# **Local News PM warns of possible** increases in fuel prices

Prime Minister Gaston Browne has put the nation on notice for another increase in the prices paid for fuel at the pump.

PM Browne, speaking on his weekly Browne and Browne show on Pointe FM on Saturday afternoon, said his administration has been doing its best to keep fuel prices in check, but the rising cost of oil on the international market is outside of the government's control.

"We are hoping that this war in Ukraine can come to a quick resolution as it has been driving up prices on the international markets. So for this month, we will have to pay West Indies Oil Company (WIOC) as the government's intake from the consumption tax has dropped significantly.

"Last month, our intake was a mere \$165,000.00 when the intake is usually in



Prime Minister Gaston Browne the millions of dollars," the prime minister explained.

According to PM Browne, the government has been subsidising the cost of fuel at the pump by taking a lower margin in taxes.

But this, he warned, is unsustainable.


"This is not a sustainable proposition. If prices do not go down with the next shipment, which is due within the next two weeks to a month, then the government will have no other choice but to raise taxes: not because we want to but because we have to," he remarked.

The prime minister noted that the government's revenues have not recov-

ered to pre-pandemic levels, and it is still dealing with the aftermath of the huge expenditure and borrowing that was required to keep the country afloat as it fought domestic fallout of COVID-19.

He further explained that the government is mindful of the fact that prices increased over the last two months by approximately \$2.65 per gallon for gasoline and that the government has been doing all in its powers to keep the current prices in tact with no additional increases.

The cost of fuel on the international market has risen sharply over the past two months. This has been caused, in large part, by rising demand and the absence of Russian oil from the international market due to the many sanctions placed on that country for its military invasion of Ukraine.

### **Cashew Hill man gunned** down in front his home Five months into 2022. Sir Lester Bird Medical

Antigua and Barbuda has recorded its third homicide.

According to information made public by the Royal Police Force of Antigua and Barbuda, an investigation has been launched into the circumstances leading to the shooting death of 36-year-old Jonathan Manley.

Manley was gunned down as he sat outside his Cashew Hill home on Saturday at approximately 9:30pm.

He was rushed to the

Centre where he was pronounced dead less than an hour later at 10:14pm.

His attacker remains unidentified.

Police have issued an appeal to any member of the public who may have information about this latest murder to come forward. All information, they have assured, will be treated confidentially.

Canadian fitness trainer, Christopher Smithers, 36, became the nation's second homicide victim this year after he was allegedly stabbed to death by Berle Wallace Jr. on Popeshead Street on 1st March.

2022's first murder was recorded a little more than two weeks earlier when Allan Dowdie was gunned down by an unidentified assailant at the bus shed near Clare Hall Secondary School in the late afternoon hours of 11th February.

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### **Local News** Jerkeem Jackson's attacker in custody

Jackson continues to make a miraculous recovery after being savagely attacked just over a week by three teen boys on All Saints Road, police revealed on Sunday that his main attacker is now in custody.

While the names of all the boys implicated in the attack are in the public domain, they cannot be published as they are minors and have not yet been charged with an offence.

Two of the three boys been had apprehended and brought in by police for questioning just over a week ago, however Jer-

As 16-year-old Jerkeem keem's mother, Kareema Jackson, told local media last Sunday that she was informed by police that they had been released as neither of those boys acknowledged involvement in the attack, although they admitted to being present when the beating occured.

> According to police, however, the third boy who is accused of leading the attack on Jerkeem - a Radio Range resident - was taken into custody on Saturday and is now assisting with the investigation.

Over the weekend, the nation breathed a collective sigh of relief, when Jerk-

eem's mother reported that her son was out of the medically induced coma he had been placed in and off the

ventilator.

She shared a photo of her son, in which he was smiling and out of bed, taking his first few steps on the road to the long recovery that lies ahead.

Jerkeem's attackers were captured on surveillance camera following him while brandishing stones and glass bottles.

Moments later, the boys allegedly jumped Jerkeem, inflicting a horrendous beating with their fists, kicks to his head and loose pieces of asphalt, which left him unconscious and suffering severe head trauma and a fractured skull.

A neighbour who witnessed the attack attempted to intervene, but was unable to stave off Jerkeem's attackers.

After beating and kicking Jerkeem mercilessly for several minutes, his attackers went on to rob him of his mobile phone and money as he lay helpless in the street.

### Local News Melford Nicholas: Healthcare system managing new COVID-19 cases well

Although the number of COVID-19 cases have been on the rise over the past several weeks, the government is satisfied that the healthcare system is equipped to manage these new cases.

This was the word from Cabinet Spokesman, Melford Nicholas at last week's press briefing.

The Ministry of Health, Wellness and the Environment indicated that there were 58 new laboratory confirmed cases and 78 active cases as of 9th May, 2022.

Of the five people hospitalised, one was classified as being "severe" while two were "moderate" and the remaining cases "mild".

According to Nicholas, despite the increase in cases, the low number of hospitalisations is not creating a strain on the healthcare system or Sir Lester Bird Medical Centre.

As a result, he confirmed that reintroducing strict COVID-19 measures is not being considered by the Cabinet at this time, however, the situation will continue to be monitored closely.

"We did not look at re-establishing a mask mandate. We did note the numbers, but the more important number for us

would be the number of hospitalisations - I think they are up to five - and we did not have any report to indicate that any of those cases were serious to the point where persons' lives could be threatened.

"It has always been our aim to be in a position that the health system, the health services can manage these types of infections, and what it has demonstrated is that with the equipment and resources that we have put at the disposal of our professionals, the numbers are in a manageable frame at this point in time," said the Minister of Information.

He continued, however, "We could wake up tomorrow morning and recognise that there is a new variant and it has certain other features that will cause us to have that concern, but for now, we think that with the prevalence of the Omicron variant and the fact that it is not a deadly strain, the


Currently, the Eastern Caribbean is served by the Polish embassy in Co-lombia.

# Health & Wellness The chemicals that linger for decades in your blood

#### By Anna Turns

Environmental journalist Anna Turns experienced a wake-up call when she had her blood tested for toxic synthetic chemicals – and discovered that some contaminants persist for decades.

In March 2022, scientists confirmed they had found microplastics in human blood for the first time. These tiny fragments were in 80% of the 22 people tested – who were ordinary, anonymous members of the public. The sample size was small and as yet there has been no explicit confirmation that their presence causes any direct harm to human health, but with more research, time will tell.

Microplastics are the subject of a lot of scrutiny. Wherever we look for them we find them. And yet, there are perhaps other less tangible pollutants that should be hitting the headlines, and which have been in our blood for decades.

Chemical pollution has officially crossed "a planetary boundary", threatening the Earth's systems just as climate change and habitat loss are known to do. A recent study by scientists from Sweden, the UK, Canada, Denmark and Switzerland highlights the urgent need to turn off the tap at source. Many toxic chemicals, known as persistent organic pollutants, or POPs, don't easily degrade. They can linger in the environment and inside us – mostly in our blood and fatty tissues – for many years.

I was curious about whether any of these chemicals were in my own blood while researching for my book, Go Toxic Free: Easy and Sustainable Ways to Reduce Chemical Pollution, I contacted a professor of environmental

chemistry in Norway called Bert van Bavel. His research has focused on POPs that persist in bodies for more than 20, 30, sometimes 50 years and he analyses how high exposure in populations correlates to cancers, heart disease and conditions such as diabetes.

Bert van Bavel developed a blood test protocol for Safe Planet, a global awareness campaign established by the UN Environmental Programme that could be used to monitor the levels of these toxic chemicals in the global population.

Safe Planet highlights the harm caused by the production, use and disposal of hazardous chemicals such as flame retardants and pesticides, many of which have been banned. He designed a test to measure 'body burden' – that's the amount of these persistent synthetic chemical pollutants that accumulate in the body. Since 2010, this test has been carried out on more than 100,000 people around the world, across Europe, North and South America, Africa and Southern Asia.

Now, it was my turn. I booked an

appointment at my local GP surgery and had my blood taken. I carefully packaged up the test tubes and couriered them to a specialist lab in Norway which spent six weeks analysing my blood for 100 or so POPs in line with this body burden test protocol.

When the results finally arrived via email, I felt quite apprehensive. The eight-page-long document detailed concentrations of so many chemicals, each with tricky-to-pronounce names. I needed help to decipher what this all meant and to work out if I should be worried about any, or if, perhaps, these levels were low enough to be insignificant.

So, I called van Bavel who explained that most of the chemicals on the list were to be expected as part of the "toxic cocktail" we all have in our bodies.

Many, but not all, of these POPs are regulated by the UN's Stockholm Convention, a global treaty that bans or restricts the use of toxic synthetic chemicals such as certain pesticides, *cont'd on pg 12*

flame retardants and PCBs or polychlorinated biphenyls that were used as cooling fluids in machinery and in electrical goods in the UK until 1981.

"In your blood sample, we looked at the old traditional POPs which have been regulated and off the market, so they haven't been used for many years," he explained. My results showed traces of DDE, a metabolite of the pesticide DDT that was used until the 1970s as well as low levels of PCBs. "It's a little bit frightening that if you get these chemicals in society, it's very difficult to get rid of them." Despite bans, these chemicals still persist, as many don't degrade easily.

He was surprised to find relatively high levels of a chemical known as oxychlordane which is normally found at lower levels than DDT and more often in the US and Asia than in the UK. The pesticide chlordane was banned in the UK in 1981, just a year after I was born. Once in the body, it's metabolised into oxychlordane which

was found in my blood at only 5% of the levels present in the population during the 1980s. But the 'half life' of this chemical – that's the time it takes for it to halve in concentration in my blood – is about 30 years. So not only was it probably passed to me via the womb, but I will have inadvertently passed this toxic legacy on to my own two children.

The impacts of some of the most hazardous chemicals last generations and chlordane is still used in some developing countries to this day. Chlordane is toxic by design - intended to kill insects, it also harms earthworms. fish and birds. In humans, it can disrupt liver function, brain development and the immune system plus it is a possible human carcinogen. Van Bavel wasn't alarmed by the current concentrations of oxychlordane still in my blood but he did emphasise the importance of banning toxic chemicals before they become globally prevalent and then accumulate in the human population.

But the chemicals that concerned



van Bavel the most were actually from a newer class, known as PFAS or polyfluoroalkyl substances. Thousands of different PFAS chemicals are used in everyday products to repel dirt and water – waterproof clothing, stain-resistant textiles, non-stick cookware all tend to be made with PFAS, otherwise known as "forever chemicals" because they are so persistent.

#### Should I be worried?

"Your levels [of PFAS] are not that high but they are a reasonable concern. We found ones called PFOS (perfluorooctanesulfonic acid), PFNA (perfluorononanoate), and lower levels of PFOA (perfluorooctanoate) the one we normally find in blood samples. The test found the major ones at 'a reasonable level', not a worrying level, but the regulation is lagging behind," commented van Bavel. He described my body burden as fairly average.

"We're all exposed to these types of chemicals. They accumulate in our body but they shouldn't be there. Your levels are acceptable from a human health perspective but if we didn't have any measures in place, levels would rise and our population would see different toxicological effects. Of course, these chemicals need to be regulated and... the number of replacements is rising so we need proper measures in place [to govern them]."

This "regrettable substitution" or replacement of one banned chemical with another similar one is a worry, especially with new emerging chemical pollutants such as PFAS, as van Bavel explains: "We don't have time to wait for research on every single chemical so we need to take a precautionary approach."

In terms of my own body burden, there's not much I can do to reduce the levels of toxic chemicals in my blood, according to van Bavel. "The sad thing is that it's very difficult for us to do something about it – we should all *cont'd on pg 13*

be very eager to regulate these compounds because they're everywhere. It's very difficult as an [individual] to avoid these background levels that we see that definitely should not be in your body. That's why we should support legislation and UN conventions that remove these compounds."

#### Prevention is better than cure

Better legislation is something Anna Lennquist, a senior toxicologist at the environmental NGO Chem-Sec, campaigns for. Based in Sweden, ChemSec aims to reduce the use of hazardous chemicals by influencing policy makers and encouraging companies to phase these chemicals out and opt for safer alternatives.

"We can reduce exposure but not eliminate it," agrees Lennquist. According to ChemSec, a huge 62% of the total volume of chemicals used in the EU are hazardous to human health and the environment. "[That's] why regulations are so critical and should protect us. Normal people shouldn't need to be bothered by these things – but we're not there yet.

"We can't be completely free from this, we have it with us from when we are born and it's so widespread in the environment – all of us have hundreds of [synthetic] chemicals in our blood these days," says Lennquist.

Toxic chemicals affect everything from our brain development to our hormone systems. Some can be carcinogenic. "Chemicals are working in many different ways in your body... some chemicals have delayed effects, for example ones that interact with our hormone systems. If you are exposed in the womb or during puberty, the effects can turn up many years later, even decades later, perhaps as breast cancers or different metabolic disorders."

So the outcomes depend not only on the type and level of exposure, but also whether that person is exposed during key stages of development. Lennquist explains that because we're never just exposed to one chemical at a time, this 'toxic cocktail' effect can be complex. Some chemicals might enhance the effect of others, some can work against each other.

"These low levels of this chemical mixture that affect hormone signalling and genetic effects are much more diffuse and difficult to link exactly – so that's why we need to do large-scale studies of populations over a long time to try to figure out what's the cause and what's the reason," says Lennquist, who remains optimistic.

New EU restrictions to ban around 12,000 substances have been proposed in what the European Environmental Bureau has called the world's "largest ever ban on toxic chemicals", but changes in regulation can be incredibly slow moving.

"There is a long way to go but with the new EU chemical strategy and European Green Deal, we are hopeful that things can improve a lot. But even then, that would take a long time before that change is visible in your blood, I'm afraid."

Labels allow consumers to make a conscious choice without having to understand everything.

That's where we come in, as consumers, and more importantly, as citizens. "We can all use our voice by demanding greater transparency, clearer labelling and stricter regulation," adds Lennquist. "With pressure from consumers and everyone else within the supply chain, the chemical manufacturing industry could shift much more rapidly. And reducing toxic chemical pollution is not only good for business, but for every one of us and future generations."

#### **Blood matters**

As a regular blood donor myself, I wondered whether the NHS Blood Donation service tests for POPs like the ones in my body. As expected, they confirmed they screen for diseases such as hepatitis, not synthetic chemicals. Of course, chemical contaminants may well be the last thing on your mind if in need of a blood transfusion, but it got me thinking. Do we need to be more cautious about sharing blood and passing on legacy contaminants? Or is blood donation one way to offload toxics – because the contaminated blood flows out, and the body then produces fresh, uncontaminated blood?

Since publishing my book, new research has been published about just this. Firefighting foams are known to contain high levels of PFASs, so firefighters are exposed to higher than average levels of those chemicals. The landmark trial tested 285 Australian firefighters for PFAS in their blood over the course of one year. Some donated blood, some did not. PFAS chemicals bind to serum proteins in the blood, and researchers found that PFAS levels in the bloodstream of those donating were significantly reduced. One possible explanation is that the donors' bodies did indeed offload the PFAS-contaminated blood, and replaced it with unpolluted blood.

While it is still early days for this research, the feasibility of blood donation as a long term, scalable solution is still questionable, as Lennquist explains: "For specifically exposed persons, like firefighters, it may be an option to empty the contaminated blood and let your body produce new blood. That requires that you will not be exposed again. For the average person the exposure is quite constant, and I do not see that it could be a solution for the general population. But it definitely points to the urgency to do something about PFAS."

While removal may well be a crucial step in some cases, surely the most appropriate solution is to turn off the tap at source and prevent PFAS and other toxic chemicals entering our bodies in the first place.

# Caribbean countries register record remittances in 2021

The World Bank says remittance flows to Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC) surged to US\$131 billion in 2021, up 25.3 percent from the previous year.

The Washington-based financial institution said the increase is due to the strong job recovery for foreign-born workers in the United States.

It said Haiti, with 21 percent, was the only CAR-ICOM country to have registered double-digit growth rates while Guatemala led with 35 percent.

"Remittances are important as a source of hard currency for several countries for which these flows represent at least 20 percent of GDP (gross domestic product), including El Salvador, Honduras, Jamaica, and Haiti."

According to the World Bank figures, Haiti received US\$4.4 billion in remittances last year, representing 20 percent of GDP, while Jamaica received US\$3.6 billion, representing 24 percent of GDP.

Dominica, Belize and St. Vincent and the Grenadines registered 10.2, 7.8, and seven percent of GDP last year, according to the figures.

The World Bank said for this year, remittances are estimated to grow by 9.1 percent, though downside risks remain. It said the average cost of sending US\$200 to the region was mostly unchanged at 5.6 percent in the fourth quarter of 2021 compared to a year earlier.

The World Bank said officially recorded remittance flows to low- and middle-income countries (LMICs) are expected to increase by 4.2 percent this year to reach US\$630 billion and this follows an almost record recovery of 8.6 percent in 2021.

In its latest Migration and Development Brief released Thursday, the World Bank said remittances to Ukraine, which is the largest recipient in Europe and Central Asia, are expected to rise by over 20 percent in 2022.

However, remittance

flows to many Central Asian countries, for which the main source is Russia, will likely fall dramatically. These declines, combined with rising food, fertiliser, and oil prices, are likely to increase risks to food security and exacerbate poverty in many of these countries.

"The Russian invasion of Ukraine has triggered large-scale humanitarian, migration, and refugee crises and risks for a global economy that is still dealing with the impact of the COVID pandemic," said Michal Rutkowski, Global Director of the Social Protection and Jobs Global Practice at the World Bank.

"Boosting social protection programs to protect the most vulnerable, including Ukrainians and families in Central Asia, as well as those affected by the war's economic impact, is a key priority to protect people from the threats of food insecurity and rising poverty."

In 2021, remittance inflows saw strong gains in Latin America and the Caribbean (25.3 percent), Sub-Saharan Africa (14.1 percent), Europe and Central Asia (7.8 percent), the Middle East, and North Africa (7.6 percent), and South Asia (6.9 percent).

Remittances to East Asia and the Pacific fell by 3.3 percent; although excluding China, remittances grew 2.5 percent. Excluding China, remittance flows have been the largest source of external finance for LMICs since 2015. (CMC)

The world's second largest reef, the Belize Barrier Reef is celebrating its 10,000th birthday this year. This historic occasion will be commemorated at a week-long nationwide event that will culminate on June 8, 2022.

The reef, now a UNESCO World Heritage site, was removed from the United Nations' endangered places list after almost a decade due to multiple preservation efforts.

These efforts include banning offshore drilling, designating no-take marine protected areas, establishing the "Fish Right, Eat Right" programme, and phasing out single-use plastic.

Belize has made considerable progress in enhancing its sustainability programs in recent years and is currently regarded as one of the most ecologically conscientious destinations in the Caribbean and Central America.

As part of Belize's coral restoration programme, after Hurricane Iris in 2001, the Belize Fisheries Department partnered with a non-profit organisation to transplant, by hand, fragments of destroyed coral.


This led to an increase in the coral cover of the sea floor from six percent

The 10,000th birthday of the reef serves as a tremendous endorsement of Belize's ongoing marine conservation initiatives, establishing the country as a global leader in safeguarding the ocean and its valuable ecosystem.

The Belize Barrier Reef is one of the world's great natural wonders. The reef, which runs more than 190 miles from Mexico to Honduras, is part of the larger Mesoamerica Barrier Reef System, and the largest reef of its type in the Northern and Western hemispheres consisting of offshore atolls, several hundred sand cays, mangrove forests, coastal lagoons and estuaries. The system's seven sites illustrate the evolutionary history of reef development and are a significant habitat for threatened species, including marine turtles, manatees and the American marine crocodile.

# CARICOM urged to act on behalf of persons of African descent

CMC – A Barbados government legislator says the CARICOM grouping has a critical role to play in securing significant and sustained change in rights and fundamental freedoms for all persons of African descent.

Addressing the Africa-African Diaspora Dialogues on Recognition, Justice, and Development, Senator John King said that despite the several challenges facing black people across the world, organisations like CARICOM have a responsibility to continue the fight for meaningful change.

"No matter the crisis, whether it is racial discrimination, climate change, economic or the public health and compounding impacts of COVID-19, the disruption that occurs in a crisis opens the door for transformative action to be taken," he told the event.

"Change must occur, but whether that change is for the better depends on our willingness and capacity for change as individuals, communities, and institutions. And for that change to be meaningful, it must first address the vulnerabilities of those most at risk," he added.

The series of talks, which are being supported by the University of the West Indies, in collaboration with the Barbados government and the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), is being held under the theme "Shaping the Present for the Future We Want"

The event seeks to identify strategies for the protection of all rights owed to persons from across the African diaspora and King said accountability must also play a key role in the solutions applied in today's world.

"Many of our ancestors came to this side of the world forcibly and under the worst of conditions. The lin-

gering effects of that trauma and the social order of the past still hold too many of our brothers and sisters in its chilling grip."

He said it was also important for CARICOM to continue to be at the forefront of the efforts regarding reparations for persons of African descent leading many discussions at the UN level over the past several years.

He said the lack of compensation and justice experienced by African descendants over the past few centuries because of the indirect consequences of the transatlantic slave trade, cannot be overstated or ignored.

"We must use this meeting to discuss how we can go about developing synergies between our CARICOM reparations campaign, the pursuit of the Program of Activities for the International Decade for People of African Descent, and the Decade of Action to deliver on the Sustainable Development Goals.

"Indeed, at the last meeting of our CARICOM Prime Ministerial Sub-Committee on Reparations, a decision was taken to mandate all CARICOM member states to make a concerted effort in the field of international diplomacy to advance and develop our reparations cause," King said.

"CARICOM diplomats and ambassadors are therefore expected to utilise all channels available within the United Nations system to build international support for our reparations claim, and so it goes without saying that our CARICOM nations are keen to devise strategies to leverage the obvious synergies between the campaign for reparative justice and the Sustainable Development Goals, as well as the objectives of the International Decade for People of African Descent."

CMC - Haitian Prime Minister Dr. Ariel Henry said he was 'deeply upset" by reports that a number of Haitian nationals had died after their boat capsized off the coast of Puerto Rico.

The US Coast Guard reported that the majority of the illegal migrants, who died in the tragedy were Haitians including 11 women.

It said that 38 survivors, including 36 Haitian nationals, had been found and rescuers were continuing the search, about 10 nautical miles (19 kilometres) north of Desecheo Island, an uninhabited US territory between Puerto Rico and the Dominican Republic.

In a message on his Twitter account, Prime Minister Henry extended condolences to the relatives of those killed, adding "the news of the sinking of a boat off the coast of Puerto Rico which caused the death of 11 of our compatriots deeply upsets me".

A Customs and Border Patrol helicopter first spotted the boat and people in the water who appeared not to be wearing life jackets around midday on Thursday.

On Thursday, the United States Coast Guard said it had repatriated 207 Haitian migrants to Cap-Haitien, Haiti, after they were intercepted 20 miles south of the Turks and Caicos Islands.

"We are urging families



in the US to ask their loved ones not to risk their lives on this dangerous journey," said Commander Anne O'Connell, of the Coast Guard Cutter, Campbell.

"These voyages are extremely hazardous and often involve rustic vessels that are overloaded, and lack food, water and basic safety equipment," she added.

Since October 1, 2021, the US Coast Guard said its crews have intercepted 4,449 Haitian migrants compared to 1,527 in the previous year.

The US Coast Guard also said that its cutter, Joseph Tezanos, repatriated 44 Dominican Republic nationals to a Dominican Republic Navy vessel Wednesday following the interdiction of two illegal voyages in the Mona Passage near Puerto Rico.

"These interdictions are the result of ongoing local and federal multi-agency

efforts in support of the Caribbean Border Interagency Group CBIG," the US Coast Guard said.

"To anyone looking to take part in an illegal voyage, do not take to the sea," warned Captain Gregory H. Magee, commander of US Coast Guard Sector San Juan.

"You will be putting your life at risk, and, if caught, you will be returned to your country of origin, or you could find yourself facing criminal prosecution in US courts."

### PM John Briceno heads to Guyana as Belize peeved at trading relations within CARICOM

CMC – Prime Minister John Briceno will lead a delegation to Guyana for talks amid growing concerns regarding intra-CARICOM trade, Agriculture Minister Jose Abelardo Mai has said.

Mai said that a container of poultry remains stuck in Grenada due to permit issues, but he believes that the authorities in Grenada are protecting their personal interests.

He said CARICOM is no longer interested in purchasing approximately 180 containers of red kidneys from Belize and that it is imperative that the undermining has to stop in order to survive and foster trade in the Caribbean.

Mai said Belize will have to revisit its trade policies with CARICOM.

"This has been raised at COTED (Council for Trade and Economic Development) a number of times. We have been battling with one container of poultry into Grenada for the past six months; one container. Their justification for not allowing it is because the importer didn't have an import permit when it arrived there.

"Apparently the permit expired because of COVID delays and it got there and they said oh, but you don't have a permit. I said fine, no problem. Forget that one. Give me a permit now for five containers. And they could not respond to me. So obviously, they are protecting their side," Mai said.

"Not that they have a strong poultry industry, but I am certain that there's one or two big businessmen that import all the poultry from Tyson in the US which is cheap poultry, subsidise poultry. So when you do things like that to undermine your fellow



Belize's Prime Minister John Briceno brother CARICOM state, it is not in good faith.

"When we have to take you to court because you are importing sugar from extra-regional sources and not paying the CET (Common External Tariff) then that is not in the best interest of the CARICOM brotherhood."

Mai said that Mexico is now offering Belize the removal of 125 percent tariff on black beans and Belmopan "will "need to revisit our marketing and production strategy to say guess what maybe we should produce red kidney beans only for local consumption while change to producing black beans which are consumed in Mexico and Guatemala".

The position being taken with Guatemala comes on the heels of tariffs being lifted in Mexico and is being seen as a move to strengthen the partnership between Belize and other Central American countries.

Mai, in announcing that Prime Minister Briceño, who is also the CARICOM chairman, will be visiting Guyana where the CARICOM Secretariat is based, maintains that the future of Belize lies in Central America.

"We have lost all confidence when it comes to trade with CARICOM. I have said this before a number of times and I have said this in the House of Representatives. Guatemala has 18 million people; Mexico has 123 million, El Salvador six and a half million.

"The future of Belize lies in Central America. So while I love our CAR-ICOM brothers - they are our supporters, we are a part of CARICOM – it is embedded in our constitution. They supported us when we wanted independence, but when it comes to trade, I have huge reservations.

"And so, we are not saying we won't trade with them, but we are saying to them that if my brothers in Central America and Mexico are extending the olive branch to us in terms of trade, we will accept it," the agriculture minister added.

### Gunman who killed 10 in Buffalo supermarket attack was on authorities' radar Reuters – New York Gramaglia told reporters on zon.com.

authorities on Sunday were investigating how a white 18-year-old, who the governor said had been on the radar of authorities since high school, was able to shoot 10 people to death in a Black neighbourhood grocery store.

The suspect, Payton Gendron, surrendered to police on Saturday at the Buffalo, New York, store after what authorities called an act of "racially motivated violent extremism." He apparently publicised a racist manifesto on the internet.

"The evidence that we have uncovered so far makes no mistake this is an absolute racist hate crime that will be prosecuted as a hate crime," Buffalo Police Commissioner Joseph

Gramaglia told reporters on Sunday.

Eleven people struck by gunfire were Black and two were white, officials said. The racial breakdown of the dead was not made clear.

The Buffalo shooting follows other racially motivated mass murders in recent years, including a Pittsburgh synagogue attack that left 11 dead in October 2018, and the Atlanta spa shootings in March 2021 in which a white man killed eight people, targeting Asians.

Authorities said Gendron drove to Buffalo from his home several hours away to launch the afternoon attack, which he broadcast in real time on social media platform Twitch, a live video service owned by Ama-

New York Governor Kathy Hochul said the firearm used in the killings was legally purchased but had been illegally modified with a high-capacity magazine.

Nearby at True Bethel Baptist Church, a reverend led a solemn service for a large crowd of worshipers, including some family of the victims and some who had been at the store at the time of the *cont'd on pg 20*



# Small wins buoy Ukraine; West says Russians losing momentum

AP – Almost three months after Russia shocked the world by invading Ukraine, its military faces a boggeddown war, the prospect of a bigger NATO and an opponent buoyed Sunday by wins on and off the battlefield.

Top diplomats from NATO met in Berlin with the alliance's chief and declared that the war "is not going as Moscow had planned."

"Ukraine can win this war," NATO Secretary-General Jens Stoltenberg said, adding that the alliance must continue to offer military support to Kyiv. He spoke by video link to the meeting as he recovers from a COVID-19 infection.

On the diplomatic front, both Finland and Sweden took steps bringing them closer to NATO membership despite Russian objections.

Finland announced Sunday that it was seeking to join NATO, citing how the invasion had changed Europe's security landscape. Several hours later, Sweden's governing party endorsed the country's own bid for membership, which could lead to an application in days.

If the two nonaligned Nordic nations become part of the alliance, it would represent an affront to Russian President Vladimir Putin, who has cited NATO's post-Cold War expansion in Eastern Europe as a threat to Russia. NATO says it is a purely defensive alliance.

While Moscow lost ground on the diplomatic front, Russian forces also failed to make territorial gains in eastern

Ukraine.

Ukraine said it held off Russian offensives Sunday in the east, and Western military officials said the campaign Moscow launched there after its forces failed to seize the capital of Kyiv has slowed to a snail's pace.

Ukraine, meanwhile, celebrated a morale-boosting victory in the Eurovision Song Contest.

The folk-rap ensemble Kalush Orchestra won the glitzy pan-European competition with its song "Stefania," which has become a popular anthem among Ukrainians during the war.

President Volodymyr Zelenskyy vowed that his nation would claim the customary winner's honour of hosting the next annual competition.

### **Andrew Symonds: Former Australia** cricketer dies aged 46 in car crash

BBC – Former Australia cricketer Andrew Symonds has died aged 46 after being involved in a car crash.

The all-rounder played 26 Tests, 198 one-day internationals and 14 Twenty20s for Australia between 1998 and 2009.

A powerful batter, canny bowler and fine fielder, Symonds was part of two 50-over World Cup wins and Australia's Ashes victory over England in 2006-07.

Queensland police said early information indicated Symonds' car "left the roadway and rolled".

А statement added: "Emergency services attempted to revive the 46-year-old driver and sole occupant, however, he died

Symonds' wife Laura told the Brisbane Courier Mail: "We are still in shock - I'm just thinking of the two kids."

Cricket Australia said it was "shocked and saddened by the news".

but raised in Australia, Symonds played county cricket in the UK for Gloucestershire, Kent, Lancashire and Surrey.

He also played for Queensland for 17 seasons, and for Deccan Chargers and Mumbai Indians in the Indian Premier League.

Symonds' exploits with Born in Birmingham Gloucestershire, who he

had initially represented as a domestic player, earned him a call-up for an England A tour in 1995 - but he declined the offer and chose to pursue his ambitions to play for Australia, making his ODI debut three years later.

He had jointly held the record for most sixes hit in a County Championship innings - he hit 16 in a knock for Gloucestershire against Glamorgan in 1995 - until Ben Stokes bettered his total last week.

His passing is another significant loss for Australian cricket, following the deaths of former wicketkeeper Rod Marsh and legendary leg-spinner Shane Warne earlier this year.

# Novak Djokovic wins his first title of the year and sixth in Rome

BBC – World number one Novak Djokovic boosted his preparations for next week's French Open by winning his first title of the year at the Italian Open in Rome. Djokovic beat Stefanos Tsitsipas 6-0 7-6 (7-5) to take the clay-court title.

The Serb, 34, cruised through the first set, and then fought back after the Greek took a 4-1 lead in the second.

Djokovic will be one of the favourites as he chases a record-equalling 21st Grand Slam at the French Open, which starts next Sunday in Paris.
