No change in fuel prices

The West Indies Oil Company (WIOC) has reported a one (1) per cent decline in the cost of gasoline and a nine (9) per cent increase in the cost of diesel. Based on the refined pass-through mechanism for fuel prices, which takes into account revenue assurance, price stability, and maintenance of subsidies for certain petroleum products, the Government has decided to maintain the retail prices at the pump.

Effective Wednesday 28, February 2024, fuel prices will be as follows:

Gasoline: \$13.99 per gallon Diesel: \$14.25 per gallon 20 Pound LPG: \$32.00 per Bottle

25 Pound LPG: \$40.00 per Bottle

100 Pound LPG: \$155.00 per Cylinder

The average regional prices for gasoline and diesel are currently \$15.36 and \$15.88 respectively while the regional average for the 20 pound and 100-pound cylinder of LPG is \$38.58 and \$200.36 respectively.

To support affordability for consumers, the Government continues to provide the following subsidies:

20 Pound LPG: Subsidy of \$5.16 per bottle

25 Pound LPG: Subsidy of \$6.45 per bottle

100 Pound LPG: Subsidy of \$17.64 per cylinder

Margins for WIOC, inland transport, and gas station dealers remain unchanged.

Air Peace to send three aircraft to Antigua 'within weeks'

Prime Minister Gaston Browne, who is leading the Antigua and Barbuda delegation to the 46th meeting of CARICOM Heads of Government, has provided an update to his colleagues on the progress being made towards setting up LIAT 2020.

PM Browne reported that the government is partnering with Air Peace out of Nigeria to spend an estimated US\$80 million to establish the new regional air service. As part of that undertaking, he further reported, Air Peace will fly three aircraft to Antigua shortly to join with the other three that are being sourced from the Caribbean Development Bank, and which were leased by LIAT (1974) Ltd.

Air Peace is also assisting the government with acquiring the LIAT (1974) headquarters building along with the aircraft it will supply initially.

According to Browne the first three Air Peace supplied aircraft are Embraer E-145's 50-seater aircraft and will arrive by mid-March. He said

Air Peace has given a commitment that it will expand the fleet as the demand suggests, including a jet aircraft sometime in the future.

"There will be a fourth aircraft – the Embraer E-195 – which can carry up to 125 persons. They have given an understanding that they will make additional assets available to meet the demands. As it stands now, we are likely to run LIAT 2020 with six aircraft; three from LIAT (1974) Ltd, through the CDB and the other three from Air

Peace. We are making progress as we are meeting the CDB on Wednesday to finalise the arrangements for the three planes formerly owned by LIAT (1974) Ltd.," he disclosed.

According to PM Browne the search for a suitable individual to head the airline is progressing with interviews now being conducted.

The focus, he informed his colleagues, is to acquire the Air Operations Certificate for LIAT 2020, but that this is contingent upon the airline first acquiring an aircraft.

PM Browne urges Haiti's interim leader to step aside

Antigua and Barbuda Prime Minister Gaston Browne, Monday said that Haiti's interim leader, Dr. Ariel Henry, needs to "step aside" and allow for efforts to continue unimpeded in finding a solution to the socio-economic and political situation in Haiti.

PM Browne is among Caribbean Community (CARICOM) leaders attending the 46th regular summit of regional leaders in Guyana where the Haitian issue has so far dominated the four-day gather-

In a telephone interview with the Caribbean Media Corporation, (CMC) Prime Minister Browne said he believes Henry's presence in the government is "part of the problem" as various stakeholders look to find a lasting solution to Haiti's problem that has been increased with the assassination of President Jovenel Moise in July 2021 and the emergence of criminal gangs terrorising citizens.

"With no disrespect, my dear friend Henry is part of the problem and I think there are many in Haiti who believe that the interventions that are planned by the stakeholder groups (are) intended to prop up Henry.

"Now, even though that is not so, we have to deal with that perception and we


are of the view that Henry has to transition and to become an honest broker and to have a power sharing agreement with the others in Haiti so it doesn't appear as though we are trying to stabilise Haiti for his benefit for him to continue....

"At the end of the day he barely has any legitimacy and we have to be careful that perception is not seen as the reality of the Haitian people which could only serve to inflame the situation," Browne told CMC.

CARICOM Earlier. chairman and host President, Dr. Irfaan Ali told the opening of the plenary session that discussions on Haiti by the regional leaders started over two days ago.

"CARICOM heads met on Saturday and commenced discussions on the challenges we have with Haiti. Monday morning with the Friends of Haiti, an expanded grouping that included all the stakeholders and partners working with Haiti," Ali said.

"We are hopeful that sometime after we will be able to point the Haitian people, the region and the global community in the direction through which we believe long lasting sustainable solutions can be achieved.

quires all stakeholders in Haiti, especially, to give a bit, to compromise a bit and to express a collective willingness to achieve the outcomes that we are setting ourselves to achieve," Ali told the meeting which is also being attended by Haiti's Prime Minister Dr. Ariel Henry.

Prime Minister Browne told CMC that he is of the view that even before any intervention in Haiti to stabilise the French-speaking CARICOM country "the political situation with Henry has to be addressed and he has to be magnanimous as possible.

Last month, the Kenya "Of course, this re- High Court ruled against

sending troops to Haiti as part of the Multinational Security Mission (MSS) to restore peace and security in Haiti.

Last October, the UN Security Council authorized the deployment of the MSS to back Haiti's beleaguered police force, which Kenya offered to lead. A 2022 sanctions regime, targeting gang leaders and their financiers, was also renewed.

Earlier this month, President of the Dominican Republic, Luis Abinader, urged the international community to do more to help deal with the security, political and economic situation in Haiti.

Chamber calls for more consultations between public and private sectors

The Antigua and Bar- noted. buda Chamber of Commerce says it wants to have more consultation and interactions between the public and private sectors as these will redound to their mutual benefit.

This comes following the recent conclusion of a public consultation held as part of the Chamber's biennial General Meeting on the Economy.

"As part of its Knowledge Sharing and Best Practices Pillar, following the BGM, the Chamber held a public discussion on the effects of the recently increased ABST on the business community," Chamber press statement

According to the release the panelists from the Public Sector were; the Commissioner of Inland Revenue, Ralph Warner, Director of Prices and Consumer Affairs, Orrin Steele, Senior Statistician Statistics Division, Jerry Aska, Debt Manager, Ministry of Finance, Peter Abraham Jr.

The Private Sector was represented by the Director of Tax Services, Grant Thornton, Neil Coates.

The discussion was moderated by the treasurer of the Chamber, Bertram Alexander.

The two-hour session was extremely informa-

tive, as the audience was very pleased as they were served by the breadth and depth of knowledge of the panelists, from both private and public sectors.

During the question-and-answer session, the audience was thoroughly engaged as they expressed concerns and even disappointments with the process of government's recent increases of the ABST and the amendments of the reporting periods.

Generally, there were concerns about the way the information about the changes is coming to the public: not giving sufficient response time, and the cost of adjusting to accommodate those changes.


Specifically, concern was also aired about the lack of meaningful engagement with taxpayers before increasing our tax burden. The public sector panelists promised to take the concerns and feedback on board and to seek to have more meaningful engagements.

From the perspective of the business community, the members of the Chamber recognize the fiscal responsibility it bears to pay for the services provided by the public sector, but agreed that there must be better consultation.

The Chamber also wishes to acknowledge the cordial relationship it has with the Inland Revenue Department, as well as other government departments, divisions, and ministries.

The Chamber sincerely desires that there will continue to be the type of access which will redound to richer level of consultations, which should enhance the ease of doing business, and so reduce the cost of doing business as well.

The new board looks forward to the term of office ahead as the Chamber seeks to serve the country in a bigger and better way through more engagement by and advocacy of the private sector.

Food security focus of one-day workshop

How can livestock farmers in Antigua and Barbuda protect their animals from the effects of climate change and thereby helping to strengthen the country's food security?

That was a central theme running through a one-day workshop for live-stock farmers organized by the Ministry of Agriculture's Veterinary and Livestock division and the University of the West Indies Climate Change and Health Leaders Fellowship Program. It was held Monday at the Antigua and Barbuda Hospitality Institute.

In her opening remarks, Veterinary Officer, Dr Nneka Hull James noted that the livestock sector in Antigua and Barbuda remains highly vulnerable to impacts from climate change.





"These impacts have been well documented: extreme weather conditions; heat waves; more frequent strong and devastating hurricanes; recurring and extended periods of drought followed by excessive rainfall; increased levels of air pollution and sea level rise.," she stated.

Additionally, she said these conditions negatively affect lifestyles, food security, water security among other impact.

In delivering the featured remarks, Chief Veterinary Dr. Tubah Edwards noted that the workshop aimed at teaching livestock farmers how to 'climate smart' their business. "The Veterinary and Livestock Division will aim to teach farmers and others several cli-



mate smart options that are available for land-based systems which would help build resilience along supply chains, improving energy use efficiency and animal breeding, grazing management, improved feed conversion and improved waste management," he outlined.

During the workshop, presentations were made by panelists; Dr. Hull James, Dr Chere Kellman, Climatologist, Orville Paige, NODS Director, Sherrod James, Director of Agriculture, Gregory Bailey and Agricultural specialist, Craig Thomas.

Attendees included livestock farmers as well as staff of the Veterinary and Livestock Division of the Ministry of Agriculture.

US challenges Kroger Albertsons deal warning of higher prices

The US is taking legal action to block the merger of two major grocery chains, warning it would lead to higher prices.

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) and a number of US states, said Kroger's planned \$24.6bn purchase of rival Albertsons would eliminate important competition "exacerbating the financial strain consumers across the country face today".

The two firms vowed to defend the deal.

The court battle comes as rising prices remain a key political issue.

US food prices have risen by 25% over the last four years and US President Joe Biden has been under pressure to show that his administration is taking action to address the problem.

Kroger, operator of brands such as Harris Teeter and Fred Meyer, is one of the biggest grocers in the US by sales.

It announced plans to purchase Albertsons Companies in October 2022, saying it would put it in a better position to compete with the likes of Walmart and Amazon.

The tie-up would create a firm with about 5,000 stores across 48 states, employing about 700,000 people and serving an estimated 85 million households.



However, critics of the deal urged regulators to block it, saying Americans have suffered as the grocery industry has become increasingly dominated by a smaller number of big players.

In its announcement on Monday, the FTC said the deal would result in store closures, job losses and fewer choices for buyers, as well as higher prices. It has filed a lawsuit to stop the deal.

Stacy Mitchell, co-executive director of the anti-monopoly watchdog, the Institute for Local Self-Reliance, cheered the move to block the merger.

"This decision shows that the FTC understands how the outsized power of big retailers is damaging the entire food system," she said. "There was no upside to this merger for anybody other than the top executives at these two companies and their investors."

Kroger had proposed selling more than 400 stores to address monopoly concerns -a collection of sitesthe FTC criticised as a "hodgepodge" that did not adequately address concerns.

The two firms have denied there were any plans for store closures or job cuts and said they planned to invest in lower prices.

After the FTC's announcement, Kroger said blocking the merger would lead to higher prices and fewer stores, while strengthening rivals who, unlike Kroger and Albertsons, do not employ staff who belong to a labour union.

"Contrary to the FTC's statements, blocking Kroger's merger with Albertsons Companies will actually harm the very people the FTC purports to serve: America's consumers and workers," Kroger said in a statement.

"The merging parties look forward to litigating this action in court."

The FTC during Mr Biden's presidency has taken a sceptical view toward mergers, suing to block deals in a range of industries including tech, health care and airlines.

Its stance has drawn criticism of over-reach, while its record has been mixed.

Though some firms have abandoned deals after being challenged, the FTC has also lost some high profile court battles.

New York medical school eliminates tuition after \$1bn gift

A New York City medical school will offer students free tuition following a \$1bn donation from the 93-year-old widow of a major Wall Street investor.

The gift to Albert Einstein College of Medicine came from Dr Ruth Gottesman, a former professor at the Bronx school.

It is one of the largest ever donations made to a US school and is the largest ever made to a medical school.

The Bronx, New York City's poorest borough, is ranked as the unhealthiest of New York's 62 counties.

In a statement, university dean Dr Yaron Yomer said that the "transformational" gift "radically revolutionises our ability to continue attracting students who are committed to our mission, not just those who can afford it".

Tuition at the school is nearly \$59,000 each year, leaving students with substantial debt.

The statement from Einstein noted students in their final year will be reimbursed for their spring 2024 tuition, and from August, all students, including those who are currently enrolled, will receive free tuition.

The donation "will free up and lift our students, enabling them to pursue proj-

ects and ideas that might otherwise be prohibitive", Dr Yomer added.

Dr Gottesman, now 93, began working at the school in 1968. She studied learning disabilities, ran literacy programmes and developed widely used screening and evaluation protocols.

Her late husband, David Gottesman, founded a prominent investment house and was an early investor in Berkshire Hathaway, Warren Buffet's multinational conglomerate. He died in September 2022 at the age of 96.

Dr Gottesman said in a statement that the doctors who train at Einstein go on to "provide the finest healthcare to communities here in the Bronx and all over the world".

"I am very thankful to my late husband, Sandy, for leaving these funds in my care, and I feel blessed to be given the great privilege of making this gift to such a worthy cause," she added.

About 50% of Einstein's first-year students are from New York, and approximately 60% are women. Statistics published by the school show that about 48% of its medical students are white, while 29% are Asian, 11% are Hispanic and 5% are black.

In an interview with the New York Times, she recalled that her late husband had left her a "whole portfolio of Berkshire Hathaway stock" when he died with the instructions to "do whatever you think is right with it".

"I wanted to fund students at Einstein so that they would receive free tuition," Dr Gottesman said she immediately realised. "There was enough money to do that in perpetuity."

She added that she occasionally wonders what her husband would have thought of the donation.

"I hope he's smiling and not frowning," she said. "He gave me the opportunity to do this, and I think he would be happy - I hope so."

Three men suspected of involvement in disappearance of US nationals in court

CMC - Three Grenadian nationals suspected of being involved in the disappearance of the United States owners of a yacht that had been anchored in that Caribbean island, Monday pleaded guilty to four immigration-related charges in St Vincent and the Grenadines.


The men, Ron Mitchell, 30, Trevon Robertson, 25, and Atiba Stanislaus, 23, of Paradise, St Andrew, Grenada pleaded guilty to charges that on February 21, at Petit Bordel, being a prohibited immigrant, entered the island by boat without a passport.

They were also charged with entering the state other than at a port of entry, entered the state by boat and disembarked without the consent of an immigration officer; and knowingly and wilfully allowed themselves to be landed as a prohibited immigrant.

The men, who appeared before Senior Magistrate, Colin John, had fled to St Vincent and the Grenadines after escaping prison in their home country.

They have been remanded into custody and will return to court within a week.

The prosecutor, acting Corporal of Police Corlene Samuel had just begun to

give the facts in the case when the magistrate told her that he would remand the men in custody and hear the facts on March 4.

The men were escorted to court by heavily armed officers from tactical units of the police force, armed with assault rifles in addition to short arms.

Mitchell held his side and appeared to have tears

flowing from his eyes during his arraignment. He had to be assisted in exiting the unmarked police vehicle in which they were taken to court.

The Caribbean Media Corporation (CMC) has been able to confirm that police shot Mitchell while apprehending the trio in Petit Bordel, a village on the west coast of St Vincent last Wednesday.

The trio are said to be among five Grenadians arrested in North Leeward over the last week.

One of the other two Grenadians is said to be wanted in his home country on rape charges.

Grenadian and Vincentian detectives have been combing the catamaran cont'd on pg 15

Sentencing hearing for former BVI Ports authority director pushed back

CMC - The sentencing hearing date for the former managing director of the BVI Ports Authority Managing Director, Oleanvine Maynard, has been deferred once again.

Last year, Maynard confessed to helping former Premier Andrew Fahie orchestrate a drug and money laundering conspiracy to smuggle thousands of kilos of cocaine through the territory's waters and to hide the proceeds coming from their efforts.

Maynard's initial sentencing date was set for August 21, 2023, after her guilty plea and agreement to provide testimony against Fahie in exchange for a reduced sentence.

However, the court continued to shift that date as

repeated delays arose with the start of Fahie's trial.

The court did not give a reason for the latest change in the sentencing date for Maynard, but announced in a brief notice last Thursday, that the sentencing hearing was reset to March 28 — just one month ahead of the expected sentencing date for Fahie.

Maynard's son, Kadeem

Stephan Maynard was sentenced on November 20, 2023, to serve 57 months in prison after he also pleaded guilty last year to a single count of conspiracy to import cocaine.

Meanwhile, Fahie's sentencing date has been put into question after an unprecedented post-verdict conundrum arose following his conviction on February

-8.

Moments after Fahie was led out of the court, two jurors who agreed that Fahie was guilty of four counts of conspiracy communicated with the judge and indicated second thoughts about their verdicts, which initiated a rare conflict after the trial's conclusion.

Judge Kathleen Williams called discussions between the two sides so far meaningful and said lawyers should continue examining past cases in South Florida and around the country to find a just solution for Fahie.

The court is expected to hear more from the defence and prosecution on March 7 when a potential legal solution to Fahie's post-verdict issue may be decided.

"Simplicity" for evidence as they investigate the disappearance of the two US nationals, who have been identified as Ralph Hendry and Kathy Brandel.

On Saturday, two of the couple's relatives stood on the dock at the St Vincent and the Grenadines Coast Guard Service Calliaqua Base, where the yacht is docked, as investigators continued their probe.

The relatives of the missing couple are said to have helped detectives to identify some of the missing couple's personal items. The yacht was allegedly stolen in Grenada on February 19 and sailed to St Vincent overnight, allegedly by the three escaped prisoners.

Officers from the Major Crime Unit and the Criminal Records office in Kingstown were joined by their Grenadian counterparts, including a forensic investigator, aboard the vessel last Friday.

Caribbean Safety and Security Net's (CSSN), which collects and disseminates information relating to crimes against yachts in the Caribbean, reported that a cruising catamaran that had been anchored off Grand Anse, Grenada, was found poorly anchored with a shredded jib off the coast of Wallilabou on the west coast of St. Vincent last Tuesday.

"Upon inspection, it was found that the yacht had been ransacked, and it was apparent a violent act had taken place. Copious amounts of blood were found in the master stateroom, and the two owners were missing," CSSN reported.

The yacht's dinghy was also missing but was later recovered. However, passports found onboard the vessel allowed authorities to make contact with the victims' emergency contact.

Hungary's parliament clears path for Sweden's Nato membership

Sweden has cleared its final obstacle to joining Nato after Hungary's parliament voted to ratify the bid.

The Nordic nation applied to join the defence alliance after Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine in 2022.

Every member must approve a new joiner, and Hungary had delayed, accusing Sweden of being hostile to it.

But last week Hungary's Prime Minister Viktor Orban said the two countries were now "prepared to die for each other".

All Nato members are expected to help an ally which comes under attack.

Swedish Prime Minister Ulf Kristersson said it was a "historic day" and a "big step" for Sweden to abandon 200 years of neutrality.

"Sweden is an outstanding country, but we are joining Nato to even better defend everything we are and everything we believe in," he said.

Nato Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg said the Hungarian decision made the alliance "stronger and safer".

The parliament's approval must now be signed by the president - after which a formal invitation

is sent to Sweden to join the 31-member group.

The process usually lasts a few days.

Mr Orban is a nationalist politician with close ties to Russia's President Vladimir Putin.

He has often blocked EU efforts to send military aid to Ukraine.

Sweden is one of the EU countries which have accused Hungary of back-sliding on the EU's democratic principles.

In turn, Mr Orban's spokesman Zoltan Kovacs accused officials in Sweden of sitting on a "crumbling throne of moral superiority".

Last week, however, Mr Orban hosted his

Swedish counterpart Ulf Kristersson and announced his support for Sweden's membership.

Monday's vote of Hungarian MPs was almost unanimous - 188 to 6.

In his speech, Mr Orban sharply criticised unnamed Nato allies for exerting pressure on his government to end the 21-month delay.

"Hungary is a sovereign country and does not tolerate being dictated to by others, on the content or timing of decisions," he said.

Turkey had been the other Nato country to withhold approval of Sweden's application in a row over what it called Sweden's support to Kurdish separatists. It eventually lifted its veto in January.

Sweden and its eastern neighbour Finland, both long considered militarily neutral, announced their intention to join Nato in May 2022.

Finland formally joined in April last year, doubling the length of the alliance's border with Russia.

Russian President Vladimir Putin sent his army into Ukraine in 2022 in the expectation it would check Nato's expansion and weaken Western collectivism.

In fact, with the addition of Sweden and Finland, the opposite has happened.

US airman dies after setting himself on fire outside Israeli embassy in Washington

A US airman has died after setting himself on fire in front of the Israeli embassy in Washington DC.

The man was identified by police as Aaron Bushnell, 25, of San Antonio, Texas.

Officers from the US Secret Service extinguished the flames before the man was taken to hospital on Sunday afternoon.

Before setting himself on fire, he said he would "no longer be complicit in genocide".

In a video aired live on streaming site Twitch, the man identified himself and said he was a serving member of the Air Force.

Dressed in military uniform, he said he was "about to engage in an extreme act of protest." After setting himself on fire, he repeatedly shouted "free Palestine".

No embassy staff members were injured in the incident, said a spokeswoman for the embassy.

The incident happened at 13:00 local time (18:00 GMT) on Sunday. A bomb disposal unit was sent to the site over concerns about a suspicious vehicle that could have been connected to the individual.

This was later declared safe after no hazardous materials were found.

Washington police said



officers were working with the Secret Service and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives to investigate the incident.

Mr Bushnell was taken to the hospital in a critical condition.

The Air Force would not confirm details of Mr Bushnell's service, citing family notification policies. A Pentagon spokesman called the incident a "tragic event" during a news conference Monday.

Before setting himself alight, Mr Bushnell emailed a number of reporters and left-wing and anarchist news websites. The Atlanta Community Press Collective, a group that received the email, provided a copy to the BBC.

"Today, I am planning to engage in an extreme act of protest against the genocide of the Palestinian people," the email reads, warning it would be "highly disturbing."

In his Linkedin profile, Mr Bushnell stated that he graduated from basic training "top of class" in November 2020 and that he was seeking "to transition out of the US Air Force into software engineering".

The Israel-Gaza war erupted on 7 October last year when Hamas gunmen infiltrated southern Israel, killing about 1,200 people and taking 253 others hostage.

Israel responded by launching a military campaign in Gaza, during which 29,300 people have been killed, according to the Hamas-run health ministry.

As of mid-January, 1.9

million civilians in Gaza have been displaced amid Israel's military operations, according to the United Nations, accounting for 85% of its population.

In an interview with CBS News on Sunday, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu defended the offensive in the face of international criticism, saying America would be "doing a hell of a lot more" if it had suffered such an attack.

It is not the first time someone has set themselves on fire in front of an Israeli diplomatic mission in the US.

In December, a protester self-immolated in front of the Israeli consulate in the US state of Georgia.

A Palestinian flag found at the scene was part of the protest, police said.

'Tourist-unfriendly' India dim England's 'Bazball' aura

RANCHI, India (Reuters) - India have remained test cricket's most tourist-unfriendly destination for over a decade and even England's gung-ho'Bazball' approach could not change that reality on Monday.

India's five-wicket victory in the fourth Test on a spiteful track in Ranchi was not really a cakewalk, thanks to England's neversay-die spin attack.

But it fetched Rohit Sharma's team an unassailable 3-1 lead in the five-match series, and consolidated their second place, behind New Zealand, in the World Test Championship standings.

This was India's 17th consecutive Test series win at home, where they have not lost a Test series since an Alastair Cook-led England team bested them in 2012.

For England, who won the opening test in Hyderabad and have been competitive as well as entertaining in Visakhapatnam and Ranchi -- it was their first series defeat under captain Ben Stokes and head coach Brendon 'Baz' McCullum.

India will be particularly happy they clinched the series despite the absence of batting mainstay Virat Kohli (personal reason) and frontline seamer Mo-

hammed Shami (injury).

Middle order batter KL Rahul missed tests after hurting himself in the Hyderabad opener, while they rested pace spearhead Jasprit Bumrah for the match in Ranchi to manage his workload.

It forced India to field four debutants in the first four matches and three of them -- wicketkeeper Dhruv Jurel, batter Sarfaraz Khan, and seamer Akash Deep -- impressed immediately.

Player-of-the-match Jurel struck 90 in the first innings to kept India alive in the contest and his unbroken 72-run stand with Shubman Gill on Monday helped India pull off a nervy chase.

In a match where there were hardly any dull moments, England's second innings meltdown left India needing 192 runs to win.

The hosts raced to 84 for no loss before Shoaib Bashir's triple strikes turned the match on its head, reducing India to 120 for five.

On a pitch where the ball turned sharply and often kept low, Jurel and Gill proved immovable despite the mounting pressure. They gritted their teeth through a 30-over stretch when they could not hit a single boundary in a defensive masterclass on a treacherous track.

Gill, an all-format batter known for his clean-hitting prowess, showed immaculate match awareness and did not hit a boundary in the first 119 balls he faced.

When victory was in sight, the elegant right-hander smacked Bashir for two sixes in the same over en route to his fifty.

The fifth and final Test, scheduled in Dharamsala, begins on March 7.
