## PM Browne repeats call for nationals to engage in retirement planning

Prime Minister Gaston Browne took time out on his Saturday radio programme to address an issue over which he has voiced concern in the past; the need for nationals to begin the serious planning for life after retirement.

PM Browne, a former banker and someone with a wealth of experience in investing, said this is important as too many people are relying on their pension to take care of their living expenses after they retire from work. However, according to the prime minister in today's era of high inflation and other challenges, relying on the pension is not enough.

"Pensions were not designed to take care of all of a person's living expenses in retirement; if you rely exclusively on pension you would not be able to maintain the living standards he/she is accused to," PM Browne emphasized.

He stated that he has

come across many instances where elders/ retirees who may have contributed much to the country in their productive years, are 'falling through the cracks' as they find themselves in situations where they are not able to maintain themselves.

"Too many persons are not taking advantage of the 'strong incomes' they earn during their productive years. They often spend as they earn or spend based on income rather than save or invest for their later years.

Retirement planning is something our people are not focused on and many end up being very vulnerable," he observed.

He expanded on this point further by noting that there are many seniors who have approached the issue on the notion that their children will take care of them in their retirement, but according to the prime minister this too, is unrealistic.

"They must understand the world in which we are living in is becoming more and more competitive as children today

have their own set of challenges. For example, based on lifestyle, the children may have to pay for mortgage or a car and even to educate their own children with little room for taking care of their parents," PM Browne stated.

He recommends strongly that as the people age, they should seek out investments opportunities that would give a return that they could be used to supplement their pension. He is also suggesting that these investments should give returns that exceed the rate of inflation.

The prime minister pointed to the lands at Pensioners where the government has earmarked for locals to get a foothold into the tourism industry. Regrettably, he noted, not too many persons from the 'middle class' are not coming forward to invest.

PM Browne is again appealing for a more robust response from what he termed 'ordinary Antiguans and Barbudans'.

### Parliamentary select committee to meet to review three legislative measures



Attorney General, Sir Steadroy Benjamin The parliamentary select committee set up to review three legislative measures before the House of Representatives will convene a public session on Thursday.

Attorney General, Sir Steadroy Benjamin wants members of the public to attend the session at the parliament chambers and to participate in the discussion.

The three pieces of legislation are; the Fire and Rescue Bill, 2025, the Police Bill, 2025 and the Antigua and Barbuda Forensic Services Bill, 2025.

According to the Attorney General, the three bills have been posted on the government website at laws@ab.gov.ag.

Sir Steadroy is inviting members of the public to peruse the three legislative measures and to attend the committee meeting and to share their ideas as this will inform any proposed changes to the bills before they are adopted.

The committee meeting will start at 10:30 am on Thursday.

A quick insight into the three pieces of legislation shows that the Police Bill, 2025, seeks to repeal and replace the existing Police Act (Cap. 330) to modernize the legal framework governing the Royal Police Force of Antigua and Barbuda. The Bill introduces enhanced governance structures, streamlines the roles and responsibilities of police officers, and incorporates contemporary policing methodologies while ensuring accountability, efficiency, and public trust in law enforcement.

On the other hand, the Antigua and Barbuda Forensic Services (ABFS) Bill will establish a legislative framework for the establishment of the Antigua and Barbuda Forensic Services to assist law enforcement agencies in the investigation and prosecution of criminal offences.

It will see the appointment and functions of the Forensic Director and Deputy Director, as well as the duties and obligations of staff and protection from personal liability.

This as the Fire and Res-

cue Service Bill which will see the Fire Department renamed as the Fire and Rescue Service (replacing the Fire Brigades Act).

In addition, the new Act once passed through the House will result in the Police Act and the accompanying regulations not being applicable to the Fire and Rescue Service.

This means that there will be a formal separation of the Fire Department from the Royal Police Force of Antigua and Barbuda, a move that has been recommended by the top rank of the department for many years.

### High-Level Workshop on Competition Policy and Law Enforcement enters Day Two



The Ministries of Legal Affairs and Trade are combining resources to mount a two-day high-level workshop on competition policy and enforcement law.

Organised by the OECS Commission and the CAR-ICOM Competition Commission (CCC), under the 11th EDF-Right Project, the 10-11 March workshop is being held at the Villa Polytechnic Clinic and it brings together government officials, statutory bodies, private sector, regional institutions.

One of the main outcomes of the workshop is the sensitisation of key principles of competition law and institutional elements required for its enforcement.

In his address to the opening ceremony, Foreign Affairs and Trade Minister, E.P Chet Greene noted that the Revised Treaty of Chaguaramas mandates that CARICOM member states enact national competition laws and establish competition authorities. This, he noted, is not merely a legal obligation but a moral and

socioeconomic imperative to ensure that the benefits of economic integration are not eroded by anti-competitive practices.


"Lest we forget that competition law and policy are foundational to a successful market economy. They establish rules that unleash the potential of producers, service providers, and investors, ensuring optimal market function, encouraging innovation, and protecting consumers from monopo-

listic and other undesirable business practices. Moreover, these laws and policies foster a level playing field where businesses, regardless of size, can compete fairly, and the benefits of economic growth are equitably distributed," he stated.

Also addressing the opening was Permanent Secretary in the Ministry of Trade, Ambassador Clarence E. Pilgrim who underscored the important role of competition to the success of business enterprises. "A robust competition regime directly impacts trade performance. When businesses operate under transparent and competitive conditions, they become more efficient, innovative, and capable of seizing export opportunities. Conversely, anti-competitive practices drive up costs, dampen productivity, and diminish our ability to compete globally," he noted.

For Antigua and Barbuda, he emphasized that establishing administrative mechanisms to support competition law, policy, and enforcement is critical. "This includes developing regulatory frameworks that address both traditional markets and emerging digital economies, ensuring they are agile enough to adapt to technological advancements," he explained.

On Day Two of the workshop, participants will explore the institutional and legislative framework for competition law enforcement, focusing on key design considerations, enforcement mechanisms, and the relationship between competition law and consumer protection. The day will conclude with a discussion on actionable steps for implementing competition law and policy in Antigua and Barbuda

# Antigua and Barbuda secures second season with Condor at ITB Berlin



a t-shirt and jewelry were found and taken to the station for further analy-

The search concluded around 11:30 am; however, there were still no sightings of the missing 37-year-old man. Keon was last seen sometime on February 26. His mother recalled having a conversation with him a week prior to his disappearance.

# One Chorus, One Purpose: 2000 people participate IWD walk 2025

"Overwhelming" is how organisers of the Men and Women United 2025: Stop Gender-Based Violence 5k Walk described the support for this year's installment of what is to be an annual awareness-raising and advocacy event now in its second year. The organisers, the Integrated Health Outreach Gender-Based Violence Coalition (IHO-GBV) in partnership with the Directorate of Gender Affairs (DoGA), estimate that more than 2000 residents of Antigua and Barbuda participated in the walk on Saturday, commemorating International Women's Day (IWD) 2025.

Participants spoke candidly about their reasons for coming out. One woman in her forties said, "We are here to march against violence. It was important to me to come out, so I invited my co-worker and we are both here today," while another participant, a man in his twenties, said, "Violence happens to everyone but more specifically to women because they're often seen as less than. It's important that people who are not directly affected by problems show their support so that those who are affected don't feel alone."

A woman who was proudly displaying a placard



with the words "Protect our mothers sisters and daughters" offered this when asked why she chose to participate: "Too many women are being raped in Antigua, too many women and too many young girls, and I am here to support them."

All ages were represented, and there were even babies and toddlers being pushed in strollers taking part in the GBV awareness walk. Organisers say that around 35% of registrants indicated when signing up that they were joining as part of an organisation. Some of the largest groups included the Girls Guides with nearly 200 registrants, the Villa Primary School with a cohort of more than 90, and the Ottos Comprehensive School with more than 100. Additionally, more than 50 soldiers and cadets from the Antigua and Barbuda Defense Force (ABDF) joined the walk as well.

The local sponsors and supporters of the event included Chestertons Antigua, Island Living Investment Services (ILIS), and Moongate Hotel & Spa, as well as Flow, the Ahkimo Group, Caribbean Alliance Insurance, Paparazzi Pizza, the University of the West Indies Five Island Campus ((UWI FIC), the Antigua and Barbuda Tourism Authority (ABTA), Sagicor, Twist Wholesale, Beyond Limits Fitness, the Epicurean Fine Foods and Pharmacy, the First Choice Supermarket, and the Source Clothing Store.

Representing three sponsors, Chestertons Antigua,

Island Living Investment Services and Moongate Hotel & Spa, Gaye Hechme, said: "We believe in equality and in respect. That is the policy that we uphold in our workplace and we believe that in supporting this event, we are supporting the same for all spaces throughout Antigua and Barbuda. As a nation, we must adopt a zero tolerance approach when it comes to gender-based violence. That is why we are here today."

# Cuba Sends Doctors, the US Sends Sanctions

THE UNITED STATES CALLS CUBA'S MEDICAL INTERNATION-ALISM "HUMAN TRAFFICKING" — BUT IT'S REALLY AN INTERNA-TIONALIST LIFELINE FOR THE GLOBAL SOUTH.

On February 25, US secretary of state Marco Rubio announced restrictions on visas for both government officials in Cuba and any others worldwide who are "complicit" with the island nation's overseas medicalassistance programs. A US State Department statement clarified that the sanction extends to "current and former" officials and the "immediate family of such persons." This action, the seventh measure targeting Cuba in one month, has international consequences; for decades tens of thousands of Cuban medical professionals have been posted in around sixty countries, far more than the World Health Organization's (WHO) workforce, mostly working in underor unserved populations in the Global South. By threatening to withhold visas from foreign officials, the US

government means to sabotage these Cuban medical missions overseas. If it works, millions will suffer.

Rubio built his career around taking a hard line on Cuban socialism, even alleging that his parents fled Fidel Castro's Cuba until the *Washington Post* revealed that they migrated to Miami in 1956 during the Fulgencio Batista dictatorship. As Trump's secretary of state, Rubio is in prime position to ramp up the belligerent US-Cuba policy first laid out in April 1960 by deputy assistant secretary of state Lester Mallory: to use economic warfare against revolutionary Cuba to bring about "hunger, desperation and overthrow of government."

Cuba stands accused by the US government of human trafficking, even equating overseas Cuban medical personnel to slaves. Rubio's tweet parroted this pretext. The real objective is to undermine both Cuba's international prestige and the revenue it receives from exporting medical services. Since 2004, earnings from Cuban medical and professional services exports have been the island's greatest source of income. Cuba's ability to conduct "normal" international

trade is currently obstructed by the long US blockade, but the socialist state has succeeded in converting its investments in education and health care into national earnings, while also maintaining free medical assistance to the Global South based on its internationalist principles.

#### **Cuban Medical Internationalism:** A Core Feature of Cuban Foreign Policy

The four approaches of Cuban medical internationalism were initiated early in the 1960s, all despite the post-1959 departure of half of the physicians in Cuba.

- 1. Emergency response medical brigades. In May 1960, Chile was struck by the most powerful earthquake on record, with thousands killed. The new Cuban government sent an emergency medical brigade with six rural field hospitals. This established a modus operandi under which Cuban medics mobilize rapid responses to "disaster and disease" emergencies throughout the Global South — since 2005 these brigades have been organized under the name "Henry Reeve International Contingents." By 2017, when the WHO praised the Henry Reeve brigades with a public health prize, they had helped 3.5 million people in twenty-one countries. The best-known examples include brigades in West Africa to combat Ebola in 2014 and in response to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. Within one year, Henry Reeve brigades treated 1.26 million coronavirus patients in forty countries, including in Western Europe.
- 2. Establishment of public health care apparatuses abroad. Starting in 1963, Cuban medics helped

establish a public health care system in newly independent Algeria. By the 1970s, they had set up and staffed Comprehensive Health Programs all throughout Africa. By 2014, 76,000 Cuban medical personnel had worked in thirty-nine African countries. In 1998, a Cuban cooperation agreement with Haiti committed to send 300 to 500 Cuban medical professionals there all while training Haitian doctors back in Cuba. By December 2021, more than 6,000 Cubans medical professionals had saved 429,000 lives in the poorest country in the western hemisphere, conducting 36 million consultations. And for two decades now, Cuba has maintained over 20,000 medics in Venezuela, peaking at 29,000. In 2013, the Pan American Health Organization contracted 11,400 Cuban doctors to work in underand unserved regions of Brazil. By 2015, Cuban Integral Healthcare Programs were operating in forty-three countries.

3. Treating foreign patients in


Cuba. In 1961, children and wounded fighters from Algeria's war for independence from France went to Cuba for treatment. Thousands followed from around the world. Two programs were developed to treat foreign patients en masse: The first is the "Children of Chernobyl" program which began in 1990 and lasted for twenty-one years, during which 26,000 people affected by the Chernobyl nuclear disaster received free medical treatment and rehabilitation on the island nearly 22,000 of them children. The Cubans covered the cost, despite the program coinciding with Cuba's severe economic crisis, known as the Special Period, following the collapse of the socialist bloc. The second program to treat foreign patients en masse was Operation Miracle, set up in 2004 for Venezuelans with reversible blindness to get free eye operations in Cuba to restore their sight. It subsequently expanded regionally. By 2017, Cuba was running sixty-nine ophthalmology clinics in fifteen coun-

- tries under Operation Miracle, and by early 2019 over four million people in thirty-four countries had benefited.
- 4. Medical training for foreigners, both in Cuba and overseas. It's important to note that the Cuban state never sought to foster dependence. In the 1960s, it began training foreigners in their own countries when suitable facilities were available, or in Cuba when they were not. By 2016, 73,848 foreign students from eighty-five countries had graduated in Cuba while that nation was running twelve medical schools overseas, mostly in Africa, where over 54,000 students were enrolled. In 1999, the Latin American School of Medicine (ELAM), the world's largest medical school, was established in Havana. By 2019, ELAM had graduated 29,000 doctors from 105 countries (including the United States) representing 100 ethnic groups. Half were women, and 75 percent from worker or campesino families.






#### **Antigua Barbuda Senior Sportsman Nominees**







Meanwhile, Jurgen Stutz, senior vice president of sales, marketing, and revenue management at Blue Diamond Resorts, the parent company of Roy-




alton CHIC Resorts, has expressed enthusiasm about the planned hotel development.

### Guyana: Police arrest woman following viral child abuse video



In response to distressing

video footage circulating on social media depicting a woman abusing a child, the Guyana Police Force acted swiftly to address the situation.

At approximately 11:30am today, officers, accompanied by the Director of the Child Care and Protection Agency (CCPA), visited West Bank Demerara. There, they arrested a 27-yearold self-employed woman seen in the video abusing her son.

The suspect was escorted to the Wales Police Station, where she was interviewed by both CCPA officials and police personnel. Following the interviews, she was placed into custody.

The child, identified as her son, was subsequently handed over to his paternal grandmother.

Authorities are continuing their investigations into the incident. (*Loop Caribbean*)

#### Three women charged for Digicel employee's murder

Three women have been charged with the brutal murder of a man who worked with the telecommunications company Digicel.

According to police reports, the body of Kevin Walker, 42, was found in a barrel in the Corporate Area last month.

Those charged with his death are Anita Vanzie, 30, Shaday Bennett, 29 and Joanna Williams, 36.

The three have been charged with murder, conspiracy to murder, simple larceny, being a part of a criminal organisation, providing benefit to a criminal organisation, misprision (deliberate concealment) of felony, accessory before the fact, accessory after the fact, and preventing the lawful burial of a corpse.

The police allege that on Saturday, February 1, Walker was lured to Oxford Street, located in the Corporate Area by Vanzie, where he was accosted by four men and taken to a premises. He was allegedly robbed of his credit and debit cards, after which Vanzie and Bennett reportedly withdrew cash from a nearby ATM and returned to share the stolen money among their accomplices.

Walker was then beaten and stabbed multiple times in the upper body before his lifeless body was stuffed into a blue barrel and dumped into a gully later that day.

A missing person report was filed for Walker on February 2, and an investigation was launched.

The police say the following day, on February 3, they responded to a report of a body found in a barrel on Industrial Terrace. The body was transported to the hospital, where Walker was officially pronounced dead.

Further investigations led to the arrest of the three women. On February 5, the police say they conducted a targeted raid at a premises where Anita Vanzie was found in possession of Walker's credit card.

Days later, Bennett and Williams were also apprehended. The police say the three were charged and question-and-answer sessions held in the presence of their attorneys. Walker, who worked at Digicel, also operated a small car rental and loan company. (*Trinidad Express*)

# C'bean leaders speak out on US sanctions on Cuba's medical aid

Caribbean governments have begun receiving formal notifications from the United States regarding its intention to sanction states and government officials involved in facilitating Cuba's medical assistance program. This program has benefited many countries in the region.

Late last month, US Secretary of State Marco Rubio issued a statement announcing the expansion of an existing Cuba-related visa restriction policy "that targets forced labor linked to the Cuban labor export program." The new measures specifically target Cuba's overseas medical missions. The Secretary of State is threatening to impose visa restrictions on nations benefiting from what he calls Cuba's forced, abusive, and coercive labor export programs.

Officials from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Grenada confirmed that the formal notification from the U.S. State Department arrived on Thursday, and it is believed that other governments in the region have since received the official correspondence.

Prime Minister Dickon Mitchell is expected to craft an official response this week, but there appears to be some defiance from the administration. Grenada's posture is that the country is sovereign and will conduct its relations with other states with-



out bowing to such pressure.

Speaking with CaribUpdate he said, "We are clear that we have a legitimate partnership with the people and government of Cuba, who have, over several decades, provided support to Grenada in the medical field. We will continue to support and defend this partnership," the Prime Minister said.

Prime Minister Dr. Ralph Gonsalves of St. Vincent and the Grenadines dismissed the US threats of sanctions, stating that his country is prepared to continue its long-standing arrangement with Havana.

"They got a free education," he said, referring to Cuban professionals. "If they are going overseas to make money from that education, then it's only reasonable for them to put back something."

Dominica's Prime Minister Roosevelt Skerrit said that the issue needs to be clarified with the US government and believes that "common sense" will prevail.

"I do not believe that any current health system in the Caribbean can survive without the support of the medical personnel from Cuba," he said, expressing optimism that once the U.S. administration is engaged, the issue can be resolved.

Over the last six decades several Caribbean nations including Jamaica, Dominica, St Vincent and the Grenadines and Grenada as well as countries in Latin America have benefitted from Cuba's overseas medical mission without US interference.

According to Rubio's statement the US had already imposed restrictions on several people, including some Venezuelans. (*Loop Caribbean*)

### Prince Frederik of Luxembourg dies at 22 from rare mitochondrial disease



Prince Frederik of Luxembourg died on Feb. 28 after years of being diagnosed with a rare mitochondrial disease, according to a statement issued over the weekend by his parents, Prince Robert and Princess Julie. He was 22.

Frederik was born with PolG disease, a genetic mitochondrial disorder that prevents the body's cells from producing adequate energy, which in turn can cause multiple organ dysfunctions and failures. He was diagnosed with PolG at 14 years old, when his symptoms began showing more clearly, Prince Robert and Princess Julie said in the Saturday statement.

His father remembered him as his "Superhero." "Frederik was born with a

special capacity for positivity, joy, and determination," Robert said. "When he was little, I would always say that if there is one child of ours that I would never need to worry about, it was him. He has social skills like no other, an amazing sense of humour, an emotional intelligence and compassion that were off the charts, a sense of justice, fairness and decency that knows no bounds."

Robert said his son's usual Italian Duolingo and exercise alarm went off on Feb. 28, which was also Rare Disease Day, but it wasn't like any other day. The 22-year-old had been unwell and was barely able to speak for several days.

"This would be his last in this world," Robert said, adding that Frederick found the strength to bid farewell to each of his family members that day.

Frederik had founded The PolG Foundation as a means to help others who suffered with mitochondrial diseases and find a cure, according to Prince Robert. The disease is estimated to affect one in every 500 people, and can be compared to "having a faulty battery that never fully recharges and is in a constant state of depletion," according to the foundation. PolG can also be difficult to diagnose and has no known cure.

Frederick participated in medical trials and donated his DNA to assist doctors with their research on the disease.

"This is the battle that Frederik fought, and this is the burden that he had to carry throughout his life. He always did so with grace and with humour," Robert said.

Even after Frederick's passing, Robert said "his mission is not complete," adding that the young prince and his foundation will continue to work to find a cure for PolG.

"I cite him as being here in the present because I know that, though physically absent, he is still here, inspiring us and pushing us forward," Robert said.

Prince Robert recalled the final conversation he had with son.

"Frederik's last question to me, prior to his other remarks was: 'Papa, are you proud of me?' He had barely been able to speak for several days, so the clarity of these words was as surprising as the weight of the moment was profound," Robert wrote.

"The answer was very easy, and he had heard it oh so many times.... but at this time, he needed reassurance that he had contributed all that he possibly could in his short and beautiful existence and that he could now finally move on," he said. (NBC News)

# Israel says it is cutting off its electricity supply to Gaza

Israel says it is cutting off its electricity supply to Gaza. The full effects of that are not immediately clear, but the territory's desalination plants receive power for producing drinking water.

Sunday's announcement comes a week after Israel cut off all supplies of goods to the territory to over two million people. It has sought to press Hamas to accept an extension of the first phase of their ceasefire. That phase ended last weekend.

Israel wants Hamas to release half of the remaining hostages in return for a promise to negotiate a lasting truce.

Hamas has pressed to start negotiations on the ceasefire's more difficult second phase instead, which would see the release of remaining hostages from Gaza, the withdrawal of Israeli forces and a lasting peace. Hamas is believed to have 24 living hostages and the bodies of 35 others.

The militant group on Sunday said it wrapped up the latest round of ceasefire talks with Egyptian mediators without changes to its position, calling for an immediate start of the ceasefire's second phase.

The new letter from Israel's energy minister to the Israel Electric Corporation tells it to stop selling power to Gaza. Israel had warned when it stopped all supplies that water and electricity could be next.

Gaza has been largely devastated by the war, and generators and solar panels are used for some of the power supply.

The ceasefire has paused the deadliest



and most destructive fighting ever between Israel and Hamas, sparked by the Hamas-led attack on southern Israel on October 7, 2023. The first phase allowed the return of 25 living hostages and the remains of eight others in exchange for the release of nearly 2,000 Palestinian prisoners.

Israeli forces have withdrawn to buffer zones inside Gaza, hundreds of thousands of displaced Palestinians have returned to northern Gaza for the first time since early in the war and hundreds of trucks of aid entered per day until Israel suspended supplies.

The White House on Wednesday made the surprise confirmation of direct US talks with Hamas.

On Sunday, envoy Adam Boehler told CNN television news station that "I think you could see something like a long-term truce, where we forgive prisoners, where Hamas lays down their arms, where they agree they're not part of the political party going

forward. I think that's a reality. It's real close."

When asked by CNN if he would speak with the militant group again, Boehler replied, "You never know."

He added: "I think something could come together within weeks," and expressed hope for a deal that would see all hostages released, not only the American ones.

Hamas on Sunday reiterated its support for a proposal for the establishment of an independent committee of technocrats to run Gaza until Palestinians hold presidential and legislative elections.

That committee would work "under the umbrella" of the Palestinian Authority, based in the occupied West Bank. Israel has rejected the PA having any role in Gaza, but hasn't put forward an alternative for postwar rule. (Jamaica Gleaner)

#### Ex-central banker Mark Carney to replace Trudeau as Canada's prime minister



Former central banker
Mark Carney will become
Canada's next prime minister after the governing
Liberal Party elected him
its leader Sunday. The
change comes as Canada
deals with United States
President Donald Trump's
trade war and annexation
threat.

Carney, 59, replaces Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, who announced his resignation in January but remains prime minister until his successor is sworn in in the coming days. Carney won in a landslide, winning 85.9 per cent of the vote.

Carney navigated crises when he was the head of

the Bank of Canada and when in 2013 he became the first noncitizen to run the Bank of England since it was founded in 1694. His appointment won bipartisan praise in the UK after Canada recovered from the 2008 financial crisis faster than many other countries.

The opposition Conservatives hoped to make the looming federal election about Trudeau, whose popularity declined as food and housing prices rose and immigration surged.

Trump's trade war and his talk of making Canada the 51st US state have infuriated Canadians, who

are booing the American anthem at NHL and NBA games. Some are canceling trips south of the border, and many are avoiding buying American goods when they can.

The surge in Canadian nationalism has bolstered the Liberal Party's chances in a parliamentary election expected within days or weeks, and Liberal showings have been improving steadily in opinion polls.

"We have made this the greatest country in the world and now our neighbors want to take us. No way," Carney said.

After decades of bilateral stability, the vote on Can-

ada's next leader now is expected to focus on who is best equipped to deal with the United States.

Carney has picked up one endorsement after another from Cabinet ministers and members of Parliament since declaring his candidacy in January. He is a highly educated economist with Wall Street experience who has long been interested in entering politics and becoming prime minister, but he lacks political experience.

The other top Liberal leadership candidate was former Deputy Prime Minister Chrystia Freeland.

Trudeau told Freeland in December that he no longer wanted her as finance minister, but that she could remain deputy prime minister and the point person for US-Canada relations. Freeland resigned shortly after, releasing a scathing letter about the government that proved to be the last straw for Trudeau.

Carney is expected to trigger an election shortly afterward. Either the new Liberal party leader will call one, or the opposition parties in Parliament could force one with a no-confidence vote later this month. (*Jamaica Gleaner*)
