PM wants voters to hold leaders responsible if their countries continue to be heavy polluters

Prime Minister Gaston Browne has made a bold request at the Global Citizens NOW meeting taking place in New York City. Speaking on one of the several panels being held as part of the twoday meeting, PM Browne called on voters in countries where discriminate polluting is taking place to hold their leaders responsible for their action, or lack thereof.

"I'm of the view that leaders globally ought to show some level of climate responsibility and I'm also of the view that voters need to hold their leaders responsible because, ultimately, they are the ones who will determine their level of success.

"Many leaders are obviously captured by certain organisations, especially organisations in the fossil fuel industry and lobbyists, but they need to liberate themselves," he declared.

PM Browne is of the view that leaders of countries across the globe, have a responsibility to all of humanity and a responsibility to protect and preserve the planet and it will be the voters who hold them responsible to make sure that they phase out the use of fossil fuels.

He voiced concerns over the commitments made year after year at the annual COP meetings where grandiose commitments are made but which are never implemented once the conference is over.

"They have been 'gaming' the system," he stated.

Other than the actions of voters, the prime minister also suggested that countries may wish to pursue legal action as Antigua and Barbuda and Vanuatu have done when they brought a case before the International Court of Justice.

Cabinet receives SIDS4 update

Foreign Affairs Minister, E.P Chet Greene presented his Cabinet colleagues with a written report on the readiness of the country to receive the 3,000 or more delegates likely to travel to Antigua and Barbuda for the Fourth Conference of Small Island Developing States (SIDS4) from May 27 to 30.

The Cabinet Notes said the written report was intended for internal uses only.

However, it reported that the hotels and the other accommodations are fast filling-up, as the dates draw near; more sites are being

examined to ensure they meet the high standards set by the Ministry of Tourism.

It revealed that additional flights on the days immediately before the Conference and after the Conference are being planned, whilst the airlines are reminded of their promise to add flights.

"Transport systems are being ironed out to allow for the smooth collection from the airport, transport to the places of accommodation, and to-and-from the Conference Center at the American University of Antigua (AUA) daily; the system planners report that they are all falling in place," according to the Notes,

It was reported that the Conference Center itself is very close to completion and was visited by the Prime Minister, the Minister of Works, and other officials (including the Foreign Minister himself); they were satisfied that it will be ready long before the start date.

The landscaping and the carpark are also being undertaken by both the AUA and the Ministry of Works.

The field hospital is being constructed on the grounds of the AUA and will be fully staffed during the days of the Conference; that medical site is 90% complete. High speed fiber optic lines are nearly complete to allow for high loads during the days of the Conference.

Antigua and Barbuda and India have been engaged in discussions on a wide array of matters relating to assistance for the Antigua and Barbuda Defense Force (ABDF).

These discussions have been ongoing for over a year, but gathered some momentum when the Indian High Commission to Guyana and the Eastern Caribbean, Dr Amit Telang, visited Antigua and Barbuda last week.

"Ever since I visited India last year for an air-show, we have been having ongoing discussions regarding areas where India could assist the country with certain assets for the military such as vessels and other equipment that we need for the proper functioning of the ABDF," Chief of Defense Staff, Col. Telbert Benjamin stated.

He reported that the High Com-

missioner has been able to help the ABDF make contact with several Indian companies through which some of the equipment may be sourced. "We are looking for assistance beyond military hardware to include matters such as training, equipment and partnering with the armed forces in other areas," Col. Benjamin detailed.

Despite the issue of geography, the army chief noted that Antigua and Barbuda has been benefitting from its relationship with India in key areas such as training, particularly in maritime training, the transfer of technologies, aviation and marine resources.

"Antigua and Barbuda and India have been working closely in several areas to support each other's development," he remarked. A note from the Indian Honorary Consul stated that the visit underscores the deepening diplomatic ties between the two nations to create engagements not only to enhance bilateral cooperation but also pave the way for strategic collaborations in defense and security, fostering mutual understanding and goodwill.

BH conducts three days of training for food vendors

Following two weekends of rolling inspections by officers of the Central Board of Health during which several food vendors were asked to cease operations, there has been an influx of persons applying for training from the health agency.

Principal Public Health Inspector, Julienne Mannix has announced that due to the demand for training this week, the CBH has had to organize three consecutive days of training to keep up with the demand. These sessions started with approximately 35 persons on Wednesday at the CBH Offices on Upper Church Street and will continue today (Thursday) and again tomorrow, (Friday). More than 250 persons are expected to be trained by the end of the sessions. Thursday and Friday's sessions will take place at the Multi-Purpose Cultural Centre.

The training sessions cover five key areas for food safety. These are;

keep food clean at all times and ensure clean water is available

pay attention to hand hygiene as well as ensuring a sanitary environment as well as pest control and a safe temperature

food and when this is coupled with the demands with Labour Day, SIDS4 and ICC T20 World Cup, many individuals see this as an opportunity to get the training and to avoid any embarrassment or loss of business from a future rolling inspection," she remarked.

Successful persons who undergo the training are presented with a badge and a certificate that are valid for the next two years.



APUA Strengthens Oversight of Renewable Energy Systems for Safety and Grid Stability

ST. JOHN'S, Antigua, May 1, 2024 - **The Antigua Public Utilities Authority (APUA) is enhancing its** efforts to ensure that all renewable energy systems comply with established policies, with a focus on safety and the stability of the national energy grid.

APUA has been overseeing the incorporation of renewable energy systems through the interconnection policy that has since evolved after first being introduced in 2011. In 2015, this policy shifted focus from net metering to net billing which allows customers with renewable energy systems to offset their electricity bills by selling excess energy back to the grid. This initiative caters to different system sizes with two interconnection categories:

- Sale of Excess: For systems producing 5 kW or less.
- Buy-All, Sell-All: For systems producing over 5 kW.

In July 2023, APUA began an island-wide survey to ensure that all renewable energy systems align with its interconnection policy. These recent assessments indicate that the total capacity of renewable energy systems in Antigua and Barbuda has reached 10.23 MW, entirely comprised of solar power.

This policy alignment is crucial for maintaining grid stability, as the variable output of solar energy can affect voltage and frequency, impacting overall power quality. Additionally, unregistered or improperly installed systems can pose significant safety risks, especially during the hurricane season, where power could be fed back unto the grid from these unregistered renewable energy systems.

APUA's Renewable Energy compliance campaign will focus on two key areas:

Grid Stability: Ensuring the consistent delivery of high-quality power amidst the variability of renewable energy sources.

Safety: Protecting technicians and the public from risks associated with non-compliant or unsafe installations, particularly during severe weather events.

APUA's assessment has identified a number of unregistered renewable energy systems; to include battery systems, which poses a significant safety risk. Owners of such systems are urged to contact APUA's Customer Service Department to begin the registration process immediately. Failure to comply may lead to APUA taking lawful measures to protect its employees, customers and its grid stability.

Four UWI FIC students receive scholarship bursaries to continue studies

Two students from the University of the West Indies Five Islands Campus were the recipients of scholarships from the Antigua Rotary Club to continue their studies at the institution.

The two students – Pia Nichols who is pursuing a degree programme in Business Management and Lauria Lewis, whose programme of study is in Computer Science and Artificial Intelligence – received a combined \$10,000.00 bursary to continue their studies at the UWI FIC.

Speaking at the ceremony on Wednesday, Director of Administration, Hyram Forde, said the university follows the Triple Helix model where government, private sector and academia combine efforts to fund the operations of a university.

"Many universities around the world cannot thrive unless they have a stakeholder involvement that would be making constant contributions to its existence.

"The renowned Harvard University has boasted of having an endowment of US\$50 billion giving them that ability to fund their operations



well into the future. Very early in the game, FIC espoused this Triple Helix model and I have to say that the Rotary Club of Antigua was arguably the first entity to come forward and to make a contribution," he reported.

He thanked the Antigua Rotary Club for its partnership with the university and its unwavering support for its tenets and programmes. He noted too that the UWI FIC decided from the onset to pursue some niche programmes and this is one reason why it's the first campus within the UWI



system to offer studies in Artificial Intelligence.

President of the Antigua Rotary Club, Michael Spencer, said the Club takes seriously its responsibility to assist the community where it exists. "Education is the cornerstone of progress, and these scholars represent a very bright future for Antigua and Barbuda We believe in your potential to make meaningful contributions to the society and we are honoured to support you in your academic journey," he told Nichols and Lewis.

Meanwhile two other students received bursaries through a new scholarship programme presented by business woman, Dr. Vanettta Rodgers. Although the amount was not disclosed, the two students were the first recipients of the UWI FIC Dr. Vanetta Rodgers Award. They are Shahein Fitspatrick and Diana Triana.

Dr. Rodgers said she intends to make the award an annual presentation to assist needy students complete their programme of studies at the university. Fitzpatrick said receiving the award 'fueled' him because of challenges he has encountered in his life, but his message to other students is simply, never give up!

CSME Standby Facility.

The Project aims to reach and inspire diverse audiences to consider TVET as a pathway to rewarding careers while promoting development professional as well as contributing to a competitive workforce. The Ministry of Education, AB-NTA and ABICE will engage with students, learners, educational institutions and industry representatives to raise awareness of the TVET courses, qualifications, and training institutions across Antigua and Barbuda.

Barbuda from the EPA and paign, is the launch of AB-NTA and new TVET website, a central hub designed to empower individuals with information and resources on TVET opportunities in Antigua Barbuda. The website, which will be made publicly available in the coming weeks, will act as a one-stop destination for exploring vocational pathways, accessing training programs, and learning about ABNTA and commitment to promoting TVET initiatives.

"TVET serves as a powerful catalyst for economic development and social mobility.

In an increasingly competitive global economy, nations such as ours must leverage their human capital to drive innovation and productivity," stated Ileathea Cabral, Project Coordinator (ONAO). "We must recognize and embrace the invaluable role that TVET plays in shaping our societies and economies," she noted.

The Standby Facility is a EUR 8.75 million resource managed by the Caribbean Development Bank, which offers opportunities to 15 Caribbean economies to grow trade, deepen integration and economic involvement, impact competitiveness, enhance market access and exports by implementing targeted projects in thematic areas.

Local News May is Stroke Awareness month

May is designated as Stroke Awareness Month, aiming to raise awareness about the symptoms and risk factors of stroke, which are largely preventable with lifelong control of risk factors, particularly high blood pressure.

At its 5th Annual Cardiac Symposium in February, the Heart and Stroke Foundation brought together experts and professionals to discuss groundinsights breaking into stroke prevention.

Consultant Neurologist, Dr. Gaden Osbourne, a prominent figure at the symposium, emphasized the significance of primordial prevention in his address on 'Stroke Care in Antigua and Barbuda.'

"While we address various aspects of stroke prevention, I must emphasize primordial prevention - the proactive approach of promoting a healthy lifestyle among individuals without existing risk factors," said Dr. Osbourne.

The key takeaways from the symposium remain: the importance of taking proactive steps to prevent stroke occurrence and promptly recogniz-





ing its signs. Individuals should be prepared to act swiftly if they or someone around them experience any of the following symptoms:

F - Face Drooping: Is one side of the face drooping or numb?

A - Arm Weakness: Is one arm weak or numb? Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?

S - Speech Difficulty: Is speech slurred, or is the person unable to speak or hard to understand?

T - Time to Call 911: If someone shows any of these symptoms, even if the symptoms go away, call emergency services immediately. Time is crucial in treating a stroke.

Dr. Osborne underscored the Stroke quadrangle, comprising: surveillance, prevention, acute care, and rehabilitation, especially for individuals in advanced age.

"In our pursuit of preventing strokes and severe disabilities, primary prevention plays an important role.

"Identifying and controlling risk factors is instrumental in averting strokes from occurring in the first place," Dr. Osborne further explained.

Dr. Osborne encourages a "grassroots approach" to stroke prevention, urging individuals to take charge of their health by adopting a proper diet, reducing fast food consumption, increasing intake of fruits and vegetables, staying hydrated, and engaging in regular physical activity.

These lifestyle changes, when implemented, can significantly reduce the risk of cardiovascular disease and stroke.

The Heart and Stroke Foundation continues to lead the way in promoting proactive and comprehensive approaches to combat heart disease and strokes.

Grenada begins 90-day firearms amnesty

The Government of Grenada has announced the commencement of its firearms amnesty from May 1, 2024, ending at 12 am on July 30, 2024.

The government reminds that any person who satisfies the conditions specified in section 4 of the Firearms Order (Gazetted April 29, 2024) will be granted the relief specified under section 51A of the Act, referred to as "the firearms amnesty".

The aim of the amnesty is to lessen the potential for the commission of violent crimes and firearms-related incidents by reducing the number of firearms and ammunition circulating illegally in the State of Grenada.

In furtherance of this objective, the Government believes that declaring a firearms amnesty is one of the approaches which may help to achieve the stated objectives.

The Firearms Amnesty Act provides an opportunity for individuals to surrender firearms, firearms-related items, and ammunition without fear of prosecution. During the designated period, individuals can turn in these items at designated drop-off locations, no questions asked.

Here are the conditions of the Amnesty:

1. During the period specified the firearm or ammunition should be surrendered:

(a) at any police station, to the officer in charge or the officer on duty; or

(b) at the office of the Royal Grenada Police Force Headquarters, to an officer designated by the Commissioner of Police for that purpose.

2. A person shall not be required to disclose his or her identity or any information when surrendering a firearm or ammunition and no details of the person who surrendered the said firearm or ammunition shall be recorded. 3. An attorney-at-law may surrender a firearm or ammunition on behalf of a person seeking a firearms amnesty in accordance with the Act.

The government says by offering a safe and anonymous way to relinquish firearms, the Firearms Amnesty Act aims to reduce the risk of firearm-related crimes, and tragic incidents of violence in our communities.

"We believe that every firearm surrendered through this amnesty programme represents a potential life saved and one less gun on the street," said Prime Minister and Minister for National Security Dickon Mitchell. "Our priority is the safety and well-being of our citizens, and this initiative is a proactive step towards achieving that goal."

The amnesty is part of a comprehensive approach to addressing gun violence and promoting community safety.

Sudden announcement of a prime minister divides Haiti's new council

A surprise announcement that revealed Haiti's new prime minister is threatening to fracture a recently installed transitional council tasked with choosing new leaders for the gang-riddled Caribbean country.

Four of seven council members with voting powers said Tuesday that they had chosen Fritz Bélizaire as prime minister, taking many Haitians aback with their declaration and unexpected political alliance.

The council members who oppose Bélizaire, who served as Haiti's sports minister during the second presidency of René Préval from 2006 to 2011, are now weighing options including fighting the decision or resigning from the council.

A person with direct knowledge of the situation who did not want to be identified because negotiations are ongoing said the council's political accord had been violated by the unexpected move and that some council members are considering other choices as potential prime minister.

The council on Tuesday was scheduled to hold an election and choose its president. But two hours and a profuse apology later, one council member said that not only a council president had been chosen, but a prime minister as well. Murmurs rippled through the room.

The Montana Accord, a civil society group represented by a council member with voting powers, denounced in a statement late Tuesday what it called a "complot" hatched by four council members against the Haitian people "in the middle of the night."

"The political and economic mafia forces have decided to take control of the presidential council and the government so that they can continue to control the state," the Montana Accord said.

Haitian politics have long been characterised by secretive dealings, but many worry the country cannot afford further political instability as gangs lay siege to the capital of Port-au-Prince and not sit on the council. His party, Pitit Desalin, is repre-

"People change parties (like) they're changing their shirts," said François Pierre-Louis, a professor of political science at Queens College in New York and former Haitian politician.

He spoke during an online webinar on Tuesday evening.

Like others, he said he believed that Jean-Charles Moïse, a powerful politician who was a former senator and presidential candidate, was behind Bélizaire's nomination.

"Interestingly, Moïse, of all the politicians there, is the one calling the shots," Pierre-Louis said.

Moïse, however, does

not sit on the council. His party, Pitit Desalin, is represented by Emmanuel Vertilaire, who is among the four council members who support Bélizaire.

The others are Louis Gérald Gilles, Smith Augustin and Edgard Leblanc Fils, the council's new president.

They could not be immediately reached for comment.

Fils represents the January 30 political group, which is made up of parties including PHTK, whose members include former President Michel Martelly and slain President Jovenel Moïse. Meanwhile, Augustin represents the EDE/RED political party, founded by former Prime *cont'd on pg 16*

China highway collapse kills 24 people

Twenty-four people have died after a section of a mountainside highway collapsed in China's Guangdong province, following days of heavy rain.

Thirty others were taken to hospital after a 17.9m (58 feet) stretch of the Meilong expressway crumbled at 02:10 local time (19:10 BST) on Wednesday.

Authorities have yet to state the cause of the incident.

Images on state media showed a massive gash in the forested mountainside below the highway.

Henry was on an official visit to Kenya to push for the UN-backed deployment of a police force from the East African country when gangs in Haiti launched coordinated attacks starting February 29.

They have burned police stations, opened fire on the main international airport that remains closed since early March and stormed Haiti's two biggest prisons, releasing more than 4,000 inmates. The violence continues unabat-

ed in certain parts of Port-au-Prince, including the area around the National Palace.

Haitians are demanding that security be a top priority for the council, which is tasked with selecting a new prime minister and Cabinet, as well as prepare for eventual general elections.

But some Haitians are wary of the council and the decisions it's taking.

Jean Selcé, a 57-year-old electrician, noted that most of the council members are longtime politicians: "Their past is not really positive."

"I hope their mentality can change, but I don't believe it will," he said. "They don't really love the country. Who's dying right now? It's Haitians like me."

Robert Fatton, a Haitian politics expert at the University of Virginia, noted that some of the parties represented on the council are responsible for the current chaos in Haiti.

"It's a contradiction," he said. "Every time we seem to be in a crisis, we reappoint the same people and hope that they change their ways, but they do not."

Raising the same criticism is Michael Deibert, author of "Notes From the Last Testament: The Struggle for Haiti," and "Haiti Will Not Perish: A Recent History."

He noted in a recent essay that the council is "dominated by the same political currents who have spent the last 25 years driving Haiti over a cliff, taking advantage of impoverished young men in the slums to be used as political bludgeons before - bloated on the proceeds from kidnapping, extortion, drug trafficking and other criminal enterprises - these groups outgrew the necessity of their patrons."

More than 2,500 people have been killed or injured across Haiti from January to March, according to the UN.

In addition, more than 90,000 people have fled Port-au-Prince in just one month given the relentless gang violence.

Brazil floods: Residents stranded on rooftops in Rio Grande do Sul

At least 10 people have died and more than 20 are missing after storms caused flooding in the southern Brazilian state of Rio Grande do Sul.

Helicopters are flying over the region searching for people who have been left stranded.

In some areas, the flooding is so severe that helicopters have been unable to land and have had to winch residents to safety.

The state's governor has asked the federal government for help.

"President Lula, please immediately send as much air support as possible for RS [Rio Grande do Sul]. We need to rescue hundreds of people in dozens of municipalities who are in an emergency due to the intense rain which has already fallen and which is going to continue falling in

coming days," Governor Eduardo Leite wrote on X, formerly known as Twitter.

President Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva responded, saying that the federal government would "join the efforts of state government and municipalities to get through this difficult time, which is the result of climate change affecting the planet".

10 people were killed. Two people died when the car they were in was swept away by the floodwaters in the small town of Paverama. Another died in a landslide in Salvador do Sul.

Twenty-one people are still missing, and around 1,500 people are stranded.

"We continue to work hard to locate the missing and ensure the safety of communities in at-risk areas," Mr Leite said.

The mayor of Sinimbu told the G1 news site that her town was living

In Candelária, residents took to the roofs of their homes as their houses filled with water.

Bridges have collapsed and more than 20 streets rendered impassable, making it hard for emergency services to reach the affected areas.

Meteorologists have predicted further rains to fall in the region as a cold front moves across it.

Last year, more than 30 people were killed in a cyclone in Rio Grande do Sul.

Brazil's National Institute of Meteorology attributed the increased intensity and frequency of rainfall to the climate phenomenon El Niño.

died but local authorities later said 24 people had been killed, with the number of injured persons still at 30.

Footage that appeared to have been taken shortly after the collapse showed flames and black smoke billowing from below the highway.

A total of 20 vehicles fell into the collapsed portion of the road, authorities said.

Another video carried by state media showed a smoking pile of charred cars partially covered in mud.

Guangdong, China's most populous

province, was hit with flash floods last week that killed four people and displaced 110.000 others.

The floods also damaged dozens of houses, shut schools and caused flight cancellations and delays. Authorities have estimated economic losses of 140.6m yuan (\$19.4m; £15.5m).

The wild weather continued over the weekend, when a tornado ravaged a factory district in the provincial capital of Guangzhou, killing five people and wounding 33 others. Hailstones the size of golf balls were also seen raining down on the city.

In a dazzling display of power hitting, Johnson Charles led the charge for West Indies A with a spectacular unbeaten 119 from just 61 balls, guiding the Caribbean team to a commanding 76-run victory over Nepal and taking a 2-1 lead in the T20 series in Kirtipur on Tuesday.

Charles' explosive innings included 13 fours and seven sixes, as he anchored the West Indies A

Nortje makes international return for South Africa's T20 World Cup squad

Anrich Nortje earned a recall to South Africa's fold as he was included in the Proteas' 15-man squad for the T20 World Cup.

Nortje has been in action in the Indian Premier League (IPL), but has not played for South Africa, who will be captained by Aiden Markram, in nine months.

While he has taken seven wickets in six matches for the Delhi Capitals, Nortje has gone at 13.36 runs per over, but has been given the nod due to his pace.

"Anrich has got another month before the World Cup starts so I have no doubt he'll hit his straps," South Africa coach Rob Walter said.

"It's good to see that his speed is up. The one thing Anrich has that separates him from others is raw pace. There's not many guys who can bowl 150kph and he can. Pace is an X-fac-

tor."

Lungi Ngidi has missed out, though he is a travelling reserve. Quinton de Kock has not been in good form, but has made the cut due to historical performances.

He is no longer under contract at Cricket South Africa (CSA) and retired from ODIs last year.

"Quinny, we've seen him do it time and time again for us," Walter said.

"Reeza [Hendricks] has been a star performer for us in T20 cricket, was a standout in this domestic CSA T20 challenge again, and Ryan Rickelton has had two outstanding competitions really where he's played the brand of cricket that we're looking to play.

"And then we're going to have Markram and that'll be the top order. It's mostly a performance-based decision and from Quinton's point of view is just a real knowledge of what he's capable of."

Rickelton and Ottniel Baartman have been standout performers in the SA20 this year, and could earn their maiden T20I caps. South Africa did not make it out of the Super 12 stage at the last World Cup in 2022.

Three big players, Temba Bavuma, Rilee Rossouw and Wayne Parnell, have missed out compared to the squad for that tournament.

The Proteas start their World Cup campaign against Sri Lanka on June 3, after playing a warm-up series against the West Indies.

Marsh, who has shared the duties on an interim basis since Aaron Finch's retirement, was named Australia's permanent T20 skipper on Wednesday.

Test captain Pat Cummins, fast bowler Mitchell Starc, and Glenn Maxwell have also been named in the squad, which features 11 of the players that were part of the team that won this tournament in 2021.

However, there is no place for former skipper Smith following a difficult spell of form, while Fraser-McGurk is also absent despite his impressive form in the Indian Premier League.

"This is an experienced squad with extensive World Cup experience that offers a variety of structures and covers the scenarios the pan-
