The ceremony will take place in the presence of family and friends as well as representatives from both the ABLP and the government.

However, in offering congratulations to the incoming senator, Prime Minister Gaston Browne, the ABLP Political Leader, did not mince words when he told Newton that the appointment to the Senate should not be his ultimate goal.

> The prime minister was speaking Thursday night at a town-hall meeting organized by Newton for the residents to hear directly from leaders of the government on the efforts being made to address their concerns.

Antigua and Barbuda economy records enormous growth since Independence

Antigua and Barbuda has seen its economy expand significantly over the past 43 years, growing from a GDP of \$336 million in Eastern Caribbean dollars at independence in 1981 to over \$5 billion today.

Governor General Sir Rodney Williams highlighted this transformation during his Throne Speech, crediting strategic investments and fiscal policies for the dramatic increase.

"On the 1st of November 1981, the new state of Antigua and Barbuda was declared sovereign, and our GDP stood at \$336 million. Today, our country's GDP exceeds \$5 billion,"

Sir Rodney said, outlining the nation's progress.

The Governor General noted that this growth reflects deliberate efforts to build a robust economy, including investments in tourism, infrastructure, and foreign direct investment.


Projects such as the Peace, Love, and Happiness (PLH) development and the Rosewood Luxury Hotel in Barbuda were cited as key contributors to job creation and economic expansion.

The government has also focused on fiscal discipline, achieving a debt-to-GDP ratio of approximately 60%, a level deemed sustainable by international financial institutions.

Sir Rodney commended the Ministry of Finance and the Cabinet for their role in managing the country's finances.

"My government set about to make Antigua and Barbuda's economy produce sufficient jobs while lowering taxes and attracting significant investments," he said, describing the administration's approach to fostering economic growth.

Tourism remains a critical driver of Antigua and Barbuda's economy, with ongoing investments in luxury resorts and improved connectivity.





The new airport terminal and the planned deep-water harbour in Barbuda are expected to enhance both tourism and trade, further strengthening the nation's economic outlook.

However, challenges remain, including the country's vulnerability to climate-related disasters and global economic fluctuations.

Despite these hurdles, the government has expressed optimism about its ability to sustain growth through diversification and investments in renewable energy, healthcare, and education.

Antigua and Barbuda's economic journey underscores the progress made since independence, though questions about the inclusivity of this growth and its resilience to external shocks remain topics for ongoing discussion.

Ministry of Health signs two-year extension for ophthalmological services at SLBMC

The government through the Ministry of Health has cleared the way for continued high-level eye-care services for patients in Antigua and Barbuda.

This comes following a contract renewal for two years for the provision of ophthalmology services signed between the Ministry of Health and Trinidad Eye Hospital.

The services will be provided at the Sir Lester Bird Medical Centre.

CEO and Chief Surgeon from Trinidad Eye Hospital, Dr. Ronnie Bhola, met with Medical Director Ag. Dr. Shivon Belle-Jarvis, Permanent Secretary from the Ministry of Health, Ena Dalso and



SLBMC Board Secretary; Martin Camacho, to sign a two-year contract for the continued provision of ophthalmology services at Sir Lester Bird Medical Centre in Antigua.

Since 2019, Dr. Ronnie Bhola and his team have been doing cataract surgeries in partnership with the Ministry of Health with more than 800 cases being done to date.

This is a significant

milestone for the Ministry of Health and the eye-care teams at SLBMC and TEH who have displayed renewed commitment and focus on reducing blindness from cataract in Antigua and Barbuda.

Ministry of Health confirms reports of Impetigo cases in Antigua and Barbuda

that a few children have been seen by medical practitioners for a rash identified as Impetigo.

While this condition is not rare in Antigua and Barbuda or globally, it is a highly contagious bacterial skin infection that requires immediate attention to prevent further spread. Impetigo is most often seen in young children but can affect individuals of all ages. The infection spreads through direct skinto-skin contact with an infected person or through contact with contaminated items such as towels, clothing, or toys.

Parents and caregivers should be aware of the signs and symptoms of Impetigo. These include red sores that typically appear on the face, around the nose, mouth, or on the hands and

The Ministry of Health confirms feet. The red sores often burst, leaving a yellowish-brown crust, and may cause itchy or irritated skin around the affected area. In some cases, impetigo can present as fluid-filled blisters that rupture easily. If left untreated, the condition can lead to complications such as deeper skin infections or, in rare cases, kidney inflammation.

> To prevent the spread of impetigo, the Ministry advises the public to maintain good personal hygiene, including frequent handwashing with soap and water. It is essential to ensure children wash their hands regularly, especially after playing outdoors. Personal items such as towels, clothing, and bed linens should not be shared, as these can harbor bacteria.

Any cuts, scrapes, or insect bites

should be promptly cleaned and covered with clean bandages to reduce the risk of infection.

If you or your child develops symptoms of Impetigo, it is crucial to consult a healthcare provider promptly. Early treatment, often involving topical and oral antibiotics, can clear the infection and reduce its contagiousness. Children diagnosed with Impetigo should remain home from school or daycare until they have been treated with antibiotics for at least 24 to 48 hours to prevent spreading the infection to others.

The Ministry of Health will continue to monitor the schools, public health facilities, and private practitioners to aid in managing and controlling the situation effectively.

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Dollar barrel goes into effect from December 1st

The popular Dollar Barrel initiative goes into effect from December 1, 2025, to January 15, 2025.

According to a media release, the Customs Division said under this initiative, each household will be permitted to import the following items in either a standard-sized shipping barrel or an E-Container for personal use:

Clothing – limited to no more than seven (7) pieces of the same type

Foodstuff

Toiletries

Please note that a 10% Revenue Recovery Charge (RRC) along with a processing and handling fee of ten dollars (USD \$10.00) will apply.

Many residents look forward to this initiative each year as their family members in the United States, Canada or elsewhere use the opportunity to purchase foods in bulk to send back to Antigua and Barbuda to take advantage of the initiative.

Haiti: Tragically descending into deeper crisis

As gang violence spirals out of control in Haiti, the limitations of international efforts to restore order, including a Kenyan-led security mission, have laid bare the depth of the crisis. A nation already on its knees now faces an even darker abyss. Haiti's tragedy serves as a stark reminder that no matter how dire circumstances may seem, they can always deteriorate further.

Centuries of Injustice

Haiti's revolution (1791-1804) —the first successful uprising by enslaved people—should have been a beacon of hope. Instead, it marked the beginning of relentless punishment by a global order which was infused with racism and avarice. Forced to pay France reparations for its own freedom, Haiti was crippled by debt and subjected to invasions, occupations, and economic exploitation. This financial and political stranglehold laid the groundwork for centuries of poverty and instability.

Corrupt leadership, often propped up by external powers, exacerbated the country's struggles for decades, while natural disasters—earthquakes, hurricanes, and floods—repeatedly decimated its fragile infrastructure. By the time President Jovenel Moïse was assassinated in 2021, Haiti's constitutional institutions had disintegrated.


The nation was left adrift, ruled by unpopular decrees without any form of public participation, amid surging gang violence, widespread hunger, and political paralysis.

A Nation on the Brink

Today, Haiti teeters on the edge of collapse. Nearly half of its population—5.41 million people—are acutely food insecure, and one in six children faces famine. Over 700,000 people have been forcibly displaced, while more than 900 schools remain closed, depriving hundreds of thousands of children of education.

Criminal gangs dominate nearly 80% of Port-au-Prince and its surrounding areas, holding 2.7 million people hostage to violence, extortion, and kidnappings. Even more alarmingly, thousands of children are now counted among their ranks, coerced into roles ranging from looters to murderers. These gangs, emboldened by weak governance, maintain their firepower and expand their reach even in the face of international interventions.

Haiti's police force, outgunned and underfunded, struggles to maintain order. The Kenyan-led multinational security mission, a contingent of just 430 personnel, has proven woefully inadequate against entrenched criminal networks. Frustrated communities have taken matters into

their own hands, forming vigilante groups to deliver brutal justice. In one chilling scene, gang members' bodies were dismembered in front of a silent and seemingly complicit police force.

The Transitional Council: Losing Its Opportunity to Lead

As basic services collapse and desperation deepens, the Transitional Council has squandered its chance to provide leadership. In April 2024, under pressure from the United States and with the backing of CARICOM, Haiti established the Council to stabilize the country, restore constitutional legitimacy, and pave the way for elections. The Council appointed Garry Conille, a former UNICEF official.

as interim prime minister, alongside a technocratic cabinet. While this initiative offered hope, it was fraught with danger from the start and destined to fail. The mix of ambitious politicians and technocrats -many of whom were not selected by the Council – set up disquiet and quickly led to dysfunction

By November, the Council's fractious relationship with Conille and his cabinet culminated in his dismissal. In just five months, little progress had been made toward stabilizing the country or addressing the root causes of its crisis. This failure further eroded international confidence and left Haiti's plight unresolved.

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UN Peacekeeping Initiative Stalled – Despite Humanitarian Disaster

Haiti's plight is more than a humanitarian disaster - it is a test of the United Nations effectiveness. The Haitian government, supported by CARICOM and the United States, has called for a full-scale UN peacekeeping operation.

Such an initiative could provide the resources and personnel needed to restore order, with its costs distributed among all UN member states. However, China and Russia - two of the five veto powers in the Security Council - have opposed the idea, arguing that peacekeepers are meant to maintain peace, not combat urban crime or rescue dysfunctional states. This effort, therefore, remains stalled.

The Collapse of Basic Services

As violence intensifies, basic services have crumbled. The United Nations recently evacuated its staff from Port-au-Prince, citing escalating dangers. Humanitarian organizations, like Doctors Without Borders, have suspended operations due to threats against staff and patients. Food for the Poor, a nonprofit organization that manages feeding programs, can no longer deliver aid reliably because of gang blockades, road hazards, and airport closures.

The Transitional Council's inability to form an Electoral Council or ad-

constituvance tional reforms has only compounded the crisis. Without these critical steps, Haiti remains stuck in a cycle of instability. A new prime minister, Alix Didier Fils-Aimé, has taken office, but his government faces the daunting task of rebuilding trust, addressing gang violence, and navigating a Transitional Council prone to micromanagement. Time is not on his side.

The Way Forward

Ultimately, the responsibility for Haiti's recovery lies with its leadership. The Transitional Council must demonstrate unity,

stability, competence, and urgency in its efforts to stabilize the country. Without decisive action to rebuild constitutional institutions and restore governance, the Council risks isolating Haiti further, plunging the country deeper into chaos as the gangs grow stronger, more strident, and more determined.

Haiti's history is one of resilience against unimaginable odds, but the resilience of its beleaguered people alone cannot rebuild a nation. It is time for its leaders to rise above petty divisions and forge an agreed plan to achieve stability and peace. Only then can Haiti's neighbours and international partners step forward with confidence to help pull the nation from the brink.

This is the task to which all involved — both domestically and internationally — must commit, setting aside perceived strategic interests, whether personal or national.




Extreme heat, beach erosion projected for C'bean in new report

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GECOM refutes allegations of election fraud cover up

The Guyana Elections Commission (GECOM) has strongly rebutted claims of electoral misconduct, emphasizing that only the High Court possesses the constitutional authority to determine the lawfulness of an election.

The statement comes in response to recent allegations by Dr David Hinds of the Working People's Alliance (WPA), who accused GECOM Chairman Justice Claudette Singh of "declaring an election with knowledge of the potential breach of the law" during a November 25 talk show.

GECOM shared that according to Article 163 (1) (b) (i) of Guyana's Constitution, the High Court holds exclusive ju-



risdiction to investigate any potential irregularities in election proceedings. GECOM explicitly stated that the commission cannot independently validate election results or conduct comprehensive investigations into electoral allegations

A press statement indicated that Dr Hinds specifically referenced alleged voter impersonation incidents from the 2020 National Recount exercise.

However, GECOM stressed that such mat-

ters can only be legally addressed through a formal election petition, not through administrative investigation.

Despite receiving documents related to the alleged voter impersonation, the commission lacks the constitutional mandate to conduct an independent investigation into these claims.

The release serves as a robust defence against accusations of a fraud cover-up, urging political stakeholders and public commentators to conduct thorough legal research before making statements that could potentially undermine public confidence in the electoral process.

GECOM warned that spreading misinformation can erode trust in electoral institutions and potentially harm the reputation of election officials.

tially affecting up to 57% of hotel revenue.

All four countries are expected to experience 22 additional days per year with temperatures exceeding 30° Celsius.

"These four countries can strengthen resilience and reduce economic vulner-abilities by combining strategic investments with more efficient resource use," said Benoit Bosquet, World Bank Regional Director for Planet.

He emphasized the critical importance of investing in nature-based solutions and transitioning away from fossil fuels, particularly in energy, transport, and waste sectors.

The report recommends developing a "resilient core" of investments that would allow countries to meet Sustainable Development Goals while minimizing infra-

structure damage and service disruptions during climate events. Grenada's Minister for Climate Resilience, the Environment and Renewable Energy, Kerryne James, called the report "a blueprint for addressing vulnerabilities and charting a path to sustainable growth." She stressed that addressing these challenges is not optional but essential for the country's future.

OECS Commission Director General Dr Didacus Jules advocated for expanding the report's scope to additional countries, recognizing its value in bridging climate and development planning.

The report serves as a call to action, urging collaboration between governments, the private sector, and the international community to address the mounting challenges posed by climate change in the Eastern Caribbean.

Bahamas: National security minister denies cocaine trafficking involvement

CMC - National Security Minister, Wayne Munroe, has dismissed suggestions that he is the "high-ranking politician" being referred to by United States law enforcement authorities to facilitate a cocaine trafficking scheme.

Munroe told The Tribune newspaper that he had not received any money nor had he been asked to accommodate any wrongdoing.

"I have not offered to accommodate any wrongdoing, and I state that categorically," he told the newspaper. Prime Minister Phillip Davis told Parliament on Wednesday that the revelations by the United States authorities linking members of the Royal Bahamas Police Force (RBPF) and the Royal Bahamas Defence Force (RBDF) strike at the "core of who we are as a nation".

"Madam Speaker, this House and the Bahamian people deserve answers," he said, adding that the government of The Bahamas will act decisively to ensure that those responsible for these breaches, regardless of rank or position, are held accountable.

"This betrayal will not go unanswered," he vowed.

The United States attorney for the Southern District of New York, Damian Williams, Wednesday said that as alleged, for years, drug traffickers have smuggled

tons of cocaine through The Bahamas with the support and protection of corrupt Bahamian government officials who control airports throughout the country and provide sensitive information about US Coast Guard movements to drug traffickers.

"This Indictment the latest in a series of charges that this office and the DEA's Special Operations Division have brought against corrupt government officials around the globe, who partner with dangerous cocaine traffickers," he add-

Williams, along with Anne Milgram, the administrator of the US Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) announced on Wednesday afternoon the unsealing of the indictment charging 13 defendants with cocaine importation and related weapons offenses in connection with their participation in a massive cocaine importation conspiracy enabled by "corrupt Bahamian government officials".

The indictment states that in or about September 2024, one of the arrested explained that, in exchange for a two-million-dollar bribe. a high-ranking Bahamian politician, whom the man named, would authorize the assistance and involvement of armed RBPF officials to facilitate incoming cocaine shipments.

But Munroe, who is currently attending a Caribbean Community (CARICOM) ministers of national security meeting in St Kitts, told the newspaper whether the politician's identity is disclosed will depend on whether the US communicates the matter confidentially or not.

"The prime minister is dealing directly with that aspect of it and I would prefer to defer to him for that. But I know that in some of these law enforcement matters. information is given to you on the basis that you do not disclose it," Monroe said.

Munroe also commented on statements posted on social media, questioning the future of Police Commissioner, Clayton Fernander, as a result of the arrests of members of the RBPF.

"I think the simple answer to it is, as put by the prime minister, we're going to be holding everyone accountable. This is a very serious matter. It is said, if you read the indictment, that it began in May of 2021 and that preceded the time that this present administration came in before Mr Fernander took the chair.

"All I would say is, you judge the head of an organisation by how they react to things like this, and so you may have bad apples in every organisation and you judge the leadership by how they react to it, and so he will be judged by how he reacts to it, just as no doubt the public will judge us by how we react to it."

Munroe said that while RBPF has shown a willingness to hold officers accountable, "what would be reprehensible is if police officers were doing things that were wrong and the police force was covering up for them

"What is being demonstrated is the police force isn't covering up for persons," he told the Tribune newspaper.

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Romania orders election recount after TikTok bias claims

A recount of the votes cast in Sunday's first round of presidential elections in Romania has been ordered by the country's top court following allegations that social media platform Tik-Tok gave "preferential treatment" to the surprise winner, Calin Georgescu.

The Constitutional Court also rejected claims filed by two of the losing candidates who accused Georgescu of illegal campaign financing.

Georgescu, a radical with no party of his own, campaigned mainly on TikTok.

The platform has categorically denied it favoured the far-right, pro-Russia candidate.

Georgescu won 23% of the vote, with 19% for the runner up, Elena Lasconi, of the opposition Save Romania Union.

Prime Minister Marcel Ciolacu of the governing Social Democrats came third.

The Central Election Bureau must now decide how to carry out the recount, with what personnel, and by what deadline.

A full recount is unprecedented in Romanian post-Communist history.

As things stand, Georgescu is due to face Lasconi in a run-off on 8 December.

"Extremism is fought by voting, not backstage games," Lasconi said.

"I call on the Central Election Bureau to handle the vote recount wisely. The law must be the same for all, not interpreted differently for some."

TikTok also faced accusations that it did not respect electoral rules by Romania's top security body, the Supreme Council of National Defence.

Outgoing President Klaus Iohannis, who convened the council, said

the platform "did not mark him as a choice. political candidate".

But TikTok has vehemently denies the allegations.

"It is categorically false to claim his account was treated differently to any other candidate," it said in a statement.

"When Romanian authorities contacted us to flag a number of videos that lacked identifiers... we took action on those videos within 24 hours."

Georgescu, himself, has pushed back against criticism that he used the social media platform illegally to gain an electoral advantage.

The 62-year-old has more than 330,000 followers - up from 30,000 just over a fortnight ago - and more than 4m likes.

"The budget of this campaign was zero... I had a very small team - a maximum of 10 people, no more. But we had millions of people behind [us]," he told the BBC.

"I'm not different - the Romanian people are different. Romanian people need freedom. Real democracy means spirituality. God. Our land. Our property. Our soul. Our family."

He added that state institutions were trying to deny the people's

Anti-Georgescu protesters have already taken to the streets in Bucharest and several provincial cities, while Georgescu has appealed to his supporters to "stay home with friends and family" and not respond to provocations.

Romania's Telecoms regulator Ancom has called for TikTok to be suspended pending an investigation by prosecutors into suspicions of manipulation of the electoral process.

Romania's National Audiovisual Council has also asked the European Commission to investigate the way TikTok, which bans formal political advertising, was used in the election.

Romania will hold a parliamentary election this weekend, with the farright parties AUR and SOS Romania hoping for a surge in popularity in the wake of the presidential vote.

The parties of the governing coalition, Social Democrats and National Liberals, are in disarray - humiliated by the failure of their candidates in the presidential election.

Across Romania, and in the large Romanian diaspora abroad, there's a mood of elation, despair, or simply confusion.

Syria rebels launch major offensive in north-west and gain territory

Rebel forces launched a major offensive in north-western Syria, capturing territory from President Bashar al-Assad's forces for the first time in years.

The Islamist militant group Hayat Tahrir al-Sham (HTS) and allied factions said they had seized control of a number of towns and villages in Aleppo and Idlib provinces since Wednesday.

The Syrian military said its forces were confronting a "large-scale" attack by "terrorists" and inflicting heavy losses on them.

A UK-based monitoring group said more than 180 combatants on both sides had been killed in the fighting. At least 19 civilians had also been killed in Syrian and Russian air strikes on opposition-held areas, it added.

More than half a million people have been killed in the civil war that erupted after the government cracked down violently on peaceful pro-democracy protests in 2011.

Idlib is the last remaining opposition stronghold and is home to more than 4 million people, many of whom have been displaced during the conflict and are living in dire conditions.

The enclave is most-

ly controlled by HTS, but Turkish-backed rebel factions operating under the banner of the Syrian National Army (SNA) and Turkish forces are also based there.

In 2020, Turkey and Russia - a staunch ally of Assad - brokered a ceasefire to halt a push by the Syrian government to retake Idlib.

That led to an extended lull in violence, but sporadic clashes, air strikes and shelling continued.

Last month, the UN special envoy for Syria warned that the wars in Gaza and Lebanon appeared to be "catalysing conflict in north-west Syria in a dangerous manner".

Geir Pedersen HTS had carried out a significant raid into government-held areas, Russia had resumed air strikes for the first time in months, and pro-government forces had significantly accelerated drone strikes and shelling.

On Wednesday, HTS and its allies said they had launched their offensive to "deter aggression" and "thwart the enemy's plans", accusing the government and allied Iranbacked militias of escalation and aggression in north-west.

But it came as the Syrian government and its allies were preoccupied with other conflicts.

In neighbouring Lebanon, an Israeli military campaign has devastated the Iran-backed Hezbollah movement, whose fighters helped turned the tide of the Syrian civil war.

Israel has also stepped up its air strikes inside Syria on targets linked to Iran, Hezbollah and other Iran-backed militia groups, while Russian forces are focused on the war in Ukraine.

By the end of the first day of the offensive, the rebels had advanced into the western Aleppo countryside, taking them within 10km (6 miles) from the outskirts of Aleppo city, according to the UK-based cont'd on pg 19

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Syrian Observatory for Human Rights (SOHR).

It reported that they had seized the Syrian army 46th Regiment's base and at least eight villages.

On Thursday, the monitoring group said the rebels had cut the M5 highway between Aleppo and the capital Damascus near Zarbah, 15km south-west of Aleppo city, and taken control of the interchange between the M5 and the M4 highway further south, near Saraqeb.

The SOHR said 121 rebels, most of them members of HTS, and 40 government troops and 21 militiamen had been killed over the past two days.

The rebels said in a Telegram statement that they had seized the town of Khan al-Assal, which is 5km west of Aleppo city, and had killed more than 200 members of pro-government forces.

A Syrian military statement put out on Thursday said its forces had "confronted the terrorist attack that is still ongoing with various weapons and in co-operation with friendly forces, leaving heavy losses in equipment and causalities among terrorists".

It did mention any losses among its forces, but Iranian news agencies said a senior commander in Iran's Revolutionary Guards serving as a "military adviser" in Syria, Brig Gen Kioumars Pourhashemi, had been killed in Aleppo province.

Meanwhile, the Syria Civil Defence, whose first responders are known as the White Helmets, said on Thursday that Syrian and Russian warplanes had struck residential neighbourhoods and shops in the opposition-controlled town of Atareb, 20km west of Aleppo, killing 14 civilians, including three children and two women.

It also reported that four civilians had been killed Darat Izza, north of Atareb.

Another civilian was by a rocket attack on a camp for displaced people near the Bab al-Hawa crossing on the Turkish border on Wednesday, it said.

The UN's Deputy Regional Humanitarian Co-ordinator for Syria, David Carden, said he was deeply alarmed by the impact of the escalating hostilities on civilians.

The International Rescue Committee said almost 7,000 families had been displaced and that some health facilities and schools had been forced to suspend services.

It appealed for an "immediate de-escalation" and called on all parties to ensure the protection of civilians, civilian infrastructure and humanitarian operations.

CWI launches innovative development programme in Tasmania

The other goals for Blackburn Palace were scored by Jamal Tavenier in the 16th minute; Sowandae



Beyond honing technical skills, the camp emphasizes mental resilience and cultural adaptation, preparing players for the demands of international cricket.

The initiative reflects a commitment by CWI to modernize its devel-

opment pathways, drawing inspiration from successful programmes like those undertaken by the New Zealand Test team.

The players will also serve as ambassadors upon their return, sharing their experiences and insights with territorial coaches and peers across the Caribbean. This marks the first time CWI has deployed contracted academy players for such specialized overseas training, signaling a strategic shift towards holistic development.

With plans to make this an annual feature of the cricket calendar, CWI continues to invest in the next generation of West Indies stars, ensuring the region remains competitive on the global stage.

Andrew among selectees as CWI launches innovative India training camp

Antiguan teenager Jewel Andrew is among seven of the region's most promising young cricketers to attend a specialized training camp for emerging talent in India next month.

The groundbreaking player development initiative, which is being undertaken by Cricket West Indies (CWI), will take place at the prestigious Chennai Super Kings Academy in India.

The two-week programme, running from December 1 to 14, represents a significant investment in the future of West Indies cricket and aims to equip the players with vital skills to excel in challenging overseas conditions.

The selected players include three contracted franchise talents — Kirk McKenzie, Matthew Nandu, and Kevin Wickham — alongside current and former West Indies Academy players Teddy Bishop and Jewel Andrew, and ex-West Indies Under-19 standouts Jordan Johnson and Ackeem Auguste.

in regional cricket, earning this opportunity to refine their abilities against spin bowling, a critical area for success in subcontinental conditions.

On Saturday, October 26, Antiguan wicketkeeper-batsman Jewel Andrew was included in the West Indies' playing XI for the third ODI in Sri Lanka, making him the first 17-year-old to play for West Indies' men's team since Sir Garry Sobers.

He was rewarded with

a call-up to the West Indies team for the ODI leg of the tour, and became the first player aged 17 or under to represent the West Indies' men's team for 70 years.

The 17-year-old Andrew has had a meteoric rise since his stellar performance in the 2024 Under-19 World Cup in South Africa, with the highlight of his tournament being a superb century against the tournament hosts.

He became the young-

est-ever player in the Caribbean Premier League earlier this year, and scored a half-century against the St. Kitts and Nevis Patriots on debut in the competition for Antigua and Barbuda Falcons.

Accompanied by West Indies Academy head coach Ramesh Subasinghe and assistant coach Rohan Nurse, the group departs for India on Friday, November 29 (today).

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
