The newest member of the House of Representatives, Rawdon Turner, took his seat in the House of Representatives for the first time on Thursday when he was administered the Oath as a Member of Parliament.

Following his overwhelming elections victory on January 14, the St. Peter representative was appointed to the Ministry of Social and Urban Transformation and he became a member of the Cabinet.

Speaker of the House, Osbert Frederick, when he welcomed MP Turner to the House noted that neither he nor MP Turner had ever considered the thought that coming out of the 2023 general elections either of them would have been members of the House, yet two years later, one was Speaker and the other, a duly elected member of the House.

Speaker Frederick turned to scripture to help to explain this; "the Most High God rules in the Kingdom

of men and giveth to whomsoever he will', adding that it is not by might nor power that both or any other person is a member of the House, but that it is God's will. "All of us are committed to serving our constituents and it is important for you to understand that the role in which you are serving the people is the most rewarding thing that any human being can do; a life of service, and I encourage you embrace serving the people who put their faith, trust and confidence in you," he remarked.

For his part, MP Turner thanked God, his constituents and his family for their support, noting that he always considered himself as one raised by the village of Parham and he gave him commitment to continue to serve them with all his energies now and in the future.

Efforts are afoot to have the baking industry align with international standards

The working group set up to recommend to government policy guidelines for the baking sector has established a number of goals that it wishes to accomplish, including the registration of all bakers and bakeries in the country.

The working group is chaired by Permanent Secretary in the Ministry of Trade, Ambassador Clarence E. Pilgrim, who also identified the creation of an association or grouping of bakers in the country as also being critical for its work.

"The Ministry of Trade, under the mandate of the National Trade Council, has established this working group to ensure that our local bakery industry thrives within a structured and fair trading environment. Our mission is to uphold best practices, improve competitiveness, and protect consumers while ensuring that our industry aligns with regional and international standards," he explained.

According to Ambassador Pilgrim the working group's task is to review and analyze existing standards and regulations, assess current practices within the bakery sector, identify areas of improvement and gaps within the draft policy, research and collect relevant data to ensure the policy is both effective and informed by best practices, and provide a forum for stakeholder consultation on the development and implementation of the policy. "Through these efforts, we aim to create a clear and actionable policy that promotes sustainability, fair trade, and consumer protection within the baking industry," he added.

At a meeting at the Villa Polyclinic on Wednesday, co-chair of the working group, Trade Policy Analyst, Nadia James, provided an overview of the objectives of the working group in its efforts to create a Na-

tional Baking Policy for Antigua and Barbuda.

"The purpose of the National Bakery Policy working group is to develop a comprehensive policy framework considering and analyzing the current mechanism, existing regulatory frameworks and provide stakeholder perspectives to address regulatory, health sustainability and economic aspects of the baking sector, promoting fair trading environment and consumer protection," she emphasised.

James said the working group will provide recommendations to the National Trade Council to achieve the trade-related goals, standards and initiatives for the sustainable growth of the Baking Sector.

Chief Health Inspector, Daryl Spencer, who is also a member of the working group, disclosed that the Central Board of Health is currently developing a set of training modules specifically for the baking sector.

He said there's need or the specialized training that caters to the specific needs of the baking community and his department will be rolling out those soon.

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Commentary The OAS Needs a Leader, Not a Battleground

The campaign for the position of Secretary General of the Organization of American States (OAS) has been tainted by misinformation and political distortion, particularly on social media. A misleading narrative has emerged, falsely framing the election as a geopolitical battle between the United States and China for control of the Organization.

This portrayal is entirely detached from reality and distracts from the fundamental issue at hand: the selection of the most capable candidate to lead the OAS Secretariat.

The two official candidates are Rubén Ramírez, the Foreign Minister of Paraguay, and Albert Ramdin, the Foreign Minister of Suriname. Ramírez has openly associated himself with the United States, implying its support for his candidacy, although the US government has endorsed no candidate and made no statement concerning its preference.

Social media campaigns have reinforced the perception, of an ideological battle, highlighting Paraguay's lack of diplomatic ties with China. Conversely, the same sources claim that Ramdin, who has the unified support of all 14 Caribbean Community (CARICOM) member states in the OAS, is aligned with China and would serve as its proxy within the Organization. This assertion is absurd and ignores the fundamental structure and system by which the OAS is governed.

Adding further complexity to the race, Arnaldo André, the Foreign Minister of Costa Rica, has entered the contest as an unofficial candidate. André has recently published a manifesto in Spanish, outlining his vision for the Organization. The government of Costa Rica has the right to propose André's candidacy up to the day of the election on March 10, but he is unlikely to garner much support. He offered himself as a candidate without campaigning among the member states or subjecting himself to questioning from the OAS members and civil society – a process in which both Ramírez and Ramdin engaged. His chances were also compromised by an outrageous slur from his President, who falsely claimed that Venezuela's President had 'bought the votes' of CARICOM countries at the OAS.

In any event, the OAS is a multilateral institution in which the United States, as a full member state, exercises direct influence in decision-making processes. China, by contrast, is an Observer state, attending only open public meetings and having no vote or decision-making power. The suggestion that the OAS could be "taken over" by China through the election of a Secretary General is not only false but also demonstrates a fundamental misunderstanding of the Organization's structure and system of governance.

There appears to be a misconception that the OAS' Secretary General has independent policymaking authority. In reality, the Secretary General is an administrator, executing the mandates set by the General Assembly and the Permanent Council. The role is one of implementation, not unilateral decision-making. No Secretary General can lawfully act or speak on behalf of the Organization without the express mandate of member states.

The upcoming election on March 10 is not about geopolitical rivalries; it is about selecting a Secretary General who can effectively execute the will of the membership, strengthen the Organization, and enhance its productivity.

However, administrative experience alone will not be enough. The next Secretary General must navigate one of the most severe financial crises in the Organization's history. This decision comes at a precarious moment for the OAS, which has suffered from chronic

underfunding. For years, the Organization has relied on "specific" funds from non-member states such as Spain and members of the European Union, alongside contributions from the United States, Canada, and Mexico. Without these funds, crucial programs in security, strengthening democracy, human rights protection, counterterrorism, anti-narcotics efforts, and transnational crime prevention would have collapsed long ago.

The financial crisis has been exacerbated by the recent decision of the U.S. government to suspend "specific" funding as part of a broader review of its support for international organizations. This review, expected to conclude by April 30, leaves uncertainty over the current work of the OAS - 215 members of the workforce and 67 programs are directly affected, with many projects halted.

Compounding this issue, three months ago, when the current Budget of the OAS was adopted, many member states had refused to increase their assessed contributions, opting instead for further budget cuts and asset sales, further weakening the Organization's ability to function effectively.

Given this dire reality, the next Secretary General must possess more than diplomatic credentials; he (there is no female candidate) must have a firm grasp of the Organization's operational needs, financial constraints, and institutional challenges. He must also be prepared to lead with resilience, innovation, and a clear vision for revitalizing the OAS at a time of diminishing resources.

CARICOM has carefully assessed the candidates and concluded that Albert Ramdin is the best-suited choice. His decade of experience as Assistant Secretary General of the OAS uniquely positions him above all other contenders. He possesses an intimate understanding of the Organization's inner workings, its challenges, and the responsibilities of the role. His candidacy represents the kind of leadership the OAS urgently requires; one focused on institutional renewal, not political manoeuvring.

At its core, this election is a test of the OAS's commitment to its own integrity and purpose. Will member states choose a Secretary General based on competence, experience, and a proven track record of administrative leadership? Or will they allow external narratives and geopolitical fearmongering to cloud their judgment? The answer will shape not only the future of the OAS but also its credibility as the principal multilateral body of the Americas.

The stakes are too high for anything less than a leader chosen for his merit, vision, and ability to enhance the OAS's relevance to each of its member states – and all of them. The future of the Organization depends on it.



The current US Secretary of State, "Pinocchio" - sorry, several children have rightly warned me that Pinocchio at the end of the children's story learns his lesson and manages to become a good boy. This is not the case with Mr. Marco Rubio, who has no limits in showing his obsessive hatred towards Cuba and its noble people. Once again he resorts to unsustainable lies and slander, this time to try to affect one of the programs with the greatest human and solidarity content carried out by the Cuban Revolution: the medical collaboration program. For this purpose, the Secretary of State announced new measures aimed at punishing with the suspension of entry visas to the US, any person or government official from Cuba or third countries who in one way or another are linked to or have approved these collaboration programs.

Attempts to try to prevent Cuba from carrying out its solidarity vocation are not new. Since the arrival of the first Trump Administration, efforts and actions to try to affect Cuba's medical cooperation agreements with third countries in every possible way have intensified to levels never seen before. Today, Cuba has collaboration agreements in the area of public health with 57 countries, the vast majority of which are countries in the so-called South, where some 22,400 collaborators work, 54% of them women. Could it be that the Secretary of State, in his schizophrenic anti-Cuban obsession, intends to apply sanctions against governments in almost a quarter of the planet, including some considered allies of the United States? How is it possible to have such cruelty, threatening governments of developing countries with draconian punitive measures, to force them to accept Washington's designs at the expense of affecting the sacred right to health of their people? For Marco Rubio, it does not matter that his measures could deprive millions of human beings around the world of basic health services that Cuban collaborators provide today.

The United States and its current Secretary of State may continue to apply their genocidal economic warfare measures to try to deprive the Cuban people of the most basic goods and services and significantly affect their standard of living. But they will never be able to deprive them of the humanistic feelings and values formed during these six decades of Revolution. Mr. Secretary of State, learn once and for all that solidarity can never be blocked.

Pastor charged with molesting, sexually assaulting boy

A 61-year-old pastor has appeared in court for sexual offences against a boy who was member of his congregation.

The pastor, who was the leader of a church in Santa Flora, was charged with two offences of sexual touching and two offences of sexual penetration.

The victim reported that the alleged offences occurred at the pastor's


home during the period January to December in 2023.

The case was investigated by members of the Special Victims Department and Child Protection Unit, and supervised by Insp Starr Jacob, W/Sgt Andrews and Cpl Karmody.

The charges were laid by WPC Alexander on February 20 and the accused appeared in court before Master Bethelmy on Monday. The court heard that the accused was previously charged for fraud offenCes in 2019 and has reporting conditions at the Santa Flora Police Station.

The accused was granted bail in sum of \$120,000 with a surety and instructed not communicate with the victim directly or indirectly.

Cora Richardson-Hodge elected as first female Premiere of Anguilla



Lawyer and legislature Cora Richardson-Hodge will be sworn in Thursday as the first female premier of Anguilla.

Her swearing is scheduled for 3:00pm local time.

Richardson-Hodge's Anguilla United Front romped to a convincing victory winning eight of the 11 seats following Wednesday's general elections.

Outgoing Premier Dr Ellis Webster, increased his margin in District 1, but most of the candidates of his Auguilla Progressive Movement lost grounds.

The AUF won four of the seven district seats, and all four of the islandwide

contests.

In Anguilla voters have five votes – one for their district candidates, and four others, which is tallied from all the districts.

The AUF made a clean sweep of the four at large seats, with the biggest winner of the night being Kyle Hodge.

It will be the second term for Hodge, who had won as a rookie five years ago with the APM. But he left the government mid-term in a protest against its tax policies.

Hodge appeared to ride on a cross-party appeal to be the night's biggest winners. He crossed the threshold of over 4,000 island wide votes – meaning a third of everyone who voted cast a ballot for him.

This sets him up to be a major player in the new administration.

Now Former Education Minister DeeAnn Kentish Rogers, who created history the last time by defeating a sitting Premier, lost her seat to an AUF newcomer Cordel Richardson.

Kentish-Rogers, hailed as a rising local political star, was the target of one of the most intense campaigns.

Also losing their seats were Quincia Gumbs Marie and Kenneth Hodge – both members of the outgoing cabinet.



Second Saharan dust surge heading to Caribbean islands



A new wave of Saharan dust is making its way across the Atlantic toward the Caribbean, with meteorological services across some islands issuing advisories about reduced air quality.

Antiguan meteorologist Dale Destin warns that "the Saharan dust season, which officially began in mid-February, is now bringing the second notable surge of the year to Antigua and Barbuda."

The dust cloud is expected to arrive in Antigua this afternoon, "reducing air quality to moderate levels due to elevated concentrations of particulate matter," according to Destin.

Effects are likely to continue for several days. The air quality is expected to remain reduced "through at least early next week with a break on Saturday. While the health risk remains low for most people, those who are unusually sensitive—such as individuals with asthma and other respiratory conditionsshould take precautions and stay informed with the latest air quality updates," Destin said.

Meanwhile, neighbouring islands are preparing for similar conditions. The Grenada Meteorological Service reports they are monitoring the same dust plume as it makes its way across the Atlantic from North Africa.

"Dust concentrations are anticipated to range from moderate to potentially dense at times," the Grenada Met service said in their advisory, which takes effect tomorrow and may extend into early next week.

Destin explained that while Saharan dust is present year-round, its impact is most noticeable from mid-February to mid-November, with dust concentrations typically peaking in June. The Caribbean normally experiences dust events every three to five days during this period.

According to data from Météo-France, the most severe dust event in recent history occurred in June 2020, when air quality deteriorated to "very unhealthy" levels—the worst recorded in at least 50 years.

Experts note that early 2025 has already seen higher-than-normal dust concentrations, though long-term seasonal forecasting of Saharan dust activity remains limited to a few days in advance. (*Loop Caribbean*)

Sudan facing 'the abyss' as mass starvation looms, UN warns

More than 600,000 people in Sudan are "on the brink of starvation" as famine stalks the war-torn country, the United Nations has warned.

UN human rights chief Volker Turk said on Thursday that famine had taken hold in five areas across the country, including Zamzam refugee camp in North Darfur, where the UN's World Food Programme (WFP) and medical charity Doctors Without Borders (known by its French initials, MSF) were forced to suspend operations amid escalating violence earlier this week.

Addressing the UN Human Rights Council, Turk said Sudan was "looking into the abyss", warning that famine could hit five more areas in the next three months, with a further 17 considered at risk in what he described as the "world's largest humanitarian catastrophe".


"Sudan is a powder keg, on the verge of a further explosion into chaos, and at increasing risk of atrocity crimes and mass deaths from famine," he said, urging immediate action to "end the war, deliver emergency aid, and get agriculture back on its feet".

MSF suspended operations in and around Zamzam, where half a million people have sought refuge, on Monday, with WFP following suit on Wednesday as fighting intensified between the military and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) paramilitary group.

WFP had been feeding approximately 300,000 of Zamzam's residents, but had only reached about 60,000 people this month amid intensified shelling, with one attack destroying the camp's central open market.

Edem Wosornu, the UN humanitarian operations director, told the UN Security Council on Wednesday that satellite imagery showed heavy weapons were used in and around Zamzam in recent weeks.

Zamzam camp is located 12 kilometres (6.5 miles) south of el-Fasher, the capital of North Darfur, which the RSF has been trying to take for months. *(Al Jazeera English)*

Philippine authorities arrest more than 400 people in suspected cybercrime hub

More than 400 people, half of them from China, were arrested by Philippine authorities in a raid on a suspected online gambling and scam hub in a busy commercial district in the capital, officials said Thursday.

The 401 detained included 207 Chinese and 132 Vietnamese nationals who were arrested in a condo building in Pasay city on Wednesday night. They were suspected by Philippine authorities of involvement in illegal online gaming operations, along with cryptocurrency, romance and investment scams, according to a government report.

Other arrested suspects were from South Korea, Malaysia, Indonesia, Myanmar and Madagascar, according to the report.

The scale of the arrests indicated how such lucrative online ventures have continued to thrive despite an order by President Ferdinand Marcos Jr. to law enforcers to shut them down by the end of last year.

Although a large number of online gambling outfits is believed to have relocated to other countries, including Cambodia and Myanmar, due to an ongoing crackdown in the Philippines, an unspecified number has remained in the country and ventured into an array of Internet-based scams.

There have been widespread speculation that Philippine law enforcement and regulatory officials have allowed illegal online gambling outfits to operate in the



country in the past in exchange for huge bribes.

The latest raid "stemmed from a report from a concerned citizen who has been noticing the large number of foreign nationals in the said building," the government report said.

Officials said 52 Filipinos who served as housekeeping staff and were not involved in the alleged offences were also taken from the online hub, which was shut by the Pasay city government for operating without a business permit.

Authorities seized computers, bundles of SIM cards and other electronic equipment allegedly being used by the suspects to target customers outside the Philippines, officials said.

In the past, arrested suspects who played key roles in such online fraud were charged by Philippine authorities for human trafficking and cybercrimes. Other suspects, who were deemed to have been illegally recruited or tricked into working for such outfits, were deported en masse to their countries.

The Office of the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights said in a 2023 report that criminal gangs have forced hundreds of thousands of people in Southeast Asia into participating in unlawful online scam operations, including false romantic ploys, bogus investment pitches and illegal gambling schemes.

Such scams have become a major issue in Asia, with many of the workers trapped in virtual slavery and forced to participate in scams targeting people over the internet, including many in China, where gambling is prohibited. (*Jamaica Gleaner*)

Trump plans tariffs on Mexico and Canada for Tuesday, while doubling existing 10% tariffs on China



President Donald Trump plans to impose tariffs on Canada and Mexico starting Tuesday, in addition to doubling the 10% universal tariff charged on imports from China.

In a Truth Social post Thursday, Trump said illicit drugs such as fentanyl are being smuggled into the United States at "unacceptable levels" and that import taxes would force other countries to crack down on the trafficking.

"We cannot allow this scourge to continue to harm the USA, and therefore, until it stops, or is seriously limited, the proposed TARIFFS scheduled to go into effect on MARCH FOURTH will, indeed, go into effect, as scheduled," the Republican president wrote. "China will likewise be charged an additional 10% Tariff on that date."

The prospect of escalating tariffs has already thrown the global economy into turmoil, with consumers expressing fears about inflation worsening and the auto sector possibly suffering if America's two largest trading partners in Canada and Mexico are hit with taxes. But Trump has also at times engaged in aggressive posturing only to give last-minute reprieves, previously agreeing to a 30-day suspension of the Canada and Mexico tariffs that were initially supposed to start in February.

Trump intends to put 25% tariffs on imports from Mexico and Canada, with a lower 10% tax on Canadian energy products such as oil and electricity. The move, ostensibly about drug trafficking and immigration, led Mexico and Canada to respond by emphasizing their existing efforts to address these issues. Canada created a fentanyl czar, and Mexico sent 10,000 members of its National Guard to its border with the United States.

Mexican President Claudia Sheinbaum said Thursday that she hoped to speak with Trump after the Cabinet-level meetings occurring in Washington this week. Mexico's Foreign Affairs Secretary Juan Ramón de la Fuente was scheduled to meet with Secretary of State Marco Rubio on Thursday afternoon.


Trump, "as you know, has his way of communicating," Sheinbaum said. But she said that her government would stay "cool-headed" and optimistic about an agreement coming together to avoid the tariffs.

"I hope we are able to reach an agreement and on March 4 we can announce something else," she said.

She said Mexico's security chiefs were discussing intelligence sharing with their American counterparts that would allow for important arrests in the US On the economic front, she said Mexico's goal is to protect the free trade pact that was negotiated during the first Trump administration between Mexico and the United States. That 2020 deal, which included Canada, was an update of the North American Free Trade Agreement from 1994.

Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau said his country has invested more than 1 billion Canadian dollars to improve border security, adding that his government's ministers and officials are also in Washington this week.

"There is no emergency for the United States at the border with Canada when it comes to fentanyl, and that is exactly what we are demonstrating at this time," Trudeau said in Montreal. "If the United States goes ahead and imposes tariffs, we already shared the details of our plan. We have \$30 billion worth of US products that will be subject to tariffs. And \$125 billion of tariffs that will be applied three weeks later. But we don't want to be in that position." (Jamaica Gleaner)



Veteran players Britney Cooper (72), Anisa Mohammed (32), and Lee-Ann Kirby (41 not out) played pivotal roles that guided Trinidad and Tobago to victory at 190 for six with 15 balls to spare, as they successfully chased down Leeward Islands' total of 188.

Cooper's 107-ball knock featured seven boundaries, while Mohammed's patient 96-ball 32 included three fours.

Earlier in the match, Mohammed also took three for 26, combining effectively with Amrita Ramtahal (4-27) to restrict Leeward Islands, despite a commanding 76 from Reniece Boyce.

Opting to bat first, Leeward Islands made a decent start but lost openers Qiana Joseph (9) and Melicia Clarke (11) with only 36 runs on the board.

Divya Saxena (32) then partnered with Boyce in a crucial 60-run stand for the third wicket before Saxena was caught by Cooper off Steffie Soogrim.

Boyce, who played a commanding 84-ball knock with four boundaries and four sixes, found another solid partner in Shawnisha Hector, who contributed a quick 35 off 30 balls, including three fours and two sixes.

Their 64-run fourth-wick-

et stand pushed Leeward Islands towards a competitive total. However, once Hector was dismissed by Samara Ramnath with the score at 160 for four, the innings quickly unraveled.

The lower order crumbled under sustained pressure from Ramtahal and Mohammed, as Leeward Islands lost their last six wickets for just 28 runs, falling short of the 200-run mark.

Trinidad and Tobago's reply got off to a disastrous start as they lost both openers, Djenaba Joseph (3) and Shunelle Sawh (6), with just 10 runs on the board.

However, Cooper and Mohammed steadied the innings with a crucial 89-run third-wicket partnership, as they patiently navigated the bowling attack. When Mohammed was dismissed in the 33rd over, Leeward Islands struck again to remove captain Karishma Ramharack (7), leaving Trinidad and Tobago at 111 for four.

Still, Cooper, unfazed, continued to accumulate runs and added another 44 alongside Kirby before falling just short of the target.

Despite a late scare with the dismissal of Soogrim (2), Kirby remained composed and finished with an unbeaten in a knock that three boundaries and three sixes, to seal the victory. Jahzara Claxton captured two for 29.

In the other second-round matches, Barbados made it two wins in a row with a 56-run victory over the Windward Islands at Warner Park, and Guyana claimed their first win in two matches with an eight-wicket victory against defending champions Jamaica at St. Paul's Sports Complex.

The regional women's limited overs competition will resume with the third round of matches on Friday (today).

The Leeward Islands will meet Guyana at Warner Park, Jamaica will face Barbados at Conaree, and Trinidad and Tobago will clash with the Windward Islands at St. Paul's.
