A&B inspires action from the international community on NCDs and Mental Health

Antigua and Barbuda's influence on the world stage was on full display Tuesday, as the international community overwhelmingly responded to its call to come together to address the issue of Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs), which has emerged as a major socioeconomic burden on many small states.

The Global Group of Heads of State and Government for the prevention and control of NCDs meeting was co-sponsored by the Government of Antigua and Barbuda and the World Health Organisation. Joining the Antigua and Barbuda Prime Minister Gaston Browne as co-chairs in leading the proceedings were the Deputy Secretary General of the United Na-

tions Amina J. Mohammed and Director General of the World Health Organisation (WHO) Dr. Tedros Adhanom Gebreyesus.

Joining Prime Minister Browne was Antigua and Barbuda's Minister of Health Sir Molwyn Joseph, who has emerged as a tireless advocate for the prevention and control measures against those illnesses that constitute NCDs to include stroke, diabetes, high blood pressure and heart disease. Also in attendance was Antigua and Barbuda's Permanent Representative to the United Nations, Ambassador Walton Webson.

The meeting, held on the margins of the 79th General Assembly of the United Nations, comes as preparations are



being made for the 4th UN High Level meeting on the prevention and control of NCDs in 2025.

In sharing his vision and optimism for a future where NCDs are no longer a major worry for not only Antigua and Barbuda but island nations around the globe,

Prime Minister Browne spoke of the meaningful gains his country has been making.

"My government has invested considerable resources in combating the devastating impact and cost of NCDs on our population and our economy including diabetes, hypertension, and cancer," he informed colleagues around the table.

"In this regard, with the support of PAHO and WHO, Antigua and Barbuda anticipates eliminating cervical cancer by 2030. To this end we have instituted cervical cancer screening at the community clinic level," Prime Minister Browne revealed.

Prime Minister Browne also seized the opportunity to shift the attention of the *cont'd on pg 3*

Both prime ministers will address the General Assembly of the UN on Friday afternoon, during which they will continue to champion the need for special and differential treatment for Small Island Developing States. Both leaders have also been strong advocates for the removal of the US embargo on the sister nation of Cuba which has been a benefactor of both

Also coming in for praise was Antigua and Barbuda's First Secretary at the Antigua and Barbuda Mission in New York Claxton Duberry who collaborated with the various offices across the UN system, the Prime Minister's Office and the Ministry of Health in Antigua and Barbuda in coordinating the event and en-

suring that it was a resounding success.

Other members of the Mission in attendance were Deputy Permanent Representative to the United Nations Tumasie Blair and Counsellor Glentis Thomas.

Climate Ambassador Ruleta Camacho Thomas, who has been attending bilateral meetings and other activities of the UN General Assembly with Sir Molwyn, was also present.

FA Minister navigates heavy schedule of engagements at UN General Assembly

Antigua and Barbuda's Minister of Foreign Affairs and Trade E.P Chet Greene has completed another busy round of engagements at the United Nations General Assembly as he represented the country's position on a number of crucial matters that are receiving global attention.

On Wednesday, Minister Greene was in attendance at a meeting convened by the United States to discuss the situation in Haiti where armed gangs have literally taken over the capital of the French-speaking Caribbean country. Leading the discussions at the meeting, which was held under



the theme "Building progress to restore peace in Haiti" was the American Secretary of State, Antony Blinken.

Also in attendance were Minister Greene's Ministerial counterparts from a number of CARICOM countries to include Jamaica, the Bahamas, Trinidad and Tobago, Suriname, Belize, Guyana as well as African, European and Latin American countries.

His diplomatic tour de force continued where he addressed a meeting of the G20, a grouping of some of the world's richest countries. Minister Greene brought attention to a glaring omission in their report on the "Call to Action on Global Governance Report."

"Alarmingly, this "Call to Action" contains only a solitary mention of climate change, and entirely omits references to Small Island Developing States. This must be glaring oversight, correct?" Minister Greene queried

The Minister of Foreign Affairs also delivered remarks at two other major events – a multi stakeholder panel on the legal dimensions of sea level rise and a crucial side event themed, United by Water: Securing Our Collective Water Future Amidst Rising Seas and Melting Glaciers.

On Tuesday, the Foreign Minister attended a bilateral meeting with Azerbaijan, which will be hosting the global climate summit, COP29, later this year. He was joined by Antigua and Barbuda's Minister of the Environment Sir Molwyn Joseph in pressing home the needs of island states, especially coming after the historic role Antigua and Barbuda played in bringing to life the 10-year framework for Small Island Development States known as the ABAS.

Minister Greene was also encouraged by the bilateral discussions with the Philippines. He emphasized his eagerness to strengthen ties between their countries, where the shared experiences as island nations could help in fostering closer collaboration in the maritime sector, renewable energy, and tourism.

With the high level portion of the United Nations General Assembly in full swing, Minister Greene has a few more packed days ahead of him as he continues the work of building positive and mutually beneficial relations for Antigua and Barbuda with the international community

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Re-establishment of the "Authentic Antigua and Barbuda" retail outlet

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Barbuda Affairs held dual approach consultation sessions aimed at providing insights into support initiatives available to propel the growth and development of MSMEs in Antigua and Barbuda and gathering feedback to guide the reestablishment of the "Authentic Antigua and Barbuda" retail outlet in Heritage Quay.

The sessions took place on September 12, 2024, at the Conference room, Deep Water Harbor, bringing together project participants who are local producers, artisans, and key partners to engage in discussions that will shape the future of this project.

The event comprised of a panel discussion themed "Support Initiatives for MSMES" (Medium, Small and Micro Enterprises), where key stakeholders from local business support organizations participated. This session was moderated by Senior Trade Policy Analyst within the Ministry of Trade, Jomica Carbon, who also serves as Project Coordinator for the Authentic Antigua Retail Outlet Project.

Panelists briefly presented on initiatives such as "Dadli Buy" an e-commerce platform for producers of local goods and services, Authentic Antigua Certification Program, concessions and subsidies offered by the Antigua and Barbuda Investment Authority and training programs for youth, women and the vulnerable offered by the G.A.R.D Center.

The second segment of the program entailed a feedback session aimed at gathering insights from existing vendors on the project's performance and recommendations that would feed into the strategic plan for re-establishing the retail space. Both segments were met with enthusiasm as MSME representatives engaged in vi-

brant discussions on the areas presented and welcomed the various forms of support.

During the session, a questionnaire was administered where the findings suggested satisfaction with the project's performance and strongly recommended that greater emphasis be placed on marketing not only to cruise ship passengers and hotel guests but also to returning locals. The consultation served as an essential platform for stakeholders to share their insights, concerns, and innovative ideas for the revitalization of the store, which is intended to be a hub for local entrepreneurship, creative expression, and economic growth.

Authentic Antigua and Barbuda was launched in 2017 as part of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Barbuda Affair's mandate to support the growth and development of MS-MEs on the verge of expansion with export potential. The project provides support by featuring the products of local producers, who meet the Ministry's specified criteria in a retail outlet in Heritage Quay.

With keen efforts lead by Ambassador Clarence Pilgrim and supported by Senior Trade Policy Analyst, Carbon and Retail Outlet Manager, Beverly Samuel, received the approval of the Cabinet of Antigua and Barbuda to revisit this initiative to execute its restructuring and reestablishment.

The Ministry has set a target of date in November 2024 to resume full operation with an imminent call for expressions of interest from producers of local goods that reflect the culture, heritage, and craftsmanship of our twin-island nation.



Local abattoir upgraded with help from People's Republic of China

The government-owned and operated abattoir, located near the Sir Vivian Richards Stadium, has been upgraded through assistance provided by the government of the People's Republic of China.

Over the past two months, teams from the Chinese company, China Civil Engineering Construction Company (CCECC) carried out general upgrade and improvements at the facility.

They painted the walls,

both inside and outside, carried out repairs to the floor, installed new equipment and refurbished others as well as carried out repairs to the two large chillers used to store the meats.

They also repaired the holding area which were seriously decayed as well as repaired the fans that are essential for the chillers to operate.

Operations Supervisor at the abattoir, Chad Williams, said the upgrades



will make a big difference in the overall efficiency and effectiveness of the abattoir. "We welcome the work done by our Chinese friends as the equipment that they installed will mechanize much of our operations. Prior to this, we had to rely on manpower to de-hair the pigs after slaughter as well as to cut the slaughtered animals, including cattle, pigs and goats, into smaller pieces," Williams explained.

According to Williams the holding pens were parcont'd on pg 7







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ticularly in dire need of repairs because they had deteriorated badly over the years. "Some of the pens were in a poor state of disrepair to the point where they were no longer useful. The Chinese came and re-welded and repaired them to where today the pens are fully functional," he added.

The CCECC teams also cleared the drains leading from the abattoir which allows for the waste water from the operations of the facility to drain away unhindered.

Deputy General Manager of the CCECC Caribbean, Jay Wang, said his company is pleased to be able to assist with the much needed repairs and retro-fitting of the abattoir as the expectation is for the overall efficiency of the facility to improve exponentially.

Williams further explained that

the abattoir processes an average of fifteen animals per week but with the new equipment and the storage facilities that number should rise sharply.

Two members of the Chinese Embassy were on hand to inspect the work; they were Director of Econom-



ic and Commercial Affairs, Claudia Chang, and Third Secretary of the Chinese Embassy, Emily Ai Hongfei.





Alleged robber in August 15 shootout with police makes first court appearance

Eighteen-year old (18), Koeina Joseph of Cooks Extension has been remanded in prison until December 4, 2024, following his first court appearance for charges stemming from the August 15 shootout with the police, during which one of his alleged accomplices died.

Joseph, who was wounded in the shootout, was released from the hospital on Tuesday and brought before Magistrate Ngaio Emanuel of District B on Wednesday.

He faces charges of robbery while being armed with a firearm and robbing Calt Mini Mart of Parham of the sum of \$2,000.00. His is charged with breaching Section 33 of the Larceny Act of the Revised Laws of Antigua and Barbuda, 1992. He also faces a charge the unlawful possession of one 9mm ammunition when not licensed to do so; and, for making use of a firearm in the furtherance of the commission of a crime to wit robbery contrary to the Firearms Act, Chapter 171 of the Revised Laws of Antigua and Barbu-

Three persons were involved in the robbery and they drove away in

a motor vehicle, but when the report and the description of the vehicle were communicated via the police communications channels, a police patrol vehicle intercepted the vehicle and in attempted to apprehend the alleged culprits, they reportedly opened gunfire at the police.

In responding to the gunfire, the police reported that they took action to defend themselves and in the process Joseph was wounded on the scene and take to the hospital. One accomplish died on the spot while the other was taken into custody.

The crime was believed to have been committed sometime between April 1st and September 22, 2024.

He was charged with the attempted murder of Ovid Lewis at Ferris Farm in the St. Paul's Parish, as well as false imprisonment of Abigail Lewis and Kamar Lewis in contravention of the Offences Against the Person Act. These incidents took place on September 29, 2023, at Ferris Farm in St. Paul.

The DPP decided not to proceed further with the case as Campbell is said to be in poor health. He however has been ordered to be deported back to Jamaica.

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Sharp rise in problematic teenage social media use, study says

A major international study suggests there has been a sharp rise in what it calls "problematic" social media use among young people since the pandemic.

Researchers came to the conclusion after surveying almost 280,000 children aged 11, 13 and 15 across 44 countries.

The Health Behaviour In Schoolaged Children (HBSC) study found, on average, 11% of respondents engaged with social media in a problematic way in 2022 - compared to 7% in 2018.

England, Scotland and Wales all recorded figures above that average.

The report's authors say the findings "raise urgent concerns about the impact of digital technology on the mental health and well-being of Europe's youth".

They say more action is needed to "promote healthy online behaviours."

"Problematic use is most common amongst 13-year-olds - it sort of peaks in that early adolescence phase and girls are more likely to report problematic social media use than boys," said the study's international co-ordinator Dr Jo Inchley, from the University of Glasgow.

She said the research also revealed how much time young people spend online.

"Across the study as a whole, we found just over a third of adolescents report continuous online contact with friends and others," she said.

"That means almost all the time throughout the day they are connected online to friends and other people."

The report does not conclude all that time spent online is detrimental.

Instead, teenagers who were heavy, but not problematic, users of social media reported stronger peer support and social connections.



But for the "problematic" minority it found social media use was associated with addiction-like symptoms including:

- neglect of other activities in favour of spending time on social media
 - frequent arguments about use
- lying about how much time is spent online
- an inability to control social media use and experiencing withdrawal

It also highlights concerns about the proportion of teenagers considered to be at risk of "problematic gaming" - something it suggests applies to boys more than girls.

That designation applied to 15% of teenagers in England - the second highest proportion across all countries studied.

The average proportion of boys who played daily was 46%, but this figure stood at 52% in England and 57% in Scotland.

And 13-year-old boys in England reported the highest rate of long gaming sessions, with 45% of boys of that age indicating that they played for at least four hours on gaming days.

The study has been published by the European arm of the World Health Organisation (WHO).

Dr Hans Henri P Kluge, the WHO's regional director for Europe, said the findings made clear social media could have both positive and negative consequences for young people.

He said there needed to be more "digital literacy education" to help young people develop a healthy approach to being online, and governments, health authorities, teachers and parents all had to play their part.

"It's clear we need immediate and sustained action to help adolescents turn the tide on potentially damaging social media use, which has been shown to lead to depression, bullying, anxiety, and poor academic performance," he said.

Ben Carter, Professor of Medical Statistics at the Institute of Psychiatry, Psychology & Neuroscience, described the report as a "useful snapshot of the evidence".

But he pointed out it was difficult to agree on a definition of what "problematic social media" was, making gathering data on it challenging.

Nonetheless, he said the study was a "valid contribution to the evidence base".

Australia's lithium mining boom hit by sagging prices

Often called "white gold" and the key component in rechargeable batteries, the metal lithium is so light that it floats on water, but its price has sunk like a stone over the past year.

Due to a combination of falling global sales of electric vehicles, and a world oversupply of lithium ore, the cost of the main lithium compound has fallen by more than three quarters since June 2023.

This decline has had a particularly hard impact on Australia, because it is the world's largest producer of lithium ore, accounting for 52% of the global total last year.

Australia also has the second-largest reserves of the mineral after Chile, with the vast majority in Western Australia, and a smaller amount in the Northern Territory.

The sharp decline in lithium prices has led to mine shutdowns. Adelaide-based Core Lithium announced back in January that due to "weak market conditions" it was suspending mining at its Finniss site near Darwin, with the loss of 150 jobs.

Then in August, US firm Albemarle said it would be scaling back production at its Kemerton lithium processing plant, located some 170km (100 miles) south of Perth. This is expected to lead to more than 300 redundancies.

Arcadium Lithium followed suit this month, announcing that it would be mothballing its Mt Cattlin mine in Western Australia, blaming low prices. The firm's shares are listed in both the US and Australia.

Yet as some producers are putting work on hold, others are expanding theirs, confident that global demand for lithium - and prices - will bounce

back.

Pilbara Minerals is one such firm. The Perth-based miner aims to boost its lithium ore production by an additional 50% over the next year.

"What we've learned historically from lithium pricing is that it can change, and it can change rapidly," managing director Dale Henderson recently told ABC News. "It doesn't faze us that much because we know the long-term outlook is fantastic."

This confidence is echoed by Kingsley Jones, founder, and chief investment officer at Canberra-based investment firm Jevons Global, which monitors the mining and metals sectors. "Lithium remains very strategic to the energy transition," he tells the BBC.

"Storage batteries for electricity is a big growth area," he adds, pointing to the increased need for batteries to store the power generated by solar and wind power.

But some analysts have warned that oversupply will keep the market under pressure until at least 2028.

Another company moving ahead

with increased lithium ore production in Australia is Perth-based Liontown Resources. In July, it started production at its Kathleen Valley mine, located 420 miles (680km) north-east of Western Australia's capital.

The facility gets 60% of its energy from its own solar panel farm.

Australia's Minister for Climate Change and Energy, Chris Bowen, has praised the site's green approach, and his government has invested \$A230m (\$156m; £118m) in the facility.

This move towards the use of renewables is also good news in financial terms for producers in Australia, as it reduces their dependence on buying expensive diesel, which is currently the main fuel that they use to generate electricity.

Extracting lithium ore in the country requires three times more energy than in other big producing nations such as Chile and Argentina, says Prof Rick Valenta, the director of the Sustainable Minerals Institute at the University of Queensland.

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additional energy because the lithium ore, also known as spodumene, has to be mined and removed from solid rock. Whereas in Chile and Argentina the ore is produced by evaporating it from brine collected from under the countries' vast salt plains.

"As Australia has hardrock mining operations, they use more energy and produce more emissions than brine operations," Prof Valenta adds.

The form of lithium that Australia exports – almost all of which goes to China – is partially processed ore, called spodumene concentrate.

Prices of this have mirrored the sharp fall of refined lithium. One report this month said that the price of spodumene had hit its lowest level since August 2021. Chinese companies refine the spodumene into solid lithium, and into the two lithium compounds used in batteries - lithium hydroxide and lithium carbonate.

This is where the real money is to be made, because a tonne of lithium carbonate is currently around 72,500 yuan (\$10,280; £7,720) compared with just \$747 (£630) for the same weight of spodumene concentrate.

Given that price differential, Australian mining firms have unsurprisingly been moving to build their own lithium refineries instead of just exporting almost all spodumene, as is

the case currently. In 2022-23, 98% was exported as spodumene concentrate.

The first refined lithium to be commercially produced in Australia happened back in 2022, when Perthbased IGO announced that it was making battery-grade lithium hydroxide at its Kwinana Refinery in Western Australia. It co-owns the facility with Chinese firm Tianqi Lithium.

Meanwhile, another Australian miner, Covalent Lithium, is building its own lithium refinery, also in Western Australia. And Albemarle has its refinery, albeit one currently reducing its output.

Some commentators welcome the development of lithium refining in Australia, saying it will help to reduce China's dominance of the global market for the metal. China currently accounts for 60% of all lithium refining.

However, Kingsley Jones says that Australia needs to be more open to embracing Chinese investment in the lithium sector. He points out that the Australian government has, in his view, "adopted a strategy, we think unwisely, to preference investment from countries other than China" in the lithium sector in recent years.

This has come as relations between the two countries have cooled since 2020. Last year, Canberra even blocked the sale of an Australian lithium miner to a Chinese firm.

The government said at the time that it was simply following the advice of the country's Foreign Investment Review Board.

Mr Jones adds: "It's an excellent example of how to shoot yourself in the foot as a producer. You tell the biggest buyer to go away. So, they do."

Australia's Department of Industry, Science and Resources did not respond to a request for a comment.

As Australia aims to become more of a lithium refiner, government scientists are continuing to research ways to do this in a more environmentally friendly way. A code, which if cracked, could make the country one of the greenest producers of the metal. Currently the pro-

cess releases a lot of poisonous chlorine gas.

"There is only one industrial method, and it has several drawbacks," says Dongmei Liu, a research scientist at Australia's national science agency, the CSIRO.

"The process is very expensive and not very efficient. Most importantly, it also produces chlorine gas. It has severe environmental issues."

She and her team are instead working on a new process called "shock quenching". It involves the extreme cooling of lithium vapour, and Dr Lui says it "avoids the chlorine gas emissions".

While Australia hopes to make its mineral industries less polluting, it also wants to recycle more.

Lithium Australia is a listed company that sorts and processes batteries that have come to the end of their lives, to extract their lithium and other metals for reuse.

"Global commodities prices place economic pressure on lithium, so creating a circular battery industry will benefit Australia by ensuring we have the sovereign capability to produce and recycle our own batteries," says Lithium Australia chief executive Simon Linge.

"If Australia is to establish a battery manufacturing industry, we must first ensure that no end-of-life lithium battery is being sent to landfill or exported to be recycled in some other country."

Suriname urges international community to do more to help Haiti

CMC - Suriname Wednesday told the international community that "Haiti fatigue" is not an option and urged countries to provide more assistance as efforts continue to restore peace and security in the French-speaking Caribbean Community (CARICOM) country.

Addressing the 79th session of the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA), Suriname President Chandrikapersad "Chan" Santokhi, praised the 15-member regional integration grouping, CARICOM, for its on-going role in bringing stability to the country.

"We are pleased to note through the Caribbean Community a roadmap towards free and fair elections has been initiated and a transitional government with a clear mandate has been installed".

Haiti has been without an elected head of state since July 7, 2021 when President Jovenel Moise was assassinated at his private residence overlooking the capital, Port au Prince.

Since then, criminal gangs have sought to overthrow the interim administration and last October the United Nations Security Council approved a resolution allowing for a Kenya led Multinational Security Support (MSS) Mission to provide much-needed respite to the Haitian people.

"We cannot leave Haiti and its people alone and behind. Haiti fatigue is not an option. We urge the international community to financially and technologically support Haiti on its path forward," Santokhi told the global community.

He said Suriname will contribute to the MSS "in whatever way we can.

"We urge and call for a more effective and coherent approach and the transparent sharing of informa-

tion regarding the different initiative to serve...the objective of facilitating peace, security and prosperity in Haiti and the Haitian people".

Santokhi in his wide-ranging speech also called for an end to the decades old trade and economic embargo by the United States against Cuba.

"Leaving no one behind should also include lifting the long-standing economic embargo against Cuba and its people," he said, urging the need to foster greater collaboration and partnerships to address the long-term global issues as climate change, social inequality and access to affordable health care and quality education for all.

He said small nations also needed support for digital transformation to fully integrate into the digital global economy.

In his address, Santokhi said that Suriname is now emerging from a tight economic situation that in the past had hampered the Dutch-speaking country from generating its own development.

He said new measures by international banks and others in the international financial sector did not consider the country's reality and the severe impact on the development objectives.

"This must be addressed head on if you want to be inclusive rather than exclusive. My country Suriname can attest to the importance of urgent needs from the global financial and political systems and to build greater trust in the multilateral system.

"Because of our ranking, we are not eligible for several global financial instruments to the detriment of my people. Since taking office in July 2020, my government has successfully started a policy of financial economic reforms including restructuring the debt portfolio supported by an IMF programme and international financial institutions.

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Dominica: Opposition party taking action against government over CBI

CMC - Dominica's main opposition United Workers Party (UWP) says it is taking legal action against the Dominica government over the controversial Citizenship by Investment Programme (CBI).

Under the CBI, foreign investors are provided with citizenship of the island in return for making substantial investments in the socio-economic development of Dominica.

Attorney General Levi Peter told the state-owned DBS radio that he would respond to the matter as soon as documentation from the court is available.

Flanked by several people, including the former attorney general of Trinidad and Tobago, Senior Counsel Anand Ramlogan, UWP president, Lennox Linton, told a news conference that the decision to pursue the legal action was not an easy undertaking.

"Deciding to take legal action against the government of the state is never easy especially for patriotic organizations driven first and foremost, the best inter-

CMC - Dominica's main est of the state," said Linton, position United Work- a former opposition leader.

"That is why having brought the injustice to public attention years ago, we advocated long and we advocated hard inside and outside of Parliament for remedial action in the public's interest. We advocated for obedience to the Constitution and the rule of law, for honesty, for transparency and accountability in the operations of the CBI programme.

"All we wanted to do was to protect the integrity of the programme and to ensure that the lofty national development goals for which it came into existence were fulfilled."

Linton told reporters that "this has been quite a journey for us in the past five years having taken the decision that we were going to go to court with this.

"We have received opinions and second opinions; we have spoken to a number of lawyers. We have in the course of time ask ourselves whether we should go forward with this because after all no institution wants to



sue their government, but we came to the point where we decided that we had to move forward with this," he added.

For his part, Ramlogan told reporters his firm has been asked to "assist with this historic, ground breaking and landmark case in the public's interest."

He said the CBI has generated significant amount of funds that are meant to be spent for the benefit of the public in Dominica.

"The cardinal principles upon which a democracy is based include...public accountability...transparency in public life and...good public administration.

"Without those hallmark principles being observed then you do not have a democracy. So we have taken a look at it. We see this is a case that is important for the Caribbean region as a whole because it will establish some significant constitutional boundaries as it relates to the government's duty to account to the people through the Parliament."

Ramlogan said the intention is to ask the government to disclose a copy of the agreement for the CBI programme between the government and its agents.

"We intend to ask to see the terms and conditions of that contract because the case is constructed based on the Dominican constitution and on the principle that all monies and revenues earned by the government is meant to be paid into the Consolidated Fund, which is subject to parliamentary scrutiny and approval for any form of expenditure," Ramlogan added.

Apart from Dominica, the other islands with a similar CBI programme are Antigua and Barbuda, Grenada, St Kitts-Nevis and St Lucia.

Canada's Trudeau survives noconfidence vote in parliament

Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has survived a motion in parliament aimed at bringing down his government and triggering an election.

Wednesday's no-confidence vote is the first in a series of similar votes expected to be put forward by the opposition Conservative Party amid Trudeau's plummeting approval ratings.

The motion failed after opposition leader Pierre Poilievre fell short in his effort to shore up support from leaders of two other political parties in parliament, the New Democratic Party (NDP) and the Bloc Québécois.

Trudeau, who has been Canada's prime minister for nine years, has been leading under a minority government.

Voting was held on Wednesday afternoon, on the same day as Trudeau was set to host French President Emmanuel Macron.

While this motion has failed, the Conservative party plans to bring at least two other similar no-confidence votes on Thursday in hopes of sending Canadians to the polls.

Trudeau has been facing growing pressure to step down in recent months.

His approval rating has plummeted from 63% when he was first elected to 28% in June of this year, according to one poll tracker, amid concerns about housing unaffordability and the rising costs of living. His Liberal party lost two consequential by-elections this summer in Toronto and Montreal.

A deal between his party and the NDP has helped him stay in power since Canada's last federal election in 2021.

But the deal collapsed early in September after NDP leader Jagmeet



Singh pulled out from the coalition, saying that the Liberals are "too weak" and "too selfish" to govern.

Trudeau's leadership has been under threat since, with Conservative Party leader Pierre Poilievre stating that he would put forward a no-confidence vote.

The vote would need the approval of the majority of the 338 members of parliament (MPs) in order for it to pass.

The Liberal Party, which holds 153 seats, voted against it, while the Conservative Party, which holds 119 seats, voted in favour.

The bulk of the other seats are held by the NDP and the Bloc Québécois - both of whose members voted to defeat the motion.

In the end, the motion was defeated by 211 votes against it.

Pierre Polievere, who has been leading in various national polls, had urged fellow MPs to vote in favour of the motion by outlining his vision for Canada under a Conservative government.

His plan, he said on Tuesday in parliament, is "to bring home the promise of Canada, of a powerful paycheque that earns affordable food, gas and homes and safe neighbourhoods".

But Singh, the NDP leader, said he would vote against Poilievre's motion because he believes the Conservative Party will cut social programmes like dental care and pharmacare if it comes to power.

The Bloc Québécois - a party whose aim is to represent the interests of Quebec, Canada's French-speaking province - has said it believes it could work with the Liberal government to secure assurances for Quebec-focused social programmes.

Trudeau was at the UN General Assembly earlier this week in New York City, where on Monday he appeared as a guest on the Late Show with Stephen Colbert.

In his interview with Colbert, Trudeau acknowledged that Canadians were going through "a really tough time" and struggling to afford gas, groceries and rent.

But he defended his leadership, saying that his government had invested in Canadians and would continue to do so.

"I'm going to keep fighting," he said.

Putin proposes new rules for using nuclear weapons

Vladimir Putin says Russia would consider an attack from a non-nuclear state that was backed by a nuclear-armed one to be a "joint attack", in what could be construed as a threat to use nuclear weapons in the war in Ukraine.

In key remarks on Wednesday night, the Russian president said his government was considering changing the rules and preconditions around which Russia would use its nuclear arsenal.

Ukraine is a non-nuclear state that receives military support from the US and other nuclear-armed countries.

His comments come as Kyiv seeks approval to use long-range Western missiles against military sites in Russia.

Ukraine's President Volodymyr Zelensky has travelled to the US this week and is due to meet US President Joe Biden in Washington on Thursday, where Kyiv's request is expected to be top of the agenda.

Ukraine has pushed into Russian territory this year and wants to target bases inside Russia which it says are sending missiles into Ukraine.

Responding to Putin's remarks, Zelensky's chief of staff Andriy Yermak said Russia "no longer has anything other than nuclear blackmail to intimidate the world".

Putin has threatened the use of nuclear weapons before. Ukraine has criticised it as "nuclear sabre-rattling" to deter its allies from providing further support.

Russian ally China has also called for calm, with reports President Xi Jinping has warned Putin against using nuclear arms.



The Russian president has previously threatened the use of nuclear arms but his new proposal expands those scenarios.

But on Wednesday, after a meeting with his Security Council, Putin announced the proposed radical expansion.

A new nuclear doctrine would "clearly set the conditions for Russia to transition to using nuclear weapons," he warned - and said such scenarios included conventional missile strikes against Moscow.

He said that Russia would consider such a "possibility" of using nuclear weapons if it detected the start of a massive launch of missiles, aircraft and drones into its territory, which presented a "critical threat" to the country's sovereignty.

He added: "It is proposed that aggression against Russia by any non-nuclear state, but with the participation or support of a nuclear state, be considered as their joint attack on the Russian Federation."

The country's nuclear arms were "the most important guarantee of security of our state and its citizens", the Kremlin leader said.

Since the end of World War Two, nuclear-armed states have engaged in a policy of deterrence, which is based on the idea that if warring states were to launch major nuclear strikes it would lead to mutually assured destruction.

But there are also tactical nuclear weapons which are smaller warheads designed to destroy targets without widespread radioactive fallout.

In June, Putin delivered a warning to European countries supporting Ukraine, saying Russia had "many more [tactical nuclear weapons] than there are on the European continent, even if the United States brings theirs over."

"Europe does not have a developed [early warning system]," he added. "In this sense they are more or less defenceless."

At the time he had hinted of changes to Russia's nuclear doctrine - the document which sets out the conditions under which Moscow would use nuclear weapons.
