MoH condemns malicious monkeypox rumours

The Ministry of Health Wellness and the Environment has issued a statement categorically denying the presence of monkeypox in Antigua and Barbuda.

The statement was issued in response to false claims being circulated on social media about the presence of monkeypox in the country.

"The Ministry is outraged that any person would disseminate false information suggesting the presence of monkeypox in the twin island state.

"This act became even more egregious when it was established that the perpetrator is a current employee of the Sir Lester Bird Medical Centre. We strongly condemn any such act creating alarm and distress in the public," said the ministry.

All laboratory investigations for suspected monkeypox cases have been negative, according to the ministry, both at the Caribbean Public Health Agency (CARPHA) and the Sir Lester Bird Medical Centre, which commenced monkeypox testing last week.

The ministry also offered the assurance that any confirmed case of monkeypox will be disclosed to the public. This is consistent with the ministry's commitment to transparency, particularly with regard to public health matters, as demonstrated in the past.

In the meantime, members of the public are reminded that monkeypox is a viral disease characterised by a fever, enlarged lymph nodes and a rash.

Monkeypox is spread from person to person by direct contact with the rash, bodily fluids (fluid, pus or blood from skin lesions), and scabs. Clothing, sheets, towels and other objects can also be a source of infection.

The virus is also transmitted from a pregnant mother to her unborn child.

Physicians are also being urged to report any suspected cases of monkeypox to the ministry's Epidemiology and Surveillance Unit.

There is no specific treatment for monkeypox, however, the public is advised that social and physical distancing, frequent handwashing and wearing face masks may prevent infection.

Persons are therefore strongly advised to practice these public health and social measures to avoid becoming infected.

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Victor 'Babu' Samuel to be laid to rest today

Antiguan and Barbudan pan icon, Victor 'Babu' Samuel, will be laid to rest today preceded by what is expected to be a celebratory funeral service.

The government granted the famed arranger, composer and musician extraordinaire an official funeral for his contributions to the development of pan music in the country and the Caribbean.

The service will take place at the Antigua Recreation Grounds and will feature performances from members of the local and regional pan fraternity, including Samuel's decades' old friend and collaborator, Dr. Len

'Boogsie' Sharpe of Trinidad and Tobago.

The Halcyon Steel Orchestra will also take centre stage along with the Westside Symphony Steelband with whom they will perform a special piece.

The message will be delivered by Reverend Joseph Nicholas of the Green Bay Moravian Church.

Former prime minister Baldwin Spencer, who was Samuel's close friend for many decades, will deliver the eulogy.

Executive member of Halcyon Steel Orchestra, Lauchland 'Punchin'

Joseph, said the funeral service will celebrate Samuel's life and his elevation as a top pannist.

Samuel arranged winning competition pieces for Halcyon Steel Orchestra for many years, making it one of the most successful steelbands in the country.

He was also a fixture in Trinidad and Tobago's Panorama Competition where he would play each year alongside "Boogsie" Sharpe in the Phase Two Steel Orchestra.

Samuel died in late June this year following a period of health challenges. He was 64.

MCII: We delivered on Carnival 2022

"We have delivered!"

That is the optimistic declaration of the Ministry of Creative Industries and Innovation (MCII) which has given itself full marks for its execution of Antigua's Carnival 2022.

The ministry's Head of Communications, Cecelia Thwaites, told Pointe Xpress that this year's carnival, launched in May under the theme 'Re-igniting the Spirit', hoped to capture the festival's colourful vitality after the two year break.

"We certainly had our challenges in fulfilling our commitment to bring reality to the theme. Yet, despite the challenges that included time and resources such as finances, our team stayed focused on the goal, and in the end, I feel confident to say that we have reignited the spirit. We have delivered!" she stated.

Thwaites said although MCII received the greenlight to proceed with planning Antigua's Carnival 2022 in March this year, for a long time there was much uncertainty about

how the festival would come together in light of the fact that the COVID-19 pandemic still presented a significant concern nationally.

"As much as we had the greenlight, we still had much public uncertainty at that time in the year as to how mas, the colourful display by masqueraders, would factor in the festival as people were fearful that it could lead to a major COVID super spreader.

"As such, the band leaders declined to invest or commit to playing mas on a grand scale as this would have exposed them to huge financial risks," she explained.

Thwaites explained that mas has evolved from the early foundations of the artform established by band leaders such as Colin 'Wanga' Martin, Barrymore 'Zawardie' Thomas and George 'Tassa' Hunte.

Today, she noted, mas is as much about business as it is about having fun.

"Costumes today are not built locally, but instead, are ordered from China. These leaders would have had to send off their orders months in advance in order to guarantee that the costumes would arrive in time given the shipping chaos that has plagued the world over the past year," she noted.

Despite the challenges, there were several successes this carnival, according to the MCII spokesperson.

"One of the areas where we were extremely proud is the area of sponsorship. This year, we had three companies coming forward as partners of the MCII. These are INET, Kennedy's Enterprises and Premier Beverages. The relationship with these entities is deeper than sponsorship; they are long-term commitment to the ministry and its several activities.

"We also had returning sponsors such as State Insurance Corporation and the coming on board of Anjo Wholesale, a first for that company," she revealed.

The ministry's relationship with the pan fra-

ternity is another area with which the ministry says it is pleased.

"Working with the Antigua and Barbuda Pan Association we collaborated in staging three very successful events; Pan D' Beach, Pan D' Garden and Pan D' Mix.


"Pan D' Mix was special as, for the first time, perhaps anywhere, all eight steel bands combined to render a tune. That was magical," she remarked.

That show also featured an appearance by pan virtuoso, Dr. Len 'Boogsie' Sharpe in honour of fallen pannist, Victor 'Babu' Samuel.

A third success of note, the ministry said, was the decision to have the mas troupes "cross the stage" on a stage erected on Independence Avenue at the junction of High Street and Factory Road.

"That was another wonderful experience as it led to some masqueraders being able to do a loop and cross the stage twice. Additionally, by not crossing the stage inside ARG, Carnival City, we made huge savings on security, lights, sounds et cetera." she declared.

Thwaites said the MCII will formally review Carnival 2022 this week, in an analysis that will also include other key stakeholders and agencies involved in carnival.

October committal hearing for Customs fraud accused

The committal hearing for the trio charged with fraud arising from an investigation at the Customs investigation will take place on 5th October in the St. John's Magistrates' Court before Chief Magistrate Joanne Walsh.

Last Monday, the accused were granted bail in the High Court during an emergency hearing following their arrest the previous Friday.

Customs Officer Joesine Christian, and brokers Rowan Matthew and Foston George, were jointly charged with conspiracy to defraud.

Christian is also charged with cheating the public revenue and cor-

The committal hearing for the charged with fraud arising from investigation at the Customs intigation will take place on 5th ruption in public office, while the brokers face charges of making a false declaration and obtaining montey by false pretences.

Prime Minister Gaston Browne first revealed that fraudulent activities were discovered at the Customs Department, where millions of dollars were being syphoned by unknown persons.

This prompted an internal investigation which began in 2017.

Browne also revealed that his signature had been forged on some of the documents the perpetrators used to commit their illegal acts.

Lawyers for the accused, Wendel

Robinson and Andrew O'kola, submitted urgent petitions to High Court Justice Colin Williams via email on Monday.

Attorney General Steadroy Benjamin said while emailed submissions may be a novel concept to laypersons, "This is also allowable in exceptional cases, where the liberty of the person is at stake."

Bail was granted to the accused in the amount of \$ 10,000 each with two sureties.

As part of their bail conditions, they are required to surrender their travel documents and are forbidden from making contact with witnesses.

Antigua Airways to begin operations in October

The Antigua and Barbuda government has inked an agreement with a Nigerian company to launch Antigua Airways which will provide direct commercial flights between the African continent and the Caribbean.

Government officials, including Prime Minister Gaston Browne, Attorney General, Steadroy Benjamin and Tourism Minister, Charles Fernandez were among those who took part in this week's signing ceremony at the Office of the Prime Minister.

The agreement was signed with Nigeria-based Marvelous Mike Press Limited to launch Antigua Airways.

PM Browne welcomed the initiative noting that there are several benefits that will accrue for Antigua and Barbuda and the rest of the Caribbean.

As the first direct commercial airline link between Africa and Antigua and Barbuda, the launch of Antigua Airways has the potential to reestablish ties between Africa and the Caribbean. These include familial ties, trade, investment and tourism.

Additionally, with the V. C. Bird International Airport (VIBIA) as its Caribbean hub, the airline will forge links with the Antigua-based carrier, LIAT, thus making it possible for people from the rest of the region to travel to Africa.

Government spokesman Lionel "Max" Hurst said the route being negotiated will see the airline travel directly from Lagos, Nigeria, to Antigua and Barbuda and return to Lagos via Toronto, Canada.

Hurst explained that the Nigerian group plans to wet-lease aircraft and crew for the fledgling carrier. As part of the wet-leasing contract, the maintenance of the aircrafts will be includ-

"We have been negotiating with the group for several months and we also completed due diligence to ensure that they are who they say they are.

"Their main offices will be in Lagos, but they will also have a presence at the VCBIA.

"One of the advantages of the new service from Antigua Airways is that it will make it much easier for people from the African continent to travel to the Caribbean," he explained.

Hurst said currently, Africans travelling to the region must make connections through Europe or the United States which is both costly and time consuming.

"We are elated as a government with this development as we are of the view that true integration between Africa and the Caribbean there must be ease of travel. Currently, we are in negotiations with several African countries to institute visa waivers that will make it easier for them to travel to the



region," Hurst added.

Under the agreement, the investors will finance the airline's operations while the Government of Antigua and Barbuda will receive 20 percent of the profits.


Ten (10) cases were recorded on July 29th, two (2) on July 30th, one (1) on August 1st and one (1) on August 2nd.



Prose, cons and cornrows

What do you call a pig that does karate? A pork chop. Why did the bike fall over? It was two tired. Why did the big-shot Tobagonian golfer bring two pairs of pants. In case he got a hole in one. Why shouldn't you write with a broken pen? Because its pointless. However, if you think I'm writing this article with a broken pen, I can tell you that even though I have a baldpoint, it is just another example of the corny jokes that I chose to make a point that should gel with you. They are all "corny" jokes and describe things that are worn out (like my children by my Pop-corn), tiresome (like the bike joke), overly sentimental, or a combination of all the other options. Now, let's avoid the cornflict and corncentrate on something with which I corncur and, hopefully, will not be stepping on your corns.

The first thing you will learn is that most corn jokes are doubly corny, like "Two corns in a field were telling each other jokes. They were the laughing stalk of the others." Our second corntestant is the story of two high-school graduates. I urge you not to start with any precornceptions and corncentrate. The first one revealed, "I'm planning on going into farming, it's what my father does and he makes good money." The second asked, "What type of farming? Wheat, corn, livestock?" The first replied, "I don't know man, there are so many fields to choose from." I am almost certain that I might be stepping on your corns as readers of serious stuff and I may have to suffer the cornsequences of my corntinuous lack of corncideration, but the final jokes are a cornsummation devoutly to be dished. "How much do pirates pay for corn?" A buccaneer. Now, the cornclusion, "Why can't a farmer keep secrets on his farm? Because the corn has ears, the potatoes have eyes and the beanstalk."

Now before you discorntinue reading and demand why I am subjecting you to this incornsequential cornucopia, I want to assure you that I have a corncrete reason. I was born just days after the end of the Second World War and because of the rationing of food, families in the sugar-cane fields not only in Trinidad, but throughout the Caribbean, grew their own survival rations. One of these in abundance was "corn", a name which originally meant "sand" and then amazingly replaced "maize" as the generic word for "grain" (wheat, barley, rye etc). What gave the "cane" its "ears" was a painting in 1573 by artist Giuseppi Arcimbaldo entitled "Summer" which featured a bearded man with a cucumber nose, peapod lips, peach cheeks and an "ear" of corn. By that time, corn from the Americas had reached Europe and even the most "earudite" joined with the cornquistadores and uncornditionally accepted the corntradiciton in terms.

Rice, flour and even sugar were rationed and limited. My family used to grow corn and we roasted and boiled a lot of them to help us survive. When I left Central Trinidad and went to the town of Siparia in the deep south, my friends did not grow corn but knew where to find them. Unlike Little Bo Peep's sheep, the corns were not left alone to bring their trails behind them. We recornnoitered and struck, going for the gold in particular.

I will start with a true cornfession. I call it "Corn With The Wind". One day, while we had a serious card came called "Whappie" going in the cornfield, the police struck. My friend Jimmy, faster than Canadian sprint-star Andre de Grasse, hit the grass like a Bolt from Jamaica. We just saw

the corn-field open and close. What I didn't know is that Mr. Shooy and his son Anton had got a head start and rushed to their nearby latrine, each trying to prove he was there first, otherwise engaged, and too busy for whappie. Each of them was stripping off his pants while trying to push the other off the throne. "I was here fuss," each shouted to the other. Unfortunately, the crudely built facility made from pieces of wood stolen from the sawmill or thrown away on the road, had one bit of cedar wood that jutted beyond the boundary. Jimmy, running fast, frantic and frightened, hit the projection, toppled it and kept running even faster, this time more like a bolt from the blue than from Jamaica. In the meantime, the frail facility had fallen apart with father and son trying to avoid falling even further and deeper, but still quarrelling until the police arrived. They were eventually dragged into custody, but not without a few blows from the "bullpistles" (tough, long whips made from bull penises) that were wielded with malice aforethought and afterthought by the cornstables.

There were many times when my cornfederates and I had our share of corn but eventually stopped because of our friend Carlie. One Emancipa-

tion holiday we rampaged through a set of cornfields and came back with about thirty biggies. We had a big "pitchoil" tin (the type in which 'cooking oil' came) filled with water, salt, pepper and chopped up onions for a contest on who could eat the most corn. Carlie ate fifteen and wiped out the supplies before any of the rest of us could complete our second.

He then said, "Fellers, I still hungry. Let us go back and get some more corn!" This was the last husk, straw and cob. It ended in a major row.

I remembered that row and my days of corn and conflict as I read "Cornrows" by lawyer, writer and artiste, Takudza Hillary Chiwanza of Zimbabwe. He wrote, "The history of slavery is filled with stories of momentous innovation and sheer resilience. One of these is how the slaves in Colombia devised ways to escape slavery through cornrows - a hairstyle resembling African pride and heritage. Cornrows, which have African origins, are now common all over the world. But this hairstyle is steeped in the history of rebellion and redemption." He

pointed out that the style of hair brading very close to the scalp, or "Cornrows", is also known as "cane rows" in the Caribbean. Because cornrows are fashioned in neat linear rows, he explained, "they can also be created in intricate geometric and curving designs." Where the cornrows proved to be efficient and life-saving was that they were used "to transfer and create maps with the intention to leave the home of captors." Takudza Hillary ended with the cornrows upon rows of slaves which helped in the fight against slavery, "The legacies of colonialism resulted in African hair being despised. Modern black women are barraged with notions that depict their natural hair as inferior. Africans should stand tall and be proud of their hair, for it is enriched with the history of self-assertion."

WMO reports decreased likelihood of severe Atlantic hurricane season

The United States National Atmospheric and Oceanic Administration (NOAA) has adjusted its forecast so as to monitor the conditions which impact cyclonic activity as the North Atlantic hurricane season enters its traditional peak period, the World Meteorological Organization (WMO), said Friday.

The WMO, a specialised

tions whose mandate covers weather, climate, and water resources said while conditions do still point towards an "above-normal" Atlantic hurricane season. NOAA forecasters have decreased the likelihood of an above-normal season, which could herald more devastating storms for the Caribbean and east coast of

May, to 60 percent in most recent estimates.

However, the likelihood of "near-normal" activity has risen to 30 percent, from a previous estimate of just 10 percent.

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change's Sixth Assessment report projects that the global proportion of tropical cyclones

> NOAA's update to the prior forecast - which covers the entire six-month hurricane season ahead – projects that there will be 14-20 named storms with winds of 39 mph or greater.

> Of these, six to 10 could become hurricanes with winds of 74 mph or greater. Of these, three to five could become major hurricanes with winds of 111 mph or greater. NOAA has projected these ranges with a 70 percent level of confidence.

Thus far, the season has seen three named storms. but no hurricanes in the Atlantic Basin. On average, hurricane season produces 14 named storms, seven of which become hurricanes, including three major hurricanes.

There are several conditions that point toward an active hurricane season. Most notably are the La Niña conditions, which will likely remain for the rest of 2022. La Niña conditions, the periodic cooling of the ocean surface central and east of the Pacific equator,


Jamaica confirms first locally transmitted case of monkeypox

Jamaica Friday confirmed its first locally transmitted Monkeypox virus case, bringing to three, the overall number of cases of the virus on the island.

"We have confirmed a third case of Monkeypox only a couple of hours ago," Health and Wellness Minister Dr. Christopher Tufton said, adding that the patient "apparently contracted the virus from someone who had the virus here.

Speaking at a ceremony to mark the resumption of construction work on the Western Children & Adolescents Hospital in St James, Tufton said the new case "in essence changes the complexion of the challenge that we face.

"In this third case, the individual is being quarantined at home because their facility does allow for it and if the person is cooperative,



this is what we will do with the cases, Tufton said, adding that the health ministry's technical team is currently having dialogue on the matter of local transmission of the disease that had been anticipated.

"They are meeting.

They are looking at their consulting, including with our bilateral and multilateral partners... looking at their protocols which we have put out already... having a discussion with the medical teams in the respective parishes and reviewing how

we address concerns around public information, how we address concerns around vaccines, how we address concerns around the contact tracing and quarantining, if necessary," Tufton added.

Apart from Jamaica, Bermuda, Bahamas, and Barbados are among Caribbean countries reporting cases of Monkeypox which is usually a self-limited disease with symptoms lasting from two to four weeks. Severe cases can occur. In recent times, the case fatality ratio has been around three to six percent.

Monkeypox is transmitted from one person to another by close contact with lesions, body fluids, respiratory droplets, and contaminated materials such as bedding. (CMC)

will slightly enhance hurricane activity, said the press release issued by the World Meteorological Organization.

In addition to a continued La Niña, weaker tropical Atlantic winds, an active west African Monsoon and likely above-normal Atlantic sea-surface temperatures, set the stage for higher-than-average hurricane activity.

The hurricane seasons in 2020 and 2021 were exceptionally active and both years exhausted the prepared lists of storm names, from the WMO's rotating list. The WMO maintains lists of names, in order to aid clear communication over hazards ahead, and help save lives.

Every year, there are on average 84 named tropical cyclones all over the world. Over the past 50 years, every single day, they have caused on average 43 deaths and US\$78 million in damages, according to WMO statistics from 1970-2019.

However, based on the data, death tolls have fallen dramatically. This development is thanks to improvements in forecasting, warning, and disaster risk reduction, coordinated by WMO's Tropical Cyclone Program.

In view of the growing hazards, WMO said it is working to ensure there is universal access to early warnings and is seeking to strengthen impact-based forecasting. (CMC)

Dr. Terrance Michael Drew was officially sworn in on Saturday, August 06, 2022, as the fourth Prime Minister of the Federation of St. Kitts and Nevis by His Excellency Sir S.W. Tapley Seaton, Governor-General, during a significant ceremony at Government House.

Prime Minister Dr. Drew was sworn in after the St. Kitts and Nevis Labour Party (SKNLP) convincingly won the Federal General Elections held on August 05, 2022, taking six of the 11 seats that were contested.

He was administered the Oath of Office, the Oath of Allegiance and the Oath of Secrecy in front of elected representatives of the SKNLP, Members of the Diplomatic Corps, specially invited guests and members of the media.

In his brief remarks,

Prime Minister Drew thanked the electorate for placing its trust in him and his team when it was called upon to choose the country's next government.

Prime Minister Drew pledged to work closely with the sister island of Nevis "so that whatever issues there are that we can solve and resolve to bring our Federation closer together."

"I look forward to the next five years to serving the people of St. Kitts and Nevis with distinction, with respect to the principles of good governance, transparency and integrity so that our nation can be counted among those that are the best," he said.

The other elected members of Prime Minister Drew's Cabinet will be sworn in at a later date. They are Dr. Denzil Douglas, Konris Maynard, Marsha Henderson, Dr. Geoffrey Hanley and Samal Duggins. Prime Minister Drew declared that Monday, August 8, 2022, is a public holiday in the Federation in recognition of his party's resounding victory at the polls.

17 missing, 121 hurt, one dead in fire at Cuban oil facility

A fire set off by a lightning strike at an oil storage facility raged uncontrolled Saturday in the city of Matanzas, where four explosions and flames injured nearly 80 people, Cuban authorities said. Seventeen firefighters are missing.

Firefighters and other specialists were still trying to quell the blaze at the Matanzas Supertanker Base, where the fire began during a thunderstorm Friday night, the Ministry of Energy and Mines tweeted. The government said later that it had asked for help

from international experts in "friendly countries" with experience in the oil sector.

The official Cuban News Agency said lightning hit one tank, starting a fire, and the blaze later spread to a second tank. As military helicopters flew overhead dropping water on the blaze, a dense column of black smoke billowed from the facility and spread westward more than 100 kilometres (62 miles) toward Havana.

Roberto de la Torre, head of fire operations in Matanzas, said firefight-

ers were spraying water on intact tanks trying to keep them cool in hopes of preventing the fire from spreading.

The Facebook page of the provincial government of Matanzas said the number of injured had reached 77, while 17 people were missing. The Presidency of the Republic said the 17 were "firefighters who were in the nearest area trying to prevent the spread."

Seven of the injured were taken to Calixto García Hospital in Havana, cont'd on pg 18

Turkey frees man wanted by Haiti after Moise's assassination

Reuters - A man wanted by Haiti over his alleged involvement in the assassination of President Jovenel Moise has been freed from a Turkish repatriation centre and returned to the United States, one of his lawyers said on Saturday.

Moise, a 53-year-old former businessman who took office in 2017, was shot dead in July 2021 at his private residence. His wife was wounded in the attack.

Businessman Samir Handal, a Miami-based Haitian and U.S. real estate developer, was detained on an Interpol red notice as he transited through Turkey

on his way from the United States to Jordan last November.

notice was later suspended at their request pending a final review and a Turkish His lawyers said the red court rejected Haiti's extradition request for Handal on July 4, ruling he should be released.

Lawyer Mahmut Barlas told Reuters that Handal was released on Aug. 3 and arrived in the United States the following day.

Handal has said he only rented a house to Emmanuel Sanon, a suspected mastermind of the assassination, and did not know of any plans to kill Moise.

Handal's lawyers had said he should not be extradited because he would be subject to hard labour in Haiti. They also emphasised the political uncertainty in the country.

The incident comes as Cuba struggles with fuel shortages. There was no immediate word on how much oil had burned or was in danger at the storage facility, which has eight giant tanks that hold oil used to fuel electricity generating plants.

"I was in the gym when I felt the first explosion. A column of smoke and terrible fire rose through the skies," resident Adiel Gonzalez told The Associated Press by phone. "The city has a strong smell of sulphur."

Authorities said the Dubrocq neighbourhood closest to the fire was evacuated, while Gonzalez added that some people decided to leave the Versailles district, which is a little farther from the tank farm.

Many ambulances, police and fire engines were seen in the streets of Matanzas, a city with about 140,000 residents and located on Matnzas Bay.

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Ex-rebel sworn in as Colombia's president in historic shift

AP - Colombia's first leftist president will be sworn into office Sunday, promising to fight inequality and heralding a turning point in the history of a country haunted by a long war between the government and guerrilla groups.

Sen. Gustavo Petro, a former member of Colombia's M-19 guerrilla group, won the presidential election in June by beating conservative parties that offered moderate changes to the market-friendly economy, but failed to connect with voters frustrated by rising poverty and violence against human rights leaders and environmental groups in rural areas.

Petro is part of a growing group of leftist politicians and political outsiders who have been winning elections in Latin America since the pandemic broke out and hurt incumbents who struggled with its economic aftershocks.

The ex-rebel's victory was also exceptional for Colombia, where voters had been historically reluctant to back leftist politicians who were often accused of being soft on crime or allied with guerrillas.

A 2016 peace deal between Colombia's government and the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia turned much of the focus of voters away from the violent

conflicts playing out in rural areas and gave prominence to problems like poverty and corruption, fueling the popularity of leftist parties in national elections.

Petro, 62, has promised to tackle Colombia's social and economic inequalities by boosting spending on anti-poverty programs and increasing investment in rural areas.

He has described U.S.-led anti-narcotics policies, such as the forced eradication of illegal coca crops, as a "big failure." But he has said he would like to work with Washington "as equals," building schemes to combat climate change or bring infrastructure to rural areas where many farmers say coca leaves are the only viable crop.

Petro also formed alliances with environmentalists during his presidential campaign and has promised to turn Colombia into a "global powerhouse for life" by slowing deforestation and taking steps to reduce the country's reliance on fossil fuels.

The incoming president has said Colombia will stop granting new licences for oil exploration and will ban fracking projects, even though the oil industry makes up almost 50% of the nation's legal exports. He plans to finance social spending with a \$10 billion a year tax reform that would boost taxes on the rich and do away with corporate tax breaks.

Petro has also said he wants to start peace talks

with remaining rebel groups that are currently fighting over drug routes, gold mines and other resources abandoned by the FARC after their peace deal with the government.

"He's got a very ambitious agenda," said Yan Basset, a political scientist at Bogota's Rosario University. "But he will have to prioritise. The risk Petro faces is that he goes after too many reforms at once and gets nothing" through Colombia's congress.

At least 10 heads of state are expected to attend Petro's inauguration, which will take place at a large colonial-era square in front of Colombia's Congress. Stages with live music and big screens will also be placed in parks across Bogota's city centre so that tens of thousands of citizens without invitations to the main event can also join in the festivities. That's a big change for Colombia where previous presidential inaugurations were more sombre events limited to a few hundred VIP guests.

"We want the Colombian people to be the protagonists," Petro's press chief, Marisol Rojas, said in a statement. "This inauguration will be the first taste of a new form of governing, where all forms of life are respected, and where everyone fits in."

Role of race contested in killing of Nigerian man in Italy

AP - Two marches Saturday in a well-to-do Italian Adriatic beach town both sought justice in the brutal daylight killing of a Nigerian man at the hands of an Italian stranger but were divided by one word: Racism.

One march by Nigerians living in Italy's Macerata province was led by victim Alika Ogorchukwu's tearful widow and joined by two of his brothers. Organizers of that march said they did not want the search for justice to be clouded by accusations of racism that they feel cannot be proven.

The second march, along the same route an hour later, was led by Black Italians from all over Italy who demanded that Italian authorities reverse themselves and recognize the role that race played in the July 29 killing.

"Not naming racism won't help us understand how to defeat it. Because racism exists in Italy," Selam Tesfaye, a Milan-based immigrant activist, told the second crowd of about 100 people. "If someone in Civitanova wants to explain why this is not racism, we are here."

A widely circulated video shows the Italian man wrestling Ogorchukwu to the ground and strangling him. One man's voice can be heard shouting for the attacker to stop, but no onlookers intervened physically, adding a layer of public outrage over their apparent indifference.

Police arrested an Italian suspect, Filippo Ferlazzo, 32, but quickly ruled out a racial motivation for the attack. The finding was confirmed by prosecutors who did not include racial motivation in the charge sheet, according to Ferlazzo's lawyer, Roberta Bizzarri.

According to police, Ferlazzo first struck Ogorchukwu with a crutch the vendor used after pursuing the Nigeri-

an 200 metres (yards) down a shopping street lined with high-end boutiques. Some accounts said Ogorchukwu had complimented Ferlazzo's companion while trying to make a sale or ask for spare change. Others said he had touched the companion's arm.

Townspeople have accepted the official version of events, attributing the Nigerian man's death to an insistent street-seller unfortunately clashing with a man who has a court-documented history of mental illness.

"This is not a racist city," newsstand owner Domenico Giordano said. "This is an open city. If you behave well, you are welcomed and even helped."

People have left flowers and condolences on the sidewalk where Ogorchukwu was killed, in front of a beachwear boutique that was closed for lunch at the time. Store owner

Laura Latino said she has received negative comments from as far away as Houston, accusing her of standing by and doing nothing when she wasn't even there.

"Be careful about judging a city of 45,000 people," Latino said, adding that false rumours were "ruining the reputation of the city."

City officials have expressed concerns that the killing was being politicised ahead of Italy's early parliamentary election on Sept. 25.

Samuel Kunoun, a Nigerian union activist who organised the march with the victim's family, said he does not believe the attack was racially motivated. Still, the role of race in the case is so charged that he kept the word "racism" off banners in the march that attracted 200 people, mostly Nigerians.

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Four cargo ships sail from Ukraine: Turkish, Ukrainian officials

AlJazeera - Four ships carrying Ukrainian food-stuffs sailed from Ukrainian Black Sea ports as part of a deal to unblock the country's sea exports, Ukrainian and Turkish officials said.

The four bulk carriers were loaded with almost 170,000 tonnes of corn and other foodstuffs, the Ukrainian Sea Ports Authority (USPA) said on Facebook on Sunday.

The resumption of grain exports is being overseen by a Joint Coordination Centre (JCC) in Istanbul, where Russian, Ukrainian, Turkish and United Nations personnel are working.

The UN and Turkey brokered the deal last month after UN warnings of possible outbreaks of famine in parts of the world due to a halt in grain shipments from Ukraine that had squeezed supplies and sent prices soaring.

On Saturday, a foreign-flagged ship arrived in Ukraine for the first time since the war started in February to be loaded with grain, Infrastructure Min-

ister Oleksandr Kubrakov said.

"We are gradually moving on to larger volumes of work. We plan to ensure the ability of the ports to handle at least 100 vessels per month in the near future," he said on Facebook on Sunday.

He said Ukraine planned to soon involve Pivdennyi port in the implementation of the grain export initiative and expected that as a result, Ukraine will be able to ship up to at least 3 million tonnes of goods a month.

Before Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine on February 24, Russia and Ukraine together accounted for nearly a third of global wheat exports. Russia calls its action in Ukraine a "special military operation".

The JCC said late on Saturday it had authorised the departure of a total of five new vessels through the Black Sea corridor: four vessels outbound from Chornomorsk and Odesa carrying 161,084 metric tonnes of foodstuffs, and one inbound.

The ships that have left Ukrainian ports included Glory, with a cargo of 66,000 tonnes of corn bound for Istanbul, and Riva Wind, loaded with 44,000 tonnes of corn, heading for Turkey's Iskenderun, the Turkish defence ministry said.

"We don't have to mix it with racism. What happened is that someone who is not normal killed our fellow Nigerian," Kunoun said. "We want this boy to pay for what he has done, to be in prison for life. That is our justice."

But a manifesto for the second march, billed as Italy's first-ever organised by Black Italians, lists the recognition of the role of race in Ogorchukwu's killing as chief among 11 demands. Some 30 organisations said they would seek to join the prosecution as civil complainants.

Ogorchukwu's widow, Charity Oriakhi, is reluctant to say the killing was racially motivated.

"It is just someone who is wicked,"

Oriakhi told The Associated Press.

She said both she and her husband had always felt welcome in Italy and that he never recounted negative interactions when he was out selling.

The Nigerian government has condemned Ogorchukwu's death and its foreign ministry has urged Italian authorities to "bring the perpetrator of the heinous act to book without delay."

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Suddenly consistent Kyrgios moves into Citi Open final

AP - Nick Kyrgios found the consistency that has long eluded him, reaching a second consecutive tournament final for the first time in his career with a 7-6 (4), 6-3 victory over Mikael Ymer at the Citi Open on Saturday night.

Kyrgios, the runner-up at Wimbledon to Novak Djokovic, has adjusted well to the hot, humid conditions at this hard-court U.S. Open tuneup. He won an uncharacteristic 24-shot rally on Ymer's serve to go ahead 5-4 in the first-set tiebreak and served it out from there.

In the second set, Kry-

gios secured the only service break of the match on a cross-court half-volley from no-man's land to move ahead 5-3.

"He's an incredible athlete and I really wasn't expecting him to be that fast," Kyrgios said. "Maybe next time I might have a couple different tactics when I play him, maybe not to try and out-rally him, maybe come forward a little bit more. But it was a tough-fought semifinal and I'm just happy to be in the final once again."

The 27-year-old Australian is No. 63 in the rankings but would move to 37th if he takes the title on Sunday. Kyrgios won at Washington in 2019, the most recent of his six ATP titles.

In the final, Kyrgios will face a surprising opponent in 96th-ranked Yoshihito Nishioka, who ousted top-seeded and eighth-ranked Andrey Rublev 6-3, 6-4.

Manchester United must let Ronaldo leave, says Rooney

Reuters - Former Manchester United forward Wayne Rooney believes that the club must let Cristiano Ronaldo leave if they are to build a successful team for the future under new manager Erik ten Hag.

The 37-year-old Ronaldo, who resigned for United from Juventus last season, reportedly wants a move away from Old Trafford after the team's failure to qualify for the Champions League.

"I think United should let Cristiano Ronaldo go. It's not that Ronaldo can't play in a Ten Hag team. He can play in any team," Rooney, who now manages Major League Soccer side DC United, wrote in a column for the Times newspaper.

"Ronny will always score you goals. But my personal view is that

United aren't ready to challenge for the title now, so the aim has to be to build a team that can win the league in the next three to four years, and you have to plan for that."

Ronaldo netted 24 times in all competitions last season, emerging as one of the few bright sparks in an otherwise forgettable campaign for United that saw them finish sixth.

Ten Hag this week said he was happy to have a "top striker" like Ronaldo in the squad and looking forward to working with him.

Rooney, who is United's all-time leading scorer, added he was hopeful that Ten Hag would be able to establish a clear playing style at his former club.

"I couldn't work out what they were trying to do in terms of game plan, or

see any patterns of play," Rooney said of last season.

"I think one of the big things you'll see from Ten Hag is him really trying to put his stamp on the playing identity."

United kicked off their Premier League campaign at home to Brighton & Hove Albion yesterday.

India facing football ban over 'deviations' from FIFA 'roadmap'

AlJazeera - FIFA has reminded India's football association that it risks losing the upcoming Under-17 Women's World Cup and faces a ban due to "deviations" from an agreed road map aimed at sorting out governance issues.

In May, India's highest court disbanded the All India Football Federation (AIFF) and appointed a three-member committee to govern the sport, amend the AIFF's constitution and conduct elections that have been pending for 18 months.

In response, football's world governing body FIFA

and the Asian Football Confederation (AFC) sent a

team, led by AFC General Secretary Windsor John, to meet stakeholders in Indian football and laid down a road map for the AIFF to amend its statutes by the end of July and subsequently conclude elections at the latest by September 15.

This week, the Indian court ordered elections to be held promptly and said the elected committee would be an interim body for a period of three months.

"As per the said roadmap, the AIFF was to call for a special general assembly in the first week of August 2022 to approve the new statutes worked upon with FIFA, the AFC and the Indian football community," a letter sent by FIFA and AFC said.


"Unfortunately, we have been informed that the Supreme Court's hearing held yesterday on the situation of the AIFF allegedly resulted in deviations to the aforementioned roadmap.

"If this is considered to be true, it would irrefutably jeopardise the mutual understanding which was displayed so far on the steps forward."

The letter, seen by Reuters news agency, was addressed to acting AIFF general secretary Sunando Dhar and signed by FIFA secretary general Fatma Samoura and AFC's John.

It asked the Indian body to provide a transcript of the court's decision by Tuesday.

FIFA warned that sanctions, if serious deviations to the agreed road map were found, could include "the suspension of the AIFF and the withdrawal of the hosting rights for the 2022 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup in India [in October]".

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Lewis hopes schools cricket will produce more LI female players

President of the Leeward Islands Cricket Board (LICB) Enoch Lewis said he is hoping schools programme will be able to produce more female players for the territory.

But Lewis, who first took over as president of the LICB in 2016 and was re-elected on a new two year-term at the organization's 7th Annual General Meeting (AGM) in Antigua on Saturday, 9th July, is cognizant of the small pool of players that is currently available from which to select the regional representative teams.

While admitting that some territories are struggling to organize men's cricket, Lewis said schools programmes can be a source of unearthing new female players for the Leewards senior and Under-19 teams.

"Even some of those territories are struggling to maintain a men's cricket programme so to ask them to add a women's programme is a challenge. We have asked, but is it realistic?

"The pool is small, but we are not going to sit on our hands and say nothing can happen. We are going to keep pushing," Lewis stated.

"What I am encouraged by is the fact that we have now started an Under-19 female tournament. We sent a team to the recent West Indies Under-19 women's tournament and we are hoping that female cricket can be expanded in the schools, which means that we would be producing players coming out of the schools as a feeder system to our Under-19 and senior women teams."

The United States played unbeaten to win this year's inaugural CWI Women's Rising Stars Under-19 Championship, which was hosted in Trinidad & Tobago from 5th to 13th July.

Barbados successfully defended their CG United Senior Women's Su-

per50 Cup title in June this year. The Bajans won their third consecutive 50-over title after they narrowly missed out on also taking the T20 Blaze crown, which was captured by Jamaica in the 7th to 25th June tournaments in Guyana.

It was the third title in a row for the Bajans who also won back in competitions in 2018 and 2019. There were no tournaments in 2020 and 2021 due to the COVID-19 Pandemic.

The Leeward Islands joined the West Indies domestic structure in 2016, playing in the Regional Women's Championship and the Regional Women's Twenty20 Championship. They finished bottom of their group in both competitions.

The side have competed in every 50-over and T20 competition since, but have yet to win a match, finishing bottom of the league every season.

In 2019, Leeward Islands captain Shawnisha Hector became the first Antiguan female cricketer to play for the West Indies.

Although admitting that winning is not everything, Lewis said the LICB will be seeking to provide the players will proper coaching to help improve their performance in next year's tournaments.

"But we are not sitting down and doing nothing. Now that we have the players, we are going to continue to work in the territories," Lewis stated.

"We produced world class players such as Sir Viv (Richards), Sir Andy (Roberts), Sir Richie (Richardson) and Sir Curtly (Ambrose) and you would realize, they started after everybody else, but as they played for a period of time, they eventually caught up and pass some of those players who were already established.

"I expect the same thing to happen with our female players. In the short four years that we now have been playing, we have developed Shawnisha Hector who was a contracted player for the West Indies and she actually played for the West Indies and so as long as we are making progress, winning games by itself is not everything, but once we can produce players that eventually get to the West Indies team, we can see some light at the end of the tunnel.

ABFA to host Under-15 Girls Invitational Tournament

The Antigua and Barbuda Football Association (ABFA) will be hosting an Under-15 Girls Invitational tournament, starting this weekend.

The Jewels of the Caribbean 2022 Girls Under-15 Invitational Tournament will involve six teams with matches being hosted at the ABFA's Technical Center at Paynters from Saturday, 13th August to Sunday, 21st August.

Chairman of the AB-FA's Competition's Committee, National Technical Director Sowerby Gomes, said the competition will involve several Caribbean teams, which were unable to participate in the recent group stage of the 2022 Concacaf Girls' Under-15 Championship in the United States.

Gomes said the five Caribbean teams will converge in Antigua for the invitational tournament after they were unable to get the required visas to enter the United States to participate in the developmental tournament, which featured 19 Concacaf member associations and Wales (invited guest), from 31st July to 7th August at the Hillsborough County Tournament Sportsplex in Tampa, Florida.

"We are going to be putting on an Under-15 tournament very shortly here in Antigua in which we will

have several female teams from the Caribbean participating," Gomes said.

"We will have teams from Grenada, St Lucia, St Vincent, Trinidad and Dominica coming to join Antigua in this tournament. We are doing what we call a six-team tournament which is going to spread out over an eight-day period.

"It is going to be very exciting right here in Antigua. We are hoping that we can keep all of our Under-15 girls engaged because we were training very hard to take part in the Concacaf Under-15 Tournament.

"But unfortunately, were had some problems getting the visas for players of all these six team to enter the United States so we were not able to participate due to visa issues.

"What really happened is that Antigua and Barbuda has been preparing for the Concacaf tournament in July 2022 and we were giving visas appointments to appear at the US Embassy sometime in 2023.

"Quite a number of the other Caribbean teams were similarly affected so all those affected teams decided we are going to come together and put on a little tournament here in Antigua to ensure that we are not missing out in terms of competition, and at the same time, boost the morale and confidence of the players who would have been disappointed with being unable to play in the Concacaf Under-15 tournament in the United States.

"So we are hoping that this tournament in Antigua will bring back that level of competitiveness within the girls."

The Jewels of the Caribbean 2022 Girls Under-15 Invitational Tournament will be contested with triple headers on each match day with games slated for 3pm, 5pm and 7pm at the ABFA's Technical Center.

The competitions will kick-off on Saturday, 13 August, with three opening round matches. St Lucia will face St Vincent at 3pm, Dominica will tackle Grenada at 5pm and host Antigua and Barbuda will clash with Trinidad & Tobago at 7pm.
