The ICC T20 World Cup Cricket Trophy arrived in Antigua and Barbuda on Tuesday to much fanfare and excitement with a welcoming party that included top government officials, cricket royalty, and representatives of Cricket West Indies and the Leeward Islands Cricket Association.

Antigua and Barbuda was the first stop of the Trophy Tour of all the territories that will host T20 Cricket matches in this major international sporting event that starts on June 1.

Prime Minister Gaston Browne officially welcomed the Trophy to Antigua Tuesday afternoon following a presentation in Barbuda earlier in the day. He said cricket has the ability to bring the world together at a time when there are worrying international conflicts.

"Cricket brings communities together and I have no doubt that this T20 World Cup will bring a number of nations together as we seek to ensure that we have a world that is peaceful and one in which we continue to promote global talents, cricketing talents and I am hoping to see a number of individuals from the region shine during this tournament.

> He expressed a desire to see the West Indies team, once a mighty cricketing power, return to its glory days. He noted that the talent is there but with application, he is confident that the West Indies will regain its position at the top.

> PM Browne thanked the organisers and wished for an exciting cricket tournament that will delight cricket lovers here in Antigua and Barbuda and around the globe where the sport is growing in popularity.

He revealed that the government has invested heavily in the further development of the Sir Vivian Richards Stadium and he expects that the matches staged there will be world class where the culture of Antigua and Barbuda may come to the fore. Following his remarks, PM Browne was invited to engage in a photo-op holding the trophy up for the benefit of the pool of photographers.

In his remarks, Cricket West Indies, Johnny Greaves said it was apt that Antigua and Barbuda was the first stop on





the Trophy Tour as this was the home of West Indies Cricket. "We are happy to call Antigua and Barbuda our home and we are also proud of the partnership we have developed with the government and the T20 World Cup is just another example of that partnership where we work to improve cricket at all levels and to plan events that do much for not just the sport, but for the overall economy as well," he stated.

He said the T20 World Cup will bring unprecedented investments in the region, and a huge international viewership as he calls for all of society to embrace the tournament.

Greaves also described cricket as the world's second most popular sport, giving the Caribbean an opportunity to showcase all the region has to offer to the rest of the world.

On hand for the Trophy reception were Sports Minister, Daryl Matthew, Cricket legends, Sir Andy Roberts and Sir Curtly Ambrose, officials of CWI, the LICA, representatives of the Tourism Authority and the Ministry of Tourism as well as local organisers and other well-wishers.

Environment Division, Bus Association team up to launch transition to electric public buses

The Department of Environment (DOE) has announced its collaboration with the Antigua and Barbuda Bus Association (ABBA), Global Environment Fund (GEF), and United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) to usher in a new era of sustainable transportation and the associated training of the workforce.

Under the GEF Funded Sustainable Low-carbon Island Management (SLIM) project, the ABBA is procuring seven electric buses from China with the USD\$560,000 grant which was granted to the Association. This marks a significant step towards reducing carbon emissions and promoting eco-friendly transit solutions in the nation by providing vehicles for local

professionals to begin experiencing, supporting and maintaining the vehicles.

In line with this initiative, representatives from ABBA, DOE, Antigua State College (ASC), and Antigua and Barbuda Institute for Continuing Education (AB-



ICE) are currently in Nanning, China, from April 6th to April 18th, 2024. Their mission is to undergo comprehensive training on the operation and maintenance of these electric buses.

This training not only ensures a seamless transition to electric vehicles but also provides an invaluable opportunity for participants to enhance their knowledge and expertise in this emerging field.

Moreover, this endeavor extends beyond the realm of transportation. Cathy Thomas, Lakeea Allen, Shania Bejai, and Jesse Gilpin will be representing the DOE at the 135th China Import and Export Fair Canton Trade Fair in Guangzhou, Guangdong, China, from April 15th to April 28th, 2024. Their participation in Phases 1 & 2 of this prestigious event aims to gain firsthand insights into various materials exhibited, facilitating informed decision-making for green procurement purposes under the DOE's various projects.

By implementing green procurement practices and fostering bulk purchasing, the DOE seeks to enhance sustainability efforts within its projects. The focus is on selecting high-quality, sustainable options that align with the nation's commitment to environmental preservation and climate action.

Government House bestows special honour on two outstanding philanthropists

Two individuals who have made an indelible mark on the lives of hundreds of persons across the Caribbean, including Antigua and Barbuda, were on Tuesday presented with the Governor General's Faithful and Meritorious Service Award.

The two – the Hon. Health Minister wants OECS procurement arrangements expanded

Officials involved in the countries is among the highmedical procurement arrangements between Organisation of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) are meeting in Antigua and Barbuda to review the programme through which all participating countries benefit.

Speaking at the opening ceremony at the Jolly Beach Hotel on Tuesday, Health Minister Sir Molwyn Joseph called for an expansion of the programme to other areas of sub-regional development.

"In the area of procurement...we need to expand the opportunities for joint procurement in the region. We started out with pharmaceuticals but I think we need to explore what other areas we can explore. We should be looking at building on the success we have achieved and look to do more than we are doing now," he stated.

One area where he has focused his attention is the need for the procurement of all consumables for the treatment of kidney diseases. Antigua and Barbuda, he reported has seen an increase in kidney diseases and he suggested that this may be the case in other OECS territories.

Sir Molwyn urged participants not to limit themselves to the areas now being served but to expand their minds and their horizons to other possibilities for future cooperation. He noted that the issue of healthcare in many OECS

June 27 is the new date that former Police Superintendent Ray John and his co-accused will return to court to find out if their new case will move on to the High Court.

The saga between John and his former partner, Shakema Charles has been ongoing for several years as both stand accused of passport fraud with several related charges but earlier this month, those charges were dropped as the law does not allow for conspiracy to be tried by judge only.

Many thought that would be the

end of the matter and that the duo would be set free, but those celebrations were cut short as they were both recharged a week later.

Fast forward to Monday and both appeared in the St. John's Magistrate's Court to hear their fate, but it was adjourned.

They will now have to wait.

John and Charles are now jointly accused of conspiring with Vincentian resident Lonzel Jones to create fake passport bio pages using unauthorized Multi-Layered Infilling

Sheets.

John, with Charles' assistance, allegedly sent the necessary documents to Jones through a friend, Lisborn Michael, from the Royal Police Force of Antigua and Barbuda.

However, police intercepted Jones and John's nephew, Geraldo James, during a transaction involving the final documents.

The defendants, represented by Defence attorneys Hugh Marshall and Michael Archibald, maintained that they were innocent.

Haiti: Political analyst shares skepticism over latest move

With the establishment of a transitional council in Haiti, many are hoping that this may be the start of the turnaround that the country needs, but one political analyst remains a bit skeptical.

Haiti created the body to fill a leadership vacuum by choosing a new prime minister, and to restore order in the Caribbean country ravaged by gang violence.

A decree published in the official gazette announced the formation of the Presidential Transitional Council on Friday.

"I am hopeful that this will work. This idea of a political solution.... but the reality is that the political instability in Haiti is frenetic. Simple solutions have been somewhat elusive, and I just have to sit back and see. It's a complex situation," Wickham said.

Ouestions remain about the nine-member council's viability with no details on a timeframe to install the body and select a new prime minister and cabinet.

The decree also did not name the members of the council.

It said Henry and the council will govern the country until the new body names his replacement.

The decree also said the council would help speed the deployment of international troops that Henry requested in 2022 to aid police in their battles with armed and increasingly powerful gangs.

Haiti has not held elections since 2016 and has been without a president since Jovenel Moise was assassinated in 2021.

Since the violence erupted, nearly 95,000 people have fled the metropolitan area of the capital as armed gangs cemented their control. Haitians lack basic goods as key ports remain closed, while the outgoing government remains absent.

Adidas on front foot after exiting Kanye West deal

Adidas has emerged from its bruising tie-in with rapper Kanye West and says it expects to make profits of \notin 700m (£598m) in 2024.

In February the German sportswear giant said it planned to sell its remaining Yeezy trainers from its partnership with West for at least cost price.

Tuesday's upbeat comments from Adidas come a month after the company posted its first losses in 30 years.

It makes Samba, Gazelle and Campus shoes.

The company said the revised figures were \notin 200m more than initially predicted and down to a better than expected first quarter of the year.

The company said its quarterly

operating profit had reached \notin 336m, up from \notin 60m a year earlier when it was hit by the break-up with West.

Adidas further said it had sold another $\in 150$ m worth of Yeezy products in the quarter, at a profit of around $\in 50$ m.

It said the remainder of its Yeezy stock would probably be sold for about €200m later this year, but without any further profit.

Last year it pledged to donate some of the proceeds of the sales to charities who work on combating hate.

Adidas cut ties with West in November 2022 over antisemitic comments he made on social media, but the company still has a diverse fan base with rich and powerful clients.

Last week Adidas and its Samba brand were thrust into the headlines

after it emerged British Prime Minister Rishi Sunak had been one of its customers for "many, many years".


Conscious that his serious reputation might not be to other Samba wearers' liking, Mr Sunak issued a "fulsome" apology on LBC radio but said he was a «long-time devotee» to the Adidas brand.

But while the global firm has warned its profits will be dented by the Yeezy affair it has also drawn attention to the devaluation of the Argentine peso at the end of 2023.

Adidas has been the maker of shirts for Argentina's national football team for decades.

Rival sportswear firm Puma has also said Argentina's currency devaluation hit its financial results as the region was its biggest and fastest-growing market.

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Environment Coral bleaching: Fourth global mass stress episode underway - US scientists

Coral around the world is turning white and even dying as recent record ocean heat takes a devastating toll.

It has triggered the fourth global mass coral bleaching event, according to the US National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).

Bleaching happens when coral gets stressed and turns white because the water it lives in is too hot.

Coral sustains ocean life, fishing, and creates trillions of dollars of revenue annually.

Ocean heat records have been falling for months but this is the first global evidence of how this episode is affecting sea life.

The US National Oceand Atmospheric anic Administration (NOAA) confirmed the mass stress in all oceans (the Atlantic, Pacific and Indian Ocean) after weeks of receiving from scientists reports globally.

The bleached coral can look beautiful in pictures but scientists that dive to examine the reefs say that up close the coral is clearly ill and decaying.

Scientists in the US, Australia, Kenya and Brazil told BBC News about feeling dismay and even anger as they watched the coral they love threatened or killed by warm oceans.

The first warning signs were in the Caribbean last year when bathers found the water off the coast of Florida was as warm as a hot tub.

That heat moved into the southern hemisphere. It has now affected more than half the world's coral including in Australia's Great Barrier Reef, and in coastlines in Tanzania, Mauritius, Brazil, Pacific islands, as well as in the Red Sea and Persian Gulf.

Last August the global average ocean temperature broke its all-time record, and has been above average almost every day

since.

Climate change is driving up sea surface temperatures as the warming gases emitted when we burn oil, coal and gas are absorbed by the oceans.

El Niño - a natural climate event - has also contributed to warmer temperatures since last June, though there are signs it is now weakening.

For 10 days in February scientist Neal Cantin flew a plane over the Great Barrier Reef for Australia's Institute of Marine Science. The UN heritage site stretches 2,000km, or roughly the length of the US east coast.

"For the first time ever we've documented very high levels of bleaching in all three areas of the Great

Barrier Reef Marine Park," Dr Cantin says. The levels are likely to kill lots of coral, he adds.

Coral is vital to the planet. Nicknamed the sea's architect, it builds vast structures that house 25% of all marine species.

Stressed coral will probably die if it experiences temperatures 1C above its thermal limit for two months. If waters are 2C higher, it can survive around one month.

Once it has died, creatures like fish that navigate using coral noise can struggle to find their way home.

For three decades scientist Anne Hoggett has dived at Australia's Lizard Island - a beautiful reef that cont'd on pg 14

Gunfire rocks St. Maarten nightlife: 1 killed, 3 hospitalised

One man is dead while three other people are nursing gunshot wounds following a shooting at near a popular nightclub in St Maarten on Sunday.

In a social media post yesterday, the Police Force of Sint Maarten (KPSM) said that it received reports of multiple people being shot near the night club in Simpson Bay around 4am.

When officers arrived, they found a young man lifeless on the opposite side of the club.

Bystanders told police two other men and a woman also sustained gunshot wounds during the incident.

Officers searched the area and found one victim behind the supermarket located next to the night club.

He was taken to the Sint Maarten Medical Centre (SMMC) in a serious but stable condition for

Like many researchers, she was shocked when she saw coral turning white in the first mass bleaching in 1998. "Now I'm just angry that this is being allowed to happen again," she says from Australian Museum's Lizard Island Research Station.

Coral can recover from heat stress but it needs time - ideally several years. When weakened, it is susceptible to disease and can easily

die.

"If given a chance, coral are actually resilient and can recover. But as bleaching becomes more frequent and stronger in intensity, we're really narrowing that window," says Technology Sydney, Australia.

The last mass global bleaching was in 2014-2016. Since then, ocean temperatures have become so much warmer that NOAA had to introduce three new heat alert levels.

CMC – A police officer has been charged and placed on interdiction after he allegedly shoved his wife out of a moving vehicle last weekend.

cannot save coral globally.

Only a rapid and global reduction in greenhouse gas emissions that limits ocean warming will guarantee we have at least some coral left, they say.

"It's like going from corals providing houses and buildings for marine life to just being scaffolding. What really wants to live in scaffolding?" Dr McWhorter says.

Coral reefs are an early warning system for the impacts of a warming planet on nature. "We need to learn from this to not do this to other ecosystems," says Dr Obura. Jones was shot by police on April 10. Police said following the shooting, Camp took to social media alleging that Jones was shot by police and was being denied medical access.

He said he had also intended to sue the police department for violating Jones' rights, but when he appeared in court on Monday accompanied by his lawyer, Sharon Pitts, Camp pleaded guilty and Pitts, in mitigation, pleaded to the court, seeking mercy for her client whom she said did not waste the court's time.

She also argued that the charge for which he was before the court was a misdemeanour.

Historic Copenhagen stock exchange in Denmark goes up in flames

Denmark's historic old stock exchange building in the centre of Copenhagen has been engulfed by fire.

The 17th Century Børsen is one of the city's oldest buildings and onlookers gasped as its iconic dragon spire tumbled into the street below.

Culture minister Jakob Engel-Schmidt said 400 years of Danish cultural heritage had gone up in flames.

Members of the public rushed to rescue historic paintings and it took hours before the fire was under control.

The building, dating back to 1625, is a stone's throw from Denmark's parliament, the Folketing, housed in the old royal palace of Christiansborg castle. Danish media said the nearby square was being evacuated and the main entrance to Christiansborg was closed because of smoke.

The old stock exchange was being renovated and had been shrouded in scaffolding and protective plastic covering.

It currently houses the Danish chamber of commerce, which described the scenes on Tuesday morning as a terrible sight. Its director, Brian Mikkelsen, said as much as half of the old stock exchange had burned down but vowed

that it would be rebuilt "no matter what".

Local craftsman Henrik Grage told Danish TV that it was a tragic day. "This is our Notre-Dame," he said, comparing it with the fire that engulfed the roof and spire of the cathedral in the centre of Paris almost exactly five years ago.

The Paris fire broke out under the eaves of Notre-Dame on 15 April 2019 when it was also shrouded in scaffolding as part of extensive renovations. Investigators have blamed either a short circuit in the electrics or a worker's cigarette butt that was not properly put out.

The cause of the fire in Copenhagen is also for the moment unknown but emergency services said the scaffolding made their operation more difficult. Officials said the fire was most intense around the tower.

One of the craftsmen replacing brickwork on the building saw the fire break out on the roof while he was on the scaffolding. Ole Hansen said he shouted to his colleagues they needed to get down and that he left the door unlocked for firemen to get in.

Fire department chief Jakob Vedsted Andersen said firefighters faced an almost impossible task accessing the area under the old copper roof. It was not until Tuesday afternoon that he said the fire had been brought under control, although much of the building was burned out.

"Furniture, floor partitions and everything that could burn has been affected by the fire," he said.

"I'm completely

speechless - this is an unparalleled tragedy," one onlooker told Danish media.

Members of the public joined emergency services as well as the head of the chamber of commerce in rushing into the building to save the Børsen building's substantial art collection.

Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen spoke of "terrible images" and of a piece of Danish history going up in flames.

Local museum inspector Benjamin Asmussen told Denmark's TV2 that the fire was difficult to watch, as the old stock exchange was filled with paintings of Danes who had played important roles since the 17th Century.

Police told to shut down right-wing Brussels event

Brussels police were ordered to shut down a conference for right-wing politicians, including Brexiteer Nigel Farage and Hungary's Prime Minister Viktor Orban, on Tuesday.

People were stopped from entering the National Conservatism Conference a few hours after it began, organisers said - although it continued for those inside.

The local mayor said he issued the order to ensure public security.

Organisers of the conference said they "overcame attempts to silence" them.

They said they plan to continue with the conference on Wednesday, writing: "See you again tomorrow!" on X, formerly Twitter.

Hungary's Mr Orban who is due to speak there - has reacted with indignation, posting on Facebook: "Brussels just moved up a gear. If anyone stands up

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al hundred works had been rescued and taken into storage under escort. In a message to organisers, Mr Kir said some of the attendees of Tuesday's conference held anti-gay and anti-abortion views. "Among these personalities there are several particularly from the right-conservative, religious right and European extreme

right," his statement said.

"The far right is not welcome," he added on X.

Mr Farage, who took to the stage this morning, told the BBC the decision to close down the conference because there were homophobes in the audience was "cobblers", and that he condemned the decision as an attempt to stifle free speech.

"Thank God For Brexit", he said.

Organised by a think-tank called the Edmund Burke Foundation, the National Conservatism Conference is a global movement embracing what it describes as traditional values, which it claims are being "undermined and overthrown". It also opposes further European integration.

The conference said it aimed to

bring together "public figures, journalists, scholars and students" who understood the connection between conservatism and the idea of nationhood and national traditions.

French far-right politician Eric Zemmour, arriving for the conference after police had blocked the entrance, told journalists that Mr Kir was "using the police as a private militia to prevent... Europeans from taking part freely".

Organisers said Mr Zemmour was not allowed into the venue and that his speech would be postponed.

As well as Mr Orban, former Polish Prime Minister Mateusz Morawiecki was also due to speak at the event on Wednesday. Mr Orban is due cont'd on pg 19

Trinidad and Tobago's Sunil Narine has made it clear that he will not be part of the West Indies squad for the upcoming ICC T20 World Cup in the Caribbean in June.

Narine, who has not represented the West Indies since 2019, reiterated his decision after the Kolkata Knight Riders' emphatic victory over the Lucknow Super Giants at Eden Gardens in the Indian Premier League on Sunday.

Former West Indies cricketer turned commentator Samuel Badree asked Narine about his World Cup plans during a postmatch interview, to which Narine responded, "I will be watching from home, Badree."

The 35-year-old Narine's absence from the West Indies setup has been notable since 2019, despite invitations to return to the team. Windies white-ball coach Darren Sammy recently indicated that the squad selection process for the World Cup was nearing

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goal-scoring opportunity.
