Antigua and Barbuda's high food import bill continues to be a concern

The government is to convene an agricultural symposium early in the next year to address ways to boost local food production.

The announcement comes from Prime Minister Gaston Browne who noted that in recent times it has been observed that the country's food import bill has jumped sharply.

PM Browne was speaking at a town-hall meeting held in Bolans last night organized by the ABLP caretaker for St. Mary's South, Senator Dwayne George.

He said the emphasis of the symposium will be to find ways to bring the farming community together with local investors to raise the level of production throughout the country.

"Having a lot of small farmers who are doing subsistent farming clearly will not satisfy the demands. So we will be hosting an agricultural sympo-

sium shortly and we should be bringing all the money-people together with the existing farmers to see how we can get them to scale up their production so that we can grow more nutritious local food while at the same time reduce imports," he announced.

Additionally, the prime minister noted that criticisms that the govern-

ment is not producing enough food is misplaced as it is not the government that produces food, but small farmers who produce food," he stated.

"If we don't have more private people who see farming as a viable venture and exploit opportunities to grow food and to sell food, then clearly we are going to have a problem. Therefore, we are going the extra mile to bring all the stakeholders together in January next year and those in this community, who are interested, are invited to attend," he added.

PM Browne is suggesting that farmers should consider combining resources in order to achieve economies of scale and have larger plots from which to produce food.

According to the prime minister Antigua and Barbuda is one of the most 'food insecure' countries in the world and this has to change.

Japan to name new ambassador to Antigua and Barbuda

Japan will be naming a right after Independence. new Ambassador to Antigua and Barbuda shortly as the currently ambassador, **MATSUBARA** Yutaka, will end his tour of duty on December 10, 2024.

The ambassador paid a farewell visit to St. John's on Tuesday to have engagements with Foreign Affairs Minister, E.P Chet Greene and Permanent Secretary in the Ministry, Ambassador Clarence Pilgrim.

Minister Greene thanked the ambassador and the Japanese government for the long history of assistance to Antigua and Barbuda since diplomatic relations were established

The foreign minister expressed special appreciation to the Japanese government on the donation of equipment that will assist Antigua and Barbuda fight the scourge of the annual sargassum seaweed invasion.

"The seaweed is a major problem for us as we here in the Caribbean invite people to visit our countries and when the seaweeds arrive from across the Atlantic they make the beaches unusable and create quite a stench as they begin to rot," he explained.

The ambassador revealed that the next funding cycle for the Japanese government starts in April next year and he urged the minister to ensure that Antigua and Barbuda gets in its requests for assistance for both the 2025 and 2026 cycles.

He noted too that a Japanese professor has been teaching a short course at the University of the West Indies FIC.


At this, Minister Greene thanked him again for the assistance noting that the government has great plans for the university to help with the human resource development of the country and he welcomed the spe-

He expressed the hope that the incoming ambassador, when named, will continue the good works started by Ambassador Matsubara.



ture development.



Police officer defendant 'pulled over the coals'

The police who is facing a charge of shooting with intent has received a serious reprimand for repeatedly finding ways to delay the trial.

Sgt. Karim Warner is charged with discharging his service firearm at a moving vehicle whose occupants he had a dispute over payment for car rental.

The case surrounds an incident where Sgt. Warner reportedly rented a vehicle to a Willikies couple. However, when the vehicle was returned both parties could not

agree on the amount owed.

In the heat of the dispute, the couple went back into the vehicle and started to drive off. It was at that time that Warner allegedly took his police-issued firearm and discharged multiple shots at the vehicle. No one was hurt, but Warner nonetheless has been charged with multiple offences, including the unlawful discharge of a firearm.

He has since been suspended and he had to remit his service revolver as part of his bail condition.

Following postponement, the matter was due to resume on Tuesday, however, Warner got word to the matter that he had a delay and wanted the start time delayed by an hour when that was granted and the time had elapsed, his attorney appeared before the court to present a sick certificate from a doctor indicating that Warner was granted a 10day sick leave...apparently for having COVID-19-like symptoms.

Senior Magistrate Ngaio Emanuel was clearly not pleased as she issued a serious reprimand of Warner's behavior noting that he had repeatedly found ways to delay the case. From having to travel and several other reasons that have forced delays after delays, Warner appeared to be finding ways to exploit the system.

Magistrate Emanuel noted that Warner was wasting the court's time, the prosecutor's and the witnesses' time in the process and that 'enough was enough'.

Warner has been urged to be in court at the conclusion of the sick-leave as too much time has been wasted already on the matter.

The ABLP's leadership highlights UPP's irrelevance

As Antigua and Barbuda continue to make strides in governance and development under the Antigua and Barbuda Labour Party (ABLP), the ongoing dysfunction and lack of vision within the United Progressive Party (UPP) have become glaringly evident. While some attempt to attribute the UPP's struggles to the ABLP, it is clear that the ruling party cannot and should not be blamed for the opposition's internal failings. Here's why.

The narrative that ABLP bears any responsibility for UPP's current state is an absurd attempt to deflect attention from the latter's failures. An opposition that cannot articulate a vision for the future does little to advance the democratic process.

The stagnation of UPP is not just a political issue; it poses a threat to national progress. A failing political party saps energy from the political ecosystem, creating distractions instead of contributing to growth. UPP's inefficacy diverts attention from critical discussions and slows the momentum of national development.

The ABLP, despite these distractions, has continued to drive forward its agenda, focusing on economic resilience, social welfare, and infrastructure development. The party's ability to deliver results even in the face of weak opposition underscores its commitment to the people. UPP's ineffectiveness only underscores the necessity of strong and consistent leadership, which ABLP has consistently provided.

UPP's persistent shortcomings leave the electorate with little choice but to place their trust in the ABLP—a party that has consistently delivered on its promises and prioritized the nation's development.

As Antigua and Barbuda forge ahead, the nation needs steadfast leadership that can navigate challenges and seize opportunities. The ABLP has proven itself to be a reliable steward, guiding the country with a clear vision and strong governance and is clearly the choice for those who prioritize stability, growth, and progress. There is no denying the UPP's lack of leadership and purpose only serves as a hindrance to the democratic process and national progress.

The people of Antigua and Barbuda deserve an opposition party that can rise to the occasion and contribute meaningfully to the national discourse and development. To the extent that we agree on the foregoing, the UPP is simply not fit for purpose.

Drake takes legal action over Kendrick Lamar's Not Like Us

Drake has launched legal action against Universal Music accusing the label of artificially boosting streams of Kendrick Lamar's diss track against him, Not Like Us.

In papers filed in New York, Drake's company, Frozen Moments LLC, accused Universal and the streaming giant Spotify of engaging in an illegal "scheme" involving bots, payola and other methods to promote Lamar's song.


Universal Music "did not rely on chance," Drake's lawyers alleged. "It instead launched a campaign to manipulate and saturate the streaming services and airwaves."

A spokesperson for Universal called the claims "offensive and untrue", adding that "fans choose the music they want to hear".

and Lamar Spotify have yet to respond.

The petition is not a full lawsuit but a so-called "pre-action petition", under which Drake's lawyers can ask the court to order Universal and Spotify to preserve all relevant documents and information, ahead of future legal action.

The BBC understands the action is principally aimed at Universal, with Spotify named in the belief

it may have information that would be relevant to a lawsuit.

Not Like Us was widely seen as the decisive blow in an escalating rap beef between Drake and Lamar earlier this year.

Drake's court filing highlights the song's runaway success - 96 million streams in seven days, number one in the US charts, and a top 10 radio hit - but suggests those achievements were artificially inflated.

His lawyers claim that Universal "conspired with and paid currently unknown parties" to "artificially" boost the prominence of Not Like Us.

They allege that the label cut its royalty rates for the song by 30%, in exchange for Spotify recommending it to users.

The filing also cites supposed claims from a "whistleblower" on a podcast, who said they were paid \$2,500 to set up software "bots" that would stream the song on repeat, turning it into "a crazy hit".

The effort spread to other streaming services, Drake's lawyers allege, referencing online reports that fans who asked Apple's voice assistant to play Drake's album Certified Loverboy were instead delivered Not Like Us.

The legal filing is a surprising coda to the musicians' feud, but it also represents a rift between Drake and Universal - the

label that has represented him for his entire career.

In court documents, the star's lawyers say he tried to address these allegations in private but that the label has "no interest in taking responsibility for its misconduct."

Furthermore. they claim Universal made "an apparent effort to conceal its schemes", which included firing staff "perceived as having loyalty to Drake".

"Streaming is a zero-sum game," they argue. "Every time a song breaks through, it means another artist does not." As a result, they claim, Drake suffered "economic harm" at Lamar's expense.

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A spokesperson for Universal rejected the claims.

"The suggestion that UMG would do anything to undermine any of its artists is offensive and untrue," they said in a statement.

"We employ the highest ethical practices in our marketing and promotional campaigns. No amount of contrived and absurd legal arguments in this pre-action submission can mask the fact that fans choose the music they want to hear."

The legal filing came days after Lamar released a surprise album, GNX, which is widely seen as a follow-up to Not Like Us.

His diss track was recently nominated for four

Grammy awards, including song of the year, and he has been booked to play next year's Super Bowl

halftime show.

However, he lags behind Drake in terms of popularity. On Spoti-

fy, the rapper is the 23rd most-streamed artist in the world, while Drake places 13th.

Black Friday shoppers warned to be wary of deals

Black Friday shoppers should be wary of deals to avoid being ripped off, retail experts have warned.

Nine out of 10 Black Friday offers are cheaper or the same price at other times of the year, according to research by consumer group Which?.

While Sarah Johnson, director of merchandise consultancy Flourish Retail, told the BBC some brands may inflate prices ahead of sales to make discounts look bigger.

Black Friday originally marked the day after Thanksgiving in the US but in recent years the sales have extended into the weeks before and after, with Cyber Monday driving millions in online sales.

Shoppers spent an estimated £13.3bn during the Black Friday sales in 2023, according to Which?.

Ms Johnson said: "It used to be that you had to establish a price for 28 days before it could be changed, but this is no longer the case.

"As a result, many brands inflate

prices in the lead-up to Black Friday, allowing them to advertise 'big discounts' that, in reality, aren't genuine."

Which? researchers looked at 227 products in last year's Black Friday fortnight between 20 November and 1 December.

The deals analysed were from eight of the biggest home and tech retailers in the UK and some of the products on offer were the same price or cheaper at different times in the year.

In what it called "one of the worst examples", Which? found a hairdryer priced at £18.99 in a Boots Black Friday deal, claiming to be reduced from £49.99.

However, the product had never been £49.99 at Boots in the preceding 12 months.

Which? said a spokesperson for Boots told it its researchers had "reviewed a very small number of our Black Friday deals from last year and in all cases, the items were at a lower price whilst on promotion or when price matched against competitors." The BBC has contacted Boots for a comment.

Which? also highlighted a previous John Lewis Black Friday deal which featured a smartwatch discounted to £294 with a saving of £90. But Which? found at no point in the previous 12 months had it been sold at £384.

Which? said a John Lewis spokesperson told it: "The recent return of our reimagined Never Knowingly Undersold brand promise - which matches prices with 25 leading retailers - gives customers absolute confidence that they are getting fantastic value."

The BBC has contacted John Lewis for comment.

Harry Rose, editor of Which? Magazine said: "We want retailers to drop the sneaky pricing tactics so consumers are not misled about the deals on offer."

He advised shoppers to compare prices at multiple retailers and use websites which check the product's price history. "That way you'll know a good deal when you see one," he said.

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SVG: Gonsalves retained as ULP leader, party to field new candidates

CMC - Prime Minister Dr Ralph Gonsalves has been re-elected leader of the ruling Unity Labour Party (ULP) that says it will field new candidates in at least four of the 15 constituencies in the next general elections, widely expected within the next year, ahead of the February 2026 constitutional deadline.

Gonsalves told the party's 26th annual convention that two legislators have indicated their intention to bow out of politics, while a candidate, who has lost five times, also wants to quit.

He said that the North Windward representative and Deputy Prime Minister, Montgomery Daniel, who is also the ULP deputy leader and South Windward representative, Frederick Stephenson, are retiring from politics.

ULP's chairman, Edwin Snagg, who has failed since 2001 to win the Southern Grenadines, does not want to make another attempt.

The party will likely field Senator Keisal Peters in West Kingstown, which the main opposition New Democratic Party (NDP) has held since 2010.

"We have to have candidates selection properly. There are some persons who run last time may not run next time. Gommery, for instance, has already said he is retiring, and we have to thank him for his tremendous service," Gonsalves said, referring to the North Winward MP.

"Montgomery has taken North Windward safe thus far and grace will lead us home," Gonsalves said, hinting that Grace Walters, who the ULP selected in March 2023, will be its North Windward candidate.

"Well, Cummings in West Kingstown ain't have nothing to say against

Keisal, other than try to run she down personally," he said referring to Peters, who made history as the country's first female minister of foreign affairs when she was appointed to the post in August 2022, after two years as the junior minister.

However, in July 2024, she was relieved of the foreign ministry portfolio and reassigned to national mobilisation.

'Well, they began by saying, remember they start to say she using skin bleach, Gonsalves said, adding "what a beautiful black woman nuh. She look like she does use bleach? And Cummings say she's a fat lady. Well, Cummings, when you get licks, you will say the fat lady sings".

On September 28, Cummings told an NDP campaign event that "a fat lady" questions constituents seeking help to repair their damaged homes about their political allegiance.

He did not identify the "fat lady" but last month Gonsalves said that the opposition MP was referring to Peters.

"This is a woman who comes from the bowels of the working class, the bowels of the working class. Her father used to work at the port," Gonsalves told the convention, adding that Peters had not "just come by with labour so". He spoke of the development of Peters under successive ULP administrations, adding that she also benefited from a university education under the ULP

"She has done magnificently, and she having Cummings going crazier than ever."

In 2010, on his second attempt to win West Kingstown, Cummings defeated the ULP's Michelle Fife and held on to the seat amidst challenges by Deborah Charles in 2015 and 2020.

Meanwhile, Gonsalves said that the ULP was considering its alternatives in South Windward, as Stephenson, who is into his third five-year term as MP there has said he is not running anymore.

"And we have one or two persons in mind to take over from Snaggy in the Southern Grenadines, because Snaggy says he wants to take a rest from that," Gonsalves said.


"And I'm warning all of those candidates, NDP candidates in Kingstown. We coming at every single one of you. We coming at Leacock. We coming at Cummings, and we coming at [Fitz] Bramble," he said.

The NDP has held East Kingstown since 1984 and Central and West Kingstown since 2010.

Gonsalves said that the performance of the ULP's Carlos Williams, after the passage of Hurricane Beryl on July 1 "will keep (Opposition Leader Dr. Godwin) Friday more at home".

Williams failed in his bid in 2020 to unseat the NDP leader in the North Grenadines, which he has been representing since 2001.

"We going to keep the nine that we have, and we're going to add more to those nine come election 2025," Gonsalves said.

Suriname: Financial payments from energy royalties to citizens

CMC - President Chandrikapersad "Chan" Santokhi says every Surinamese national will receive a share in royalties of US\$750 with an interest of seven percent annually from the energy sector.

"Today, I announce the financial instrument, under the name Royalties for Everyone (RVI), which offers the people of Suriname a share in future oil royalties.

"The RVI instrument means that every Surinamese, who lives in our country, receives a savings note, worth US\$750, with an annual interest of seven percent. The money will be paid out in the future, from the royalty income, of Block 58."

Santokhi said the payment would only be made when the oil from Block 58 has been sold and Suriname has received the royalties.

"The RVI is listed in US dollars so that it is stable in value. The payment will be made in Surinamese dollars. For people over 60 years old and people with disabilities, options are being developed to receive these before 2028.

"We must now translate that positive impact into opportunities for our own people. There are opportunities for our entrepreneurs, our youth to shape the future of Suriname with the right education and training,"

Santokhi said as he spoke of the positive impact of an agreement reached with TotalEnergies, the global integrated energy company that produces and markets oil and biofuels, natural gas and green gases, renewables and electricity.

In October, TotalEnergies chairman and chief executive officer, Patrick Pouyanné, held talks with President Santokh and Annand Jagesar, the chief executive officer of the state-owned Staatsolie Maatschappij Suriname NV, Suriname's National Oil Company.

They later announced the Final Investment Decision (FID) for the "Gran-Morgu" development located on offshore Block 58.

According to a statement posted on the website

of TotalEnergies, the Gran-Morgu project will develop the Sapakara and Krabdagu oil discoveries, on which a successful exploration and appraisal campaign was completed in 2023.

It said the fields are located 150 km off the coast of Suriname and hold recoverable reserves estimated at over 750 million barrels.

The project includes a 220,000 barrels of oil per day Floating Production Storage and Offloading (FPSO) unit, that replicates a proven and efficient design.

Total investment is estimated at around US\$10.5 billion and first oil is expected in 2028.

The GranMorgu FPSO is designed to accommodate future tie-back opportunities that would extend its

production plateau.

TotalEnergies is the operator of Block 58 with a 50 per cent interest, alongside APA Corporation (50 percent).

Staatsolie has announced its intent to exercise its option to enter the development project with up to 20 percent interest. Partners agreed that Staatsolie will contribute to the project from FID and will finalise its interest before June 2025.

The Suriname Constitution stipulates that "natural resources are the property of the nation and will be used to promote economic, social and cultural development".

It also states that "the State strives for a fair distribution of the national income, aimed at a fair distribution of welfare and prosperity among all levels of the population".

Speaking at a luncheon for the media, Santokhi, who was accompanied by the visiting Prime Minister of Curacao, Gilmar Pisas, who was a special guest of the country celebrating its 49th anniversary of independence, said "after the announcement of the first investment decision for block 58, 'I have received many requests better implement those requirements of the

Israel-Hezbollah ceasefire designed to be permanent, says Biden

A ceasefire has been agreed to end 13 months of fighting between Israel and Hezbollah in Lebanon, US President Joe Biden has announced.

"Effective at 04:00 tomorrow local time (02:00 GMT on Wednesday), the fighting across the Lebanese-Israeli border will end," Biden said, adding that it aimed to be a "permanent cessation of hostilities".

Israel's Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said Israel will not hesitate to strike if Hezbollah breaks any part of the agreed deal.

There has been no response from the Iran-backed armed group which had been trading fire with Israel since October 2023. Fighting escalated in late September when Israel in-

tensified bombardments and launched a limited ground invasion.

It has been Lebanon's deadliest conflict in decades, killing more than 3,823 people say local officials.

Under the deal an-

nounced on Tuesday and brokered by the US, there will be a 60-day period during which Israel will gradually withdraw its troops from Lebanon's south as Lebanese government forces regain control of an area currently held by Hezbollah.

It is expected that Hezbollah fighters and weapons will be removed from the area south of the Litani River, a boundary established at the end of the last Israel-Hezbollah war in 2006.

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"And some groups, especially retirees, have informed me that they, unlike younger generations, will not benefit from the positive effects of oil in the country.

"With these requests in mind, I have commissioned financial experts to propose a financial instrument that offers the people of Suriname a share in our natural resources.

"Today I can announce the creation of a financial instrument that offers the people of Suriname a share in future oil royalties. In this way, our people become de facto owners of Suriname's natural assets.

"Consider this share as a form of

reward for a number of years of necessary efforts during the macroeconomic and financial stabilization," Santokhi added.

The government said the "Royalties for Everyone" has three objectives, namely that everyone has a share in the development of the oil and gas sector, just as other countries, such as Alaska, have done.

It said citizens are rewarded for the years of necessary efforts during the macroeconomic and financial stabilization and thirdly that the instrument is a powerful incentive to achieve important and cross-party policy goals such as reducing the informal economy, by everyone freely identifying themselves with the tax authorities,

and everyone who does not yet have one, getting a bank account.

Santokhi said that several experts have been working for several months, under the coordination of the ministry of finance and planning, to develop this instrument, with the timeline that it will be implemented in the first half of 2025.

"I expressly inform you that the RVI will be paid from future royalties to be received by the State of Suriname.

"The State will not be burdened with a loan and future oil will not be pledged. The only thing that will happen is that part of the future royalty revenues will be allocated to the population," Santokhi added.

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"This announcement will create the conditions to restore lasting calm and allow residents in both countries to return safely to their homes," said a joint statement from the US and France - which will be involved in monitoring the implementation of the deal.

Israel has claimed the right to respond with military action if Hezbollah breaches the ceasefire. President Biden has echoed this saying Israel "retains the right to self defence consistent with international law".

"If Hezbollah violates the agreement and tries to arm itself, we will attack. If it tries to rebuild terrorist infrastructure near the border, we will attack," Netanyahu said.

Netanyahu also said ending the fighting against Hezbollah in Lebanon, Israel's northern neighbour, would allow the Israel Defense Forces (IDF) to focus on "the Iranian threat".

Hezbollah in Lebanon had long been seen as Iran's first line of defence. But with much of the group's missile arsenal now destroyed, the military balance between Iran and Israel appears to have tilted in Israel's favour.

Israel and Hezbollah had long been enemies but the past 13 months of fighting were triggered by the war in the Gaza Strip.

Hezbollah started firing rockets into Israel a day after its Gaza ally Hamas carried out a wide-ranging attack on southern Israel on 7 October 2023, which killed about 1,200 people.

Netanyahu said ending the fighting in Lebanon would also isolate and increase pressure on Hamas.

"From day two of the war, Hamas was counting on Hezbollah to fight by its side. With Hezbollah out of the picture, Hamas is left on its own," Netanyahu said.

He said ending fighting in Lebanon would also give the IDF space to resupply weapons, munitions and troops.

Israeli commentators had noted that the country's military was not ready nor equipped to fight two wars on two fronts over an extended period of time.

Ending the conflict in Lebanon thus could also free up more Israeli forces to serve in Gaza, a conflict which shows no sign of ending.

At the White House on Tuesday, Biden was asked about a ceasefire in Gaza and said his government was working with other negotiators Turkey, Egypt and Qatar to "make another push" on a deal.

The US, Israel's key backer, had led the charge with France in negotiating the deal in Lebanon.

France, which administered Lebanon for more than 20 years in the last century, is also a long-term ally and is expected to be involved through the monitoring of the truce. Biden confirmed that no US troops would be deployed to managing the ceasefire.

The war has been devastating for Lebanon, where, in addition to the 3,823 people killed and 15,859 injured, one million residents have been displaced in areas where Hezbollah holds sway.

Lebanon's Prime Minister Najib Mikati welcomed the ceasefire deal, calling it a "fundamental step towards restoring calm and stability" in the country and allowing citizens to return home.

But he also demanded that Israel "fully comply" with the deal, with-draw from the sites it currently occupies and to respect the UN resolution previously set at the end of the last Hezbollah-Israel war in 2006.

Israel went on the offensive against Hezbollah - which is proscribed as a terrorist organisation by Israel and many Western countries - after almost a year of cross-border fighting sparked by the war in Gaza.

It has said it wants to ensure the

safe return of about 60,000 residents of northern Israeli areas displaced by rocket attacks, which Hezbollah launched in support of Palestinians.

Hezbollah attacks on Israel and the occupied Golan Heights have killed at least 75 people, more than half of them civilians, while more than 50 soldiers have been killed in combat in southern Lebanon, according to Israeli authorities.

The World Bank estimates \$8.5bn (£6.8bn) in economic losses and damage in Lebanon. Recovery will take time, and it is unknown how this will be funded.

Hezbollah, too, has been devastated. Many of its leaders have been killed, including long-time chief Hassan Nasrallah, in an IDF strike on Beirut on 27 September. A week later Israel also killed his presumed successor, Hashem Safieddine, in another strike.

With much of its infrastructure also damaged, how Hezbollah will look after the war remains unclear. The group has been severely weakened but it has not been destroyed.

In Lebanon, it is also more than a militia: it is a political party with representation in parliament, and a social organisation, with significant support among Shia Muslims.

Hezbollah's opponents could see it as an opportunity to limit its influence - it was often described as "a state within a state" in Lebanon before the conflict - and many fear this could lead to internal violence.

Since intensifying the fighting in September, Israel has carried out hundreds of daily strikes in Lebanon, targeting what it said were Hezbollah areas in the south, east and in the capital Beirut.

As reports emerged that Netanyahu was discussing a ceasefire deal with his cabinet on Tuesday, the IDF continued its strikes - targeting Beirut with strikes that killed at least 10 people.

Trump vows tariffs on Mexico, Canada and China on day one

Donald Trump says he will hit China, Mexico and Canada with new tariffs on day one of his presidency, in an effort to force them to crack down on illegal immigration and drug smuggling into the US.

The US president-elect said he would sign an executive order imposing a 25% tariff on all goods coming from Mexico and Canada, after being inaugurated on 20 January 2025.

He also said "we will be charging China an additional 10% tariff, above any additional tariffs" until it cracked down on fentanyl smuggling.

The threat could mark a major escalation in tensions with the US's three top trading partners. It could also lead to higher prices for Americans, since tariffs work as a form of tax on imports.

The US is the world's largest importer. China, Mexico and Canada account for about 40% of the \$3.2tn (£2.6tn) of goods it imports each year, according to official data.

China has defended its efforts to stop the flow of illegal drugs, and has warned that there can be no winner in a trade war between the two.

After Trump made his tariff threat, he spoke to Canada's Prime Minister Justin Trudeau for about 10 minutes, discussing trade and border security, a Canadian government official told the BBC. They had a "good discussion", the source said.

During the call, Trudeau pointed out that the number of migrants crossing the Canadian border was much smaller compared to the US-Mexico border, the official said.

Mexico's finance ministry said: "Mexico is the United States' top trade partner, and the USMCA provides a



framework of certainty for national and international investors."

The measures have the potential to cause disruptions to the global supply chain and would hit the three countries targeted by the tariffs hard.

The tariffs on Mexico and Canada will remain in place until the two countries clamp down on drugs, particularly fentanyl, and migrants illegally crossing the border, Trump said in a post on his Truth Social platform.

"Both Mexico and Canada have the absolute right and power to easily solve this long simmering problem," he wrote. "It is time for them to pay a very big price!"

In a follow-up Truth Social post, Trump attacked Beijing for failing to follow through on promises that he said Chinese officials made to carry out the death penalty for people caught dealing fentanyl, a synthetic opioid.

A spokesperson for the Chinese embassy in Washington told the BBC "the idea of China knowingly allowing fentanyl precursors to flow into the United States runs completely counter to facts and reality".

"China believes that China-US economic and trade cooperation is

mutually beneficial in nature. No one will win a trade war or a tariff war," he added.

The Biden administration has been calling on Beijing to do more to stop the production of ingredients used in fentanyl, which Washington estimates killed almost 75,000 Americans last year.

During his election campaign, Trump threatened Mexico and China with tariffs of up to 100%, if he deemed them necessary, much higher than those he put in place during his first term in office.

Trump has also said he will end China's most-favoured-nation trading status with the US - the most advantageous terms Washington offers on tariffs and other restrictions.

Last year, more than 80% of Mexico's exports went to the US, while around 75% of Canada's went to its southern neighbour.

Even after years of a bitter trade dispute between the world's two biggest economies, the US still accounts for about 15% of China's exports.

A tariff is a domestic tax levied on goods as they enter the country, procont'd on pg 21

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portional to the value of the import. So a car imported to the US with a value of \$50,000 subject to a 25% tariff, would face a \$12,500 charge.

Tariffs are a central part of Trump's economic vision - he sees them as a way of growing the US economy, protecting jobs and raising tax revenue.

He has previously claimed that these taxes are "not going to be a cost to you, it's a cost to another country".

This is almost universally regarded by economists as misleading.

The charge is physically paid by the domestic company that imports the goods, not the foreign company that exports them.

So, in that sense, it is a straightforward tax paid by domestic US firms to the US government.

Trump imposed a number of tariffs in his first term of office, many of which have been kept in place by his successor, President Joe Biden. Economic studies suggest most of the economic burden was ultimately borne by US consumers.

It was not immediately clear whether Trump's "additional 10% tariff, above any additional tariffs" earmarked for China were on top of the 25% he was planning for Canada and Mexico.

The move is "clearly consistent with his promise that he made during the campaign to utilise

tariffs as a weapon to accomplish many of his policy initiatives," Stephen Roach, Senior Fellow at the Paul Tsai China Center of Yale Law School, told the BBC's Business Today programme.

Trump's pick for Treasury Secretary, Scott Bessent, has previously suggested that the president-elect's threats to impose major tariff hikes were part of his negotiating strategy.

"My general view is that at the end of the day, he's a free trader," Bessent said of Trump in an interview with the Financial Times before he was nominated for the role.

"It's escalate to de-escalate."

It comes as the Chinese economy is in a significantly more vulnerable position than it was during the previous Trump presidency.

The country has been struggling with a number of serious issues, including an ongoing property market crisis, weak domestic demand and growing local government debt.

The new tariffs appear to break the terms of the US-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA) on trade.


The deal, which Trump signed into law, took effect in 2020. It continued a

largely duty-free trading relationship between the three neighbouring countries.

Outside the official reaction from the three countries affected, the response has been critical.

Doug Ford, the premier of the Canadian province of Ontario, said Trump's planned tariff would be "devastating to workers and jobs in both Canada and the US".

Leader of the Mexican senate, Gerardo Fernández, asked: "What tariffs should we impose on their [America's] goods until they stop consuming drugs and illegally exporting weapons to our homeland?"

West Indies crush Bangladesh by 201 runs

The West Indies ended a two-and-a-half-year wait for a Test win on home soil with an emphatic 201-run triumph over Bangladesh on Tuesday's fifth and final day of the first Test of their two-match series at the Sir Vivian Richards Stadium in Antigua.

The West Indies commanding performance showcased their pace attack's dominance and underlined their desire to return to winning ways in the longest format.

Bangladesh's pursuit of an improbable 334 was thwarted on Tuesday's fifth morning at 132 for nine, with Shoriful Islam's retirement due to a shoulder injury effectively sealing the result.

Shoriful's decision not to continue resulted from Alzarri Joseph's short-ball assault on Bangladesh number 11, as West Indies needed just seven overs to wrap things up and secure their victory.

Alzarri Joseph set the tone early, dismissing Hasan Mahmud for a duck with a sharp delivery that moved away, drawing an edge that was caught low down by

Jaker Ali, the lone resistance in Bangladesh's lower order, seemed set to delay the inevitable but was later trapped leg-before-wicket for 31 after a dogged 58ball stay that included four boundaries.

With only two wickets left, Alzarri turned up the heat, relentlessly peppering Taskin Ahmed and Shoriful

with bouncers. The West Indies fielders joined the action, adding verbal pressure to the beleaguered Bangladesh tailenders.

When Shoriful was unable to continue after Joseph's blow, the match was called off, capping an aggressive and clinical effort by the hosts.

This victory marks a turning point for the West Indies, who last tasted a

home Test win in 2021. The performance was built on a foundation of aggressive fast bowling and a collective resolve to dominate in all phases of the game.

Joseph Alzarri Jayden Seales ended with five wickets in the match, while Kemar Roach finished with four, and Man-of-the-Match Justin Greaves had two to go with his unbeaten cont'd on pg 25
