GG urges Senator Dwayne George to utilize his training in his new appointment

Prime Minister Gaston Browne has fulfilled a promise made to political newcomer, Dwayne George, that he will be appointed to a position in the government following the By-election held on Tuesday.

In the presence of family and well-wishers, as well as Prime Minister Browne and other members of the Cabinet and the Senate, Senator George took the three oaths; the Oath as a Senator, the Oath as Minister of State, and the Oath of Secrecy in a ceremony presided over by the Governor General Sir Rodney Williams at Government House. In brief remarks, Sir Rodney took time to highlight to Sen. George some of the significance of his appointment.

"I would like to take this opportunity to highlight the values and principles that are of paramount importance as we embark on this journey of governance.

"First and foremost, I want to stress the crucial role of prudent fiscal management. Our Ministry of Finance plays a pivotal role in the economic well-being of our nation. It is responsible for managing the resources that fuel the engine of our country's growth.

"We must ensure that our fiscal decisions are guided by sound financial principles, safeguarding our financial stability for the benefit of future generations. Senator George, I encourage *cont'd on pg 3*

At a graduation ceremony held at the UWI Five Islands Campus on Thursday, some two hundred and fifty-two persons graduated, after completing courses being offered through the University of the West Indies Five Islands Campus Life-Long Learning Unit (LLU).

Among the dignitaries in attendance were the Governor General, His Excellency Sir Rodney Williams, and Foreign Affairs Minister, E.P. Chet Greene, who sponsored courses for several of his constituents.

Head of the LLU, Paula Lee, said the ceremony marks a continuation of the learning revolution now taking place in Antigua and Barbuda with the advent of the UWI FIC.

"There is easier access to professional development training, a wider variety of courses that are ideal for current and emerging sec-

Antigua and Barbuda shows interest in sargassum research

Antigua and Barbuda's representative at the OECS Mission in Geneva, Switzerland, Ambassador Colin Murdoch, was part of a study tour that the mission mounted, to an institute where research is being conducted into sargassum.

Each year, the brown colour and fowl stench of the sargassum algae have periodically plagued beaches in the Caribbean in recent years, impacting sea life, tourism, and livelihoods of those who work in the blue economy.

In a media release, the Organisation of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) Commission said it is ded-

icated to promoting sustainable solutions for environmental and development challenges.

"Keeping to this commitment, representatives of the OECS participated in a recent study tour with the Paul Scherrer Institute in Switzerland and AlgalTek, an algae production company.

"The OECS team comprised of representatives from the OECS Mission in Geneva, led by Ambassador Colin Murdoch, as well as colleagues from OECS headquarters in Saint Lucia," according to the release.

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It described the Paul Sherrer Institute (PSI) as a leading research institute for natural and engineering science.

AlgalTek specializes in algae products, algae bioproducts, research, consulting, and development. AlgalTek aims to produce high-quality products from algae biomass in an environmentally friendly manner, including food, cosmetics, packaging, and other materials.

The main activity of the study tour was designed to identify a baseline for research and technology and help participants build capacity to support projects aimed at effective management and use of Sargassum



algae. Participants had the opportunity to see some of the innovations in algae production and studied various methods to process each component of Sargassum algae that can be adapted for different uses–pigments, proteins, lipids, minerals, microfibrillated cellulose, biofuels and bioplastics, residue, etc. They were also able to explore modern methods to collect Sargassum algae and discussed possibilities for export for the OECS region.

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Environment Division launches competition inviting innovation among young people

The Department of Environment has initiated a project titled "Innovative Technologies for improved water availability to increase food security in Antigua and Barbuda" (AFSIG Project).

The project aims to improve food security in Antigua and Barbuda by facilitating the availability and use of ground or surface water for agricultural purposes via innovative technologies.

To foster the younger generation's interest in education about climate change and the environment, as well as to empower youth to help the country achieve climate solutions, the DOE's AFSIG project is hosting a Student Innovate Competition through which a Call for Proposals (CFP) has been issued to students to pitch innovative technologies and approaches for the agricultural sector.

Individual students or groups of students (aged 12 - 21 and currently enrolled in a secondary or tertiary school in Antigua and Barbuda) are invited to submit a research essay to present an innovative technology or approach that has the potential to help the agricultural sector become more resilient to climate change by tackling one of four (4) water supply challenges facing farmers (see Competition Guidelines).

Suggestions for proposals include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Ecosystems-based adaptation
- 2. New inventions
- 3. Digital technologies

4. Best and successful practices outside of Antigua and Barbuda

Authors of shortlisted submissions will pitch their innovative technology or approach via a brief oral presentation to a panel of judges at the DOE's annual Arbour Day event on November 30, 2023.

The competition will be divided into two categories: (1) tertiary and (2) secondary schools. The student(s) with the best pitch for each category will receive a cash prize for their respective school. The best overall submission between the two categories will be tested as a demo and students will be invited to participate in the demonstration.

Venezuela's dangerous referendum: Threatening peace and international law

For sixty years, from their entry into school, Venezuelans have been trained into believing that the Essequibo region of Guyana belongs to Venezuela. Consequently, regardless of the facts, this belief is ingrained in the Venezuelan psyche.

This is why, the only matter on which the contending political factions in Venezuela can agree is that Essequibo is Venezuelan.

It has long been a political tactic that, when there is domestic discord, a common enemy should be created, in an attempt to gain political support generally. Hence, the periodic but persistent proclamations from Venezuela, claiming Essequibo.

The latest attempt to validate the acquisition of the Essequibo region is evident in the questions posed to the Venezuelan electorate in a forthcoming referendum with a predetermined outcome.

The contrived referendum, prejudicially titled, "in defence of Guayana Esequiba", will be held on 3rd December 2023. Among its deliberately leading questions, designed to get a desired positive answer, is the following: "Do you agree with the creation of the Guayana Esequiba state and the development of an accelerated plan for the comprehensive care of

the current and future population of that territory that includes, among others, the granting of citizenship and Venezuelan identity card in accordance with the Geneva Agreement and international law, consequently incorporating said state on the map of Venezuelan territory?".

Given that for over 60 years, successive governments of Venezuela have carried out a propaganda policy of brainwashing their people to adopt the claim that Essequibo belongs to Venezuela in defiance of an 1899 International Arbitral Award, the question is framed to secure the electorate's support as validation of the annexation of Essequibo.

Significantly, the questions for the referendum ignore entirely that there is an existing arbitral award since 1899 that establishes the boundaries between Venezuela and Guyana. Similarly, the questions ignore the historical evidence that Venezuela proclaimed the arbitral award and ratified it in their congress.

The referendum also makes no mention of the fact that, since 2018, there is a case before the highest legal court in the world, the International Court of Justice (ICJ), to settle the validity of the 1899 award. The only reference to these proceedings is contained in

question 3 of the referendum, which, prejudicially, poses the loaded question: "Do you agree with the historic position of Venezuela not to recognise the jurisdiction of the International Court of Justice to resolve the controversy over the territory of Guayana Essequiba?".

Venezuelan The authorities neglect to advise their electorate of Articles 92 and 93 of the Charter of the United Nations. Article 92 states, "The International Court of Justice shall be the principal judicial organ of the United Nations" and Article 93 declares, "All Members of the United Nations are ipso facto parties to the Statute of the International Court of Justice." Not to recognise the jurisdiction of the ICJ is tantamount to a repudiation of the UN Charter.

Moreover, the ICJ has already twice decided that it has jurisdiction to determine the validity of the 1899 award and the related land boundary between Venezuela and Guyana. The placing of the question in the referendum, in the manner in which it is framed, is a flagrant disregard for international law, the UN Charter and the ICJ.

It is clear that this contrived referendum is designed to lead the Venezuelan electorate into giving cover for the government decision to ignore the ICJ proceedings and, instead, to take unilateral action to "incorporate" Essequibo into "the territory of Venezuela".

The Caribbean Community (CARICOM) rightly responded to this situation by noting that "two of the questions approved to be posed in the Referendum, if answered in the affirmative, would authorise the government of the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela to embark on the annexation *cont'd on pg 13*



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of territory, which constitutes part of the Cooperative Republic of Guyana, and to create a state within Venezuela known as Guyana Essequibo". Further, CARICOM reaffirmed that "international law strictly prohibits the government of one State from unilaterally seizing, annexing or incorporating the territory of another state.

An affirmative vote as aforesaid opens the door to the possible violation of this fundamental tenet of international law."

Against this background, it seems that the Venezuelan government is convinced that its chances of a favourable decision from the ICJ of its claims are very slim. Therefore, it is moving to annexation, a blatant violation of the Charters of the UN and the Organization of American States.

Venezuela has reached this point after many efforts to scuttle the ICJ process, by asserting that the controversy with Guyana could be settled by dialogue and negotiation between the two states. In making this assertion, Venezuela ignores the 50 years of joint commissions, direct negotiations, and UN good offices mediation which all failed. It also ignores that the present ICJ process, which flowed directly from the 1966 Geneva Agreement in which both Venezuela and Guyana agreed, under Article IV (1), that the UN Secretary-General shall make the decision concerning "one of the means of settlement provided in Article 33 of the Charter of the United Nations". The Secretary-General decided on the ICJ.

And, Venezuela had every opportunity to participate actively in the proceedings even after it lost its legal arguments objecting to the Court's jurisdiction. Therefore, Venezuela's call for dialogue and negotiation is another gambit to avoid the judicial means of settlement.

International law and the ICJ process are the legitimate and peaceful pathways to a definitive settlement of the land boundary.

Any attempt to unilaterally incorporate Essequibo into Venezuela as is promoted by the planned referendum, or any subsequent military action in furtherance of such a contrived referendum, will rightly be met by international odium, condemnation and action.

Vogue editor Edward Enninful named UK's most powerful black person

The editor-in-chief of British Vogue, Edward Enninful OBE, has been named the UK's most influential black person by the Powerlist 2024.

Powerful Media's annual list celebrates people of African, African Caribbean and African American heritage.

Now in its 18th year, it highlights black role models to young people.

Other names to make the list for 2024 include Afua Kyei, Bank of England chief financial officer, and Dragon's Den star and podcaster Steven Bartlett.

Enninful is the first black man to hold the top job at the British fashion magazine but earlier this year he announced he would be stepping down to help grow the brand globally and focus on other projects.

He is also the European editorial director of Condé Nast.



Edward Enninful said it was an honour to be featured at the top of 2024's list.

The 51-year-old described it as an honour to be number one on the list, which he said "shines a light on black people really breaking boundaries, who are unafraid and champion what it means to be truly diverse in their own industries".



Born in Ghana, Enninful moved to London at a young age with his parents and six siblings. As a teenager, he was scouted on a train and briefly spent some time modelling.

He started his editorial career as fashion director of British youth culture magazine i-D at the age of 18, making him the youngest person to be named an editor at a major international fashion title.

The Powerlist recognises men and women across a wide range of industries including business, science, technology and the arts.

Other names for 2024 include Lord Woolley of Woodford, co-founder of Operation Black Vote and principal at Cambridge University's Homerton College, as well as model and activist Munroe Bergdorf.

Comedian Mo Gilligan and entrepreneur Patricia Bright also make an appearance.

Previous people to make the number one spot include Jacky Wright, former chief digital officer and corporate vice-president at Microsoft US, seven-time Formula One champion Sir Lewis Hamilton and former Children's Laureate Malorie Blackman.





CMC -The Surinamese Association of Journalists (SVJ) has "strongly condemned" the attack on a radio station here as police continue their investigations into the circumstances that led to bullets being fired upon the private radio station on Tuesday.

Police said that unknown persons fired shots at the Radio LIM FM in the capital during the early hours where the manager and owner, Clifton Limburg, resides with his family.

Limburg said that he had no idea where the attack came from, but that he will not be "intimidated" nor deterred by the action that damaged the vehicle belonging to his wife.

Limburg served as the spokesperson for former president Desi Bouterse during the previous government, and his radio programme "'Bakana Tori" is critical of the current Santokhi administration.

In a statement, the SVJ said while the "motive for this shooting is still unknown" it "strongly expresses its rejection of what happened and condemns this shooting.

"If it turns out that this is an intimidating attack on the media house and the presenter, it would constitute CRIME

undermining and violating the freedom of the press and freedom of expression, which are guaranteed in the constitution and international treaties and declarations to which Suriname is a party.

"Shooting and other attacks on democratic foundations, institutions, persons, and organisations create an unsafe and burdensome feeling in society," it said, calling on the judicial authorities and the government, and in particular the Ministry of Justice and Police, to conduct a thorough investigation into the matter.

Justice Minister Kenneth Amoksi, who condemned the attack, told reporters on Wednesday that every effort is being made to solve the case and bring the perpetrators to justice.

Meanwhile, the ruling Progressive Reform Party (VHP) has also condemned the attack saying it "does not fit in with our democratic system at all.

"This is not only an attack on the rule of law and democracy, but also on our hardworking entrepreneurs. If this cowardly act is directed against the medium of LIM FM, it goes against fundamental rights such as freedom of association, freedom of expression, and freedom of life," the ruling party said in its statement.

The ruling party noted that regardless of the motive for this "cowardly act", there is no room for anarchy and lawlessness in the Surinamese system.

"We must always walk the path of democracy. No one has the right to take matters into their own hands." the VHP said.

The extra-parliamentary party, Democratie en Ontwikkeling in Eenheid (DOE) said in a statement that "such events" against anyone or any agency have no place in a democracy and the rule of law.

"It creates an imbalance and a heavy feeling of insecurity. The party would like to see that the facts of this unsavoury event are quickly exposed by the authorities," DOE said.

The Royal Turks and Caicos Islands Police Force (RTCIPF) is investigating a murder following the discovery of a body.

The victim was found on the side of the road on Robinson Street, Five Cays, Providenciales this morning.

A report states the unidentified male is approximately 5' 08" ft tall, slim built, about 150 to 160 pounds, and appears between 30 and 40 years old.

The body was clad only in a white long-sleeve jersey and long khaki pants. The male victim wore multi-coloured sneakers (purple, green, and white).

The RTCIPF is seeking the public's assistance in positively identifying the male victim.

Based on preliminary information, a call was placed to the Police Control Room around 6:37 am indicating that

the lifeless body of a male was lying on the roadside.

RTCIPF officers arrived at the location and found the bleeding victim with what appeared to be gunshot wounds.

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An autopsy is expected to be performed today to determine the cause of death.

Hurricane Otis: Dozens killed in Mexico's Guerrero state With landlines and mobile phone hurricane - the most severe category

At least 27 people were killed by Hurricane Otis, which made landfall on Mexico's Pacific coast on Wednesday, officials say.

Four more people have been reported missing, the security secretary said.

Acapulco was among the areas worst hit with 80% of the resort's hotels damaged and streets flooded.

The Mexican President travelled to the city by land and at one point had to get out of his car and walk as debris from a mudslide blocked the highway.

"The army is bringing machinery and we're going to try to reopen [the highway] as soon as possible," President Andrés Manuel López Obrador said.

coverage disrupted for more than 24 hours, it took officials until Thursday morning to release the death toll.

"Unfortunately, we have received word from the state and city governments that 27 people are dead and four are missing," Secretary of State for Security Rosa Icela Rodríguez said.

She did not give any details about where or how they had died.

The ministry of defence said 8,000 soldiers had been deployed to Acapulco and towns along the coast to help with the clear-up and provide residents with food and water.

Hurricane Otis made landfall at 00:25 local time (06:25 GMT) on Wednesday. It had intensified from a tropical storm into a category five

- in just 12 hours.

It brought winds of 165 miles per hour (265km/h) to the coastal areas before easing in strength.

Citlali Portillo, who works in the tourism sector in Acapulco, described to Televisa TV how "the building shook as if there was an earthquake".

Videos showed guests sheltering in bathrooms and other areas without windows so they would not be injured by flying glass as windows were blown in by the wind.

The facade of a shopping centre in Acapulco was also ripped off.

MP Crispin Blunt arrested on suspicion of rape

Ex-minister Crispin Blunt has confirmed he was arrested on Wednesday on suspicion of rape and the possession of controlled substances.

In a statement, the Reigate MP said he had twice been interviewed by police in connection with this incident.

Mr Blunt said he originally raised the incident with police three weeks ago, concerned about "extortion".

He said he was cooperating with Surrey Police's investigation and was confident he would not be charged.

The police were unable to say if the controlled substances were drugs, as tests are being carried out, according to PA Media.

The Conservative Party withdrew the whip, meaning Mr Blunt will sit as an independent MP, after he confirmed he had been arrested. He has been asked to stay away from Parliament.

Mr Blunt was elected as Conservative MP for Reigate, in Surrey, in the 1997 general election, defeating the incumbent Sir George Gardiner, who had switched from the Tories to the Referendum Party.

He served as a justice minister from 2010 to 2012, in the whips office when the Conservatives were in opposition and chaired the influential Foreign Affairs Committee.

In April, he apologised for defending former MP Imran Ahmad Khan, following his conviction for sexually

assaulting a teenage boy. Mr Blunt had called the verdict a "dreadful miscarriage of justice" in a statement, but retracted his comments.

A month later Mr Blunt announced he will be standing down as an MP at the next election.

In a statement Mr Blunt, he said: "It has been reported that an MP was arrested yesterday [25 October] in connection with an allegation of rape. I am confirming that MP was me.

"The fact of the arrest requires a formal notification of the Speaker and then my chief whip.

"I have now been interviewed twice in connection with this incident, the first time three weeks ago, when I initially reported my concern over extortion.

Mexico state, Morelos and Oaxaca should expect very heavy rain.

"He has been released on conditional police bail pending further inquiries."

The Conservative Party has declined to comment.

This is the latest sexual misconduct allegation to hit the party.

A separate Conservative MP, in his 50s, was arrested in May 2022 on suspicion of rape, sexual assault, abuse of position of trust and misconduct in a public office.

The MP is currently on bail until mid-February 2024.

The basketball fraternity is now mourning the loss of one of Antigua and Barbuda's basketball legends, Wayne "Doc" Harris, who passed away on Wednesday.

Harris, who was born on North Street in the Point before moving to Crosbies, was a key member of Antigua and Barbuda's senior national basketball team, the Wadadli Bulldogs, which dominated the sport in the sub-region during the 1980s and 1990s by winning multiple OECS and LIBA championships.

Harris also served the nation of Antigua and Barbuda as a basketball coach in the now-defunct Community Development Sports and Games Department (CDS&GD) under the guidance of its late Director Fitzroy Brann in the 1980s.

Harris also served as Coordinator of the Schools Basketball Programme within the Ministry of Education, Sports, and Youth Affairs

from the late 1980s until 1997, when his Wadadli Bulldogs teammate and friend Carl "Bowlie" Knight took over the role, which he still currently holds.

Knight, who developed into Antigua and Barbuda's best ever point guard, describes Harris as the finest allround basketball player the twin island nation has ever produced.

"Wayne 'Doc' Harris was the finest all-round player Antigua and Barbuda have ever produced. He could do it all when it comes to a game of basketball. When I played in my rookie year with the Wadadli Bulldogs, 'Doc' was the starting point guard at the time. He also played the shooting guard position, and he was an outstanding low post player as well," Knight stated.

"We played for a number of years on the senior national team at Caricom championships and also won several

OECS and Leeward Islands basketball titles together as members of the Wadadli Bulldogs. I think we last played together in 1987, the year 'Doc' would have retired from playing with the senior national team."

Over the years, Knight and Harris developed a great bond and lasting friendship. Knight said he was one of the nicest people he had ever met.

"We grew up playing a lot of basketball together. Doc was a player for Heads, and I played for Skillville, and we had a big rivalry back in the day. By the time I made my debut on the senior national team in 1981, Doc was already a star on the Wadadli Bulldogs."

However, Knight said he isn't totally surprised by Harris' passing. He said Harris battled with serious health challenges during the latter stages of his life, which led to the amputation of his legs.

Knight expressed his condolences to Harris' family, especially to his wife, Beverly Samuel Harris.

Former national netball and basketball player Candace Jones, who has been one of Harris' closest friends, is also extending condolences to the family of the fallen Antiguan basketball legend.

Jones, who worked for 40 years with Harris at the CDS&GD and the Ministry of Sports, described him as just a fine person.

"Doc and I were like peas in a pod. He is someone who loves life. He was always jovial and extremely kind-hearted, and he just doesn't seem to know how to say no whenever he is asked to help another person," Jones said.

ABCF to stage season-ending circuit race on Sunday

The 2023 Antigua and Barbuda Cycling Federation's (ABCF) season will conclude with the staging of the Annual Jenel Warner Circuit Race on Sunday.

The event will commence at 3 pm at the Pan Am Base Circuit in Coolidge.

The race is sponsored by Warner, who is a former cyclist, with the support of Anjo Wholesale Distributors, Frank B. Armstrong Antigua Limited, Team Viper, Lucozade Energy, and Chef Steve.

President of the ABCF, St. Clair Williams, said the season-ending race is Warner's way of giving something back to cycling, a sport that she loves.

"Warner had approached the cycling federation a few years ago wanting to make a contribution to the development of the sport because she used to compete locally a few years ago. She is no longer an active cyclist, but she wanted to give back and still be a part of the cycling fraternity.

"Hence, she decided to help spon-

sor a race, and so the cycling federation facilitated her, and we now have the Jenel Warner Circuit Race, which we use as the last race of our season.

"Most of the cyclists will come out for this season-ending race to have some fun since we have already completed all of our other domestic and regional races."

Cyclists will compete in the usual seven classes in Sunday's circuit race. As usual, cyclists in the elite male and junior male divisions will have the toughest challenge in the race.

The cyclists in those two categories will be required to complete 15 laps of the Pan Am Base Circuit to win their divisions and become the overall champion.

Cyclists in the masters' class will be required to complete 13 laps, while those competing in the elite female, sports class, and the cadets in the 14 to 17 categories will ride for 10 laps.

The cyclists competing in the Cadets 11-13 division will have to complete six laps of the circuit to win their category.

A new addition in the form of a children's race will be part of Sunday's event. It will start at 1 pm at the same venue.

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Williams said the ABCF is also planning to revert to incorporating more races for children with BMX bikes starting next season.

He said the main objective is to attract young children with BMX bicycles to racing, which could be a catalyst for more youngsters gravitating to the sport of cycling and becoming a part of the national cycling federation.

"What we plan to do in 2024 is try to mobilize children with BMX bicycles to become part of an introductory cycling race programme," Williams said.

"We have quite a lot of children in Antigua with BMX bikes that could start to do a little competitive racing at that level. This will be an opportunity to get them interested in cycling races, and as they grow older, they can make a transition into road race cycling."
