
Sir Steadroy, was one of two persons presented with Knighthood, one of the country's highest awards during the ceremony.

The other was hotelier, Sir Robert "Rob" Barrett, who received the Knight Commander Award (KCN). Sir Steadroy's KGCN is the second-highest National Award, to be conferred

upon deserving citizens. Only National Hero ranks higher.

In an exclusive interview with Point Express newspaper, Sir Steadroy said in working on behalf of the people with their interests uppermost in your actions, good things will follow.

"I have served the people of the constituency for over forty years, and it



shows that once you love people and people love you and you have their interests at heart, they will give you the rewards that you deserve," he stated.

Sir Steadroy is also committing himself to continuing to serve the people of St. John's City South and by extension, the nation of Antigua and Barbuda.

"I will continue to serve them to the best of my abilities; I will continue to work in my community to develop the Ovals area, the rest of the constituency and all of Antigua and Barbuda generally, and in particular the institutions in the country," he asserted.

As Attorney General over the past nine years, Sir Steadroy has been responsible for the updating of many of the laws on the books of Antigua and Barbuda. Additionally, he has been able to usher in a series of social legislations that have benefited society.

Among his achievements has been the setting up of the Family Court system which has been fully endorsed by the Chief Justice of the Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court, Dame Janice Pereira, which has used Antigua and Barbuda as a model for the introduction of the Family Court system through the OECS.

Sir Steadroy says there will be no letting up, as he plans to continue the work on behalf of the people.


The annual presentation of National Awards took place on Wednesday, (Independence Day) during the Ceremonial Parade held at the Sir Vivian Richards Stadium.



Organizers say despite the challenges brought on by the persistent rains during most of the week leading up to the actual Independence Day, they are satisfied that the events were well attended.





Speaking about the exhibit, the Antigua and Barbuda Tourism Authority's Marketing Communications Manager, Maria Blackman said, 'The Antigua and Barbuda Goes to Space' exhibit ensures that the tangible assets from the historic August 10th visit to space, form a permanent part of the history of Antigua and Barbuda. That day was such an incredibly powerful moment for those of us watching in Antigua, Barbuda, as well as around

the world. We hope future generations who view the exhibit housed at the Museum of Antigua and Barbuda, will be inspired by our astronauts and will use this moment as their personal catalyst towards achieving their dreams."

The exhibit was aptly unveiled on the eve of Antigua and Barbuda's 42nd Anniversary of Independence held under the theme 'Embracing the Legacy, Shaping the Future'.

The 'Antigua and Barbuda Goes to Space' exhibit is now open to the



public.

Business **Disney to buy remaining 33%** stake in streaming service Hulu

Disney has announced that it will buy the remaining stake in streaming service Hulu, in a widely expected move.

The company said on Wednesday it would acquire the 33% stake it does not own from TV giant Comcast.

This would give Disney full ownership of the streaming service and the ability to incorporate it into its own Disney+ platform.

Disney has been locked in battle with other streamers as profits have fallen.

Completing its takeover of Hulu is expected to cost some \$8.6bn (£7bn). Disney said in a statement.

But it added that the move would "further Disney's streaming objectives" as it sought to boost subscriber numbers.

In the US, the entertainment giant already sells Hulu as part of bundled offerings with its Disney+ and ESPN+ platforms.

In the UK, some Hulu content is already available to watch via the Disney+ app, such as The Kardashians and The Bear.

The price tag reflects a "guaranteed floor value" for the streaming service that was established when California-based Disney took over Rupert Murdoch's 21st Century Fox in a huge deal in 2019, along with a majority stake in Hulu.

Under an agreement be-



tween Disney and Comcast that year, both firms had the right to force a sale of Comcast's stake in Hulu - and executives have been vocal about wanting to do a deal.

But at a conference this vear. Comcast chief executive Brian Roberts described Hulu as a "scarce kingmaker asset", which was "way more valuable today" due to its hits like the series Only Murders in the Building.

Disney said on Wednesday that it hoped the deal would be concluded by 1 December although negotiations with Comcast, NBC Universal's parent company, are ongoing.

In the announcement, Disney said that if the current value of Hulu was determined to be greater than

the guaranteed price, it would pay NBC Universal the difference.

Hulu currently has about 48.3 million subscribers, in comparison with Disney's 146.1 million globally.

The boss of Disney, Bob Iger, told investors in August that the company was moving towards having one app in the US where it could combine content from its various brands.

Since economies have reopened from pandemic-related lockdowns, competition for audience attention has been fierce.

Disney reported in August that profits continued to fall as it faced a raft of issues including lacklustre film performance and a sharp drop in advertising sales in its traditional tele-

vision business.

Overall, revenue at the company grew by 4% year on year in the three months ending 1 July, but it posted a loss of \$460m, compared with a \$1.4bn profit in the same period last year.

Alongside Disney, other streamers have been weighing up how to generate cash and crack down on password-sharing.

The film and television sector has also seen some productions paused by strikes in the US, slowing down the turnaround of the new content needed to hook audiences.

A senior Disney creative behind films like Frozen recently told the BBC that the actors' strike could halt animation production later this year.

Technology PGE 13 Rishi Sunak: AI firms cannot 'mark their own homework'

Monitoring the risks posed by artificial intelligence (AI) is too important to be left to big tech firms, Prime Minister Rishi Sunak has said.

He told the BBC that governments needed to take action and AI firms could not be left to "mark their own homework".

He was speaking ahead of the AI Safety Summit, where a global declaration on managing AI risks has been announced.

King Charles told delegates the issue required "urgency, unity and collective strength".

It comes amid growing concerns about highly advanced forms of AI with asyet unknown capabilities.

So far countries are only starting to address the potential risks, which may include breaches to privacy, cyberattacks and the displacement of jobs.

In an interview with the BBC at Downing Street, Mr Sunak AI was a "transformative technology" that could have huge benefits in the NHS or in schools.

But he said he wanted the UK and other countries to be able "do the testing that is necessary to make sure that we are keeping our citizens and everyone at home safe".

"There has to be governments or external people who do that work," he said.

Speaking to the BBC's technology editor Zoe Kleinman, he said that many AI firms had already given the UK access to their models before their release.

And he claimed the UK was "investing more" AI risk management than any other country.

"We've already invested £100 million in our task force, which will become our Safety Institute," he said.

"And we're attracting the best and the brightest researchers from around the world to come and work in that institution."

Around 100 world leaders, tech bosses and academics are currently gathering at the UK's first AI safety summit at Bletchley Park, in Buckinghamshire.

Earlier on Wednesday, the delegates agreed the world's first ever "international statement" on so called frontier AI - the government's term for AI that could exceed the capabilities of today's most advanced systems.

The Bletchley Declaration calls for global cooperation on tackling the risks, which include potential breaches to privacy and the displacement of jobs.

Signed by 28 countries and the EU, it also says AI should be kept "safe, in such a way as to be human-centric, trustworthy and respon-

sible".

Dr Caitlin Bentley, AI education lecturer at King's College London, said the declaration was an "important milestone" in promoting the "responsible AI development".

However, she said more investment in AI education was needed to ensure "AI is not only responsible, but equitable in its effects" with the benefits felt by all.

In his BBC interview, the prime minister defended a planned discussion with controversial tech billionaire Elon Musk on Thursday night, saying he could bring "something valuable to the conversation".

"Elon Musk for a long time has both been an investor and developer of AI technologies himself," said Mr Sunak.

"For over a decade, he's been also talking about the potential risks that they pose and the need for countries and companies to work together to manage and mitigate against those risks."

Mr Musk arrived at the summit on Wednesday morning, having warned the day before that AI could lead to the extinction of humanity.

"We've got representatives from all the major AI companies here at the summit," said Mr Sunak.

"And that's crucial, because countries will need to work together with the companies that are developing the technology."

Those appearing at the summit are discussing how best to maximise the benefits of AI - such as discovering new medicines and tackling climate change - while minimising the risks.

The summit's priorities include the threat of bio-terrorism and cyber attacks.

Speaking ahead of the event in London, US Vice President Kamala Harris said that world leaders "must address the full spectrum of AI risks to humanity" and listed examples of faulty algorithms in healthcare, the use of AI in making "deepfakes", misinformation and biased facial recognition.

China has also backed international cooperation on AI, with the country's Vice Minister for Science and Technology, Wu Zhaohui, calling for "global collaboration to share knowledge and make AI technologies available to the public".

Montserrat selects new top cop

Montserrat has selected veteran police officer Robin Hall to be the new Commissioner of Police.

In a statement on Tuesday, the Governor's Office said that Hall was selected after an international recruitment process.

Hall has been a police officer for thirty years serving in a number of UK forces, the last 18 of which with Cambridgeshire Constabulary where he is the Head of the Major Crime Unit.

Hall has also worked alongside a number of other

international police services including Turks and Caicos, Mauritius and Malta.

He will take up his position on 11th December 2023.

The current Commissioner of Police, Dr Nick Caveney will depart Montserrat later this month, as he returns to policing in the UK.

In the interim period between Caveney's departure and Hall's arrival, Deputy Commissioner, Charles Thompson will be acting Commissioner of Police.

PM Drew says Nevis will rebound after Four Seasons Fire

Prime Minister Dr Terrance Drew is expected to travel to Nevis to get a first-hand view of the damage that the Four Seasons Resort suffered during last evening's fire and to stand in solidarity with islanders.

Drew said he has spoken with Nevis Premier Mark Brantley and Billy Cueto, the General Manager of Four Seasons to express his sympathies.

The prime minister said during this time of heartbreak for Nevis, it was important for the country to be united.

"As we move forward from this tragedy, we must stand united as a community to rebuild what has been lost. The spirit of Nevis is resilient, and I have no doubt that, with time and effort, we will witness the Four Seasons Resort restore the affected areas, becoming stronger and more beautiful than ever before," he said.

"In the face of adversity, our Kittitian-Nevisian spirit shines through. Let us come together as a united com-

He said the government plans to assist persons affected by the fire, which began late on Tuesday night. The resort said its pro shop and gym were damaged.

Drew added that he is confident the luxurious resort will be restored to all its glory.

Bolivia has become the first Latin American country to cut diplomatic ties with Israel over what it describes as "aggressive and disproportionate" military actions in Gaza.

The country called for a ceasefire and said it would be supplying the blockaded Gaza Strip with aid.

An Israeli official said the move was "a surrender to terrorism".

Lior Haiat accused the Bolivian government of "aligning itself with the Hamas terrorist organization".

Bolivia's Deputy Foreign Minister Freddy Mamani said that the government had taken the decision to cut ties "in repudiation and condemnation of the aggressive and disproportionate Israeli military offensive taking place in the Gaza Strip".

He added that the country wanted an end to Israel's blockade that was preventing "the entry of food, water and other essential elements for life".

Gaza has been under an Israeli siege for weeks, with essential aid only reaching people through Egypt's Rafah crossing sporadically.

"Israel condemns Bolivia's support of terrorism and its submission to the Iranian regime, which attest to the values the government of Bolivia represents," Mr Haiat said in response.

Iran has been accused of providing support for Hamas to carry out the 7 October attacks. While Iran's leaders have celebrated and praised the violence, they have denied involvement.

Bolivia is not the only Latin American country to have begun taking diplomatic steps against Israel.

Chile's President Gabriel Boric said on Tuesday he was recalling the country's ambassador in Tel Aviv for consultations "given the unacceptable

violations of International Humanitarian Law that Israel has incurred in the Gaza Strip."

"Chile strongly condemns and observes with great concern that these military operations - which at this point in their development entail collective punishment of the Palestinian civilian population in Gaza," he wrote on X, formerly Twitter.

Colombian President Gustavo Petro made a similar announcement on social media.

"I have decided to call our ambassador in Israel for consultation," Mr Petro said, adding that "if Israel does not stop the massacre of the Palestinian people we cannot be there."

Brazil's President Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva urged a ceasefire. Following reports of a new Israeli air strike in Gaza, Lula said on X: "We are seeing, for the first time, a war in which the majority of those killed are children... Stop! For the love of God, stop!"

The majority of the 8,500 war

deaths reported by the Hamas-run health ministry in Gaza are of adults but they include 3,500 children.

Israel has been bombing Gaza since the Hamas attack of 7 October that killed 1,400 people and saw at least 239 people taken hostage.

The US said on Tuesday that 66 trucks had been able to deliver aid inside Gaza, but charities warn that it will not be enough.

United Nations Relief and Works Agency (Unrwa) commissioner-general, Philippe Lazzarini said that prior to the war, about 500 trucks would enter Gaza each day.

Bolivia only restored diplomatic relations with Israel in 2019. It had previously cut ties with the country in 2009 under President Evo Morales, again to protest against Israel's actions in Gaza.

On Monday, Bolivia's President Luis Arce described Israel's actions in Gaza as "war crimes" on X after meeting with the Palestinian ambassador to Bolivia, Mahmoud Elalwani.

Egypt opens Gaza border crossing to evacuate injured and foreigners

Ambulances have taken 76 seriously injured Palestinians from Gaza into Egypt for the first time since the war between Hamas and Israel began.

A group of 335 foreign passport holders - including British nationals - were also allowed to leave via the Rafah crossing on Wednesday, officials said.

Gaza's borders have been closed since Hamas's attack on Israel on 7 October.

Rafah is expected to continue opening for limited time periods to let foreign nationals and injured civilians leave.

The lists of those allowed to cross will be agreed between Egypt and Israel, with embassies from the relevant countries being informed in advance to ensure they can prepare to receive their citizens, Western officials say.

The BBC understands there are about 7,000 dual nationals in Gaza.

Speaking on Wednesday evening, US President Joe Biden said that thanks to "concerted American leadership, safe passage for wounded Palestinians and foreign nationals has started".

American citizens were able to exit, he said, as part of the first group of "probably more than 1,000", adding that the process would

"We're working nonstop to get Americans out of Gaza as soon and as safely as possible," Mr Biden stressed.

UK Foreign Secretary James Cleverly earlier said the departure of the first of the estimated 200 Britons in the territory was "a hugely important first step".

"We are working with Egyptian and Israeli authorities to ensure the crossing stays open so all British nationals can get to safety in the coming days," he wrote on X, formerly known as Twitter.

Israel has been bombarding Gaza for more three weeks and has recently sent in ground forces in response to an unprecedented cross-border assault by Hamas gunmen in which 1,400 people were killed and 240 taken hostage.

Gaza's health ministry says more than 8,700 people have been killed in the territory since then, while the UN says supplies of food, water, fuel and medicine are dangerously low because of a siege imposed by Israel.

Ambulances were seen rushing to Rafah on Wednesday morning. At least two children were among the wounded - one with a bandaged stomach. After medical checks, they were carried away on stretchers.

At least 76 had arrived in Egypt by the evening, according to a spokesperson for the Palestinian border authority and an Egyptian official.

"Hospitals in the Gaza Strip are treating large numbers of injured people while suffering from a lack of medical supplies. Therefore [they] cannot operate on such cases," Nassem Hasan, a medic working with Gaza's health ministry, told Reuters news agency.

"Now they are being transported to the Egyptian side, and will then be evaluated and might be relocated to another hospital."

Most of the patients will

be taken to a field hospital built by Egyptian authorities in Sheikh Zuweid, 15km (9 miles) from Rafah. Others will go to permanent hospitals in the nearby town of El-Arish or the city of Ismailia.

The director general of the World Health Organization, Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, welcomed Egypt's decision to accept medical evacuations.

But he warned: "Attention must not be diverted from the far greater needs of thousands of patients in Gaza, many of them extremely fragile who cannot be moved.

"We need an immediate acceleration in the flow of medical aid permitted into Gaza. Hospitals must be protected from bombardment and military use."

The WHO says more than a third of Gaza's hospitals are not functioning, while the rest are only partly working and are overwhelmed by casualties.

Gaza's health ministry says more than 20,000 people have been injured.

The Palestinian border authority said 335 foreign and dual nationals had crossed by Wednesday evening.

As well as the unspecified number of Britons, they included five French nationals, four Italians and a number of Americans.

PUNE, India (Reuters) - Quinton de Kock smashed his fourth century of the World Cup and Rassie van der Dussen also hit a ton as semi-finals-bound South Africa sealed a comprehensive 190-run victory over New Zealand on Wednesday for their sixth win in seven matches.

New Zealand were left needing a rescue act after collapsing to 90 for five inside 19 overs while chasing 358, with only Will Young (33) and Daryl Mitchell (24) offering any resistance, but South Africa did not relent and dismissed them for 167 in 35.3 overs.

Pace bowler Marco Jansen, who took three for 31, began the rout with an early

ther investment in the potential of CCG. No doubt, his wealth of experience and institutional knowledge offer tremendous value to completing this next phase of the CCG project."




