Government issues deadline regarding ownership of Alfa Nero

Given that there are currently misleading stories, appearing in online news portals of a dubious journalistic standard, which quote deceptive remarks from members of the United Progressive Party (UPP); the Government of Antigua and Barbuda makes the following statement.

Regarding the current ownership of the Superyacht, Alfa Nero, which has been abandoned in Falmouth Harbour for several months, leaving its crew unpaid and numerous bills unsettled, international law enforcement agencies have advised the Government that the beneficial owner of the vessel is the Russian Oligarch, Andrey Grigoryevich Guryev and his daughter, Yulia Guryev-Motlokhov.

The suggestion that the vessel is owned by a Mr. Alexander Mavrodi is unsubstantiated, indicating that it is either a hoax by which senior members of the UPP



have been duped, or it is a deliberate fabrication. Certainly, no such claim has been made to the competent authorities in Antigua and Barbuda.



Under the laws of Antigua and Barbuda, the Port Manager gave the beneficial owner of the Alfa Nero, ten days' public notice from 21 March to present documents of ownership, and to remove the vessel from the territory of Antigua and Barbuda. If a Mr. Alexander Mavrodi exists and, contrary to the evidence available to international law enforcement agencies, he is the verifiable beneficial owner and can substantiate his claim, he is free to advance his claim by 31 March.

If by March 31, no person declares themselves to be the beneficial owner, producing verifiable documents of ownership, by law, the Port Manager will regard the Alfa Nero as abandoned and also as a threat to the safety or security of the harbour and the wellbeing of the country. Consequently, the vessel will be seized and offered for sale by auction in the interest of the safety of the harbour and the well being of the economy and the people of Antigua and Barbuda.



Minister asks trade ministry's staff to 'turn a new page'

Trade Minister E.P. Chet Greene is calling on the staff of the ministry to 'turn a new page' of commitment and dedication to the task at hand, as part of the overall goal of fulfilling its mandate.

Greene made the call on Monday during a general staff meeting of members from the several departments within the ministry, held at the Sir John E. St. Luce Financial Centre on Factory Road.

"There are three things that I would wish to ask for your commitment; these are (a) a commitment to work as a team, (b) show respect for those placed in positions of authority in your departments and (c) share in the glory of the successes of the team," he admonished.

While he noted that some departments may have under-performed in the past, Greene told the staff that he was not there to focus on the negativity, but on the positives and a renewed emphasis by all to do well for the ministry and for the people

of Antigua and Barbuda.

"I want us to build a team, to be friends, I want us to work together with a shared and common interest, Antigua and Barbuda. We can't talk about increase in salaries and wages with improvements in benefits and working conditions when we ourselves are not giving to the exercise," he stated.

Greene recalled listening to a preacher at a recent funeral who called on public servants to work, because if salaries are late, they are the first to complain.

He also addressed the issue of the service meted out



staff in many government departments and the litany of complaints about the poor level of service available, generally in the public sector.

The minister also spoke of the importance of staff members upgrading their skills and he encouraged more persons to take up the challenge of pursuing specialized studies in the several areas that form part of the ministry.

He encouraged them to take advantage of the fact that there is a University of the West Indies campus right here in Antigua and

higher learning much easier.

"You will benefit, the country will benefit and Antigua and Barbuda will benefit from your improved skills-set," he added.

Permanent Secretary, Clarence Pilgrim, in his brief remarks, noted that the Ministry of Trade is the 'life-blood' of any nation. He noted that customs collects much of the duties and fees that the ministry generates.

"What you are doing is critically important to the development of the economy of Antigua and Barbuda. This is an extremely important ministry and as such, we will position ourselves to that level of importance," he declared.

The meeting was the first such engagement between the minister and the staff since his re-assignment of the trade portfolio following the January 18th general elections.

The National Office of Disaster Services (NODS) will build on the efforts started, to bring awareness to tsunami readiness in Antigua and Barbuda.

This follows a successful Caribe Wave Tsunami Exercise on Thursday which involved 25 workplaces and schools, to include a preschool in Gambles.

As part of the activity, participants were required to move to their designated tsunami safe areas after receiving an alert of a mock tsunami warning message on their smartphones, via the Common Alerting Protocol (CAP), which is the official alerting system for NODS regarding hazards.

Among the areas identified as safe were the St. John's Cathedral, the highest point in the Botanical Gardens, the stands at the Antigua Recreation Grounds



and Michael's Mount.

Some educational institutions in the countryside evacuated to nearby hilly areas.

Health & Wellness For the future: Eating with sustainability in mind

The month of March is recognized globally as Nutrition Month. This year's theme 'Good Nutrition is Fuel for the Future', aims to promote ways to develop and maintain a healthy lifestyle, through healthful eating and physical activity. The objective is to reap benefits now and, in the years, to come.

The past few years have been challenging for many of us. Navigating these unforeseen circumstances may have placed our health in turmoil. In addition to the pressures imposed by Covid 19, we have seen global economic crises, and the impact that inflation has placed on the global food supply. Additionally, climate change continues to threaten the availability of healthy foods.

In spite of the uncertain future, we are hopeful and look to brighter days

ahead. It is paramount that we intentionally assess our nutritional status and become more determined to make the necessary changes that will place us on the path to improved health, while helping to manage, delay or prevent chronic non-communicable diseases (NCDs).

As we attempt to make informed food choices and develop healthy eating habits, our buying power has been significantly impacted in this economic climate. According to the recent Consumer Price Index (CPI) report by the Antigua & Barbuda Statistics Division (2023), 2022 saw a drastic increase of 11.7% in food costs due to inflation. The index for vegetables increased by 11.6%, while meat and meat products rose by 13.1%. These indexes accounted for the largest contributors to food inflation by 23.0% and 19.7% respectively. In view of the current statistics, we are faced with the



challenge to eat healthily in spite of the high food cost. It has, therefore, become necessary to be creative while planning a healthy, sustainable diet.

A well-thought-out plan involves, firstly, creating a food budget for meals and snacks for the entire family. Secondly, planning your family's meals, and finally, deciding where those foods will come from. Here are a few guidelines that will help us to eat healthily with sustainability in mind:

Plan weekly meals & snacks – Include more plant-based options

Prepare most of your meals at home

Eat a variety of fruits, vegetables, starchy foods, protein foods and dairy to optimize nutritional benefits

Jetblue to add second service to Grenada for Spicemas 2023

The Grenada Tourism Authority (GTA) has announced that JetBlue is adding additional service to the destination in time for its biggest cultural festival, Spicemas.

From 7 August to 1 September 2023, the carrier will operate a second daily nonstop flight, a 162-seat A320, leaving New York's John F Kennedy (JFK) airport at 9:50 pm and arriving at Grenada's Maurice Bishop International Airport (GND) at 2:47 am. The returning flight departs GND at 5:01 am and arrives at JFK at 9:57 am.

JetBlue currently offers daily nonstop service from New York, and American Airlines offers a daily nonstop flight from Miami, along with a seasonal weekly flight from Charlotte on Saturdays. Also, in line with the



uptick in family travel to the destination, JetBlue has increased capacity on its regular service, from an A320 to the 200-seater A321, for the entire summer peak period from 15 June to 5 September. Latin America and the Caribbean reiterates commitment to basic learning

Basic learning has been the top priority of education ministers in Latin America and the Caribbean as they gathered in Bogota, Colombia to reaffirm their commitment to "promote urgent educational recovery.

The World Bank reported that the meeting aims to discuss and agree on concrete measures to ensure that all children and adolescents get the basic learning skills that they need to reach their full potential and become essential units of the society.

The pandemic has undoubtedly affected 1.5 years of schooling, which according to World Bank, could have set back learning outcome for more than 10 years.

"Preliminary evidence from several countries shows greater losses at the primary than at the secondary level and among students at the lowest socioeconomic levels. Collective learning losses will hurt Latin America and the Caribbean in the future, exacerbating inequalities and jeopardizing eco-

- The Trini-CMC dad-based Caribbean Court of Justice (CCJ) has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Guyana-based Caribbean Community (CARICOM) Secretariat aimed at improving access and delivery of justice in the Caribbean region.

The agreement formalizes the partnership between the two regional institutions to execute several justice and legal sector projects which are being funded by the European Union's 11th European Development Fund (EDF).

The Secretariat will provide procurement support to the CCJ in the execution of several projects which form part of a larger project which also comprises work to benefit the Caribbean Community Administrative Tribunal (CCAT) and the Council of Legal Education (CLE). The implementation of these projects is expected to have a transformative effect on justice delivery in the region.

The CCJ said that some of the more specific outcomes include a region-wide public education campaign to raise awareness of the Court's Original Jurisdiction (OJ) which plays a critical role in the Caribbean Single Market Economy (CSME) and

and protects the freedom of movement of people, goods, services, capital, labour, skills and establishment guaranteed under the CSME.

In addition, the CCJ will also sensitise judicial officers and attorneys on the Court's referral process so that national judiciaries are aware of their obligation to send issues concerning the rights under the CSME to the CCJ for judgment, when necessary.

The CCJ said that it is anticipated that increased knowledge of provisions under the Revised Treaty of Chaguaramas, which governs the regional integration movement, and avenues for redress will empower regional citizens to capitalise on their rights provided by the Treaty.

It said that the grant will also be used to upgrade the information and communication technology infrastructure in the CCJ courtroom to enhance the court user experience for litigants and attorneys.

CCAT, an impartial and independent judicial body responsible for hearing and delivering judgments on employment disputes from CARICOM institutions will also benefit from funds received under this grant," the CCJ said in a statement.

"The Tribunal is a long-awaited development for employees of these organisations, as CARICOM institutions enjoy immunity from lawsuits brought in national courts and so, for many years employees did not have an avenue to challenge the legality of

employment decisions."

The CCJ said that through the revision of the legal education curriculum for the regional law schools under the CLE's management, law students will also indirectly benefit from this EDF grant. It is critical for the curriculum to be up to date to meet the emerging legal needs and trends within the Caribbean since most practising attorneys in the region are matriculated by these law schools.

"It is anticipated that this collaboration will further strengthen the relationship between and among the various CARICOM institutions and the European Union," the CCJ said, adding that it "welcomes this partnership and looks forward to the mutually rewarding benefits".

Holness reaffirms commitment to Republic status for Jamaica

Jamaica's Prime Minister Andrew Holness has reaffirmed the Government's commitment to the process of transitioning the country from a Constitutional Monarchy to a Republic.

Holness told the newly formed Constitutional Reform Committee at the Prime Minister's Office that the approach must be collaborative and guided by expert advice.

"In spite of the delay in formally establishing this constitutional reform committee, I am pleased we have all made progress. I would like to thank all of you gathered today for graciously accepting the Government's invitation," he said.

The Committee, which includes members of the Government, the Parliamentary Opposition, relevant experts, and members of the general public, has



been formed to ensure Jamaica's smooth transition to a republic.

Holness stated that the government has made a deliberate decision to build on the work of previous administrations in order to move the country closer to Republican status.

"We took the position that we should not seek to restart while ignoring the work that has already been completed." Because significant work was completed, we consider this a building step. It simplifies the work, and I'm confident we'll move faster as a result of taking into account and incorporating what has been done," he added.

The Committee's work will include a thorough and comprehensive review of the 1962 Constitution, including the 2011 Charter of Fundamental Rights and Freedoms, as well as recommendations for reform made by previous constitutional reform commissions and committees.

Meanwhile, Marlene Malahoo Forte, Minister of Legal and Constitutional Affairs, emphasized that partisan interests will be set aside during the Committee's deliberations.

The Minister greeted the members and reminded them of their mission and the work that remained to be done. "It is an enormous honour for us to be a part of the work ahead of us." "It's been a long road to get here," she said.

The Constitutional Reform Committee is made up of 14 members, including Co-Chairs Minister Malahoo Forte and Ambassador Rocky Meade, the Attorney General, Dr Derrick McKoy, and Opposition Representatives Anthony Hylton and Senator Donna Scott Mottley.

Laleta Davis-Mattis, Senator Ransford Braham, Senator Tom Tavares-Finson, Dr Nadeen Spence, Sujae Boswell, Hugh Small, Dr David Henry, Professor Richard Albert, and Dr Lloyd Barnett are among the other members.

Suspect arrested in connection with Bermuda's latest murder

Loop - Police in Bermuda announced today that they have arrested one person in connection with Saturday's murder.

The Bermuda Police Service revealed this information as they identified the deceased as Marco Perinchief.

Perinchief, 49, was found unconscious in a grassy area on Clyde Best Lane in Sandys. He was taken to the King Edward VII Memorial Hospital where he was pronounced dead. At a press conference today, Acting Chief Inspector Jason Smith said the suspect is a 47-year-old man.

Smith said the suspect was initially identified by eyewitnesses.

Smith explained that Perinchief's murder was the culmination of two disturbances that occurred in the area.

"There's an incident that took place on Somerset Road next to the junction with Hook And Ladder Lane which from our inquiries might be what started the second incident involving Mr Perinchief and the man that has been taken into police, custody," Smith said.

Smith noted that detectives were reviewing CCTV footage and asked members of the public, who may have filmed or witness the incident, to assist with their investigation.

An autopsy is expected to be done on Perinchief's body this week to determine his cause of death.

Six dead in Tennessee school shooting

By Bernd Debusmann Jr Six people have been killed in a school shooting in the US city of Nashville, Tennessee.

Three of the victims were pupils aged nine or under at Covenant School, a privately run Christian school.

They were named by police as Evelyn Dieckhaus, Hallie Scruggs and William Kinney.

The adults victims were employees and named as Cynthia Peak, 61, Katherine Koonce, 60, and Mike Hill, 61.

Covenant School has about 200 students, and teaches pupils from three years old up to around 12.

Ms Peak was a substitute teacher working at the school that day. Mr Hill was a janitor and Ms Koonce is described as the Head of School on Covenant's website.

Police named the suspect as a 28-year-old woman, Audrey Hale, who identified as transgender.

Hale was armed with three guns, including a semi-automatic rifle, and was shot dead by police.

Nashville Police Chief John Drake said the shooter had conducted surveillance, and that maps of the building showing entry and exit points were found at a nearby home.

Police received the first call about the incident at 10:13 local time on Monday morning.



The school teaches pupils from pre-school up until about 12 years old.

Police said the suspect got in by firing through one of the school doors, which were all locked.

Hale fired shots on the ground floor before moving to the building's second floor, and was shot dead in a confrontation with police at 10:27. One officer was injured by broken glass during the operation.

A search of a nearby parked car had led officers to "firmly believe" that Hale was a former student of the school.

Police have spoken with the attacker's father during a search of a nearby home that is listed as the shooter's address.

Chief Drake said investigators there found a manifesto and "a map of how all of this was going to play out".

In the hours that followed the shooting, parents gathered at a nearby church to be reunited with their children. As buses of children arrived, they hung their heads and hands out of the windows to wave to their parents, according to the Tennessean newspaper.

The Presbyterian-affiliated Covenant School is located in the upscale Green Hills neighborhood, just south of downtown Nashville.

The mother of one pupil at the school said her son had been left traumatised by the shooting.

"I think he's doing better now that he knows that the shooter is dead," Shaundelle Brooks told BBC News.

"These are conversations we shouldn't be having," she added. "We're failing our children."

In a statement, Nashville Mayor John Cooper said the city had "joined the dreaded, long list of communities to experience a school shooting".

"My heart goes out to the families of the victims," Mr Cooper added. "Our entire city stands with you."

President Joe Biden called the shooting a "family's worst nightmare".

"We have to do more to stop gun violence," he said, calling on Congress to pass gun control laws. "It is ripping at our communities apart, and ripping at the very soul of this nation."

The attack was America's 129th mass shooting of 2023, according to Gun Violence Archive, a non-profit that tracks gun violence data.

According to data compiled by Education Week, there have been 12 school shootings that have resulted in deaths or injuries in the US this year up until the end of last week.

North Korea test-fires two more missiles as US sends carrier

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Fighter jets roared off the USS Nimitz as the nuclear-powered U.S. aircraft carrier and its battle group began exercises with South Korean warships on Monday, hours after North Korea fired two short-range ballistic missiles in an apparent protest of the allies' expanding drills.

The seventh missile test this month underscored heightening tensions in the region as both the North's weapons tests and the U.S.-South Korea joint military exercises have intensified in a cycle of tit-for-tat.

The launches may have been timed for the arrival of the USS Nimitz and its strike group, including a guided missile cruiser and two destroyers, which engaged in air defense exercises and other drills with South Korean warships in waters near Jeju island.

Jang Do Young, a South Korean navy spokesperson, said the drills were aimed at sharpening joint operational capabilities and demonstrating the U.S. commitment to defend its ally with the full range of options, including nuclear, in face of the North's "escalating nuclear and missile threats."

The Nimitz strike group was expected to arrive at the South Korean mainland port of Busan on Tuesday.

"The United States has deployable strategic assets at the ready on every day," said Rear Adm. Christopher Sweeney, commander of Carrier Strike Group Eleven. "We can continue to deploy those assets and we will."

South Korea's Joint Chiefs of Staff said the two North Korean missiles were fired from a western inland area south of the North's capital of

Pyongyang from around 7:47 a.m. to 8 a.m. and traveled around 370 kilometers (229 miles) before landing at sea. Japan's military said the missiles, which landed outside Japan's exclusive economic zone, flew on an irregular trajectory and reached a maximum altitude of 50 kilometers (31 miles).

Japan has previously used similar language to describe a North Korean solid-fuel missile apparently modeled after Russia's Iskander mobile ballistic system, which is designed to be maneuverable in low-altitude flight to better evade South Korean missile defenses. North Korea also has another short-range system with similar characteristics that resembles the U.S. MGM-140 Army Tactical Missile System.

Japanese Chief Cabinet Secretary Hirokazu Matsuno said North Korea may dial up its testing activity further with more missile launches or even conducting its first nuclear test since September 2017.

The South Korean and Japanese militaries denounced the latest launches as a serious provocation threatening regional peace and said they were working with the United States to analyze the missiles further. The U.S. Indo Pacific Command said the launches did not pose an immediate threat to the United States or its allies, but still highlighted the "destabilizing impact" of North Korea's illicit nuclear weapons and missiles programs.

North Korea, which has weathered tightened U.N. Security Council sanctions since 2016 over its nuclear developments, didn't immediately comment on the launches.

Strike over pay paralyzes rail, air travel in Germany

BERLIN(AP) - Trains,planes and public transit systems stood still across much of Germany on Monday as labor unions called a major one-day strike over salaries in an effort to win inflation-busting raises for their members.

The 24-hour walkout - one of the biggest in decades - also affected cargo transport by rail and ship, as workers at the country's ports and waterways joined the strike.

Many commuters opted to drive to work, causing some delays on the roads, while those who could worked from home.

Unions are seeking a pay increase of at least 10.5% and have dismissed offers from employers of about 5% over two years plus one-off payments.

High inflation also seen elsewhere last year has hit many workers hard, said Ulrich Silberbach of the Civil Service Federation.

"We have recorded drops in real wages and these need to be balanced out," he told reporters in

Antigua and Barbuda miss out on Gold Cup after losing to Barbados

Antigua and Barbuda missed out on qualification to this summer's Gold Cup tournament after Barbados came from behind to snatch a 2-1 victory over the Benna Boys in their final Concacaf Nations League (CNL) League B Group A match at the Sir Vivian Richards Stadium on Sunday.

The day started on a much brighter note for The Benna Boys. As the clock ticked past the half-hour mark Antigua and Barbuda forward Myles Weston whipped in a corner kick from the far side that he tucked into the net for a spectacular opening goal.

But Barbados was hungry for points in the CNL and mounted a rally. After linking in the midfield, Thierry Gale surged forward and sent a right-footed shot from just outside the box for the equalizer.

And in the 87th minute, Barbados had their first advantage of the tournament with defender Shane Codrington sending a ball over the top to forward Taijo James.

James used his first touch to send a looping shot over the advancing Antigua and Barbuda goalkeeper Nicholas Townsend to give

Despite attacking changes from Antigua and Barbuda, the advantage held and Barbados earned the three points.

Both teams now will begin preparations for the next edition of the Concacaf Nations League, when each will again compete in League B.

Barbados' first-ever League B victory also barred Antigua and Barbuda from qualifying for the Gold Cup preliminary round along with group winners Cuba.

Cuba gained qualification to the Gold Cup Group stage by winning Group A and Guadeloupe finishing second. Antigua and Barbuda ended in third place with Barbados finishing in the cellar position.

Cuba beat Guadeloupe 1-0 in Havana on Sunday to win the group with 15 points. Guadeloupe qualified for the Gold Cup by virtue of finishing second in the group on goal difference ahead of the Benna Boys after both teams ended their CNL campaign with nine points each.

Antigua and Barbuda's Benna Boys had beaten Guadeloupe 1-0 at the Stade Rene Serge Nabajoth in Les Abymes, Guadeloupe, on Thursday night.

Antigua and Barbuda's midfielder Ashley Nathaniel-George made the difference, slipping into the box in the 57th minute and scoring an individual goal.

It was the second win for Antigua and Barbuda over Guadeloupe in the competition.
