


TWO HOSPITALIZED AFTER LATE NIGHT SHOOTING

Two hospitalized following late night shooting

A late-night shooting at one of the country's leading resort hotels, has left two people in the hospital nursing wounds, and are said to be in stable condition. The incident happened at Carlisle Bay Hotel in Old Road village, the most southerly community in Antigua. According to police reports, the incident hap-

The incident happened pened at 11:30 pm on Tues-Carlisle Bay Hotel in day night.

> The police have been tightlipped about a possible motive for the shooting, only to say that two people



are currently assisting them with their investigation. Other reports indicate that the victims are employees of the hotel and were leaving work when the assailant allegedly approached them and started shooting.

The victims are said to be a 33-year-old man and a 32-year-old woman, were walking towards the gate together, when the first shot was discharged, wounding the male who cried out in pain. Several other gunshots were reportedly fired; the man was shot at least twice, while his female co-worker sustained about three bullet wounds to both arms and her side. Both were rushed to hospital and are said to be in stable, but serious condition.

There have been several theories about a possible motive for the shooting, but neither the police nor associates of the victims appear willing to address this matter, at what is believed to be a very emotional time.

The police have confirmed that one of the two men in custody, assisting with their investigation, also works at the hotel. The two men, aged 23 and 22, both live in Golden Grove New Extension.

Management and security arrangements in place for Alfa Nero

The government has put in place a number of measures to safeguard the multi-million-dollar super yacht, *Alfa Nero*, which it seized on Tuesday, under the provisions of the Antigua Port Authority Amendment Act of 2023.

Antigua Port Authority General Manager, Darwin Telemaque, has reported that systems have been put in place to ensure the proper maintenance of the vessel, as well as to ensure that there is 24-hour security.

Key to all these arrangements, is the situation with the remaining five crew members and their future. Telemaque reported that negotiations have been completed with the crew and they have decided to stay until the vessel is sold, as has been the stated purpose of the government.

"They have stayed with the vessel, and we can also report that the *Alfa Nero* is now flying the flag of Antigua and Barbuda, as those arrangements to have it flagged have been com-



pleted. We are still working on insurance for the vessel. Those negotiations are ongoing. At the same time, we have made arrangements with the Antigua Yacht Club, on a maintenance schedule for the vessel," said Telemaque. The Antigua Yacht Club will also be responsible for the management of the vessel on an interim basis. it aboard the vessel, during the seizure on Tuesday, that there were obvious signs that the vessel is in need of major maintenance work. The *Alfa Nero* has been in the Antigua and Barbuda waters for over a year, after it was sanctioned by the international community and later abandoned by its owner, believed to be a Russian Oligarch.

the government, that they did not have the funds to carry out the needed maintenance, and that was one of the reasons that spurred the government into action, to effectively take ownership of the vessel.

So far, a shipment of 2,500 gallons of fuel has been delivered to the vessel by the West Indies Oil Company.

The next major step in the process will be the sale of the vessel to the highest bidder or via a public auction. The proceeds from the sale will go towards settling outstanding bills owed to local suppliers, the crew, and the management of the Antigua Yacht Club with the remainder deposited into the national treasury. 
Hotels occupancy projections for the summer months are out

The Antigua and Barbuda Hotels and Tourist Association (ABHTA) is predicting a busy summer period this year but reported that it will fall short of the robust performances of 2019, the best year on record.

The data is based on bookings for hotels operating in the country for the months of May, June and July. The data shows that the bookings for May will see occupancy figures at a rate of 60 percent compared with 64.10 percent for the same month in 2019.

For June, the projections are that occupancy rates will fall to 54 percent compared with 56.40 percent for the same month in 2019. July is predicted to outperform its corresponding month in 2019. This year, occupancy in July will amount to 58 percent, compared with 54.70 percent, in 2019.

According to the ABH-

Home porting confirmed for four ships for the 2023-24 cruise season

At least four vessels will home port in Antigua during the upcoming cruise season, making the St. John's Harbour one of the busiest in the Eastern Caribbean.

General Manager of Antigua Cruise Ports, Dona Regis-Prosper, said the Star Clipper which home ported in Antigua last Saturday on its final call this season, will be joined by its sister ship, Royal Clipper, and home port at the St. John's Harbour next season.

The other vessels, the P & O Cruises, Arvia and Emerald Azzarra will also be homeporting later in the year, according to Regis-Prosper, who noted that these developments help to confirm that Antigua Cruise Ports is on track to record its best season, so far.

"We want homeporting to be a regular occurrence at Antigua Cruise Port regardless of the magnitude. Turnarounds help to solidify our space as leaders in cruise tourism in the Caribbean," Regis- Prosper said.

During the Star Clipper's homeporting call last Saturday, most of the 127

passengers who arrived on the vessel ended their trip in Antigua with 117 visitors debarking during the morning.

Meanwhile, fifty- two people boarded the 170passenger capacity ship in the afternoon. Operations Manager for Pier Services, Rawle Reynolds said, "We



The World Around Us Contents In Kerala, an aging trend bucks India's booming population

KOCHI, India (AP) — When 82-year-old Vasanthi Baby almost tripped while climbing down the stairs in her home in southern India's Kerala state, she decided, along with her 84-year-old husband V. Baby, to move to an assisted living center.

The couple are two of a growing number of people in India's only aging state that are moving into specialized facilities. They're happy with the care they receive: round-the-clock access to nurses, the reassuring company of their own generation and healthy, regular meals.

"There is a feeling of safety we can only get here," V. Baby said. "We cannot get this at home."

Like millions of others in the region, Baby, a retired math professor, spent his life savings building a twofloor multi-bedroom home. It was meant to last generations: their son Sony was supposed to have and grow his family here, but he emigrated to the United Arab Emirates for work and a better quality of life.

In the past 60 years, the percentage of people age 60 and over in Kerala has shot up from 5.1% to 16.5% — the highest proportion in any Indian state. This makes Kerala an outlier in a country with a rapidly growing population, soon to be the world's most populous at 1.4 billion. India has a booming workforce and young population, but language barriers, climate threats, minimal federal provisions and an increasing desire among younger people like Sony to live elsewhere put the state's older people in a precarious position.

The country's population has more than quadrupled since its independence from colonial rule 75 years ago. But the world's largest democracy re-

mains, in many ways, two countries: a place that is both urban and rural, modern and pre-industrial, opulent and impoverished. For older people, where they fall on the divide determines how they'll live out their autumn years.

Just 20 kilometers away (12 miles) from the assisted living center, in the Mattancherry neighborhood of Kerala's financial capital Kochi, 65-yearold Zainaba Ali lives in a small room with an asbestos roof in a corner of her daughter's house.

Ali spent most of her youth working in the countries around the Middle East as a cleaner but has little savings to show for it. After developing arthritis and a slew of other health conditions making her unable to work, she returned to India.

"I receive a small pension from the government but that hasn't come through in months. I survive on the goodwill of my children," Ali said. Her daughter doesn't work and her son is a daily wage laborer. "Even buying medicines has become difficult now."

In India, people over 60 are entitled to a state pension of roughly 1,600 rupees (\$20) a month, usually not enough for basic necessities. It means that many older people rely on their children if they are no longer able to work and don't have enough saved up. In Kerala, where there are over 4.2 million elderly people, it can be tough on families' finances.

Flooding and heat waves, both made worse by human-caused climate change, adds to the vulnerability of Kerala's older people, said Anjal Prakash, a research director at the Indian School of Business.

Kochi in particular has been bearing the brunt of the damages. A disas*cont'd on pg 11*

trous flood in 2018 sunk large parts of the city. The summer months are getting hotter and longer and rains are becoming more erratic and concentrated.

"During monsoons we need to hold open umbrellas inside the house," Ali said, pointing to buckets kept in various corners of the house. "Summer has become absolutely unbearable. Because of the scorching sun, we often go to the seashore seeking a bit of shade. Inside here the fan does not even run properly."

Prakash said specific measures to look after older people who have their own needs and vulnerabilities is a "dark spot" in climate policy.

"Understanding the specific needs of seniors is the first step in protecting them. ... People are not trained to rescue older people and children," he said.

The movement of younger people away from the state also means fewer people to care for their older relatives.

Poonam Muttreja, the executive director of the New Delhi-based Population Foundation of India, pointed to a steady stream of outward migration from Kerala for at least 50 years. In the 1960s and 1970s, "there was a huge migration to the Middle East, eastern Africa." Many went to other countries as school teachers or nurses, a trend that's continued in more recent times, now also to Europe and north America, she said.

The aging population, combined with the migration of younger generations, means there will be 35 people over 60 in the state for every 100 working-age people by 2030, according to the Kerala government. It means more specialized care facilities would be needed, with enough workers to staff them.

"Getting qualified employees is a big challenge today and bringing people from other states doesn't always work because of language barriers,"

said Alex Joseph, the managing trustee of Signature Homes, the assisted living center where the Babys reside. Joseph added that getting staff from within Kerala is also difficult since most of them aspire to migrate abroad for work.

"Kerala probably sends out more nurses to the rest of the world than any other single region in India or elsewhere. To get them to stay here and work here for long periods is extremely difficult," he said.

The state's unique demographics in India are due to declining fertility and increasing life expectancies as a result of statewide policies. Since the state was formed in 1956, Kerala prioritized social welfare and invested heavily in public health and education.

It paid off: Kerala's literacy rate is 93% compared to India's 75%. It's also the only state in India to have a maternal mortality rate that is less than one for every 100,000 live births.

In other parts of India, especially in poorer regions in the north, states have a larger population, higher levels of corruption and other factors that cause them to lag behind in health and education, Muttreja said.

But like Kerala, "southern Indian states have lower fertility rates because they invested in literacy, health infrastructure and family planning," said Muttreja. She estimated that states like southern Tamil Nadu could also see Kerala-like trends in the long and medium term.

Although that's good news for most younger working people, it can be tough on older generations.

Despite his cheerful demeanor, Baby admits he misses his son but agrees there is a better life to be had elsewhere.

"I cannot ask him to stay here," he said.

Health & Wellness Juul Labs agrees to pay \$462 million settlement to six states

Electronic cigarette-maker Juul Labs Inc. will pay \$462 million to six states and the District of Columbia, marking the largest settlement the company has reached so far for its role in the youth vaping surge, the attorneys general in several states announced Wednesday.

The agreement with New York, California, Colorado, Illinois, Massachusetts, New Mexico and Washington, D.C. is the latest in a string of recent legal agreements Juul has reached to settle lawsuits related to the way it marketed addictive nicotine products. Critics said Juul was trying to lure children too young to smoke.

Like some other settlements reached by Juul, this latest includes restrictions on the marketing and distribution of the company's vaping products. For example, it is barred from any direct or indirect marketing that targets youth, which includes anyone under age 35. Juul will also limit the amount of purchases customers can make in retail stores and online.

"Juul lit a nationwide public health crisis by putting addictive products in the hands of minors and convincing them that it's harmless," New York Attorney General Letitia James said in a statement. "Today they are paying the price for the harm they caused."

A spokesperson for Juul said with Wednesday's settlement, the Washington D.C.-based company was "nearing total resolution of the company's historical legal challenges and securing certainty for our future."

The spokesperson added that underage use of Juul products has declined by 95% since 2019 based on the National Youth Tobacco Survey. According to the CDC though, since sur-

veys were administered online instead of on school campuses during the pandemic, the results cannot be compared to prior years.

Juul rocketed to the top of the U.S. vaping market about five years ago with the popularity of flavors like mango, mint and crème brûlée. But the startup's rise was fueled by use among teenagers, some of whom became hooked on Juul's high-nicotine pods.

Parents, school administrators and politicians have largely blamed the company for a surge in underage vaping.

District of Columbia Attorney General Brian Schwalb said in a statement that Juul "knew how addictive and dangerous its products were and actively tried to cover up that medical truth."

In September, Juul agreed to pay

nearly \$440 million over a period of six to 10 years to settle a two-year investigation by 33 states into the marketing of its high-nicotine vaping products to young people. That settlement amounted to about 25% of Juul's U.S. sales of \$1.9 billion in 2021.

Three months later, the company said it had secured an equity investment to settle thousands of lawsuits over its e-cigarettes brought by individuals and families of Juul users, school districts, city governments and Native American tribes.

The vaping company, which has laid off hundreds of employees, recently agreed to pay West Virginia \$7.9 million to settle a lawsuit alleging the company violated the state's Consumer Credit and Protection Act by marketing to underage users, West *cont'd on pg 13*

Gerard Depardieu: French actor faces new sexual assault allegations

Actor Gerard Depardieu has been accused of sexual assault or harassment by 13 women, according to an investigation by French news website Mediapart.

The women claim the star groped them, put his hands in their underwear and made obscene remarks, the site said.

The incidents are alleged to have happened over the past two decades on film and TV sets or in public places.

A lawyer for Mr Depardieu, 74, said he "formally denies all the charges which may fall under criminal law".

The Oscar- and Bafta-nominated actor is known for films including Jean de Florette, Green Card and Cyrano de Bergerac.

The allegations come two years after he was placed under criminal investigation for rape, which he has denied.

In the Mediapart investigation, one extra on a film set said he put his hand under her dress before trying to "slip in to get to my knickers". When she pushed SCORACI DE CONTRACTORIONAL

his hand away, he became aggressive and tried again, the woman claimed.

Another described how the actor "grabbed [me] by the waist" between takes, had a "wandering hand" and "ended up putting his hand on my bum in an insistent way".

One woman said he tried to "put his hand on my genitals" during a crowd scene. On another occasion, accompanied by a man he introduced as the producer, the actor allegedly grabbed her from behind and "rubbed my hips, stomach and breasts".

Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrisey announced Monday. Last month, the company paid Chicago \$23.8 million to settle a lawsuit.

Minnesota's case against Juul went to trial last month with the state's Attorney General Keith Ellison asserting that the company "baited, deceived and addicted a whole new generation of kids" as youth cigarette smoking rates fell. Many of the women told Mediapart they were shocked that no action was taken on the film sets, with his alleged behaviour being tolerated or even met with laughter.

"Adults let an actor fondle my breasts in front of everyone," said one actress, who was 17 at the time.

The Paris prosecutor's office told the AFP news agency on Wednesday it had "not received any new complaint to date".

SVG PM shares thoughts on death penalty

The controversial issue of the death penalty came up during the Prime Minister of St Vincent and the Grenadines' Face-to-Face radio programme as he expressed concern about crime and whether certain offences require capital punishment.

On Easter Monday the island recorded a fatal shooting, the first killing by a firearm since February 9, 2023.

Dr Ralph Gonsalves is urging young men to restrain themselves and end their fascination with guns for taking out their anger.

"Everyone has to have a patience and a calm. Not because you get angry or lose yourself to restraint you have to go for the gun. There has to be something that holds you back."

Gonsalves said that something has to be instilled in the family, schools,

The prime minister said unfortunately both the Court of Appeal and the Privy Council decided practically that no one can be sent to the gallows anymore for murder.

"I have oscillated between the death penalty and no death penalty for a long time now over the last dozen or so years and I came to the conclusion that there are particular offences you need the death penalty for."

He believes it should be for murder, but not those of passion. The prime minister said that distinction was made in the Constitutional Reform Proposal which went to the people, however, the people rejected it.

"There were many proposals but this was a critical one to write into the constitution... what was not there before... so we could carry out the death penalty in particular cases.

But there it is... we may have to go back to the people on that."

The prime minister added that in the meantime, the existing legal systems will be used as SVG seeks to see how it could bring up persons, particularly young males, and have the necessary restraints so they don't resort to the gun.

BVI leaders square off in election debate

Loop - Political leaders on the British Virgin Islands laid out their development plans last evening for the territory as they participated in a historic leadership debate ahead of the April 24th General Election.

The debate was organised by the H Lavity Stoutt Community College (HLSCC) Virgin Islands Studies Institute.

The Virgin Islands Party's (VIP) Dr Natalio Wheatley, the Progressive Virgin Islands Movement's (PVIM) Ronnie Skelton, the National Democratic Party's (NDP) Marlon Penn, and Julian Fraser of Progressives United (PU) were pressed by moderator Ronn Grant on topics such as fiscal policy, social welfare, the commission of inquiry, independence and healthcare.

All of the leaders agreed that the British Virgin Islands was at a difficult juncture in its history as it deals with implementing governance reforms that were recommended in the Commission of Inquiry report and reconstruction from two devastating hurricanes.

In his opening statement, Fraser said Virgin Islanders "can't afford" to have the UK impose direct rule as locals have been doing the work necessary to reform the system, including the formation of a Unity Government.

And that's why he said it is important for Virgin Islanders to elect a com-



petent government on Election Day.

Penn stated the NDP is not against the BVI becoming an independent country but local institutions need to be strong before that step can be taken.

"We have to particularly look at our institutions and ensure that they're fit for purpose," Penn stated.

He continued: "We saw in the [Commission of Inquiry] where many of our institutions were challenged... in terms of the ones that are responsible for holding accountability, good governance, and making sure that persons in the political class, in other classes are held accountable and the good governance structures that are necessary."

"As it pertains to self-determination, we have to ensure, as I said earlier, to build those institutions, to make sure those institutions continue to be strong and robust as we move forward," Penn said. Wheatley committed to repealing the Retiring Allowances (Legislative Services) Amendment Act, 2021, which is known locally as the "greedy bill". The bill was criticized for giving hefty retirement benefits to former legislators.

"I will not collect a dime on that Retirement Act in its current form and I intend, God willing, [if] I'm given the opportunity, to repeal the entire bill," Wheatley stated.

Skelton stated his party wants to increase the minimum hourly wage from US\$6 per hour as part of efforts to reduce the BVI's wealth inequality. He noted that many businesses aren't paying their employees the minimum hourly rate.

"These people cannot live on \$48 a day," Skelton said whiling noting that a PVIM government will also look at placing limits on what businesses can charge for food items.

Thomas-Jacobs and Judge Willocks are currently set to go before the Legislature's Rules and Judiciary Committee for a nomination hearing.

Germany scales back cannabis liberalization after EU talks

BERLIN (AP) — Germany's government presented scaled-back plans Wednesday to liberalize the country's rules on cannabis, including by decriminalizing possession of limited amounts and allowing members of nonprofit "cannabis clubs" to buy marijuana for recreational purposes.

In a second step, German officials also envision setting up regional test projects to sell cannabis through "commercial supply chains," Health Minister Karl Lauterbach said. But the proposal differs from one he presented in October, which foresaw allowing the sale of cannabis to adults across the country at licensed outlets.

The German government revised the plan following talks with the European Union's executive commission. Agriculture Minister Cem Özdemir said EU law "sets us limits we must respect, but that I will also say we are pushing."

Lauterbach had cautioned all along that the government would only proceed with its original plan if it got the green light from the EU.

Germany has allowed some patients to get cannabis as a prescription medication since 2017.

The proposed new legislation foresees legalizing the possession of up to 25 grams (nearly 1 ounce) of cannabis for recreational purposes and allowing individuals to grow up to three plants.

It would let German residents 18 and older join nonprofit "cannabis clubs" with a maximum 500 members each, which would be allowed to grow cannabis for members' personal consumption. Individuals would be allowed to buy up to 25 grams per day, or up to 50 grams per month — a figure that would be limited to 30 grams for adults under age 21.

Membership in multiple clubs wouldn't be allowed, and authorities could limit the number of clubs. The clubs' costs would be covered by membership fees, which would be staggered according to how much cannabis the members use.

Özdemir said that draft legislation will be finalized this month and that "consumption will become legal this year already." Officials hope that the first step will help push back the black market.

This fall, the government plans to map out the next step: five-year tests of regulated commercial supply chains in select regions. Lauterbach said details, including which regions would be chosen, have yet to be thrashed out.

The government wants to have the pilot projects scientifically evaluated. The ministers were optimistic that successful tests would enable them to build pressure for a change of policy at the EU level, and ultimately to clear the way for their original plan to allow licensed sales.

The feedback so far from Brussels "is on the one hand, something that perhaps disappointed us, but on the other hand also an opportunity — the opportunity to build the basis for a European cannabis policy with a well-conducted study," Lauterbach told reporters in Berlin.

The plans will need the approval of the German parliament's lower house, but officials said an endorsement is not needed from the upper house. That chamber represents Germany's 16 state governments, many of which include the country's main center-right opposition bloc.

The bloc has opposed liberalizing cannabis laws. One conservative recont'd on pg 17

Italian authorities are on the hunt for a bear that killed a 26-year-old jogger in the north-eastern region of Trentino last week.

Andrea Papi's funeral took place on Wednesday. The 17-year-old female bear that killed him was known as JJ4 and identified through genetic testing.

JJ4 also attacked a father and son in June 2020.

The provincial government had issued an order for the bear to be killed at the time, but it was overturned by a court.

This time authorities have opted to euthanise the bear. "We are doing everything we can to locate the bear and ensure the safety of local residents," said Maurizio Fugatti, the president of the Trentino region.

Mr Papi was running in the countryside when he was attacked and killed, sparking fear among residents. Many have called the bear to be captured and demanded changes to a European plan called "Life Ursus" which is aimed at reintroducing brown bears in the Alps.

People in Trentino have been expressing condolences and solidarity with Mr Papi's family. Candles have been outside windows as a symbol of mourning, and local municipalities have lowered their flags to half-mast.

In the village of Caldes, a large crowd of mourners filled a church to pay their respects and offer support to Mr Papi's family at his funeral.

"The village is upset, angry," Antonio Maini, mayor of Caldes, told reporters outside the church. "One of our boys has died, we are in mourning, but we are also angry because he died from a bear attack. An event that should not have happened."

The incident has reignited the debate about the coexistence of humans and wildlife in the area and raised questions about how best to balance the need to protect endangered species with the safety of residents.

Bears are a protected species in Italy, and their population has been increasing in recent years due to conservation efforts. However, their presence in residential areas can pose a risk to human safety, as highlighted by the attacks.

"A conscientious administration should act in compliance with the rules for the protection of biodiversity and should not be moved by a spirit of retaliation, a spirit of revenge," the international Organisation for the Protection of Animals (OIPA) wrote in a note.

The species was reintroduced in the region about two decades ago. Since then, the bear population in Trentino has surged from three to approximately 100, according to data provided by the province.

Despite hopes that the bears would spread across the Alps, they have largely remained concentrated in Trentino.

JJ4, the bear responsible for the recent fatal attack on the jogger, was born in Trentino. Her parents were brought to the area from Slovenia.

Italy's environment minister, Gilberto Pichetto Fratin, said the bears might be relocated to other parts of the country, if not abroad, and locals could be equipped with anti-aggression spray.

"Bears and wolves have become a problem, for farmers, breeders, inhabitants, tourists," Reinhold Messner, an Italian mountaineer and explorer told daily newspaper La Stampa.

"We need a precise regulatory framework, so it is clear how to deal with situations of this kind."

gional official went to Brussels to lobby against Lauterbach's initial plan.

Center-right health policy spokesman Tino Sorge told the Funke newspaper group that the government was pressing ahead with legalizing a risky drug "despite European legal hurdles, clear expert opinions and bad experiences from other countries." He accused Lauterbach of setting the wrong priorities.

The health minister argued that Germany's existing policies have failed. He said the government's aim is to offer greater safety, protect consumers against contaminated and toxic products, and reduce drug-related crime.

"We are not creating a problem," Lauterbach insisted. "We are trying to solve a problem." He reiterated that Germany doesn't want to emulate the model of the neighboring Netherlands, which combines decriminalization with little market regulation.

The cannabis plan is one of several social reform projects that German Chancellor Olaf Scholz's socially liberal three-party governing coalition agreed to embark on when it took office in December 2021.

Hundreds forced from Indiana homes as plastics fire burns

RICHMOND, Ind. (AP) — An evacuation order affecting more than 1,000 people was expected to remain in place through Wednesday around a large industrial fire in an Indiana city near the Ohio border where crews worked through the night to douse piles of burning plastics, authorities said.

Multiple fires that began burning Tuesday afternoon were still burning Wednesday afternoon within about 14 acres of various types of plastics stored both inside and outside buildings at the former factory site in Richmond, 70 miles (113 kilometers) east of Indianapolis, Richmond fire Chief Tim Brown said.

He said the fire is contained within the old factory site but not under control and the firefighting effort is ongoing. Brown said the fire response team has a very tentative goal of finishing up dousing the flames by Saturday morning, but added Wednesday afternoon "that's a guess."

Brown said their goal is to put out the fires, not let them burn, and said rumors to the contrary were incorrect.

"We are attempting to put the fire out. We are not letting it burn. Evidently there's some misinformation out there that we're letting it burn," he said.

Between 1,500 and 2,000 people who live within a

half-mile (0.8 kilometer) of the plant were told to leave after the fire began, said David Hosick, spokesperson for the Indiana Department of Homeland Security.

Brown, the fire chief, said it's unclear how many people have been evacuated from around the site. People outside that radius who live downwind of the fire were advised to keep windows closed and pets inside.

Brown said the evacuation order would remain in place through Wednesday and perhaps into Wednesday night, depending on how much progress crews make in putting out the flames. He said the fire's cause remains under investigation and the only injury has been a firefighter who suffered a minor ankle injury overnight Tuesday.

Some Richmond residents forced from their homes took shelter starting Tuesday afternoon at Oak Park Pentecostals, after families picking up their children from the church's daycare realized they could not return home, said executive pastor Jesse Arthur. He expects the church's expansive gymnasium, with bathrooms, showers and the daycare — and water and hot food provided by the Red Cross and residents could fill up Wednesday evening.

"I think most everybody was exhausted. Long day. Traumatic. Everything's up in the air," Arthur told The Associated Press on Wednesday.

Terry Snyder Jr. spent a restless night at the church Tuesday night with his parents, who are worried about their home of five years. All three were coughing from the smoke as both Snyder and his mother, Wendy, have asthma, while his father, Terry Snyder Sr., has chronic obstructive pulmonary disease.

"I didn't sleep all night. I was nervous," Wendy Snyder said. "... I've never been displaced from my home."

Aaron Stevens, a Richmond police officer who lives six blocks from the plant, remained at his home Wednesday despite the evacuation order and watching ash fall *cont'd on pg 19*

on his deck and backyard. His sister, who lives closer to the fires, was staying with him to escape the smoke and Stevens said he's keeping an eye on the changing updates around the smoke.

State and federal regulators were at the scene to monitor air quality and other environmental impacts at the site, which local officials said has been used to store plastics and other materials for recycling or resale.

Jason Sewell, the onscene coordinator for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, said the agency has been doing roving air sampling outside the evacuation area and into part of nearby Ohio, but no toxic compounds have been detected.

He stressed, however, that smoke is harmful to inhale because it contains particulate matter of different sizes and can contain toxics, and residents should avoid the smoke.

Sewell said air sampling was continuing Wednesday in Richmond, a city of 35,000 residents.

President Joe Biden, who has been visiting Northern Ireland and Ireland, spoke by phone to Indiana Gov. Eric Holcomb and offered his support and any additional federal assistance needed to respond to the fire, the White House said.

EPA Administrator Michael Regan said the federal agency was working closely with its state and local partners in responding to and monitoring the fire. He said

an EPA team would be collecting samples of debris in the area Wednesday "to determine whether asbestos-containing materials may have left the site."

"So we're following the situation very closely and will continue to provide the community with any assistance that they need," he said in the nation's capitol before speaking about tough new automobile pollution control limits.

Because of smoke still wafting from the fire, Indiana's environmental agency issued an air quality advisory Wednesday for two eastern Indiana counties, Wayne and Randolph, warning that forecasts call for elevated levels of fine soot particles in the air. That advisory was later extended through Thursday.

Indiana's state fire marshal, Steve Jones, said residents need to get away from the smoke plumes, especially elderly people with respiratory problems.

"There's a host of different chemicals that plastics give off when they're on fire. And so it's concerning," Jones said.

Pastor Ken Harris at Bethesda Worship Center in Richmond said the church housed several families, about 20 people total, Tuesday night after evacuation orders were issued, but those families were later moved to a separate, larger facility about 5 miles (8 kilometers) away.

"We gave them a safe space to breathe and collect their thoughts," Harris said Wednesday as dark gray smoke billowed in the distance through the clear-blue sky beyond the church's windows.

Richmond Mayor Dave Snow said Wednesday that the plastics recycling site had been under a city order to clean up and remediate the complex, but said the business owner had ignored that order. Snow called that person "a negligent business owner."
