# Tourism officials present comprehensive 'state of the industry' report

A comprehensive report on the state of the tourism industry in Antigua and Barbuda was unveiled on Thursday at a special gathering of industry partners and media representatives.

The report was a joint undertaking of the Ministry of Tourism, the Antigua and Barbuda Tourism Authority, the Antigua and Barbuda Hotels and Tourist Association (ABHTA) and the Antigua and Barbuda Workers Union, which represents the vast majority of workers in the industry.

Using a multi-media format as well as booklet, the officials indicated that

the state of the industry is generally good with improvements on the horizon.

Tourism Minister the Honourable Charles Fernandez provided an overview of developments taking place in the key sectors of airlines (air-lifts), hotels (accommodation) as well as future developments. The minister also unveiled what he dubbed Vision 2032, which is a ten-year development plan for the industry.

"Our vision for the tourism industry, simply put, is for all partners inclusive of the citizens and residents of our twin-island nation to buy into the policies and plans set forth that

would keep the industry on a positive trajectory. A key component to this is Vision 2032 – Vision 2032 strives through partnership to actively contribute towards ensuring that the industry is sustained while benefiting all," he remarked.

minister The alsohighlighted five crucial focus areas for the destination's development. These areas encompass sustainability, the creation of authentic local experiences, the establishment of a robust legislative and policy framework, investment in a highly skilled workforce, and the cultivation of an industry that benefits all Antiguans and Barbudans through economic linkages.

In his remarks, President of the ABHTI, Craig Marshall of Royalton Resort, stressed the importance of advancing the tourism industry by concentrating on key factors, particularly bolstering airlift, especially from primary source markets like the UK. He pointed out that a reduction in flights from the UK during the past summer significantly impacted the performance of many ABHTA members. Marshall emphasized the need to prioritize sustained airlift during the summer months for the destination's year-round success.

He disclosed that the ABHTA has embarked on a significant mission for the upcoming year – the re-imaging of the hospitality sector.

The ABWU representative, Chester Hughes, spoke of the need for tripartism noting that if tourism is every body's business as the slogan says then workers, the backbone of the industry must share equitable in the proceeds of the industry. He also raised issues of continued learning for workers as well as issues related to the absence of a public transportation system.

**ABTA Chief Executive** Officer, Colin C. James highlighted that "Key to our airlift strategy is the need to balance airlift with the growth in room stock and demand for the destination. For the 2024, winter season, Antigua and Barbuda will benefit from increased service out of the USA, Canada and the Caribbean. New flights are also expected, with Silver Airways scheduled to begin servicing the destination as of November 16."

# PM Browne meets Saudi Arabian Foreign Minister for important talks

Prime Minister the Honourable Gaston Browne continues his packed agenda of engagements while he is in New York for the 78th meeting of the United Nations General Assembly.

The prime minister has reported that one such meeting was held Thursday in the margins of the General Assembly with the Saudi Foreign Minister Prince Faisalbin Farhan during which they discussed a range of issues.

"I am pleased to report that I had very good bilateral talks with Saudi Foreign Min-

ister and the Minister of Tourism on deepening corporation in investment and trade. As a

consequence, I will travel to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia in mid-October to hold more detailed discussions. These follow-up discussions are to focus largely on exploring opportunities for investments into Antigua and Barbuda in the critical area of tourism," PM Browne stated.

Antigua and Barbuda and the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia are developing closer ties especially in light of the Saudi commitment to assist with the country's educational infrastructure. The Saudi Development Fund has approved a loan for US\$80 million to upgrade the University of the West Indies Five Islands Campus.

"That expansion will include additional lecture theatres and dorms primarily for foreign students. It is expected that the campus will expand to 5000 students, contributing up to five percent of GDP," PM Browne explained. Work on this transformative project will start in the first quarter of next year. As the funds have been approved and allocated.

# Antigua and Barbuda helps facilitate dialogue on energy transition

As the 78th session of the United Nations General Assembly kicks into high gear this week, Antigua and Barbuda played a pivotal role in facilitating useful and productive dialogue on the pressing issue of energy transition for small island states.

The matter was the subject of an enthusiastic and insightful exchange of ideas during a side event at the United Nations headquarters on Monday 18th September.

The event was hosted jointly by the Government of Antigua and Barbuda and the Scotia Group, which is a global network of prominent and influential thinkers in law, politics, academia, and business.

Another major partner involved is RAND Europe, a well-respected non-profit institution that seeks to help improve policy and decision making through research and analysis.

The discussions have brought RAND Europe and the Scotia Group a step closer to issuing a Call to Action that advocates a fundamental shift in the way climate finance is raised and deployed for Small Island Developing States.

As part of this undertaking, RAND Europe and the Scotia Group will reveal their findings in a document called "Roadmap for a Global Energy Transition". It will introduce new financial and legal tools that will encourage green investments in Small Island Development States (SIDs), like Antigua and Barbuda.

News of this coincides with a major development that will take off in Antigua and Barbuda next year which will address the knowledge and data gaps that island nations experience.

"While we are not going to solve all issues here today, I am pleased to announce that Antigua and Barbuda initiated the establishment of a Centre of Excellence for SIDS so that we co-create solutions with our partners that are suitable for our case, that meet the special circumstances of SIDS," Ambassador Aubrey Webson explained to the meeting.

"The Centre will work across sectors in technology and innovation, advanced data science and financing and we look forward to working with you all - and Scotia and RAND in particular- in the implementation of the New Programme of Action including through the Centre," he affirmed.

The Programme of Action is the result of months of hard work in defining a 10-year agenda for SIDS and will be unveiled at the end of the 4th SIDS Conference which will be held in Antigua and Barbuda in May next year.

# Minister of Foreign Affairs addresses Global Development Initiative meeting at UNGA

Minister of Foreign Affairs, the Honourable E.P Chet Greene is in the midst of a frenzied schedule of important engagements and bilateral meetings with development partners in New York where he is attending the 78th United Nations General Assembly.

His first major engagement took place on Tuesday when he joined an impressive list of speakers to address a Ministerial Meeting of the Global Development Initiative. The GDI is primarily an ambitious undertaking by the People's Republic of China to support the development goals of small states like Antigua and Barbuda in the areas of food security, debt recovery, renewable energy and digital economy.

Minister Greene used the occasion to reflect on the 40 years of diplomatic relations between their two countries, noting the mutual interest they share in pursuing the type of

development that positively impacts their people in an equitable way.

"It is against this background that Antigua and Barbuda supports the call made by His Excellency Wang Yi, Foreign Minister of China for the global community to remain dedicated to 'development' as a priority for international cooperation and alliance building," Minister Greene offered.

The Minister was further strident in his call, against the backdrop of the GDI project, for a deepening and strengthening of the engagement required to ensure "equity in the global development architecture" on a number of issues with which island nations are forced to contend.

The issue of climate change, Minister Greene noted, was an urgent and pressing priority and matters like the operationalisation of the Loss and Damage Fund and the adoption of a Multi-Dimensional Vulnerability Index (MVI) are now essential tools in

ensuring the inhabitants of island nations not only survive, but also thrive.

"We must continue to encourage the reform of the international financial system and call for change among international financial institutions and Multilateral Development Banks for the benefit of developing countries," Minister Greene urged.

"As evident from our experiences in Antigua and Barbuda, the GDI supports social and economic opportunities in developing countries, thereby giving a boost to fulfilling the UN 2030 agenda for Sustainable Development," the Minister continued.

In this connection, Minister Greene advised the meeting about the landmark SIDS4 Conference, which will be held in Antigua from May 27 – 30 next year and the launch of a Centre of Excellence that will coincide with the hosting of the major gathering of island nations from across the globe.

# Debt and SIDS4 dominate talks between PM Browne and UK minister

Prime Minister Gaston Browne has expressed his gratitude to the Government of the United Kingdom for setting an impressive example of the type of support the Government of Antigua and Barbuda needs in ensuring that next year's SIDS4 Conference is a success.

Prime Minister Browne, who is in New York attending the 78th session of the United Nations General Assembly, had the occasion to extend his appreciation during a bilateral meeting with the UK's Development Minister the Hon. Andrew Mitchell.

It was one of a series of meetings with top and senior officials in government that occupied the time of Prime Minister Browne during his first day of official meetings of the most important policy making session of the United Nations.

Accompanying him to the bilateral discussion with the senior minister in the UK Government were Minister for Health and the Environment Sir Molwyn Joseph and Minister for Foreign Affairs and Trade the Honourable E.P Chet Greene.

The UK Government has not only pledged fi-

nancial support to Antigua and Barbuda for the May 27-30 SIDS4 Conference, a world gathering of island nations, but is also providing technical expertise on island and at the Antigua and Barbuda Mission in New York which is leading the coordination of the exercise in consultation with the support of the United Nations.

Prime Minister Browne, in recognition of the United Kingdom's role as a non-borrowing member of the Caribbean Development Bank (CDB), also took advantage of the opportunity to intercede on behalf of Antigua and Barbuda and other island nations in seeking the UK's support in debt sustainability considerations for SIDS.

Prime Minister Browne has been persistent in arguing that burdensome and onerous debt only exacerbates the issues of climate change and other threats that stand in the way of Antigua and Barbuda truly achieving sustained economic growth.

## IICA presents report on its activities over the past year

The International Institute for Cooperation in Agriculture (IICA) presented its country report on Antigua and Barbuda to stakeholders in agriculture on Thursday.

Country Programme Manager, Craig Thomas said the organization is required to present an annual report detailing its activities in each member state where it operates.

The presentation of the report was done in a forum dubbed an 'accountability seminar' that brought together representatives from the various groups and organisations with which IICA has been interacting over the past year.

"The report was based on three key pillars; transparency, accountability to stakeholders and feedback. Following the presentation of the country report the general feedback from the stakeholders was for us to continue the work that we having been doing and even to expand as well as congratulate us on what we have accomplished so far," Thomas reported.

The report covered the year 2022 where the IICA focused on territorial development and family farming. Territorial development has to do with working with producer groups such as bee keepers on both Barbuda and Antigua, the Gilbert Agricultural and Rural Development (GARD) Centre as well as other NGO's and Community-based Development Organisation (CDO's).

"We also focused on agriculture health and food safety. Currently, we are developing the draft new health and food safety policy document for Antigua and Barbuda. We are also working with the Plant Protection Union in the Ministry of Agriculture as well as Bureau of Standards. During the past year, we also did work to mitigate the effects of climate change. One aspect was a project to grow vetiver grass (bed grass) in collaboration with the GARD Centre," he disclosed.


The vetiver grass has been successfully used to carry out soil stabilization as well as used in what Thomas described as green business. This is where the grass is processed and used in ice cream making as well as soaps. "We engaged in green engineering. That is where we use plants to control soil erosion and soil slippage," Thomas

stated.

For its 2023 work programme, IICA has its eyes focused on working with women involved in the agro-processing sector as well as a programme to revive the Antigua Black pineapple. Antigua and Barbuda joins Jamaica and St. Lucia in a pilot project to improve sweet potato.

# Alfa Nero claimant may be ultimate loser

The Cabinet spokesman has taken a swipe at the claimant in the latest legal challenge brought against the government in the sale of the Alfa Nero, saying she likely stands to lose whatever the outcome.

Yulia Guryeva-Motlok-hov is the daughter of Russian Oligarch Andrey Gurvey and claims to be the sole share-holder in a Guernsey-based trust that is the only share-holder in the Flying Dutchman Limited that owns the superyacht. As such, she is laying claim to the Alfa Nero and has retained the services of Dr. David Dorsett to represent her cause in the High Court.

Cabinet Spokesman Melford Nicholas on Thursday maintained that adequate time was given for claims to be made and that period has long expired. He said even if the court rules against the government, it will not be a simple handing over of the Alfa Nero, since the initial sanctions placed on the vessel will likely be re-instituted.

"It is quite opportunistic now for these other persons who are staging these court cases to be saying that they are the rightful owners. If they for one moment hold the view that should they prevail and they are still part of the sanctioned group of persons that that craft will not go back unto a sanctions list and be subject to what it was prior to all of this actions we have taken, I think they're living in fairyland," the information minister asserted.

In June, the United States removed the Alfa Nero from its sanctions list, following in-depth discussions between Antiguan and Barbudan and US officials. This made it possible for the vessel to be placed on the auction block after it was compulsorily acquired earlier.

However, the latest legal challenge, along with the drawn-out process has caused American billionaire and former Google Executive Eric Schmidt to withdraw from the purchase of the Alfa Nero, after his bid of US\$67 million was accepted approximately three months ago.

Despite the setbacks, the government insists the vessel was legally acquired and will be sold.

"We are still encumbered by these legal challenges and we're going to have to determine how we go forward from there. But the thing to do is not to lose sight of what the ultimate objective is that the craft, has been confiscated, as a result of the abandonment in our waters and it has brought with it the possibility that it can become an environmental challenge, not only to our marine environment, but to our tourism facilities as well." Minister Nicholas reiterated.

The matter came up for hearing in the High Court of Justice on Wednesday and will continue on 18th December, 2023.

Antigua and Barbuda and the People's Republic of China set off on a journey into friendship 40 years ago. Preparations for the construction of the affordable housing project are being stepped up; 11 students who got the Chinese Government Scholarships have started their university life in China; The soon-to-be-opened Embassy of Antigua and Barbuda in Beijing will be a new home for Antiguans and Barbudans; Agricultural experts from both sides together visited 16 farms in five agricultural growing areas in Antigua and Barbuda and exchanged in-depth views on high-quality seeds, water conservation and irrigation, seedling and grafting, pest and grass control; During the Carnival, Chinese diaspora dressed in traditional Chinese costumes celebrating the development of Antiguan and Barbudan cultural heritage.

It is expressed in the letters from Chinese President Xi Jinping to Governor General H.E. Sir Rodney Williams and Prime Minister Hon. Gaston Browne that 'our political mutual trust has grown ever stronger; our practical cooperation has produced fruitful outcomes; and the friendship between our peoples has kept deepening'.

Looking back on 40 years of journey, the cooperation between the two countries has maintained a good momentum which rests on three pillars:

In so doing, we need to plan and develop relations between the two countries from a long-term perspective, and deepen the synergy of our development strategies. We need to actively explore new potentials of cooperation, and together safeguard the interests of developing countries and promote fairness and justice.

We are of the view that by working together to cultivate more development opportunities, more achievements will be brought to the two peoples. May the practical cooperation between the two countries break new grounds and take our traditional friendship to a new level.

# Do Caribbean countries need a new social contract?

Recent findings by the International Institute for Democracy and Electoral Assistance (IDEA) ring alarm bells for the global community: democratic governance is under threat, with an increasing number of people subjected to authoritarian regimes that bluntly infringe on human rights and freedoms.

While authoritarian regimes are emerging, detaining opposition figures, muzzling the media, and instilling fear, their societies are fragmenting and their economies are weakening, making them less able to satisfy the basic needs of their people, millions of whom are fleeing to other lands.

Their hold on power is buttressed by fear and the capacity of governing parties to keep the military loyal by acts of unusual generosity to leading figures and even to the institutions themselves. But as the adage goes, "Uneasy lies the head that wears the Crown".

Comfort in leadership is best and most sustainably derived from the wish of the people, by their informed votes cast at free, fair and transparent elections which are observed by international organizations. It ought not to rest on the vested interests of a few who benefit from the imposed structures

of power.


True democracy nourishes human rights, ensures voices are heard, and confronts past injustices to foster a promising future. In this connection, governments that uphold the rule of law, human and political rights, and the freedoms of speech and dissent are more likely to guide their countries towards political stability, social advancement, and economic development.

Yet, challenges abound. The rise of misinformation and disinformation, exacerbated by fake news on social media platforms, corrodes the fabric of democratic societies. This isn't just about inaccurate information; it's about using disinformation and misinformation as strategic ploys to mislead and harm societies.

United **Nations** The Secretary-General, Antonio Guterres, has expressed great concern about the use of misinformation and disinformation in societies.

While misinformation refers to the unintentional spread of inaccurate information, disinformation is not just inaccurate - it is crafted with the intent to deceive and cause harm. including race-hate and reputational damage.

All societies have to be alert to both misinformation and disinformation, questioning the accuracy of

what they see and hear on social media platforms. The established media also have a responsibility to point out when false information is being spread on social media, and not to fall into the trap of themselves providing platforms for flawed and unsubstantiated charges.

In light of this, governments owe it to both themselves and their societies to maximize transparency and access to information, in order to build trust in public institutions, governance, and processes. As Secretary General Guterres put it, "they should also encourage public participation at all levels and enable meaningful dialogues and debates".

On the link between democracy and development, robust democracies magnets for investments. They foster an environment of stability, predictability, and trust-cornerstones for any thriving economy.

However, the quality of life of the people is inextricably tied to these economic realities.

Hence, at the intersection of democracy and development lies the urgent task of eradicating extreme poverty, elevating living standards, and ensuring that the fruits of economic growth are equitably shared.

Democracy has not fully achieved these goals, but authoritarian regimes have not attained them at all, particularly since, in their pur-

suit, the essential elements of human participation in decisions have been absent.

But democracies cannot rest on their laurels, having succeeded in creating societies where democracy is upheld and institutionalised, through the separation of powers between the executive, the legislature and the judiciary, a great urgency now exists to narrow the gaps between the rich and the poor, within nations and between them, by upgrading the quality of human life.

The Caribbean, with a few exceptions, stands out as a beacon in upholding democratic tenets. However, underlying issues such as high unemployment and escalating costs of living can spark civil unrest, necessitating forward-looking measures.

To navigate these cross-roads, Caribbean countries must forge a renewed contract of democracy—one that not only pays homage to our tumultuous past in overcoming the bitter legacies of slavery, indentured labour, colonialism and imperialism, but also illuminates a path of hope, equity, and prosperity for all.

In its 2022 report on the Global State of Democracy, IDEA posited that democracies require a new social contract between political actors and civil society groups. IDEA proposed that this contract should be reconceptualized to reflect today's reality, addressing

new and evolving public needs and demands.

This concept is already being addressed in several countries through citizens' assemblies, governmental dialogue mechanisms and new constitutions which allow for greater power sharing and structures for wider participation in decision-making.

It is a concept that might be energetically considered by all in the Caribbean.

The pilot is said to have emergency initiated an landing procedure at Vance Amory International Airport; however, the aircraft ultimately plunged into the


sea near Herbert's Beach.

# Venezuela and US spar over Guyana border dispute

Venezuelan President Nicolás Maduro has rejected "interference" from the United States in its border dispute with Guyana.

Maduro's statements came after the US State Department's Assistant Secretary for Western Hemisphere Affairs, Brian Nichols, expressed the Biden Administration's support for Guyana in the dispute that is currently before the International

Court of Justice (ICJ).

"The US supports Guyana's sovereign right to develop its own natural resources. Efforts to infringe upon Guyana's sovereignty are unacceptable.

"We call on Venezuela to respect international law, including the 1899 Arbitral Award and the ongoing ICJ process between Guyana and Venezuela," Nichols wrote on X, formally known as Twitter.

Nichols' post was a re-

sponse to Venezuela criticising Guyana on Tuesday night for accepting bids for oil blocks in waters of the disputed territory.

Maduro responded to Nichols' tweet saying the US is trying to strip Venezuela of its territorial rights.

"From Venezuela we firmly reject the insolent interference of the United States, who have manipulated and bought, through Exxon Mobil and the Southern Command, the servile politicians of Guyana who little by little have turned this nation into a colony," he wrote.

"It is an unacceptable conspiracy that seeks to strip us of the territorial rights that belong to the Venezuelan people. Rest assured that the truth will prevail over these vile pretensions and Bolívar's Venezuela will triumph!"

Another statement from the Venezuelan Government accused the US of seeking to build a military base in Guyana, which will then be used for operations to undermine the Bolivarian Republic.

Venezuela stated this "would put the peace and stability of the entire region at risk".

Venezuela said its people and citizens are committed and ready to defend their homeland against any aggression from the United States.

# New York school bus crash: 'Faulty tyre' leaves two dead and five critically injured

Two people have died and five others have been critically injured in a school bus crash in New York.

It appears to have been caused by a faulty front tyre, officials say, adding that an inquiry is underway.

The charter bus was taking pupils from Long Island to a band camp when it came off the road and tumbled into a ditch near the town of Wawayanda.

Officials say 44 people were on the bus. They have been taken to six regional hospitals for treatment.

The two people who died have been named as Gina Pellettiere, 43, and Beatrice Ferarri, 77.

According to the school's website, Ms Pellettiere worked in the school's music programme.

the forming Arts, a community letmusic club in Long Island, ol's says on its website that she is the "director of bands" at the Farmingdale High School.

The crash happened at around 13:10 local time (18:10GMT) on Interstate 84, about two hours north of New York City. Police have closed the highway to allow work to be carried out at the crash scene.

The bus was one of six that was chartered to take some 300 pupils from the Farmingdale High School marching band to a music camp in Greeley, Pennsylvania.

Photos show the bus on its side with broken windows and a ladder raised up to help rescue people trapped inside.

"A bus that literally tumbled down a 50-ft (15-meter) ravine within minutes. It's extraordinary," New York Governor Kathy Hochul said in an evening news conference.

"While it's preliminary, it's likely that a faulty front tyre contributed to the accident. Although, again, this is still under investigation," she continued.

"That's a preliminary determination."

Most of the students on the bus were around 14 or 15 years old. The governor said it took 45 minutes to rescue all of them from the wreckage.

"I feel bad for them.

# South Africa: 'Cannabis muffins' given to 90 schoolchildren

Around ninety primary schoolchildren in South Africa were sent to hospital after eating muffins thought to be laced with cannabis.

Officials said the pupils bought the muffins from a street vendor on their way to Pulamadibogo Primary School, north-west of Pretoria.

They experienced nausea, stomach pain and vomiting - and three girls are still in hospital.

Two people have been arrested and face charges of attempted murder.

The suspects, aged 21 and 19, will appear before Soshanguve Magistrate's Court on Friday, police said.

The Gauteng provincial education department said teachers had called an ambulance after noticing "strange behaviour" from children in class.

It said the incident had caused considerable distress to parents who were worried about their children's safety.

Police, who are conducting a tox-



icology report to confirm if cannabis return to hea was used, say more than 90 pupils re-

ceived the muffins and suffered "serious pains".

They were all sent to nearby medical facilities, and "about 87" have been discharged, the education department said in a statement.

"Only three girl learners remain in hospital, and they are still receiving the necessary medical attention to return to health," it said.

Earlier this year, the Democratic Alliance (DA) party called for better vetting processes for street vendors, after eight children were admitted to hospital having eaten so-called 'space cookies' outside their school.

The party's spokesperson Khume Ramulifho also said he would pressure the provincial government to improve safety measures at school.

thought the tyre just came off. I didn't know they crashed and did flips and stuff," one student told the network.

"I usually take a bus," another pupil said. "I don't think I want to take a bus no more."

Some pupils said they had seen images of their injured friends on social media.

"My friend came up to me, showed me a photo, her face was all bloodied and stuff. I started crying," student Wenel Jen-Babtist told ABC News. "We saw somebody posting on Snapchat, the bus flipped over, we thought it was a joke at first," student Sean Jacobs said. "We didn't even know it was serious. It's horrible."

The cause of the accident is under investigation by New York State Police and the National Transportation Safety Board.

A family reunification centre has been set up at the Orange County Community College.

The camp was due to run from Thursday to Sunday. The uninjured students are expected to return home.

Nortje has succumbed to a back issue that saw him miss the latter part of the recent 3-2 home series win against Australia, and the loss of his extreme pace is a heavy blow. Magala has been battling a knee injury.

their opening encounter.


Keroi Lee produced 13 points as the Sandals snatched a 64-52 victory against the Sledge'O Ballers.

# Pay dispute between England women's players and FA appears to be resolved

LONDON (AP) - Players from the England women's team appear to have reached an agreement with the country's soccer federation regarding a dispute over bonuses and commercial structures.

England captain Millie Bright said at a news conference on Thursday that the players "feel really confident moving forward about the structure we now have in place" with the Football Association. Exact details of the agreement have yet to be officially announced.

In a statement released before the recent Women's World Cup in Australia, the England squad expressed disappointment at the dispute having not been resolved before the tournament and said the players had decided to pause talks with the intention

of revisiting them.

Players from teams at the World Cup were due to receive individual payments directly from FIFA for the first time, ranging from US\$30,000 to US\$270,00 depending on what stage of the tournament they reached.

England players didn't

receive any payments from the FA, reportedly because the governing body perceived payments coming from FIFA to be enough.

There is also believed to be frustration over a commercial strategy which players feel limits their ability to earn extra money from sponsorship.

"We've had a really good conversation with the FA," Bright said.

"We have come to an agreement, but I think it's bigger than just the bonus.

"For us it's about being world leaders on and off the pitch, and as we know the women's game is evolving very quickly and conversations like this need to happen in order to make sure in all areas we're at the top of our game."

England lost to Spain in the World Cup final, a year after the team coached by Sarina Wiegman won the European Championship for the first time.

England's first match since the World Cup is against Scotland today (Friday) in the inaugural Women's Nations League.

## Walton powers TKR into 2023 CPL final

Chadwick Walton hit an unbeaten half century as the Trinbago Knight Riders (TKR) secured their place in the 2023 Republic Bank Caribbean Premier League (CPL) final with a seven-wicket win over Guyana Amazon Warriors in Qualifier 1 at Providence in Guyana on Wednesday night.


