Chinese technicians on view with Pointe Xpress, he said several key departments in St. John's are collaborating with eight highly skilled technicians who were deployed by the Chinese government.

> These technicians are now formulating a plan to transform the area.

> "The technicians are now gathering data and the Ministry of Works along with other agencies such as DCA, the Ministry of Health through the Solid Waste Authority, are now assisting in providing the data.

"Once that data is complete, then the technicians will return to China on the 23rd December where they'll then use that in-





formation to create a plan which would be suitable for the environment," Ambassador Pilgrim said.

He explained that it is imperative that careful consideration be given to the location, and other dynamics in the area, before a design is finalised.

"What you see here today is a tangible demonstration of assistance from the People's Republic of China with respect to their commitment to build the 150 units to house the people of Booby Alley."

Work to clear the land identified for the development has been underway over the last two weeks. This work followed the relocation of Booby Alley residents and the demolition of their houses.

Although the completed project will bring tangible benefits and improved living conditions to Point residents, there are a small group of people who continue to resist and have refused to relocate. This has delayed the start of the project.

"There are some residents who have not caught on to the vision that we have of creating a brand new urban development and urban renewal site.

"As the prime minister has indicated, the government will be taking steps to ensure that the site is cleared so that the forward momentum of the project will not be slowed," Pilgrim added.

"We have cleared as much as we can, we are very hopeful that those persons who have not as yet indicated a timeline for them to move would so do, because this is slowing down the process and this is an exciting opportunity for Antiguans and Barbudans to see exactly how we can upgrade an environment," he continued.

Ambassador Pilgrim said the Booby Alley development will create a model community that its residents can be proud of.

Commission of Small Island States on Climate Change and International Law (CO-SIS), Prime Minister Gaston Browne of Antigua and Barbuda and Prime Minister Kausea Natano of Tuvalu. submitted a request for an Advisory Opinion yesterday to the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea (IT-LOS) on the obligation of states under the 1982 United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS) to protect and preserve the marine environment in relation to climate change impacts, including ocean warming, sea level rise, and ocean acidification.

This historic proceeding before ITLOS is the first inter-State case addressing the international legal obligations of States with regard to climate change. The request to ITLOS is complementary to and in support of the initiative of Vanuatu, to have the UN General Assembly request an advisory opinion on climate change from the International Court of Justice (ICJ).

It is anticipated that IT-LOS will schedule the filing of written pleadings and a hearing in 2023, in which all states parties to UNCLOS as well as international organisations will be able to participate. Prime Minister Browne stated, "This is a historic step for Small Island States, to invoke international law in the effort to ensure that the major polluters take their obligations seriously, to prevent harm to vulnerable states or to compensate them for damage. Our peoples are already feeling the catastrophic consequences of climate change. We cannot continue business as usual."

Prime Minister Natano remarked, "If humankind does not act with urgency, some of our island nations will disappear under the sea within a generation. Protection of the marine environment is a matter of survival. Greenhouse gas emissions should not be treated less seriously than other forms of pollution. If anything, they require even greater urgency and a commitment to respect

existing principles of international law."

COSIS is assisted by a committee of legal experts consisting of 14 distinguished jurists from around the world. The Agreement establishing COSIS was signed at COP26 on October 31st, 2021, in Edinburgh.

The current members are Antigua and Barbuda, Tuvalu, Palau, Niue, Vanuatu, and St. Lucia.

Hazardous sea conditions delay LPG shipment

Chief Executive Officer of the West Indies Oil Company Ltd. (WIOC), Gregory Georges says adverse weather conditions are responsible for the shortage of cooking gas on the island.

Over the weekend, almost all petrol stations and other cooking gas vendors were all out of the product.

By Saturday morning, cooking gas was unavailable at most vendors.

A statement from WIOC on Monday said that Antigua and Barbuda, as well as several other Caribbean countries were experiencing delays in the arrival of Liquefied Petroleum Gas (LPG) because of severe weather conditions.

Last week, reports indicated that the Antigua Port Authority's chief pilot could not safely navigate the tank-

These conditions are also impacting neighbour-ing islands.

To commemorate the 36th Charter Anniversary, a




week of activities was held from 3rd to 10th December.



Twitter relaunching subscriber service after debacle

AP - Twitter is once again attempting to launch its premium service, a month after a previous attempt failed.

The social media company said Saturday it would let users buy subscriptions to Twitter Blue to get a blue checkmark and access special features starting Monday.

The blue checkmark was originally given to companies, celebrities, government entities and journalists verified by the platform. After Elon Musk bought Twitter for \$44 billion in October, he launched a service granting blue checks to anyone willing to pay \$8 a month. But it was inundated by imposter accounts, including those impersonating Musk's businesses Tesla and SpaceX, so Twitter suspended the service days after its launch.

Biodiversity: 'Magical marine species' pushed toward extinction

A "sea cow" that evoked tales of mermaids is being driven to the edge of extinction, conservation experts warn.

According to an update of the official extinction list, the dugong is almost wiped out in some parts of the world.

Scientists have also sounded alarm over the loss of other marine creatures, including exotic coral and shellfish.

They said humans had created a "perfect storm" that threatens marine life across the globe.

The International Union for Conservation for Nature (IUCN), which compiles the official Red List of endangered species, revealed the latest findings at the UN biodiversity conference, COP 15.

"We simply cannot afford to fail," said Dr Bruno Oberle, head of the IUCN.

He warned of the urgent need to address the linked climate and biodiversity crises, or "risk losing the crucial benefits the oceans provide us with".

The latest update to the list, which has now assessed more than 150,000 species, revealed "a perfect storm of unsustainable human activity decimating marine life around the globe," he said.

Countries are meeting in Montreal, Canada, to try to agree targets for addressing

the loss of nature amid an extinction crisis threatening a million species on Earth. High on their agenda is a plan to protect 30% of land and sea for nature across the globe by 2030.

Environmental groups say progress in the first week has been slow and are calling for a step change in both pace and ambition.

"We will continue to see threats to marine life and our whole natural world unless we secure an ambitious deal," said Bernadette Fischler Hooper of WWF.

The latest extinction list highlights risks to a type of

pillar coral that forms finger-like structures found throughout the Caribbean. It is now classed as critically endangered. The coral is dying due to disease, climate change and pollution.

Meanwhile, many species of abalone, the world's most expensive seafood, are threatened with extinction, due to poaching and unsustainable harvesting, made worse by disease, pollution and climate change.

Marine biologist, Prof Amanda Vincent, of the University of British Columbia, Canada, said the "awful status" of these species should shock us and engage us for urgent action.

"These magical marine species are treasured wildlife, from the wonderful abalone to the charismatic dugong and the glorious pillar coral, and we should safeguard them accordingly," she added.

Dugongs belong to the Sirenia, an order of aquatic mammals sometimes known as "sea cows". The Sirenia family also includes manatees.

In 2015, the IUCN classified dugongs as vulnerable to extinction worldwide *cont'd on pg 13*

The Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) and the International Labor Organization (ILO) say despite the recovery seen in labour markets in the first half of 2022, it is expected that in the second half the deceleration of growth will slow the region's capacity to generate quality jobs.

In their new joint publication, "Employment Situation in Latin America and the Caribbean," the UN agencies indicate that Latin America and the Caribbean's economies are facing "a very complex macroeconomic, social and environmental context, which is going to affect labour market dynamics."

The report says the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic prompted "an unprecedented crisis in Latin

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due to a myriad of threats, including being caught up in fishing gear or struck by boat propellers, ocean pollution and the loss of the sea grasses on which they graze.

They are now particularly concerned about two populations. One, living in waters off Mozambique, is down to just 250 individuals and is regarded as critically endangered.

The other, in New Caledonia, east of Australia, is deemed endangered.

America and the Caribbean's economies and labour markets."

In previous reports, ECLAC and the ILO emphasised that the recovery experienced by the region's labour markets, since the economies reopened, had been "slow, partial and uneven."

However, the new report says, in the first half of 2022, favourable changes were observed in those markets' main indicators.

First, in the second quarter of 2022, the report says the employment rate reached the level seen prior to the crisis.

It says the unemployment rate declined by 2.8 percentage points versus the same period of 2021, reaching 7.3 percent, a figure below pre-pandemic levels.

"This reduction in the



unemployment rate was observed in all the countries studied," the report says. "Similarly, there were improvements in the labour participation rate, although it is still below the level recorded prior to the health crisis."

Another aspect highlighted in the first part of the report is that these positive trends are stronger among women, "who were especially affected during the pandemic and whose recovery was slower than that of men in 2021."

"Indeed, although in the first half of 2022, the unemployment rate fell for both men and women (by 2.3 and 3.4 percentage points, respectively), the decline was much sharper in the case of women, resulting in a narrowing of the unemployment gap, which went from a ratio of 1.5 to 1.4 between the first half of 2021 and the same period of 2022," the report says.

It also notes that, since the first half of 2022, wage employment has increased more than own-account work and the manufacturing sector has shown the highest rates of job creation.

The document also indicates that average real wages have fallen due to the significant increase in inflation in the first half of this year. (CMC)

There are still dugongs living in the waters off around 40 countries. Australia has the world's largest population of dugongs today, largely thanks to having a sparsely populated coast with lots of sea grasses.

Earlier this year the dugong was declared functionally extinct in China. "Functional extinction" means that even if some dugongs are still alive off China's coast, their numbers are too small to maintain a viable population.

JCF targets thirty US-based criminals directing crime in Jamaica

CMC - Major General Antony Anderson, Jamaica's Commissioner of Police, says 30 people living in the United States who are influencers of crime and violence in Jamaica are being sought by the Jamaica Constabulary Force (JCF).

He made the disclosure recently during a press briefing at the Office of the Prime (OPM) when Prime Minister Andrew Holness announced states of emergency (SOEs) in several parishes.

Anderson emphasised that SOEs are about more than merely arresting individuals and the JCF is also targeting criminals who live in the US.

"As the prime minister says, we're also working with our overseas partners on some of this. We have a target list of 30 who reside in the US who we're doing some work on," Anderson said.

He added: "Those who are over there who believe that they are supporting violence and crime in Jamaica and they are doing so without anybody paying any attention to them they're sorely mistaken."

On Thursday, senior representatives from the US Department of Justice and the Federal Bureau of Investi-

gation (FBI) met with Prime Minister Andrew Holness, Major General Antony Anderson, and other government officials in Washington.

The meeting was called to discuss the increasing danger posed by transnational criminal gangs, organised criminal violence, and the trafficking of illegal guns into Jamaica.

According to a media release from the Office of the Prime Minister

(OPM), during the meeting, the police commissioner noted that "closer cooperation will ensure that criminals do not feel they have a safe haven in the United States from which to sponsor crime in Jamaica."

As for the issue of the illegal export of firearms, Holness said the United States is taking even greater steps to deal with the problem of the cont'd on pg 15

Brazil economy ministry rejects Lula transition team's judgement on finances

Reuters - Brazil's Economy Ministry on Sunday rejected assertions by president-elect Luis Inacio Lula da Silva's transition team that the outgoing administration was leaving government finances "bankrupted."

The Economy Ministry said in a statement that gross debt will reach 74% of GDP by the end of the year, with a primary surplus (excluding debt costs) of 23.4 billion reais, the first since 2013.

"This will be the first government ending its term with debt ratios lower than in its beginning, the debt was 75.3% of GDP in 2018," the statement said.

Last week, the Planning and Budget group in Lula's camp said President Jair Bolsonaro is leaving the Brazilian state "bankrupted," according to former minister and transition team member Aloizio Mercadante.

Brazil will pay international financial institutions \$1.23 billion next year, 20% below the \$1.56 billion that was due in 2016, the ministry said.

The government said expenses to help the most

Lula takes office on Jan. 1. The leftist ex-president narrowly defeated Bolsonaro in an Oct. 30 runoff election, a political comeback that ended Brazil's most right-wing government in decades.

Peru president proposes moving up elections amid protests

AP - Peru's new president, Dina Boluarte, gave in to protesters' demands early Monday announcing in a nationally televised address that she will send Congress a proposal to move up elections.

Boluarte's decision came after thousands of demonstrators took to the streets around Peru for another day on Sunday to demand that she resign and schedule elections to replace her and Congress. The protests turned deadly, with at least two reported deaths in a remote community in the Andes, according to officials.

Boluarte said she will propose the scheduling of general elections for April 2024. That marks a reversal as she had previously said she should be allowed to hold the office for the remaining 3 1/2 years of her predecessor's term.

"My duty as president of the republic in the current difficult time is to interpret, read and collect the aspirations, interests and concerns, if not of all, of the vast majority of Peruvians," Boluarte said. "So, interpreting in the broadest way the will of the citizens... I have decided to assume the initiative to reach an agreement with the congress of the republic to advance the general elections."

Many of those demonstrating in the ongoing political crisis are demanding the release from custody of Pedro Castillo, the centre-left president ousted Wednesday by lawmakers after he sought to dissolve Congress ahead of an impeachment vote.

The protests rocking Peru heated up particularly in rural areas, strongholds for Castillo, a former schoolteacher and political newcomer from a poor Andean mountain district. Protesters set fire to a police station, vandalised a small airport used by the armed forces, and

marched in the streets.

A 15-year-old boy died of an injury suffered during a protest in the remote Andes community of Andahuaylas, Congresswoman Maria Taipe Coronado said as she made an impassioned plea from the legislative palace for Boluarte to step down.

"The death of this compatriot is the responsibility of Mrs. Dina for not submitting her resignation," charged Taipe, who is affiliated with the party which helped Castillo and Boluarte to their election last year as president and vice president respectively before both were kicked out of that party. "Since when is protesting a crime?"

Taipe charged that authorities were using heavy-handed repressive tactics in quelling demonstrations. But it remains unclear how the boy was fatally injured, and state media reported a second death in the same community without giving details.

Anthony Gutiérrez, director of a lo-

cal hospital, told a radio station that the second protester to die was an 18-yearold person. At least 26 people also were reported injured.

Hundreds of people also protested in Lima, the capital, where riot police used tear gas to push protesters back.

Boluarte, in her address to the nation, declared a state of emergency in areas outside Lima where protests have been particularly violent.

Boluarte, 60, was swiftly sworn in at midweek to replace Castillo, hours after he stunned the country by ordering the dissolution of Congress, which in turn dismissed him for "permanent moral incapacity." Castillo was arrested on charges of rebellion.

Castillo's failed move against the opposition-led Congress came hours before lawmakers were set to start a third impeachment attempt against him.

Three children die after fall into icy lake; UK gripped by storm

AP - Three young boys who fell through ice covering a lake in central England have died and a fourth remains hospitalised as weather forecasters issued severe weather warnings for large parts of the United Kingdom.

Police in full uniform jumped into the water and broke through the ice using their bare hands to pull the boys, ages 8, 10 and 11, from the icy waters Sunday afternoon and rushed them to the hospital in the West Midlands, about 100 miles (160 kilometres) north of London. But they could not be revived after suffering cardiac arrest.

The fourth child, who is 6, remains in critical condition. Emergency workers searched through the night and into Monday for two other children who were reportedly with the group, though it is uncertain whether there were additional victims of the trage-

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have also set up roadblocks, leaving people stranded for hours.

On Saturday in Andahuaylas, 16 people were treated for concussions at a hospital, and one of those persons was reported in serious condition.

Boluarte has called for a time of national unity to heal from the latest upheaval. But many of those demonstrating in favour of Castillo have called her a "traitor."

"The life of no Peruvian deserves to be sacrificed for political interests,"

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"It's important to stress ... that we've had no contact from anybody suggesting that there's anybody else missing, but until we're 100% certain we will be carrying on searches throughout the course of today," West Midlands Police Superintendent Richard Harris said. Harris declined to say whether the children were members of a single family.

The news came as the Met Office, Britain's national weather service, issued severe weather alerts for large parts of the country. Roads in eastern and southeastern England were among the most affected. Some travellers were stuck for hours due to the closure of the UK's busiest highway, the M25, which circles greater London.

Gatwick and Stansted airports warned of flight delays on Monday, and London City Airport said it was experiencing "some disruption" because aircraft were out of position after flight cancellations on Sunday night.

The country recorded its coldest night of the year so far in northern Scotland at minus 15.7 degrees Celsius (3.7 degrees Fahrenheit).

"Frozen lakes, ponds, canals and reservoirs can look picturesque but they can be lethal, and there are no greater warnings of this than yesterday's tragic events," West Midlands Fire Service area commander Richard Stanton said. "Yesterday's incident is a stark reminder to us all of the dangers of open water, especially during the winter months."

Boluarte tweeted hours before her address to the nation. "I express my condolences for the death of a citizen in Andahuaylas. I reiterate my call for dialogue and to put an end to violence."

Meanwhile, in Lima, hundreds of people again gathered outside the legislative palace on Sunday. Dozens of police officers in riot gear used tear gas against those gathered, while just inside the building, lawmakers were beginning a session. Police also chased and beat protesters as they ran from the scene amid clouds of gas. Peru has had six presidents in the last six years, including three in a single week in 2020 when Congress flexed its impeachment powers.

The power struggle in the country has continued as the Andes region and its thousands of small farms struggle to survive the worst drought in a half-century. The country of more than 33 million people is also experiencing a fifth wave of COVID-19 infections — having recorded about 4.3 million infections and 217,000 deaths since the pandemic began.

Iran carries out second execution linked to wave of popular protests

Reuters - The Islamic Republic on Monday hanged a man in public who state media said had been convicted of killing two members of the security forces, the second execution in less than a week of people involved in protests against Iran's ruling theocracy.

Nationwide unrest erupted three months ago after the death while in detention of 22-year-old Kurdish Iranian woman Mahsa Amini, who was arrested by morality police enforcing the Islamic Republic's mandatory dress code laws.

The demonstrations have turned into a popular revolt by furious Iranians from all layers of society, posing one of the worst legitimacy challenges to the Shi'ite clerical elite since the 1979 Islamic Revolution.

"Majid Reza Rahnavard was hanged in public in (the holy Shi'ite city of) Mashhad this morning ... He was sentenced to death for 'waging war against God' after stabbing to death two members of the security forces," the judiciary's Mizan news agency reported.

Mizan published pictures of the execution at dawn, showing Rahnavard hanging from a construction crane, with his hands and feet bound and his head covered with a black bag.

The semi-official Fars news agency said Rahnavard killed two members



of the Basij volunteer force and wounded four others. The Basij force, affiliated with the elite Revolutionary Guards, has been at the forefront of the state crackdown on protests.

Calling for added protests across the country, activists on social media criticised the execution of the 23-year-old Rahnavard as "a criminal act" by the clerical rulers to deter dissent.

"They called Rahnavard's family at 7am (local time) and told them to go to the Behesht-e Reza cemetery. "We executed your child and buried him,' they said," widely followed activist account 1500Tasvir posted on Twitter.

The contents of the post could not be verified by Reuters.

On Thursday, Iran hanged Mohsen Shekari, who had been convicted of injuring a security guard with a knife and blocking a street in Tehran, the first such execution after thousands of arrests over the unrest, drawing a chorus of Western condem-



nation and sanctions.

Rights groups have said Shekari was tortured and forced to confess. Molavi Abdolhamid, an outspoken Sunni Muslim cleric in the Shi'ite-ruled Islamic Republic, has said the death sentence of Shekari violated sharia (Islamic law), his website said.

State media published a video of a man, which it identified as Rahnavard, stabbing another man who fell against a parked motorcycle, and then stabbing another person immediately afterward and then running away.

State television showed a video in which Rahnavard said in the court that he came to hate the Basij forces after seeing them beating and killing protesters in videos posted on social media. Activists said he was forced to confess under torture.

Amnesty International has said Iranian authorities are seeking the death penalty for at least 21 people in what it called "sham trials designed to intimidate those participating in the popular uprising that has rocked Iran".

The European Union's foreign policy chief Josep Borrell said on Monday the EU will agree on a "very tough" package of sanctions against Iran to show its support for peaceful protesters.

Blaming the unrest on foreign foes such as the United States and Israel, Iranian Foreign Ministry spokesman Nasser Kanaani on Monday rejected Western criticism of rights abuses during the crackdown as meddling in Iran's state matters.

Tehran on Monday imposed sanctions on dozens of EU and British officials and entities "over their support and instigation" of the unrest, state television reported.

The unrest has been watched closely by Israel, where a national security official said the executions did not appear to be deterring protesters and could further "box in the regime".

"Because it can only respond with force, that has reinforced for the public the grievance being protested over," the Israeli official told Reuters. "There is no returning this genie to the bottle."

Rights group HRANA said that as of Sunday 488 protesters had been killed, including 68 minors. It said 62 members of the security forces had also been killed. As many as 18,259 protesters are believed to have been arrested, it said.

Sports News Page 19 Brathwaite rues 'bad game', urges WI to learn from defeat

CMC - Captain Kraigg Brathwaite has rued West Indies' lack of resolve in the Adelaide second Test but said he believed the chastening result was a learning curve, which would serve the side well in important contests next year.

West Indies slumped to a 419-run defeat, half-hour before lunch on the penultimate day here Sunday, the result marking their heaviest-ever loss in Test history by runs.

They were bowled out for 77 after resuming on 38 for four – their lowest-ever total Down Under and their second lowest-ever against the Aussies.

"Obviously [the] pink ball is always different – under lights is always tough and at times a little tougher," Brathwaite told a media conference afterwards.

"[We needed] a little better judgement at times. But it happens. Bad days happen and bad games [happen], and obviously this was a bad game for sure, for us.

"But it's not the end of the world. We have a lot of Test cricket to play next year so we have to look ahead."

West Indies lost the opening Test in Perth by 164 runs last week, their first Test defeat of the year following series triumphs over England and Bangladesh, when they went unbeaten.

And while they took the opening Test against Australia deep into the final day before succumbing, the Caribbean side showed little of that determination in the day-night affair in Adelaide.

Brathwaite, however, praised his side and said they retained his full support going forward.

"In a year, you want to win every game – you don't want to lose – but I think losing is a part of the game," he explained.

"Obviously this loss was a bit disappointing in how we didn't show the fight [required]. I was pleased with the first Test in Perth despite it being a loss. We saw guys fighting, and to carry a strong Australia team into the last day was a decent effort.

"I still think it was a good year for us – a very

good year. Obviously losing one series against the number one team in the world is not a bad effort.

"As I said, it's important to learn from this experience. We have South Africa next year in March after Zimbabwe and we know there are kind of similar conditions in South Africa so it is important we show that experience.

"You go through certain things and it is important you learn from them. But I'm 100 percent behind this team. I think it's a good group [but] you can't always win."

Brathwaite was one of only four players with previous Test experience in Australia and that dearth of knowledge showed in the series result.

There were three debutants in the series – Tagenarine Chanderpaul, Devon Thomas and Marquino Mindley – while Anderson Phillip was playing only his second Test.

Brathwaite said the way Australia went about their business in the series had served as a blueprint for his inexperienced unit, especially with West Indies scheduled to return Down Under in just over a year.

"[For] a lot of the guys, this was their first time to Australia so I think the experience would help, both as batsmen and as bowlers," Brathwaite pointed out.

"And then seeing how Australia would've played, seeing how their batsmen would've started their innings – we can learn from that starting.

"And then how their bowlers bowled throughout – throughout a spell, throughout [a whole day] – because at times in Perth they bowled for a whole day but then you see the areas they bowled.

"It's stuff like that you've got to learn from and it's important when you come [back to Australia] that you don't necessarily make the same mistakes.

"Australia will always be a strong team at home but the key with experiences is to learn from them so it's important we show that experience when we come back."



AP - Kenya's most identifiable community is abandoning hunting lions with spears for javelin throwing at a biannual event called the Maasai Olympics.

The Maasai people, renowned for their colourful garb, are predominantly herders and live near some of Kenya's most visited wildlife parks. Attacks by Maasai on wildlife has often been cited as a threat to some animal populations.

The traditional rite of passage for a young Maasai man has been to kill a lion with a spear in order to prove his masculinity, earn a warrior name and admiration among young women.

But Maasai elders like Mingati Samanya, 69, are charting a new path for the community's young warriors, also known as morans.

During his youth, Samanya killed two lions to show he was a man and that is how he received the "lion name" Mingati in the Maa language. His name at birth was Naiganya.

Samanya is now among dozens of elders who are encouraging Maasai morans to pursue an alternative way of proving their masculinity that includes participating in athletics, javelin and Maasai jump competitions during the community Olympics.

On Saturday, at the Kimana Sanctuary in the foothills of Mount Kiliman-

jaro, young men and some women competed for medals and cash prizes.

"During our time, we killed lions and did not benefit with anything. Right now, when the morans throw a javelin and run, they get money. Previously, we got nothing. It was just poverty instead of providing for our family," Samanya told The Associated Press.

Vivian Nganini, who attended the Maasai Olympics while wearing a traditional wedding dress complete with colourful beaded necklaces, said girls of today prefer the modern moran.

"At least when they run, they can win some money

and be able to take care of their wives and children," said the 22-year-old mother of two.

The Maasai Olympics also are part of wider conservation efforts.

"The cultural side of warriors wanting to kill lions to be renowned is solved by this event," Craig Millar with the Big Life Foundation told the AP.

The lion population in the Amboseli ecosystem which includes the Kimana Sanctuary has increased 10 times over the last 20 years, according to Millar. He attributed this to various initiatives like anti-poaching law enforcement and

compensation programs to alleviate the loss of Maasai-owned livestock to predators.

But other dangers remain for wildlife. Parts of Kenya and the wider East Africa region have experienced four consecutive seasons with inadequate rainfall, with hundreds of elephants, wildebeests, zebras and other animals dying, according to a recent report by wildlife authorities.

During such prolonged dry periods, the risk of human-wildlife conflict increases, but communities living near parks are encouraged to protect and co-exist cont'd on pg 21

AP - Tears are flowing from soccer's biggest superstars as they make emotional exits from what might be their last World Cup.

First it was Neymar. Then it was Cristiano Ronaldo. Could Lionel Messi be next?

Momentum is building behind Messi's push to cap his career with the biggest prize in the game. The 35-year-old Argentina playmaker has carried his team to the semifinals, almost in the same way Diego Maradona — the man with whom Messi is so often compared - led the South American nation to its second and most recent World Cup title in 1986.

Now in Argentina's way is Croatia, a country with a population of 4 million which is establishing a reputation as the most stubborn and durable of opponents while also boasting one of soccer's most graceful players in Luka Modric.

The teams go head to head at Lusail Stadium - also the venue for Sunday's final - in a meeting between the last two runners-up at the tournament:

Argentina in 2014 and Croatia in 2018.

Argentina might have been expected to be in this position. The team arrived at the World Cup as the Copa America champion, on a 36-match unbeaten run and with Messi back in sublime form for Paris Saint-Germain.

There was much less noise around the Croatians, yet they keep on surprising just like four years ago when their run to the final included a 3-0 victory over Argentina in the group stage. They also reached the World Cup semifinals in 1998.

Both teams have come

through uncomfortable moments. Argentina's darkest time was right at the start of the tournament, after a 2-1 loss to Saudi Arabia in what will go down as one of the World Cup's biggest upsets.

Inspired by Messi and one of the most fervent fan followings in Qatar, Argentina won its final two group games, ended up squeezing past Australia 2-1 in the round of 16 and then required penalties to get past the Netherlands in a wild quarterfinal match.

Messi now has four goals in the tournament in Qatar, leaving him one behind top scorer Kylian Mbappé. They are probably the two standout players at a World Cup that has seen many other top players live up to their lofty reputations.

Modric is a case in point. He might not have scored a goal. He hasn't even had an assist. But don't underestimate the importance to Croatia of the little magician who keeps things ticking in midfield and manages to assert some control for a team which fights until the last minute.

In 2018, each of Croatia's knockout games went into extra time before the team lost to France in the final, and the same thing is happening in Qatar, with victories in penalty shootouts over Japan in the last 16 and Brazil in the quarterfinals.

Croatia looked more comfortable against Brazil than against Japan, which shows the team might be happier to invite pressure and choose its moments to break forward rather than control games and be more susceptible to the counterattack.

Containing Messi will be key and much of the responsibility there lies with holding midfielder Marcelo Brozovic, who protected Croatia's defence so well against Brazil.

Argentina will be without two players because of suspension: left back Marcos Acuña and right back Gonzalo Montiel. Acuña is the bigger miss, having impressed since coming into the team after the loss to Saudi Arabia, and he is likely to be replaced by Nicolás Tagliafico.

Joseph, Holder in Windies T20 squad to face England

CMC - Under-19 stars Djenaba Joseph and Trishan Holder have been called up to the West Indies Women's senior squad for the opening two Twenty20 Internationals of the fivematch series against England Women.

The pair replace veteran seamer Shakera Selman and batsman Chedean Nation, both of whom featured in the just concluded three-match One-Day International series which England Women won in a clean sweep.

Joseph and Holder will be joined by off-spinner Karishma Ramharack, who was named in the squad for the first two ODIs but never played due to injury.

"Based on injuries in the CG United ODI series Chedean Nation and Shakera Selman have been ruled out at this time," said chief women's selector Ann Browne-John.

"Two members of the Under 19 World Cup squad, Djenaba Joseph and



Trishan Holder at the Commonwealth Games earlier this year.

Trishan Holder, who have been making great progress, have been named to the squad and we believe that they will fit in well and absorb the experience.

"Karishma Ramharack returns to the team after missing the ODI series due to injury and Shamilia Connell who was on the injured list for the ODIs is also expected to be ready to be considered for selection later in the series."

Joseph and Holder were last week named in a 15-member squad for next month's ICC Under-19 T20 World Cup in South Africa, from January 14-29.

Swimming body FINA rebrands as World Aquatics

AP - FINA, the federation which has run international swimming competitions for more than a century, is rebranding itself as World Aquatics ahead of the next Olympics in Paris in 2024 after a vote Monday.

That means leaving behind the French-language name of Fédération Internationale de Natation — International Swimming Federation.

World Aquatics says the new brand is more inclusive of events such as diving, water polo and artistic swimming, all of which are



overseen by the federation.

"More than 70% of the athletes that we have spoken with have said that they would like us to change FI-NA's name. Many of them could not even tell us what the letters in FINA stand for," World Aquatics president Husain Al-Musallam said.

The new name will be phased in gradually in 2023 before the World Aquatics Championships in Fukuoka, Japan, in July.

World Aquatics continues a trend toward shorter, simpler English-language names among the federations running international sports.

In track and field, the International Association of Athletics Federations rebranded as World Athletics in 2019. The former Fédération Internationale des Sociétés d'Aviron is now known as World Rowing and the International Rugby Board became World Rugby.


