Police probe suspected electrocution of Empire FC goalkeeper

Police are investigating the death of Judah Bowers, who is believed to have been electrocuted at his home in Green Bay on Tuesday evening. The tragedy has plunged his family, friends and the football fraternity into mourning as they struggle to come to grips with his passing.

According to a STRATCOM report, 22-year-old Bowers was in his backyard hanging out laundry sometime around 9:15 pm, when the clothesline made contact with live electrical wire that was connected to a fence.

An unresponsive Bowers

was discovered on the ground by a relative who contacted the Emergency Medical Services for assistance.

The young man was transported by ambulance to the Sir Lester Bird Medical Centre where he was pronounced dead by a medical doctor at 9:34 pm.

Police say a post mortem examination will determine his exact cause of death.

The Empire Football Club goalkeeper has been described as a humble and hardworking young man by those who knew him, as they come to terms with the shock of his sudden and untimely death.

Electrical violations at neighbouring property led to Bowers' electrocution

Antigua Public Utilities Authority has completed its own investigation into the cause of the electrocution of Judah Bowers on Tuesday and its result is disturbing.

According to APUA, its examination of the situation revealed utility violations at the property next door to the 22-year-old's home where he lost his life.

In a statement, APUA explained their Electricity Business Unit discovered that the property where the incident occurred shares a fence with an apartment building.

The apartment building's electricity was being supplied by a temporary service that breached the National Electrical Code and APUA's standard.

According to APUA, an extension cord running along and intertwined through a shared chain link fence supplied the apartment with electricity.



Due to exposure to the elements, however, the insulation on the extension cord deteriorated, exposing metal wire that made direct contact with the fence that separates the two buildings, energising it.

According to available information, the clothesline where Bowers was hanging his washing two nights ago was attached between the chain link fence and a tree in the yard.

Authorities say this was disaster that was just waiting to happen.

In offering condolences to the family




of the Empire FC goalkeeper, APUA issued an appeal for people to "desist from unsafe practices of breaching the electrical installation code and standards".

"We strongly caution customers to only engage with qualified electricians for their internal wiring requirements. APUA only approves temporary electrical supply to assist with the construction and repair of buildings.

"Temporary electrical supply should not be used for regular domestic accommodation outside of construction and repair purposes", APUA admonished.

The utilities company said it will engage its staff in a vigorous audit of temporary services and compliance.

"We extend sincere thanks to you, prime minister, for standing in solidarity with our nation. Antigua and Barbuda can always count on the solidarity and friendship of Venezuela," she remarked.



The 12th WTO Ministerial Conference extended

The WTO's 12th Ministerial Conform. ference being held in Geneva, Switzerland has been extended by a day and is now scheduled to end 16th June, 2022.

This decision comes as members remain locked in intense negotiations on several issues with the objective of attaining consensus.

Key areas include: Fisheries Subsidies; Agriculture; The Work Programme on E-commerce and Moratorium on the application of customs duties on electronic transmissions; Trade and Health, notably agreeing on a WTO response to COVID-19 and a waiver of certain aspect of The Agreement on Trade-Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights (TRIPS) to enable diversification of production of COVID-19 vaccines: and WTO re-

Minister of Foreign Affairs, E. P. Chet Greene, indicated that "the negotiations are at a critical stage and compromises will be required if meaningful outcomes are to be achieved centred around sustainability, development and livelihoods."

Greene further expounded that "this illustrates the existential crisis currently plaguing the WTO and by extension the multilateral trading system".

A&B joins in observing Int'l Domestic Workers' Day

Domestic workers across the country are being encouraged to take the day off today as Antigua and Barbuda joins the rest of the world in observance of International Domestic Workers' Day.

Antigua Trades and Labour Union (AT&LU) Domestic Workers' Coordinator, Andie Stephen, said the call for a rest day should not be viewed as a form of industrial action. Rather, it should be considered a non-mandatory day of rest, with compensation, as a form of appreciation for this important category of workers.

In Antigua and Barbuda, the AT&-LU has lobbied for representation on behalf of domestic workers, with General Secretary, Alrick Daniel, credited for adding the new section to the union eight years ago.

Since then, Antigua and Barbuda in 2018, ratified the International La-



bor Organization's Domestic Workers Convention, 2011 (No. 189).

"We have grown from a small group to over seventy-five members registered with the union at this time.

"It has been a journey, and as the coordinator for domestic workers, a lot of work has gone into us putting together this section and ensuring the ladies in the section are well protected," Andie Stephen remarked.

She noted that the AT&LU also negotiates with employers on behalf of

domestic workers for better working conditions and living standards.

In observance of the day, domestic workers, and their union, will march through the streets of the city celebrating the unity they have forged, while raising awareness of the representation they continue to receive from the AT&LU.

"We are going to start at V. C. Bird Bust. We are going to make our way up Market Street, left unto Newgate Street, right unto Popeshead Street and we will end at the union's headquarters at 46 North Street, where we will have a few speeches just to culminate the day," Stephen told Pointe Xpress.

The International Labor Organization states, "Although they provide essential services, domestic workers rarely have access to rights and protection. Around 81 per cent are in informal employment – that's twice the share of informal employment among other employees. They also face some of the most strenuous working conditions.

"They earn 56 percent of average monthly wages of other employees, and are more likely than other workers to work either very long or very short hours. They are also vulnerable to violence and harassment, and restrictions on freedom of movement. Informal domestic workers are particularly vulnerable".




Thirty-eight (38) samples were processed.

Dog health: Don't buy a bulldog until breed is reshaped, vets plead

The flat faces bred into bulldogs can cause a "lifetime of suffering" and vets are urging people not to buy one.

The bulldog has twice the health risks of other dogs, a study has found.

Urgent action is needed to reshape the breed and stop the UK joining the list of countries where the dog is banned, say Royal Veterinary College experts.

They want people to stop buying English bulldogs and two other popular breeds the French bulldog and the pug - until breeding issues are addressed.

They're also calling on the public to stop "promoting" the dog on social media by posting and liking pictures.

The bulldog has soared in popularity over the past decade.

The breed, also known as the English or British bulldog, earned comparisons with Winston Churchill for its jowly face, and was historically seen as a symbol of courage and endurance.

A fashion for ever more extreme features, such as a flat face, wrinkled skin and squat body, has made the breed prone to health complaints, raising welfare concerns.

With their large bulging eyes and flat face, the dogs are undeniably "cute", said Dr Dan O'Neill of the Rov-



al Veterinary College, one of the authors of the study, but their extreme body shape after years of selective breeding has become their downfall.

"For breeds such as English bulldogs where many dogs still have extreme conformations (a dog's structure and appearance) with poor innate health, the public have a huge role to play by demanding dogs with moderate and healthier conformations," he said.

"Until then, prospective owners should stop and think before buying a flat-faced dog."

The English bulldog was once a muscular and athletic breed, but over the years has become a popular pet, with a trend towards a short skull, protruding jaw, skin folds and a squat build.

The public has an important role to play in driving change by not posting pictures of the dogs on social media or liking posts, thereby "inadvertently advertising" them, Dr O'Neill said.

But he admitted the "phenomenal" popularity of the bulldog is understandable,

given the psychological effect they have on us. With their large heads, big eyes and docile temperament, they remind us of babies, triggering our nurturing instincts.

"We interpret this as the dogs being cute, and this is totally understandable and, in fact, very hard to fight against as a human," he said.

"What we deem is cute from the outside, if you're living the life as that dog, is anything but cute. It is, in many cases, a lifetime of suffering."

The breeding of the bulldog is already banned in several countries, and, according to an expert working group of vets and welfare groups, including the Royal Veterinary College, the same could happen here if nothing is done.

Owners who already have one should look out for health issues such as eye problems, difficulty breathing and skin fold infections, and seek veterinary advice if concerned, they say.

Veterinary historian, Dr Alison Skipper, of King's College London, said many of the diseases linked to body shape had been known by breeders for more than a century. Responsible breeding, prioritising health, could "improve the welfare of this popular and iconic breed," she said.

And The Kennel Club said a ban risked driving the problem underground.

"We urgently want to see people choosing dogs not just because they like the way they look, which is often driven by celebrity and social media, and instead find breeders who use the health tools available and breed a non-exaggerated dog, where health comes first, as described in the breed standard," said spokesperson, Bill Lambert.

The study, published in the journal of Canine Medicine and Genetics, compared the health of thousands of English bulldogs kept as pets with that of other dog breeds. It found English bulldogs were twice as likely to have one or more disorders in a single year than other dogs.

The commonest health complaints were infections in skin folds (38 times more likely than in other dogs), an eye disorder known as cherry eye (26 times more likely), protrusion of the lower jaw (24 times more likely) and breathing problems (19 times more likely).

A recent study by the same team found pugs were also at high risk of health complaints.

Why you may have a thinking digital twin within a decade

Most of us have been told by a friend that we have a doppelganger - some stranger they passed on the street who bore an uncanny resemblance to you.

But imagine if you could create your very own twin, an exact copy of yourself, but one that lived a purely digital life?

We are living in an age where everything that exists in the real world is being replicated digitally - our cities, our cars, our homes, and even ourselves.

And just like the hugely-hyped metaverse - plans for a virtual, digital world where an avatar of yourself would walk around - digital twins have become a new, talked-about tech trend.

A digital twin is an exact replica of something in the physical world, but with a unique mission - to help improve, or in some other way provide feedback to, the real-life version.

Initially such twins were just sophisticated 3D computer models, but artificial intelligence (AI) combined with the internet of things - which uses sensors to connect physical things to the network - have meant that you can now build something digitally that is constantly learning from and helping improve the real counterpart.

Technology analyst Rob Enderle believes that we will have the first versions of thinking human digital twins "before the end of the decade".

"The emergence of these will need a huge amount of thought and ethical consideration, because a thinking replica of ourselves could be incredibly useful to employers," he says.

"What happens if your company creates a digital twin of you, and says

'hey, you've got this digital twin who we pay no salary to, so why are we still employing you?'?

Mr Enderle thinks that ownership of such digital twins will become one of the defining questions of the impending metaverse era.

We have already started the journey towards human twinning - in the form of the above mentioned avatars - but these are currently rather clunky and primitive.

In Meta's (formerly Facebook) virtual reality platform, Horizon Worlds, for example, you may be able to give your avatar a similar face to your own, but you can't even provide it with any legs because the technology is at such early stages.

Prof Sandra Wachter, a senior research fellow in AI at Oxford University, understands the appeal of creating digital twins of humans, "it is reminiscent of exciting science fiction novels, and at the moment that is the stage where it is at".

She adds that whether someone will "be successful at law school, get sick, or commit a crime - will depend on the still debated 'nature versus nur-

ture question'.

It will depend on good luck and bad luck, friends, family, their socio-economic background and environment, and of course their personal choices."

However, she explains, AI is not yet good at predicting these "single social events, due to their inherent complexity. And so, we have a long ways to go until we can understand and model a person's life from beginning to end, assuming that is ever possible."

Instead, it is in the fields of product design, distribution and urban planning where the use of digital twins is currently the most sophisticated and extensive.

In Formula One racing, the Mc-Laren and Red Bull teams use digital twins of their race cars.

Meanwhile, delivery giant, DHL, is creating a digital map of its warehouse and supply chains to allow it to be more efficient.

And increasingly our cities are being replicated in the digital world; Shanghai and Singapore both have digital twins, set up to help improve cont'd on pg 12

WHO looks into reports of monkeypox virus in semen

The World Health Organisation is looking into reports that the monkeypox virus is present in the semen of patients, exploring the possibility that the disease could be sexually transmitted, a WHO official said on Wednesday.

Many cases in the current monkeypox outbreak, largely centred on Europe, are among sexual partners who have had close contact, and the agency reiterated that virus is mainly transmitted via close interpersonal contact.

In recent days, scientists say they have detected viral DNA in the semen of a handful of monkeypox patients in Italy and Germany, including a lab-tested sample that suggested the virus found in the semen of a single patient was capable of infecting another person and replicating.

Catherine Smallwood, monkeypox incident manager at WHO/Europe, said it was not known whether recent reports meant the monkeypox virus could be sexually transmitted.



"This may have been something that we were unaware of in this disease before," she told a press briefing.

"We really need to focus on the most frequent mode of transmission and we clearly see that to be associated with skin to skin contact."

More than 1,300 cases of the viral disease have been reported by about 30 countries since early May. Most cases have been reported in men who have sex with men.

The outbreak has triggered concern since the virus is rarely seen outside of Africa, where it is endemic, and the majority of the European cases are not related to travel to the continent.

As the outbreak spreads, the WHO has recommended targeted vaccination of close contacts, including healthcare workers, but has warned it is already seeing a rush to stockpile vaccines.

"Once again, a 'me first' approach could lead to damaging consequences down the road," said Hans Kluge, WHO's regional director for Europe.

"I beseech governments to tackle monkeypox without repeating the mistakes of the pandemic - and keeping equity at the heart of all we do."

the design and operations of buildings, transport systems and streets.

In Singapore, one of the tasks of its digital twin is to help find new ways for people to navigate, avoiding areas of pollution. Other places use the technology to suggest where to build new infrastructure such as underground lines. And new cities in the Middle East are being built simultaneously in the real world and the digital.

French software company, Dassault Systemes, says it is now seeing interest from thousands of firms for its digital twins technology.

So far its work has included using digital twins to help a hair care firm digitally design more sustainable shampoo bottles, instead of endless real-life prototyping. This cuts down on waste.

And it is enabling other firms to design new futuristic projects - from jetpacks, to motorbikes that have floating wheels, and even flying cars. Each has a physical prototype too, but the

refining of that initial model happens in the digital space.

But the real value seen in digital twins is in healthcare. Dassault Systemes' Living Heart project has created an accurate virtual model of a human heart that can be tested and analysed, allowing surgeons to play out a series of "what if" scenarios for the organ, using various procedures and medical devices.

The project was founded by Dr Steve Levine, who had personal reasons to want to create a digital twin. His daughter was born with congenital heart disease, and a few year's back, when she was in her late 20s and at high risk of heart failure, he decided to recreate her heart in virtual reality.

Boston Children's Hospital is now using this technology to map out real patient heart conditions, while at Great Ormond Street hospital in London, a team of engineers is working with clinicians to test devices that may help children with rare and difficult-to-treat heart conditions.

St. Vincent gov't seeking to ease burden on citizens due to higher fuel prices

CMC - The St. Vincent and the Grenadines government says it has taken emergency steps to prevent the fuel surcharge on electricity bills from surpassing the record high of EC\$0.67 cents (One EC dollar=US\$0.37 cents) per unit in 2008. Prime Minister Dr. Ralph Gonsalves said he had given instructions "so that we can keep the bill which is coming out (Tuesday) in some reasonable frame."

The fuel surcharge this month has jumped from EC\$0.58 cents per kilowatt-hour to EC\$0.72 cents per unit, an increase of EC\$0.14 cents per unit.

"The bill is going to go up," Gonsalves said, as he told a radio audience of an emergency meeting with the director general of finance and planning.

"I'm trying to shield the people as much as possible from the burden because this is a poor people's government. This is a working people's government." Gonsalves said. "The highest that it has ever been is in 2008 when it was 67 cents, approximately, per unit per kilowatt-hour, the fuel surcharge," he said, noting that back then, unrefined diesel sold for US\$147.50 a barrel.

"Now this would have taken it higher," he said, adding that he called the VINLEC chief executive officer, Thornley Myers, who is in Canada, and Minister of Finance Camillo Gonsalves, who is attending the annual Caribbean Development Bank meeting in Turks and Caicos.

He said a similar call was made to the director general of finance and planning "as we had to do something."

"Basically, what we are going to do, we are going to split the 14 cents. Let the consumer pay seven and we pay seven," he said, adding that this will benefit VINLEC's 47,000 consumers, including close to 42,000 domestic consumers.

"We will keep it below what the highest point has ever been. But still, it will increase. VINLEC will absorb about EC\$500,000 of that. And the government will put a number close to EC\$300, 000," Gonsalves said, adding "if this has to be repeated next month, we'll have to probably reduce the way that formula is between the government and VINLEC.

"It's a difficult period. And, as always, I have to come to the people and be very honest. If we were to absorb all of it, it will cost us about EC\$1.6 million, and when you take into account that we are already doing over a million dollars a month in providing the subsidy on the gasoline [and diesel] at the pump..."

Gonsalves said a consumer who pays EC\$135 will see an increase slightly less than EC\$10, about half of what it would have been had it not been for his government's intervention.

Bahamas Opposition legislator Adrian Gibson arrested

CMC – Bahamian Opposition legislator, Adrian Gibson, has been granted US\$150,000 bail after he appeared in court on Monday on charges of abuse of power while he served as executive chairman of the Water and Sewerage Corporation.

However, Gibson, 37, an attorney, and six other defendants, were all remanded into custody until their bail is signed

Gibson, who appeared before Assistant Chief Magistrate Carolyn Vogt-Evan, faces a total of 56 counts on allegations that he failed to declare his interest in con-

tracts awarded by the corporation.

Gibson faced 31 of his 56 charges alone, while together with the remaining six accused, faced a combined total of 101 charges.

Prosecutors allege that

Gibson gained a financial advantage of more than one million US dollars from contracts granted to a maintenance and restoration company and he laundered the illicitly obtained funds by purchasing properties

and vehicles.

Gibson was not required to plead to the charges.

The prosecution also alleges that the opposition legislator, who served as chairman of the utility company during the term in the office of Prime Minister Hubert Minnis, was aided by Elwood Donaldson, the corporation's former general manager; his cousin, Rashae Gibson; his campaign general Joan Knowles; Jerome Missick, Tonya Demeritte and Peaches Farquharson.

Dr. Keith Mitchell warns against tampering with CBI programme as Grenada election campaign heats up

CMC – Grenada's Prime Minister Dr. Keith Mitchell says the Citizenship by Investment Program (CBI) must be "run and managed" by Grenadians hinting at the main opposition National Democratic Congress (NDC) being used by persons who want to "control this country of ours."

But the 44-year-old NDC leader, Dickon Mitchell, has brushed aside these suggestions telling the Caribbean Media Corporation (CMC) that while there is a need for more transparency in the programme, the NDC" is being funded by a grassroots campaign to a large extent by local Grenadians who desire change.

"We are not funded by any CBI company (and) that's the reality we do not have any big donors, we do not have any secret donors, we do not run the Citizenship by Investment Programme...it is being run exclusively by a New National Party government,"

he added.

Grenada is among several Caribbean Community (CARICOM) countries with a CBI programme that provides citizenship to foreign investors who make a significant contribution to the socio-economic development of these islands.

Addressing a rally of his ruling New National Party (NNP) as he prepares for the June 23 general election, Prime Minister Mitchell, 75, told supporters the CBI programme "must be run and managed with no inherent conflict by people who oversee that programme.

"And the only loyalty is to the people of Grenada, Carriacou, and Petite Martinique.

"There are those who have their friends, who believe they want to control this country of ours. We are a welcoming people to all and sundry, but you must come here and respect the people of this land," Mitchell said, adding "who wants

to sell out this country will not come through the New National Party."

But the NDC leader, who is also an attorney, described the statement by Prime Minister Mitchell as "laughable and borderline insane.

"We are not being funded by any CBI company," he said, adding that "the only person who is capable of selling any country, the

only persons capable of being bought is the New National Party".

Meanwhile, the Organization of American States (OAS) has announced that its observer mission for the general election will be led by Dr. Rosina Wiltshire, a former United Nations Resident Coordinator, and United Nations Development Program Resident Representative for Barbados and the OECS.

Grenada has formalised an agreement with the OAS to observe general elections where 41 candidates contest for the 15 seats in the House of Representatives or the Lower House of Parliament.

Apart from the OAS, CARICOM is also expected to mount a mission to Grenada for the polls.

Russia again cuts natural gas exports thru European pipeline

Suspects confess to killing British journalist and Brazilian guide - reports

AP – Brazilian suspects in the disappearance of British journalist Dom Phillips and his Brazilian guide Bruno Pereira have confessed to killing and dismembering the men, broadcasters CNN Brasiland Band News reported on Wednesday.

The federal police had said in a statement on Wednesday they were still searching for Phillips and Pereira in what they described as a homicide investigation, following the arrest of two suspects in the case. Reuters witnesses saw police take a masked and hooded man out on the river where the men vanished.

Police have not commented on the reported confession.

The suspects are fisherman Amarildo da Costa, known as "Pelado," and his brother Oseney da Costa, 41, or "Dos Santos."

Amarildo was arrested last week on weapons charges and is being held while police investigate his involve-

Biden announces new \$1 billion in weapons for Ukraine

Reuters – President Joe Biden on Wednesday announced a fresh infusion of \$1 billion in weapons for Ukraine that sources familiar with the package said included anti-ship rocket systems, artillery rockets, and rounds for howitzers.

In a phone call with Ukraine President Volodymyr Zelenskiy, Biden said he told the embattled leader about the new weaponry.

"I informed President Zelenskiy that the United States is providing another \$1 billion in security assistance for Ukraine, including additional artillery and coastal defence weapons, as well as ammunition for the artillery and advanced rocket systems," Biden said in a statement after the 41-minute call.

The president also announced an additional \$225 million in humanitarian assistance to help people in Ukraine, including by supplying safe drinking water, critical medical supplies and healthcare, food, shelter, and cash for families to purchase essential items.

The aid packages, which



come as U.S. Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin is meeting with allies in Brussels, could be split into two categories: transfer of excess defence articles from U.S. stocks and other weapons being funded by the Ukraine Security Assistance Initiative (USAI), a separate congressionally authorised programme.

Three sources familiar with the details, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said that one package of about \$350 million was expected

to include more rockets for Multiple Launch Rocket Systems (MLRS) that had been sent to Ukraine and artillery rounds for M777 howitzers and spare parts.

A second package, anticipated to amount to more than \$650 million and funded using USAI, could include ground-based Harpoon anti-ship missile launchers, secure radios, night vision and training.

Ukraine is pressing the United States and other West-

ern nations for speedy deliveries of weapons in the face of increased pressure from Russian forces in the eastern Donbass region.

In May, the Biden administration announced a plan to give Ukraine M142 High Mobility Artillery Rocket Systems after receiving assurances from Kyiv that it would not use them to hit targets inside Russian territory. Biden imposed the condition to try to avoid escalating the Ukraine war.

reduce flows by 40% after Canadian sanctions over the war prevented German partner Siemens Energy from delivering overhauled equipment. It blamed the same issue for the additional reduction.

But German Vice Chancellor Robert Habeck said Wednesday that Gazprom's initial move appeared to be political rather than a result of technical problems. He said the new developments "clearly show the Russian side's explanation is simply an excuse."

"Obviously, the strategy is to unsettle people and push up prices," Habeck said.

Gazprom also told Italian gas giant Eni that it would reduce gas through a different pipeline by roughly 15% on Wednesday. The reason for the reduction has not been made clear, and the Italian company said it was monitoring the situation.

The reduced flows to two of Europe's biggest importers of Russian natural gas follow Russia's previous halt of gas supplies to Bulgaria, Poland, Finland, the Netherlands and Denmark.

Blatter, Platini face 20-month suspended jail sentences

AP – Prosecutors in the fraud trial of former FIFA president Sepp Blatter and vice president Michel Platini asked Wednesday for both men to get 20-month suspended prison sentences.

Blatter and Platini, a former France national team captain who was president of European governing body UEFA, faced sentences of up to five years for financial wrongdoing but actual jail time was considered to be unlikely ahead of their 11-day trial. Verdicts are expected on July 8.

The 86-year-old Blatter's legal jeopardy increased Wednesday when prosecutors in FIFA's home city Zurich confirmed to The Associated Press they had opened criminal proceedings against him in a separate complaint filed by soccer's world body in 2020.

Blatter and his long-time right-hand man, former FIFA secretary general Jérôme Valcke, are now formal suspects in an investigation of alleged mismanagement relating to the FIFA World Football Museum project in central Zurich. The new details were first reported by a Swiss financial news website.

Earlier Wednesday at the Swiss federal criminal court in Bellinzona, prosecutor Thomas Hildbrand also asked the three judg-

es for Platini to pay FIFA more than 2.2 million Swiss francs (\$2.2 million) in compensation.

Blatter and Platini deny fraud and lesser charges relating to a FIFA-approved \$2 million payment to the France great in 2011. At the time, Platini was UEFA president, a FIFA vice president and was expected to succeed Blatter, likely in 2015.

Platini said in a statement published after the court session that he was "serene and confident."

"The indictment of the prosecutor today is devoid of any basis," Platini said. "The debates of the trial proved that this criminal procedure had no reason to exist."

The prosecution argued

there was no legal or contractual basis for FIFA to pay Platini's invoice for working as a presidential adviser in Blatter's first term between 1998 and 2002. FIFA also paid \$229,000 of social security taxes in Zurich.

Both have long denied wrongdoing and claim they had a verbal deal in 1998 for Platini to get extra salary that FIFA could not pay at the time. Platini signed a contract in August 1999 to be paid 300,000 Swiss francs (\$300,000) annually.

Their defence previously failed at the FIFA ethics committee, which banned them from soccer and removed them from office, the FIFA appeals committee, and later in separate appeals at the Court of Arbitration for Sport.

Blatter has said FIFA accounted for the money properly, and Platini has claimed the allegation came to light in September 2015 to block him from campaigning to be FIFA president.

In June 2015, Blatter announced his plan to resign early as president in fallout from a sprawling American corruption investigation. A separate but cooperating case by Swiss prosecutors led to the Platini payment being investigated.

Blatter and Platini testified last week and both are expected to make closing statements at the end of the trial on June 22.

Two federal criminal proceedings and one at canton (state) level are now ongoing against Blatter and also Valcke.

FIFA asked Zurich prosecutors to look at the \$140 million renovation of a downtown Zurich building for a museum long seen as a pet project of Blatter that opened in 2016. The loss-making museum is tied to a longterm FIFA rental of apartments and offices on the site owned by insurance firm Swiss Life.

Lawyers for Blatter said 18 months ago the museum allegations are "baseless and are vehemently denied."

Another member of Haiti's Special Olympics delegation gone missing

CMC - Law enforcement officials in Florida have confirmed that a seventh member of Haiti's Special Olympics delegation has disappeared even as the search continues for the six others who went missing after checking into their hotel last week.

The deputies of the Sheriffs of Osceola County said 25-year-old Louis Jacques Wilguens, who was due to return to Haiti on Sunday was last seen on Saturday getting off the bus at the All-Star Sports Resort around 4:30 p.m., wearing red sandals, blue jeans and a white Special Olympics shirt with the word Haiti written on it.

As in the previous case when the six others went missing, the authorities say they do not suspect foul play and are urging anyone with information to contact the Osceola County Sheriff's Office.

Last week, the authorities named Atione Joseph Mithon, 32; Nicholson Fontilus, 20; Peter Mianovich Berlus, 19; Anderson Petit-Frere, 18; Steevenson Jacquet, 24 and Oriol Jean, 18, as having gone missing.



They are all associated with the country's soccer team that participated in the Special Olympics USA Games in

The police said the group was last seen at the ESPN Wide World of Sports complex. All six men left behind their personal belongings.

Haitians have in the past been making dangerous voyages by sea to enter the United States illegally. Many have lost their lives as a result, but others continue in a hope of escaping poverty and crime in the French-speaking Caribbean Community (CARICOM) country.

"Many of those who resort to dangerous sea crossings are fleeing the political instability and socio-economic insecurity of the region, which has put severe strains on communities throughout the Caribbean."

As of May, the US Coast Guard reported almost 3,900 interceptions of Haitian nationals, more than double the number reported a year ago.

In addition, the UN said at least 175 Haitians have been reported to the coast guard as missing or de-

AP – George Washington University is dropping its "Colonials" moniker because "it can no longer serve its purpose as a name that unifies," the school announced Wednesday.

GW will keep using "Colonials" until a new name is introduced. That is expected by the 2023-24 academic year.

"A moniker must unify our community, draw people together and serve as a source of pride," said Grace Speights, chair of the university's Board of Trustees.

"We look forward to the next steps in an inclusive process to identify a moniker that fulfils this aspiration."

\$1 million in 2010 to the Trinidad and Tobago soccer federation. The suspects are Blatter, Valcke and former FIFA finance director Markus Kattner, who testified in court Tuesday about the Platini payment.

The loan was later waived and effectively gifted soccer money to Jack Warner, then a FIFA vice president, weeks before he was a candidate in the Caribbean islands' general election. Warner then became a government minister.

Valcke is also awaiting a federal appeals court verdict in Bellinzona after a retrial in March on charges linked to use of a Qatari-owned villa in Sardinia and World Cup broadcast rights. The three defendants include soccer and broadcast executive Nasser al-Khelaïfi, the president of French champion Paris Saint-Germain.
