#### **ABLP 'preps' supporters for elections**

The Antigua and Barbuda Labour Party used the annual Labour Day solidarity rally and march to 'prep' its supporters for the upcoming general election, constitutional due by March next year.


Party leaders provided glimpses of its campaign platforms to the large audience assembled to hear the speakers at yesterday's rally held at the Bust of V.C Bird on lower Market Street.

Political Leader and Prime Minister Gaston Browne extolled the ABLP Administration's management of the nation's affairs over the past eight years, emphasising that the country was in 'good hands'.

"We are here today to celebrate the achievements of workers in this country, but our opponents are trying to turn Labour Day celebrations into a political event. They are saying that their march will be a 'vote of no confidence' in the ABLP. But today, they got the answer by your turnout. This is a powerful 'vote of confidence' in the continued stewardship of the country by the ABLP," PM Browne declared.

He said it is clear that the people have shown by their turnout that they are happy with the performance of the ABLP Administration and they want to see the party continue to manage the affairs of Antigua and Barbuda.

PM Browne referenced



Prime Minister Gaston Browne the solid foundations provided by both his predecessors – Sir V.C Bird and Sir Lester Bird – upon which his administration has used to further advance the social and economic development of the country.

"I can stand here to say without fear of contradictions that the Gaston Browne Administration has built on those successes by making strides in every aspect of human endeavor in this country. Every sector has grown under our leadership. Look at the healthcare services; we are delivering healthcare services that are superior to many other countries in the Caribbean. Today, we are offering kidney transplants; the last of which was done about a week ago," PM Browne reminded his audi-

Alongside the achievements in healthcare, the prime minister identified the successes in education as another key success for his government, especially with the establishment of the fourth landed campus of the University of the West Indies at Five Islands, as well as the number of scholarships it has offered over the past eight years.

Other successes include the rescue and expansion of the banking sector, the developments at the cruise and cargo ports, new highways and the provision of quality homes for many in the country.

PM Browne announced that the new housing programme for those making less than \$3,000.00 per month will start in less than two months. He said these homes will be subsidized to the point where homeowners will only be required to make a mortgage payment of \$800.00 per month.

Also speaking at the rally was ABLP chairman and Minister of Foreign Affairs, Immigration and Trade, EP Chet Greene. He too pointed

to the successes of the ABLP Administration over the past eight years and in particular, its management of the coronavirus pandemic.

Among the successes were the rebound in tourist arrivals to the point where last July, a month where traditionally many hotels closed for the summer, was the best July on record, with the number of passengers arriving aboard the many airlines operating into the country.

Greene also hinted that the yachting sector also performed well during the pandemic as Antigua was viewed as a welcoming port for many who arrived aboard yachts.

Both Prime Minister Browne and Foreign Affairs Minister Greene urged the audience to continue to support the ABLP, as it was the party with the proven track record of performance on behalf of Antigua and Barbuda.

#### Ambassador Murdoch leads OECS call for sustainable ocean economy

The Organization of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) has called for a shift to an integrated macro approach to climate adaptation and mitigation resilience measures for the maritime sector in the Eastern Caribbean region.

Head of the Permanent Delegation of the OECS in Geneva, Antigua and Barbuda's Ambassador Colin Murdoch, addressing the fourth Oceans Forum, explained that simultaneous growth in globalisation, containerisation, and cruise tourism has resulted in competition for berth space in many Caribbean ports.

He noted however, that port infrastructure in the Caribbean has not always kept pace with changes in the global shipping industry and this has a direct impact on the region's ability to engender sustainability and resilience in maritime supply chains.

"There is clearly a need to urgently factor climate change considerations into port development, redevelopment, operation, and management," Murdoch told the event hosted by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD).

He said as Small Island Developing States (SIDS), there needs to be recognition that the impact of climate change will affect the fulfillment of several Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), which necessitates a multi-layered approach to building resilience.

"In this regard, stakeholders from the private sector and the public sector need to be engaged and involved, wherever possible, in identifying threats and opportunities, and in for-





Murdoch identified a need for sustainable, climate adaptivity, supportive, policy action to be integrated into what is now a compartmentalised trade network in OECS member states.

He said this shift will require technical support from development partners like UNCTAD.

"There is a pressing need for work to be continued and deepened, for example in areas of research and multi-hazard assessments, and for the work by UNCTAD to be expanded, in collaboration with others, to assess risks for all ports and airports in the OECS to develop technical and policy solutions to help build resilience."

The OECS maritime sector is of systemic and strategic importance given the region's vulnerabilities to climate-related disasters and emergencies in addition to its high susceptibility to external shocks.

## ABPSA appeals for unity to tackle issues affecting workers

The president of the Antigua and Barbuda Public Service Association has appealed for togetherness among the membership and support for the union as they advance the cause of government workers.

Joan Peters, in a Labour Day message, informed the ABPSA's members that support is crucial at this time as the decisions taken today will affect future generations.

She maintained that strong representation is needed to guarantee firm interactions between the union and the government.

"It is not enough to say I am a union member, or let the executive handle the situation. You too have a part and role to play in ensuring the success of our beloved institution.

"Yes, it is true that we are all facing individual issues in our respective workplaces, but it is easier to break one twig than a handful of branches. Although it is the job of the Executive and General Council to lead the organisation, we, the members, are needed to show the government, and those who would seek to detract and destroy, that we are a force to be reckoned with," Peters asserted.

The ABPSA president said these goals can only be achieved if employees adopt the proper attitude and adjust to regularly encountered challenges while remaining productive.

Citing the global crisis brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic and the invasion of Ukraine by Russia, Peters wants the government to give attention to issues that are causing a strain on workers and their families.

"The ABPSA is therefore calling on the government to:

1. Reconvene the negotiations process with a view to fairly and objectively assess the needs of the worker balanced with the needs of the Gov-

ernment who is the employer.

- 2. Resolve issues pertaining to Performance Appraisals, Upward mobility within the service, the lack of Increments/Cost of Living Allowances, Health Insurance coverage and Pension Benefits; especially with a view to eliminate the unfairness to the Seconded Workers at the SLBMC.
- 3. Revamp the Salary Scale to address the continuous anomalies that have been perpetrated over the years. There are workers who are considered "Essential" and are being paid at the bottom of the scale, this we see is an indictment against the government since a number of their employees cannot afford to live in this country.
- 4. Payment of salaries that were withheld from workers during the vaccine mandate period even though the parameters have changed to reflect an atmosphere of inclusion.
- 5. Address and remedy the diminishing access to essential services (water, health care and transportation); There is also the issue of the non-payment of the two-month salary in lieu of back-pay," still yet unpaid to a number of Civil Servants/Retirees."

Peters indicated the union's readiness to engage the government on the issues that have been outlined in the hope of bringing relief to its members.

#### Royal Caribbean, Antigua and **Barbuda pact for onboard employment**

has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Royal Caribbean International to create "thousands of job opportunities" for residents of the Caribbean nation through employment with the cruise line.

The cruise operator will participate in a local job fair seeking onboard employees in June, said officials in a statement.

The summer employment event will be open to nationals and residents of Antigua and Barbuda and feature marine sector employment opportunities including junior seaman, junior engine man and assistant electrician.

Operations sector opportunities will include storekeepers, cruise staff, youth staff, sports staff,

Antigua and Barbuda laundry and restaurant attendants, bar waiters, wait staff, bakers and butchers. Specialty sector vacancies include entertainers and "all positions" in casino operations.

> "This initiative will not only see a huge cadre of our tourism professionals become gainfully employed while being ambassadors for our country," said Charles Fernandez, Antigua and Barbuda's minister of tourism and investment, "but it will further strengthen the partnership between the government and Royal Caribbean."

that they become part of the cultural and social milieu of the country.


"This signature piece that the ministry was given the challenge to put on tonight was not only good, but it was exceptional!" he declared.

### Rachel Lloyd dies at age 104

Antigua and Barbuda's oldest citizen passed away over the weekend at age 104.

The Community Development and Citizens Engagement Division of the Ministry of Social Transformation made the announcement on Saturday evening, via social media, that Mrs. Rachael Edith 'Amelia' James- Lloyd, formerly of Freetown Village, passed away on 30th April, 2022.

Paying tribute, the department said, "Rachel Lloyd lived a full life and was always showered with love by her family and friends. May her family and friends find comfort in this time of bereavement."

Rachel James-Lloyd was born on 18th November, 1917, on Freyes Estate near Willoughby Bay, Bethesda.

A biography previously issued by the Ministry of Social Transformation said the centenarian was raised in Freetown and became known as one of the best seamstresses in the village.

She remained rooted in Freetown well into her twilight years when she relocated to Lightfoot Estate to be with her daughter due to failing eyesight.

A few years later, she was moved to a care home to receive advanced care and treatment.

Rachel James-Lloyd became the country's oldest citizen following the death of Raymond Hughes in January, 2022, at the age of 105. There are now 24 centenarians living in Antigua and Barbuda.

## Old man and the sea

My family decided that we would spend last weekend in a village on the North Coast of Trinidad, overlooking the Atlantic Ocean. Its name is pronounced "Blankey-Shears" and one of my friends, on hearing this, immediately warned me not to go there or anywhere else with a name I couldn't spell or pronounce properly.

"Even if you refuse to take my advice," he insisted, "be careful and don't get into any trouble with the police because they will lock you up in some distant place with a name they know how to spell – like Toco".

This was an old joke based on a policeman who found a dead horse on "Frederick" street in Port-of-Spain and laboriously dragged it to "Duke" street because that was easier to spell.

Over the years, as I trotted around the Caribbean, I had warned myself about loving the region but not getting spellbound. When I arrived in Barbados in 1993, people who knew me from Trinidad's carnival expected me to participate in their "Kadooment".

I was not sure how to pronounce it. Then I ran into "Cohobblopot." I did not go to the event because I decided that I was not participating in anything that I could not pronounce.

I also experienced a pronounced problem in 2014 when the "chikungunya" virus, which is spread by mosquito bites, hit Jamaica and other Caribbean countries, including Antigua, where we lived.

Until I checked the spelling in a medical dictionary, I had gone along with the local pronunciation which, despite the African origin of the disease, ranged from "Chickomonia" and "Chicken Gun Man" to "Chicken Gonorhea".

Despite my own misgivings, we ended up in Blanchisseuse (pro-

nounced "Blankey-Shears"). I had told my wife and children that more than 2000 people die at sea every year but that didn't sink in. It was a true "conspira-sea" against me.

I even told my wife if she went there she would end up with a sea-section, but she didn't care. Her mind was more made up than Khloe Kardashian or Boy George.

I found out that when it comes to holidays, Christmas is not the only season to be jolly with folly. For Indranie and the children it was a case of long time no sea. However, in my case I was reminded once more that regardless of where I go there is no country for old men.

If I were Moses facing the Red Sea I could have said, "Goddamit" and he would have done so, but while life is like the ocean in that it goes up and down, the ocean is not like life. I have no need for Vitamin Sea. Unlike coffee, the sea cannot be restrained.

In fact, it is only in the sea you find your true direction. Down! I like Langston Hughes for making it known, "The sea is a desert of waves, A wilderness of water" yet I was pool-hardy enough to be there. In fact, was I aware that I should go no further than that part where the land meets the sea? I shore did, or so I thought.

The first thing that happened when my son Zubin and I tried "throwing a line" is that one small fish grabbed his bait and took off. "Don't worry," I consoled Zubin, "there are many more fish in the sea except where the Chinese and Japanese fishing fleets have been."

Unfortunately, we were told by a nearby banana vendor that there was a great beach just a few minutes away where he fished. He gave us the impression that it was a scion of a beach.

We didn't know that when dealing

with fishermen there is always a catch. In this case, it was a double whammy. The banana-man's advice proved to be slippery.

At that stage, we didn't know or care and within minutes we were in high gear heading down what seemed to be a thousand steps to the rocky beach which, even at falling tide, was as wavy as Shirley Temple's hairstyle.

My daughter, Jasmine, was worried about the lack of rails on the staircase and its steepness. "The longest journey," I preached to her, "begins with a single step." "Backward or forward?" she asked. "I going back."

Eventually we all hit rock-bottom and by the time we reached the beach, Zubin and I had already loaded up like the Earp Brothers heading into the OK Corral.

It reminded me of a quote from "No Country For Old Men". Clare Jean Moss asks, "What you're going to do?" Llewelyn Moss replied "I'm fixing to do somethin' dumbern' hell but I'm goin' anyways.

If I don't come back, tell Mother I love her." Carla Jean reminded

him, "Your mother's dead, Llewelyn." He responded, "Well, then, I'll tell her myself." I am not sure if it was my Irish blood but I knew that, ironically, the whole of Ireland, apart from Cork, is at risk from rising sea levels. However, my great-grandfather had to be from Kildare since I had a date, not with the Loch Ness Monster but a lock-neck monster and I was almost a luck-less punster.

ed", I learnt that this old man's feet could have been bitten off in the sea.

My son Zubin had left to drop Jasmine back to where we were staying. I saw it as an opportunity to dump the bait he was using, what Jamaicans call "swims" (shrimps), and because we had not caught anything as yet, use the firm and bloody "Bonito" fish as bait.

I thought that the fishing would go more swimmingly. It did. The Moray, smelling the fish-blood on me and trying to get a bite, kept bobbing, weaving and coming like a crazy Energiser Bungee.

I remembered Hemingway's "Now is no time to think of what you do not have. Think of what you can do with what there is". Seeing this wiggly, black beast coming for my foot and then, when I slipped and fell in the water, at my other parts and pieces, I kept rolling, beating my arms and kicking up my feet to scare it away.

My wife thought it was a branch floating next to me and then, when she saw the full size, believed it was "kelp" the largest group of seaweed around. I thought it was curtains.

## Mexico's Caribbean Sea beaches may see worst sargassum since 2018

Mexican authorities say the problem of foul-smelling seaweed-like algae on the country's Caribbean coast beaches is "alarming."

The arrival of heaps of brown sargassum on the coast's normally pristine white sand beaches comes just as tourism is recovering to pre-pandemic levels, though job recovery in the country's top tourist destination has been slower.

With more algae spotted floating out at sea, experts fear that 2022 could be as bad or worse than the catastrophic year of 2018, the biggest sargassum wave to date.

"We can say the current situation is alarming," said Navy Secretary José Ojeda, who has been entrusted with the apparently hopeless task of trying to gather sargassum at sea, before it hits the beaches.

The Navy currently has 11 sargassum-collecting boats operating in the area. But the Navy's own figures show that the portion they have been able to collect before it hits the beach has been falling.

In 2020, the Navy collected 4% of sargassum at sea, while 96% was raked off beaches. But that figure fell to 3% in 2021 and about 1% so far in 2022.

Allowing the algae to reach the beaches creates not only a problem for

tourists, but for the environment, said Rosa Rodríguez Martínez, a biologist in the beachside town of Puerto Morelos who studies reefs and coastal ecosystems for Mexico's National Autonomous University.


So much algae is reaching the beaches that hotels and local authorities are using bulldozers and backhoes, because the normal teams of rakes, shovels and wheelbarrows are no longer enough.

"The heavy machinery, when it picks it (sargassum) up, takes a large amount of sand with it," contributing to beach erosion, Rodriguez Martinez said.

"There is so much sargassum that you can't use small-scale equipment anymore, you have to use the heavy stuff, and when the excavators come in, they remove more sand."

Rodríguez Martinez worries that 2022 could be worse than the previous peak year. "In the last few days there have been amounts washing up, and in places, that I didn't see even in 2018," she said.

However, the University of South Florida Optical Oceanography Lab said in a report that "2022 is likely going to cont'd on pg 13

be another moderate or major sargassum year," with observable amounts in all waters lower than in 2018 and 2021. But given the vagaries of ocean currents, it may just be a very bad year for Mexico. Rodríguez Martinez is already suffering the effects herself, at her beachside offices.

"Where I am, I'm about 50 meters (yards) from the beach and the smell is very unpleasant," she said. "Right now my head is hurting and another friend said her head hurts, and I said it must be the (hydrogen) sulphide gas from the sargassum, no?"

The problem comes just as resorts like Cancun, Playa del Carmen and Tulm are recovering from the brutal two-year drop in tourism caused by the coronavirus pandemic. Not all beaches have been hit equally; many in Cancun and Isla Mujeres are often free of much sargassum, but much of the Riveria Maya has been hit hard.

Carlos Joaquin, governor of the coastal state of Quintana Roo, said the number of tourists arriving by air so far this year — some 3.54 million travellers — is 1.27% above 2019 levels, before the pandemic. But Joaquin said that only about 83% of the 98,000 jobs lost during the pandemic have returned.

Sergio León, the former head of the state's employers' federation, said the seaweed invasion "has definitely affected us, it has affected our image on the domestic and international level. Obviously, not just visually, but in term of environmental damage and pain."

"The Navy is making an effort, but it needs more, it isn't enough," said León. "The ideal thing would be to gather it before it gets to our beaches."

Rodriguez Martinez said that, given the limited number of Navy boats and funds, the best solution might be to hang floating offshore barriers and collect the sargassum in waters closer to the shore.

But she notes another problem: what to do with the thousands of tons of stinking algae collected each year, mainly by private hotel owners. Some have simply been tossing the mounds collected from the beach into disused limestone quarries, where the salt and minerals collected in the ocean can leech into groundwater.

Other simply toss into woodlands or mangrove swamps, which is equally as bad.


"The algae has a lot of salt ... so that is not good, even for palm trees, which are pretty salt resistant," she noted.

While some have tried

to use sargassum to create bricks or fertilizer, the lack of official policies and long term plans make it hard to obtain big investments for such plans.

Initial reports in the 2010s suggested the masses of seaweed came from an area of the Atlantic off the northern coast of Brazil, near the mouth of the Amazon River. Increased nutrient flows from deforestation or fertilizer runoff could be feeding the algae bloom. But other causes may contribute, like nutrient flows from the Congo River, increased upwelling of nutrient-laden deeper ocean water in the tropical Atlantic and dust blowing in from Africa.

## Truth Social app to be available via web browser 'end of May' – CEO

Former U.S. President Donald Trump's Truth Social app will launch on a web browser at the end of May, Chief Executive Devin Nunes said on Monday.

In a post on the platform, Nunes also said Truth Social has not yet been approved for launch in the Google Play store for Android devices.

"End of May we will launch PWA (Web Browser)

this will allow access from any device," Nunes wrote. "After that we will launch an Android App... pending approval from Google!"

Availability in the Google Play and Apple App stores is key to the app's ability to scale up.

Truth Social's parent company, Trump Media & Technology Group, launched with the mission of standing up to Big Tech, after Trump was kicked off Twitter, Facebook and You-Tube for allegedly inciting or glorifying violence during the Jan. 6 U.S. Capitol riots.

Yet the social media venture is limited by its reliance on Alphabet-owned Google and Apple, which operate app stores that dominate the smartphone market.

Truth Social launched in the Apple App store on Feb. 21 and was for a time the most downloaded free app there. It was number two on that list on Monday.

Trump began posting on the site late Thursday, for the first time since he posted one "truth" – as posts are called – on Feb. 14.

TMTG is planning to go public through a merger with blank-check firm Digital World Acquisition Corp. The deal is under scrutiny by the Securities and Exchange Commission and is likely months away from being finalised.

# **British Virgin Islands activists protest plan for direct UK rule**

Reuters – Activists in the British Virgin Islands on Monday protested against a proposal to put the overseas British territory under control of the United Kingdom, days after the BVI premier was jailed in Miami on charges of conspiring to traffic drugs.

A report released on Friday that was commissioned by Queen Elizabeth's representative to the territory said governance problems are so severe that the legislature should be suspended and the territory effectively governed from London. read more

That report came just a day after BVI premier Andrew Fahie and the territory's director of ports were jailed following a sting by the Drug Enforcement Administration in a major em-

barrassment to the United Kingdom.

Hundreds of people rallied on Monday outside the office of Governor John Rankin in the capital Road Town on the island of Tortola chanting slogans and holding signs that said "No UK rule."

"Our message to the United Kingdom government and to the world: there will be no direct rule in this land," said Luce Hodge-Smith, who has previously held positions in government and whose Facebook page says she is retired.

The rally coincided with a visit by Amanda Milling, a British member of parliament who is also Minister of State for Asia and the Middle East, to discuss the report released by the commission of inquiry.



Its report found that millions of dollars of state funds were spent each year by politicians and ministries without proper process, along with serious dishonesty in relation to sales of public property and widespread abuse of appointments.

Fahie's administration had ignored principles of good governance, witnesses had been afraid to come forward, and that "the people of the BVI have been badly served in recent years," con-

cluded the report, which is unrelated to Fahie's arrest.

The British Virgin Islands were conquered by Great Britain in the 1600s and were for centuries the site of sugar plantations worked by slaves who were forcibly brought from Africa.

The territory of about 30,000 people gained autonomy from the United Kingdom in 1967 through its first elections and the creation of its first autonomous government.

#### Cubans take to streets on Worker's Day for first time in three years

Reuters – Cubans poured onto the streets in celebration of International Worker's Day on Sunday, the first such parade since the onset of the coronavirus pandemic, touting fluttering flags, posters of former leader Fidel Castro and chanting "Cuba Lives and Works." Cuban President Miguel Diaz-Canel and former revolutionary leader Raul Castro, wearing a white mask and dressed in hallmark military fatigues, oversaw the rallies from a stage overlooking Havana's "Plaza de la Revolucion."

The marches, held each year across the Communist-run country prior to the pandemic, are rife with symbolism, a celebration of the 63-year-old Cuban rev-

olution, but also, a government-led rebuke of the Cold War-era embargo imposed on the island by the United States.

Juana Garcia, a worker with the Cuban Institute for Philosophy who waved a small Cuban flag on a wooden stick, said the march had far exceeded her expectations, a show of solidarity for the cause, she said.

"Despite so many difficulties, the majority of Cubans support the revolutionary process. We Cubans work to fix our own problems. We do not want interference of any kind," she said.

The rallies this year were also the first since anti-government protests on July 11 - the largest since Castro's 1959 revolution - rocked the nation, a major test of the island's first non-Castro led government since the start of the revolution.

There was no official estimate by mid-day of how many had marched during the early morning rallies.

Cuba, a Caribbean island of 11 million, is suffering through a grinding economic crisis that has led to food and medicine shortages and has prompted a mass exodus to its northern neighbour, the United States. Upwards of 80,000 have left the island in recent months for the United States, according to Customs and Border Protection data, making their way by plane to Nicaragua and then overland north to the U.S./Mexico border, or by boat or raft across the Florida Straits.

## Poland urges EU unity to slap sanctions on Russian energy

AP - Poland urged its European Union partners on Monday to unite and impose sweeping sanctions on Russia's oil and natural gas sectors over the war in Ukraine, and not to cave in to pressure to pay for their gas in Russian rubles.

EU ministers are meeting in Brussels to discuss their response to Russia's decision last week to cut gas supplies to Bulgaria and Poland. Energy giant Gazprom says the two countries failed to pay their bills in April.

"We will call for immediate sanctions on Russian oil and gas. This is the next, and urgent, and absolute step," Polish Climate and **Environment Minister Anna** Moskwa said. "We already have coal. Now it's time for oil, and (the) second step is for gas. The best option is take them all together."

In a move last week branded in Europe as "blackmail," Russian energy giant Gazprom cut supplies to Bulgaria and Poland. It came after Russian President Vladimir Putin said that "unfriendly" countries must start paying for gas in rubles, Russia's currency.

Bulgaria and Poland have refused to do so, like most EU countries. More Gazprom bills are due on May 20, and the bloc is wary that Russia might turn off more taps then. Russia

rejects the claims of blackmail.

The 27 nation EU imports around 40% of the gas it consumes from Russia. But some member countries, notably Hungary and Slovakia, are more heavily dependent on Russian supplies than others, and support for a gradual phasing in of an oil embargo is emerg-

Germany believes it could cope if supplies of Russian oil were cut off by Moscow. Economy Minister Robert Habeck said that Russian oil now accounts for 12% of total imports, down from 35% before the war, and most of it goes to the Schwedt refinery near Berlin.

"Germany is not against an oil ban from Russia. Of course it is a heavy load to bear, but we are ready to do that," Habeck told reporters. He said that a few more weeks or months to find oil transporting ships, and to better prepare harbours and pipelines would be useful.

"Time is helpful but I think other countries have bigger problems, and as I have asked for solidarity or understanding of the German situation, I am also of course willing to understand the maybe more difficult situation for other countries," he said.

The bulk of Monday's meeting is focused on shoring up gas supplies and not giving in to Putin's demand that companies pay for gas in rubles. Around 97% of European contracts have been concluded in euros or dollars.

EU's The executive branch, the European Commission, has warned that companies ceding to pressure to convert euros to rubles through two accounts at Gazprombank would be in contravention of the bloc's sanctions.

The EU has hit Russian officials, oligarchs, banks, companies and other organizations with rafts of sanctions since Russian troops invaded Ukraine in February. The commission is working on a sixth round of measures, possibly including oil restrictions, and could announce them this week.

The measures would have to be approved by the member countries, which could take several days.

#### Israel demands apology after Russia says Hitler had Jewish roots

Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov on Monday for claiming that Adolf Hitler had Jewish origins, saying it was an "unforgivable" falsehood that debased the horrors of the Nazi Holocaust.

In a signal of sharply deteriorating relations with Moscow, the Israeli foreign ministry summoned Russian ambassador and demanded an apology.

"Such lies are intended

Reuters - Israel lam- to accuse the Jews themselves of the most horrific crimes in history that were committed against them," Israeli Prime Minister Naftali Bennett said in a statement.

> "The use of the Holocaust of the Jewish people for political purposes must stop immediately," he add-

> Lavrov made the assertion on Italian television on Sunday when he was asked why Russia said it needed to "denazify" Ukraine if the country's own president, Volodymyr Zelenskiy, was himself Jewish.

> "When they say 'What sort of nazification is this if we are Jews', well I think that Hitler also had Jewish origins, so it means nothing," Lavrov told Rete 4 channel, speaking through an Italian interpreter.

> "For a long time now we've been hearing the wise Jewish people say that the biggest anti-Semites are the Jews themselves," he added.

> Dani Dayan, chairman of Yad Vashem, Israel's memorial to the six million Jews killed in the Holocaust, said the Russian minister's remarks were "an insult and a severe blow to the victims of the real Nazism".

Speaking on Kan radio, Dayan said Lavrov was spreading "an anti-Semitic conspiracy theory with no basis in fact".

#### U.N. chief calls for debt relief, post-**COVID** investment on West Africa trip

Reuters – U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres on Sunday urged debt relief for African countries and more investment to help their economies recover from the COVID-19 pandemic and weather the impacts of the Ukraine war.

The United Nations chief spoke in Senegal on the first leg of a trip that will also include Niger and Nigeria, where he will visit communities affected by conflict and climate change.

Supply disruptions due to Russia's invasion of Ukraine have caused simultaneous food, energy and finance crises in Africa and beyond, Guterres said.

The coronavirus pandemic pushed many poor countries into debt distress and the Ukraine war has disrupted their economic recovery, according to the International Monetary Fund (IMF). Public debt ratios in sub-Saharan Africa are at their highest in more than two decades, the IMF said last week.

"International financial institutions must urgently put in place debt relief measures by increasing liquidity and fiscal space, so that governments can avoid default and invest in social safety nets and sustainable development," Guterres said.

The United Nations has made proposals to the World Bank and the IMF regarding the mobilization of various

so far the measures taken have been insufficient, he added.

He called on wealthy countries and pharmaceutical companies to accelerate donations of COVID-19 vaccines and invest in local vaccine production, with almost 80% of the African population still not vaccinated against COVID-19.

"Beyond vaccination, we see big imbalances when it comes to investments in post-COVID recovery," he said, adding that economic growth per capita is projected to be 75%

The identity of one of Hitler's grandfathers is not known but there has been some speculation, never backed up by any evidence, that he might have been a Iew.

There was no immediate response for comment from the Russian embassy to Israel or from Lavrov in Moscow.

Kyiv condemned Lavrov's words, saying his "heinous remarks" were offensive to Zelenskiy, to Israel, Ukraine and Jews.

"More broadly, they demonstrate that today's Russia is full of hatred other nations," towards Ukrainian Foreign Minister Dmytro Kuleba said on

## FIFA punishes Senegal for fan disorder, lasers at Salah

AP – FIFA fined Senegal's soccer federation 175,000 Swiss francs (\$180,000) on Monday for fan disorder at a World Cup playoff game, including shining laser pointers at Egypt star Mohamed Salah in the penalty shootout.

Salah's face was a blur of vivid green light when he prepared to take his penalty, which he blasted over the bar. Senegal went on to win the shootout in Dakar in March with Salah's Liverpool teammate Sadio Mané scoring the decisive spot kick.

FIFA said its disciplinary committee also looked into a pitch invasion by Senegal fans, an offensive banner and the national federation's "failure to ensure that law and order are maintained in the stadium."

Senegal was also ordered to play a future competitive game in an empty stadium.

The FIFA disciplinary panel also judged dozens of similar cases from World Cup qualifying games played

since January and handed out several other fines and stadium closures.

Nigeria was punished with a 150,000 Swiss francs (\$154,000) fine and one-game stadium closure. Fans invaded the field in Abuja and there were other incidents of disorder after Nigeria was eliminated at home by Ghana in their playoff.

FIFA imposed fines of 125,000 Swiss francs (\$128,000) on Congo

and 100,000 Swiss francs (\$103,000) on Lebanon in similar cases at games against Morocco and Syria, respectively. Both got one-game stadium closures.

Discrimination by fans of Chile and Colombia at their home games, plus other offenses, resulted in total fines of 95,000 Swiss francs (\$98,000) and 55,000 Swiss francs (\$56,500), respectively.

## Andy Murray 'not supportive' of Wimbledon ban of Russian players but has no 'right answer'

BBC – Andy Murray is "not supportive" of players from Russia and Belarus being banned from Wimbledon but says there is no "right answer" on the issue.

Players from the two countries cannot play at this year's Grand Slam because of Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

The All England Lawn Tennis Club (AELTC) has also banned Russian and Belarusian players from all other UK grass-court tournaments.

Meanwhile, Rafael Nadal called the ban "very un-

fair".

Belarusian players were included in the ban because the country has supported Russia's military action in

Ukraine.

In March, the UK government is understood to have asked national governing bodies to request written confirmation from Russian and Belarusian players of their neutrality if they wanted to compete in events in England.

The AELTC, which organises Wimbledon, consulted the government in April about whether to allow players to compete.

When the ban was announced on 20 April, it was supported by UK Sports Minister Nigel Huddleston and Culture Secretary Nadine Dorries, and criticised by Kremlin spokesperson Dmitry Peskov.

#### **UEFA** announces further sanctions on Russian clubs and national teams amid Ukraine invasion

BBC – Russia have been barred from competing in summer's this women's Euro 2022, while Russian clubs will also be banned from UEFA competitions next season, says Europe's football governing body.

UEFA has announced that Russia's bid to host the men's Euro 2028 or Euro 2032 tournaments is now ineligible too.

The sanctions come amid Russia's continued invasion of Ukraine.

In February, Russian clubs and national teams were suspended by FIFA and UEFA "until further notice".

On Monday, UEFA announced that Portugal - who lost to Russia in the playoffs - will replace them at Euro 2022, which takes place in July.

Russia's women's national team will also no longer compete in European qualification for the 2023 World Cup, while the men's side is barred from the 2022-23 Nations League.



There have been shows of support for Ukraine at football matches since Russia launched its invasion of the country in February

be ranked fourth in group two of League B, meaning they will be relegated at the end of the group phase.

The ban imposed on clubs means there will be no Russian teams in the men's and women's Champions League, Europa League, or Europa Conference League during the 2022-23 campaign.

In March, UEFA confirmed Russia had declared an interest in hosting Euro 2028 - as well as the UK and They will automatically Ireland, and Turkey - and the 2032 edition.

UK Prime Minister Boris Johnson said Russia's interest was "beyond satire" and "beyond comprehension".

UEFA said the bid was ineligible in accordance with article 16.02 of the Bid Regulations, which states that "each bidder shall ensure that it does not act in a manner that could bring UEFA, any other bidder, the bidding procedure or European football into disrepute".

UEFA's latest sanctions

also ban Russia from the 2021-23 European Under-21 Championship, as well as youth and futsal competitions.

An updated qualifying process for the Champions League has been published, which shows benefits for Scottish teams.

The Premiership champions will go directly into the competition's group stages, while the second-placed side will now go into the third round of qualifying rather than the second.

#### **Mother of West Indies cricketer Permaul murdered**

CMC - Police in Guyana have detained for questioning the husband of 52-year-old Waynumattie 'Datalin' Permaul, whose body was found in a shallow grave at Kilcoy Chesney, seven days after she was reported missing.

West Indies and Guyana cricketer, Veersammy Permaul, had reported his mother missing to the authorities on Thursday, telling them he had not seen

or heard from her for a week.

Police said they searched the yard of the couple's home and uncovered the shallow grave with the woman's body inside.

She and her husband lived alone at the house in Corentyne Berbice, a region along the Berbice River.

"When questioned he (the husband) reportedly 'confessed' to the po-

lice, divulging details of how he committed the heinous act on April 22 at about 02:00 hours," the police said in a statement. The police said that the husband, Avemanen "Terry" Permaul, is expected to be charged with murder as soon as their investigations continue.

Permaul, a left-arm spinner, made his test debut for West Indies in Bangladesh in 2012.

# Kieron Pollard in the running for T20 Blast stint following international retirement

CricInfo – Kieron Pollard is weighing up offers to play in the T20 Blast following his retirement from international cricket.

Pollard, who turns 35 next month, stepped back from his position as West Indies' limited-overs captain last week after two-and-a-half years in the role but will continue to play domestic T20 cricket around the world.

He was the first pick in the men's Hundred draft earlier this month and will now be available to play for London Spirit for the majority of the tournament and will consider returning to county cricket for the first time since 2011, a move which would see him spend around three months in England this summer.

ESPNcricinfo understands that at least two counties have enquired about Pollard's availability for the Blast, which runs from May 25 - four days after his IPL

franchise, Mumbai Indians, play their final game in this year's IPL - until July 16.

Surrey appear to be the frontrunners at this stage, in a move which would re-

unite Pollard with his close friend and long-term teammate Sunil Narine, who has already signed for the duration of Blast as an overseas player.

Surrey had planned to use Sean Abbott as their second overseas player after his stint was cut short due to injury last year, but his involvement in Australia and Australia A's squads for their tour of Sri Lanka means he will be unavailable for the majority of the group stages and the club are expected to look for a replacement.

Pollard previously spent two seasons with Somerset in 2010 and 2011 where he was hugely successful, averaging 34.58 with the bat at a strike rate of 169.94 and taking 41 wickets in 28 appearances.
