separated placement of tables and chairs.

The grant of reopening comes with a warning that, "Those bars found to be in violation of the rules will have their liquor licenses revoked, and will be compelled to shut down for long periods."

Speaking on this subject during the live post-Cabinet media briefing on Thursday morning, Information Minister Melford Nicholas pointed out that the reopening is expected to take place "on a gradual basis"

as bars and clubs implement and demonstrate compliance with agreed measures for applying and upholding the safety protocols.

"If the bar ... operators are not vaccinated they will not be permitted to operate ... This is a prerequisite step for any of these operations to go into effect again," Nicholas stated bluntly.

He further explained that the permitted reopening of bars will not result in any modification of the existing curfew hours.

"The curfew times continue to be from 11:00 p.m. until 5:00 a.m. on a daily basis, and that has not yet been changed ..." he declared.

However, the time-

line for reopening bars may not coincide with the three-month window within which persons who have already received their first-dose inoculation would have been eligible for the second - which is necessary for someone to be considered fully vaccinated; after which an additional two weeks after the second jab is indicated medically for the attainment of immunity.

It is therefore likely that the bar owners/ operators who seek to avail themselves of this grant to reopen may in fact, at this stage, be only partially immunised. But further clarification of this is expected to be provided in the coming days.

ANTIGUA POWER COMPANY WINS TENDER TO SUPPLY CLEAN-ENERGY POWER PLANT

The Antigua Power Company Limited (APC) has been awarded the contract to supply the Antigua Public Utilities Authority (APUA) with the country's first clean-energy power plant.

APUA sources said APC was among several entities which submitted bids in a tendering process administered by the Antigua and Barbuda Tender's Board. The APC proposal was selected by the board as the 'preferred bidder' and best suited for the country at this time.

The sources said that while the Tenders Board recommended the APC proposal, no final contract has been signed with the company as the recommendations are that further negotiations take place between APUA and the company.

Under the contract, APC will construct a Liquefied National Gas (LNG) plant to generate power which APUA will purchase at an agreed rate. LNG is de-



scribed as the cleanest of the fossil fuel energy sources as it does not do as much harm to the environment as heavy fuel and diesel, both of which are currently used to produce electricity in the country at the moment. It will also be the first plant of its kind to be in operation within the OECS.

LNG is available from

a variety of sources, including Trinidad and Tobago, Venezuela and the United States.

The APUA sources say it is too early to say how the operation of this plant will affect the cost of electricity in the country as these are matters still to be negotiated.

People seeking employment in the hotel sector as first timers will soon have to present a certificate of vaccination as a condition of employment.

Executive Chairman of the Antigua and Barbuda Hotels and Tourist Association (ABHTA), Jeffers. Vernon while this has not yet been formalised into a written policy, most hotels have indicated that

this is the way forward for future employment in the sector.

"Our members are telling us that there are numerous inquiries from guests making reservations, asking about the vaccination status of the staff and the hotel. Many of these potential guests are coming from areas where they have been vaccinated and it would be unwise to expect that they would

want to vacation in a country with a low rate of vaccination," he explained.

According to the ABHTA executive chairman, the matter is quite serious as many people in the traditional source markets are paying attention to everything that is happening in the country. "They are watching to see the latest uptake in the vaccination rate in a country before they travel. For example, the U.K. will review its traffic light system for approved travel in another few weeks and while we are tipped to be included any surge in the rate of infection of the coronavirus or a continued low rate of vaccination could determine a person's choice for a vacation," he remarked.

Jeffers said the hotels have agreed to continue to encourage existing staff members to be vaccinated and they have also discussed ways to assist their staff in the process.

As a condition of their reopening last year, hotels had to implement stringent health protocols thus creating a biosphere of their properties as they welcomed guests from abroad.

VACCINATE OR SUFFOCATE - THE STARK CHOICE

Sections of the population in many of the 14 independent CARICOM countries are in grave danger of undermining their own health and economic interests by their re-

fusal to be inoculated against the coronavirus, COVID-19.

At the time of writing (May 13), 159.5 million persons have been infected with the virus worldwide. Of this number, almost 3.4 million have died. Shockingly, the countries of the Americas from Canada to Argentina, including the Caribbean, account for almost half of the global infections and deaths - 64.1 million infections and 1.5 million deaths.

While this persistent rate of infections and deaths continues, the entire Hemisphere, except for the wealthiest nations, will continue to experience a health and economic cri-All who yearn for a return to the pre-COVID period of unrestricted activity will not only endure an exceedingly long waiting period, but they will also experience increased numbers of infections and deaths. The latter will overburden already fatigued medical capabilities and strain morgue and burial facilities.

Figures from Caribbean countries are worrying, despite the efforts of governments and their medical authorities, to prevent infections and deaths. The Pan-American Health Organization (PAHO) records community spread in 8 of the 14 independent CARICOM countries Barbados, Guyana, Haiti, Jamaica, St Lucia, St Vincent and the Grenadines, Suriname and Trinidad and Tobago. Cluster cases are registered in two countries, namely Antigua and Barbuda and The Ba-The other three hamas.

countries – Dominica, Grenada and St Kitts-Nevis – report sporadic cases.

While it is not a magic bullet that will eliminate the coronavirus, the anti-COVID vaccine is the best solution for the people of CARICOM countries to save themselves, their families and their friends, and to place themselves in a position to recover from their present health and economic crises. Those who refuse to be vaccinated or propagandize against it, are endangering themselves and all who live in their countries. Indeed, they could be described as choosing to commit suicide and to take along with themselves many other people. This not only lacks good judgement in personal terms, but it is also a clear and present danger to their entire societies.

When the COVID-19 pandemic started, all nations cried out for vaccines. The wealthier nations invested billions of dollars in the big pharmaceutical companies to develop and test vaccines. Four types were

quickly developed and approved after extensive testing by AstraZeneca, Pfizer, Moderna and Johnson & Johnson. On May 7 the World Health Organization also approved the Sinopharm COVID-19 vaccine from China.

Fear has been expressed about taking any of these vaccines based on the relatively rapid rate in which they were developed in comparison with vaccine development in the past. This trepidation should take account of the fact, that unlike as in the past, science and technology have vastly improved, allowing for reliable results to be obtained faster. Further, at no previous time in human history has such large sums of money been devoted to the research and development of a vac-

Regarding those who take the simple view that they reject vaccines as unnecessary and harmful, Caribbean history reveals that what made Caribbean people survive and lead productive lives, were vaccines against mumps, measles, chicken pox, Hepatitis A and B, diphtheria, whooping cough, polio and tetanus

(lockjaw). These vaccines were administered and accepted routinely because they saved lives. What those vaccines have done in the past, and still do, anti-COVID-19 vaccines can do today. But, vaccination rates in CARICOM countries are too low. The anti-vaccination propaganda seems to have overtaken government information and education machinery - something governments must reverse swiftly, including by better use of social media platforms and by direct communication with influencers in communities. Thus far in the vaccination success table, Antigua and Barbuda (31.74%), Barbados (26.9%), Dominica (26.2%), St Kitts-Nevis (24.3%), Guyana at 19.16%, and Grenada (11.1%) are the six leaders: all others are below 10% and four of them Jamaica, Trinidad and Tobago, St Lucia and St Vincent and the Grenadines are at less than 5%. Where countries such as Antigua and Barbuda and Barbados have some vaccines, but people are falling prey to propaganda, endangering their own and other lives, as well as

the recovery of their coun-

tries, they weaken considerably the argument that CARICOM governments have been advancing in the international community that we need access to more vaccines. Ten wealthy countries have secured 75 per cent of the 1.36 billion doses already administered to vaccinate 8.6 per cent of the world's population. Other countries are struggling. There is a strong moral argument for equitable distribution. But, if Caribbean countries have vaccines that are not being taken-up and which must be discarded because they have expired, the argument about being deprived of vaccines by rich countries will quickly

A few politicians in some countries, such as Antigua and Barbuda, while publicly supporting vaccines, have joined the anti-vaccination propaganda behind the scenes with what appears to be an intent to promote circumstances to blame the governments for a lack of progress. In Antigua and Barbuda, for instance, political focus has been placed on its Prime Minister Gaston Browne who was gifted with the Moderna vaccine

be discounted.

which he took to try to allay fears. Now, even with other safe and reliable vaccines available, some politicians are putting politics ahead of patriotism by promoting the idea that the only acceptable vaccine is Moderna. From my own discussions with Moderna and Pfizer, I know that no new supplies will be available until January 2022 at the earliest.

None of this anti-vaccina-

tion propaganda is help-

ing the Caribbean. The region needs to reach herd immunity soon if economies are not to decline and wither, affecting everyone. The fate or the future of the region is now in the hands of the region's people themselves – rejecting vaccinations is a sure way of widening the path to misfortune. The words of Dr Carissa Etienne, the Director of PAHO, should be the clarion call – "The best

The alternative is a prolonged period of misery, including an increase in infections and deaths. None of this is exaggerated.


"I am afraid for my life," the 14-year-old Form 3 student told Loop News in the presence of her mother, who works at the school.

Mandatory vaccination for tourism workers as Dominica prepares for the return of cruise ships

Dominica News Online - As Dominica prepares for the return of cruise ships, which officials say will commence in June 2021, Prime Minister Roosevelt Skerrit has announced that his government will amend the certification criteria to include vaccination for those involved in the sector.

According to the Prime Minister, these measures need to be implemented for the safety of both visitors and locals, and to grow the economy back to the place it once was.

"Similar to how the food handlers' license is done – that you have to go and do a tuberculosis test, etc., before you can get the food handlers license – and for good reason … if you want our bank account to start receiving income in the manner in which we were receiving it in 2019."

The Prime Minister also stated that along with the new protocols which will be put in place for tourism and hospitality adjustments workers. will also be made for cruise passengers wishing to explore the island. "You cannot be a tour guide and not want to get vaccinated, because the person who is going to want you to take them to Titou Gorge and Trafalgar Falls and the boiling lake, they are going

to want to know that you are vaccinated because they are going to want to protect themselves," he reasoned. "And they are going to demand that they will only go on a tour with people who are vaccinated and the person would have a right to demand so."

Skerrit further noted that vendors who will be in daily contact with visitors would need that added "amour of defence with the vaccine" and further emphasized the importance of those in the hospitality and tourism sector getting vaccinated.

"So, it is important for us to recognize that we have to set aside all these things we read on You-Tube and Facebook and all these social media platforms. It is important for us to read those things, but we need to understand what we are reading to comprehend what we are reading and to understand what is in our best interest," the prime minister said.

Skerrit admitted that this comes with risks, "but we have to recognize the need for us to get back to a state of normalcy".

He gave the assurance that his government had not taken the decision lightly and had done so in consultation with the cruise lines, regional counterparts and stakeholders in Dominica.

T&T RECORDS DEADLIEST DAY OF COVID



People still defy mask mandate

T&T has recorded the deadliest day for the COVID-19 pandemic to date. In the last 24 hours, nine people have succumbed to the disease.

The country has recorded 55 deaths for the month, making May 2021 the deadliest month for the pandemic, averaging five deaths a day for the last 11 days. The record-high previous monthly death toll occurred in September 2020, with 54 deaths reported. According to the Ministry of Health, the nine deceased included seven people with comorbidities. There were three elderly males, three elderly females, and one middle-aged female. In addition, the remaining two were a middle-aged male and a middle-aged female without comorbidities. These deaths have taken the total number of COVID-19 related deaths to 224.

In the last 24 hours, 348 people have tested positive for the disease, marking the third-highest jump in daily reported COVID-19 cases to date. The cases reported yesterday reflect samples taken from May 8

through May 10, 2021. T&T's total COVID-19 cases stand at 13,802, with a record high of 4,078 cases considered active. Active cases include COVID-19 positive people isolated at home, in step-down facilities, or in hospitals across the country. As of May 11th, 2,972 cases have been recorded month-to-date, marking the highest number of cases recorded in a single month. The previous record occurred last month with 2,798 cases. Testing continues to occur across T&T at a record pace. In the last 24

hours, the total number of people tested at private and public facilities stands at 147,470, rising by 5,920. This marks the largest increase on record. However, 5,136 people were tested at private facilities in the last week. T&T's COVID-19 hospitals continue to be under strain due to rising cases. With a total of 335 in hospital, this marks the second-highest number of patients since the pandemic began.

T&T's overall COVID-19 hospital occupancy stands at 51 percent across all levels of care in both islands, with a slightly higher 54 percent when only accounting for Trinidad's beds. Based on the latest numbers from the Ministry of Health, there are 138 hospitalised at the Couva Hospital and Multi-Training Facility, marking a 67 percent occupancy. The Caura Hospital currently is at a 78 percent occupancy level. At Arima General Hospital, there is a 69 percent occupancy. The Augustus Long Hospital is also reporting a 75 percent occupancy. The St. Ann's Hospital, with 10 beds available, remains at zero percent capacity.

iWitnessNewsSVG - Opposition lawmaker St. Clair Leacock says the gun-wielding allegation against government senator Ashelle Morgan is the latest in a series of incidents in which members of the ruling Unity Labour Party (ULP) "feel they can flex with their gun".

"In this country of St. Vincent, we have had more people lose their lives to the gun than we have lost through [the eruption of La] Soufriere, through COVID or dengue, and this is a culture that you all don't want to address," the Central Kingstown MP told the

media outside Parliament on Tuesday.

"Every time a member and the hierarchy of the Unity Labour Party has a problem, they feel they can flex with their gun," Leacock said.

"We had a situation of Hans King [former press secretary to Prime Minister Ralph Gonsalves], if he was on mainland St. Vincent, what he would have done; we had [MP for North Leeward] Carlos James, [then a ULP candidate] pulling his gun [in 2015] and doing what he had to do; we had a guy beating his wife in America and coming here and be-

ing elevated to be press secretary to the prime minister. You have all the consulates doing all sorts of nonsense stories, no clear action."

Leacock was speaking immediately after he and other opposition lawmakers walked out of Parliament in support of opposition leader Godwin Friday who was ordered to leave after defying the Speaker's ruling. Friday had asked House Speaker Rochelle Forde to order Morgan, who is also Deputy Speaker of the House of Assembly, to excuse herself from Parliament until the

completion of an investigation in an April 13 shooting at Diamond. Morgan is alleged to have been present when Cornelius John, a 60-year-old businessman, was shot in the leg at his home in

the East St. George com-

munity.

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She is further alleged to have wielded a gun during the incident. Commissioner of Police Colin John has confirmed that Morgan and Assistant Director of Public Prosecution Karim Nelson are "persons of inter-

est" in the investigation.

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a major step toward returning pre-pandemic life. the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) on Thursday eased indoor mask-wearing guidance for fully vaccinated people, allowing them to stop wearing masks outdoors in crowds and inside in most situations.

The new guidance still calls for wearing masks in crowded indoor settings like buses, planes, hospitals, prisons and homeless shelters, but will help clear the way for reopening workplaces, schools, and other venues — even removing the need for masks or social distancing for those who are fully vaccinated. "We have all longed for this moment when we can get back to some sense of normalcy," said Dr. Rochelle Walensky, the director of the CDC.

The announcement comes as the CDC and the Biden administration have faced pressure to ease restrictions fully vaccinated people — people who are two weeks past their last required COVID-19 vaccine dose — in part to highlight the benefits of getting the shot. The country's aggressive vaccination campaign has paid off: US virus cases are at their lowest rate since September; deaths are at their lowest point since last April; and the test positivity rate is at the lowest point since the pandemic began.

Walensky announced the new guidance on Thursday afternoon at a White House briefing, saying the long-awaited change is thanks to millions of people getting vaccinated — and based on the latest science about how well those shots are working.


"Anyone who is fully vaccinated can participate in indoor and outdoor activities — large or small — without wearing a mask or physically distancing," Walensky said. "If you are fully vaccinated, you can start doing the things that you had stopped doing because of the pandemic."

The easing guidance is likely to open the door to confusion, since there is no sure-fire way for businesses or others to distinguish between those fully vaccinated and those who are not. Walensky said those who are not fully vaccinated should continue to wear masks

indoors.

President Joe Biden was set to highlight the new guidance Thursday afternoon in a speech from the White House.

To date about 154 million Americans, more than 46% of the population, have received at least one dose of the COVID-19 vaccines and more than 117 million are fully vaccinated. The rate of new vaccinations has slowed in recent weeks, but with the authorization Wednesday of the Pfizer vaccine for children ages 12 to 15, a new burst of doses is expected in the coming days. Just two weeks ago, the CDC recommended that fully vaccinated people continue to wear masks indoors in all settings and outdoors in large crowds.



Long queues formed at petrol stations

Three weeks into nationwide anti-government protests, residents in Colombia's third-largest city, Cali, say they are struggling to get petrol and some food items.

Protesters have blocked some of the main access roads into the city, and deliveries have been severely disrupted.

Cali has been the scene of some of the worst clashes between protesters and security forces. At least 42 have died in the protests. While food and medicine have been reaching the city after a number of "humanitarian corridors" were established last week, the disruption has been severe.

The demonstrations over the past two days in Cali may have been massive, but they were peaceful and colourful, with dances, music and artistic tributes paid to those who died or were wounded in previous protests. You don't see many police on the streets. However, reports of police violence continue to come in from other parts of the country. Not far from here, in Popayán, dozens of civilians were injured in clashes with security forces on Wednesday.

Cali, in any case, is paralysed. Everyday life has been affected by the blockades and petrol shortages: if you need a plumber or someone to fix your internet connection, you are going to have to wait for days or even weeks. Most shops are shuttered and their doors have been sprayed with anti-government graffiti. Young masked protesters have blocked roads with branches and wires. They tell me they are protesting "for a different country" and I can't see them giving up anytime soon.

Cali's Mayor Jorge Iván Ospina said it was vital that supplies be allowed through without hold-ups. "Some supplies or limited supplies are not enough," he said about the agreement with protesters blocking the roads to let some delivery trucks pass.

The city depended on food from neighbouring regions to feed its residents, he explained. Traders at one market said there was a shortage of potatoes, while those at another market said they had received a delivery, but at a price 30% higher than usual.



GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip (AP) — Hamas sent a heavy barrage of rockets deep into Israel on Thursday as Israel pounded Gaza with more airstrikes and shells and called up 9,000 more reservists who could be used to stage a ground invasion. The hostilities intensified despite mediation efforts by Egyptian negotiators who held in-person talks with both sides.

In another potential escalation, at least three rockets were fired from southern Lebanon toward Israel, an attack that threatened to open a new front in the fighting.

The artillery and tank shells that began falling into Gaza in the evening forced scores of families to flee their homes, Palestinian witnesses said. The

use of artillery fire in Israel's four-day-old offensive raised the likelihood of civilian casualties.

Previous fighting between Israel and Gaza's Hamas rulers, including a devastating 2014 war, was largely confined to the impoverished and blockaded Palestinian territory and Israeli communities on the frontier. But this round seems to be rippling farther and wider than at any time since the 2000 Palestinian intifada, or uprising.

While some rocket attacks have reached the Tel Aviv area, Arab and Jewish mobs have rampaged through the streets, savagely beating people and torching cars. Flights have been canceled or diverted away from the country's main airport.

Weary Palestinians, meanwhile, somberly marked the end of the Muslim holy month of Ramadan on Thursday as militants fired one barrage of rockets after another and Israel carried out waves of bone-rattling airstrikes. Since the rockets began Monday, Israel has toppled three high-rise buildings that it said housed Hamas facilities after warning civilians to evacuate. Gaza's Health Ministry said the death toll has climbed to 87 Palestinians, including 18 children and eight women, with 530 people wounded. Islamic Jihad confirmed the deaths of seven militants, while Hamas has acknowledged 13 of its militants killed, including a senior commander. Israel says the number of militants dead is much higher.

Seven people have been killed in Israel. Among them were a soldier killed by an anti-tank missile and a 6-year-old child hit in a rocket attack.

Many world leaders have condemned the violence and urged restraint, and a visit by Egyptian security officials was a significant development in international efforts to bring about a cease-fire. Such efforts have been key to ending past rounds of fighting. The officials met first with Hamas leaders in Gaza before holding talks with the Israelis in Tel Aviv, two Egyptian intelligence officials said. They spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to talk to the press.



Trudeau cleared of ethics wrongdoing in political scandal

Canada's ethics watchdog has cleared Prime Minister Justin Trudeau of wrongdoing in the WE Charity scandal. The charity had been tapped by his government last vear to oversee a volunteer programme for students during the pandemic. Mr. Trudeau later faced scrutiny when it was revealed he had personal ties to the organisation. But the report found former finance minister Bill Morneau had breached federal ethics rules in the scandal. Morneau resigned in August, although he

denied it was because of this case. Morneau faced pressure to step down last summer after it was revealed WE had covered some of his expenses while he was on two trips with his family to see some of the charity's work in Kenya and Ecuador. He said it was an oversight and repaid C\$41,000 (\$33,000; £ 24,000). In October, Federal Ethics Commissioner Mario Dion cleared Morneau of ethical wrongdoing for that, saying it appeared to be a genuine mistake. But on Thursday, Dion released

a report that found Morneau had placed himself in a conflict of interest "on several occasions" in other ways. The former finance minister's relationship with the charity and a friendship with WE co-founder Craig Kielburger, in particular, "afforded WE unfettered access to the Office of the Minister of Finance". Mr. Dion wrote.

Mr. Morneau broke conflict of interest rules by "improperly furthering WE's private interests, by failing to recuse himself from decisions relating to WE, and by


giving WE preferential treatment", the report said. In a statement. Morneau reiterated that he should have recused himself from the government's discussion regarding the charity, given his personal ties. He had previously apologised for failing to do so.

The former finance minister also reiterated a finding of the report - that he did not have direct involvement in the recommendation of WE Charity for the programme.





ST JOHN'S, Antigua – The West Indies team has made a significant move up the International Cricket Council's (ICC) Test Match rankings, following the release of the latest rankings on Thursday morning. West Indies moved up two places to sixth, leapfrogging South Africa and Sri Lanka. West Indies are on 84 points ahead of the Proteas on 80 and Sri Lanka on 78. India lead the rankings on 121, with New Zealand (120), England (109), Australia (108) and Pakistan (94). The West Indies growth and progress is the result of the memorable 2-0 win away to Bangladesh and the hard-fought 0-0 draw in the Sandals Test Series at home against Sri Lanka. It signals an overall rise for the team. Last month it was announced they moved up one spot in the ICC One-Day International (ODI) things right in the preparation and the rankings, following the 3-0 clean sweep over Sri Lanka in the CG Insurance ODI Series. Test Captain Kraigg Brathwaite was full of praise for his players and support staff. He said this is the beginning of the climb towards higher rankings. The experienced opener spoke to CWI Media on Thursday morning from Bristol in England where he is playing for Gloucestershire in the County Championship.

Brathwaite said: "I'm very proud of the team to jump two places in the Test rankings. I think this is just the beginning of good things to come. As a group, it shows that we can climb up the ladder and it's just important for us to work hard and keep the belief and attitude to doing
