The Next Commonwealth Heads of Government meeting is coming to Antigua and Barbuda

Antigua and Barbuda will host the 2026 Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting (CHOGM) in the city of St. John's.

"This decision, made during the just-concluded Executive Session of the 2024 Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting, in Apia, Samoa, marks a significant moment in our history as the smallest country to host this prestigious gathering of Commonwealth leaders," said Prime Minister Browne.

"The 2026 CHOGM in St. John's will be a remarkable occasion for Antigua and Barbuda to showcase the island's unique culture, warm hospitality, and progressive vision. Alongside the main summit, Antigua



and Barbuda will host several key fora that will unite youth, women, business leaders, and civil society. This underscores our commitment to inclusive dialogue on issues that matter to the Commonwealth's diverse membership, ensuring that everyone's voice is heard and valued," a jubilant Prime Minister Browne said.

Antigua and Barbuda's selection as the CHOGM 2026 host marks a pivotal moment for the region and the country's continued leadership within the Commonwealth community. The event promises to spotlight the unique challenges and opportunities faced by Small Island Developing States (SIDS), with a particular focus on climate change, international trade, and economic innovation. "These are urgent issues that require immediate attention, and Antigua and Barbuda is uniquely positioned to lead these discussions, given its leadership in environmental advocacy and active role in Commonwealth initiatives," he said.

Prime Minister, Gaston Browne also expressed great enthusiasm about welcoming the Commonwealth family to the Caribbean, stating, "It is an honour and privilege for Antigua and Barbuda to host the 2026 CHOGM. GG's Deputy makes strong case for elderly and mental health care

It is Deputy, Sir Clare Roberts has made a strong case for family members and the society to show more concern for the elderly of society against the backdrop that some have been abandoned at the Sir Lester Bird Medical Centre and the Clare Vue Mental Hospital.


Sir Clare made the case in an impassioned address delivered Sunday afternoon at the National Independence Service of Thanksgiving held at the St John's Pentecostal Church.

The service was one of the activities marking the official programme for the 43rd anniversary of independence for Antigua and Barbuda.

"Recent reports by the Ministry of Health have highlighted the abandonment of elderly citizens at state institutions like the Clarevue Hospital for the mentally ill, and the Sir Lesdisheartening to hear that in the latter case, some 14 elderly patients have been left without the care and support they need, abandoned by their families even though they have no ailments requiring hospitalisation. In the former case, it is even more disheartening to learn that of the patients warded at the Clarevue Hospital over 50% are abandoned," he noted.

The Governor General's Deputy observed that while laws may make it mandatory for children to take care of their parents when they are no longer able to take care of themselves, he believes that it there is a collective sense of duty rooted in faith and respect for human dignity, that must guide the society in ensuring its elders are cherished, protected, and cared for.

According to Sir Clare, these practices are deeply



Commonwealth, as well as our nation's role in fostering unity, collaboration, and sustainable progress across the Commonwealth community."

Tourism Minister, Charles Fernandez who said this news is a significant development for the country's tourism product, outlined that the government extends a warm invitation to all Commonwealth members and their citizens to join in what promises to be a landmark event for the Commonwealth and the world.

rooted in the African traditions which influence much of the society's cultural practices.

With respect to mental health, Sir Clare is also focusing the spotlight on this growing problem.

"The mental health crisis, particularly among our youth, is becoming more

pronounced, based on a 2023 report from one of our nation's psychiatrists. We cannot afford to ignore the toll this crisis is taking on individuals, families, and communities. Mental health care must be a central part of our community's collaboration efforts, requiring us to listen, support, and create systems that foster healing and resilience," he observed.

The Governor General's Deputy is making an urgent plea for the nation to show more concern for the elderly among us...as well as those struggling with mental health challenges. "Let us all consider spending some time away from the screen and online interaction to engage in person-to-person calls or face-to-face visits," he remarked.



Pastor Ivor Davis: Every voice matters!

"Every voice matters, my voice matters' was a central theme of the sermon delivered by Reverend Ivor Davis on Sunday at the National Independence Thanksgiving Service held at the St. John's Pentecostal Church of Restoration.

Rev. Davis drew parallels from the Book of Nehemiah in the Bible where the task of rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem was made a community effort with everyone collaborating with each other to get the job done.

"Collaboration doesn't mean we never disagree or face challenges. But it does mean we face challenges together, pooling our resources, our ideas and efforts to find solutions," he remarked.

He likened the nation to a family with persons performing different roles, from the prime minister and leader of the opposition to the police and teachers. "Pooling our resources and ideas will require open communication with all

members of the family, the community. There are times when voices get lost as we communicate for some reason or other, but here me my people, every voice matters, my voice matters," he stated.

According to Rev. Davis it is important to listen to everyone in society as 'even the dull and ignorant have a story'. To illustrate this point, he again returned to scripture where in 1 Corinthians 12:18-20 it states: But in fact God has placed the parts of the body, every one

of them, just as he wanted them to be. If they were all one part, where would the body be? As it is, there are many parts, but one body.

"This passage reminds us of our diversity, our uniqueness and our essential functions. Your voice matters, your contribution can lead to a solution," he remarked.

The call, Rev. Davis emphasized, is for collaboration and teamwork. "We have heard it said time and again: there is no 'I' in team, but the team is usually uniformed and speaks to unity. Nehemiah and his team were united. He played the leading role, but there was unity, they listened and followed his instructions, his directives. Consider how Nehemiah united the people from various tribes and social classes to rebuild Jerusalem's wall," he declared.

Rev. Davis reiterated that unity means working together despite and even because of differences.





Youth representative wants changes to school's curriculum

The youth representative participating in this year's National Independence Thanksgiving Service is recommending changes to the current school's curriculum.

In extending greetings on behalf of the Ottos Comprehensive School, Jhana Parades, noted that her school is this year celebrating its 50th anniversary and was a mere seven years old when Antigua and Barbuda attained political independence on November 1, 1981.

Reflecting on the theme for this year's independence celebrations, Parades said there are some changes she wishes to see to the curric-

1- ulum.

"As a young and proud Antiguan and student of OCS, I would like to see a greater focus placed on developing career, mentorship and public speaking programmes; eco-friendly projects; cultural diversity workshops and an increase effort to incorporate sports meaningfully in our national curriculum. The time has also come for us as a nation to seriously consider the teaching of Civics in all of our schools," she suggested.

She referenced the school's recently held anniversary service where Dr. Emmanuel Elizee, himself a former OCS student, shared an interesting acronym to

describe what or who OCS represents. O - Overcomers, C-Conquerors and S- Survivors, noting that these traits could be adopted nationally.

"I think that this is quite applicable for us to embrace



on a national level as we celebrate our independence. Let us as a people - and I make a special appeal to our youths to realize that we are O – overcomers. We must overcome the numerous obstacles that we may encounter. Let us C - conquer and silence the voices of negativity that may try to hinder us from achieving our individual goals and our collective efforts to foster community collaborations. Let us S- be survivors as we maximize the gains on a global level," she urged.

Local News PAGE 7 **Reduction in price of flour...an Independence gift**

Antigua and Barbuda will reflect an EC\$0.30 to and several Eastern Caribbean countries will likely see a reduction in a number of flour-based products as the producers of flour- the Eastern Caribbean Group of Companies (ECGC) has announced a reduction in the price for flour.

In a statement, the ECGC said the reduction is an independence gift to Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Dominica, Grenada, St Lucia, St Kitts-Nevis, St Vincent and the Grenadines, Montserrat, British Virgin Islands and Anguilla. It said the price reduction went into effect on Friday in Kingstown and on November 1 in the other islands.

"The price reduction is expected to benefit consumers, bakeries, and businesses throughout the region," the ECGC said, noting that prices across the Organisation of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) will be lowered on both bulk flour and the retail packaged flour sold in supermarkets.

The price of a 100 lbsack of flour will fall by between six and 10 EC dollars (One EC dollar=US\$0.37 cents), ECGC said, adding that "consumers will now see the retail prices drop by an average of EC 0.10 cents per pound on the popular bagged out flour sold in their community stores..."


At the same time, premium packaged brands EC\$0.90-cent decrease on the supermarket shelf.

The company said this strategic price adjustment aligns with the independence celebrations of OECS member states, with St Vincent and the Grenadines celebrating 45 years of political independence from Britain on Sunday, followed by Antigua and Barbuda on November 1, Dominica two days later and Barbados on November 30.



ECGC chief executive officer, J. Robert Cato, said the price reduction was made possible by recent

capital investments in the business, improved efficiency, and favourable market conditions.

Antigua and Barbuda, Morocco sign new enhanced cooperation agreement

Antigua and Barbuda and the Kingdom of Morocco have agreed to the implementation of a very ambitious Road Map for the period 2024 to 2026, designed to deliver a series of economic promotions and investment opportunities.

Minister of Foreign Affairs, E.P. Chet Greene, recently visited Morocco where he held discussions with his counterpart Minister of Foreign Affairs, Nasser Bourita, to discuss ways of consolidating the longstanding bilateral relations and to explore strategies for improved functional cooperation.

During the deliberations, Minister Greene extended greetings from the Hon. Gaston Browne, Prime Minister of Antigua and Barbuda to His Majesty King Mohammed VI, thanking him for his support for South/South Cooperation.

Minister Greene noted the fact that diplomatic relations between Antigua and Barbuda and Morocco were established since 2007 based on shared core values such as a support for democracy, the rule of law and the universal respect for human rights.

He reiterated Antigua and Barbuda's recognition of Morocco's sovereignty over its Sahara and that the Autonomy Initiative is the only realistic, serious, and credible solution to the issue of the Moroccan Sahara within the sovereignty of the Kingdom of Morocco over its southern provinces.

Minister Nasser Bourita, expressed appreciation for Antigua and Barbuda's support to the Kingdom of Morocco and His Majesty's vision for 'South/South Cooperation based on effectiveness, solidarity and pragmatism.

He further stated that the vision of Morocco is to uphold stability and se-

curity in the Caribbean region through concrete socioeconomic projects.

It was against this background that on Monday 21st October, Minister Green and Minister Bourita signed a new Road Map of Cooperation, for the period 2024-2026, to further deepen and consolidate bilateral cooperation through exchange of experience and expertise in different fields of common interest.

According to Minister Greene, "I am delighted to formalize a cooperation agreement that will deliver a variety of engagements, projects/programme in areas such as Education, Technical cooperation, Fertilizers and soil fertility, economic promotion and investment, culture and civil society partnerships, financial assistance to support development projects and exchange of visits.

"I am of the firm believe that this new road map of cooperation for the period 2024 to 2026 will be mutually beneficial and will serve to bring the people of our two countries closer together." The Road Map for Cooperation will provide assistance in the follow-ing areas through:

•Support for the ABAS Centre of Excellence and Data Hub.

Organizing learning visits to Morocco for officials from Antigua and Barbuda.

• Offering scholarship programmes for students from Antigua and Barbuda to pursue their higher education in Moroccan universities and vocational training centers.

• Capacity building programs for officials from Antigua and Barbuda in various fields and themes.

• Sending Moroccan experts in multiple sectors (Agriculture, Education and Arts and Culture) to Antigua and Barbuda:

• Sending delegations of Moroccan economic operators to Antigua and Barbuda to develop win-win business partnerships with local operators and promote various investment opportunities to carry out joint projects in priority sectors of interest for Antigua and Barbuda.

Have you heard about how much meat pastries cost in Barbados, Jamaica and Trinidad as well as the rest of the English-speaking Caribbean? An old sailor in a Port-of-Spain bar told us that in Jamaica, beef pies cost \$1.50. Goat pies cost around \$2 and apple pies are about \$2.50. In Trinidad the prices are roughly the same.

Cheese and onion pies are \$1.50, steak and onion pies are \$2 and cherry pies are \$3. In Barbados a mushroom pie would cost about \$4 and vegetable pie is about \$1.75.

When we asked him why he's telling us all this, he replied, "These are the Pie rates of the Caribbean."

But it's not just the pie but the sky. It is the sun of a beach in the Caribbean and the sense of humour wherever we go. It is what our visitors, local or foreign, consider our warmth, hospitality, music, dance and food!

We joke and laugh everywhere and every time, even if it is merely to keep our pain, or even anger, in control. This is why I put the people first.

Even though I am a son of a beach, the sand, sea, sun and (some say) sex, are secondary. The people of the entire region are funnier than Richard Pryor, Chris Rock and Joan Rivers put together. Here are examples from the three countries of our Caribbean pie-rate.

We start with Barbados. From the day, 32 years ago when I started my columns, it was not the sea but the cricket where humour and concern were the players in the middle. I had long dreamt of the day when I would sit in the stands of Kensington hearing the "Hoi! Hoi!" of the hoi-polloi, their "Cor Blimeys" and the agonised "Jeez-U" of puzzlement and exasperation. "Give Hooper the ball," a woman shouted.

Her companion told her it is the new ball and Hooper cannot use it. "Why not?" she demanded. "What they have against the boy?" Ambrose twice beat Sohail outside the off stump. "Hoi! How he fishing so? He from Oistins?"

Then the game stopped and the lady asked her friend "What happening?" He explained, "The umpire offer them the light." She was angry, "But how he could come from England and give them we light? Like the man cornfuse!"

I owned a car, a MOKE. a word which the dictionary says is "a donkey or a stupid fellow."

When I took it to a mechanic, he told me, "Mister, is either you or the car. Is better you change the car and keep the oil." I asked him, "What for? To fry saltfish?" He laughed.

Both of us knew that in Barbados especially, "Nothing in the world is sweeter

After the first humans were created and made love for the first time, the Lord appeared and asked Adam, "How didst thou like it?" Adam admitted it was incredible. The Lord asked, "What about Eve?" Adam smiled knowingly and said, "She liked it too."

The Lord then asked for Eve, and Adam replied that she was in the river, washing. Suddenly the sky darkened, and the winds roared. Adam was alarmed and asked, "What's the matter, Lord? What's wrong?" And the Lord boomed in frustration, "Now I'll never get that smell out of the fish.

Next was Jamaica where, from the moment I arrived, I learnt that it was "TING country". When I asked why that name I was told, "no big ting".

What makes it more than a thing apart in the "Jam", is that the missing "h" is added to words like "egg", "omelette" and "auspice". It is true that most Caribbean people say, "Tings bad, boy. Tings brown." The great Jamaican group, the Merry Men, sang, "All you hear this ting./ My girlfriend, promise to give me some ting./ And the bells goin' ring/ and the birds goin' sing,/ Cause she promise to give me some ting, ting, ting."

This is where I also heard my favourite "ting" joke. In a bar in the country this "bad-john" or "tough man" sat drinking his liquor with his henchmen around him, when suddenly a stranger came up to him, smiled and without warning, touched him on his ear "Ting!"

The bad-john was angry and upset and he grabbed the stranger intending to do him grievous bodily harm. Undaunted, the stranger smiled sweetly and again touched the bad-john on his cont'd on pg 13

Guyana wants private investment to develop a safari-type zoo

CMC - The Guyana government has signaled its intention to seek private investors to develop a safari-type zoo model here, placing greater emphasis on wildlife conversation.

Speaking at a public consultation on the restoration of the Zoo and Botanical Gardens, Vice President Bharrat Jagdeo, said that the restoration project will see greater emphasis being placed on wildlife conservation, and a keen effort to create interactive spaces to educate visitors on the country's biodiversity.

Jagdeo said that the government recognises the tourism potential and the thrilling experience a safari-style zoo venture can have for Guyana.

Generally, this model is one where visitors can drive through large enclosures to view animals in more natural settings, similar to a real safari.

It often features a drivethrough experience, allowing visitors to observe animals from their vehicles.

"We believe that you can have a safari-type zoo in the country, where animals are just out in the open.

"And we want to issue a prospectus where we will give support to any private investor who wants to do this arrangement," he said.

Jagdeo told the consultation many people in the region may have never seen or experienced this kind of model, or had the opportunity to interact with the many exotic animals Guyanese are familiar with.

"We believe that in the Caribbean, this would be a huge draw to Guyana," he said, adding that the restoration of the National Zoological Park and the Botanical Gardens is not primarily focused on providing sensational wildlife exhibitions.

"This is not the only opportunity," he said, noting that many of the other revenue-generating measures and wildlife experiences would be better suited to a safari-style zoo.

"There is a private zoo being developed on the East Bank too, so people can go to different places.

"This [national zoo] has a slightly different purpose, so it is not one where we have a large number of animals, and keep them in cages and things like that. It is a different concept."

Jagdeo said rather, the upgrades to these areas are aimed at exposing visitors to Guyana's diverse landscapes, while bringing greater awareness to the climate challenges faced by the country and the various ways these are being tackled.

The upgrades to these

areas are aligned with the expanded Low Carbon Development Strategy (LCDS 2030), which emphasises biodiversity protection, water management, the maritime economy, climate adaptation and the energy transition.

Similarly, the government in partnership with the Guyana Forestry Commission (GFC) has a wider plan in place to transform and beautify Guyana's urban landscape.

Through this partnership, an estimated 50,000 flowering trees will be planted along the urban area, including on the East Bank Demerara, the Soesdyke-Linden Highway and in Georgetown.



US airline temporarily suspends flights to Haiti's capital

line on Friday temporarily cancelled flights to Haiti's capital after gang members opened fire and hit a UN helicopter flying near the country's main airport.

Spirit Airlines said in a statement to The Associated Press that its daily flight from Fort Lauderdale to Port-au-Prince has been suspended through Sunday.

The announcement comes a day after a UN helicopter was hit by gunfire, forcing it to make an emergency landing in Port-au-Prince shortly after it had departed the main airport.

The UN Humanitarian Air Service helicopter, which was carrying three sengers, landed safely, according to the World Food Program.

The shooting comes as gang violence surges across Haiti's capital and beyond in recent days, raising concerns that a UN-backed mission led by Kenyan police is struggling to contain the violence. Thousands of people have been killed or injured this year, and more than 700,000 have been

At least one US air- guests and team members crew members and 15 pas- left homeless in recent years as a result of the ongoing gang violence.

"There's a lot that needs to be done to give hope," Leslie Voltaire, president of Haiti's transitional presidential council, said at a press conference on Friday. "I am not satisfied. Right now there are no results. We should do more to improve people's lives."

US and Haitian officials including Voltaire have said the Kenyan mission lacks personnel and funding and have requested that it be replaced by a UN peacekeeping mission.

Earlier this year, coordinated gang attacks forced the government to close Haiti's main international airport for nearly three months.

New wave of mass killings in Sudan alarms UN

A senior UN official in Sudan says she is deeply troubled by reports of "atrocious crimes" in the central Gezira state, including the mass killing of civilians by the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF).

Clementine Nkweta-Salami's comments came after an activist group said that at least 124 people were killed by the RSF in attacks on villages over the past week.

The RSF has denied targeting civilians, saying its fighters are clashing with militias armed by the military.

The 18-month conflict in Sudan has killed tens of thousands of people and displaced more than 11 million.

Gezira state turned into a major battleground last week after the RSF suffered a major blow when one of its commanders, Abu Aqla Kayka, defected to the military.

The army said he had brought "a large number of his forces" with him, in what it described as the first high-profile defection to its side.

In response, the RSF said its fighters would defend themselves and "decisively deal with everyone carrying arms".

the UN Resident and Humanitarian Coordinator in Sudan, said that preliminary reports suggested that the RSF had carried out a major attack across the state between 20 and 25 October.

She added that it led to mass killings, the raping of women and girls, the widespread looting of markets and homes and the burning down of farms.

Ms Nkweta-Salami said the "atrocious crimes" were on a scale similar to those seen in Sudan's Darfur region last year, when the RSF was accused of "ethnic cleansing" communities seen to be opposed to it.

The coalition led by Japan's ruling Liberal Democratic Party (LDP) has lost its majority in parliament, its worst result for over a decade.

Opposition parties secured more than half the seats in the lower house, provisional election results showed.

With 22 seats left to declare, the LDP and its coalition partner, the much smaller Komeito, had gained 208 seats to the opposition's 235.

A party needs a majority of 233 seats in the lower house of Parliament, the Diet, to govern alone.

The result of the general election has triggered uncertainty about how the world's fourth-largest economy will be governed.

The largest opposition party, the Constitutional Democratic Party (CDP), had won 143 seats at around 02:00 JST (17:00 GMT), according to NHK.

The election was called by the LDP's new leader Shigeru Ishiba three days after he was selected as new leader, before he had been officially sworn in as prime minister.

"Voters have handed us a harsh verdict and we have to humbly accept this result," he told NHK.

It comes after a tumultuous few years for the LDP tion also does not stand out at all".

"They sure complain a lot, but it's not at all clear on what they want to do," the 66-year-old said.

For all the apathy, politics in Japan has been moving at a fast pace in recent months.

Shigeru Ishiba took over as prime minister after being voted in by the ruling party following his predecessor Fumio Kishida - who had been in the role since 2021 - making a surprise decision to step down in August.

The move to call the election came at a time when the LDP is desperate to restore its tarnished image among the public. Ishiba - a long-time politician who previously served as defence minister - has deverdict".

A series of scandals has tarnished the ruling party's reputation. Chief among them is the party's relationship with the controversial Unification Church - described by critics as a "cult" - and the level of influence it had on lawmakers.

Then came the revelations of the political funding corruption scandal. Those allegations - running into the millions of dollars - led to the dissolution of powerful factions, the backbone of its internal party politics.


