Election officers commence training this week

Approximately one thousand people who have applied for employment at the Antigua and Barbuda Electoral Commission (ABEC) to man polling

stations on election day will undergo four days of intense training this week.

Assistant to the Supervisor of Elections, Ian Hughes, said the training

St. John's, January 1st... The Antigua and Barbuda Labour Party has noted a so-called "New Year's Day Message" from Mr. Asot Michael, carried by the online publication, Antigua News Room, with which he has an intimate relationship.

In his latest act of collaboration with the UPP, and in return for the promise of a big Ministerial position, Mr. Michael has become an attack dog for the UPP. Therefore, he spewed a tirade of cheap insinuations, unfounded allegations and clear falsehoods against the ABLP leader.

The ABLP exposes Mr. Michael's rants as nothing more than sour grapes by a flawed personality who has sold his soul to the UPP and adopted their political playbook of attacking the Prime Minister. (ends) will cover all the areas polling clerks, who work alongside Returning Officers, will be required to be competent in.

"The training will cover the entire voting process to include how to issue the ballots, the need to carefully examine the Voter ID cards to ensure the person presenting him/herself for voting is the one listed in the Voters' Register, how to determine a spoilt ballot, among other critical issues," he reported.

Polling clerks will also be required to ensure that voters do not take cellular phones into the voting booths or wear party colours when presenting themselves to vote.

They will also seek to ensure that voters do not undermine the system by attempting to vote multiple times.

Clerks will therefore carefully examine voters' index fingers for signs that

they may have voted previously.

According to Hughes, ABEC takes the responsibility of training election workers seriously.

"We can't take any chances as elections are serious undertakings and at all times we must be in a position to say we trained that individual based on the high standard of work displayed," he stated.

Once the training session has been completed, the one thousand applicants will be whittled down to the top seven hundred who successfully complete the test administered at the end of the course.

The training exercises will be conducted in each constituency by the seventeen Returning Officers.

The Returning Officers who will oversee the elections in each constituency, completed their training in September last year.





Local News PAGE 3 **Gaston Browne: Nation's future** bright, with sound leadership

Prime Minister Gaston Browne has called on citizens and residents of Antigua and Barbuda to make the right decision entering the New Year in charting the way forward for Antigua and Barbuda.

He said that the economy of Antigua and Barbuda, as projected by the United Nations Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) has grown by a whopping 8.3 percent, surpassing almost all countries in the subregion.

This he said is due to sound government and creative policies implemented by his administration.

The country's leader pointed out that the nation is now at a pivotal moment as troubling global circumstances have not subsided.

He said to combat these challenges, the country requires tried, tested and successful leadership and government.

"We have before us a fork in the road, and a decision of which path to take. One path was risked before with disastrous consequences, including economic failure, represented by a 25 percent decline in the economy and high unemployment; bank failure which cost taxpayers over \$300 million to resolve: fiscal failure that included burdensome debt with over 50 percent in arrears; the imposition of personal income



Prime Minister Gaston Browne tax; late payments of salaries & wages, and social security pensions; and expanded poverty," he pointed out.

He noted that all of this occurred under the UPP government with Harold Lovell as the Minister of Finance.

"The other path is the one that has always taken our nation to higher heights of employment, economic growth, and development; that has attracted investments; improved health services; expanded education facilities; increased home, car and business ownership; more than doubled water production; delivered high speed broadband facilities; created opportunities for all; and - most significantly successfully lifted us up as a nation," stated Prime Minister Browne.

He remarked that it was the high performance Antigua and Barbuda Labour Party administration that has achieved growth and development for Antigua and Barbuda.

He also pointed out that in a matter of weeks, Antiguans and Barbudans will be called upon to make a choice between the established economic success of the ABLP administration and the proven financial failure of the UPP and Harold Lovell.

"The UPP choice is worse this time. Not one of the UPP aspirants to office

has any proven successful track record in government, in financial administration and in economic competence," he said.

Prime Minister Browne said that risking the UPP, is risking retrogression and the country's future, as well as, the future of the nation's children.

"For just as it took years to recover the country from the last UPP government, so it will take years to rebuild what we would lose," he pointed out, concluding that, "the prospects are real, and the future is bright if sound government and visionary leadership continue."

Antigua and Barbuda congratulates Republic of Cuba on 64th anniversary of the Revolution

On 1st January, 2023, the government and people of the Republic of Cuba marked the 64th anniversary of the Revolution that gave birth their nation.

Antigua and Barbuda joined the Cuban people in the celebration of the observance of this historic event.

In a letter to President of the Council of State and Ministers of the Republic of Cuba, Miguel Diaz-Canel, Prime Minister Gaston Browne noted that the Cuban Revolution became a unique and potent symbol of hope and liberation.

"President [Fidel] Castro's revolutionary ideals had a significant and empowering psychological impact on oppressed peoples every-



where, including in the rest of the Caribbean, where people identified with the Cuban struggle for freedom.

"Passionate and heroic in his resolve to stand up for Cuban freedom and sovereignty, former President Fidel Castro faced the might of the United States, and defied all odds. His remarkable and revolutionary leadership altered the course of events, and will forever have an impact on world history." the prime minister said. Browne also expressed gratitude on behalf of the people of Antigua and Barbuda for Cuba's continued willingness to share its achievements in healthcare, education, and culture over the years.

"Many nationals of Antigua and Barbuda have benefitted from the successes of the Cuban Revolution," he noted.

Meanwhile, in correspondence to his counterpart in the Cuban government, Foreign Minister E. P. Chet Greene took the position that the historical significance of the Cuban revolution lies in its poignant symbolism as a beacon of freedom from oppression and its traditions and lasting legacies.

According to Greene, despite the decades-long economic and financial embargo imposed against the Cuban people by the United States, Cuba has been able to record huge strides in education, medicine, sports and other areas of human development.

Greene underscored the work of the Cuban Medical Brigade which has made a lasting impact on Antigua and Barbuda's health care system, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Antigua and Barbuda has received significant cooperation through grants and soft loans from the People's Republic of China in those years.

"A friendship bridge which connects the south of Antigua with the northern half during floods and downpours marked the start of our friendship. Most recently, a modern airport terminal, a rebuilt and enlarged cargo port, and a planned housing project continue to characterise the relations between our states," Browne continued.

Foreign Affairs Minister E. P. Chet Greene said the 40th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic ties provided an opportunity for reflection on the achievements of the past four decades.

"The People's Republic of China has played a significant role in the promotion of our national development and has been a generous provider of technical support in various fields, which has resulted in quantifiable benefits for the people of Antigua and Barbuda.

"In 2017 when Hurricane Irma ravaged...Barbuda, the People's Republic of China offered humanitarian aid to assist the residents in this dire time of need.

"Your steadfast commit-

ment to ensuring the safety of the people of Antigua and Barbuda has and will continue to be highly appreciated," Greene said.

The 40th anniversary of diplomatic ties will be marked by an official flag-raising ceremony at the Office of the Prime Minister on a date to be announced.



Local News PAGE 6 **ABLP's Jonas rejects UPP claim** that firearm was brandished

The Antigua Barbuda Labour Party's incumbent candidate for St. George, Dean Jonas, has rejected allegations that he, or any of his supporters, used a firearm to intimidate his United Progressive Party opponent, Algernon Watts, or his supporters.

In a statement issued on Sunday, Jonas dismissed the allegation as false and said it was part of the UPP's strategy to manipulate electors ahead of this month's elections.

Jonas said his opponent had resorted to making the "untruthful and morally bankrupt claim" in a desperate attempt to salvage his efforts after being "unable to get any traction in their two-year campaign leading to the January 18, 2023, general election".

The ABLP candidate accused Watts and his supporters of trailing his entourage on 31st December, 2022 as they campaigned, creating a "nuisance" and coming close to "triggering a physical confrontation".

Rumours surfaced on Saturday night that a member of Jonas' entourage brought the heckling to an abrupt end after a firearm was brandished.

"On Saturday evening, December 31, 2022, the UPP team alleges they were frightened-off when they were threatened by the display of a firearm. That claim is wholly untrue.

"Minister Dean Jonas denies having or displaying a firearm and has watched as this hapless group of unworthy aspirants for public office sink into character assassination, obfuscation and unwholesome lies in an effort to persuade voters," the statement from Jonas' campaign said.

Jonas, meanwhile, commented, "I have the impression that the UPP team is growing more and more desperate as the smell of defeat becomes more discernible."

He further dismissed the allegation from the Watts camp as a desperate attempt by "the losing UPP and their operatives are seeking sympathy by concocting stories that are false, irresponsible, and lacking in substance".

January poised to become "best month ever" for A&B's cruise tourism industry

Four cruise ships are expected in the St. John's Harbour today boosting industry officials' prediction that January 2023 will become the country's best month on record for cruise tourism.

The Antigua Cruise Ports (ACP) has reported that seventy-seven cruise ship calls are booked this month with fifteen calls scheduled this week alone.

According to ACP, this month is expected to surpass all previous records for cruise ship calls at the St. John's Harbour and cruise tourist arrivals to the country.

Arriving today are the Seabourn Ovation, AIDA Perla, Marella Explorer

January also marks another significant milestone for the country as it will become the homeport of the Carnival Arvia.

On 28th January, the Arvia, which has a normal operating capacity of 5,200 guests and 1,800 crew, will use the St. John's Harbour as the origin of its cruises. Homeporting will open many economic benefits for the country as passengers arriving in Antigua and Barbuda will be required to conduct business with merchants, taxi operators, restaurants, and other establishments ahead of the departure of their cruises.

According to the General Manager of Antigua Cruise Port, Dona Regis-Prosper, Antiguan and Barbudan travellers booking cruises will now also have the option of beginning their journey at home in St. John's.

The Arvia will dock at the recently commissioned fifth berth at the St. John's Harbour.

Regis-Prosper disclosed that the Carnival Arvia will homeport in Antigua and Barbuda until 2025.

At the end of this year's winter tourist season, the arrangement will recommence in November 2023 and continue each year until the expiration of the agreement in 2025.

She added that Antigua Cruise Port will continue to oversee the continued expansion and growth of the country's cruise tourism sector.

Halo donates over \$76,000 to Street Pastors

Religion **Tens of thousands** view Benedict XVI's **body at Vatican**

Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI 's body, his head resting on a pair of crimson pillows, lay in state in St. Peter's Basilica on Monday as tens of thousands queued to pay tribute to the pontiff who shocked the world by retiring a decade ago.

On the eve of the first of three days of viewing, Italian security officials had said at least 25,000-30.000 people would come on Monday.

But by mid-afternoon, around six hours after the basilica's doors opened to the public, Vatican police estimated that about 40,000 had filed by the body, the Holy See said.

As daylight broke, 10 white-gloved Papal Gentlemen – lay assistants to pontiffs and papal households - carried the body on a cloth-covered wooden stretcher after its arrival at the basilica to its resting place in front of the main altar under Bernini's towering bronze canopy.

A Swiss Guard saluted as Benedict's body was

brought in through a side van by foot for a few hundoor after it was transferred in a van from the chapel of the monastery grounds where the increasingly frail, 95-yearold former pontiff died on Saturday morning.

His longtime secretary, Archbishop Georg Gaenswein, and a handful of consecrated laywomen who served in Benedict's household, followed the dred yards in a silent procession toward the basilica.

Some of the women stretched out a hand to touch the body with respect.

Before the rank-andfile faithful were allowed into the basilica, prayers were recited and the basilica's archpriest, Cardinal Mauro Gambetti, sprinkled holy water over the body, and a small cloud of incense was released near the bier.

Benedict's hands were clasped, a rosary around his fingers.

Just after 9 a.m. (0800 GMT), the doors of the basilica were swung open so the public, some of whom had waited for hours in the pre-dawn damp, could cont'd on pg 13

pay their respects to the late pontiff, who retired from the papacy in 2013 — the first pope to do so in 600 years.

Faithful and curious, the public strode briskly up the center aisle to pass by the bier with its cloth draping after waiting in a line that by midmorning snaked around St. Peter's Square.

Benedict's body was dressed with a miter, the peaked headgear of a bishop, and a red cloak.

Filippo Tuccio, 35, said he came from Venice on an overnight train to view Benedict's body.

"I wanted to pay homage to Benedict because he had a key role in my life and my education," Tuccio said.

"When I was young I participated in World Youth Days," he said, referring to the jamborees of young faithful held periodically and attended by pontiffs.

"Tuccio added that he had studied theology, and "his pontificate accompanied me during my university years."

"He was very important for me: for what I am, my way of thinking, my values," Tuccio continued.

Among those coming to the basilica viewing was Cardinal Walter Kasper, like Benedict, a German theologian. Kasper served as head of the Vatican's Christian unity office during Benedict's papacy.

Benedict left an "important mark" on theology and spirituality, but also on the history of the papacy with his courage to step aside.

"This resignation wasn't a sign of weakness, but a sign of strength, a greatness because he saw that he was no longer up to the challenges of being pope," Kasper said.

Kasper, who was among the cardinals who elected Benedict to the papacy in 2005, added that the res-

ignation gave "a more human vision to the papacy: that the pope is a man and is dependent on his physical and mental strengths."

Public viewing was set for 10 hours on Monday, and 12 hours each on Tuesday and Wednesday before Thursday morning's funeral, which will be led by Pope Francis, at St. Peter's Square.

As Benedict desired, the funeral will marked by simplicity, the Vatican said when announcing the death on Saturday.

Workers on Monday were setting up an altar in the square for the funeral Mass.

Also being arranged were rows of chairs for the faithful who want to attend the funeral. Authorities said they expected about 60,000 to come for the Mass.

On Monday, the Vatican confirmed widely reported burial plans. In keeping with his wishes, Benedict's tomb will be in the crypt of the grotto under the basilica that was last used by St. John Paul II, before the saint's body was moved upstairs into the main basilica ahead of his 2011 beatification, Vatican spokesman Matteo Bruni said.

At two sides of the piazza's colonnade, viewers went through the usual security measures required for tourists entering the basilica passing through metal detectors and screening bags through an X-ray machine.

Marina Ferrante, 62, was among them.

"I think his main legacy was teaching us how to be free," she said.

"He had a special intelligence in saying what was essential in his faith and that was contagious" for other faithful.

"The thing I thought when he died was that I would like to be as free as he was."

While venturing that the shy, bookworm German churchman and theologian and the current Argentine-born pontiff had different temperaments, Ferrante said: "I believe there's a continuity between him and Pope Francis and whoever understands the real relationship between them and Christ can see that."

An American man who lives in Rome called the opportunity to view the body "an amazing experience." Mountain Butorac, 47, who is originally from Atlanta, said he arrived 90 minutes before dawn.

"I loved Benedict, I loved him as a cardinal (Joseph Ratzinger), when he was elected pope and also after he retired," Butorac said. "I think he was a sort of people's grandfather living in the Vatican."

With an organ and choir's soft rendition of "Kyrie Eleison" ("Lord, have mercy" in ancient Greek) in the background, ushers moved well-wishers along at a steady clip down the basilica's center aisle.. Someone left a red rose.

A few VIPs had a moment before the general public to pay their respects, including Italian Premier Giorgia Meloni, the far-right leader who in the past has professed admiration for the conservative leanings of Benedict.

Italian President Sergio Mattarella also came to view the body.

The Vatican has said only two nations' official delegations — from Italy and from Benedict's native Germany — were invited formally to the funeral, since the pope emeritus was no longer head of state.

Sister Regina Brand was among the mourners who came to the square before dawn.

"He's a German pope and I am from Germany," she said. "And I am here to express my gratitude and love, and I want to pray for him and to see him."

AP - Brazil's Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva was sworn in as president on Sunday, and in his first address expressed optimism about plans to rebuild while pledging that members of outgoing Jair Bolsonaro's administration will be held to account.

Lula is assuming office for the third time after thwarting far-right incumbent Bolsonaro's reelection bid. His return to power marks the culmination of a political comeback that is thrilling supporters and enraging opponents in a fiercely polarized nation.

"Our message to Brazil is one of hope and reconstruction," Lula said in a speech in Congress' Lower House after signing the document that formally instates him as president. "The great edifice of rights, sovereignty and development that this nation built has been systematically demolished in recent years. To re-erect this edifice, we are going to direct all our efforts."

Sunday afternoon in Brasilia's main esplanade, the party was on. Tens of thousands of supporters decked out in the red of Lula's Workers' Party cheered after his swearing in.

They celebrated when the president said he would send a report about the prior administration to all lawmakers and judicial authorities, revoke Bolsona-

ro's "criminal decrees" that loosened gun control, and hold the prior administration responsible for its denialism in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"We do not carry any spirit of revenge against those who sought to subjugate the nation to their personal and ideological designs, but we are going to ensure the rule of law," Lula said, without mentioning Bolsonaro by name. "Those who erred will answer for their errors, with broad rights to their defense within the due legal process."

Lula's presidency is unlikely to be like his previous two mandates, coming after the tightest presidential race in more than three decades in Brazil and resistance to his taking office by some of his opponents, political analysts say.

The leftist defeated Bolsonaro in the Oct. 30 vote by less than 2 percentage points. For months, Bolsonaro had sown doubts about the reliability of Brazil's electronic vote and his loyal supporters were loath to accept the loss.

Many have gathered outside military barracks since, questioning results and pleading with the armed forces to prevent Lula from taking office.

His most die-hard backers resorted to what some authorities and incoming members of Lula's administration labeled acts of "terrorism" - which had prompted security concerns about inauguration day events.

Lula will have to navigate more challenging economic conditions than he enjoyed in his first two terms, when the global commodities boom proved a windfall for Brazil.

At the time, his administration's flagship welfare program helped lift tens of millions of impoverished people into the middle class. He left office with a personal approval rating of 83%.

Given the nation's political fault lines, it is highly unlikely Lula ever reattains the popularity he once enjoyed, or even sees his approval rating rise above 50%, said Maurício Santoro, a political science professor at Rio de Janeiro's State University.

Furthermore, Santoro said, the credibility of Lula and his Workers' Party were assailed by a sprawling corruption investigation. Party officials were jailed, including Lula whose convictions were later annulled on procedural grounds.

The Supreme Court then ruled that the judge presiding over the case had colluded with prosecutors to secure a conviction.

Lula and his supporters have maintained he was railroaded. Others were willing to look past possible malfeasance as a means to unseat Bolsonaro and bring the nation back together.

"I always wanted to go the inauguration, I didn't think I would have a

chance to see Lula there after he was jailed," said Tamires Valente, 43, a marketing professional from Brasilia. "I am very emotional, Lula deserves this."

But Bolsonaro's backers refuse to accept someone they view as a criminal returning to the highest office. And with tensions running hot, a series of events has prompted fear that violence could erupt on inauguration day.

On Dec. 12, dozens of people tried to invade a federal police building in Brasilia, and burned cars and buses in other areas of the city.

Then on Christmas Eve, police arrested a 54-year-old man who admitted to making a bomb that was found on a fuel truck headed to Brasilia's airport.

He had been camped outside Brasilia's army headquarters with hundreds of other Bolsonaro supporters since Nov. 12. He told police he was ready for war against communism, and planned the attack with people he had met at the protests, according to excerpts of his deposition released by local media.

Bolsonaro finally condemned the bomb plot in a Dec. 30 farewell address on social media, hours before cont'd on pg 17

CMC - Police in Dominica are investigating the death of a medical practitioner whose body was found in a pool of blood at her home in Goodwill, on the outskirts of the capital Roseau, on Friday.

Police believe the death of Dr. Velma Valmond, the island's 17th murder this year, is as a result of domestic violence.

Police Inspector, Fixton Henderson, told reporters that law enforcement officials had responded "to a report of domestic violence between a woman and her boyfriend" and on arrival at the residence found the body of the 35-year-old woman "in a pool of blood with a severe laceration across her neck". Henderson said the victim was examined and pronounced dead by a medical doctor and her body was transported to a funeral home where it is awaiting an autopsy.

"Velma's boyfriend, 32 year old boyfriend, Alexander, was also found on the floorand in a state of distress," Henderson said, adding "he was transported to the Accident and Emergency Department of the Dominica China Friendship Hospital and is in a stable condition."

The police said Dr. Valmond's 18-yearold daughter is also nursing injuries that were apparently sustained during the incident and is also in stable condition at the hospital.

Floods in Philippines leave 51 dead, over a dozen missing

Thousands of AP people in the Philippines emergency remained in shelters in the wake of devastating Christmas flooding, as the death toll climbed to 51 with 19 missing, authorities said Monday.

Images showed residents in southern Misamis Occidental province sweeping away thick mud from the floors of their homes.

In the seaside village of Cabol-anonan, coconut trees were uprooted and huts made of light material were nearly flattened.

The Northern Mindanao region bore the brunt of the disaster, reporting 25 deaths, according to the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management

Council.

Most of the deaths were from drowning and landslides, and among the missing were fishermen whose boats capsized.

Floods have subsided in most parts, but more than 8,600 people were still in shelters.

Over 4,500 houses were damaged by the floods, along with roads and bridges, and some areas still struggle with disrupted power and water supply, the disaster management agency said.

Ivy Amor Amparo, a hospital worker from Ginoog city in Misamis Oriental province, said that the seaside home of her parents and siblings was damaged

AP - An arrest warrant has been issued in Botswana for former President Ian Khama on a charge of illegal possession of firearms.

Khama, currently residing in neighboring South Africa, denies the charge, his lawyer said.

The former president was formally charged in April last year but has not yet appeared in court. A Botswana court issued the warrant for Khama's arrest on Dec. 29.

Khama has been in South Africa for about a year, after falling out with his hand-picked successor, President Mokgweetsi Masisi.

Khama, 69, president of Botswa-

Botswana has not yet asked South Africa to extradite Khama.

AP - Mourners began paying their respects to Pelé in a solemn procession past his coffin at the Vila Belmiro Stadium in his hometown of Santos on Monday.

The Brazilian soccer great died Thursday after a battle with cancer. He was 82.

Pelé's coffin was placed on the field where he scored scored some of the best goals of his career. Mourners walked past his casket in the 16,000seat stadium outside Sao Paulo. His burial will take place in a cemetery only 600 meters away on Tuesday.

Fans arrived at the stadium in the early hours of Monday to honor Edson Arantes do Nascimento, globally known as Pelé.

One of them was Brazilian Supreme Court Justice Gilmar Mendes.

"It is a very sad moment, but we are now seeing the real meaning of this legendary player to our country," Mendes told journalists. "My office has shirts signed by Pelé, a picture of him as a goalkeeper, also signed by him. DVDs, photos, a big collection of him."

Mendes also said Pelé was a humble man despite his global fame, and that he deserves every tribute.

Pelé's casket will be ushered through the streets of Santos before his burial. Brazil President Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva and other dignitaries are expected to attend.

Pelé had undergone treatment for colon cancer since 2021. The medical center where he had been hospitalized said he died of multiple organ failure as a result of the cancer.
