Latest dashboard reveals first 2022 COVID-19 death

COVID-19 has claimed hundred and its first life this year. (214) new lab

The COVID-19 dashboard published by the Ministry of Health, Wellness and the Environment on 9th January revealed that one person lost their life to the virus following its last update on 8th January.

Additional information related to the circumstances of this death were not revealed.

This brings the total deaths in Antigua and Barbuda to one hundred and twenty (120).


As of Thursday 6th January, 2022 at 6pm, the ministry disclosed two

hundred and fourteen (214) new laboratory confirmed COVID-19 cases in Antigua and Barbuda with three hundred and forty (340) samples having been processed.

Seven (7) recovered cases were recorded.

Consequently, the total number of persons with laboratory confirmed COVID-19 cases in Antigua and Barbuda is five thousand and fifty-eight (5,058); which is inclusive of eight hundred and twenty (820) active cases.

There are seven (7) hospitalised cases; four (4) moderate and three (3) mild.

The tenancy agreement between Mr. Browne and Victor Singh of Metropolitan University College of Medicine Incorporated that lists the monthly rent at US\$20,000 a month was made public last week by political aspirant Algernon Watts.

This sparked debate in some quarters over Browne's decision to enter such an arrangement.

The main opposition United Progressive Party's leader, Harold Lovell, said the prime minister has gone enriching himself through "creative means", having negotiated the university deal with Mr. Singh and his associates. Lovell posits that the prime minister should have refrained from conducting private business with Mr. Singh and ought to have referred Metropolitan's principals to real estate agents as the villa rental constitutes a conflict of interest and "rape of the institutions of Antigua and Barbuda."

But on his radio programme at the weekend, Prime Minister Browne said the arrangement he entered with Victor Singh is above board.

"It is a private property owned by myself and my wife. We are renting it to another private person. It has nothing to do with government," Browne assured. "We didn't buy anything from government, the house is not on government property, the land was not a government piece of land. We pay our own utilities to Jolly Harbour."

Mr. Browne explained the property was rented after his family decided against moving from Hodges Bay to Jolly Harbour. This decision was taken after his wife, Minister Maria Bird-Browne, expressed worry over security, following the series of events involving Mehul Choksi.

"She [Maria Bird-Browne] has actually placed us in a position where she has to now go and get a mortgage to build a house somewhere, because I can't go and get another mortgage in my old age."

"I'm the only Antiguan who has a beach property at Jolly Harbour that's available



for rent. So I want to know: if my white neighbours can rent their properties for US \$ 3,000 a night, collecting US\$90,000 a month, I want to know why I can't rent my own on a long-term basis for US \$ 20,000?" Mr. Browne asked.

The Prime Minister told his listeners he believed he knew the source of the leak of the lease agreement as there were only two ways in which the agreement could have been leaked: through the real estate company, which he ruled out or the bank. He did not reveal, however, the name of the bank where the rent is deposited.

Despite the revelation of the agreement and the attention it has drawn, Prime Minister Browne is unfazed. He said proper procedure was followed with precision with respect to the agreement so he's still not sure what the uproar is about.

Perhaps this is why I ask myself whether life is really the "walking shadow" that Shakespeare claimed it is or is it just another four-letter word like "this", "that", "what" and "when"? Or why do we call swollen veins in the lower rectum "haemorrhoids" instead of "assteroids"?

As we get older, just trying to survive and make sense of the world are enough to swell not just our veins but also our brains. I remember when my wife had the air-conditioning on at full blast but still didn't like me to sleep in my socks. I reluctantly made a resolution to sleep barefoot but after the first night I got cold feet. Globally, the most popular resolution is to "exercise more" followed by "lose weight", "get organised" and "learn a new hobby or skill". Somehow this does not go well with the fifth

which is "live life to the fullest" and even worse, number six, which is "save money" or "spend less money." I did better with the seventh in that I quit smoking many years ago and with the eighth, spending more time with family and friends. Number nine is "travel more" and while COVID and unemployment made that and going to the gym impossible, they helped me move number ten — "read more"- right to the top of the tree.

Actually, McVitie's, the biscuit makers, crunched the numbers and found that out of 28 million (61%) adults who make New Year's resolutions, only 9% keep them for a whole year. In fact, nearly a third (29%) of people who make resolutions drop out in less than a week. This is why, as the Irish poet and playwright Oscar Wilde said, "Good resolutions are simply cheques that men draw on a bank where they have no account." Mark Twain added. "Now is the accepted time to make your regular annual good resolutions. Next week you can begin paving hell with them as usual." Actually, the best thing to do is to become a vegan for a day and then very quickly learn that it was a missed steak.

Like Twain and other humourists, I am an escapist. Generally, all resolutions go into one year and come out the next. The only one I have ever kept is the one I made to never make any. My New

Year's resolution is to procrastinate so I'll start tomorrow, ok? When I was younger, women used to kiss me on my lips but it's all over now. My son Zubin calls me "Pop" and makes me want to tell him, "Son, that is what the little champagne bottle calls his father." As I head into my 77th year, my version of the "Serenity Prayer" is, "God grant me the senility to forget people I never liked anyway, the good fortune to run into the ones that I do, and the eyesight to tell the difference."

Last night I stayed up until midnight, not to welcome the New Year but because of the pressure we all suffered in 2021, I wanted to make sure it had gone for good. And then, before falling asleep I said the prayer that was especially designed for today, "Dear Lord. So far this year I've done well. I haven't gossiped, I haven't lost my temper, I haven't been greedy, grumpy, nasty, selfish, or overindulgent. I'm very thankful for that. But in a few minutes, Lord, I'm going to get out of bed, and from then on I'm probably going to need a lot more help. Amen." In fact, I already remember 2021 like it was yesterday.

For a while, my first resolution used to be not to expect too much from life. That was because I read about the female student whose biology teacher asked her, "What portion of the human anatomy swells to ten times its

normal size during periods of agitation or emotional excitement?" Blushing, she stammered that she would rather not answer the question because it was kind of personal. The teacher, pointing out that it was not at all personal, explained, "The correct answer is the pupil of the eye, and your response tells me two things: First, that you didn't read last night's assignment, and second, that marriage is going to leave you a tremendously disappointed young woman."

The second was never to wish too much for company because that always got me into trouble. The third, and most important for me, especially given my love of reading is never to judge a book by its cover. It turned out to be a book about Chess.

This is why for three reasons I am going to start my New Year by re-reading (for the tenth time) DUNE, the Frank Herbert book that I bought and immediately read when it was released in 1965. First, what the new year brings to us will depend a great deal on what we bring to the new year. Secondly, time flies and each of us is our own pilot. Thirdly, in my

Fifth Form Block Commissioned at SNRA

A new fifth form and physical education (PE) block has been added to Sir Novelle Richards Academy through a donation from Italian billionaire businessman, Leonardo Del Vecchio, through his foundation Pavillon Foundazone Leonardo Del Vecchio.

Constructed at a cost of US\$ 1.6 million, the building was dedicated last Friday with government and education officials in attendance.

Addressing the ceremony, Prime Minister Gaston Browne said initially, the funding was earmarked to facilitate improvements in the health sector, specifically cardiac and renal facilities but it was determined upgrading of the school was necessary to accommodate fifth formers.

He thanked the Del Vecchio's for their generosity and for assisting Antigua and Barbuda in its "developmental quest" by exercising corporate responsibility.

"I hope that other very wealthy people who would have made Antigua and Barbuda their home will follow your lead to make similar contributions," the prime minister told the audience.

He also pointed out that the project, from discussion to construction, will be used as a model in approaching others for assistance.

"There are many wealthy people who have lived in Antigua and Barbuda over the decades. Many of them at Mill Reef Club, Jumby Bay and other areas on the island, but unfortunately have not been well integrated into the society. Our government is making a special effort to engage these individuals, to

Antigua & Barbuda leads CARICOM with highest vaccination rate

Recently released statistics from the Caribbean Public Health Agency (CAR-PHA) reveal that Antigua and Barbuda is ahead of its CAR-ICOM partners with respect to the rate of vaccination.

According to CARPHA sixty-three percent of the eligible population of Antigua and Barbuda has received at least the first dose of one of the approved, available COVID-19 vaccines while sixty percent are fully vaccinated.

The numbers are based on Antigua and Babrbuda's reported population of 97,928.

The CARPHA report dat-

ed 2nd January, 2022 is based on final statistics reported to it by each CARICOM member country at the end of December 2021.

Belize follows in second place with 49% fully vaccinated and 57% with at least one dose.

Barbados is third with 50% and 54%, Guyana is fourth at 37% and 52%, and St Kitts and Nevis follow in fifth with 48% and 52%.

Jamaica with 19% and 24% and Haiti with 1.1% with at least one dose are 14th and 15th respectively.

Some CARICOM associate states however have made drastically more headway in



vaccinating their populations.

The Cayman Islands have a vaccination rate closing in on 90%. Bermuda reports 71%, the Turks and Caicos stand at 70%, Anguilla, 61%.

The British Virgin Islands reports the lowest of the Caricom associate members at 56%.

In other parts of the region, Aruba has reported a vaccination rate closing in on 80%. As of 9th January 2022, Antigua and Barbuda has reported 3,307 partially vaccinated with 59,054 fully vaccinated.

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Elective and Non- Essential Services Restricted at SLBMC

The Sir Lester Bird Medical Centre (SLBMC) has made the decision to suspend all elective and non-essential services at the hospital.

This change came into effect today, Monday January 10, 2022 and will remain in place until further notice.

According to a statement, this decision was taken in response to the latest increase in COVID-19 cases, "In an effort to keep our patients, staff, and communities safe."

The services at SLBMC affected include elective surgeries and outpatient clinics, routine laboratory services and non-emergent radiological services.

The hospital said patients who are affected by this restriction will be contacted by its care team.

Acknowledging the inconvenience the decision will create, SLBMC Medical Director, Dr. Albert Duncan asked for the public's under-



Sir Lester Bird Medical Centre standing as: "The safety of our patients and visitors remains a priority. We continue to make decisions in the best interest of those in our care and those who love them".

Persons who require access to essential treatments at SLBMC such as cancer care, antenatal (high-risk) care, and kidney dialysis will not be affected by the change and they are assured that their treatment programmes will continue. Additionally, the emergency department will remain open around the clock and the hospital will also continue to accept urgent physician referrals.

Rather than presenting themselves to the hospital and risking exposing others, people who suspect they may have been exposed to COVID-19 are being asked to phone the COVID Hotline: 46-COVID (462-6843) OR 562-9764 for advice and help.

Individuals are being asked to only present to the hospital if their symptoms are severe or if a health professional has advised them to do so.

Concerns grow over disunity in Barbuda

The Barbuda Council Chairperson, Jackie Frank, is bemoaning growing disunity among some sectors of the population on the sister isle.

In a recent appearance on the Barbuda Channel, Frank said the lack of togetherness is hampering the work of the decision making body in advancing Barbuda.

The chairperson indicated the Council is experiencing difficulties with disunity and is vowing to deal with the issue.

"People have recognised and pointed out to the Council that the body of Council is not as unified as it could be and not as unified as it probably once was in the past, which is true. We as Councillors, we have recognised that and are taking that on board and we're finding ways to work together to improve this, so that going forward, Barbuda can achieve even more," Frank stated.

Noting that the internal

disharmony must be addressed with urgency, Frank further pointed out that the present situation puts at risk the island's progress at a time when as Councillors they must together forge ahead and leave behind their present difficulties.

The challenges of disunity are not limited to Barbuda's decision makers; it is also an issue within the workforce. In this sphere however, it concerns the poor work ethic of some employees.

Jackie Frank said there is a stark contrast between

employees of the Council and those employed by private companies. The less than desirable level of productivity of Council employees, she revealed, has now become an issue in the community.

"How is it when a developer or an outsider comes and when they expect a certain amount of engagement with the work they get it, but at the same time it doesn't happen with Council?

"That is a challenge and something the Council will be addressing in the coming days and weeks." The chairperson questioned whether the challenges the executive body face are of deliberate design. She is of the opinion there may be an attempt by some developers to "divide and conquer".

Frank said the Council is willing to work with developers in the interest of the sister isle, but she wants a direct relationship that excludes the central government.

Frank noted that Barbuda's laws are special, specific and enshrined in the country's Constitution. Therefore, developers must operate with this in mind and show their willingness to cooperate with the Barbuda Council.

"At the moment the challenge is some of the developers do not yet recognise that fact and are not behaving that way, so it is leading to and causing some disunity within the community and that isn't good for Barbuda."

Black, Hispanic families hit hardest by dementia

It can begin with the occasional missed bill payment. An inability to remember names. Telling the same story repeatedly. There may be personality changes or mood swings. Confusion. Over time, it's as if the person who once was slowly disappears.

Dementia. As the population ages, a growing number of families face this debilitating condition, which can be both emotionally and financially exhausting, and require near-constant supervision from spouses or adult children. It can be tough on any family, but in the United States, Black and Hispanic communities are hardest hit.

"We don't exactly know why," said Jason Resendez, executive director for the UsAgainstAlzheimer's Center for Brain Health Equity in Washington, D.C. "More and more evidence is pointing to a mix of factors that are health-related, such as disparities in diabetes and heart disease. But there are also social and economic factors, such as education, social isolation, smoking, low income and other inequalities."

While dementia risk in the United States has been relatively stable over the past two decades, racial disparities have remained high, according to research published last year in JAMA Neurology. Other data suggest Black adults, from age 50 onward, are two to three times more likely than their white peers to be diagnosed with dementia; Latinos are at 1.5 times greater risk.

Research shows many of the risk factors can be reduced. In fact, efforts to do so are meeting with some success but less so for people of colour. For example, a 2017 study in JAMA Neurology found cholesterol-lowering drugs could reduce dementia risk by 23%, but they were less effective for Black and Latino adults than for their white peers.

Up to 40% of all cases of dementia could be reduced by lowering 12 risk factors, according to a report by the Lancet Commission. These include high blood pressure, obesity, smoking, diabetes, physical inactivity, depression, hearing loss, less education, air pollution, social isolation, excessive alcohol consumption and traumatic brain injury.

Nearly all of these factors "are intertwined with social inequities," Resendez said. "We are not all born with the same opportunity for brain health."

Black and Hispanic adults, for example, are more likely to have blood pressure levels uncontrolled than white adults, said Dr. Deborah Levine, an associate professor of internal medicine and director of the Cognitive Health Services Research program at the University of Michigan. Black adults also tend to have more severe high blood pressure and develop it at an earlier age than white adults.

Levine led a 2020 study showing Black adults' cumulative high blood pressure rates might explain their faster cognitive declines compared to white adults. High blood pressure also significantly increases the risk for stroke – a risk that is higher among Black and Hispanic adults than it is for their white peers, she said. And stroke doubles the risk for dementia. Levine led another study that showed cognitive function declines faster following a stroke than it does in people who haven't had one.

The troubling statistics on these health disparities are not explained by genetics, said Chandra Jackson, a research investigator with the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences, part of the National Institutes of

Health. "These disparities are the manifestation of historical and contemporary forms of structural racism."

Years of discrimination in housing, education, employment, earnings, benefits, credit, media and criminal justice have all contributed to making people of color more vulnerable to the conditions that foster poor health, she said.

"The places where people live, learn, work and play affect dementia risk," said Jackson, who also is an adjunct investigator with the National Institute of Minority Health and Health Disparities at the NIH. Researchers call these the "social determinants of health."

A report last year by the Urban Institute and UsAgainstAlzheimer's highlighted the role social inequities play. It compared counties with the highest rate of Alzheimer's disease – the most common form of dementia - among Black and Latino adults to those with the lowest rates.

Counties with the highest rate of Alzheimer's also had the highest percentage of families living in poverty, fewer opportunities for exercise and people with less education and health insurance.

The stress of living with racism likely also plays a role, said Lynn Rosenberg, a professor of epidemiology at Boston University and epidemiologist at its Slone Epidemiology Center. She is a principal investigator for the Black Women's Health Study. Her team

The Guardian - General Máximo Gómez, a key figure in Cuba's 19th-century wars of independence against Spain once said: "Cubans either don't meet the mark – or go way past it."

A century and a half later, the aphorism rings true. This downtrodden island struggles to keep the lights on, but has now vaccinated more of its citizens against Covid-19 than any of the world's major nations.

More than 90% of the population has been vaccinated with at least one dose of Cuba's homegrown vaccines, while 83% have been fully inoculated. Of countries with populations of over a million, only the United Arab Emirates has a stronger vaccination record.

"Cuba is a victim of magical realism," said John Kirk, professor emeritus of Latin American studies at Dalhousie University, Canada. "The idea that Cuba, with only 11 million people, and limited income, could be a biotech power, might be incomprehensible for someone working at Pfizer, but for Cuba it is possible."

Like most Latin American countries, Cuba knew it would struggle to buy vaccines on the international market. So in March 2020, with foreign exchange reserves plummeting due to the loss of tourism revenue and ferocious new US sanctions, the island's scientists got to work.

The gamble paid off: this spring Cuba became the smallest country in the world to successfully develop and produce its own Covid vaccines. Since then its well-staffed, if dilapidating universal health service, has rolled out injections at a fast clip, inoculating even young children (all vaccination on the island is voluntary).

Both vaccines are over 90% effective, according to Cuban-run clinical trials conducted last spring. Successful rollout has brought infection rates down

from among the highest in the western hemisphere last summer to low levels today.

Last August the island reported hundreds of Covid deaths per week; last week there were three.

The vaccine success is all the more striking when set against the parlous state of the healthcare service in other areas. With hard currency inflows cut in half over the last two years, antibiotics are now so scarce that 20 pills of amoxicillin trade on the black market for the equivalent of a month's minimum state salary. Out of plaster cast, doctors in some provinces now resort to wrapping broken bones in used cardboard.

"Ever since the 1959 revolution, Cubans have embarked on these grand crusades which are quixotic yet often successful," said Gregory Biniowsky, a Havana-based lawyer.

rime example, Biniowsky said, was Fidel Castro's pipe dream of investing one billion dollars in biotech after the Soviet Union disintegrated. "Any rational adviser would have said this was not the time to invest resources in something that might bear fruit in 25 years. And yet here we are now ... where these fruits of the biotech investment are saving lives."

Other quests have dramatically failed: the Ten Million Ton Sugar Harvest of 1970 aimed to produce an unprecedented amount of sugar to spur growth. But to cut the cane, workers

were pulled from their regular jobs, paralysing industry and wreaking havoc on the economy.

Last year Cuba harvested seven times less sugar than in 1959.

"As a nation there's a tendency to get really good with the big things, and awful at the everyday things," said Hal Klepak, professor emeritus of history and strategy at the Royal Military College of Canada.

"The whole idea of electrifying the country [in under a decade], abolishing illiteracy in 2.5 years, and medical internationalism – these were all just mad schemes. And they did it."

On Friday Cuba posts tens of thousands of doctors and nurses doing humanitarian work abroad – but fails to grow enough potatoes for the population. Cuba's highly centralised, state planning system – one of the last in the world – goes some way to explaining this paradox. When there is political will from the top, objectives can be driven forward; when there's a lack of direction, the island's rigid, Kafkaesque bureaucracy can elevate passing the buck to an art form.

"In capitalism you tend to have, even with very little things, somebody to fill the market," said Klepak. "The difference with Cuba is that for [most economic] decision-making, there isn't anyone but the state."

After registering less than 100 cases a day for weeks, infection rates are now rising due to the highly contagious Omicron variant. Cuban scientists have not released data on the efficacy of their vaccines against Omicron but have begun work to update their vaccine against the variant.

In the meantime, the Cuban ministry of public health has fast-tracked its booster campaign, and aims to give almost the entire population an extra shot of vaccine this month.

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T&T records first Omicron case: woman quizzed, charges expected

Trinidad Express - Charges are expected to be laid against a woman who brought the first recorded case of the Omicron variant of COVID-19 into Trinidad and Tobago.

The woman was interviewed by police on Saturday. A statement was taken and the police team was expected to approach officials in the office of the Director of Public Prosecutions for instructions on how to proceed.

The Express was told by police investigators that the investigative team, led by ACP Williams, was waiting for the woman to complete her quarantine period before moving to question her.

months' imprisonment upon summary conviction.

The woman was allowed to board a flight in New York, to Panama. She presented a negative antigen test to local authorities on December 9, which she took in Panama, even though Trinidad's entry conditions require PCR tests be submitted. However, this was flagged upon her arrival in Trinidad.

Minister of Health Terrence Devalsingh explained during a news conference that she did not make it past Port authorities, who took note of a positive PCR test which she had also taken.

As a result, she was quickly isolated and tested. The sample was retrieved on December 10, and the findings were presented on the evening of December 11.

"The individual was flagged at the airport, and once the individual was flagged our protocols worked, and hats off to our Port health workers, and the person was sent immediately to a stepdown facility. So, at no point in time was anybody in the general public, her family, village, community exposed to her,"

Fourteen passengers who were nearest to this person were ordered to self-isolate.

found women who reported experiencing the highest levels of racism in their daily lives measured lower on tests of cognitive function than those who experienced less racism. Other studies have shown everyday stress increases dementia risk.

Eliminating the disparities in dementia and other health risks will require tackling structural racism on a societal level, Jackson said. It also means creating communities that promote healthier living through greater access to economic stability, healthy

foods, opportunities for physical activity and better social support for families and caregivers. But research shows there also are steps individuals can take to improve brain health: stop smoking, eat a healthier diet, stay active, lose weight and maintain good blood pressure, cholesterol and blood sugar levels.

"These are steps people should take long before they reach their senior years," Resendez said. "We need to target people in their 30s and 40s. Their actions today affect their brain health 20 years from now."

At least 200 dead in bandit attacks in northwest Nigeria

AlJazeera - An estimated 200 people were killed and 10,000 displaced in attacks by armed bandits in the northwestern Nigerian state of Zamfara following military air raids on their hideouts last week.

A spokesperson for Sadiya Umar Farouq, minister of humanitarian affairs, said more than 200 bodies were buried.

"We are very saddened by this incessant invasion ... and we also worried about the displaced persons who are fleeing in their hundreds from their communities," Nneka Ikem Anibeze said on Sunday.

Farouq called the past week's attacks in Zamfara state "horrific and tragic," giving the first official toll after details began filtering out early Saturday.

The minister said more than 10,000 people were displaced when "their homes were razed by the bandits while scores are still missing".

The state government had previously said 58 people were killed in the attacks.

Locals returned to their villages on Saturday to organise mass burials.

The military conducted air attacks agency.

on Monday on targets in the Gusami forest and west Tsamre village in Zamfara, killing more than 100 bandits including two of their leaders.

More than 300 gunmen on motorcycles stormed eight villages in the Anka local area in Zamfara on Tuesday and started shooting sporadically, killing at least 30 people.

Attackers also rampaged through 10 villages in Anka and Bukkuyum districts on Wednesday through Thursday, firing at residents and looting and burning homes.

Babandi Hamidu, a resident of Kurfa Danya village, said the assailants were shooting "anyone on sight".

"The search for more bodies is ongoing because many people are unaccounted for," Hamidu told AFP news

At least seven dead after Brazil cliff collapses on boats

BBC - At least seven lowed days of rain in Minas people have been killed after part of a cliff collapsed onto leisure boats on a Brazilian lake.

Another three are missing and 32 injured following the accident in the southeast of the country.

Video circulating online shows the moment the rock detaches from the cliff face as onlookers try to yell warnings to the boats beneath.

At least one of the boats appears to have sunk, while others managed to escape.

The collapse at 11:00 local time (14:00 GMT) folGerais state, which had made the cliffs more susceptible to collapse, local fire officials told reporters.

"That piece will fall out," a woman can be heard saying in a video of the accident. "Get out of there." warns another, before the cliff collapses onto the boats.

Three vessels were hit by falling rock, Lieutenant Pedro Aihara told reporters. Out of the 32 injured, nine people were in hospital.

Divers and helicopters are searching the water for any more survivors.

Twenty people were ini-



tially reported missing, but Lt Aihara said most were accounted for after checking hospital lists.

Alessandra Barbosa told news outlet EPTV that she is seeking news of her uncles, who were spending the weekend at the site and decided to take a boat tour of the cliff.

"I called local hospitals. So far I haven't had any information about them. We are distressed, very concerned," she said.

"We get nervous because we have no information and it's family, right? Family is everything to us."

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Major fire in Bronx apartment building leaves 19 people dead, including 9 children, officials say

CNN - A major fire in a residential apartment building in the Bronx in New York City on Sunday left 19 people dead, Mayor Eric Adams told CNN. Nine of them are children, a city official with direct knowledge told CNN.

The blaze sent 32 people to hospitals with life-threatening conditions, FDNY Commissioner Daniel Nigro said earlier Sunday. A total of 63 people were injured.

It remains unclear what started the fire, but it is not believed to be suspicious, Nigro said.

"This is a horrific, horrific, painful moment for the city of New York, and the impact of this fire is going to really bring a level of just pain and despair in our city," Adams said.

About 200 members of the New York City Fire Department were on scene of the fire at a 19-story apartment building at 333 East 181st Street.

The fire began a little before 11 a.m. in a duplex apartment on the 2nd and 3rd floors of the building and has been "knocked down," the FDNY said.

The door to the apartment was left open, and smoke then spread to every floor of the building, he said.

Firefighters were met



by "very heavy smoke, very heavy fire" in the hallways.

Victims were found in stairways on every floor of the building, many in cardiac arrest, in what Nigro said could be an unprecedented loss of life. The injuries were predominantly from smoke inhalation, he said.

The FDNY posted several images of the scene showing ladders extending into apartment windows as well as a number of broken windows.

"This is going to be one of the worst fires that we have witnessed during modern times here in the city of New York," Adams said.

"I am horrified by the devastating fire in the Bronx today," New York Gov. Kathy Hochul said on Twitter. "My heart is with the loved ones of all those we've tragically lost, all of those impacted and with our heroic FDNY firefighters. The entire State of New York stands with New York City."

James said he decided to produce the magazine as a tribute intended to highlight King Frank-I's significant contributions to journalism over his 40 year career.

"I am in the process of producing a magazine for the Test match in March and a chunk of that magazine will be devoted to the life and times of King Frank-I," said James in a guest appearance on Pointe FM's Sports Overflow programme last Friday.

"On the morning of his

death, I began to write an article and I got so much enthused into what I was writing that I had to tell myself, look, rather than just making this a spur of the moment tribute, let me go and do a proper research and documentation on my association with the King; let me go and do some proper research and documentation on his life; and let me make sure that whatever I am putting out there, is also supported by photos that I would have taken of the King and have never been seen before in any publication.

"I have been going through my archives over the last two weeks and, I tell you, there is so much information about the King.

"If you would have listened to the tributes that were paid at the funeral, there is so much about the life of King Frank-I that I don't think that I would

have done justice with, maybe, penning 500 words on a Facebook post in honour of the King.

"So I am really going to try to back myself [so] that I may be able to come forward with a proper tribute."

James shared many experiences with King Frank-I as they often worked together during a wide range of sporting events in Antigua and Barbuda, especially in the coverage of national, regional and international cricket and football.

He said King Frank-I also impacted the lives of many other journalists across the entire Eastern Caribbean.

"It is not only for me, because King Frank-I had so many positive effects on other journalist colleagues across the Caribbean. You speak of journalists such as Keith Holder in Barbados, the late 'Ras B' down in Anguilla might not be

around, but you can go to any Leeward Island and any Windward Island and many journalists in these islands can tell you of their great working experiences with King Frank-I," James said.

King Frank-I had one of the most recognisable voices on many topics, ranging from sports to politics.

The Rastafarian Elder of the Nyabinghi Theocracy Order was also a sportscaster on ZDK Radio, producing and hosting the radio station's flagship "Sportsline" programme for more than three decades.

He was appointed Antigua and Barbuda's Ambassador to Ethiopia by the ruling Gaston Browne-led Antigua and Barbuda Labour Party Government in 2014.

During his tenure, Ambassador Francis created history in Washington DC on May 14, 2018, when he became the first Rastafarian to address the Organization of American States' (OAS) Permanent Council.

King Frank-I also led efforts in Antigua and Barbuda in the fight for the decriminalisation and legalisation of cannabis.

The ambassador also lobbied for the legalisation of medicinal cannabis in Antigua and Barbuda.

Ambassador Frank-lin "King Frank-I" Francis passed away on December 6th 2021 at the age of 72.

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England clings on to draw Fourth Ashes Test

SYDNEY (AP) - England's tailenders resisted Australia's bowlers in fading light yesterday to clinch a draw on a dramatic final day of the fourth Ashes Test at the Sydney Cricket Ground.

Jack Leach, Stuart Broad and then Jimmy Anderson batted out the final 10 overs under immense pressure after Pat Cummins and Scott Boland took three quick wickets in the final session before Steve Smith removed Leach with two overs remaining to set up a nervous finale to a gripping Test match.

At stumps, England finished on 270 for nine with Broad unbeaten on eight and Anderson not out on nought to give England their best result of the five-match series that Australia leads 3-0.

"It's a small step forward," said captain Joe Root.

"I think coming into the game I spoke a lot about putting some pride back into English cricket and into the test performance.

"The fight, desire and character shown today and throughout the five days has done that in a small way."

With the final hour approaching, Cummins removed Jos Buttler and Mark Wood in the space of three balls to turn the Test on its head after it was looking increasingly likely that England would earn a draw after their most determined batting effort of the series.

Boland then continued his rapid start to Test cricket by having first-innings centurion Jonny Bairstow caught by Marnus Labuschagne for 41.

It was Boland's 14th wicket in just his second Test after making his Test debut in the third Test at Melbourne

where he was named man of the match.

But Broad and Leach saw out the remaining 10 overs despite Australia having all their fielders around the bat in catching positions as the fading light meant Australia had to bowl spinners Nathan Lyon and Steve Smith in the final three overs.

"From the position we found ourselves in at certain points in this game, to be able to sit here having drawn... was going to take a good performance and I'm really proud of the way the guys dug in and managed to do that," Root said.

Earlier in the session, Stokes, no stranger in proving to be an immovable object for Australia after his heroics in the 2019 Ashes series in England, did not appear to let the pain of his left side injury curtail his attacking shots as he crushed ten boundaries and a six as part of his 60 runs, to go with his 66 in the first innings.

Lyon eventually made the vital breakthrough as he caught Stokes in two minds as to whether to play at a ball or leave it. In the end, he did neither and guided a simple chance to Smith at slip.

It was the ninth time that Lyon has taken Stokes' wicket, including twice in this match.

As the final hour loomed, Cummins (two for 80) made a breakthrough when trapping Buttler lbw for 11.

On-field umpire Paul Reiffel initially rejected the appeal before Cummins referred to the TV umpire, who reversed the decision.

Two balls later Cummins dismissed Wood with a vicious in-swinging delivery that hit the tail-ender on the foot for a much easier lbw decision for Reiffel to confirm.

Boland then had Bairstow caught to expose England's tail, but Leach and Broad and then Anderson found a way to survive despite up to nine fielders in close catching positions.

It was the third time in the past 12 months that Australia's attack has failed to bowl out a team on the final day, having twice squandered winning positions against India last season, and again here at the SCG yesterday.

The tour represents the lowest rung of the men's professional tennis ladder. ITF tournaments are incorporated into the ATP Rankings, enabling young professionals to progress on to the ATP Challenger Tour and ultimately the full ATP Tour. Nearly every professional player has spent some time on the ITF Men's World Tennis Tour.

Ireland were already missing key batsman Paul Stirling and Shane Getkate because of Covid-19 before Simi Singh and Ben White were ruled out on Saturday morning after testing positive - the pair are awaiting results of PCR tests.

The Irish elected to field in the World Cup Super League game and it looked like a good decision before Brooks and Pollard brought the Windies to 217 for four.

The final six wickets fell relatively cheaply and the Irish were very much still in the game.

Mark Adair (three for 38) and Craig Young (three for 56) were the best of the Irish attack and they gave their side a decent chance of repeating the famous victory over the West In-

dies at the 2015 World Cup.

William Porterfield fell for a duck before Andy McBrine (39) retired hurt after being hit on the helmet with the score on 62 for one, but it was only a temporary setback as Harry Tector (53) impressed at number four.

Balbirne and Tector flourished as they added 103 runs but Ireland slumped from 165-1 to 194 for six to put the hosts in control.

Mark Adair smashed an unbeaten 21 from just nine balls but Ireland finished 24 runs shy with five balls remaining.

"I thought the fielding effort was good, but I thought we could have

bowled a bit better up the top and made them play on the front foot a bit more, just for that bit of nip there was early on," said Balbirnie.

"We set up a run chase that is pretty much our blueprint, so not to get over the line is hard to take at the moment, but we've got two more games to put it right."

The teams meet again in the second ODI tomorrow with the final match of the Sabina Park series three days later.

Maginley prepares for new season

Antigua and Barbuda's overseas-based professional men's tennis player, Jody Maginley, is preparing to resume his campaign in the second and third tier tournaments in this year's Association of Tennis Professionals (ATP) Tour.

The ATP Tour, organised by the Association of Tennis Professionals (ATP), comprises a three-tier system which uses a player's current ranking to determine which level each player is eligible to compete in.

Although, Maginley, 26, is currently the only national tennis athlete with ATP Ranking points, he is only eligible to compete in the second-tier ATP Challenger Tour and the third-tier ITF Men's World Tennis Tour.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, as well as sustaining a back injury which required surgery, Manginley was only able to participate in six tournaments in 2020.

In 2021 his tournament participation fell to three when he competed in Colombia, Guatemala and the Dominican Republic.

Speaking on Pointe FM's Sports Overflow programme, however, Maginley said he has recovered from his injury and he is now preparing to play a full schedule this year.

"So the way it works is the highest level is the ATP Tour. So that's the grand slams, all of the ATP's 100. The grand slams obviously being the Australian Open, the French Open, Wimbledon and the US Open. And then they have the ATP Tour under that, then below that they have the ATP Challenger Tour and then the Futures Tour," Maginley explained.

"So currently I play mostly futures and a little bit of the ATP Challengers. So I would say I play against guys ranked mostly between 300 in the world all the way down to into the thousands.

"And occasionally I would play challengers and play some of those higher ranked guys. But through COVID-19 - and then last year I had injuries - I really didn't have the opportunities to play that many events.



"So I am healthy now and this year I will be able to play a full schedule. Hopefully, 25 to 30 weeks out there I will be competing and give myself the best shots to get up to the ATP tournaments."

Maginley, who is based in Florida in the United States of America, currently has an ATP men's singles ranking of 1326 and in 1025 in doubles. In the ITF Men's World Tennis Tour he is ranked 967 in singles and 205 in doubles.
