NEARLY 9,000 CRUISE PASSENGERS VISIT



Nearly 9000 cruise passengers arrived aboard four vessels on Saturday

cruise passengers visited Antigua and Barbuda aboard four cruise ships on Saturday, including the nearly

Nearly nine thousand eight hundred who started their cruises in St John's as part of home-porting operations.

A very pleased Tour-



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ism Minister Charles Max Fernandez noted that two of the vessels - the Arvia of the P&O Cruise Lines and Emerald Sakara - were the two vessels involved in home-porting.

Arvia docked at the fifth berth and brought near her maximum capacity of 5,200 passengers to the destination. In a well-executed exercise, over 700 passengers ended their itinerary in Antigua, while another 700 boarded the P & O Cruises vessel.

At the Nevis Street Pier, Emerald Sakara did a full turnaround with over 80 passengers starting their journey in Antigua. It was also the first time the 100-passenger capacity supervacht visited the country.

Meanwhile, Artania and Marella Discovery were berthed at Heritage Quay, making it the first time four vessels had been in port, at the same time, for the season.

Fernandez said the ex-

pectation is that this season will see over 700-thousand cruise ship passengers visiting the country; this is nearing the record 773-thousand visitors who arrived in 2019.

"We are projecting that the 2024 season will see over 900-thousand passengers which represents a fifteen percent increase on the record set in 2019," he stated.

Meanwhile, Anti-Port Offi-Cruise gua Cynthia cer-in-Charge Jacobs-Browne said, "Saturday's success indicates our capacity to manage homeporting.

"We had four vessels in port, and operations were smooth, so guests had a pleasant experience at our port."

Arvia began homeporting in Antigua in January and will make a total of nine turnaround calls this season, while Emerald Sakara will make thirteen.

Royal Clipper and SeaDream II will also home-port at the Antigua Cruise Port.

visas that grant holders entry into 27 European countries.

Receiving the donations of 50 special lights, to be used to magnify and highlight documents to tell whether or not they are genuine, Chief Immigration Officer, Katrina Yearwood said the equipment will significantly assist the DOI in keeping ahead of trends where people are traveling with more and more sophisticated documents, that are difficult to detect fraud.

"The way this works is that there are many trends that are spilling over into the Caribbean.

"These include the sophistication in constructing travel documents. Gone are the days when you reach a certain port-of-entry and the DOI officer could look in a passport and say, 'This is not right,' as it had all the tell-tale signs of not being something legal. However, what we are seeing increasingly this year, and in previous years, is the level of sophistication at a level higher than we are accustomed to as a law enforcement agency," Yearwood explained.

Based on the new trends, she further explained that without improved equipment and training, her officers will not be able to intercept these highly sophisticated forgeries that are increasingly being presented at the ports of entry in Antigua and Barbuda and other Caribbean territories.

"The construction of these forgeries is so seamless that they often have the security features, and unless you have the proper equipment and training, you are not going to detect these documents," she added.

Meanwhile. Resident German Counsel in St. John's, Torzten Stenzel, said the fifty magnifying glasses are designed to help detect fraudulent documents such as passports, visas, and especont'd on pg 5

cially Schengen visas, which are becoming more of an issue at the moment. "The officers here need to know if a document is real or not. The bad people get more and more educated, so the copies are getting better and this equipment should make it easier to tell what is wrong and what is genuine," he revealed.

He said the German Embassy in Trinidad and Tobago issues the visas that allow entry into 26 other countries, and they have to make sure that when visas are presented at border control, they are the real visas issued by the embassy.

The actual handover of the equipment was done by Colonel Stephan Kaldasch of the German Federal Police, who conducted a training session for officers of the DOI following the presentation.

Ambassador O'Marde addresses the issue of reparation at conference in Ghana


Chairperson of the Antigua and Barbuda Reparations Commission and one of the vice-chairs of the CARICOM Reparations Commission (CRC), Ambassador Dorbrene O'Marde, was one of the guest speakers at a conference in Accra, Ghana, where the subject of reparation was the central theme.

The November 14-17 conference was organized by the African Union Commission and the Government of the Republic of Ghana and convened under the auspices of the president of Ghana, with the theme 'Building a United Front to Advance the Cause of Justice and the Payment of Reparations to Africans.'

O'Marde spoke on 'Reparations in Action', recounting the decade-long history of the CARICOM Reparations Commission and highlighting its successes, challenges, and opportunities. He recommended organizational structures and approaches that may prove successful to African countries now preparing to engage in the quest for reparations.

Fifteen (15) selected Heads of State and Government from Africa and the Americas were invited. The conference hosted legal experts, policymakers, academics, stakeholders, and specifically reparationists from the Caribbean, North and South America, the UN System, and the African Union (AU).

President of the Republic of Ghana, Nana Addo Dankwa Akufo-Addo, called for a united front with African leaders on demands for reparations for transatlantic slavery and colonial-era *cont'd on pg 7*

He insisted that 'no amount of money can restore the damage caused by the transatlantic slave trade and its consequences and emphasized that reparations is a matter that the world can no longer ignore and must confront.

He asserted that the entire continent of Africa deserves a formal apology from the European nations involved in the slave trade and called on Africa to work together with the Caribbean to advance reparations in a valid demand for justice.

O'Marde has praised the vision of the Government of Ghana and emphasized

that an important goal of the CRC - to forge and participate fully in a global movement for reparations - was fully met at the conference.

The resulting partnership between the fifty-five-member African Union (AU) and CARICOM will further intensify political and diplomatic pressure on Europe, to recognize its moral and legal responsibilities to fully engage with the reparations movement.



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Antigua and Barbuda highlights the dangers of climate change, again

Antigua and Barbuda, as a member of CARICOM, is tackling the climate crisis and strengthening its economic engagements and commercial ties to stimulate inclusive growth and a green economic transition.

That is according to Foreign Minister E.P. Chet Greene, speaking on behalf of Antigua and Barbuda at the 2nd Voices of the Global South Summit in India, last weekend. The foreign minister said the country aims to be climate resilient – this would include support for adaptation, biodiversity, nature-based solutions, and opportunities within the ocean economy.

"Climate Change remains the largest threat to the sustainable development of Antigua and Barbuda, and the rest of the Caribbean Region. CARICOM countries like other Small



Island and Low-Lying Coastal Developing States continue to advocate for elevated and concerted actions, to limit the global increase of temperatures to below 1.5 degrees Celsius, instead of 2 degrees relative to preindustrial levels," he stated.

Greene noted that going into COP 28, mitigation outcomes should be robust and in line with the science to keep 1.5 degrees within reach. In this regard, Antigua and Barbuda, he added, underscores that major economies should be urged to increase near-term or 2030 ambition and develop action plans in line with the science since implementation of such actions remains critical to keep 1.5°C alive.

The minister drew attention to the lack of finance for small developing states to undertake the transition to green energy that is now required. "Another issue of utmost concern for the small and vulnerable economies is the lack of climate finance to adequately match the needs and priorities of developing states. While the Technical Synthesis Report addresses the failure of developed countries, to achieve the delivery of 100 billion of climate finance by 2020, it does not provide any basis for recommendations to developed countries to deliver on the goal and to close the gaps in the shortfall of funding from 2020 to date. Neither does it address the need for developed countries to further scale up finance to achieve the 100 billion goals before 2025," he explained.

A note from the India High Commission in Guyana said the overarching theme of the 2nd Voice of the Global South Summit was 'together, for everyone's growth, with, everyone's trust.' It said the agenda and the deliberations of the foreign ministers' session of the summit focused on the theme 'Global South and One Development.'



Statement by the President of the Permanent Council of the Organization of American States, Sir Ronald Sanders, Ambassador of Antigua and Barbuda, at the conclusion of a Special Meeting of the Permanent Council on Haiti on 17 November 2023

As we conclude the meeting, it is crucial that we reflect deeply on the continuing plight of the Haitian people.

Their suffering, tragically amplified by the dominance of armed gangs, is rooted in a history marred by oppression, exploitation, and a series of dictatorships.

The profound poverty and underdevelopment of Haiti are not just symptoms but also the root causes of the country's enduring challenges. While re-establishing security is an imperative step towards restoring law and order, making the streets safer, and offering a semblance of normality, we must recognize that it is just the beginning.

The resolution of Haiti's problems does not end with the disarmament

of gangs; that is only a gateway to a much-needed, broader economic and social transformation. A vision for Haiti should extend far beyond recovering it from lawless gangs and declaring, "Mission accomplished."

The Haitian people, who have endured so much suffering, for so long, deserve a future that aligns with the basic tenets of a civilized and thriving society. They deserve the dignity of decent housing, and the certainty of access to essential services, like water and electricity - not as privileges, but as fundamental rights. They deserve opportunities for employment that offer both sustenance and a path to a dignified life. Education, the bedrock of progress, must be accessible to all children in Haiti, providing them with the knowledge and skills necessary to climb the ladder of success. Furthermore, it is our collective responsibility to ensure that the shadow of dictatorship and the blight of corruption are lifted from their lives.

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The Haitian people deserve no less than the opportunity to thrive in their own country and in circumstances where their rights are protected, their voices are heard, and their dreams are attainable, and Haitian women deserve a life free of violence and rape.

Let us leave this meeting with an understanding that our work does not end here; but we must get the priorities right, spending our effort and other resources on an agenda that is helpful and meaningful.

We should all make a concerted effort to stand with the Haitian people to make Haiti the country they want for this generation; the next generation and the generations yet unborn.



SVG: Top cop urges men to seek help in battling with issues of life

CMC - Acting Commissioner of Police, Enville Williams, Sunday urged men in the St Vincent and the Grenadines Police Force (RSCGPF) to seek assistance if they are battling "with the issues of life".

In a message to mark International Men's Day (IMD) that is being observed under the theme "Zero Male Suicide," Williams said men tend to choose to suffer in silence rather than to ask for help

He used the occasion to honour "all the men of the RSVGPF for their sacrifice, bravery, and unwavering dedication to duty and country.

"Every day, these loyal men go above and beyond the call of duty to protect and serve the citizens and residents of St Vincent and the Grenadines (SVG) in every kind of weather and under very stressful and dangerous circumstances.

"I want you to know that I appreciate your sterling contribution to nation-building and citizen security as the custodians of law enforcement in SVG. I encourage you to continue to execute your duty with-

But Williams noted that the World Health Organization (WHO) has indicated that suicide remains one of the leading causes of death worldwide with more than twice as many males dying due to suicide as females.

"These staggering statistics reveal that men and boys are more at risk when it comes to committing suicide. But there is hope! Together, we can work to reduce incidents of suicide

International ND THE WORLD **Putin critic Girkin wants to stand** in Russia presidential election

An outspoken pro-war blogger who has fiercely criticised Russia's military strategy in Ukraine has said he wants to challenge Vladimir Putin in next March's presidential elections.

Igor Girkin, 52, led pro-Russian fighters in eastern Ukraine in 2014, following Moscow's annexation of the southern Crimea peninsula.

Girkin is in jail awaiting trial for extremism, which he denies.

He said he wanted to disrupt the "sham" poll with the winner already known.

This comment is widely seen in Russia as a reference to President Putin, who is yet to publicly declare that he will run again.

In a letter to supporters published on Telegram on Sunday, Girkin, whose nom de guerre is Strelkov, said: "I understand perfectly well that in the current situation in Russia, participating in the presidential campaign is like sitting down at a table to play with card sharps."

But he said he hoped his attempt to unite patriotic forces would disrupt the Kremlin's plans for the polls in which "the only winner is known in advance".

"This is our chance to unite in the face of external and internal threats," he said.

He told his supporters

Igor Girkin is currently in jail awaiting trial for extremism. to set up a headquarters for his campaign, and to start collecting signatures for his candidacy, even though he knew he would not be allowed to stand.

Supporters of Girkin told Reuters that his criminal investigation had been extended until 18 December, and that he could theoretically take part in the polls as he has not been convicted yet.

Girkin is a former FSB intelligence colonel. He was one of three men convicted in absentia by a Dutch court last November of murder for his role in the 2014 shooting down of a Malaysia Airlines passenger jet with the loss of all 298 people on board.

After Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, he gained prominence by mocking Russian tactics and repeatedly warned that Russia faced revolution and even civil war unless President Putin's military top brass fight the war in Ukraine more effectively.

He was arrested in July. If convicted of extremism he could face up to five years in jail.

Russian authorities have cracked down on nationalist critics who have called for a much tougher approach to fighting the war in Ukraine, after the failed mutiny by Wagner chief Yevgeny Prigozhin in June.

Prigozhin was killed in August in a plane crash, the causes of which are still unclear.

President Putin's spokesman Dmitry Peskov said in an interview published on Friday that he hoped his boss would stand for another term.

He first served as president from 2000 to 2008, returning to the role from a stint as prime minister in 2012. Recent amendments to the Russian constitution allow him to stay in power until at least 2036 if he is elected again.

Yemen's Houthi rebels hijack cargo ship in Red Sea

Yemen's Iranian-backed Houthi rebels say they have seized an Israeli cargo ship in the Red Sea.

They said the vessel was then taken to a port in Yemen.

Israel said the ship was not Israeli, and no Israelis were among its crew. Israeli PM Benjamin Netanyahu said this was "another act of Iranian terrorism".

Iran has not commented. Houthis had threatened to hijack Israeli ship within their reach over Israel's war with Hamas in the Gaza Strip.

Israel says 1,200 people were killed and more than 240 taken hostage during the surprise Hamas attack on the south of the country on 7 October.

Israel has launched a massive military operation - involving air and artillery strikes as well as ground troops - with the aim of eliminating Hamas.

The Hamas-run health ministry

says the death toll in Gaza since then has reached 12,300. More than 2,000 more are feared to be buried under rubble.

The Houthis have fired several missiles and drones towards Israel just after Israel launched its retaliatory operation.

The US said at the time that all the missiles and drones were intercepted by its warship in the Red Sea.

The Israel Defense Forces (IDF) described the attack on the ship - which it did not name - as a "very grave incident of global consequence".

The IDF said the vessel was on its way from Turkey to India when it was seized in the southern Red Sea near Yemen.

Although Israel says the seized vessel does not have any connection with it, unconfirmed reports suggest the ship may have an Israeli owner.

In Sunday's statement on social media, Mr Netanyahu said that Israel "strongly condemns the Iranian attack against an international vessel".

He said the ship was owned by "a British company and is operated by a Japanese firm", adding that "25 crew members of various nationalities including Ukrainian, Bulgarian, Filipino and Mexican" were on board the ship.

Iranian Foreign Minister Hossein Amir-Abdollahian has recently said that what he called resistance groups allied to Tehran were "cleverly adjusting pressure" on Israel and its supporters.

Earlier this month, the Houthis shot down a US military drone off Yemen's coast, American officials said.

The Houthis have been locked in a prolonged civil war with Yemen's official government - backed by Saudi Arabia - since 2014. PAGE 20

Treasury and Sandals won their latest matches in the ABAVA Business League competition.



Australia beat India to win sixth cricket World Cup title

AHMEDABAD, India (Reuters) -Australia won a record-extending sixth 50-overs World Cup title after opener Travis Head smashed a magnificent century to fashion their six-wicket victory in Sunday's final against the tournament's form team India.

Put into bat, India rode battling half-centuries by KL Rahul and Virat Kohli to post a below-par 240 all out in exactly 50 overs at a packed Narendra Modi Stadium.

Australia suffered a top order wobble of their own, but Head's 137 off 120 balls saw them romp home with seven overs to spare in match that never reached great heights.

Around 93,000 predominantly Indian fans sat mostly in deathly silence as the home team, who had won 10 matches in a row to make the final, succumbed to their first loss of the tournament in the all-important summit clash.

Earlier, Pat Cummins's decision to field, primarily to avoid operating with a dewy ball in the night, bemused many but Australian bowlers, aided by some superb fielding, stifled their opposition.

India captain Rohit Sharma had been playing tone-setting knocks in their batting template in the tournament and it was no different in the final despite the early loss of Shubman Gill.

Rohit smashed three sixes in his entertaining 47, but fell just before the end of powerplay.

The opener stepped out against Glenn Maxwell, but miscued his shot on the offside. Head ran backwards from cover to take a tumbling catch to get rid of the Indian captain.

Kohli (54) hit Mitchell Starc, who claimed three for 55, for three boundaries in a row, but India slumped to 81 for three in the 11th over when Cummins dismissed Shreyas Iyer caught behind.

Kohli and Rahul (66) then combined in a dour rebuilding job even if it meant going 16.1 overs without a boundary.

Kohli brought up his ninth 50-plus knock in 11 innings but soon departed after chopping a Cummins delivery on to his stumps.

Rahul hit just one four in his half-century illustrating how difficult the pitch was for shot-makers like him.

Australia wicketkeeper Josh Inglis took five catches, which is a record in a World Cup final. Australia, when they came out to bat, slumped to 47-3 seven overs into what had looked like a straight-forward chase for them.

Head combined with Marnus Labuschagne, who made 58 not out, in a 192-run stand to kill off the contest.
