

PM BROWNE CALLS OUT SANDALS



Local News PM Browne calls out Sandals over its anti-tax policy

Browne is again calling out the luxury hotel brand - Sandals - for its policy of not wanting to pay taxes generally, and for wanting to hold onto ABST that it collects on behalf of the government.

Speaking on the Browne and Browne show on Point FM on Saturday, PM Browne revealed that the latest issue surrounds recent assessment performed by the Inland Revenue Department where it determined that the company owes an estimated \$30 million in taxes, most of which were from ABST

Prime Minister Gaston payments which it collected for the government and was holding on to portions of the money.

> "I don't understand why these 'so-called' investors feel that they are the only game in town and are the only stakeholders to benefit. So they try to wring every ounce of revenue out of the business and they don't want the government to get anything in the form of taxes. I have been through this already with Sandals and I don't want to go down that road with them again," he emphasized.

The prime minister said he is making a public appeal to the company to cooperate with the IRD as he wants to avoid another public spat with them. He noted too that Sandals had a recent issue with the Bahamas where they ended up having to pay 'some money'.

"Everywhere they go, this is their modus operandi! Everywhere they go, there is a feeling that they don't want to pay government taxes and that they are the ones who must extract all these profits so that they can expand. Well, I want to tell my dear friend, Adam Stewart, (Sandals' Executive Chairman), Sandals is not the only stakeholder when you open your hotels in a Caribbean country; you have staff who deserve a good pay; you have the government who ought to get its fair share of taxes; you cannot rely exclusively on exploiting concessions and to push governments into the ground; you all need to stop it!" the prime minister declared.

He described the Sandals' model as reminiscent to the colonial period and slavery, noting that he is very disappointed that a Caribbean brand, which is loved and admired by the people of the region, would be engaged in the exploitation of Caribbean people.

"This is a colonialist model that does not work

for the Caribbean people and Sandals needs to end this practice immediately," he advised.

According to PM Browne, as a beloved Caribbean brand, Sandals ought to feel proud that it is making a worthwhile contribution to the Caribbean countries within which it operates, but the opposite is true based on its policies.

"You should be proud to be able to say that your workers are making a decent salary so that they could afford a mortgage, a good car etc. It's not about you expanding while others are suffering. We can't even attract workers to the hotels sector because of the low wages, while you are making tens of millions of dollars each year out of each of these small economies and every time there is an assessment, you come with all kinds of reasons why you should not be paying.

"I'm tired of it. If this is going to be your attitude going forward where only Sandals benefits, then take your hotel elsewhere; and I am very serious," PM Browne declared. The prime minister reiterated that he does not want another public spat with the hotel and he is urging them to come to the table in a spirit of equity to resolve the outstanding matters.

He said he was 'shocked' when he was told that the hotel was not cooperating with the IRD.

According to the prime minister the issue with Sandals is not an Antigua and Barbuda problem... but a Caribbean problem, as the company's policies throughout the region are the same everywhere.



Local News POINTERPART **The Antigua and Barbuda** Economy: A success story to tell

The Antigua and Barbuda economy has regained all the grounds it lost during the 2020-21 COVID-19 pandemic when it lost more than twenty percent of its value. Tangible indicators of the strength and performance of the economy will come to light when all the data is presented to the ministry of finance at the end of the year. New records are expected to be established in revenues: an economy valued at over \$6 billion and growth rate that averaged approximately eight (8) percent over the last several years.

It is instructive too, that the economy will out-perform the forecast of leading institutions; international the International Monetary Fund has predicted growth of just over four percent for 2024, while the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) is predicting that the economy will grow by six percent.

However, in the words of Financial Secretary, Rasona Davis-Crump, who provided insights into the economy as the country celebrates its 43rd anniversary of Political Independence, real growth for the year will be between seven (7) and eight (8) percent.

"We continue to rebound (from the pandemic) very, very strongly as we expect

growth of between 7 and 8 percent for 2024. There are projections by ECLAC on one hand, which indicates that the growth will be 6.3percent, however, the figures upon which those projections are based, are from June this year. The IMF has projected 4.9 percent," she revealed.

Davis-Crump said she is not too concerned about the projections at this point as in the end 'the figures will bear things out' when the actual data arrives at the end of the year. That's important according to the Financial Secretary as there are many uncertainties, mainly international, that could still impact the economy negatively.

"There are many things

that are unfolding that could have knock-on effects on the economy positively or negatively. However, based on where we are today with the projects that are in the pipeline in terms of hotels, business expansion or private home construction coupled with the significant performance in tourism, I would say that we are looking very good," she declared.

Tourism is the main driver of the Antigua and Barbuda economy and recent data indicates that the sector has already bypassed the figures for 2019, generally seen as the best performing year on record for Antigua and Barbuda tourism.

At a meeting in St. John's to discuss plans for Antigua and Barbuda to

host Caribbean Marketplace next year, CEO of the Caribbean Hotel and Tourism Association (CHTA), Vanessa Ledesma said the Caribbean continues to show impressive growth with a 16% increase in international arrivals compared to 2023, ranking second only to the APAC region. "Antigua and Barbuda, in particular, is leading this surge, with an expected 17% growth in overseas arrivals from October to December, just behind St. Maarten. Moreover, Antigua and Barbuda stands out as the top-performing destination in terms of seat capacity growth, with a remarkable 19% increase over last year. These statistics clearly demonstrate the value Antigua and Barbuda brings as the host of Caribbean Travel Marketplace 2025, cementing its position as a key player in regional tourism," she observed.

Similar sentiments were expressed by the Florida Caribbean Cruise Association in their report on the cruise sector just last week. It showed that Antigua and Barbuda ranks only second to St. Kitts Nevis in terms of passenger and crews spending among Eastern Caribbean destinations. The total for Antigua and Barbuda was US\$89,1 million. This as the number of cruise calls and passengers continues to grow.



Public servants in line for onemonth extra salary for December

Workers in the public sector are in line for an extra month's salary in time for the Christmas holiday period.

In responding to a question regarding back-pay when he appeared Saturday on the *Browne and Browne* show, Prime Minister Gaston Browne, who is also the country's Minister of Finance, reported that he had instructed the team at the ministry headquarters to 'find the money' so that public sector workers can get an extra month's salary for December. PM Browne said the extra salary will constitute a portion of the back-pay that government owes to public servants following the fourteen percent salary increase which went into effect nearly two years ago.

The egg-production business that former gang members will manage will soon be a reality

The egg-production business enterprise that will be owned and managed by former members of a Grays Farm-based gang, will soon become a reality.

Prime Minister Gaston Browne announced that the first container of feed as well as an estimated two thousand chicks have arrived on the island and are to be turned over to the new business as soon as it is up and ready.

He said the ABLP Caretaker for the St. John's Rural West constituency, Michael C. Joseph, is spearheading the efforts to establish the business,

Joseph told Point Express newspaper that the two acres of land upon which the buildings will be erected to house the chicks is currently being cleared. "The land is located on the approach to the landfill at Cooks and the preparation should be completed this week. Immediately after that is done, we will begin to erect the build-

ings. Meanwhile, we are conducting training for the guys who will be in charge of the facility. They will undergo training in management, marketing and financial management for about a six-month period," he noted.

He revealed that funding for the project has been provided by the Cabinet. Joseph has assembled a team of experts on how to successfully manage a business to conduct the training. He reported that the former gang members are quite anxious to get started.

"The experts will also teach them how to run an egg-production facility with emphasis on critical areas such as hygiene and the nurture and care of the layers. The guys are excited about the project as they see it as acquiring new skills and a form of employment. They recognize too that they have to approach it with much seriousness in other to make it a sustainable enterprise," he explained.

Joseph said he continues to interact with the young men alongside Mitch Jeremiah, who has been a part of the team that joined PM Browne in his several engagements with the former gang members.

"These guys are eager to become productive members of the society and we are doing our part in making this happen," he remarked.

In addition to all this, the prime minister said there is also a commitment from the government to employ the former gang members in an exercise to beautify the city and its environs.

The PM also made an appeal to members of the private sector to reach out to the young men to offer either part time or full time jobs to help keep them off the streets.

Transportation representatives leave for World Travel Market

Joseph noted that these experiences are important for as many members of the association as possible as they will get a first-hand look and an understanding of the efforts that are made by the tourism authority to attract visitors to Antigua and Barbuda.

"I want other members of the association to recognize that visitors who come to our country don't do so by accident. The tourism authority and others put in much effort and energy to market the country and everyone ought to appreciate this and to approach their contributions to the sector from the point of view of knowledge," he remarked.

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WISH responds to recent commentary on mental health in Antigua and Barbuda

"For lack of wisdom, my people perish" - Hosea 4:6. This powerful scripture speaks to the importance of seeking knowledge and understanding concerning human well-being. While religion and spirituality play vital roles in our society and personal lives, they should never be wielded as tools to dismiss or degrade scientific research and medical facts. As the verse suggests, true wisdom comes from embracing both spiritual insights and human understanding – including the vast body of research and evidence supporting mental health care.

Today, the Wadadli Initiative for Self-care and Healing (WISH) addresses recent commentary questioning the legitimacy of mental health concerns in our community. As a mental health advocacy organization in Antigua and Barbuda, we feel compelled to provide clarity and context to this important discussion.

"Mental health challenges are not a product of moral failure or lack of faith - they are legitimate medical conditions that affect one in four Caribbean citizens," states WISH founder Chaneil Imhoff. "The World Health Organization reports that mental health conditions have increased by 25% since the pandemic, impacting people of all backgrounds, beliefs, and walks of life. Dismissing these challenges as merely spiritual issues does a grave disservice to our community and potentially prevents people from seeking life-saving help."

Imhoff continues, "We've seen firsthand how untreated mental health conditions impact families, workplaces, and communities across our islands. The statistics are clear: 75% of mental health conditions develop before age 24, yet the average person waits 11 years before seeking help, largely due to stigma and misconceptions."

WISH Content Creator Raisa Charles offers a balanced perspective on the intersection of faith and mental healthcare: "Religious freedom is a constitutional right and plays an important role in our society. People should do whatever helps them feel spiritually grounded and connected.

escapism remembering that some approaches can be so heavenly-minded that they are no earthly good. The idea that a person's mental health struggle is their fault due to a lack of faith is unsupportive at best and extremely harmful at worst. While involvement with communities of faith and spiritual support systems are often part of the treatment approach for improving a person's mental health, these measures are especially effective when paired with credible assessment, accurate diagnosis and therapeutic intervention where necessary. It is imperative that we, as a people, arm ourselves with sound, evidence-based infor-

mation before attempting to offer care and support to vulnerable communities."

WISH advocates for a comprehensive approach to mental health that:

Recognizes mental health as a fundamental aspect of overall wellbeing

Supports evidence-based treatment methods while respecting cultural and spiritual beliefs

Promotes early intervention and prevention strategies

Reduces stigma through education and open dialogue

Increases accessibility to mental health resources across Antigua and Barbuda

Independence Address by Prime Minister the Hon. Gaston Browne

My fellow citizens and residents of Antigua and Barbuda,

On this glorious occasion of our nation's 43rd independence, we have good reason for a deep sense of pride and gratitude.

Today, we not only celebrate our independence, but we also reaffirm our commitment to the principles that have brought us this far - resilience, belief in our worth as a people, and faith in our capacity to succeed.

As the Apostle Paul said, "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time, we will reap a harvest if we do not give up".

And, neither we, nor the generations before us, ever gave up.

Over the years, we have shown the world – and indeed the elements - that we, the people of Antigua and Barbuda, possess an indomitable spirit.

In the face of the COVID-19 pandemic - a disaster that crippled many economies and devastated lives across the globe—we stood firm.

Through swift, decisive action and careful management, we saved lives and safeguarded livelihoods.

While other nations faltered, we reopened our economy quickly and effectively, experiencing a recovery faster than most.

Our economy grew by 7.8% in 2023, second only to Guyana in the region, and our 2024 performance will be similar, evidencing that we continue to lead in recovery and resilience.

This was possible because we worked together, with faith and determination.

Undoubtedly, there have been political bickering and the usual political claims that sought to divide our communities; but our society as a people remained faithful to our common goals of uplifting our nation and strengthen-

But even as we celebrate our achievements, we know that there is still much work to be done.

Ten years ago, we inherited an outdated socio-economic infrastructure: our schools and other public buildings, roads, curbs and drains, water systems, electricity grid, and internet broadband services were in decay.

We faced unsustainable debt, economic contraction, high rates of crime, unemployment, bank failure and poverty.

But we steadfastly addressed each of these problems and worked diligently to resolve them.

That task is not yet over, but you know from your own lived experience that the situation has dramatically improved.

And as I have always implored you; let's give thanks for our achievements to date no matter how small.

Employment has increased to the point where we have a shortage of labour in crucial areas of our economy, to include construction and the hotel sector, further increasing our dependence on imported labor.

Access to education at all levels, and provision of health services have greatly progressed and are advancing every year.

Commencing in 2025, we will spend \$200 million to expand the UWI Five Islands Campus, which currently hosts over 1000 students, to provide even more opportunities for higher education; ensuring that every young person has the tools they need to contribute to our nation's future.

This is in addition to the \$20 Million investment in the Antigua & Barbuda institute of Continuing Education (The Harrison Centre), that is now providing vocational training for over 800 Antiguans & Barbudans.

We have expanded healthcare services to include kidney transplants and hip replacements. The construction of the cardiac centre and renal unit for advanced dialysis care should be completed in 2025, further advancing our healthcare delivery. In addition, the *cont'd on pg 11*

Cancer Centre will be retrofitted and re-equipped with modern equipment to enhance the delivery of cancer treatments and is projected to recommence operations in the first quarter of 2025.

With the establishment of a 40meg Liquid Natural Gas electricity plant earlier this year, the delivery of electricity has been better than at any other time in the history of our country. The delivery of water, though challenging, because of the persistent droughts, continues to improve with the expansion and upgrade of our water distribution system. We have expanded the water production capacity from 3 Million gallons per day to approximately 8.5 million per day and this is projected to increase to 12 Million per day in 2025, thereby satisfying the full water demand of our population.

Our roads remain a challenge.

Not because we have neglected them, but because they were ignored for far too long and unusual extreme weather events have taken a harsh toll. Nonetheless, we continue to pay focused attention on our main arteries and have recently purchased \$21 Million of heavy equipment to accelerate the reconstruction of our roads; especially our community roads.

Because we are an island, our society imports most of the commodities we need, including food products. In recent years particularly as costs have risen globally, we have been importing the increased costs of our major trading partners, and, in turn, this has raised prices for all of us.

Fortunately, we are beginning to enjoy a stabilization in prices, which had previously galloped to six percent earlier this year. As a caring administration, we did not wait for this imported inflation to fall to address this problem, but increased the wages, salaries and pensions of public servants, even in difficult financial circumstances.

By doing so, we eased the pressure of imported in-

flationary costs.

We also gave an example to the private sector to share its profits with the consumer by curtailing the extent of profit margins.

We did so on the basis that the private sector will sustain itself and prosper, if it maintains a large and steady clientele; if prices push purchasers out of the market, the private sector will quickly decline.

Further, we hoped that the entire private sector would follow the government's example by improving wages and salaries, rewarding their staff for productivity and encouraging them to help enlarge businesses and improve ser*cont'd on pg 12*

Several transformative projects are underway and are reshaping our economy and providing unprecedented opportunities for all our citizens.

On Barbuda, we have witnessed incredible progress.

From the devastation of Hurricane Irma seven years ago, Barbuda has been reborn, like a Phoenix for the ashes, with new energy and exciting prospects for its sustained advancement.

The modern international airport has opened Barbuda to international tourism, through projects like the "Peace, Love & Happiness (PLH) Resort, the luxury Nobu Resort by Robert De Niro, and RoseWood Luxury Hotel by Murbee Ltd, creating hundreds of jobs, directly and indirectly.

These initiatives are putting Barbuda on the map as one of the world's premier luxury destinations, giving opportunities for growth and development to all who inhabit the island.

On Antigua, there are several luxury resorts to be constructed included the recently launched US\$400M Nikki Beach Resort and Residences, the One & Only Hotel at half Moon Bay and the Luxury Marriot at Yeptons Beach, which will commence construction next month.

Our government has embarked on the construction of thousands of affordable homes, using eco-friendly, energy-efficient materials. These homes will not only provide security and comfort to our people; their construction will also generate employment and stimulate the economy.

There are ample employment opportunities in sectors such as construction and hospitality—so there is no justification to rob and kill.

Antigua and Barbuda offers work, and there are better, legal ways to provide for yourself and your families.

My fellow citizens and residents, as we continue on this journey to modernize Antigua and Barbuda, we must present our nation to the world as a place of investment, beauty, and dynamism.

In doing so, we cannot afford to tolerate decrepit buildings and abandoned lands overgrown with unsightly bush in our communities.

This is not the Antigua and Barbuda we envision for ourselves or for future generations.

To address this, my government will take decisive action.

We will confront the issue of derelict properties and unsightly parcels of land in built-up areas.

Property owners will be held accountable for the maintenance of their land, and if neglected, the costs of maintenance will become a charge against the property. Also, our government will exercise the power of sale at public auction for derelict properties where property taxes and other charges on the land remain unpaid for an extended period.

We will also tackle indiscriminate dumping, littering, and unregulated vending in public spaces.

The Government will enforce existing laws and strengthen regulations to ensure that our country remains *cont'd on pg 13*

On other occasions, we took initiatives to create or strengthen alliances.



Whether you are in Antigua or Barbuda, whether you are a student, a business owner, or a member of our diaspora, you have a role to play in shaping the future of our beloved country.



Haiti confirms date for inauguration of newly-elected president

CMC - The Organization of American States (OAS) and the Venice Commission of the Council of Europe say Haitian authorities have confirmed their intent to maintain February 7, 2026, as the target date for the inauguration of a newly-elected president.

The Washington-based OAS said it continues its work to assist Haiti in developing the "enabling legal framework" for its next general elections in collaboration with the European Commission for Democracy through Law, known as the Venice Commission.

The Venice Commission is the Council of Europe's advisory body on constitutional matters that provides legal advice to its member states and, in particular, assists states wishing to bring their legal and institutional structures into line with European standards and international experience in the fields of democracy, human rights and the rule of law.

The Venice Commission also helps to ensure the dissemination and consolidation of a common constitutional heritage, "playing a unique role in conflict management, and provides emergency constitutional aid to states in transition," the OAS said.

In keeping with the Commission's policy and in line with the OAS Secretary General Luis Almagro's commitment, the OAS said the work of the Venice Commission is being conducted "in close collaboration with the Haitian state and proceeds from the basis that all solutions to the current crisis must be Haitian-led and Haitian-approved."

"While participants discussed establishing intermediate steps toward this goal, all parties stressed that the re-establishment of security is a fundamental precondition for holding the referendum and the elections," said the OAS and the Venice Commission in a joint statement on Friday after a series of high-level meetings, from October 28 to 30, with a delegation from Haiti.

The OAS hosted the meetings through its Department of Electoral Cooperation and Observation (DECO) in following up to the OAS Permanent Council Resolution 1237.

"These sessions focused on essential constitutional and legislative measures needed to facilitate future elections in Haiti," the statement said. "Haitian authorities reiterated their call for international support, particularly through a United Nations peacekeeping mission, to assist in restoring safety and stability."

In parallel with these efforts, the OAS and the Venice Commission said the Haitian Steering Committee plans to launch a national consultation on constitutional reform beginning November 7, 2024, with a draft constitution anticipated by the end of December.

This draft is expected to be presented to the Haitian



public ahead of a referendum planned for 2025.

"The Venice Commission has offered to provide recommendations to the draft constitution, while DECO remains available for technical cooperation on specific issues, if requested by Haitian authorities," the statement said. "Haitian authorities have pledged to keep both the public and international partners informed on the progress of these initiatives."

In a collaborative spirit, the statement said Haiti, the Venice Commission and the OAS have "committed to open communication channels and to considering a roadmap to support Haiti's next steps following the adoption of a new constitution." Conclusions from these discussions will be made available next week.

The Venice Commission is scheduled to issue its final opinion in December 2024 on potential constitutional and legislative solutions for Haiti's electoral processes.

"This opinion will address several areas discussed during the meetings, such as the stability of electoral institutions, gender equality in elections, youth representation, voting for Haitians abroad, electronic vote, party funding and formation, security conditions for voters and materials, and voting rights," the statement said.

At the request of Almagro, the statement said the Venice Commission issued an Interim Opinion in June 2024 on potential constitutional and legislative approaches to elections in Haiti.

"This opinion, while provisional, highlighted the importance of a secure and inclusive electoral framework, and underlined the principle that the Haitian people and their representatives will determine the terms and timing for resolving the current crisis."

The OAS expressed its gratitude to the governments of Canada, France, and the United States for their "generous contributions, which made it possible to hold these meetings and to secure the participation of the Haitian delegation in these productive discussions."

Jamaica: INDECOM concerned about more police officers being prosecuted

CMC - The Independent Commission of Investigations, INDECOM, has expressed concern that a significant number of police officers continue to be prosecuted for serious offenses.

INDECOM is the state agency tasked to undertake investigations concerning actions by members of the security forces

According to the agency's Commissioner Hugh Faulkner, he was hoping that the Police High Command would review a report prepared by INDECOM, with a view to effecting changes to police operations.

He said the police high command should review the conduct of the police to prevent them from being charged.

Speaking during a press conference on Friday, Faulkner revealed that for the period January 2011 to December 2023, more than 150 cases were brought before the courts involving police officers who have been charged.


The commissioner also called for the full implementation of body-worn cameras by the Jamaica Constabulary Force (JCF) and all law enforcement bodies as police-related fatalities reach alarming levels across the country.

Fauklner then warned that the failure to activate body-worn cameras during police operations not only undermines accountability but also deepens public mistrust in law enforcement.

The commissioner added that at the current rate of fatal and non-fatal shootings by security forces, this year is projected to have the highest number of incidents in 11 years.

"Where they have been worn, the majority of cases have shown that officers fail to turn on the body-worn cameras, especially where a shooting incident occurs."

"Our new case management sys-

tem ensures that the data is captured on every event that inquiry is made and documented. Equally, the deployment of body-worn cameras to the specialised policing teams has not been introduced at all, and these teams are deployed in prepared and planned operations.

The commission again called for the swiftest and fullest implementation of this critical investigative equipment and tool for the procurement of justice."

The commission noted that, despite the "broken record" recommendation, implementation has not occurred in any meaningful way.

The "broken record" recommendation refers to a recurring recommendation from oversight bodies and human rights organisations regarding the conduct and oversight of Jamaica's security forces, particularly concerning accountability, transparency, and the use of force.

Stakeholders have noted that while the recommendations are consistent, implementation has been slow, leading to ongoing concerns from both domestic and international observers.

Meanwhile, INDECOM Deputy Commissioner Hammish Campbell pointed out that of the 252 fatal and non-fatal shooting incidents in 2023, not a single one involved the deployment of a working body-worn camera.

"One camera was deployed in a fatal shooting incident, but the officer failed to turn it on, and that matter has been reported to the commissioner of the JCF."

Campbell added that body-worn cameras would significantly enhance the evidence-gathering process and alleviate ongoing concerns regarding alleged abuses by security forces while supporting traffic enforcement.

INDECOM notes that 58 people have been killed by security forces in 50 planned operations as of the end of October.

"So, 40 percent of people killed so far this year have come from planned operations where these specialised teams enter properties, yards, and premises, resulting in fatalities. In not one of those planned operations were body-worn cameras deployed," Campbell stated

In its report tabled in Parliament earlier this week, INDECOM pointed to an ever-increasing number of people being killed by security forces.

"The current projection shows that, unless trends are reversed by the security forces in Jamaica, 2024 will see the highest level of fatal incidents since 2013. In 2013, there were 253 fatalities, indicating a significant issue at present," INDECOM's Commissioner stated.

INDECOM noted that 2019 had the lowest police fatal shootings, with 86, and, since then, there has been an 80 percent increase in police fatal shootings. The numbers for previous years are as follows: 2020 had 115 fatalities, 2021 had 127, and 2022 had 134 police fatal shootings.

Ex-police officers jailed over Brazil politician's murder

Two former police officers have been jailed in Brazil for the murder of Marielle Franco, a prominent left-wing politician killed in a drive-by shooting in 2018.

Anderson Gomes, Franco's driver, was also killed in the attack but her press officer Fernanda Chaves, who was in the car, survived.

Ronnie Lessa confessed to firing the shots and was sentenced to 78 years and nine months, while Élcio de Queiroz received 59 years and eight months for being behind the wheel.

Franco, a gay Black woman, was an emerging light in Brazil's socialist party, with her death at the age of 38 sparking nationwide protests.

Speaking to the court from prison by video-link, Lessa said he was "blinded" and "driven crazy" by the prospect of a million-dollar reward for the murder.

In March 2024, Brazil's Justice Minister Ricardo

The commission also highlighted that many videos of incidents have been posted online recently.

"This underscores the importance of video footage in understanding police-civilian interactions, and we have seen numerous instances where digital images and video material have aided in establishing the truth in various matters," Commissioner Faulkner remarked.

INDECOM emphasises that police-ci-

Lewandowski said the homicide was "evidently politically motivated".

He said Franco wanted to convert property into housing for the poor, while others wanted to use it for commercial use.

Both defendants signed plea bargains, leading to the arrest of politician Chiquinho Brazão and his brother Domingos in March on suspicion of ordering the hit.

Lessa said the brothers

told him Rivaldo Barbosa, the state's chief of police at the time, had signed off the killing. Barbosa was arrested the same month.

After the sentencing, Franco's father Antônio da Silva Neto said his family would continue their fight for justice.

"It doesn't end here because there were masterminds [of the crime]. The question we're asking now is: when will the masterminds be convicted?"

Life sentences do not exist under Brazilian law and each defendant is expected to serve a maximum of 30 years.

The two were ordered to pay together 706,000 reais (\pounds 93,000; \$120,000) in damages to Franco's mother, partner and daughter, and to Gomes' wife.

They were also ordered to pay a pension to Gomes' son Arthur until he is 24.

Chaves, who survived the shooting, told the court how the night unfolded and "completely changed" her life.

Shortly after the attack, Chaves and her family fled the country and she was not able to attend Franco's funeral or memorial service. She has since moved back to Brazil.

Slavery reparations not about transfer of cash, says Lammy

UK Foreign Secretary David Lammy has said the concept of reparations for former colonial nations affected by slavery "is not about the transfer of cash".

In his first comments since 56 Commonwealth leaders in October signed a joint letter saying "the time has come" for a conversation about reparations, Lammy told the BBC that was not "the debate people are wanting to have".

"I'm keen to emphasise that there's a sort of simplistic press debate in part of the media that thinks this is about the transfer of cash," he said.

Speaking in Nigeria, Lammy said instead the UK wanted to look to developing relations with the continent based on the sharing of skills and science.

"It's not about the transfer of cash, particularly at a time of a cost of living crisis around much of the globe,

The UK has faced growing calls from Commonwealth leaders to pay reparations for the country's role in the slave trade.

Before the Samoa summit, Downing Street had said the issue was not due for discussion but Sir Keir Starmer later signed a document calling for talks on "reparatory justice" alongside other Commonwealth leaders.

Lammy spoke to the BBC at the beginning of a trip in which he will visit Nigeria and South Africa - among the continent's biggest economies.

He said he wanted to launch a fivemonth consultation period with African nations.

"I think the UK needs a new approach to Africa," the foreign secretary said.

"Much has changed since the last

time my party was in government under Tony Blair and Gordon Brown, where there was a huge commitment to the continent but it was largely based on development.

"The dynamism, the energy here in Lagos. The potential for growth and opportunity in a range of areas. There is so much potential.

"What I hope over the coming months and years is that the UK can partner more, here in Nigeria and on the continent.

"And that the UK is present once more, because what I've heard is that the UK has stepped back somewhat over the last few years, it reflects on our trading figures.

"There's much that I think we can do together over the coming months and years."

Asked about other issues relating to Africa, Lammy said the conflict in Sudan was of "tremendous concern" and said the UK planned to make that a priority during November, when it has the rotational presidency of the United Nations Security Council.

He said: "The loss of life is unbelievable and outstrips other conflicts around the world.

"The humanitarian catastrophe that has now been unfolding for many months is something of tremendous concern.

"We have just become the chair of the UN Security Council and I intend to make Sudan my priority over the course of this next month.

"I will be in New York raising the issues - both the humanitarian issues, but also how we bring the parties together to try and reach a peaceful outcome.

"It's been a subject of huge concern that Sudan has not commanded the international attention that it requires, given the way that it's not just the suffering involved, but the way that it is frankly unpicking stability in the wider region, and will have huge implications potentially if Sudan is to be a a totally failed state. Huge implications not just for east Africa and the African continent, but of course for Europe as well."

Sports News England levels ODI series against West Indies

NORTH SOUND, Antigua (AP) - Captain Liam Livingstone's first ODI century in a 140-run partnership with Sam Curran inspired England to a five-wicket win over West Indies in the second One-Day International on Saturday to level the three-match series.

England finished their successful run chase on 329 for five with 15 balls remaining at the Sir Vivian Richards Stadium in Antigua.

Livingstone, who hit a top score of 48 in England's eight-wicket loss in the first match at the same venue on Thursday, emerged in full bloom as he reached his century from 77 balls and finished 124 not out from 85 deliveries.

Livingstone produced only four half centuries in 31 previous ODIs. But his accession to the ODI captaincy has been energizing and he showed the full range of his ability as he led England to the second-highest successful ODI chase in the West Indies.

England had been set a formidable target after Livingstone's counterpart, West Indies captain Shai Hope, made 117 to lead his team to 328 for six off their allotted 50 overs.

Young fast bowler John Turner had West Indies in trouble at 12 for two, dismissing Brandon King (7) and Evin Lewis (4), inside four overs after Livingstone won the toss.

Dismissing Lewis was a welcome wicket for England as he made an unbeaten 94 on Thursday to lead the West Indies to victory in the series opener.

Hope and Keacy Carty, who made 71, rebuilt the West Indies innings. Hope and Keacy put on 143 for the third wicket. Carty gave a chance at eight to Bethell, struggled for boundaries early, then marched to his first half century in five ODI innings from

62 balls.

Hope raised his half century his 42nd in One-Day Internationals — from 66 balls with a six off a short ball from Bethell.

Carty was out in the 31st over when West Indies were 155 for three. Hope was joined by Sherfane Rutherford (54) with whom he added 79 for the fourth wicket, carrying the West Indies to 234 for four just as the last 10 overs were about to begin.

Hope left in the 47th over when West Indies were 297 for six and in the middle of a late charge, which brought 93 runs from the last 10 overs.

Rutherford continued his superb form of West Indies' recent one-day series in Sri Lanka in which he scored three consecutive half centuries with a top-score of 80. He took his first four from the second ball he faced and added three more and three sixes in reaching 50 from 35 balls.

Shimron Hetmeyer scored a sprightly 24 from 11 balls with three sixes as the West Indies rapidly closed

on 300.

Roston Chase made 20 not out from 22 balls and Matthew Forde hit three consecutive sixes in his 11-ball 23 to keep up the momentum.

In reply, Phil Salt's 59 and a maiden half century by Jacob Bethell (55) gave England a solid start.

Livingstone began watchfully but steadily gained momentum as he eclipsed his previous ODI best of 95. He was in full flow when he took 26 runs from the 45th over, bowled by Jayden Seales, and 24 from Shamar Joseph in the 46th before finishing the chase with plenty to spare.

The match was still in the balance when England reached 176 for four in the 30th over, with the Livingstone-Curran partnership in its infancy and 7.5 runs per over needed to win.

But Livingstone expertly controlled his team's chase with the able assistance of Curran, who was out for a run-a-ball 52 in the 46th over with

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
