

Cyclist critical following accident

The family of national cyclist, Andre Simon, is pleading for blood donations and prayers on his behalf following an accident on Sunday morning.

Simon, and two other cyclists who were with him, were struck by a Toyota Vitz on Sunday morning on the



Sir George Walter Highway.

The circumstances surrounding the accident are still unclear and, up to press time, the police had not yet issued a statement.

Simon, a former OECS cycling champion, was seriously injured and is warded in the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) of the Sir Lester Bird Medical Centre.

On the afternoon of the accident, Simon's sister informed the public in a social media post that her brother had been placed in a medically induced coma, adding, "blood is needed urgently, please donate".

The appeal being made is for B+ blood.

The full extent of his in-





juries, which included head trauma, was not revealed, but he is confirmed to be in critical condition.

A video which started making rounds on social media after the accident, showed police taking a male, believed to be the driver of the Vitz, back to the scene of the accident.

Later in the video, police were seen cuffing the man and placing him into the vehicle while an angry cyclist, who is believed to have been with the group, shouted at the driver.

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OCS principal wants tougher penalties for violent teens

The Principal of Ottos Comprehensive School is calling for authorities to review the country's laws and introduce harsher penalties for teens who engage in violent behaviour.

Foster Roberts' remarks were prompted by an incident at OCS on Thursday, in which a 16-year-old student of the public institution was stabbed with a pair of scissors by an 18-year-old who also attends the same school.

Over the years, several fights have taken place at Ottos Comprehensive School in which students have violently attacked each other using weapons. Principal Roberts said the problem of violence that is permeating society is increasing in schools, and the situation must be addressed sooner rather than later to prevent far more serious outcomes.

"The situation really needs to be addressed, needs to be arrested, because I fear that one day, we'll be taking a body away from one of our plants if we do not do something immediately," the OCS principal stated.

"One of the first things that we probably need to do is to probably look at the laws and probably give a little bit more flexibility, a little more authority to the police officers, so that per-

sons can be charged and convicted when they commit these kinds of crimes against another person."

Previously, Mr. Roberts has addressed the need for adequate security at schools that will stop students entering with weapons, a position he maintains.

"I don't think that people are taking school security seriously. School security is a serious matter and having one security on a plant like Ottos Comprehensive School on any given day is certainly not adequate, and that is something that really needs to be addressed," he added.

Principal Roberts has singled out his teachers and Head Boy, Adrian Hazel, for their management of the incident that resulted in no disruption to the school day.

The 16-year-old student, who sustained nonlife threatening injuries, was treated at Sir Lester Bird Medical Centre and discharged. The 18-year-old was taken into police custody.

The future of the students' education in the public school system now rests with Director of Education, Clare Browne, who will review an incident report submitted by the OCS principal before convening a hearing.

The most severe outcome for both boys could be expulsion, or they could be allowed to return to school on probation.

PM Browne hopeful talks with US VP will bear fruit

Prime Minister Gaston Browne says he hopes recent talks between United States Vice President Kamala Harris and CARICOM leaders will not turn out to be another "diplomatic exercise."

"I would say a good first meeting. I hope it is just not one of those diplomatic exercises...some of them just want to say that they engaged the Caribbean (and) year after year you see nothing substantive coming from them.

"I hope Kamala will deliver, and I hope too that there will be a subsequent summit with President Biden," Browne said.

Noting that the US has an obligation to improve its relations with its Caribbean neighbours, the prime minister continued, "They need to understand that...you could end up with some Caribbean people going to their shores as refugees. So, if you don't help us to keep them here, then they will come to your shores. I am sure they don't

want that

This month, the Joe Biden administration renewed its commitment to the Caribbean, saying that partnership is "key" to "shared prosperity and security."

In the virtual meeting, the Vice President Harris, who is the daughter of a Jamaica-born economist, said, "As a neighbour in the Western Hemisphere, the United States shares a common bond with the nations of the Caribbean.

"As neighbours, we know our partnership is key to our shared prosperity and security. We also know that we have common challenges.

"And that is why I've convened this meeting to strengthen our partnership and chart a path forward together.

"As we all know, our nations have extensive people-to-people ties. Millions of Americans have Caribbean heritage. Millions of Americans travel to the Caribbean each year for va-



Prime Minister Gaston Browne cation, to visit friends and family, and to engage with the richness of that history."


The meeting focused on three areas, economic recovery, security, and climate and energy, and the White House later said in a statement that the meeting "underscored the importance the Biden-Harris administration places on our partnerships throughout the Caribbean".

Prime Minister Browne said regional leaders, who included President of the Dominican Republic, Luis Abinader and CARICOM Secretary General Dr. Carla Barnett, appealed to Washington to assist the region by increasing the supply of fossil fuel, given increasing oil prices on the global market, resulting from the Russian invasion of Ukraine.

"We have asked for the United States to consider increasing its supply of fossil fuel so that we can increase the supply of fuel and to reduce the price.

"That is a critical requirement at this point in order to curb inflation; otherwise we are going to continue to see an escalation in inflation, which will create significant problems, especially for the poorer countries.

"So, we have asked them to give serious consideration to that, and at the same time use their influence to encourage other countries - Saudi Arabia and so on - to increase their supplies, even Venezuela."

Water conservation the only way to overcome drought, Ambassador Hurst

As the Antigua and Barbuda government works along with Antigua Public Utilities Authority (APUA) to resolve the ongoing water crisis, in large part due to extended drought conditions, Ambassador Lionel "Max" Hurst has added his own appeal for greater water conservation efforts by the public.

According to the Chief of Staff in the Office of the Prime Minister, although efforts are being made to ensure that existing and new reverse osmosis plants are online and functioning by the end of this year, and with plans to increase water output to 24 hours a day by 2023, APUA will continue to struggle to meet the country's estimated 8 million gallon a day water demand if conservation does not become a way of life.

"Most Antiguans recog-

nise that there is a drought, but there is the expectation that despite drought conditions, they must be able to turn the tap on and get water flowing through that tap. And the question is can we meet that expectation?

"And the answer is that's precisely the expectation we are trying to fulfil," Ambassador Hurst said in an appearance on Pointe FM on Saturday.

"It is a reasonable expectation, but we also add that we must engage in conservation. In other words, one cannot then take the water that is flowing through the tap, created by reverse osmosis to hose down the car."

Hurst continued that the

conservation efforts can be relatively simple and suggested practical methods, including repurposing water from laundry and dishwashing for gardening.

"These kinds of practices are going to help. It's okay to want to have water in the tap 24 hours, but it's not okay to utilise the water as though it is a cheap substance. It is very expensive to make by reverse osmosis, and we must apply our minds to reducing waste to the extent that it is possible," he said.

Earlier this year in an appearance on Pointe FM, Prime Minister Gaston Browne indicated that his government expects that water supply will improve by September, following the installation of reverse osmosis plants.

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now under construction and its equipment is expected to arrive by the end of this month.

When completed, it will supply 500,000 gallons of water daily. This output will

increase to more than one million gallons in the following months.

Last Friday, the Barbados-based Caribbean Institute for Meteorology and Hydrology (CIMH) warned of long term drought conditions in the region that can "negatively" impact the Eastern Caribbean.

"Many parts of the region experienced above-normal rainfall in March, bringing some relief from dry conditions since late 2021. Despite this, there are concerns over long term drought that can negatively impact large rivers and reservoirs, and groundwater, by the end of May," CIMH said in its most recent Caribbean Drought Bulletin.

Why Elon Musk's Twitter might be (more) lethal

We seek the best ways to blunt the power of dangerous speech, online and offline. Musk taking over Twitter doesn't look like one of them, to say the least.

Just before he clinched a deal to buy Twitter for about \$44bn last week, Elon Musk suggested that he might jettison the platform's limits on speech including "hateful content" and abuse. "Is someone you don't like allowed to say something you don't like?" he asked sardonically. "It's damn annoying, but that is the sign of a healthy, functioning free speech situation."

Musk didn't specify which kinds of speech he meant, but he gave us an idea two weeks later by retweeting far-right critiques of two of Twitter's executives. One contained images of Vijaya Gadde, the company's general counsel and chief of content moderation, with text implying that she was biased against conservatives.

Some of Musk's more than 84 million Twitter followers piled on, with vitriol and threats aimed at Gadde. Many of the hostile posts referred to her Indian background. Musk also replied approvingly to a tweet in which the far-right conspiracy theorist Mike Cernovich accused Twitter's deputy



general counsel of facilitating fraud.

Though Musk's followers seemed to love those posts, others found them much worse than "damn annoying". Dick Costolo, who was the company's CEO from 2010 to 2015, tweeted after Musk derided Gadde, "What's going on? You're making an executive at the company you just bought the target of harassment and threats."

Yet Costolo is no stranger to the say-what-you-like credo. About a decade ago, Costolo began referring to the platform as the "free speech wing of the free speech party," meaning that Twitter wanted to let people post as they wished, and the company avoided removing

tweets or accounts.

In subsequent years, Twitter backed away from that hands-off position, as users protested at how much people were being attacked on the platform. Among innumerable examples, Robin Williams's 25-year-old daughter Zelda received graphic, horrifying tweets blaming her for his suicide in 2014.

During that period, Twitter staff began rewriting the platform's rules to prohibit "targeted harassment" and "glorification of violence". It was under the latter that former President Donald Trump was finally removed from the platform, after the January 6, 2021 riot at the US Capitol.

Still, Twitter continues to be used to attack individuals

across the globe. And there's another ocean of harmful content: frightening, usually false information about groups of people.

I study this sort of content, which I have dubbed "dangerous speech," for its capacity to inspire violence between groups of people. Dangerous speech forms a category because it is strikingly similar from one case to another, across languages, cultures, and even time periods.

At the Dangerous Speech Project, an independent research team I founded, we have identified innumerable examples, many of which have been followed by killings and even genocide.

Our team has found that when incendiary content goes viral, it can easily reach susceptible audiences open to committing violence offline. On Twitter, a frightening message can be boiled down into a memorable hashtag. Following such hashtags and related tweets, people around the world have been tortured and killed.

In the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic, for example, rumours spread on Twitter and other media in India that Muslims in the country were planning to infect Hindus with the virus.

In just over a week, nearly 300,000 tweets carrying the hashtag "CoronaJihad" were viewed 165 million times, according to Equality Labs, a digital human rights group. This led to multiple attacks.

On April 5, 2020, a Hindu mob dragged villager Mehboob Ali to a field in northern India and beat him severely with shoes and sticks. They accused him of trying to spread coronavirus because he had recently attended a Muslim religious gathering.

His attackers demanded to know who else formed part of the conspiracy. When he finally made it to a hospital to seek treatment for his wounds, Ali was isolated as a "corona suspect".

A few days later, two babies died when Indian hospitals refused to admit their labouring mothers because they were Muslim and therefore accused of spreading the virus. Such accusations persisted in India and led to the torching of 45 Muslim households near Kolkata in May.

Tweets that inspire aggression also often come from powerful government officials, which adds to their influence. During the early stage of the pandemic, a member of the Kenyan parliament

tweeted that people should stone a group of Chinese people who had allegedly violated quarantine. In Brazil, President Jair Bolsonaro and his son have repeatedly posted suggestions that LGBTQ people are paedophiles.

None of these posts were taken down under Twitter's existing rules. Under Musk, the rules are likely to loosen. Pressed on his plans, Musk has elaborated (on Twitter, of course) that "by free speech, I simply mean that which matches the law".

It should be noted that the law on freedom of speech varies greatly from country to country, and many governments enforce it selectively to their own benefit.

In practice, the relevant law for Twitter will be the platform's own rules, or rather, the Musk rules, if his deal goes through. Then we must hope that Musk learns – and chooses to care – about speech that is worse than damn annoying.

Recombinant COVID variants: What is Omicron XE?



Since abandoning all COVID safety measures and relying on the government's "Living with COVID-19" strategy, the United Kingdom has seen a surge in the number of people becoming infected with the virus. Although numbers are coming down now, they remain at relatively high levels.

This new wave is thought to be driven by the BA.2 sub-variant of Omicron as well as waning protection from vaccines. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), the BA.2 sub-variant of the original Omicron variant of coronavirus (now known as BA.1) has specific mutations that give it a growth advantage over BA.1.

When we have large volumes of two viruses that are genetically linked circulating in the population, there is a risk of a recombinant virus forming. This is thought to have been the case in the UK with the discovery of Omicron XE; a recombinant virus made up of the BA.1 and BA.2 sub-variants of Omicron.

Recombinant viruses occur in instances like this when an individual is infected by two different viruses that share similar genetic material, as is the case with BA.1 and BA.2. As both sub-variants divide rapidly inside their human



host cells, they can swap some of their genetic makeup and form a new "hybrid" sub-variant made up of both parent viruses.

Recombination is common among coronaviruses and is expected.

Omicron XE was first detected on January 19, 2022, and more than 600 cases have since been detected in England. And although it is too soon to say conclusively, according to the WHO, early tests suggest it has a growth advantage of approximately 10 percent when compared with BA.2. It continues to be monitored and there is currently no reason to believe it confers any more

serious illness than previous Omicron sub-variants or has any specific properties that mean it might evade the protection given by vaccines or previous infection.

For now, the WHO says it will classify Omicron XE under the Omicron family rather than as a new variant in its own right; this may change if evidence suggests that it harbours enough changes that affect disease severity, transmission or resistance to treatment.

Since its discovery, small numbers of XE have also been identified in China, India and Thailand.

As the sub-variant is very new, little is known about the characteristics of the strain, but it is currently not believed to cause any new symptoms.

Omicron XE is not the only recombinant variant to have occurred. The WHO continues to monitor the XD and XF sub-variants which are both thought to be combinations of the Delta and Omicron variants of coronavirus.

Only 38 cases of XF have been identified in the UK since mid-February and no cases of XD. Just 49 cases of XD have been reported to global databases, the UK Health Security Agency said. The majority of these were found in France. Neither is thought to be any

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more transmissible than the original Omicron variant, and as a result, they have failed to make an impact on case numbers.

For now, the advice remains the same: ventilate indoor spaces, wear a mask when on public transport and in indoor public spaces, and get vaccinated.

Memory B cells persist after third COVID vaccine dose

More than two years since the pandemic began, COVID-19 still rages on with the arrival of the Omicron variant and its even more infectious sub-variant, BA.2.

Many countries are seeing a surge in the number of people testing positive, and some of them are ending up in hospital as a result. The widely used mRNA COVID vaccines, and in particular the boosters, have been shown in numerous studies to be effective in preventing serious illness from COVID infection.

Data from the United States in February 2022 showed that unvaccinated adults aged 18 to 49 were four times more likely to be hospitalised than their fully vaccinated (including having the booster) peers. Among those over 65, the unvaccinated were six times more likely to be hospitalised.

There has always been some debate about how long protection from an initial vaccine dose might last, and what effect the boosters have. Several studies have shown that the protection from infections, including symptomatic infections, offered by vaccines wanes from 90-95 percent two months after being vaccinated, to about 60 percent for Pfizer or 70 percent for Moderna, five to six months after vaccination. There is further substantial waning after six months.

It is not just protection from vaccines that lessens; we have seen people who caught COVID in the past getting infected again. If immunity wanes quickly, millions of people may be at risk for reinfection after recovery from the virus.

The immune system is complicated, and a waning immune response is generally associated with a part of it known as neutralising antibodies. Their production is triggered by either the vaccine or natural infection.

They then circulate in the blood, keeping an eye out for the SARS-CoV-2 virus. If they encounter it, their job is to neutralise and destroy it before it gets a chance to enter and infect cells. To do this, they must be able to recognise the virus.

But mutations such as the ones seen in the Omicron variant mean they may not recognise their target so well, which may explain why we are seeing so many infections after people have been infected in the past or have had the vaccines – also known as breakthrough infections.

While the number of neutralising antibodies declines over time, there is another group of immune cells that studies have shown last longer, especially after booster shots – memory B cells.


These cells remember the virus and recognise it should it try to infect the body again; they then signal the production of antibodies to kill both the virus and any cells it has already managed to infect.

It has always been unclear how long these might last and what effect boosters would have on them.

Now, a new study has shown that the third dose of the mRNA vaccines from Pfizer or Moderna increases the power of these memory B cells that were induced by the second dose of the vaccine by not just strengthening their ability to produce antibodies, but also enabling them to produce antibodies that could help better neutralise mutated versions of the virus such as the Omicron variant.

The study states the third dose of the vaccine expands and diversifies the types of memory B cells already present from previous doses, which can respond rapidly and produce antibodies capable of clearing even diversified variants.

A separate study shows the third dose of the vaccine helps stabilise the decline of antibodies and found they gave rise to longer-lasting memory B cells.

Brazil's Amazon deforestation hits April record, nearly double previous peak

Deforestation in Brazil's Amazon surged to record levels for the month of April, nearly doubling the area of forest removed in that month last year -- the previous April record -- preliminary government data showed on Friday, alarming environmental campaigners.

In the first 29 days of April, deforestation in the region totalled 1,012.5 sq km (390 sq miles), according to data from national space research agency Inpe. The agency, which has compiled the monthly DETER-B data series since 2015/2016, will report data for the final day of April next week.

April is the third monthly record this year, after new highs were also observed in January and February.

Destruction of the Brazilian Amazon in the first four months of the year also hit a record for the period of 1,954 sq km (754 sq miles), an increase of 69% compared to the same period of 2021 – clearing an area more than double the size of New York City.

Deforestation in the Amazon has soared since right-wing President Jair Bolsonaro took office in 2019 and weakened environmental protection. Bolsonaro argues that more farming and mining in the

Amazon will reduce poverty in the region.

"The cause of this record has a first and last name: Jair Messias Bolsonaro," said Marcio Astrini, head of Brazilian advocacy group Climate Observatory, in a statement.

Bolsonaro's office directed questions to the ministries of environment and justice.

The ministries said in a joint statement the government was making major efforts to fight environmental crimes and that police and environmental authorities were cooperating on an operation to combat deforestation in five Amazon states.

Even with deforestation already on the rise, Climate Observatory said its analysts were astounded by such a high reading in April, which is part of the rainy season when the muddy forest is harder for loggers to access.

Preservation of the Amazon is vital to stopping catastrophic climate

change because of the vast amount of climate-warming carbon dioxide it absorbs.

Ane Alencar, science director of the Amazon Environmental Research Institute (IPAM), said she had expected deforestation to keep rising ahead of the October presidential election, like it has in Brazil's past three election years, as officials wary of angering voters generally do less to enforce the law. Still, she called the surge in deforestation last month "absurd."

"It seems that the clearing of forests has become institutionalized in the country as something common, with record after record," Alencar said.

Grim search in blown-out Havana hotel, death toll at 26

Cuban rescue workers on Saturday picked through rubble for bodies and possible survivors after a Havana boutique hotel was devastated by what authorities said was a gas explosion, leaving at least 26 dead.

The blast at the Hotel Saratoga, just a block from the iconic capitol building in a renovated area of downtown Havana, seriously damaged two adjoining upscale apartment buildings and inflicted lighter damage to 17 structures within a two-block radius. Debris fell on pedestrians in the heavily travelled area and glass and debris went flying at a near-by grammar school.

Local authorities said 50 adults and 14 children were

injured. Four of the dead were children, they said, providing few details. One of the dead was a Spanish tourist.

Authorities and local media said rescuers were working to get to a passage way to the basement in hopes there were survivors. They said it was slow going as engineers had to check the stability of what remained of the building.

The hotel, housed in a more than century-old build-

ing, had been closed and only workers were inside at the time of the explosion, state-run TV said.

Residents of the adjoining apartment building often rented out to tourists.

The neoclassical-style hotel was remodelled by a British company after the fall of the Soviet Union and for many years was considered the place to stay by visiting government officials and celebrities.

Recently, it had lost some of its shine with the opening of new hotels in Havana, but was still a five-star venue just a minute away from various historic sites such as the renovated, century-old Marti Theater, which sustained moderate damage.

Three US tourists die at Bahamas hotel after falling ill

AP – Three U.S. tourists have died at a resort in the Bahamas after falling ill, officials of the Atlantic island nation confirmed, and another was airlifted to a hospital for treatment.

Acting Prime Minister Chester Cooper issued a statement Friday saying that police are investigating and the cause of death was unknown, though foul play "is not suspected."

Their identities were not initially made public.

The health minister, Dr Michael Darville, told Eyewitness News Bahamas on Saturday that some hotel guests went to a clinic Thursday with nausea and vomiting, were treated and

left. Three were later found dead. A fourth was flown to a hospital in New Providence.

He said the environmental health scientists, physicians and others were

BVI swears in new premier

CMC - Dr. Natalio "Sowande" Wheatley was sworn in as the new Premier of the British Virgin Islands (BVI), a few hours after the House of Assembly unanimously passed a no-confidence resolution evoking the appointment of Andrew Fahie as premier of the British Overseas Territory.

Fahie, 51, was arrested last Thursday during a sting operation at the Miami Opa Locka Executive Airport, along with the managing director of the BVI Ports Authority, Oleanvine Maynard, and her son Kadeem.

On Wednesday, a United States judge ruled that Fahie can be released on a US\$500,000 bond pending his trial on cocaine trafficking conspiracy and money laundering conspiracy charges, despite a prosecutor's arguments that he should face pre-trial detention.

Fahie would have to remain in monitored confinement in his daughters' apartment, Judge Alicia Otazo Reyes of the US District Court for the Southern District of Florida ruled.

Wheatley had proposed

the resolution on behalf of the new National Unity government that states members lack confidence in Fahie.

The resolution noted that Fahie, who was appointed premier following the 2019 general election, had been arrested and charged with money laundering and conspiracy to import a controlled substance into the United States.

It said also that the arrest and the charges against Fahie had brought "the integrity and sanctity of the role of the premier to public and international disrepute and demonstrate a lack of character and suitability to operate in a public leadership role and manage the affairs of this government".

The resolution noted that the "charges and the ongoing investigations and trial will undermine the international confidence and reputation of these Virgin Islands" and that Fahie has "not stepped down as premier and remains in custody outside the Virgin Islands and unavailable to perform his functions and lead the government".

The resolution indicat-

ed that the Virgin Islands Constitution Order 2007 provides that "If a motion on the Order Paper that the House of Assembly should declare a lack of confidence in the Government of the Virgin Islands receives in the House the affirmative votes of a majority of all the elected members of the House, the Governor shall, by instrument under the public seal, revoke the appointment of the Premier"

"Now, therefore, be it resolved by the House of Assembly of the Virgin Islands that it does declare a lack of confidence in the government led by honourable Andrew A. Fahie".

Wheatley said he had noted the concern voiced by members of the financial services and tourism sectors about the future of the territory.

"They would have been very concerned with what they were reading in the international news," he said, adding, "It is vital ... that we take a stand and do what is right for the people of the Virgin Islands," he said, adding that Fahie "has lost the moral authority to lead the Virgin Islands.

"It does not mean that I condemn him, but it means that he in his private moments will have to pray to the lord and ask for repentance. He will have to accept the consequences of his actions," Wheatley said.

Wheatley was recommended to replace Fahie by other elected officials and Governor John Rankin, confirmed him as the new premier. He was later sworn into office.

60 believed killed after school attack by Russia in east Ukraine

AlJazeera – At least 60 people are missing and feared dead in the debris of a burned-out school after a Russian air raid in eastern Ukraine.

The governor of the Luhansk region, Serhiy Haidai, said on Sunday that two people were confirmed dead after Russian forces dropped a bomb on the school, and 30 civilians had been pulled from the debris.

About 90 people had been sheltering in the school in the village of Bilohorivka, said Haidai, and a fire following Saturday's attack engulfed the building.

"The fire was extinguished after nearly four hours, then the rubble was

cleared and, unfortunately, the bodies of two people were found," Haidai wrote on the Telegram messaging app.

"Thirty people were evacuated from the rubble, seven of whom were injured. Sixty people were likely to have died under the rubble of buildings."

Video released by the Luhansk military administration showed emergency services personnel amid the burning ruins of the building.

An unidentified person can be heard saying, "It is unlikely others have survived. The crater is down to the basement. It's horrible."

Philippines on high alert as all systems go for election

Reuters – The Philippine police and military said on Sunday they were on high alert as last-minute preparations continued for the country's general election, even as the overall situation remained "relatively peaceful".

Filipinos vote on Monday to choose President Rodrigo Duterte's successor, a vice president, 12 senators, hundreds of congressmen and thousands of governors, mayors and provincial and city councillors.

The presidential race is a rematch between Ferdinand "Bongbong" Marcos Jr., the son and namesake of the country's late dictator, and Leni Robredo, the human rights lawyer who narrowly beat him in the 2016 vice presidential contest.

Three months of divi-

sive campaigning ended on Saturday, with Marcos and Robredo making final bids to sway undecided voters with patriotic, upbeat messages.

Duterte did not endorse a presidential candidate, but his party backs frontrunners Marcos and his running mate, Duterte's daughter Sara Duterte-Carpio.

"We are ready for any contingencies," Armed Forces chief Lieutenant General Andres Centino told a media briefing with police officer-in-charge Lieutenant General Vicente Danao and senior election commission officials.

"We are committed... to ensure that we have a secure, accurate, free and fair elections tomorrow."

Political violence, cheating allegations and

vote-buying marred previous elections in the Philippines. But the police said they have recorded far fewer poll-related offences than in the 2016 general election and 2019 mid-term polls.

"Hopefully we can maintain this tranquillity up to the last day of our electoral process," Danao said.

Philippine National Police spokesperson Jean Fajardo told another briefing the pre-election situation was "relatively peaceful", with 16 election-related offences, including shootings in Nueva Ecija and Ilocos

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G7 leaders pledge further economic isolation of Russia

Reuters - The Group of Seven leaders said in a joint statement on Sunday that they will reinforce Russia's economic isolation and "elevate" a campaign against Russian elites who support President Vladimir Putin.

After meeting virtually with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskiy, the leaders said they would cut off key services on which Russia depends, reinforcing the isolation of Russia "across all sectors of its economy."

They also committed to phasing out dependency on Russian energy, including by banning imports of Russian

"(W)e will continue and elevate our campaign against the financial elites and family members, who support President Putin in his war effort and squander the resources of the Russian people," the statement added.

The United States on Sunday unveiled sanctions against three Russian television stations, banned Americans from providing accounting and consulting services to Russians, and sanctioned executives from Gazprombank to punish Moscow for its invasion of Ukraine. read more

Putin calls the invasion a "special military operation" to disarm Ukraine and rid it of anti-Russian nationalism

U.S. Senate to vote Wednesday on abortion rights bill

Reuters – The U.S. Senate will vote on legislation to codify abortion rights into law on Wednesday in reaction to the leaked draft decision indicating the Supreme Court is poised to overturn its landmark 1973 Roe v. Wade ruling, Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer said on Sunday.

"Every American will see how every senator stands," Schumer said during a news conference

with state leaders in New York. Republicans "can't duck it anymore. Republicans have tried to duck it."

The Democrat said he will file cloture on Monday and the 100-seat chamber will vote on the bill on Wednesday.

Schumer called the draft decision an "abomination." noting that a majority of Americans want to preserve the right to have an abortion and women's heath care.

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Djokovic playing his 'best' tennis ahead of French Open

AP – Novak Djokovic is optimistic about his game going into the French Open despite going another week without a title.

The top-ranked Djokovic is yet to win a trophy this season while trying to regain his best form after not being allowed to play in the Australian Open because he was not vaccinated for COVID-19.

Djokovic lost to young sensation Carlos Alcaraz in three sets in the semifinals of the Madrid Open on Saturday, when he was trying to make it to his second consecutive final after losing to Andrey Rublev in Serbia last month.

Despite the loss, Djokovic said he leaves Madrid feeling good about his preparations for the upcoming French Open, where he will defend his title.

"I definitely played very good tennis, I mean, the best that I have played this year," Djokovic said. "Probably when the disappointment of losing this match passes, I will have a lot of positives to take away from this week."

Djokovic said he felt he could have come away with the victory against the 19-year-old Alcaraz — one the hottest players on tour this season — if he had been "able to capitalize when it mattered" during the match of more than 3 1/2 hours at the "Caja Mágica" centre court.

The Madrid Open was only his fourth tournament of the year, and third on clay. He lost to 29th-ranked Alejandro Davidovich Fokina in his first match in Monte Carlo in his only other

Masters 1000 appearance so far.

Djokovic did not play in Indian Wells and Miami. He will carry an 8-4 record on the season into Rome this week, with one of those victories coming after Andy Murray withdrew from their third-round match in Madrid because of a stomach illness.

Djokovic had opened his campaign in the Spanish capital with a two-set win over Gael Monfils. He comfortably defeated Hubert Hurkacz in two sets in the quarterfinals.

The 34-year-old Djokovic said after the match against Monfils it was "his best performance of the year" considering he hadn't played well and lacked rhythm in the few tournaments he had played.

Djokovic had reached the quarterfinals in the only other tournament he played this year, losing to 72nd-ranked Jiri Vesely in Dubai in February.

The goal now is preparing to do well in Roland Garros, where he will try to win his third French Open.

Shelly-Ann Fraser-Pryce runs fastest 100m of 2022 in Nairobi

BBC – Jamaica's Shelly-Ann Fraser-Pryce has run the fastest women's 100m so far this year with victory in 10.67 seconds in Nairobi.

Only four other women have ever run faster at the distance.

It goes over into schoolwork in education as well. It is that mentality that makes you feel that you can always do better than your competitor and that only helps them to grow," Lawrence said.

"Some people did not

expect their reaction to losing, but I expected it because nobody wants to lose. If you lose a final like this and showed no emotion, then you would have to question whether they really wanted to play to win or they just came to play because they were told to do so.

"So, I fully understand because I also feel a type of way, especially seeing my students so emotional because I have created a bond with them and it's like family."

Earlier in the afternoon, Villa Primary claimed third place in the Primary School Cup competition by coasting to a 3-0 victory over Jennings in a playoff match between the semi-finals losers at the same venue.
