### Antigua and Barbuda hosts AOSIS meeting

The Association of Small Islands States (AO-SIS) is entering the second of a two-day conference in St. John's to finalise the Wadadli Action Plan (WAP), an initiative that will, among other things, set the groundwork for the 4th International Conference on Small Island States which will also be held in Antigua and Barbuda.

Attending the conference are representatives of AOSIS member states, government officials,partner countries, regional organisations and members of the private sector and civil society.

Speaking at Monday's opening ceremony, Antigua and Barbuda's Foreign Affairs Minister, E. P. Chet Greene, the chairman of AOSIS, told delegates that these are unprecedented times for small island developing states which have been confronted with seemingly never ending challenges.

"We still live in a world where inequality is on the rise, acute poverty and indigence coexist with extreme greed and wealth.

"We live in a world where global economic shocks are frequent and hardest felt in our small states and where recovery takes decades while in de-

He noted that wars and conflicts around the world are having a negative impact on small island states.

"We live in a world where war and threats of war that are far removed from our shores can drive up energy and food prices within our islands.

"We live in a world where global temperatures

continue to rise, weather systems are more intense, unusual, and unpredictable and where some of our islands are facing extreme drought and where in the blink of an eye can also face extreme flooding," he emphasised.

The minister warned his colleagues that failure to act coupled with continued lack of attention from the international community would spell human and environmental disasters where small island states will be the first ones to suffer the consequences.

Delivering the keynote address, President of the Caribbean Development Bank, Dr. Hyginus Leon, noted that the meeting is being held against the backdrop of last week's Emancipation Day celebrations and Jamaica's celebration of 60 years of political independence.

"One of the architects of that independence, Norman Manley, declared that it was the mission of his generation to win self-government and political power, but the task of future generations would be to reconstruct social and economic systems of society to achieve financial independence," he recalled.

He added that the meeting, and its timing, bring into sharp focus the fact that the region's collective history and indeed its present, have been marked by progress through struggle.

"The issues on our conference agenda -including access to finance, debt sustainability, the need for equitable measurement mechanisms for vulnerability and resilience, climate action, and access to information for decision making - are pertinent to advancing the causes of this generation and lessening the burden for future generations," he urged.

He commended AOSIS for playing a leadership role in convening small states and acting as champion advocate in the international arena.

The Government of Antigua and Barbuda, as Chair of the Alliance of Small Island States, is hosting the two-day meeting of the Wadadli Action Platform which concludes today at the Sir John E. St. Luce Conference Centre on Factory Road.

Facing a lawsuit over its alleged inability to pay deposits to two of its clients, Global Bank of Commerce says its integrity and reputation remain intact.

The bank took the unusual decision to respond to an "article and related reports in a local online news portal, and subsequent public remarks, concerning a legal matter between the Bank and one of its customers".

While they did not directly address the genesis of the matter that has landed them in court, Global Bank of Commerce's management and board of directors chose to focus on their four decades of operation and being in compliance with Antigua and Barbuda's regulatory standards governing the banking sector.

"While the matter is before the Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court and is therefore, sub judice, we wish to assure the public that the integrity of our institution and its 40-year long-standing participation and contribution to the international banking

sector remain fully intact and in good standing, as regulated by the Financial Services Regulatory Commission (FSRC)."

It continued." We confirm that our Bank is managed and operated independent of any local domestic commercial bank in Antigua and Barbuda, and any public assertions to the contrary is misleading and incorrect. We further confirm that no domestic commercial bank in the state of Antigua and Barbuda is connected in any way to the above referenced legal

matter".

The bank has apologized to its customers for the inconvenience they may be experiencing as a result of the information that was posted by several news portals and has given the assurances that they continue to operate as normal.

Filed in the High Court of Justice, the defendants are claiming in their lawsuit millions of dollars in deposits made, which they argue the financial institution has failed to or refuse to pay out.

A lightning strike at an oil tanker facility in Cuba has caused more than 100 deaths, scores of injuries and at least 70 people remain missing.

Antiguan and Barbudan students who have studied in Cuba have expressed their deep sorrow over the recent tragedy in the north Caribbean island that left over 100 people dead.

Last weekend, an oil tank explosion in the industrial zone of the city of Matanzas left several people injured and scores more dead.

More than 70 people remain missing following the explosion which Cuban me-



dia reports state was started by a lightning strike.

On Monday, a statement from the Cuban embassy in Antigua and Barbdua said, "Those of us in Antigua and Barbuda, who have studied in Cuba, as beneficiaries of the phenomenal generosity and unequalled internationalism of the Cuban revolution, are deeply saddened by the recent tragic events in your country.

"We can only imagine the pain and the grief, and express our solidarity with you, as we find it so unfair that fate has chosen to be so unkind to so charitable a people, already suffering from the long sustained cruelty imposed by a powerful external force,"

It continued, "Though we know that you are an extremely resilient people, we do hope that in this moment of tragedy and extraordinary technical challenge, not only will those to whom you have extended generosity respond in kind, but that those who have subjected you to criminal deprivation and undeserved hostility, might find it in their hearts to relent and let justice prevail."

Yesterday, CARICOM also issued a statement expressing condolences over the tragedy in Cuba and extended offers of the grouping support as the nation seeks to recover.

## Parenting Nine steps to more effective parenting

toughest and most fulfilling jobs in the world - and the one for which you might feel the least prepared.

These 9 child-rearing tips can help you feel more fulfilled as a parent.

1. Boost Your Child's Self-Esteem

Kids start developing their sense of self as babies when they see themselves through their parents' eyes. Your tone of voice, your body language, and your every expression are absorbed by your kids. Your words and actions as a parent affect their developing self-esteem more than anything else.

Praising accomplishments, however small, will make them feel proud; letting kids do things independently will make them feel capable and strong. By contrast, belittling comments or comparing a child unfavourably with another will make kids feel worthless.

Avoid making loaded statements or using words as weapons. Comments like "What a stupid thing to do!" or "You act more like a baby than your little brother!" cause damage just as physical blows do.

Choose your words carefully and be compassionate. Let your kids know that everyone makes mistakes and that you still love them, even when you don't love their behaviour.

2. Catch Kids Being Good

Have you ever stopped to think about how many

Raising kids is one of the times you react negatively to your kids in a given day? You may find yourself criticising far more often than complimenting. How would you feel about a boss who treated you with that much negative guidance, even if it was well-intentioned?

The more effective approach is to catch kids doing something right: "You made your bed without being asked - that's terrific!" or "I was watching you play with your sister and you were very patient." These statements will do more to encourage good behaviour over the long run than repeated scoldings.

Make a point of finding something to praise every day. Be generous with rewards — your love, hugs, and compliments can work wonders and are often reward enough. Soon you will find you are "growing" more of the behaviour you would like to see.

3. Set Limits and Be Consistent With Your Discipline

Discipline is necessary in every household. The goal of discipline is to help kids choose acceptable behaviours and learn self-control. They may test the limits you establish for them, but they need those limits to grow into responsible adults.

Establishing house rules helps kids understand your expectations and develop self-control. Some rules might include: no TV until homework is done, and no hitting, name-calling, or hurtful teasing allowed.



You might want to have a system in place: one warning, followed by consequences such as a "time out" or loss of privileges. A common mistake parents make is failure to follow through with the consequences. You can't discipline kids for talking back one day and ignore it the next. Being consistent teaches what you expect.

4. Make Time for Your Kids

It's often hard for parents and kids to get together for a family meal, let alone spend quality time together. But there is probably nothing kids would like more. Get up 10 minutes earlier in the morning so you can eat breakfast with your child or leave the dishes in the sink and take a walk after dinner. Kids who aren't getting the attention they want from their parents often act out or misbehave because they're sure to be noticed that way.

Many parents find it rewarding to schedule together time with their kids. Create a "special night" each week to be together and let your kids help decide how to spend the time. Look for other ways

to connect - put a note or something special in your kid's lunchbox.

Teens seem to need less undivided attention from their parents than younger kids. Because there are fewer windows of opportunity for parents and teens to get together, parents should do their best to be available when their teen does express a desire to talk or participate in family activities. Attending concerts, games, and other events with your teen communicates caring and lets you get to know more about your child and his or her friends in important ways.

Don't feel guilty if you're a working parent. It is the many little things you do - making popcorn, playing cards, window shopping that kids will remember.

5. Be a Good Role Model

Young kids learn a lot about how to act by watching their parents. The younger they are, the more cues they take from you. Before you lash out or blow your top in front of your child, think about this: Is that how cont'd on pg 12

you want your child to behave when angry? Be aware that you're constantly being watched by your kids. Studies have shown that children who hit usually have a role model for aggression at home.

Model the traits you wish to see in your kids: respect, friendliness, honesty, kindness, tolerance. Exhibit unselfish behaviour. Do things for other people without expecting a reward. Express thanks and offer compliments. Above all, treat your kids the way you expect other people to treat you.

6. Make Communication a Priority

You can't expect kids to do everything simply because you, as a parent, "say so." They want and deserve explanations as much as adults do. If we don't take time to explain, kids will begin to wonder about our values and motives and whether they have any basis. Parents who reason with their kids allow them to understand and learn in a noniudgmental way.

Make your expectations clear. If there is a problem, describe it, express your feelings, and invite your child to work on a solution with you. Be sure to include consequences. Make suggestions and offer choices. Be open to your child's suggestions as well. Negotiate. Kids who participate in decisions are more motivated to carry them out.

7. Be Flexible and Willing to Adjust

Your Parenting Style

If you often feel "let down" by your child's behaviour, perhaps you have unrealistic expectations. Parents who think in "shoulds" (for example, "My kid should be potty-trained by now") might find it helpful to read up on the matter or to talk to other parents or child development specialists.

Kids' environments have an effect on their behaviour, so you might be able to change that behaviour by changing the environment. If you find yourself constantly saying "no" to your 2-year-old, look for ways to alter your surroundings so that fewer things are off-limits. This will cause less frustration for both of you.

As your child changes, you'll gradually have to change your parenting style. Chances are, what works with your child now won't work as well in a year or two.

Teens tend to look less to their parents and more to their peers for role models. But continue to provide guidance, encouragement, and appropriate discipline while allowing your teen to earn more independence. And seize every available moment to make a connection!

8. Show That Your Love Is Unconditional

As a parent, you're responsible for correcting and guiding your kids. But how you express your corrective guid-

ance makes all the difference in how a child receives it.

When you have to confront your child, avoid blaming, criticising, or fault-finding, which hurt self-esteem and can lead to resentment. Instead, try to nurture and encourage, even when disciplining your kids. Make sure they know that although you want and expect better next time, your love is there no matter what.

9. Know Your Own Needs and Limitations as a Parent

Face it — you are an imperfect parent. You have strengths and weaknesses as a family leader. Recognize your abilities - "I am loving and dedicated." Vow to work on your weaknesses — "I need to be more consistent with discipline."

Try to have realistic expectations for yourself, your partner, and your kids. You don't have to have all the answers — be forgiving of yourself.

And try to make parenting a manageable job. Focus on the areas that need the most attention rather than trying to address everything all at once. Admit it when you're burned out. Take time out from parenting to do things that will make you happy.

Focusing on your needs does not make you selfish. It simply means you care about your own well-being, which is another important value to model for your children.

# Study connects climate hazards to 58% of infectious diseases

Climate hazards such as flooding, heat waves and drought have worsened more than half of the hundreds of known infectious diseases in people, including malaria, hantavirus, cholera and anthrax, a study says.

Researchers looked through the medical literature of established cases of illnesses and found that 218 out of the known 375 human infectious diseases, or 58%, seemed to be made worse by one of 10 types of extreme weather connected to climate change, according to a study in Monday's journal Nature Climate Change.

The study mapped out 1,006 pathways from the climate hazards to sick people. In some cases downpours and flooding sicken people through disease-carrying mosquitoes, rats and deer.

There are warming oceans and heat waves that taint seafood and other things we eat and droughts that bring bats carrying viral infections to people.

Doctors, going back to Hippocrates, have long connected disease to weather, but this study shows how widespread the influence of climate is on human health.

"If climate is changing, the risk of these diseases are changing," said study co-author Dr. Jonathan Patz, director of the Global Health Institute at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Doctors, such as Patz, said they need to think of the diseases as symptoms of a sick Earth.

"The findings of this study are terrifying and illustrate well the enormous consequences of climate change on human pathogens," said Dr. Carlos del Rio, an Emory University infectious disease specialist, who was not part of the study. "Those of us in in-

fectious diseases and microbiology need to make climate change one of our priorities, and we need to all work together to prevent what will be without doubt a catastrophe as a result of climate change."

In addition to looking at infectious diseases, the researchers expanded their search to look at all types of human illnesses, including non-infectious sicknesses such as asthma, allergies and even animal bites to see how many maladies they could connect to climate hazards in some way, including infectious diseases.

They found a total of 286 unique sicknesses and of those 223 of them seemed to be worsened by climate hazards, nine were diminished by climate hazards and 54 had cases of both aggravated and minimised, the study found.

The new study doesn't do the calculations to attribute specific disease changes, odds or magnitude to climate change, but finds cases where extreme weather was a likely factor among many.

Study lead author Camilo Mora, a climate data analyst at the University of Hawaii, said what is important to note is that the study isn't about predicting future cases.

"There is no speculation here whatsoever," Mora said. "These are things that have already happened."

One example Mora knows firsthand. About five years ago, Mora's home in rural Colombia was flooded — for the first time in his memory water was in his living room, creating an ideal breeding ground for mosquitoes — and Mora contracted Chikungunya, a nasty virus spread by mosquito bites. And even though he survived, he still feels joint pain years later.

Sometimes climate change acts in odd ways. Mora includes the 2016 case in Siberia when a decades-old reindeer carcass, dead from anthrax, was unearthed when the permafrost thawed *cont'd on pg 15*

Olivia Newton-John, best known for playing Sandy in smash-hit musical Grease, has died aged 73, her family says.

The star died from cancer, her manager told the BBC.

Her husband John Easterling said she "passed away peacefully" at her ranch in California on Monday morning.

An actress and musician, Newton-John achieved commercial success as a country singer and sold millions of records globally.

But it was her role as high school student Sandy in the film adaptation of Grease that catapulted her to worldwide fame.

One of the most successful film musicals of all

from warming. A child touched it, got anthrax and started an outbreak.

Mora originally wanted to search medical cases to see how COVID-19 intersected with climate hazards, if at all. He found cases where extreme weather both exacerbated and diminished chances of COVID-19. In some cases, extreme heat in poor areas had people congregate together to cool off and get exposed to the disease, but in other situations, heavy downpours reduced COVID spread because people stayed home and indoors, away from others.

Longtime climate and public health expert Kristie Ebi at the University of Washington cautioned that she

had concerns with how the conclusions were drawn and some of the methods in the study. It is an established fact that the burning of coal, oil and natural gas has led to more frequent and intense extreme weather, and research has shown that weather patterns are associated with many health issues, she said.

"However, correlation is not causation," Ebi said in an email. "The authors did not discuss the extent to which the climate hazards reviewed changed over the time period of the study and the extent to which any changes have been attributed to climate change."

But Dr. Aaron Bernstein, interim director of the Center for Climate, Health, and the Global Environment at Harvard School of Public Health, Emory's del Rio and three other outside experts said the study is a good warning about climate and health for now and the future. Especially as global warming and habitat loss push animals and their diseases closer to humans, Bernstein said.

"This study underscores how climate change may load the dice to favour unwelcome infectious surprises," Bernstein said in an email. "But of course it only reports on what we already know and what's yet unknown about pathogens may be yet more compelling about how preventing further climate change may prevent future disasters like COVID-19."

Laboule is close to the town of Pelerin, where President Jovenel Moïse was assassinated in July last year.

Buissereth, director of Haiti's Public Company for the Promotion of Social Housing, and his nephew

were travelling in a government-issued vehicle and were found inside the charred car. According to Lafontant a gang that is trying to control the area is likely to blame.

The Ti Makak gang, which means "Little Macaques," is fighting with the Toto gang over control of the area.

Gangs in the capital of Port-au-Prince and beyond have become more powerful and waged violent turf wars since Moïse was assassinated.

Prime Minister Ariel Henry condemned Buissereth's killing as a "barbaric act" by armed gangs in Laboule.

"His assassins, as well as all the other criminals who sow mourning in the country, will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law and must respond for their ignominious acts before justice," the prime minister said.

# Bharrat Jagdeo urges Guyanese citizens to reject "false narrative"

CMC - Vice President Dr Bharrat Jagdeo has called on citizens to reject what he called the false narrative being peddled by the opposition and other anti-government voices that the government is deliberately withholding pay increases for public servants.

Speaking at a recent community meeting, on the West Bank Demerara, the Vice President reminded that it is the same AP-NU+AFC Coalition government that took away the one-month tax-free bonus from the joint services, which the PPP/C administration has since re-implemented.

According to Jagdeo, it was the PPP/C Government that redeemed the public service from a pauperized state, "...but they can only say that for people who do not know the history of this country or who are not aware of and we need to stand up to this sort of thing."

The vice president added that the PPP/C administration will not allow this sort of thinking by the opposition to dictate its policies, "we have a straight and clear ideology, and we have a goal which we outlined in our manifesto."

He noted that the PPP/C has committed to providing citizens with world-class education and healthcare, providing job opportunities, and ensuring their safety, and the administration has since embarked on that journey over the two years since returning to office.

The vice president said the development taking place offshore will secure close to 3,000 jobs for residents on the West Coast Demerara, referencing the largest privately-owned

wharf, as well as the government's investment in the construction of the New Demerara River Crossing and the opening up of lands for the construction of some 14, 000 house lots in the region, among several other major projects.

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The vice president added that the government has been making significant investments in the country despite the pandemic. He said this is happening even though a large number of persons were laid off around the world, in Guyana, public servants continued to receive their salaries.

The EOM, led by the former prime minister of Jamaica, Bruce Golding, congratulated the people of St. Kitts and Nevis on their "peaceful and responsible participation in the general elections."

The EOM comprised 11 experts and observers from nine countries – three of whom worked virtually.

On election day, the OAS said the team was present in all of 11 constituencies of St. Kitts and Nevis and visited 100 percent of the 128 established polling stations. The voters' list provided by the Electoral Office indicated that 50,933 persons were eligible to vote – 38,015 voters in St. Kitts and 12,918 voters in Nevis, said the EOM in a statement.

It said members of the mission observed the process from the opening of the polling stations to the closing of polls and reported that the day proceeded in a "generally orderly and peaceful manner."

On Saturday, Drew was sworn in as the fourth prime minister of the twin-island federation after leading his SKNLP to victory in Friday's snap general election.

The SKNLP won six of the 11

seats contested in the election held three years ahead of the constitutional deadline, with the former coalition partners, the PLP of outgoing prime minister Dr. Timothy Harris winning one seat, the same as PAM, while the Nevis-based CCM won all three seats on the sister isle.

Governor General Sir Tapley Seaton is expected to name the four other legislators to the 15-member parliament.

Drew, a Cuban- and US-trained medical practitioner was administered the oath of office by Justice Trevor Ward in the presence of the governor general.

## **Trump says FBI raided his Florida home**

BBC - Former US President Donald Trump has said his Florida home is being raided by the FBI.

Mr Trump said in a statement Mar-a-Lago in Palm Beach was being "occupied by a large group of FBI agents".

Neither the FBI or Department of Justice have commented on the reported raid. It is unclear what might have prompted any search warrant.

Mr Trump is currently the focus of a congressional inquiry into last year's US Capitol riot.

According to CNN, Mr Trump was in Trump Tower in New York City at the time of Monday's reported raid.

"These are dark times for our Nation," Mr Trump's

He said he had cooperated with all relevant government agencies and so the "unannounced raid on my home was not necessary or appropriate".

Mr Trump said it

"Such an assault could it only take place in broken, Third-World Countries," he said.

"Sadly, America has now become one of those countries, corrupt at a level not seen before.

# Russia halts US inspections of nuclear arsenal under New START treaty

BBC - Russia has told the US it has "temporarily" suspended on-site inspections of its strategic nuclear weapons, under an arms control treaty known as New START.

The Russian foreign ministry said the US was seeking advantages and had deprived Russia of the right to carry out inspections on US territory.

It said US sanctions imposed on Russia over Ukraine had changed conditions between the countries.

The treaty came into force in 2011.

It is the last remaining arms reduction agreement between the former Cold War rivals. It caps at 1,550 the number of long-range nuclear warheads that each country can deploy.

The ministry said the suspension was allowed under the treaty terms "in exceptional circumstances".

The suspension comes a week after US President Joe Biden said he was ready to work on a new nuclear arms deal with President Vladimir Putin. The current one will expire in 2026.

# Mexico to send aquatic drone into shaft with trapped miners

AP - Mexico will attempt to send an aquatic drone into a collapsed coal mine where 10 miners have been trapped since last week.

Laura Velázquez, national Civil Defense coordinator, said Monday that images from the drone could help authorities decide whether to send in divers without putting them at risk.

She also said that 25 pumps were working to remove water from the flooded shafts. Water that was once 111 feet (34 metres) deep was now between 55 and 78 feet (17 and 26 metres) deep.

The mine in Sabinas, Coahuila about 70 miles southwest of Eagle Pass, Texas, collapsed last Wednesday with 15 miners inside. Five managed to escape with injuries. Authorities say the miners breached a neighbouring space filled with water. There has been no contact with the remaining 10.

The miners' families are desperate and some complained Sunday that President Andrés Manuel

López Obrador gave them little information when he visited the site.

"I appreciate that he has come to take a photo with my pain, the pain of my family and the pain of everyone of us here," said Lucía Rodríguez, mother of one of the miners, in a video circulated on social media. "I hope that his photographs serve his policy well."

The president said that as a public servant you have to be willing "to always pay the tax of humiliation," but that his conscience is clear because the rescue teams arrived to the site in two hours and have been working day and night to rescue the miners.

The state and federal prosecutor's offices have opened investigations to determine those responsible for the accident. Such small mines are often the result of locals who get concessions and then contract teams of miners. Experts say they seldom have the safety plans and equipment necessary to reduce the risk of accidents.

In June and July of 2021, cave-ins at two Coahuila mines claimed the lives of nine miners.

Mexico's worst mining accident also occurred in Coahuila on Feb. 19, 2006, when an explosion ripped through the Pasta de Conchos mine while 73 miners were inside. Eight were rescued with injuries including serious burns. The rest died and only two of their bodies were recovered.

López Obrador's administration promised two years ago to recover the remaining 63 bodies, a highly technical endeavour that has still not begun.

We wish her all the success possible in her future endeavours."

Courtney Walsh, West Indies Women's Head Coach said, "Deandra is one of the most athletic and dynamic players in the history of Women's cricket and I want to take this opportunity to congratulate her on what has been 14 years of performance excellence for the West Indies.During my time as Head Coach I have been able to see her brilliance up close on the field, and she always gave it everything."

Dottin made her international debut in Ireland in June 2008 and was a fixture in the team in both One-Day Internationals and T20 Internationals since.

She played 143 ODIs and 124 T20Is for West Indies. She is a three-dimensional player as a powerful



batter, brisk medium-fast bowler and livewire in the outfield, which enabled her to quickly rise to be rated among the best all rounders in the history of the women's game.

In One Day Internationals (ODIs) she made 3,727 runs, with a topscore of 150 not out and took 72 wickets with best figures of 5-34. In T20 Internationals (T20Is) she made 2,681 runs with two memorable centuries and also took 62 wickets with best figures of 5-5. Her finest hour came when she was part of the West Indies team which defeated Australia to win the ICC Women's T20 World Cup title in Kolkata in April 2016.

She also had one of the most memorable feats in cricket history which catapulted her to stardom when she made her maiden T20I century – 112 not out off 45 balls against South Africa in St. Kitts in the ICC Women's T20 World Cup 2010.

### India beats West Indies by 88 runs in T20 match in Florida

India's spinners put on a show in Florida to take all 10 wickets in an 88run win over West Indies in the fifth and final Twenty20 cricket international on Sunday.

India leaves with two wins in two matches, and a 4-1 victory overall in the series. The first three matches were held in the West Indies.

India scored 188-7 after choosing to bat first before skittling West Indies for 100 all out in 15.4 overs. Only No. 4 Shimron Hetmyer with 56 runs off 35 balls provided any resistance before falling to Indian spinner Ravi Bishnoi, who took four wickets for 16 runs in 2.4 overs.

Hetmyer scored his fastest T20 international half-century in 28 balls, one delivery quicker than his previous best. He hit five fours and four sixes in his innings.

Axar Patel had 3-15 in three overs and Kuldeep Yadav 3-12 in four.

India earlier reached 53-1 in powerplay and 95-1 after 10 overs. Opener Shreyas Iyer top scored for India with a 40-ball 64 which included eight fours and two sixes before he was caught and bowled by Jason Holder. Deepak Hooda hit 38 off 25.

Williams then saved a break point of her own, before finally taking the set on another smash at the net.

Although her serve and movement were not at their best, she produced some superb defence to save another breakpoint and keep the second set on serve.

That continued into a 25-minute service game that saw nine deuces, with Williams somehow coming through to hold before breaking Parrizas Diaz in the next game.

After converting her first match point, Williams congratulated her 31-yearold opponent, telling her she "played really well" before acknowledging the crowd.

The Toronto competition is one of several warm-up events for the US Open, which begins on 29 August.

Wimbledon champion Elena Rybakina and Simona Halep also advanced on the opening day's play.
