Local News Antigua and Barbuda and Saudi Arabia commit to deepen ties

Antigua and Barbuda, and the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia have committed to strengthen the existing ties between the two countries.

The pledges came during bilateral discussions held at the margins of the 46th Regular Meeting of the Conference of Heads to Government of the Caribbean Community, now taking place in Guyana.

Prime Minister Gaston Browne engaged in dialogue with His Excellency Adel Al-Jubeir, Minister of State for Foreign Affairs and Climate Envoy surrounding opportunities for trade and investment between both countries.

The Prime Minister thanked the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia for its support given towards the expansion of the University of the West Indies, Five Island Campus. He further endeavoured to strengthening relations between both nations, while mentioning that Saudi Arabia has shown global leadership based on mutual respect and shared values.

Minister Al-Jubeir also Prime praised Minister Browne's leadership on the global stage, and pledged Saudi Arabia's support for the existing partnership between the two countries, with a vision for mutual investment opportunities to

benefit both societies.

Both parties also discussed support and contributions towards SIDS4 which

would greatly contribute to SIDS countries achieving the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).





Antigua and Barbuda endorses Ghana's candidacy for SG post

Antigua and Barbuda is the second CARICOM country to publicly endorse Ghana's nominee for the position of Secretary General of the Commonwealth grouping when the elections are held in October this year.

The Commonwealth is a voluntary association of 56 independent and equal countries in Africa, Asia, the Americas, Europe and the Pacific.

It is home to one-third of the world's population and includes both advanced economies and developing countries.

Earlier this month Ghana's Foreign Affairs Minister, Shirley Ayorkor Botchwey launched a bid to replace the Dominican-born Dame Patricia Scotland, who served two terms at the head of the London-based Commonwealth grouping.

So far, no other contender has emerged for the top post ahead of the scheduled October 22 election.

Grenada earlier this month said it would en-

dorse Botchwey after President Nana Addo Dankwa Akufo-Addo of Ghana addressed a joint sitting of the Grenada Parliament.

Now, Antigua and Barbuda Prime Minister Gaston Browne, who held talks with Botchwey on the margins of the 46th regular meeting of CARICOM leaders, has signaled that Antigua and Barbuda will follow suit.

A government statement said that during their discussions, Botchwey said that she would reposition the London-based Commonwealth Secretariat with priority given to areas such as trade and investment; climate change; youth, education, skills, innovation and start-ups; mobility and labour markets; and the plight of Small Island Developing States (SIDS).

In his response, Browne outlined his administration's support for Botchwey as he commented on the historical ties between Antigua and Barbuda, and Ghana which have also resulted in harmo-

nious diplomatic relations between both countries.

"He also committed to strengthening relations between Ghana, and Antigua and Barbuda through more people to people exchanges through increased air linkages between the African continent and the Caribbean region, which the government has been committed to. "Further, Prime Minister Browne used the occasion to extend an invitation to the Honourable Nana Akufo-Addo, President of the Republic of Ghana to the upcoming 4th International Conference on Small Island Developing States which will be held from 27-30 May, 2024 in Antigua and Barbuda," the statement added.

Malta offers moral support for Antigua and Barbuda

Antigua and Barbuda continues to expand its circle of friends within the international community.

The latest step in this direction came when Foreign Affairs Minister, E.P Chet Greene, held discussions with his Maltese counterpart, Ian Borg, at the margins of the World Trade Organisation meeting in Dubai.

During the discussions both Min-

ister Greene and Minister Borg signed a Memorandum of Understanding on water cooperation. "Our shared challenges as small island states paved the way for collaboration on climate change and fostering a deeper understanding of vulnerabilities," the Maltese minister proclaimed in a social media post.

Minister Borg said he is enthusias-

tic about the MOU and he now awaits the next step in the relationship.

"We also endorsed Antigua and Barbuda's aspiration for increased cooperation with the European Union as we eagerly await the SIDS conference in May. Malta fully supports Antigua and Barbuda's leadership in this field. I look forward to welcoming Minister Greene in Malta very soon," he added.

Privy Council rules in favour of Barbuda duo

The London-based Privy Council has ruled in favor of John Mussington and Jackie Frank that will now pave the way for legal challenges against the granting of a development permit for construction of an airport in Barbuda.

The case taken before the Law Lords late last year, challenged whether the Court of Appeal was correct to conclude that the Appellants (Frank and Mussington) did not have standing to pursue judicial review proceedings against a decision to grant a development permit for the construction of a new airport runway.

Mussington and Frank secured an injunction in the High Court in 2018 to prevent construction of the runway, claiming in part that the work being carried out was causing major damage to the island's wildlife and eco-system.

This after the Development Control Authority granted approval to the developer who was required to make several improvements to the plan.

The injunction was sub-

sequently lifted by the Appeals Court.

A new application was made in September 2018 at the High Court that sought to restrain key parties from granting permission for work to continue until the outcome of a judicial review.

That injunction was refused in February 2020, but attorneys for Mussington and Frank appealed to the Supreme Court on six grounds but it was denied.

They then filed for permission to take their case to the Privy Council. The matter was heard on 8th November, 2023.

In its ruling, the Privy Council found "the Court of Appeal erred in taking too narrow an approach to the issue of standing".

In citing why there was standing, the Judges outlined among other matters, the concerns expressed by Frank and Mussington about the effects the runway and airport can have on aquifers and the water table, due to the close proximity between the airport and residences.

The failure to follow due process, noting construction work commenced before a permit was granted and that residents were not given the opportunity to make proper representation.

Further, the Privy Council cited the concerns expressed by Mr Mussington in his capacity as a marine biologist about the negative impact to Barbuda's ecology and the breaches to the 2023 Act raised by the application for the development permit.

"Children are becoming more vocal about healthy choices, exemplified by my daughter expressing a desire for strawberries and apples. The message is reaching the next generation," Dr. Meade, as a mom, proudly stated.

Nonetheless, Dr. Meade expressed deep concern about the underestimation of hypertension, its silent nature and potential to cause severe health issues.

"I am gravely concerned. I think more people need to be mindful of hypertension. It does not cause symptoms, and so a lot of us take it lightly. And it is the number one cause for a hemorrhagic stroke, which is a bleeding type of stroke. Your heart may become enlarged. Your kidneys may fail. And so, by simply checking your blood pressure and monitoring your blood pressure, your life could be saved."

As the Heart and Stroke Foundation continues its mission to promote heart health, the 5th Annual Cardiac Symposium stands as a testament to the progress made and the ongoing commitment to empowering individuals with useful information for a hearthealthy lifestyle.

Jam Master Jay: Godson and childhood friend guilty of Run-DMC star's murder

The godson and a childhood friend of Run-DMC star Jam Master Jav have been convicted of his murder in New York City more than two decades ago.

Karl Jordan Jr, 40, and Ronald Washington, 59, targeted the musician at his recording studio after being cut out of a drug deal, the trial heard.

The hip-hop pioneer, real name Jason Mizell, was 37 when he was shot in the head in Queens on 30 October 2002.

Jordan and Washington now face 20 years to life in prison.

"Y'all just killed two innocent people," Washington yelled at the jury after the guilty verdict, according to the Associated Press. Jordan's supporters also began shouting and cursed the jury.

Mizell formed Run-DMC with friends Joseph Simmons and Darryl Mc-Daniels, all of whom grew up in the Hollis neighbourhood in the New York borough of Queens.

The group became one of the most influential hiphop acts of all time and had a string of hits in the 1980s including tracks such as It's Tricky, It's Like That and Aerosmith collaboration Walk This Way.

Although the group was publicly against drug use and made anti-drug public service announcements. Mizell turned to cocaine trafficking as their popularity began to fade in the 1990s.

Prosecutors said Jordan, Mizell's godson, and Washington, a childhood friend who was staying with Mizell's sister, thought they would be part of a drug deal worth nearly \$200,000, and were angered when they were cut out.

During a four-week trial, defence lawyer Ezra Spilke called the prosecution's account of events "one version of many".

The defence also challenged the accuracy of eyewitness testimony after so many years.

But prosecutors called dozens of witnesses, introduced forensic evidence and said the accused carried out an "execution" that was "motivated by greed and by

Jam Master Jay's murder shocked the music world in 2002. revenge". Although the two defendants had been suspected in the case for years, the murder remained unsolved before they were charged by

> federal prosecutors in 2020. Two key eyewitnesses denied they could identify the killers for years until they changed their stories after the case was reopened in 2016.

Uriel "Tony" Rincon testified that he was playing a video game with Mizell when Jordan walked into the room, shook hands with the hip-hop star and then started shooting.

"And then I see Jay just fall," he said.

A woman who worked for Mizell's JMJ Records label, Lydia High, also witnessed the shooting and said Washington ordered her to the floor as the killers made their escape.

Both witnesses said fear prevented them from identifying the killers earlier.

"I felt that [Mizell's] wife and his children needed closure, and I felt that they should know what took place," Mr Rincon testified during the trial.

Other witnesses testified that Jordan bragged about carrying out the killing.

"The witnesses in the recording studio knew the killers, and they were terrified that they would be retaliated against if they cooperated with law enforcement," US prosecutor Breon Peace told reporters after the verdict.

Another man, Jay Bryant, is facing a separate trial in relation to this case.

He is expected to appear in court in 2026, accused of letting Jordan and Washington through the back door of the studio Mizell was in.





Business PAGE 13 **PlayStation to axe 900 jobs** and close London studio

Sony has announced it will lay off 8% of Play-Station employees globally, amounting to approximately 900 people.

In addition to cuts in the US and Japan, the gaming giant said this would mean closing PlayStation's London Studio entirely.

In a blog post sharing an email sent to employees, boss Jim Rvan called the move "sad news" and said it was "a difficult day at our company".

"We have concluded that tough decisions have become inevitable," he said.

"The leadership team and I made the incredibly difficult decision to restructure operations, which regrettably includes a reduction in our workforce impacting very talented individuals who have contributed to our success."

The cuts come a month after rival Microsoft revealed plans to lay off 1,900 people in its gaming division, which included those at recently-acquired Activision-Blizzard.

"Sony is one of the big pillars of UK game development culture so it's massive to see the legendary Sony London studio close in particular," said Halli Bjornsson, head of UK developer Lockwood Publishing.



Insomniac Games, which developed Spider-Man 2, is one of the studios affected by the cuts.

"It's a challenging time for our industry as it continues to go through major changes.

"However, UK games talent and heritage is world class, and if we continue to foster it, we'll rebound and be in a good place to build upon the opportunities that are on the horizon."

Sony's London Studio was founded in 2002 as a result of the merging of two other London-based studios under the PlayStation brand.

Over the past two decades, it created several series including karaoke game SingStar and 2000s football title This Is Football.

More recently, it made virtual reality (VR) games exclusive to Sony's headset, including VR Worlds

well-received and the shooter Blood & Truth.

According to LinkedIn, the studio has between 51 and 200 employees, and it was working on "an unannounced online co-op combat game" set in London before the announcement.

Sony's PlayStation 5 has sold more than 50 million units worldwide, more than double Microsoft's Xbox Series X/S sales.

But another gaming rival, Nintendo, which released its Switch console three years earlier, has sold almost 140 million units worldwide.

And Sony said in its earnings report in February that it now expected to sell four million fewer consoles than expected by the end of March.

Despite PlayStation's revenue being up by 16% compared to the same period one year earlier, its operating income had fallen by a quarter.

"Sony Interactive Entertainment becomes the latest in a long list of games companies that have laid off a significant number of staff in the last 12-18 months," said Piers Harding-Rolls, gaming industry analyst at Ampere Analysis.

"The cost of developing big-budget games has reached unsustainable levels and these costs have come when the games sector is going through an adjustment post-pandemic.

"Many companies have been responding to that more commercially risky market."



Prime Minister Dr Keith Rowley said plans are moving forward for the "imminent" launch of an inter-island regional ferry service, with the intention to add Suriname to the route.

The Office of the Prime Minister said Dr Rowley joined regional leaders in Georgetown, Guyana for the 46th Regular Meeting of the CARICOM Heads of Government on Monday.

The conference will run from February 25-28, 2024.

"Maritime transportation, specifically the imminent launch of an inter-regional cargo ferry that will operate the Trinidad and Tobago, Barbados, and Guyana routes, also engaged leaders during [Monday] morning's session.

"It is expected that Suriname will be added to the ferry's route."

"Prime Minister Rowley said he



was pleased with the level of interest generated by the decision to launch the ferry and assured that the Government is committed to ensuring the commercial preparatory work is completed."

"He said while the Government will facilitate the incubation of the project, it is hoped that the private sector will play an integral role in the ex-



pansion of the ferry service."

The OPM said Dr Rowley also held bilateral discussions with Canada's Minister of International Development, the Hon Ahmed Hussen, with talks focussing on matters of national security, travel protocol and employment opportunities.

The Prime Minister also met with the Envoy of the Minister of Foreign Affairs of the United Arab Emirates, Omar Shehadeh.

A commitment was made by both parties to enhance cooperation in the areas of aviation and the creation of a legislative framework to respond to the emerging issues related to the increased usage of Artificial Intelligence.

The OPM said heads also received a detailed report on the progress the region has made towards increasing food production in member states. CAR-ICOM has embarked on a mission to reduce the region's import bill by 25 per cent by 2025.

Accompanying the Prime Minister to Monday's meetings was the Minister of Foreign and CARICOM Affairs, Dr Amery Browne.

The OPM said regional heads and Foreign Ministers will meet in caucus at a special retreat on Tuesday - among the issues to be examined during this session are Haiti, the Caribbean Development Bank and the CSME.

Oil spill spreads across Caribbean from Tobago to Bonaire

Oil leaking from a capsized barge off the coast of Tobago has spread hundreds of miles to reach the Caribbean island of Bonaire.

Officials on Bonaire, which is located 50 miles (80km) north of the Venezuelan coast, said the oil posed a "serious threat to both humans and nature".

The island is the latest to have been contaminated with oil from the barge which ran aground earlier this month.

It is still unclear who owns the barge and what may have caused it to sink.

The authorities on Bonaire, which is a special municipality of the Netherlands, said the island's east coast, including Sorobon, Lac and Lagun, had been polluted.

They also warned that the island's mangrove, fish and coral ecosystems

were at risk.

The oil leak was first spotted by the Trinidad and Tobago Coast Guard on 7 February. They traced it to a barge which had become lodged on a reef about 150m (500 ft) off Tobago's southern coast.

There was no crew on board the barge and the Coast Guard said it had not received any distress signals. They did, however, spot the name "Gulfstream" painted on the side of the vessel.

Trinidad and Tobago authorities said the barge had originated in Panama and had been towed by a tugboat. They said it appeared "to have been bound for Guyana".

An investigation conducted by online investigative journalism site Bellingcat suggests the barge stopped in late January in Pozuelos Bay, a Venezuelan port used by the stateowned PdVSA oil company. According to Bellingcat, the barge may have started leaking oil as early as 3 February. The whereabouts of the boat which had tugged the barge are not currently known.

The prime minister of Trinidad and Tobago declared a national emergency on 11 February. The country's Office of Disaster Preparedness and Management has been trying to contain the spillage but oil has been continuing to leak from the barge.

The Trinidad and Tobago Weather Center said satellite images suggested the oil slick had spread into the marine area of Grenada as early as 14 February.

From there, it appears to have been carried further westward to Bonaire.

Officials on Bonaire are particularly concerned for the mangroves, which are among the best preserved in the Caribbean.

Nato allies reject Emmanuel Macron idea of troops to Ukraine

Several Nato countries, including the US, Germany and the UK, have ruled out deploying ground troops to Ukraine, after French President Emmanuel Macron said "nothing should be excluded".

Mr Macron said there was "no consensus" on sending Western soldiers to Ukraine.

Kremlin spokesperson Dmitry Peskov has warned of direct conflict if Nato troops deploy there.

Russian forces have recently made gains in Ukraine and Kyiv has urgently appealed for more weapons.

Mr Macron told a news conference on Monday evening: "We should not exclude that there might be a need for security that then justifies some elements of deployment.

"But I've told you very clearly what France maintains as its position, which is a strategic ambiguity that I stand by."

The French leader was speaking in Paris, which is hosting a crisis meeting in support of Ukraine, attended by heads of European states, as well as the US and Canada.

A full-scale invasion of Ukraine launched by Russian President Vladimir Putin is now in its third year, with no signs that the biggest war in Europe since



World War Two could end soon.

Mr Macron's comments prompted responses from other European and Nato member countries.

US President Joe Biden believes the "path to victory" is providing military aid "so Ukrainian troops have the weapons and ammunition they need to defend themselves", a White House statement said.

"President Biden has been clear that the US will not send troops to fight in Ukraine," it added.

German Chancellor Olaf Scholz said there had been no change to the agreed position that no European country or Nato member state would send troops to Ukraine.

UK Prime Minister Rishi Sunak's spokesman said the country had no plans for a large-scale military deployment to Ukraine, beyond the small number of personnel already training Ukrainian forces.

The office of Italian Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni said Italy's "support does not include the presence of troops from European or Nato states on Ukrainian territory".

Mr Peskov, on behalf of the Kremlin, called Mr Macron's suggestion "a very important new element" adding it was absolutely not in the interests of Nato members.

"In that case, we would need to talk not about the probability, but about the inevitability [of direct conflict]," he said.

Earlier, Nato secretary general Jens Stoltenberg denied considering whether troops would be sent to Ukraine, although he insisted the alliance would continue to support Ukraine, which is not a Nato member.

That position has been echoed by a number of Nato member states including Spain, Poland and the Czech Republic.

Russia has an abundance of artillery and is a far bigger military force than Ukraine, whose troops are critically dependent on modern weapons being provided by Western allies, particularly the US.

On Tuesday, Mr Biden urged congressional leaders to approve \$95bn (£75bn; ϵ 69bn) US aid package, which includes \$60bn for Ukraine, during a meeting in the Oval Office.

The package has been facing an uphill battle in the US House of Representatives. Republican House speaker Mike Johnson held *cont'd on pg 17*



Dutch mega-trial exposes brutal gangland underworld

Three members of a drug cartel involved in a series of gangland killings have been jailed for life, in the biggest criminal trial in Dutch history.

The gang's "undisputed" ringleader, Ridouan Taghi, was for years one of the Netherlands' most-wanted fugitives.

Taghi was jailed for murder, firearms offences and aggravated robbery.

Two other men, Said R and Mario R - whose full names cannot be revealed under Dutch law - were also given life sentences.

They were convicted of complicity in murder, attempted murder, preparation for and complicity in murder.

In total, 17 people were handed sentences ranging from life in prison to one year and nine months.

The nature and scale of this case is unprecedented in the Netherlands.

Armed police guarded the "Bunker" high-security courthouse in Amsterdam.

It took 142 hearing days spread over almost six years, 800 pages of pleadings and more than 3,000 pages of documents from the lawyers to arrive at today's verdicts.

From the outset the "mega-trial" - which began on 11 March 2021 - has been shrouded in secrecy and security.

The court president said the "Marengo" trial -

named after the codeword for the police operation which led to the arrests was about "ruthless, disruptive violence".

"When we read the messages in the file, we end up in a world where human life has no value," he said.

The trial has captivated a country that has recently been forced to confront its violent underworld. The gang's murders were well prepared by using "spotters" or using sophisticated sounding bea-

cons.

According to the court, the organisation counted not only gunmen and drivers among its many members, but also corrupt officials who provided vital insider information.

Taghi, 46, was found guilty of being the undisputed leader of the criminal organisation, which is thought to have been one of the Netherlands' biggest drug cartels.

He was the subject of an international arrest warrant and was eventually arrested in Dubai in 2019, where he had been living below the radar in a suburban villa.

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky, who took part in Monday's meeting in Paris by video link, said that "everything we do together to defend against Russian aggression adds real security to our nations for decades to come".

The ease with which Taghi decided that someone should be killed was described by the judges as "shocking" and ruthless.

were present when their fathers were shot dead.

Taghi was not among the eight suspects who attended court on Tuesday.

Those who did were brought to the high-security courthouse - nicknamed the "Bunker" - in armoured vehicles. Heavily armed police stood guard outside the building, wearing body armour and balaclavas as surveillance drones buzzed overhead.

The court noted it was significant that none of the surviving relatives of the gang's victims made use of the right to speak or submitted a claim as an injured party, such is the fear and vulnerability they still feel.

One person who did speak out was a man called Nabil B, who became the key witness at the heart of the mega-trial. Court cameras only filmed him below the neck, so as to conceal his identity.

Nabil B was found guilty of being complicit and an accessory to murder, but handed a lesser sentence of 10 years due to personal circumstances and the role he played in bringing his former accomplices to justice.

Just before reading out the verdict, the court reflected on three targeted killings of people close to Nabil B - which all occurred while the investigation was under way.

A week after it became public knowledge, in early 2018, that Nabil B had turned informant and cut a deal with prosecutors as a key witness, his brother was shot dead.

A year later, Nabil B's lawyer, Derk Wiersum, was murdered outside his home.

Then, in July 2021, his confidante, the investigative journalist Peter R de Vries, was shot on a summer evening after leaving a TV studio in central Amsterdam. He died soon after.

Nabil B called the Marengo case "the most diseased and poisoned trial ever".

Before the sentences were read out today, the court said these three killings added a "dark edge" to the proceedings. Those murders are now being dealt with in separate trials.

CARSON, Calif. (AP) qualify for last year's World -- Mexico beat the United States for the second time ever, getting goals from Lizbeth Ovalle and Mayra Pelayo for a 2-0 victory Monday night in the CON-CACAF Women's Gold Cup.

The US entered the game 40-1-1 against its rival, with its only previous loss a 2-1 decision during Women's World Cup qualifying in 2010.

It was the first loss for the US under interim coach Twila Kilgore, who took over after the team's dramatic exit from the Women's World Cup last summer in the round of 16. Emma Hayes will take over for Kilgore this spring.

Cup, finished atop Group A in the Gold Cup, while the United States finished second. Both teams advanced to the knockout round.

"They went out and they were bold, they were brave with the dream of playing a good game against the United States," Mexico coach Pedro Lopez Ramos said.
