Antigua and Barbuda joins in calling for a 'humanitarian ceasefire' in Gaza

Antigua and Barbuda joined with more than one hundred other members of the United Nations in voting in favour of a 'humanitarian ceasefire' in the Middle East, where Israel has stepped up its aerial and other bombardments of Gaza.

Foreign Minister E.P. Chet Greene noted that Antigua and Barbuda was the first CARICOM nation to condemn the Hamas incursion into Israel killing more than one thousand people on October 7.


Greene said the country has been consistent in its stance against violence of all

kinds. "On Friday, we voted in favour of the resolution put forward by the Jordanian delegation calling for an immediate ceasefire on humanitarian grounds.

The Israeli reported that just over 1400 of its citizens were killed by Hamas fighters who attacked by air and on land. However, as the Israeli Defense Force has stepped up its bombardment of the narrow Gaza Strip, more than eight thousand Palestinians have been killed and many more wounded. There is almost nowhere to escape to, as Israeli bombs have struck in the north, where it asked peo-

ple to evacuate as well as in the south where, he had indicated, was a 'safe zone.'

Greene explained that the Jordanian resolution had first been amended by the Canadians which Antigua and Barbuda did not support. "However, once they came back to the Jordanian resolution, which had all the ingredients; the release of civilians and humanitarian truce, then, Antigua and Barbuda had absolutely no difficulty in supporting. We believe that the carnage in Gaza must stop; we believe that the force being used by Israel is disproportionate and

we cannot continue to see, in a modern civilized world, this type of behaviour and not at the level of the UN where our voice does count to make our

Wettest October in more than a decade

Late-season tropical storms and an upper-level trough over the northern Caribbean have given rise to the wettest October in more than a decade.

The Meteorological Office (Met Office) has reported that over the past 48 hours, between two and

three inches of rain fell in parts of Antigua and Barbuda. The rain gave rise to localized flooding in some parts of Antigua.

The heavy rainfall has been attributed to an upper-level trough that blanked the country for the past several days, leading

to heavy rainfall since Friday afternoon. The rains have persisted on and off since then. During all this, the Met Office issued a flash flood warning which was lifted at 5:00 pm on Sunday.

According to the Met Office, there is a 40 percent

chance of rain today, Monday, but the forecasters are anticipating that conditions will improve, and sunshine shall return to the area, as the clouds associated with the trough depart the area.

The latest round of showers has brought the total rainfall for October up to Sunday to 11.99 inches of rain. The forecasters say this has been the wettest October for more than a decade.

The National Office of Disaster Services (NODS) Sherrod James said there have been reports of localized flooding, but he explained that this has more to do with human action than the actual rain.

position clear and to state it where we stand in this conflict," he stated.
The foreign minister said he recognizes that the conflict has some history and that there have been previous UN resolutions that have addressed the issue of the occupation of Gaza by the Israelis going back to 1948 when it was declared a state.
He added that peace in the region will be elusive unless one question is answered; an independent Palestinian state. "I think to find lasting peace in this situation, there has to be reference to and respect for, the original tenets of the UN position on this matter. In the meantime, what we are seeking is an immediate, durable and sustainable humanitarian truce because the carnage must stop! Diplomacy is at work and I must commend the other 119 nations that voted in favour of this resolution," he declared.
Antigua and Barbuda was among eleven of the fourteen independent CARICOM nations that voted in favour of the resolution.

the project through a grant, has submitted drawings for condominium-styled buildings for the project and it is at a stage where input from the people who will occupy the buildings should offer some feedback on what is being planned.

"One final thing is to consult with residents, finding them and bringing them together because I need to arrange a town hall meeting to go through the entire concept with them," he explained.

He further explained that approval to proceed has been given by the committee overseeing the project. The proposals were submitted to the team one week after the removal of the final property. "The Chinese will be on the ground within a matter of weeks, in terms of finalizing the design, and I am hoping to have at least one public consultation to get input from the residents," he stated.





Shortened week for schools

Thousands of school children across Antigua and Barbuda are having successive days without school as the annual mid-term holiday is one day before Independence Day, a public holiday. Tuesday is the mid-term holiday and Wednesday is Independence Day.

Director of Education, Clare Browne observed, as he indicated, that schools across the nation will open today, Monday, although the past three days have seen much rainfall across the country.

Browne said he has not received any reports of damage to any school building following the rain, but he expects that when schools open today, Monday, the principals will likely submit such reports if there has been any damage to the school


plants.

The director said he is not inclined to close schools simply because the country experienced heavy rainfall this past weekend.

“We have to move away from the notion that whenever there are heavy rains like we had this weekend we will close down the education system.

“When we do that, it has a ripple effect throughout the whole society, because it leaves parents wondering what to do with their children when they are at work,” he observed.

According to the director, the principals at the schools are responsible people who would determine the conditions at the respective schools, if that institution is in any way affected by the rains.

'Friends' star Matthew Perry dies at 54

US actor Matthew Perry, best known for playing wisecracking Chandler Bing in the hit '90s TV sitcom *Friends*, has died at the age of 54.

The actor was found dead at his home in Los Angeles, law enforcement sources told US media.

Friends, which followed the fortunes of six young friends living in New York City, aired from 1994 until 2004.

Its final episode was watched by 52.5 million in the US, making it the most watched TV episode of the 2000s.

The LA Times and TMZ, which first reported that Perry had died, said the actor was found unresponsive in a hot tub at his house.

A Los Angeles Fire Department spokesperson told the BBC that first responders went to an address in the Pacific Palisades area, regarding a "water emergency" of an unknown type, but did not name Perry.

Warner Bros, which produced the long-running show whose global reruns were loved by new generations of viewers, described Perry as a "true gift to us all".

Born in Massachusetts in 1969, Perry was raised in Ottawa, Canada, where he attended elementary



school with Justin Trudeau, who later became Canadian prime minister.

Canada's leader wrote on X: "Matthew Perry's passing is shocking and sad. I'll never forget the schoolyard games we used to play, and I know people around the world are never going to forget the joy he brought them. Thanks for all the laughs, Matthew. You were loved - and you will be missed."

Perry moved to Los Angeles as a teenager. He starred as Chazz Russell in *Boys Will Be Boys* and also had roles in shows including *Growing Pains*.

But he became an international star on *Friends*, a show which followed the lives of six New Yorkers navigating dating, careers and friendship.

The comedy, co-starring Jennifer Aniston, Courtney Cox, David Schwim-

mer, Matt LeBlanc and Lisa Kudrow, became one of the most successful shows of all time.

Perry was cast as the awkward Chandler Bing, famous for his sarcastic one-liners and his childish behaviour with room-mate Joey Tribbiani. The role earned him an Emmy nomination in 2002.

But while at the height of his fame, Perry was battling with addiction to painkillers and alcohol, and attended rehabilitation clinics on multiple occasions.

In 2016, he told BBC Radio 2 that he could not remember three years of filming during *Friends*, because of drink and drugs.

In an interview last year, he spoke about how he did not watch the show.

"I didn't watch the show, and haven't watched the show, because I could go, 'Drinking, opiates,

drinking, cocaine,'" he said. "I could tell season by season, by how I looked. That's why I don't wanna watch it, because that's what I see.

"But I think I'm going to start to watch it because it's been an incredible thing to watch it touch the hearts of different generations."

Perry experienced health problems including a burst colon in 2018 due to his drug usage, which required several operations.

Entertainment reporter Sean Mandell described the overwhelming feeling in Los Angeles as "shock" and a "ubiquitous response" in not believing Perry had died.

He told BBC News Perry played an integral part in the success of *Friends* and was someone who was "at the hub of the wheel".

"His character had the perfect combination of wit, but also true heart and it was grounded," he said.

Perry also appeared in several films, including *Fools Rush In*, *Almost Heroes* and *the Whole Nine Yards* - but never found a screen project which came anywhere near matching the huge success and fame he found in *Friends*.

His later TV work, however, achieved some acclaim.

His role as associate White House counsel Joe Quincy in Aaron Sorkin's *The West Wing* earned him two Emmy nominations for outstanding guest actor in a drama series in 2003 and 2004. He played the lead role in Sorkin's later series, *Studio 60 On The Sunset Strip*, then wrote and produced his own show called *Mr Sunshine* in which he also played the lead character.

His final significant TV project - other than the *Friends* reunion - was a TV reboot of *The Odd Couple*, which lasted on American screens for three seasons.

In 2017, Perry tweeted he found out it was being cancelled when he arrived on set and discovered his face on the stage door had been painted over with green paint.

Maggie Wheeler, who played Chandler's troublesome ex-girlfriend Janice in *Friends*, was the first of Perry's co-stars to publicly pay tribute to the actor.

Wheeler said the joy Perry brought to "so many" in his "too short lifetime will live on".

"I feel so very blessed by every creative moment we shared," she wrote on Instagram.

Morgan Fairchild who played Perry's on-screen mother and erotic novel writer Nora Bing, said: "I'm heartbroken about the untimely death of my 'son', Matthew Perry."

"The loss of such a brilliant young actor is a shock," she added.

Cruel Intentions actress Selma Blair said Perry was her "oldest boy friend", adding: "All of us loved Matthew Perry, and I did especially. Every day. I loved him unconditionally. And he me.

"And I'm broken. Broken hearted. Sweet dreams Matty. Sweet dreams."

Lucy Davis, who starred in *Studio 60 on the Sunset Strip*, said it was an "honour" to work with Perry on the show.

In a post on X, she wrote: "He

was as funny off screen as he was on screen. He was really kind to me: I had one week where I was having difficulty with something at work and he came up to me and told me not to worry because he had my back.

"He was generous with his compliments to me when we acted together," *The Office* star added.

"Thanks for all the laughs Matthew. You made a great impact on me."

Perry's final Instagram post, published a few days ago, shows him relaxing in a rooftop pool. It has since attracted a stream of tributes from fans.

Perry leaves parents John Bennett Perry and Suzanne Perry, who split up when he was a baby. He has five half-siblings.

He never married and had no children.

Perry said he was inspired by his father, who was also an actor and appeared in one episode of *Friends* in 1997 as Mr Burgin, the dad of Rachel's love interest Josh.

Venezuela wants CARICOM to intervene in border dispute

CMC - Venezuela has called on the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) grouping to “promote and facilitate a direct dialogue between the parties” as the National Assembly here has set a date for debate on the ongoing border dispute between Guyana and Venezuela.

Clerk of the National Assembly, Sherlock Isaacs, in a letter sent to all 65 legislators, said the National Assembly would be meeting on November 3, at 10.00 (local time) “to consider a motion on the Guyana/Venezuela border issue.”

Guyana has already denounced the planned December 3, 2023 referendum in Venezuela that asks Venezuelans to formally approve disregarding the jurisdiction of the International Court of Justice (ICJ) in settling the territorial controversy and instead demand that the two countries do so bilaterally.

But Georgetown is also upset at a question in the referendum that seeks Venezuelans’ support for declaring Guyana’s county of Essequibo a state of Venezuela and to grant citizenship and identification cards to everyone living there.

In its statement, Caracas said that the position of CARICOM “must be to promote and facilitate a direct dialogue between the parties, which will return Guy-



ana to the path of respect for Public International Law, by promoting a peaceful and diplomatic route to address the territorial controversy”.

In a statement on Wednesday, CARICOM said the referendum proposed by Venezuela in December has no validity as the border dispute between the two countries took on a new twist this week.

“The Caribbean Community (CARICOM) notes the decision of the Venezuelan National Assembly to conduct a popular referendum on defending Venezuela’s claim of the Essequibo,” the 15-member regional grouping said in a statement.

“CARICOM further notes that two of the questions approved to be posed in the Referendum, if answered in the affirmative, would authorise the gov-

ernment of the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela to embark on the annexation of territory, which constitutes part of the Cooperative Republic of Guyana, and to create a state within Venezuela known as Guyana Essequibo.”

CARICOM said that it wanted to reaffirm that “international law strictly prohibits the government of one State from unilaterally seizing, annexing or incorporating the territory of another state.

“An affirmative vote as aforesaid opens the door to the possible violation of this fundamental tenet of international law,” it added.

Venezuela had on Tuesday said it rejected the “offensive statements” made by the Guyana government regarding the upcoming consultative referendum on the Essequibo which the

South American country continues to claim as part of its territory.

“The Government of the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela categorically rejects the infamous and offensive statements of the Government of the Cooperative Republic of Guyana, regarding the consultative referendum scheduled for December 3, 2023, which are loaded with deep contempt for the people Venezuelan, its Bolivarian history and its right to express itself, in a democratic manner, in matters of special national importance,” Caracas said in the statement.

Earlier Georgetown said it was concerned that Venezuela’s referendum could lay the ground work for the annexation of the county of Essequibo, which Caracas has been claiming belongs


US Immigration agents conduct multiple removal flights to Caribbean

CMC - The United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agency says it has coordinated with the US Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and US Customs and Border Protection (CBP) in facilitating multiple removal flights, including single adults and family units, to Cuba, Haiti and Jamaica.

On Friday, ICE said that nationals from Angola, Central America, Colombia, Ecuador, Peru and Venezuela were also deported as part of dozens of other routine removal flights conducted throughout the hemisphere and around the world.

Since May 2023, ICE DHS has removed or returned more than 300,000 individuals, including more than 45,000 individual family unit members, to their respective countries.

“Individuals who lack



a lawful basis to stay in the United States are ordered removed, consistent with US law,” ICE said. “All individuals who are removed have been screened for protection concerns.

“This policy applies to all noncitizens regardless of nationality to ensure the orderly and humane processing, transfer, and removal of single adults, family units and others determined to be removable,”

it added.

ICE said noncitizens placed into removal proceedings receive their due process from immigration judges in the immigration courts, which are administered by the Justice Department’s Executive Office for Immigration Review.

Due to operational security reasons, ICE said it does not confirm or discuss future or pending transportation operations.

ICE said its Air Operations facilitates the transfer and removal of noncitizens, including family units, via commercial airlines and chartered flights in support of ICE field offices and other DHS initiatives.

In fiscal year 2022, ICE said its Enforcement and Removal Operations conducted 72,177 removals to more than 150 countries worldwide.

to it.

Guyana said it had taken “careful note” of the issuance by the National Electoral Council of Venezuela of five questions to be asked in the national referendum.

It said among other questions, all of which are intended to further Venezuela’s “unlawful and unfounded claim to more than two-thirds of Guyana’s national territory, question five is the most pernicious.

Guyana instituted proceedings

against Venezuela by Application to the ICJ on March 29, 2018, asking the Court to resolve the controversy that has arisen as a result of Venezuela’s contention, formally asserted for the first time in 1962, that the 1899 Arbitral Award Regarding the Boundary between the Colony of British Guiana and the United States of Venezuela is “null and void”.

Georgetown said it remains firmly of the view that the Arbitral Award of 1899 is valid and is committed to a path of final and peaceful settlement

and will continue to adhere to the rule of International Law and the procedures of the ICJ.

But in its latest statement, Caracas reiterated that it had no faith in the ICJ.

“Venezuela’s historical position for several decades has been that the International Court of Justice will never reach an equitable solution, as contemplated in the 1966 Geneva Agreement, which makes it the only valid instrument to achieve a solution,” according to a translated version of Venezuela’s statement.

Lilie James: Murder at elite school horrifies Australia

On Thursday, as Australia woke to the news a body had been found inside the bathroom of an elite Sydney private school, horror rippled around the country.

Police had turned up at St Andrew's Cathedral School just before midnight, after a chilling triple-zero call.

There they encountered a "confronting scene" - 21-year-old water polo coach Lilie James, dead, with extensive head injuries.

Detectives believe she was murdered - allegedly with a hammer - hours earlier, according to local media who have cited anonymous sources.

CCTV had reportedly captured her colleague, 24-year-old hockey coach Paul Thijssen, entering the bathroom after her. Thijssen, who also made the call to authorities, later emerged alone.

Though police have made no public comments about a potential motive, local media have reported Ms James had recently ended a relationship with Thijssen. They had been seeing each other for only five weeks.

Thijssen had vanished after calling in the tip-off from Vaucluse, and police launched a major manhunt focussed on the cliffside suburb.

There they found items "associated with the homicide" - allegedly the murder

weapon - in a bin, and on Friday morning, a body which was later confirmed to be Thijssen.

As friends and family reckoned with the death of Ms James, they remembered her as kind friend and an avid sportswoman.

Along with water polo, she loved dancing and swimming, doing both competitively as a teenager. And she had been studying a sports business degree at university, working at the school on the side.

"She was vibrant, outgoing, and very much loved by her family and friends," Ms James's family said in a statement.

"We are devastated and heartbroken."

Ms James was "stolen from us", family friend Daniel Makovec wrote in a fundraising appeal for the family.

"We will be grieving this loss forever," he said.

In a note to parents, the head of St Andrew's Cathedral School said she was

deeply concerned for all involved.

"The horrors of evil do not, and will not, define our community, that is my oath," Julie McGonigle said.

Mr Thijssen, a Dutch national, was a former sports captain at the school before he became a staff member.

New South Wales Premier Chris Minns too sent his condolences to Ms James's family, describing her death as a "horrible, horrible crime".

"[It is] one of the worst that I've seen in my public life, and I can only imagine what [the] family is going through right now," he said.

The case has reignited conversation about how Australia has long struggled to move the needle on what is often called an "epidemic" of domestic violence in the country.

Ms James is the 41st Australian woman this year to die allegedly as a result of gendered violence, according to the Counting Dead Women

project.

In the past 10 days alone, three women - South Australian Krystal Marshall, an unnamed Canberra woman and Ms James - have all allegedly been killed by men they knew. All were inside their own homes or workplace.

Gendered violence reform campaigner Tarang Chawla - whose sister was murdered by her partner in 2015 - said Ms James's death is a "tragic reminder of the dark, insidious reality of men's violence against women".

"I look at the photos of Lilie and I remember my own 23-year-old sister Niki and how I felt after she was murdered," he wrote on Instagram.

"Lilie, I'm sorry we failed you."

And while the nation grieves, urgent questions are again being asked about how to keep women safe.

Australia has had a National Plan to End Violence against Women and Children since 2010, but the statistics show the rates of violence remain stubbornly high.

A new 10-year plan was introduced last year - this time with actionable targets. It places emphasis on early intervention, improving police and justice responses, creating more emergency housing and increasing the trauma support available to

Hurricane Otis: Mexico troops tackle looting in devastated Acapulco

Some 17,000 soldiers and police have been deployed in the Mexican resort city of Acapulco, where there has been widespread looting since a powerful hurricane hit the region.

Videos show people taking food and water from shops, while others walk away with expensive electronic items and clothes from shopping centres.

Thirty-nine people are now known to have died in Hurricane Otis.

Hundreds of thousands of people remain without power and water. Otis made landfall on the Pacific coast on Wednesday, with winds reaching 165mph (266 km/h). It had intensified from a tropical storm into a category five hurricane - the most severe category - in just 12 hours.

Acapulco was among the areas worst hit in Mexico, with 80% of the resort's hotels damaged and streets flooded.

The death toll rose to 39



Officials believe the damage could be estimated at billions of dollars.

on Saturday - 29 men and 10 women, the government said, while at least 10 are missing.

Videos have been uploaded to social media showing looting in hard-hit neighbourhoods as food and water supplies run increasingly low.

The main road linking Acapulco to the rest of the country has only now been reopened, allowing the delivery of essential goods to the city.

In the Renacimiento neighbourhood, residents

have been left angered by the lack of aid.

"The government hasn't given us any help, not even hope," Apolonio Maldonado told Reuters news agency, lifting his feet from the water to show deep red cuts on his shins.

"They haven't left any food, or even mattresses or cots."

President Andrés Manuel López Obrador has promised to help rebuild the city, but has accused his political

rivals of exaggerating the extent of the looting to discredit his government before next year's presidential election.

"They circle like vultures, they don't care about people's pain, they want to hurt us, for there to have been lots of deaths," he said in a video uploaded to social media.

Officials say Otis was the most powerful storm to ever hit Mexico's Pacific coast, leaving a trail of devastation estimated at billions of dollars.

victim survivors.

But CEO of Full Stop Australia, Karen Bevan, says it is concerning "cultural attitudes towards gender equality and violence against women" that underpin Australia's domestic violence scourge.

According to a recent survey, while more than 90% of Australians recognise violence against women is a problem in the country, just under half say it is a problem in their own suburb or town.

The same study also found around

four in 10 Australians wrongly believe men and women are equally likely to commit domestic violence.

Ms Bevan says that addressing "myths and misconceptions" of how and why violence against women occurs and greater "community understanding" is key.

NSW Minister for Domestic Violence Prevention, Jodie Harrison, has also appealed for the community to better call out "inappropriate behaviour" in the wake of Ms James's death.

"That's really the start of a lack of

safety for women and children," she told Guardian Australia.

"It's up to every single one of us. Government can fund programs but unless individuals take responsibility for themselves, that government funding will be wasted."

But advocates say more funding and measures to track progress are also needed.

"For all the violence elsewhere that we condemn, Australia has a problem that we urgently need to fix," Mr Chawla said.
