PM: Antigua and Barbuda making a big impact on the world stage

Antigua and Barbuda is attracting much respect and attention on the international stage largely due to the positions adopted by the government led by Prime Minister Gaston Browne.

Speaking in an exclusive interview with Point Express newspaper, PM Browne said this growing respect is manifested by the fact that Antigua and Barbuda was selected to host next year's Small Islands Developing States (SIDS) conference which will attract as many as five thousand attendees.

"Antigua and Barbuda is punching above its weight. This international conference of SIDS next year that we are hosting was being pursued by other small states, yet we are the ones who got it. I don't wish to boast, but it is Antigua and Barbuda that the United Nations is looking towards in order to champion many causes. Even as far as the new



Prime Minister Gaston Browne global eye care initiative," he revealed.

The prime minister noted that Antigua and Barbuda has also been at the forefront of the 'loss and damage' campaign that he first raised at COP 26 in Scotland and again at COP 27 in Egypt. Unfortunately, according to PM Browne some sections of the media have been singling out another Caribbean state for leadership in this campaign when it was Antigua and Barbuda that has been at the helm from the start.

As one of the senior prime ministers in CARICOM, PM Browne said he has led an administration that has done an 'enormous' amount of work on the international scene. Including, he noted, negotiating with the international financial community on the issue of de-risking and the threat it posed to the region's banking system, as many international banks threatened to withdraw their corresponding banking relations with banks in the Caribbean.

The prime minister confirmed that he has been receiving regular invitations from other governments and international institutions to address them on several issues of concern from climate change, to challenges facing small states to the recent efforts to help create and promote the Multi-Dimensional Vulnerability Index (MVI), which he co-chaired and helped to present at a meeting of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund held last week in Morocco.

Antigua and Barbuda joins in celebrating World Food Day

Today October 16, 2023, is World Food Day, and Antigua and Barbuda joins the international community in focusing attention on the quest to attain food security for its people.

With its 2023 theme, "Water is life, water is food. Leave no one behind," this year the Day spotlights the plight of 2.4 billion people in water-stressed countries and the 600 million reliant on aquatic food systems who face pollution, ecosystem degradation, and climate change impacts.

Minister of Agriculture, E.P. Chet Greene, said he is honored to stand with humanity in solidarity and dedication to the crucial mission of achieving food security for all.

"Today, we celebrate the bountiful harvests that nourish us and the collective efforts to address the intertwined challenges of water security, sustainability, and global development. Antigua and Barbuda wholeheartedly aligns with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), as they provide a comprehensive framework to drive our actions towards a more prosperous, equitable, and sustainable future. The pursuit of SDG 2: Zero Hunger and SDG 6: Clean Water and Sanitation resonates deeply with our nation's commitment to

uplifting our communities through resilient food systems and improved water security," he emphasized.

Noting that water is the lifeblood of agriculture and the cornerstone upon which foods are nurtured and flourish, Greene said the government firmly believes in improving water security to meet our growing agricultural needs sustainably.

"With strategic investments in Reverse Osmosis (RO) services, the establishment of new dams and ponds, and sustainable water management techniques, we are actively fortifying our infrastructure to ensure consistent water supply and usage efficiency across the food production chain. It is essential that we recognize the criticality of water as the source of life and the foundation of our sustenance," he pointed out.

He highlighted water's important role in all facets of food production including crop irrigation, maintenance of livestock, and food processing, and it enhances the nutritional values of our produce. "With this understanding, we prioritize the efficient and responsible utilization of water resources, preserving this invaluable asset for future generations," he urged.

The minister also announced several events to mark the day reflecting the government's unwavering commitment to nurturing sustainable food systems and educating society on their significance. "These activities include the distribution of food packages to vulnerable communities, seeds, and seedlings to encourage local cultivation, as well as educational initiatives to promote awareness and understanding of responsible water usage and sustainable agricultural practices," he revealed.

Minister Greene called on the nation to harness this precious resource (water) to cultivate abundant, nutritious food for all communities and pave the way for a self-sustainable future.

WIOC shareholders approve upgrade of offshore facilities

Shareholders of the West Indies Oil Company (WIOC) have approved plans by the senior management team to upgrade the company's offshore facilities as the company positions itself to be a major player in the storage business.

The disclosure comes from Chief Executive Officer, Gregory Georges, who indicated that the shareholders meeting less than a month ago went 'very well' as the management team pursues plans to 'build a company for the future.'

"We went to the shareholders' meeting to explain our strategic plans; what we plan to do; how we plan to

manage the energy transition and it went down very well. It is now on the part of management to continue to execute, as we continue to ask for support from our board and our shareholders," he stated.

Part of the company's vision for the future is to im-

prove its storage and pumping capabilities to make it more competitive in this area of its operations.

"At this stage, nothing is yet finalized, but we have plans to improve our offshore facilities; to improve our jetty, and to increase the size of our pipelines to boost our pumping rates and to make us a much more competitive storage facility in the Caribbean. As of now, we have a low pumping rate because our facilities were not designed for what we do at such a stage," he revealed.

Georges reported that the company has to invest 'significant sums' to install bigger pipes as they record a low pumping rate, using the current set of pipes which he explained were not designed for what the company does today.

"Our storage capacity went from half a million barrels to 1.7 million barrels today. Our sea infrastructure was developed for that type of facility. We will be investing a 'significant amount of money' to bring our offshore facilities with what's happening on the landside. This would make us a major storage player in the Caribbean," he declared.

Storage has emerged as a major source of revenue for WIOC over the last several years.

CONTRIBUTIONS OF THE HONOURABLE STEADROY BENJAMIN TO ANTIGUA AND BARBUDA FROM 1ST NOVEMBER, 1981 TO PRESENT

We, the undersigned, as representatives of the vast majority of the residents of St. John's City and its environs, hereby nominate the Honourable Steadroy Cutie Olivero Benjamin, the Attorney General and Minister of Legal Affairs, Public Safety, Immigration and Labour for National Honours to be bestowed upon him.

This fine gentleman has made tremendous outstanding contributions over the past 42 years in the areas of Politics, Law, Public and Community Service.

IN THE FIELD OF POLITICS

- The Honourable Steadroy Cutie Olivero Benjamin is one of the two surviving active (a) politicians who were Members of Parliament at the time when Antigua and Barbuda obtained its Independence from Britain on the 1st November, 1981; the other surviving active politician and Parliamentarian from that era is The Honourable Sir Robin Yearwood.
- He was appointed a Senator on 1st November, 1981 and served until 1984. He was (b) reappointed to the Senate in 1989 and served until 1994; a period all together of 8 years in the Senate.
- In 1994, he was elected to the House of Representatives for the Constituency of St. (c) John's City South where he served as Deputy Speaker of the House and Advisor on National Security until 1999. From 1994 to the present he has been successful at the polls and returned as the Constituency's Representative for seven consecutive elections: 1994, 1999, 2004, 2009, 2014, 2018 and 2023. He has never lost his seat in parliamentary elections
- All together, he has served this country as a Parlimentarian for a period of 38 years. He (d) served as Minister in various government ministries and is, at present, the country's Attorney General and Minister of Legal Affairs, Public Safety, Immigration and Labour. He has held these portfolios for the last three consecutive parliamentary terms
- He has been appointed to and acted as Prime Minister on numerous occasions during the (e) period 2014 to the present.

IN THE FIELD OF LAW

In addition to being an outstanding and eloquent Lawyer, as Attorney General and Minister of Legal Affairs, the Honourable Steadroy Cutie Benjamin has been in the forefront of legislative development in Antigua and Barbuda and in the OECS.

- He changed the legal architecture in the State of Antigua and Barbuda and is regarded as (a) one of the Leading Attorneys General and in the OECS;
- (b) He served as an Executive Member of the Council of Legal Education of the Caribbean and has had significant inputs into the Legal Education of students of the region.
- He has engaged the Council of Legal Education with a view to establishing a Law School (c) in Antigua and Barbuda to serve qualified students in the state and especially in the OECS.
- He oversaw the implementation of the sentencing guidelines for the sub-region which were (d) launched in Antigua/Barbuda and the OECS.
- The pilot programme of the Family Court for the OECS began in Antigua/Barbuda under (e) his guidance, be it thus so far, only at the level of the Magistracy- the High Court jurisdiction will soon be established.
- Under his stewardship the First Model Criminal Sexual Offences Court had its beginnings (f) in Antigua/Barbuda; the first in the region.
- The Civil Registry was established as an independent stand alone Department in September (g) 2020: the first in the OECS.
- The Criminal Prosecution Service as an independent legal entity was also recently (h) established; again, the first in the OECS.
- (i) He piloted several pieces of innovative legislation to include amendments to the Banking Act which featured prominently in the recent sale of Bank of Nova Scotia in the various countries in the sub-region and most recently there were amendments to the Companies Act which provide for the Rehabilitation of an insolvent corporate debtor-such as L.I.A.T 1974 limited
- (j) He pioneered the change in the Standing Orders in the Senate and the House of Representatives, updating and changing those Standing Orders which were first enacted in 1967

IN THE FIELD OF PUBLIC SERVICE

- (a) He worked as a Junior Clerk in the service of the Government of Antigua and Barbuda and was attached to the Royal Police Force of Antigua and Barbuda at the Newgate Street Police Station in the late 1960's before he was transferred to be trained as an Assistant Air Traffic Control Assistant at the Coolidge Airport, as it was then known.
- After graduating as Student of the Year from Cave Hill Campus at the University of the (b) West Indies in 1974, he was stationed by the government in the Labour Department where he was a Hearing Officer and the Senior Employment Officer. Further, he assisted the International Experts then present in Antigua in drafting what is now The Antigua and Barbuda Labour Code; a model legislation throughout the region.

- He has been a Judge of Calypsos in Calypso Competitions for many years and his voice (6) can be heard on Radio yearly, during the Carnival Season analysing the performance of Calypsonians and the performance of troupes and groups on the road. This he has been doing for over 35 years
- He taught Criminal Law at the State College and has mentored many young lawyers in (7)Antigua and Barbuda
- He is a Radio and Television host and personality, and, has voluntarily hosted several programmes on Television and Radio to include, "The Law and You" and "Justice". (8)
- He was a member of the Jaycees and is a Honourary Member of the Rotary Club. (9)

Principal Public Health Inspector, Julienne Mannix noted that while World Hand Hygiene Day was observed on Sunday (October 15) her department decided to hold its activities today.

Mannix indicated that her department will stage several demonstrations just outside its offices, on Upper Church Street, to show members of the public the correct ways in which they should go about washing their hands.

As part of the exercise, members of the public will be asked to wash their hands in the presence of the CBH officers who will observe to ensure that this is being done correctly.

The World Health Organization (WHO) said hand hygiene saves millions of lives every year when performed at the right moments during health care delivery. It is also a smart investment that offers exceptional returns for each dollar invested. Cleanliness care is a sign of respect to those who seek care, and it protects health and other workers who provide the same.

Opinion **UN action needed urgently** to end Israel-Hamas violence

The attack by Hamas on civilians in Southern Israel on 7 October 2023 was as stupid as it was cruel, brutal and inhuman.

Whatever the purposes - and there were many - behind a slaughter of 1,200 persons, including children - Hamas gave the perfect cover to the Benjamin Netanyahu government in Israel to try to carry out a long-desired objective by many Israelis. And that is to annex Gaza and cleanse it of Palestinians who are either refugees or descendants of refugees who were forced to flee from Palestine in 1948 when Israel announced its independence and a bitter war ensued between the nascent Israeli State and surrounding Arab countries.

The background to the issue

There were two attempts, driven by external powers to partition Palestine into two states, one Arab, one Jewish. The first was offered by Britain, the occupying power in 1937, and the second was proposed by the United Nations in 1947. The Arab countries rejected both plans, and Israel declared itself independent creating its own state. This led to the first Arab-Israeli war and produced more than half a million Arab refugees, and deep hostility that has never waned.

What built even greater resentment was that after the war, Israel destroyed hundreds of Palestinian villages and adopted an "Absentees' Property Law" by which the government confiscated land and houses that Palestinians were forced to abandon.

Over the years, there have been several attempts to negotiate a two-state solution to the problem, but with no success. Meanwhile, with each war, Israel has secured more territory, both occupying and settling it with Jewish people.

Encaging Palestinians in Gaza

Until 7 October, there were approximately 2.3 million Palestinians, hemmed into Gaza, living in crowded and impoverished conditions. Gaza is a narrow piece of land located on the eastern coast of the Mediterranean Sea, bordered by Israel to the east and north, and Egypt to the southwest. It is 41 km (25 mi) long, and from 6 to 12 km (3.7 to 7.5 mi) wide. Its total area is 365 km (141 sq. mi).

Since October 7, more than 2,700 people in Gaza, one third of them children, have been killed and 9,000 wounded by retaliatory Israeli military assaults. Further, 1.1 million people in North Gaza (the area closest to Israel) have been warned to move to South Gaza or

However, Egypt, which already hosts millions of migrants, is uneasy about the prospect of hundreds of thousands of Palestinian refugees crossing into its territory. Therefore, it has not opened the border. Consequently, if Israel continues its bombardment of Gaza in an attempt to kill Hamas' leaders, many more thousands of its inhabitants, including those trying to flee, will be killed.

The rise and support for Hamas

That carnage, laid at the feet of Israel, would suit Hamas, which has controlled Gaza since 2007 and whose main goal as set out in its revised charter of 2017 is "the destruction of the state of Israel". The resentment and demand for revenge, resulting from the killing of thousands of Palestinians would bring greater support for Hamas.

Hamas was formed in 1987 and, for decades, it has pursued a violent strategy aimed at rolling back Israeli rule - and it has made its presence felt at the cost of human suffering to both Israelis and Palestinians.

Hamas is known to have a close relationship with Iran. Iran and Israel regard each other as mortal enemies, and Iran is said to be providing weapons and money to Hamas. Additionally, Hamas is now producing its own weapons. This explains how it was able to employ sophisticated means of carrying out its October 7 attack. But it should be noted that Iran is reported to have been surprised at the event, and the US Secretary of State has publicly said that there is no evidence of Iranian involvement.

Nonetheless, Iran does have an interest in the incident, since it helps to pause, cont'd on pg 11

if not to derail, attempts by the US government to promote a deal between Israel and Saudi Arabia, the world's largest oil producer, to normalize relations. Further, Israel's decision to carry out intense military action in Gaza and the likely shedding of Palestinian blood, has caused several Arab states to retreat from closer relations with Tel Aviv. This retreat by Arab states from fashioning closer contact with Israel also suits Iran whose leadership want to keep Israel isolated.

The irony of Israeli support for Hamas

In its radical ardour, and access to financing and weaponry, Hamas has usurped the Palestinian Authority in the fight for Palestinian rights.

The irony is that it is the Israeli authorities, which for several years gave favourable treatment to Hamas, that has helped it to rise. In their fear that the Palestinian Authority might succeed in negotiating internationally for a sovereign state that would include the territories occupied by Israel, the Israel authorities sabotaged the Palestinian Authority at the 2006 election which Hamas won in Gaza.

Bitterness and resentment run deep

Bitterness and resentment between the Palestinians and Israel run deep. Israeli successes at annexation and expansion, while Palestine withered and Palestinians suffered dislocation and marginalization, have intensified Palestinian anger.

One of the external factors that heightened this acrimony was the recognition of Jerusalem as the Israeli capital by former US President Donald Trump. Palestinians regard Eastern Jerusalem as "occupied territory" where, one day, they wish to establish their own capital.

Nothing justifies barbarism

No well thinking person or government can excuse terrorism and barbarism for whatever cause. These events rightly create revulsion and rejection of its perpetrators.

Equally, however, no well thinking person or government should support any effort that uses these circumstances as an opportunity to punish all Palestinians for the actions of a radical group and seize more territory.

This is not the time to take sides. All governments – powerful ones particularly – need to look backward and forward at this issue and act to stop the escalating violence and carnage from which nothing good will result.

The fact that the United Nations Security Council (UNSC) has met, in an emergency session, and failed to issue even a joint statement on this matter is simply appalling. There is urgency for diplomatic action at the highest level.

The innocent people on both sides of this conflict require responsible action by those entrusted with peace and security in the world. So, too does the global community if this conflict escalates adding to the existing disruption of peace in the world.

A few days ago, I read in the Jamaica Observer that "cats are the single biggest problem Jamaicans are having right now, next to crime". I was not shocked or even surprised. After all, I grew up in Trinidad where every family has at least one cat or at least one small, domesticated feline mammal, the Felis cattus (or domesticus), the majority of which has thick soft fur of various colours. However, almost all the people in the region and beyond - men, women and children recognise that "cat" (a.k.a. "pussy" or "pussin") is not necessarily a domestic feline pet but also a colloquialism for the female sexual organ.

And not just us in the Caribbean. One night, at university in Canada, I took in the Johnny Carson Show. Johnny was interviewing the flamboyant actress, Zsa Zsa Gabor, whose fame lay (and I use that word with full awareness of its many meanings) in the number of marriages in which she was a protagonist and which exceeded the number of movies in which she featured. She had brought on the set of the Tonight Show a small creature as described above (feline mammal) and petted it constantly during the interview. She then, in seeming innocence, asked Johnny archly, "Do you want to play with my pussy?" To which he replied, "You have to get that cat off your lap first."

In Trinidad, the Calypsonians were the first to make the second meaning of cat overtake the first by leaps, bounds and not single, but 'double' entendres two words and phrases, one of which is usually risqué or indecent. Lord Blakie came with, "Hole de pussy, hole de pussy, hole the pussy cyat." He made sure the police couldn't hole him for it. The great Lord Kitchener, the Road March Champion, in his "My Puss-

Cat as ca in", demanded, "Mistah, move youh hand from dey, dat pussin belongs to me." Many years ago when the present Prime Minister (PM), Dr Keith Rowley, was the leader of the Opposition (LO) and Kamla Persad-Bissessar, now LO, was the PM, Mr Rowley, referring to the PM, made it clear he was no Kitch. He chanted, "She could jump high; She could jump low,/ She could drink this; She cold drink that,;/ She could bark at meh dog, I go ignore she cat."

COLLOQUIALISM

One of the senators on Dr Rowley's team termed the "cat" reference a "colloquialism". Their Women's League called it "political picong" (meaning, "politically based teasing or satirical banter"). Another senator, the Honourable Faris Al Rawi, insisted that the use of the term "cyat" by his political leader had "nothing to do with genitalia". One of my colleagues scoffed, saying that all the kids in Trinidad and Tobago knew exactly what "cat" or "kyat" meant. I stopped him. "You can't be sure of that. It is possible that because the senator went to school in Iraq and was catapulted to power in Trinidad, categorically speaking, and catastrophic as it might sound, the minister might have been catnapping for so long a period that he was unable to understand our categorisation of animals."

All this came to my mind when Mr Al-Rawi, removed from his high post of attorney general and made minister of rural development and local government, claimed that the media in Trinidad and Tobago (TT) are "too negative". He insisted, "TT is hooked on bad news ..." and added, "In no other country do you see 365 days of bad news on the front pages." The response in an editorial by journalist Kambe Lovelace of the TT pa-

per Newsday was immediate, "Conventional wisdom might suggest the minister is playing the old game of Shoot the Messenger. A more cynical view: this latest lecture is the strategy known to journalists as a "dead cat"- an attempt to shift the focus from all that is going wrong in the country – under Mr Al-Rawi and company's watch." In other words, Mr. Lovelace took down Al Rawi from self-acclaimed Rolex watches to Fog (off-white).

I was impressed by the inclusion of the term "dead cat" and felt that I needed to share its meaning and usage to my readers. Seeing that we were dealing with politicians, it was not surprising that the first thing I came up with was, "What's the difference between a dead politician and a dead cat on the street?" There were skid marks in front of the cat. I tried another angle. "What has four legs and flies?" A dead cat, one that helped me to understand what the term meant. Basically the "dead cat strategy", also known as "deadcatting", is the political strategy of deliberately making a shocking announcement to divert media attention from problems of failures in other areas.

US actress Suzanne Somers has died at the age of 76 following a decades-long battle with cancer, her publicist has confirmed.

"Her family was gathered to celebrate her 77th birthday," reads a statement shared with media.

"Instead, they will celebrate her extraordinary life, and want to thank her millions of fans and followers who loved her dearly."

As well as an actress, Somers was an author and fitness guru.

She began her acting career in the late 1960s and early 1970s with small parts in TV shows including The Love Boat and One Day at a Time before landing the role

of Chrissy Snow in Three's Company in 1977.

Somers starred in the show for five of its eight seasons before being fired following a dispute over pay.

Following a break from on-screen acting that included a stint as an entertainer in Las Vegas, she returned to on-screen acting in the early 1990s - taking up a lead role in Step by Step, which ran for seven seasons.

Her later TV credits included co-hosting Candid Camera, her own talk show The Suzanne Show and an appearance on Dancing with the Stars.

Somers also built up a multimillion dollar fitness empire, appearing in com-

mercials for the Thighmaster and ButtMaster exercise equipment and releasing several self-help books on topics including wellness and weight loss. She launched her own beauty brand in 2019.

She was first diagnosed with an aggressive form of breast cancer in her 50s and announced on social media in July that, after being in remission, it had returned.

"I know how to put on my battle gear and I'm a fighter," she wrote on Instagram.

A private family burial will be held for Somers next week, according to her publicist, with a memorial to be held in November.

Somers is survived by her husband and son.

Jamaican MP wants justice for his murdered daughter and her mother

CMC - Opposition Parliamentarian, Phillip Paulwell is "hoping that all who were involved [in the kidnapping and murder of his 10-month-old daughter and her mother] are brought to justice and punished to the fullest extent of the law."

In a statement issued on Saturday, Paulwell said nothing could have prepared him for the events that unfolded since last week Thursday when police here charged Leoda Bradshaw, a US Navy petty officer with whom Paulwell sired a now eight-year-old child, along with three other men in the abduction and murder of his daughter Sarayah and her mother, Toshyna Patterson.

"The past few weeks have been extremely difficult for me as I grappled with the abduction of my daughter and her mother," the Member of Parliament for Kingston East and Port Royal said in a statement.

"I am heartbroken that the worst has happened," he said, adding that he had "prayed unceasingly" for their safe return.

"That anyone could murder a mother and an innocent baby is unimaginable, and my heart is heavy with sadness," he said.

"I am praying for Toshyna's family, who I know are experiencing the unbearable grief and pain of losing their beloved daughter and granddaughter.

"As a human being, father, lawyer, and legislator I am hoping that all who were involved are brought to justice and punished to the fullest extent of the law."

Paulwell said he has been in constant dialogue with the police and has cooperated fully with the investigation.

"I cannot comment on the inves-

tigations nor matters before the court, but I wish to thank the police for their tireless work.

He expressed gratitude to the "many Jamaicans" who have been generous in their prayers as well as their "kind and thoughtful expressions of love, support, and solidarity" for him and his family.

Last Friday, Bradshaw, appeared in the Supreme Court after being charged with two counts of conspiracy to kidnap, two counts of conspiracy to murder, two counts of kidnapping, and two counts of capital murder.

According to the Crown, Bradshaw, who lives overseas, after learning about the existence of Paulwell's 10-month-old daughter on September 5, 2023, contacted Patterson on Facebook, and told her she was Paulwell's spouse and wanted a DNA test done on the baby.

She travelled to Jamaica the next day, September 6, 2023 "for the sole purpose of killing Toshyna Patterson and the young child she shared with her spouse," the Crown alleged.

The Crown also alleged that Bradshaw, through her cousin and co-accused Roland Balfour, contracted men to kidnap and murder Patterson and Sarayah.

Balfour has been charged with two

counts of accessory before the fact to kidnapping and two counts of accessory before the fact to murder.

Richard Brown, another accused, has been charged with two counts of conspiracy to murder, two counts of conspiracy to kidnap, two counts of kidnapping, and two counts of murder.

Roshane Miller, the third man accused in this matter, has been charged with two counts of accessory before the fact to kidnapping, and two counts of accessory before the fact to murder.

Both Brown and Miller are to appear before the court later this month.

According to prosecutors, Bradshaw met with Miller and Brown to arrange for the kidnappings and murders. The original plan was to kidnap Patterson and the baby from their home.

Prosecutors told the court that Bradshaw paid the men the equivalent of J\$100,000 in United States currency as down payment for the execution of the crime. The remainder of the funds (\$400,000) was to be paid after the completion of the deal.

Prosecutors said that on Saturday, September 9, Bradshaw "placed several calls and conversed with Patterson, with a view to lure her away from her premises", arriving at Patterson's home at approximately 7 am that day.

SVG calls for UN intervention amidst 'war crimes' in Israel-Gaza war

CMC - The Government tlement of the conflict as of St. Vincent and the Grenadines (GoSVG), says "war crimes" are being committed in the ongoing Israeli-Gaza conflict and has called for an end to hostilities on both sides.

The government made the call in a statement on Friday, five days after the regional bloc, CARICOM, said "the savage nature of the attacks and counterattacks is the antithesis of civilised life and living".

On October 7, Hamas militants fired rockets into Israel, killing scores of people and taking more than 100 others hostage.

Since then, Israel has been bombing Gaza and economists have been monitoring the economic fallout amidst the emerging humanitarian situation. In its statement on Friday, the Ralph Gonsalves-led government said it endorses CARICOM's statement on the current attacks and counter-attacks.

"We reiterate the foundational principles for set-



contained in the United Nations Security Council Resolution (UNSCR) 242, which was adopted on November 22, 1967, following the Six-Day War in June 1967 between Israel, on the one hand, and Arab nations. including the Palestinians, on the other hand," Kingstown said.

The government noted that the Resolution emphasises, centrally, among other things, "a just and lasting peace in which every State in the area can live in security", and acknowledges "the sovereignty, territorial integrity and political independence of every state in the area and their right to live in peace within secure and recognised boundaries free from threats or acts of force

"This Resolution has become a pivotal cornerstone of Middle East diplomatic efforts since then," the government said, noting that the resolution premises "a two-State solution" for Israel and Palestine to



live alongside each other in peace within secure and recognised boundaries free from threats or acts of force.

"Successive governments of Israel, more particularly those headed, or unduly influenced, by rightwing and ultra-nationalist forces, including the current government, have refused repeatedly to ensure the practical implementation of 'a just and lasting peace'," the GoSVG said.

"Indeed. Israel has imposed a veritable colonialism, including a harsh settler-colonialism and а forceful, illegal occupation of Palestinian lands, which has given rise to intense Palestinian resistance and a brutal Israeli response. Sadly, innocent lives are being lost, needlessly."

Hong Kong: 11kg of suspected cocaine found in motorised wheelchair

Officials at Hong Kong International Airport have uncovered 11kg of suspected cocaine hidden in the cushions of an electric wheelchair.

The haul, worth an estimated \$1.5m (£1.26m), was found when a 51-year-old man was going through customs clearance on Saturday.

The man, who arrived from the Caribbean country of Sint Maarten via Paris on Saturday, has been arrested.

He could face life in prison if found guilty of trafficking a dangerous drug.

According to customs officials, the suspect brought the wheelchair into the country as one of two pieces of checked baggage.

Further examination was ordered when staff became suspicious and they found evidence that its seat cushion and backrest had been re-stitched.

The man, who is not

from Hong Kong and has mobility issues, reportedly told officials that he was the director of a car rental company and that the wheelchair had been loaned to him by a friend.

An investigation into the incident has been launched.

Customs officials said in response to the discovery that they would increase checks on visitors from "high-risk regions" to combat transnational drug trafficking activities.

According to their latest statistics, the number of cases detected in customs checks involving dangerous drugs in 2022 was 931, up from 906 the previous year. Some 178 people were arrested over related offences last year.

It is not the first time

that drugs have been found hidden in a wheelchair at an airport. In November, officials in New York seized \$450,000-worth of cocaine found in the wheels of a woman's wheelchair.

In September 2022, nearly \$1.6m-worth of cocaine was found stuffed into the upholstery of a motorised wheelchair in the Italian city of Milan.

Ecuador chooses president during wave of violence

Ecuadoreans are voting in the run-off of a presidential election that has been overshadowed by a crime wave which has turned the country into one of the most violent in the region.

The first round of the election was held just days after presidential candidate Fernando Villavicenio was shot dead in the capital, Quito.

Seven suspects were arrested in connection with his assassination, but have since been killed in jail.

Security is voters' main concern.

Voters will choose between centrist Daniel Noboa of the National Democratic Action coalition and Luisa González of the left-wing Citizen Revolution Movement.

The 35-year-old Daniel Noboa is the son of banana magnate Álvaro Noboa.

The older Noboa ran for the presidency five times, but failed to get elected.

Daniel Noboa's success in the first round - he came second with 23% of the vote, thereby securing himself a spot in the run-off - was a surprise. He has since overtaken the first-placed candidate, Luisa González, in the opinion polls.

Luisa González, a lawyer who secured 34% of the votes in the first round, may not have a billionaire father, but she does enjoy the backing of former president Rafael Correa.

Mr Correa continues to exert huge political influence in Ecuador, despite the fact that he has lived in Belgium since he left power in 2017 after a 10-year stint as president.

The former leader is a divisive figure, who was convicted of breaking campaign finance laws in 2020

and sentenced in absentia to 10 years in prison.

The 45-year-old Luisa González is his handpicked candidate and she has said that if she were to win, Mr Correa would be her main adviser.

Both Ms González and Mr Noboa have tried to address voters' concerns about Ecuador's skyrocketing murder rate and the increasing power of gangs.

Mr Noboa has suggested moving some of Ecuador's most hardened criminals to prison ships off the Ecuadorean coast, in order to break up the prison gangs which have engaged in deadly warfare inside the country's penitentiaries.

He also wants to boost the security at Ecuador's borders and ports to disrupt key drug-trafficking routes. Ecuador is located between Colombia and Peru, the top two producers of cocaine in the world, and has become a transit country for the drug.

Mr Noboa has suggested installing scanners at ports and airports to ensure more shipments of cocaine are intercepted.

He has also tried to appeal to voters by promising to boost employment opportunities.

Ms González has said that if elected, she would tackle the root causes of crime, fostering social integration and creating job opportunities for those who may be tempted to join the ranks of the gangs for lack of prospects.

If she were to win, she would become Ecuador's first woman president. However, her opposition to abortion even in cases of rape and incest has alienated some of the women voters who want to see a woman lead the country.

Whoever wins will be sworn in on 25 November. However, the winner will only have 17 months in office until the next presidential election.

This is due to the fact that the current presidential election was triggered early when outgoing President Guillermo Lasso dissolved parliament amid an impeachment trial.



MELBOURNE, Australia- West Indies Women suffered an eight-wicket defeat to Australia in the third One Day International at Junction Oval on Saturday, which gave Australia a 2-0 series win in the threematch series, after the second game was abandoned due to rain.

The West Indies Women were sent in to bat first and they struggled against a disciplined Australian bowling attack, failing to post a challenging total as they tumbled to 103 all out in 31.4 overs.

Wicketkeeper/batter Rashada Williams once again led the team with the bat as she top-scored with a patient 23 off 71 deliveries.

Skipper Hayley Matthews was next best with 23 off 17, falling for the second time in series to Kim Garth.

Cherry-Ann Fraser provided some late hope at the end of the innings with 19 off 34 deliveries, which included a mighty six. Annabel Sutherland was the pick of the Australian bowlers, finishing with figures of three for 23, followed by Tahlia McGrath with two wickets for 10 runs.

The main goal was learning and adapting, and in that sense, there were takeaways.

In the post-match presentation, captain Hayley Matthews reflected on the ODI series. She said, "I think for us we definitely got to find a way for more of our batters to chip in.

"It's disappointing for many of us, especially throughout the ODI series not being able to get totals on the board. However, we recognize the calibre of the opposition and knew the challenges of this tour. But reflecting upon our performances, we believe we can and should do better."

The road ahead for the West Indies Women is an exciting one, with away series lined up against Pakistan and Sri Lanka in 2024, but the team's eyes are firmly set on the upcoming ICC Women's T20 World Cup in Bangladesh next September-October.

While the tour's results may not have been in their favour, the lessons learned will undoubtedly serve as a building block for the future. The journey to the ICC Women's T20 World Cup will be one to watch, with the West Indies Women looking to bounce back stronger.
