PM Browne scoffs at UPP "bribery" claims

St. John's City West MP, Gaston Browne, has rubbished claims by the opposition United Progressive Party (UPP) that he was bribing constituents for their support last Thursday.

The UPP's Alister Thomas said Browne's donations to UPP supporters during their "Small Business Pull-up" activity was an attempt to win over their supporters through nefarious means.

Browne, who is highly active on social media, responded to the accusation on his personal Facebook page.

"They bought \$5 drinks for their supporters. I gave my supporters money to buy their drinks. Their \$5 gift is morally acceptable, but according to their false logic, my gift constitutes a 'bribe', Browne said.


"Tell them UPP losers, laggards and charlatans, get a blasted life," to which he added, "The latter is a mild

version of what I would really like to tell them."

Elections in Antigua and Barbuda are constitutionally due by March, 2023, however, it is believed that Prime Minister Browne, whose Antigua Barbuda Labour Party continues to enjoy a considerable lead over the main opposition UPP, will likely call elections well before the deadline.

Trade Minister calls for national embrace of quality and standards concepts

Trade Minister E. P. Chet Greene is pushing for Antigua and Barbuda to fully adopt the principles of quality standards.

Speaking at the launch of the National Quality Awards Programme on Monday at the Antigua and Barbuda Hospitality Training Institute (ABH-TI) at Dutchman's Bay, Greene said incorporating these principles in all facets of life will go a long way in helping the country

achieve the goal of becoming an economic power-house.

In support of his position, Greene quoted the National Quality Awards (NQA) prepared by the Antigua and Barbuda Bureau of Standards ahead of Monday's launch.

"The National Quality Awards is a useful way of introducing and encouraging the concept and principles of quality as one of

the underlying platforms and tools for business development, service excellence and overall economic development."

He said while the ideals and principles of quality standard are not generally considered to be "fashionable or popular", they remain of critical importance as they build upon the sub-structures of said. the society.

"It's about empowering micro-businesses, ensuring that there are standards and quality attached to everything they do, and to ensure that at the end of the day, Antigua and Barbuda is identified as a country where you find standards and quality. That to me is the ultimate," he

Greene noted that it is imperative that Antigua and Barbuda fall into compliance as countries across the region are conducting similar exercises.

CARIFORUM has also given a commitment that within the grouping, there will also be full compliance.

"It is not Antigua and


Barbuda alone doing this one.

"Most of the countries in this part of the Caribbean thrive on tourism, so, what we are trying to achieve is to find a competitive edge, to set aside Antigua and Barbuda from the rest of the competition," he explained.

According to Greene, the Antigua and Barbuda Hotels and Tourist Association is not alone in achieving standards and quality benchmarks in the tourism industry which is vital to the nation's economy. Rather, they are concepts which all of Antigua and Barbuda must embrace.

Greene also named a NQA Committee which will be responsible for implementing a national education programme and to organise the awards activities.

The NQA committee, headed by Senator Shenella Govia, will also include ABHTA Director, Patrice Christian-Simon; Executive Director of the Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Martin Cave; Ministry of Agriculture representative, Shenneth Tonge-Roberts; UWI FIC representative, Dr. Curtis Charles; Antigua and Barbuda Investment Authority representative, Jacqueline Yearwood; Ministry of Trade representatives, Petra Williams and Kyrah Carbon and Antigua and Barbuda Bureau of Standards representative, Solange Baptiste.

More arrests as efforts continue to stop items being smuggled into '1735'

Two men were sentenced yesterday for drugs which they had in their possession in and around His Majesty's Prison.

Rasheam Francis was spotted near the prison wall on 13th October by a police officer who was carrying out surveillance from a tower inside the prison.

The officer observed the defendant walking near the prison's eastern wall with a bag on his back and a mask on his face.

The cop approached Francis and searched him with his consent.

Upon doing so, he found a quantity of green, bushy substance that resembled the controlled drug cannabis.

Further analysis revealed that it was, in fact, 165 grams of marijuana.

Francis admitted to the court on Monday that he would have thrown the marijuana, valued at \$1,650,

into the prison if he had not been caught.

The defendant was ordered to pay \$5000 to the state by 30th December. Failure to pay will land him a year in prison.

Meanwhile, a convicted rapist who was found with marijuana inside of his cell was also sentenced.

Julian Morgan got three months added to his already lengthy sentence of 16 years for possession of 60 grams of cannabis.

The drugs were found inside of his pillow.

These are the latest arrests at the prison stemming from an extensive effort on the part of the government and prison's administration to eliminate conveyance.

Just last week, Soni Russell, who is serving a six-month jail sentence for wounding, was given an additional eight months for the possession of 95 grams of

A number of other individuals have been caught and penalised. The increase in the discovery of contraband is likely due to the fact that police officers are now a part of the team providing surveillance and security at the prison.

The decision to increase security at His Majesty's Prison came following a major prison raid which led to the discovery of over 60 cell phones, drugs, pots, kettles and other items.

Meanwhile, correctional officers at His Majesty's Prison protested outside of

the facility yesterday demanding that authorities settle several outstanding matters they claim are affecting the performance of their duties.

They argued they are not paid overtime and holiday pay and are made to work in unsanitary conditions.

The workers are also demanding to be made established government workers.

They also took aim at the permanent secretary with oversight of HMP, calling for her removal over her failure to address their concerns.

Acting Prison Superintendent, Jermaine Anthony, was also slammed for comments he allegedly made to the media in which he accused the institution's correctional officers of being "corrupt". The officers who staged industrial action are demanding an apology from Anthony.

Pointe Xpress made several attempts to contact the Minister of National Security, Steadroy Benjamin, for comment, however we were unable to reach him.

ABWU calculates severance owed to former Jolly Beach workers

The union representing former Jolly Beach workers has concluded in-depth discussions with the former employees of the resort who are to receive outstanding severance payments.

The Antigua and Barbuda Workers' Union met last Wednesday and Thursday with the approximately 500 former employees of the hotel to verify their outstanding severance amounts, a statement from ABWU outlined.

By Friday morning, more than two hundred peo-

ple were able to confirm the outstanding severance due

to them.

According to Deputy General Secretary, Chester Hughes, the ongoing verification exercise will ensure that all employees are paid what is rightfully theirs.

The government of Antigua and Barbuda has set aside approximately US\$5 million to pay the former employees who have been waiting for compensation since Jolly Beach Resort closed its doors in 2020.

The sale of the property to the government was to be finalised last week, paving the way for payments to begin.

Prime Minister Gaston Browne has given the assurance that the money is in an escrow account, allaying the fears of some former workers who are concerned that there will be further delays.

Jolly Beach Resort is set to reopen before the end of the year. It will be managed by Elite Island Resorts on behalf of the Government of Antigua and Barbuda.

Met Office isssues excessive heat advisory

The Antigua and Barbuda Met Office has issued an excessive heat advisory which will remain in effect until today at 3:30pm.

According to the advisory, the maximum heat index temperature is expected to be in the range of 38 to 41 °C or 100 to 106 °F. Winds will fall to less than 10mph during this time.

While the risk of heat related illnesses exists to anyone in these conditions, vulnerable individuals, including the elderly, children, the unsheltered and those



with specific medical and psychiatric conditions, are at an increased risk.

Symptoms of heat illnesses include the development of a heat rash, swelling, dizziness or fainting, headaches, vomiting, cramps, exhaustion and a loss of consciousness.

These symptoms, if left unchecked, can have severe health consequences leading to heat stroke or death. Until the advisory ends, efforts should be made to remain well hydrated and sheltered in a cool place.

Vulnerable people should be checked on often to ensure that they are not in distress.

An Antigua and Barbuda delegation recently returned from attending the Florida Caribbean Cruise Tourism Association's (FCCA) 28th annual conference in the Dominican Republic and has reported that they are "very upbeat" about the country's prospects for the upcoming cruise tourism season.

Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of the Antigua and Barbuda Tourism Authority (ABTA), Colin James, led the delegation which was composed of stakeholders from the Ministry of Tourism, The Antigua and Barbuda Port Authority, and executive members of the St. Johns Taxi Association to the 11th - 14th October conference.

"The delegation participated in high-level meetings with major players in the cruise tourism industry.

"Cruise tourism is a fast-growing component of our tourism industry.

"Since we're now ex-

periencing a strong recovery after being at a standstill due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, the staging of the conference is timely," James said.

"The upcoming winter season promises to be record-breaking for cruise arrivals; some 182,120 passengers from 108 calls are expected during the last quarter of this year with January 2023 projected to be our busiest month for the season with 79 calls and 135,810 passengers to St. Johns," he continued.

The team held meetings with executives representing over ten cruise lines as well as FCCA executives.

The Ministry of Tourism and Investment, with the ABTA, was also able to facilitate the attendance of St. John's Taxi Association president, Patrick Bennet and members Leroy Baptiste, and Sean Beazer in its meetings with the leadership of the FCCA.

The meetings were frank and productive, incorporating a presentation from the Taxi Association

As the dynamics of travel platforms continues to evolve, the discussions with each cruise line varied.


Hundreds of Antiguans and Barbudans continue to benefit from the career opportunities that Royal Caribbean and MSC cruise lines offer.

The delegation shared the news that Antigua and Barbuda has now cominstallation menced 6 Liquified Natural Gas (LNG) generators which will be deployed in April 2023. Princess Cruise Lines advised they will also be launching the 4,300 passenger Sun Princess, its first LNG vessel, which will call on St. John's in 2023.



Haitians in shock after death of singer Mikaben in Paris

Sunday to the singer Mikaben, whose sudden death during a concert in Paris left his country reeling.

The 41-year-old recording artist, whose real name is Michael Benjamin, suffered a suspected heart attack or cardiac arrest during a performance on Saturday, shocking fans who saw him collapse as he made his way off stage.

He was appearing at the 20,000-capacity Accor Arena in eastern Paris as a

Haitians paid tribute on guest of the Haitian group Carimi. He "died after suffering a seizure on stage and despite the efforts of emergency services", the venue announced on Twitter.

repeat from Saturday night. "I'm shocked by the sudden death of the young and very talented artist Michael Benjamin 'Mikaben'," the Haitian prime minister, Ariel Henry, wrote on Twitter. We have lost a major figure in Haitian music."

Haiti-born rapper Wyclef Jean, of the hip-hop group the Fugees, called him "one of the most influential and inspirational young artists of our generation", in an interview with the Miami Herald newspaper. "Rest in peace," he wrote in a tribute on Twitter, with a video showing him with Mikaben. "Gone too soon."

The former Haitian premier Jean Henry Céant echoed the praise, hailing Mikaben as "one of the most talented artists of his generation".

Netflix sets \$7 monthly price for its ad-supported service

Netflix next month will unveil the first version of its video streaming service with ads, giving cost-conscious viewers a chance to watch most of its shows at a steep discount in exchange for putting up with commercial interruptions.

The ad-supported service is scheduled to debut Nov. 3 as Netflix tries to reverse a drop in subscribers. It will cost \$7 per month in the U.S., a 55percent markdown from Netflix's most popular \$15.50-per-month plan, which is ad-free.

Netflix's ad-supported option will also be rolling out in Australia, Brazil, Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Korea, Mexico, Spain and the U.K., according to a Thursday post by the company's chief operating officer, Greg Peters.

Besides putting up with roughly four to five minutes of ads during each hour of viewing, Netflix subscribers who sign up for the cheaper service also won't be able to download

TV shows and movies to in more than a decade. watch when their devices are offline. Peters also said a "limited" amount of programming available on the commercial-free service won't be on the ad-supported version because of licensing issues.

Netflix's 15-year-old streaming service has until now been commercial free. but the Los Gatos, California, company decided to head in a new direction six months ago after reporting its first loss in subscribers

The customer erosion worsened a wrenching decline in its stock price that has wiped up more than \$200 billion in shareholder wealth during the past 11 months. The shares rallied after Thursday's announcement, but still have lost about two-thirds of their value since reaching their peak last November when the streaming service was still growing.

Through the first half of this year, Netflix lost 1.2

million subscribers, leaving it with nearly 221 million. Management in July predicted it would regain about 1 million of those subscribers during the summer months. The numbers for the July-September period are scheduled to be disclosed Tuesday.

Netflix is betting the low-priced option with ads will be particularly popular at a time that persistently high inflation is pressuring millions of households to curb their spending, particularly on discretionary items such as video streaming.

The streaming market also has become crowded with tougher competition from the likes of Amazon, Apple and Walt Disney Co., which also is preparing to offer an ad-supported version of its service soon.

er Tamara Suffren said his death was "a blow to the country" - a state mired in security and health crises.

Mikaben, son of the famed singer Lionel Benjamin, was born in the Haitian capital, Port-au-Prince, in 1981, and was well known in the local music scene as a singer, writer and producer. He featured in several Carimi hits, including Baby I Missed You and Fanm sa Move.

Smiling and thanking fans, he posted a video to his more than 1 million followers on Instagram from inside the Accor Arena on Saturday before the concert.

His wife Vanessa, who is pregnant, posted a message thanking people for their prayers but asking for privacy.

"I'm in no condition to talk. I lost my other half and have no words," she wrote.

Haiti gang blockade is causing catastrophic hunger, U.N. officials say

Reuters - Haitians are experiencing catastrophic hunger because of gangsters blockading a major fuel terminal, U.N. officials said on Friday, with more than 4 million facing acute food insecurity.

A coalition of gangs has prevented the distribution of diesel and gasoline for over a month to protest a plan to cut fuel subsidies. Most transport is halted, with looting and gang shootouts becoming increasingly common.

"We have for the first time a famine present in Haiti," Ulrika Richardson, Resident and Humanitarian Coordinator for the U.N. system in Haiti, said in a telephone interview.

"The gang violence has cut off the capital from the food-producing south, and that means that we have now an increase in food insecurity." A U.N. spokesperson later clarified that Richardson should have described the situation as catastrophic hunger rather than famine.

Richardson said other countries need to do more to support Haiti, as the Caribbean country's humanitarian response plan for this year has received less than 30percent of the required funding.

"While we address the current symptoms of the multiple crises that Haitians are facing ... the security and the fuel crisis - we also have to make sure that we invest in the longer term root causes, such as impunity, such as corruption," said Richardson, the U.N.'s most senior humanitarian official in Haiti.

Some 19,200 people in Haiti's Cite Soleil are suffering famine conditions, according to an analysis by U.N. agencies and aid groups on Friday. A famine is declared when at least 20percent of the households in

a region are suffering famine conditions.

The analysis said that in total 4.7 million people - nearly half of Haiti's population - are experiencing high levels of acute food insecurity.

The situation was "close to breaking point", Jean-Martin Bauer, World Food Program country director in Haiti, told reporters earlier.

A U.N. report released on Friday said children as young as 10 and elderly women have been subjected to sexual violence, including collective rapes for hours in front of their parents or children.

"Gangs use sexual violence to instill fear, and alarmingly the number of cases increases by the day as the humanitarian and human rights crisis in Haiti deepens," said Nada Al-Nashif, the Acting Human Rights Chief.

Prime Minister Ariel Henry last week asked for military assistance from abroad to confront the gangs, and U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres has proposed "a rapid action force" to help Haiti's police. It is not immediately evident which countries would participate in such a force.

U.S. development agency USAID on Friday sent a Disaster Assistance Response Team to Haiti, the agency's chief, Samantha Power, wrote on Twitter.

Such teams are dispatched in response to natural disasters and complex emergencies, and typically include infectious disease specialists, nutritionists, and logistics experts, according to USAID's website.

The U.S. State Department has offered support for Haiti's police and has sent a Coast Guard vessel to patrol the area.

The United States and Canada in the coming days will deliver armoured vehicles to the Haitian police that have been purchased by Haiti, U.S. Assistant Secretary of State Brian Nichols said in an interview with Haitian TV on Thursday.

Bahamas records first case of Cholera since 2017

CMC-Bahamas health high alert, monitoring our authorities confirmed a case of Cholera on the island last week, the first case recorded in 5 years. As Bahamians begin to panic the government has sought to reassure citizens that the country can handle an outbreak of cholera, should it occur.

Health and Wellness Minister Dr. Michael Darville told reporters that the case involved a 52-yearold Bahamian man in New Providence who was reported by the Ministry of Health and Wellness on Thursday.

He insisted that the man did not travel to Haiti, where there is an outbreak of the disease, but did not reveal any other details on the patient's recent travel history.

Cholera is an acute diarrheal infection caused by the ingestion of food water contaminated with the bacterium Vibrio cholera, according to the World Health Organisation (WHO). The health minister said given the new case, the ministry is working closely with the Pan American Health Organisation (PAHO) to implement additional protocols.

"The additional protocols are more closely monitoring our borders, having more healthcare, individuals in our surveillance unit, airports, ports of entry ships coming in from various different jurisdictions. It's more involved with surveillance," he said

He said that the country's healthcare facilities have the capacity to deal with cholera cases, adding "yes, we have an emergency protocol that we can activate in the event that we have cases that supersede these isolated cases. They are available not only in New Providence but also in Grand Bahama.

"And our team on the Family Islands are also on high alert. So, these are standard medical protocols that our healthcare providers have the ability to activate, in the event that we do have an outbreak."

But Dr. Darville said the population should not be alarmed at the situation, even as he urged residents to take the necessary precautions, such as using and drinking safe water and practising proper hygiene.

"I want the residents of The Bahamas to know that our neighbour is in close proximity, there's an outbreak and there's always the possibility. And so, for us in the healthcare industry, we must be mindful of what is around us and begin to prepare for any possible outbreak."

The Bahamas recorded its last case of cholera in 2017.

Brazil's da Silva, Bolsonaro clash in first one-on-one debate

AP — Brazil's former President Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva and incumbent Jair Bolsonaro clashed in their first one-on-one debate Sunday, two weeks before the presidential election's runoff.

Debates in the election's first round featured several other candidates, none of whom garnered more than 5percent of the Oct. 2 vote. During the debates, they were largely distractions from the two obvious frontrunners.

On Sunday, the two repeatedly called each other liars during an encounter lasting about 1½ hours. The term was used more than a dozen times by each of the candidates in the TV Band debate that, otherwise, was less aggressive than many analysts had expected.

"You are a liar. You lie every day," da Silva said during one exchange. Bolsonaro frequently said: "You can't come here to tell people these lies."

Earlier this month, da


Silva, who is universally known as Lula, won the election's first round with 48percent of the vote compared to Bolsonaro's 43percent.

Polls indicate the leftist former president, who governed between 2003-2010,

remains the frontrunner, though his lead has shrunk considerably.

Each candidate focused on the issues that, according to polls, represent their adversary's weak points: for Bolsonaro, the COVID-19 pandemic that killed 680,000 Brazilians, and for da Silva, corruption scandals involving his Workers' Party.

Da Silva and Bolsonaro are expected to take part in one more debate, days before the vote, on TV Globo, Brazil's most popular network.

Lawmakers will try to oust UK PM Truss this week, Daily Mail reports

Reuters - British lawmakers will try to oust Prime Minister Liz Truss this week despite Downing Street's warning that it could trigger a general election, the Daily Mail reported.

More than 100 members of parliament (MPs) belonging to the governing Conservative Party are ready to submit letters of no confidence in Truss to Graham Brady, the head of the Conservative Party's committee which organises the leadership contest, the tabloid reported, quoting unnamed sources.

Britain, engulfed in a political crisis, has lost three prime ministers since it vot-

ed to leave the European Union in 2016.

The MPs will urge Brady to tell Truss that "her time is up" or to change the political party rules to allow an immediate vote of confidence in her leadership, the report said.

Brady is said to be resisting the move, arguing that Truss, along with newly

appointed Chancellor Jeremy Hunt, deserve a chance to set out economic strategy in a budget on Oct. 31, the report added.

Separately, The Times reported that some lawmakers have held secret discussions on replacing Truss with a new leader.

Truss, who won the Conservative Party leadership last month after promising to slash taxes, is fighting for her political survival after ditching key parts of the programme.

The chaos has fuelled discontent in the party, which is falling behind the opposition Labour Party in opinion polls.

Iran Evin prison death toll jumps, state says

BBC-The death toll from a fire at Iran's notorious Evin prison has risen from four to eight, Iran's judiciary has said in a statement.

Officials said dozens more were injured in the blaze at the jail in Tehran on Saturday night. Hundreds of those taking part in anti-government protests which have swept the country for the past month have been sent to Evin prison. It is not clear whether the incident at the jail was connected to the unrest.

The judiciary said the fire began in a prison workshop after a fight among inmates. State TV said it was a "premeditated" escape plan, which the head of prisons in Tehran said was foiled by the security forces. However, a witness inside the prison told BBC Persian that prisoners had not set fire to the site.

The prison has long been criticised by Western rights groups. Human Rights Watch has accused authorities at the prison of using threats of torture and of indefinite imprisonment, as well as lengthy interrogations and denial of medical care for detainees. On Monday, the EU said it was imposing sanctions on 11 people and four organisations in Iran - including its morality police - in response to Iran's crackdown on the protests.

Nigeria races to assist flood victims; death toll tops 600

AP— The death toll from floods in Nigeria this year has increased to 603 as local authorities race to get relief items to hundreds of thousands being evacuated from their submerged homes.

More than 1.3 million people have been displaced by the disaster, which has affected people across 33 of Nigeria's 36 states, the nation's humanitarian affairs ministry said late Sunday.

At least 340,000 hectares of land also have been affected, worsening fears of food supply disruptions. Armed conflict already has threatened production in the northwest and central regions of Nigeria, which produce much of what the country eats.

Nigerian President Muhammadu Buhari directed "all concerned to work for the restoration of normalcy," according to a statement issued by the presidency.

Nigeria experiences annual flooding especially in coastal areas but this year's floods are the worst in more than a decade. Authorities blame the disaster this year on the release of excess water from Lagdo dam in neighbouring Cameroon and on unusual rainfalls.

The flooding has worsened the the end of November. humanitarian crisis in Nigeria where armed violence especially in the troubled northern region has already displaced more than 3 million people, according to the Internal Displacement Monitoring Center. Sadiya Umar Farouq, Nigeria's minister of humanitarian affairs, warned that five states are still at risk of experiencing floods up till

"We are calling on the respective state governments, local government councils and communities to prepare for more flooding by evacuating people living on flood plains to high grounds," Farouq said. Last week, President Buhari approved 12,000 metric tons of grains for the flood victims, the humanitarian affairs minister said.

The morality police - a force which ensures compliance with Iran's Islamic values, including dress code - has borne the brunt of public anger and has been blamed for the death of a young woman in custody an event which sparked the protests.

Protests continued overnight, including in neighbourhoods of Tehran. In a video from the north-east district of Narmak, chants

of "Death to the dictator" - a reference to Iran's supreme leader - among others can be heard in the dark. Elsewhere, in Ekbatan in western Tehran, a crowd of protesters chanted anti-government slogans, while video showed a group cheering as a woman burnt her hijab on a bonfire lit by protesters.

The protests erupted one month ago in the wake of the death of 22-yearold Kurdish Iranian Mahsa Amini in police custody.

Officials said she died of a heart attack, but her family dispute this, saying she was beaten by morality police.

The demonstrations quickly spread across the country, mounting the most serious challenge to the Islamic Republic since its inception in 1979. Iranian security forces have used force including live fire, beatings and mass arrests to try to put down the protests. Human rights groups say at least 200 people have been

killed, though the true figure is believed to be much higher.

The BBC and other independent media are banned from reporting from inside Iran, while authorities have disrupted the internet and social media tools, making it difficult to know

outside what is happening. Iranians, however, are still managing to post videos of protests and incidents which have been verified by the BBC.

Jurgen Klopp red card among incidents prompting referee charity to call for inquiry into managers

BBC-A leading referees' charity has called for an inquiry into the touchline behaviour of managers after ugly scenes at several Premier League matches.

Jurgen Klopp's red card for berating a referee's assistant during Liverpool's win over Manchester City was among a number of flashpoint incidents. It came on a weekend where Merseyside Youth League games were postponed amid ongoing issues with referee abuse. "People mimic what they see on TV," said Ref Support UK CEO Martin Cassidy.

The Football Association is looking into incidents on and off the pitch at Anfield as well as Manchester United players surrounding referee Craig Pawson at Old Trafford in their draw against Newcastle. "For years, we have said the dissension towards referees comes from the top down as well as the bottom up," Cassidy added.

"When you see world recognised figures like Jurgen Klopp and Pep Guardiola behaving like that, it is then replicated by people in youth football and perpetuates the idea that it is OK to do it."

Klopp apologised in his post-match comments

but insisted his behaviour had been borne out of frustration at what he saw as the officials' failure to award Liverpool a freekick for a challenge on Mohamed Salah. "Something snapped in that situation, I'm not proud of that - I deserved a red card, and the way I looked in this moment is not right," the German, 55, admitted. However, Cassidy, a Liverpool fan, said apologies would not suffice and that the League Managers Association must encourage its members to behave more respectfully. "As far as I'm aware, the LMA has never put out a statement condemning this behaviour - is there a code of conduct? They have to take responsibility," he said.

"The time has come to have some form of inqui-

ry into the behaviour of people on the touchline - it goes on and on and I don't think people understand the ramifications it has at grassroots level."

While Klopp's tirade towards the official running the line at Anfield was the highest-profile instance of dissent, it was by no means alone on a day packed with controversy.

His counterpart Pep Guardiola confronted Anthony Taylor when the referee, invited to consult his pitchside monitor by the video assistant referee, disallowed a City goal for a foul by Erling Haaland. Elsewhere, Manchester United players angrily surrounded referee Craig Pawson for disallowing a Cristiano Ronaldo goal in their stalemate with Newcastle United.

There were similar scenes from West Ham's players at Southampton, castigating Peter Bankes for not ruling out Saints' opener, while Hammers boss David Moyes said the VAR needed "to go to Specsavers". And Chris Kavanagh was also crowded by players from both sides at Elland Road in another game heavy on VAR intervention as Premier League leaders Arsenal beat Leeds.

'Yellow cards for abuse the solution' - Lineker

BBC Sport presenter Gary Lineker believes the problem of referee abuse in the professional game can be solved by the implementation of stricter punishments.

"I think you stop that by issuing yellow cards for any form of abuse whatsoever and then make it red straight after," Lineker, who was famously never booked during his playing career, told BBC Radio 5 Live.

"It'll be carnage for a few weeks, but they'll learn like they do, like they did with kicking players, you can't do it anymore. It would work, I'm convinced of that."

Neymar appears in court in trial over Barcelona transfer

AP— A few hours after scoring the winning goal in Paris Saint-Germain's victory over Marseille in the French league, Neymar arrived in court in Spain on Monday to face a trial for alleged irregularities involving his transfer to Barcelona in 2013.

Neymar's parents, former Barcelona president Sandro Rosell and representatives for both the Spanish club and Brazilian team Santos also appeared in court after a complaint brought by Brazilian investment group DIS regarding the amount of the player's transfer.

The Brazil forward arrived at the court in Barcelona wearing sunglasses and a black suit and tie. Neymar's mother and father, who also is his agent, were among those arriving alongside the player.

The defendants, who have denied wrongdoing, sat near each other to hear the opening arguments in the trial that comes nearly a month before the World Cup opens on Nov. 20 in Qatar, and is expected to last until the end of the month.

Neymar left the Barcelona court about two hours after arriving, without talking to reporters.

Neymar and the rest of the defendants had to be in court for the first day of the trial, but the player is only expected to testify on Friday. On Sunday night, Neymar scored his ninth French league goal of the season in first-half stoppage time to lead PSG to a 1-0 win over Marseille in French soccer's biggest game.

Prosecutors have charged the 30-year-old Neymar and his father with corruption and asked for a prison sentence of up to two years, although any jail time would likely be suspended. DIS accused them of

corruption and fraud and asked for a five-year prison sentence for Neymar and his father, and for compensation of 34 million euros (\$32.1 million) and a fine of 195 million euros (\$190 million) that would be paid to the Spanish state.

Prosecutors seek a fine of 10 million euros (\$9.7 million) for Neymar and his father. They also seek five years in prison for Rosell for fraud and corruption charges, plus a fine of 10 million euros (\$9.7 million).

Neymar's representatives have argued that the crime of corruption between individuals was not punishable in Brazil, which is where they say the transactions originally took place.

They said that according to Spanish law, a crime can't be punished in Spain if it didn't happen in both territories.

DIS was entitled to 40percent of Neymar's transfer but said it received a smaller compensation because part of the transfer fee was concealed. Prosecutors said those involved tried to hide the real amount of the transfer in order to pay a lower commission to the investment group.

The lawyers for the plaintiffs argue that DIS only received its due percentage from the 17 million euros (\$16.6 million) that Barcelona and Santos initially announced as the transfer fee between the clubs, while the real cost was about 82 million euros (\$79.9 million).

An investigative judge in Spain has already said that the real cost was at least 83.3 million euros (\$81.2 million). Neymar and his father previously appeared in court in Madrid a few years ago because of the accu-

World Cup host Qatar wins rights for 2023 Asian Cup

AP — With the World Cup in Qatar just weeks away, the country was selected Monday as host of the 2023 Asian Cup by the Asian Football Confederation.

Qatar beat bids from South Korea and Indonesia in a short-notice contest to replace China and host a tournament that could yet be played in 2024.

The 2023 Asian Cup is set in the FIFA-managed calendar of national-team soccer games to be played from June 16 to July 16 — when the desert heat in Qatar is so extreme that the World Cup had to be moved to November and December. Oatar hosted the 2011 Asian Cup in January that year and now becomes the first country to host the continental championship three times after also staging the event in 1988.

The Qatari men's team will be aiming to defend the title it won in 2019 in the United Arab Emirates. China was originally scheduled to hold the 24-team event in 2023 but gave up hosting

rights in May because of the country's "Zero-COVID" policies to contain the COVID-19 pandemic, leaving the AFC looking for replacements.

"Given the short lead time in preparation, we know that the hard work begins immediately but with their existing world-class infrastructure and unrivalled hosting capabilities, we are confident that Qatar will stage a worthy spectacle befitting the prestige and stature of Asia's crown jewel," AFC President Sheikh Salman bin Ebrahim Al Khalifa said in a statement. Qatar's win Monday offered good news for neighbouring Saudi Arabia which is bidding to host the 2027 Asian Cup, in a contest that is now a two-bid race with India.

That 2027 contest originally included Qatar and Iran, whose soccer federation withdrew its candidacy last Thursday, the AFC said. No reason was cited, although Iran has experienced a month of street protests in support of women's rights after the death in police cus-

tody of 22-year-old Mahsa Amini, "In the All India Football Federation and the Saudi Arabian Football Federation, we have two exemplary bids," Sheikh Salman said.

The AFC will need to seek FIFA agreement and likely a decision from the sport's world body's ruling Council to amend the international match calendar and find new dates for the 2023 Asian Cup. That process could raise tension with European clubs which typically object to soccer's continental championships being moved to their midseason from June slots.

The **FIFA** calendar mandates the game dates and tournament periods when clubs must release their players who have been selected for national teams. However, fewer Europe-based players are needed for the Asian Cup than had to leave their clubs for the African Cup of Nations that was played in Cameroon in January. That tournament also was moved from an intended slot in June.

The influential European Club Association is led by a Qatari who is a close friend of the country's Emir. The Switzerland-based club group's chairman is Nasser al-Khelaifi, the president of Paris Saint-Germain.

Scotland bowlers script huge upset against West Indies

Scotland 160 for 5 (Munsey 66*, Holder 2-14, Joseph 2-28) beat West Indies 118 all out (Holder 38, Watt 3-12, Leask 2-15, Wheal 2-32) by 42 runs

Two-time T20 World Cup champions West Indies were stunned by Scotland in their opening match of Group B in Hobart. With the bat, opener George Munsey scored 66 off 53 to hold Scotland's innings together to help them post 160. With the ball, Scotland relied on their slower bowlers to rock West Indies to 118 all out and consign them to a 42-run defeat. It is the second time in two days that a Full-Member side has gone down to an Associate nation, with Namibia beating Sri Lanka on opening day.

West Indies started their chase strongly and were 53 for 1 in 5.4 overs, but then lost their next seven wickets for 26 runs, with left-arm spinner Mark Watt producing a penetrative and economical spell to finish with 3 for 12 in his four overs. Offspinner Michael Leask also put in a stranglehold with the wickets of Nicholas Pooran and Royman Powell, while right-arm seamer Brad Wheal got crucial breakthroughs at the top and then in his return spell.

The loss puts West Indies under pressure with

matches against Ireland and Zimbabwe next on their docket. Scotland, meanwhile, will be looking to build on this comprehensive win and will eye a second consecutive Super 12 spot at the T20 World Cup.

Watt, Leask open West Indies' wounds

The pitch wasn't particularly difficult to bat on, and many of West Indies' key batters fell looking to play their shots in a chase of 161. Kyle Mayers was the first to go, caught at deep midwicket going for a big hit even though he had just slammed a four and a six. Evin Lewis and Brandon

King stayed positive through the rest of the powerplay, but Lewis perished after his pull found the only fielder on the leg side boundary.

By now the skies were turning grey. Watt, who opened the bowling, came back after the powerplay. But a sizable part of his focus - and the captain Richie Berrington's - was on the DLS sheet. At that point, Scotland were marginally behind, but the tables turned when King was bowled trying to cut Watt off the back foot. With Scotland now slightly ahead of the DLS, it was West Indies who were trying to force the play, and in the process hurt their own game since rain never arrived in the second innings.

Leask, from around the stumps, had Pooran bowled for 5 after he missed a pull shot. Powell soon fol-

lowed, holding to long-on. And Shamarh Brooks was caught trying to heave a back-of-a-length delivery to the only boundary rider on the leg side to leave West Indies reeling at 77 for 6 after 12 overs.

Akeal Hosein was then run out after a mix-up. Watt induced a nick from Alzarri Joseph for a first-ball duck to bring West Indies down to 79 for 8, and from there on, the result appeared to be a formality.

Jason Holder at No. 7 did save some face for West Indies with his 33-ball 38 to take the team's total past 100. He was the last man to depart in the 19th over, caught at long-off by Chris Greaves, prompting a sedate and composed cele-
