Opening dates for Calypso tents announced

The dates for the opening of the Calypso Tents, long viewed as the official start to the Carnival season, have now been released.

The Ministry, in collaboration with the Sub-Committee, Calypso is pleased to announce the opening of the Calypso Tent season commencing on June 2nd, 2023. The timing is ideal, as Calypso Fever is said to be spreading rapidly while the country gears up

for Antigua's Carnival Calypso Tent season.

In a media release, it was stated that the Creative Industries Ministry is officially partnering with two (2) Carnival Tents for the 2023 Carnival Season:-

The Mason Brothers Tent, which starts on Friday, June 2nd, and Sweet Benna Soca Tent on Saturday, June 3rd. Both will be operated out of Julee's on Cross and Tanner Street. Meanwhile, Calypsonians desirous of vying for the position of Calypso Monarch are required to register for the competition with the Ministry and must also register with one of the official Carnival Tents, for eligibility to participate in Calypso Quarter and Semifinals.

There is an innovation being introduced this year regarding the judging for Quarter Finals. "This year's





Tent season will operate for four (4) weekends, with each weekend being adjudicated. This will give the Calypsonians four (4) opportunities to be adjudicated with their best two (2) scores used to qualify for the Semifinals. Therefore, aspiring competitors should note that it is mandatory to commence performances from the first weekend -June 2nd and 3rd - to comply with the pre-requisite judging process," the release explained.

The Ministry is urging Calypsonians to get ready to bring the bacchanal, commentary, politics, and vibes to the 'Caribbean's Greatest Summer Festival.'

It was an unusual sight in St John's on Monday to see two cruise ships docked at the Heritage Quay port, during the month of May, the start of the summer cruise season.

It is customary for the cruise ships that regularly call at Antigua and Barbuda and other Caribbean ports during the winter cruise season, to be redeployed to the Mediterranean Sea and other ports during the summer months.

However, the Antigua Cruise Ports, working in collaboration with the Antigua and Barbuda Tourism Authority, has been promoting the notion of a year-round cruise season for Antigua and Barbuda.

Already, with multiple calls booked for the traditional low season for the cruise industry, things are looking up, particularly for the men and women whose livelihoods depend directly on the cruise trade.

Two cruise vessels docked at Heritage Quay on Monday, indicating a solid uptick in cruise tourism during the summer season.

Disney Magic returned to Antigua Cruise Port for the first time for the

Disney Magic and Norwegian Getaway year with over two thousand passengers. Norwegian Getaway also docked at Heritage Quay with over four thousand passengers onboard. The two vessels being berthed at the cruise port during the summer season is a sign of the positive change in the cruise sector as recent previous seasons were inactive because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

However, Heritage Quay was as expected, vibrant with visitors, taxi drivers, and vendors on Monday. Taxi driver Alwyn Daniel said, "Today is a good day for the taxi drivers, the vendors, and everybody." Antigua Cruise Port's Leasing & Marketing Officer Jessica Russell said, "It's great to have two vessels here, even after our busiest period would have ended. With tourism being our main industry, we want to ensure that we get the most out of it and move beyond the limitations of what is expected, during the summer season; so, we're glad to have Disney Magic and Norwegian Getaway here."

Vernon "Goldie" Griffith, who plays the banjo in the quay, said he felt encouraged by the vessels berthing in


Foreign Affairs Minister Greene to use ministry to strengthen food security

Foreign Affairs Minister, E.P Chet Greene, who also holds the agriculture ministry portfolio, says he intends to use the international contacts of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs to help Antigua and Barbuda achieve food security.

Greene made the point during a meeting with the Inter-American Institute for Cooperation in Agriculture (IICA) Representative for the OECS, Gregg Rawlins.

He said the issue of food security has taken on prominence in countries around the world, and Antigua and Barbuda is working towards achieving this goal as a 'safety net', noting that the country may not be able to rely on the usual suppliers of food items in times of stress, such as the recent COVID-19 pandemic.

"We want to work with the rest of CARICOM in achieving its 25% by 2025 goals, but even beyond those goals, we need to strengthen our food security as our own safety net. With that in mind, we have paid down on a chicken abattoir as well as made a commitment to upgrade the current meat abattoir. We understand the challenge such as working

Greene noted, as the minister of foreign affairs he maintains a busy schedule. Yet, despite this fact, he is committed to ensuring that the Ministry of Agriculture receives the attention that it deserves. "I want to give the assurance that I do not place more value on foreign affairs than I do for agriculture. Instead, what I seek to do is to leverage the Ministry of Foreign Affairs for the benefit of agriculture. If I can put it more succinctly, I will leverage the foreign affairs ministry for the food security and food safety of the nation," he declared.

According to Greene whilst he would seek assistance from other countries in the areas of training, education, sports, and trade he uses every opportunity to secure benefits for the agri"Agriculture and food security are priority subjects, as we have seen what can happen during the last pandemic, the shortening of food supply chains. We saw what larger countries would do when confronting pandemics and other challenges so we can't be anything but smart, as we are called upon to address and adjust the way we do business," he emphasized.

CARICOM governments have committed to reducing the region's large food import bill by 25% by 2025. The implementation of the CARICOM Agri-Food Systems Strategy in the Member States is expected to help achieve this target, by giving special attention to priority crops and products such as poultry, corn, soya, meat (Goat, Sheep, Beef), rice, and niche vegetables which are highly imported products in the region.


itors from the US market."



Local News Almost 100 Pounds of Cannabis Seized at Deep Water Harbour

Law enforcement continues its goal to stem the flow of illegal drugs into the country, with the latest drug bust happening on Monday.

Close to 100 pounds of cannabis was seized at the Deep Water Harbour.

Reports are that both the Police and Customs Departments conducted a joint drug operation at the main seaport and discovered two barrels containing 97 sealed packages of cannabis.

The substance weighed a total of 97 pounds with an estimated value of \$582,000.

The World Around Us Concerned over UN agencies concerned over refugee migration crisis in Americas

CMC - Raising concerns about fresh restrictions on Caribbean and other migrants and refugees following the United States' lifting of a COVID-19 pandemic-era measure known as Title 42, UN agencies have called for great multilateral action to regularise movement across the Americas, including the Caribbean.

The UN refugee agency (UNHCR) and the International Organization for Migration (IOM) issued a call for a more collaborative approach to better respond to the anticipated impact of changes on the southern US border.

"The challenges facing the Americas call for ambitious, innovative, and principled cooperation among all stakeholders," the agencies said.

The agencies said such a plan must be based on international law and "genuine solidarity" to advance protection and solutions for refugees and migrants, and align with the framework laid out the Global Compact on Refugees, Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration, as well as the Los Angeles Declaration on Migration and Protection.

Welcoming positive initiatives to expand resettlement and other regular pathways in the region, the agencies remain concerned about new restrictions on access to asylum following the "long overdue" lifting of the Title 42 public health order by the United States.

Since the pandemic's outset in 2020, UNHCR and IOM noted that Title 42 has been used by US immigration officials "some 2.5 million times at the southern border, to expel people to Mexico or their home country, without assessing what risks they faced as a result of being returned."

"Barriers preventing people from exercising the fundamental human right to seek asylum are unacceptable and contrary to States' international obligations," they said, adding that the new US Government rule that restricts access for asylum-seekers who arrive irregularly, after transiting through another country, is "incompatible with principles of international refugee law."

While the number of people approaching the US border has grown in recent

years, the UN agencies said that the majority of the people on the move in the Americas are still hosted by countries in Latin America.

"The challenges presented by the movement of refugees and migrants cannot be solved by any country in isolation," they said. "Real progress can only be made through joint efforts to address the causes of displacement and irregular migration."

The UNHCR and IOM said more could be done through support to communities that are hosting the majority of displaced people, "providing access to air and effective asylum procedures and other legal stay arrangements, and facilitating access to safe and regular pathways as alternatives to perilous journeys.

"A more effective response calls for collaborative engagement by States and other stakeholders to expand access to protection and asylum and regular pathways to migration, while strengthening solutions," the agencies said.

They, however, said the US-led expansion of refugee resettlement and other regular routes is "a welcome step that can present real alternatives for desperate people who are risking their lives to find safety and solutions.

"Facilitated and expanded access to resettlement, family reunification, humanitarian parole and labor mobility schemes, can save lives and protect people from smuggling, trafficking and other forms of violence", they said, stating that they are ready to redouble efforts to work with all countries and existing regional mechanisms to make this a reality.

But the UN agencies said that expanding resettlement and other regular pathways cannot replace the responsibility of States to provide people with access *cont'd on pg 11*

to territory and asylum procedures.

"Any return agreements between States, including of asylum-seekers to a third country, must uphold in practice the principle of non-refoulement, the prohibition on forced return of people to situations where their lives and safety are at risk," UNHCR and IOM said.

In the interim, as immigration advocates intensify calls for solving the migration crisis in the United States that involves Caribbean and other illegal migrants and refugees, Caribbean American Democratic Congresswoman Yvette D. Clarke has reiterated her call for comprehensive immigration reform.

"As a daughter of immigrants, it is not lost upon me the multitude of hardships and difficulties families experience when they come to this nation in hopes of finding the American Dream. Unfortunately, our immigration system, which has not been updated in 30 years, is broken," Clarke, the daughter of Jamaican immigrants, told the Caribbean Media Corporation (CMC) on Friday.

"At the same time, extremist MAGA Republicans are fighting tooth and nail to break it even further with H.R. 2, their Child Deportation Act," added the representative for the 9th Congressional District in Brooklyn, New York. "This cruel legislation would force draconian restrictions and punishments on migrants and asylum seekers. and set America's immigration priorities back years. Any bill that would allow vulnerable migrant children to be inhumanely detained by Border Patrol for up to a month is an unacceptable solution."

As chair of the Immigration Task Force in the US House of Representative, Clarke said she has seen "the glaring inequities, blatant racism, vicious xenophobia, and civil rights violations immigrants face – particularly in immigrant communities of African descent.

"Immigrants of colour experience immigration inequities more than any other community and immigrants of European origin," she said. "But let me very clear, immigrants—regardless of status—contribute billions every year in taxes and to the American economy. That's why we need a concrete vision, equipped with compassion and equity, for comprehensive immigration reform."

On Thursday, Brooklyn Borough President Antonio Reynoso, the son of Dominican Republic immigrants, joined immigration advocates in urging elected officials, the real estate community and the Joe Biden administration to intensify efforts in solving the crisis.

"While Mayor Adams (New York City Mayor Eric Adams) is doing the wrong thing in rolling back Rightto-Shelter, we must be careful to call even more loudly on those who are doing nothing at all: the real estate community that sits on thousands of vacant apartments while families sleep in the streets; our neighbours in the suburbs who hide behind racist zoning policies that prevent new affordable housing from being built; and the Biden administration that refuses to step up with meaningful aid despite immigration being a federal issue," Reynoso told CMC.

"In the problems that got us here lie the solutions that can pull us out," he added. "If the real estate community continues to resist voluntarily opening up vacant apartments for those experiencing homelessness, we need to explore legal action. If suburban leaders like Rockland County Executive Ed Day continue to call asylum-seekers rapists and criminals and threaten to 'reach up and grab [Mayor Adams] by the throat for the people of Rockland County,' we must name their racist hate and demand they do their part by offering shelter now and housing in the near future," he added.

"And if the federal government continues to sit idly by, we will ensure every person in this city and state understands the blame for this situation lies with President Biden and his failure to lead on a comprehensive solution," Reynoso continued. "Because when our neighbours – whether down the street, across the country, or over borders – need help, our community must and will show up. That's what Brooklyn stands for, that's what New York stands for, and that's what we must demand this country to stand for."

As Title 42 ended mid-night Thursday, which allowed immigration agents to swiftly remove Caribbean and other illegal migrants from the US, Reynoso said "the imminent arrival of more people and families seeking asylum is no excuse to go back on our values here in New York City.

"Right-to-Shelter exists to defend the basic rights, dignity and safety of people who are without a stable place to settle," he said. "And to roll it back – or even threaten as much – is not only cruel but a tactic of intimidation we will not accept.

"Rather than abandon the humanity this city stands for, we must meet this national crisis with a national solution – a solution that the real estate community, New York suburbs, and federal government can no longer decline to be a part of."

In response to the Mayor Adams's executive order to temporarily suspend New York City's right-to-shelter protections, Natalia Aristizabal Betancur, deputy director of Make the Road New York, an immigration advocacy group, said it was "simply outrageous for Mayor Adams to flout the law and try to suspend right-to-shelter protections that have been fundamental to New York City housing laws for decades. *cont'd on pg 12*

Health & Wellness Weight-loss injections pose a risk to health, say officials

There is a real risk to people's health if they buy weight-loss injections from unregulated sources, the Department of Health has warned.

It said a number of the injection pens were in circulation across Northern Ireland.

The department added that there had been increased demand for the pens, including from online sellers.

It said they may not be subject to normal safety controls on manufacture or prescribed by a doctor.

Semaglutide is a medication that can be prescribed for weight loss.

It is mainly approved for the management of diabetes and is available under



Many of the asylum seekers are nationals of Cuba, Haiti and Venezuela.

In his announcement, Adams said the program will launch with two hotels located in Orange Lake and Orangeburg counties, with the potential to expand, and will provide asylum seekers with shelter for up to four months as well as the same city-funded services available at Humanitarian Emergency Relief and Response Centers.

The mayor said staff at participating hotels will also connect asylum seekers with community-based organizations and faith groups to support their transition to a new city.

Since last spring, the mayor said over 60,800 asylum seekers have come through New York City and been offered a place to stay, adding that over 37,500 asylum seekers are currently in the city's care.

At the same time, the mayor continues to call for the state and federal governments to provide support to manage this crisis, including financial assistance, a national decompression strategy, expedited work authorizascription-only medicines outside the legitimate supply chain.

"I would urge people not to source their prescription medication from unregulated sources," he said, adding that it presented "a real risk of adverse health effects".

Canice Ward, head of the MRG, said it was extremely important that people took prescription-only medicines after consultation with their GP or healthcare provider, who have access to patient health records and are aware of the risks and benefits of every medicine.

The department said anyone who suspected a medicine had been falsified should tell a healthcare professional such as a pharmacist.

Earlier this week, New York Governor Kathy Hochul issued an Executive Order to help provide aid to Caribbean and other asylum seekers expected to arrive in New York, as US federal Title 42 immigration policy was set to expire Thursday night.

Hochul said the Executive Order will provide the state with greater flexibility to procure the resources necessary for municipalities to support asylum seekers while also allowing the State to increase the number of National Guard service members providing logistical and operational support.

Executive Order 28 allows the state and localities to quickly respond to the anticipated arrivals of asylum seekers.

Jamie Foxx and daughter Corinne to host game show after hospitalisation

US star Jamie Foxx has been announced as the host of a new music-centric game show, days after it was confirmed that he had been discharged from hospital.

The Oscar-winning actor and singer will host We Are Family on US network Fox alongside his daughter, Corinne.

She said on Friday that her father was recuperating at home after a spell in hospital due to a "medical complication".

They said they were "thrilled" to have worked on the show.

The father and daughter have previously appeared together on another music-based game show, Beat Shazam, broadcast on the same network.

"We hope this show brings as much fun to audiences at home as we've had creating it when it premieres next year," they said in a joint statement.

The new show will feature non-famous relatives of celebrities performing duets with their hidden famous family member, while audience members attempt to guess their identity through clues in order to win a \$100,000 prize.

It is scheduled to be broadcast in 2024.

Allison Wallach, one of the Fox Entertainment bosses, described the Foxx family presenting pair - who UK audiences may have seen together on-screen in recent TV adverts - as "important partners to the Fox family."

"Their boundless energy and charming interplay with contestants are irresistible, which make them the perfect hosts of We Are Family," said Wallach.

Corinne Foxx, the 29-year-old actress, model and activist, first shared news about her 55-year-old father being in hospital on 12 April but did not specify the reason for him needing care.

She said that "due to quick action and great care, he is already on his way to recovery".

One missing as boat from Martinique capsizes on its way to St Lucia

Loop - Rescue operations continue for a woman missing at sea after the vessel she departed Martinique on with eight other persons reportedly capsized while on its way to St Lucia. The missing woman is believed to be in her 40s.

According to the Prefet de la Martinique, on Saturday around 5:30 am, the Regional Operational Center for Surveillance and Rescue Antilles-Guyane, was informed about the disappearance of the ship "Sé kon sa nou yé", which departed on Friday around 4 pm while heading for St Lucia with nine people on board.

Search and rescue teams were deployed. Shortly before 12 pm, a French sailboat "Le Bercail", rescued two people in distress in the Saint-Lucie canal.

Those shipwrecked were aboard the ship that reportedly capsized between 7 pm and 10 pm on Friday



night.

Then, just before 3 pm on Saturday, the Dutch Coast Guard plane located six people hanging on the hull of the ship.

The search operations coordinated by the Regional Operational Center for Surveillance and Rescue Antilles-Guyana continued on Sun-

day to locate the last occupant still missing.

French and foreign aerial and nautical means are permanently engaged in the Sainte-Lucie canal along with the authorities' maritime patrol boat Saint Lucia Police Force (Protector) as well as a Barbados Air Force aircraft.

St Vincent: Sandy Bay teen on bicycle dies in road accident

Loop - The community of Sandy Bay in St Vincent and the Grenadines is in mourning after a schoolboy, 12-year-old Dezy Lavia died in a road accident on Mother's Day.

Police have launched an investigation into the circumstances surrounding the tragic accident that occurred in Orange Hill at about 6:50 pm on May 14, which left the 12-yearold pedal cyclist dead.

According to reports, a motor vehicle that was being driven by a 38-year-



old Byrea resident, struck the teen as it headed toward Sandy Bay.

Lavia suffered multiple injuries about his body and was taken to Georgetown Medical Center before being transferred to Milton Cato Memorial Hospital, where he was pronounced dead.

A postmortem exam-

ination is expected to be carried out on the body of the deceased to ascertain the exact cause of death.

The driver is assisting the police with the investigation.

Regional News PAGE 15 **Suriname: Native Amerindians** hold protest demonstration

CMC - Members of Suriname's indigenous community on Saturday protested against what they have called their marginalisation, deprivation and non-respect and recognition of their collective rights by the government and other parts of society

During a silent walk here, several hundred indigenous people from all tribes and from the deep hinterlands and far south took part in the protest.

The immediate reason for the demonstration is the killing by the police of two indigenous men about two weeks ago after a group of indigenous men set fire to a number of logging trucks and a police station in the Pikin Saron area, southwest of the capital.

According to Sharmaine Artist, a spokeswoman from the group, Native Power, the silent march is the start of a number of actions that will be used in the coming weeks.

She said the organisation now plans to write a number of international human rights organisations, including the Organization of American States, about the poor treatment indigenous people receive from the Surinamese government.

"We are also travelling to the different villages to speak to the people and

explain to them what we intend to do," Artist further explained. Hundreds of indigenous people took to the streets on Saturday to protest in a "silent way" against the lack of recognition of land rights. Indigenous groups have fought for years for this, but successive governments have so far failed to heed their call to solve this issue. "It was nice to see all the Indigenous groups. We proved that we are one. It was nice that people from the different villages, also from the far south, mobilised themselves to come here. We walked in unity and the Almighty for help," said Artist

Following the death of two indigenous men earlier this month, Native Power in particular has decided to take more visible action.

Another organisation the Association of Indigenous Village Chiefs (Vids) also says it is now monitoring matters even more closely.

Meanwhile last Thursday, the speaker of the house, Marinus Bee said that the government will look at a number of the concessions in the indigenous areas issued by the then Bouterse adminis-

tration.

These were subsequently extended by the Santokhi government. However, due to the lack of legal recognition of land rights, there is an unclear situation, resulting in many illegal economic activities, including gold mining.

The House speaker promised that he would look into whether there is political support for the bill and also coordinate with the government on how to proceed. The draft law has been put back on the agenda for next Tuesday's parliament meeting.

Israel-Gaza: Shaky start to ceasefire ending five days of fighting



Palestinian Islamic Jihad confirmed a ceasefire had been agreed, while Israel said quiet would be met with quiet.

There are hopes a ceasefire will take hold to end five days of fighting between Israel and Palestinian Islamic Jihad (PIJ) militants in Gaza.

It got off to a shaky start, as both sides kept firing for two hours after the truce started on Saturday evening.

At least 33 Palestinians have been killed since Tuesday in Gaza, where Israel says it has struck PIJ targets.

Palestinian rocket fire into Israel has killed two people, one Israeli and one Palestinian working in the country.

The mediation efforts were led by Egypt, which urged both sides to adhere to the ceasefire agreement.

Washington welcomed the announcement of the ceasefire, and said US officials had worked with regional partners to achieve the resolution. Barrages of Palestinian rockets set off warning sirens in southern Israel, close to Gaza, and the suburbs of the city of Tel Aviv just before the truce was due to come into effect at 22:00 local time (19:00 GMT) on Saturday.

Minutes after it supposedly started, militants launched more rockets at southern Israeli communities and the Israeli military carried out air strikes on what it said were two PIJ rocket launchers in Gaza.

Further rocket fire at around 23:00 drew another round of air strikes.

Despite the fighting, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's office issued a statement confirming that a ceasefire had been agreed and thanked Egypt for its "intensive efforts" to secure one.

It also said Israel had made clear that its acceptance meant "quiet will

be met with quiet, and that if Israel is attacked or threatened, it will continue to do everything that it needs to in order to defend itself".

PIJ also confirmed the ceasefire, with a spokesman telling Reuters news agency: "We will abide by it as long as the occupation [Israel] abides by it."

According to a text from Egyptian intelligence seen by the BBC, Palestinian militants and Israel have agreed to stop actions targeting civilians and other individuals.

The BBC's Yolande Knell in Jerusalem says this form of wording appears to cover both the recent intense rocket fire from Gaza and Israel's controversial policy of targeted killings of militant leaders.

Israel began its military operation in Gaza before dawn on Tuesday, killing three leaders of PIJ in their homes *cont'd on pg 17*



New Zealand hostel fire: At least six dead and more missing in Wellington

At least six people have died and others remain unaccounted for following a fire in a hostel, New Zealand's prime minister has told local media. Emergency services were called to the four-storey building in Wellington just after midnight local time (12:30 GMT) to reports the building was alight.

Dozens were rescued from the building, but police said a number of people remained unaccounted for.

Chris Hipkins warned the number of dead was likely to increase.

Upon arrival at the blaze, firefighters found the top level of the building ablaze. By 04:00 at least 20 fire trucks were involved in helping extinguish it.

Fire and Emergency District commander Nick Pyatt described the fire as Wellington's "worst nightmare".

Police warned they could not be more specific on the number of deaths until they could access the building.

Mr Pyatt also said the building contained asbestos and urged locals to wear a face mask and keep their windows closed to avoid inhaling the smoke, the New Zealand Herald reported.

"This is a tragic event for all involved. My heartfelt condolences go to the loved ones of those who have lost their lives", he said.

Authorities rescued at least five people from the roof of the burning building and one person sustained serious injuries after jumping from the third floor of the building to escape the flames, local media reported.

Mr Hipkins described the fire as "tragic" to TVNZ and paid tribute to local firefighters "who have put themselves in harm's way over past hours to get people out of the building and put the fire out", the NZ Herald reported.

"It's an absolute tragedy and you know, Wellington is a small close-knit community", he said to New Zealand's AM show.

The cause of the blaze is currently unknown, but local media reported that police were investigating whether it was deliberately lit.

as well as at least 10 civilians, including relatives and neighbours of the men.

PIJ fighters then fired barrages of rockets at southern and central Israel, which they said were intended to avenge the dead.

At least 1,234 rockets and mortars have been fired from Gaza in total, with 976 crossing into Israeli territory, according to the Israeli military. Most have been intercepted or have landed in open areas, but some have hit homes and other buildings.

One woman was killed when a rocket hit an apartment building in the central city of Rehovot on Thursday, while a worker from Gaza was killed when he was hit by rocket shrapnel at a building site in the southern Sdot Negev region.

The military says 221 of the rockets have fallen short inside Gaza and that they have killed four people there, including three children. Islamic Jihad denies the allegation.

Israel has carried out air strikes on 371 PIJ targets across Gaza, killing three more leaders and destroying what it said were the group's rocket launch sites and command centres.

About half of the 33 people killed in Gaza were civilians, including seven children and four women, according to local health officials. PAGE 18

China sentences 78-year-old US citizen to life in prison for spying

A Chinese court has sentenced a 78-year-old US citizen to life in prison on spying charges.

John Shing-Wan Leung, who is a permanent resident in Hong Kong, was jailed on Monday.

The court in the south-eastern city of Suzhou gave no further details of the allegations against him.

Leung was arrested in the city two years ago by a local bureau of China's counterintelligence agency, a news release from the court said.

He "was found guilty of espionage, sentenced to life imprisonment [and] deprived of political rights for life", according to the statement from the Intermediate People's Court, which was posted on the WeChat social media platform.

It is unclear where Leung was living at the time of his arrest.

A spokesperson for the US embassy in Beijing said they were aware of the reports. "The Department of State has no greater priority than the safety and security of US citizens overseas," they said.

At a news conference in Washington DC on Monday, the State Department declined to comment on the case citing privacy concerns.

Closed door trials are common in China, and few details are usually made public for sensitive cases such as those involving espionage charges.

Heavy sentences such as this, however, are relatively rare for foreign citizens.

In July, a new law will come into effect that broadens the scope of China's espionage legislation. It will ban the handing over of any data the authorities deem to be related to national security.

US and Chinese media reports and records show that Mr Leung was heavily involved with Chinese cultural and expat organisations in the US.

According to Hong Kong media reports, he was head of the Texas branch of the Association for the Promotion of the Peaceful Reunification of China (APPRC), which promotes Beijing's claims over Taiwan abroad.

Mr Leung was also chair of his own foundation - the Leung Cultural Exchange Foundation - which sent musicians to and from China and the US, the Wall Street Journal reported. He frequently travelled to China to meet with government officials.

The jailing of Leung is likely to further strain relations between China and the US, which deteriorated during former US President Donald Trump's administration after he launched a trade war against China in 2018.

The two superpowers continue to clash on various issues, including Taiwan, China's militarisation of the South China Sea, and the origins of Covid. Tensions were also heightened in February when the US shot down an alleged Chinese spy balloon, which Beijing insisted was a weather monitoring device.


