Broad support for Cultural Heritage (Protection) Bill, 2025

There was broad support in the house of Representatives on Tuesday as the members debated the Cultural Heritage (Protection) Bill, 2025, with members on both sides giving their full support for the measure.

Foreign Affairs Minister, E.P Chet Greene, who has portfolio responsibility for the National Park Authority, the lead agency that will oversee the implementation of the Bill, reported that a select committee of the House had met to go through its provisions before it was tabled in parliament. According to Minister Greene, except for the National Park area in English Harbour, there are no historical sites in the country that have legal protection backed by legislation. He emphasized that under the waters of the nation's coastline there are hundreds of shipwrecks and on land, scores of historical and pre-historical sites. "It is known that around our waters, there are an estimated 250 shipwrecks. These by themselves will create, can create employment, can add to our tourism product and certainly, the research component which we encourage through UWI FIC amongst our young people, will also be areas of benefit as we proceed on this path. It is also instructive to note



He explained that the preservation of these sites is the chief reason why the government introduced the Bill at this time.

Culture Minister, Daryll Matthew, joined in supporting the bill and explained that as Culture Minister his area of concern included mainly the performing arts, but that the Bill was rightly placed under the purview of the NPA, which falls under Minister Greene's portfolio.

"There is no confusion here and in fact, because of the fantastic work that the NPA has been doing, it is the appropriate place to vest the authority of over-

Support also came from Sir Molwyn Joseph, Minister Melford Nicholas and Sir Steadroy Benjamin on the government side as well as Barbuda Representative, Trevor Walker and the Member for St. John's Rural West Richard Lewis on the opposition beach were among members supporting the Bill. All parliamentarians spoke of the timeliness of the Bill and especially the need to closely monitor the trade in rare artifacts as quite often visitors come to the country with this intention and secretly take things out of the country.

House of Rep. approves measure for hearing remand cases virtually

The House of Representatives has paved the way for magistrates to conduct virtually hearing for persons in prison on remand.

Mover of the Bill, Attorney General, Sir Steadroy Benjamin, explained that the current law provides for those persons on remand must appear before the court every eight days to have their matters reviewed.

However, he noted that there may be times when it is difficult to have the prisoners taken to the court due to a number of factors.

"During the COVID-19 pandemic, Mr. Speaker, the magistrate was able to do the remands virtually. It worked very well then. We want to make it now a matter of law; so that the magistrate now can, based on the law, do the remands as the law requires, virtually. This is a move in the right direction," he observed.

Sir Steadroy told his fellow parliamentarians that already this system is in operation in the magistracy in other OECS territories, which share a common judicial system, as well as in the OECS Supreme Court system.

"Therefore, it is only a natural consequence that this accommodation is made for the magistrate to now hear remand cases virtually," he stated.

The Explanatory Memorandum attached to the Bill explained that the measure modernizes remand pro-

cedures by allowing magistrates to conduct remand hearings on a virtual platform when necessary or desirable.

Sir Steadroy said the measure provides for the effec-

tive functioning of the court as he urged the House's approval.

In offering support for the measure, MP for St. John's Rural West, Richard Lewis, noted that the amendments were necessary given the realities of the world today.

"There have been many lessons learnt from COVID 19, and one of those lessons is that life can exist in the virtual space, and, there is no going back to what we consider to be 'normal life'. So life today has become a hybrid between the physical presence and the virtual world. Technology, over the years, has allowed us to bridge that physical gap and allowed us to minimize logistical challenge, and possibly minimize costs," he remarked.

Therefore, he added, the nation's laws must be amended to reflect these new realities.

The Bill now goes to the Senate for its consideration before heading for the Office of the Governor General to be signed into law.

AG wants parliamentarians to act 'responsibly'



Attorney General, Sir Steadroy Benjamin, has chided his fellow parliamentarians for their tardiness for repeatedly showing up late for sittings of the House of Representatives.

Sir Steadroy did not single out whether the guilty parties sat on the government or opposition bench, but spoke generally, noting that as parliamentarians they all have a duty to attend the parliamentary sitting, but to also be on time.

"I am asking our parliamentarians to be responsible; you represent people. Attendance on time is very essential, so please in the future, kindly address your businesses in such a way that you can attend the session on time. The people who voted for you will see that you are conducting the business on their behalf," he advised.

Late arrivals of members of the House have in the past delayed

the start of the sessions as there needs to be a quorum of eight

members before the meeting can begin.

Members of the Assessment Board to Review Compensation for the Cancer Centre Acquisition take office

The Assessment Board appointed under the Land Acquisition Act, Chapter 233 was officially sworn in to oversee the valuation and compensation process regarding the Government's compulsory acquisition of the Cancer Centre Eastern Caribbean.

The swearing-in ceremony was presided over by the Governor General, Sir Rodney Williams, at Government House on Tuesday. The Board is chaired by Justice Nicola P. Byer, with former Chief Surveyor for the Government, Vernon Bird, serving as the Government-appointed member. James Bristol KC, a distinguished attorney-at-law from Grenada, was sworn in virtually as the nominee representing the property's majority owner.

The Board has been constituted in accordance with Section 12 of the Land Acquisition Act, which mandates the appointment of a three-member panel to determine fair compensa-

tion when there is a dispute regarding the valuation of land acquired for public use. This follows the Government's compulsory acquisition of the Cancer Centre, a move aimed at facilitating its reopening to address urgent national and regional healthcare needs.

In his remarks, the Governor General underscored the critical role of the Board in ensuring that the assessment process is transparent, fair, and guided by legal and valuation principles. He noted that the resolution of this matter will not only impact the future of healthcare in Antigua and Barbuda but will also reinforce the integrity of the land acquisition process.

The Government has invoked Section 3 of the Act, citing the Cancer Centre's reopening as a matter of public interest, given the increasing demand for cancer treatment services across the Eastern Caribbean. The Board will now proceed with its independent review



James Bristo to determine appropriate compensation in keeping with the rules outlined in Section 19 of the Act.

The Assessment Board is

Vernon Bird expected to begin its deliberations as soon as possible, with all parties committed to an expedient and just resolution.

According to the Chief of Defence Staff the SWORDFFISH will expand the unit's capabilities in combating narcotics trafficking and illegal fishing and even smuggling.




accessibility as expressed in the Ministry of Education's Sector Plan.

Greek non-resident ambassador wants to strengthen ties

Greece's newly appointed
Non-Resident Ambassador to
Antigua and Barbuda, Theodore
N. Tsakiris, wants to see stronger ties between his country and
Antigua and Barbuda, noting that
among other things, Greece is a
member of the European Union
and that this may be of some
benefit.

Ambassador Tsakiris made the observation on Tuesday when he presented his credentials to Governor General Sir Rodney Williams at Government House.

He acknowledged that June this year will mark the 40th anniversary of diplomatic relations between both countries. "Our countries have strong maritime ties and a commitment to international cooperation. Greece seeks to strengthen partnerships with Antigua and Barbuda as well as with the other members of CARICOM in education, tourism, climate resilience and food security," he stated.

In his remarks, Sir Rodney highlighted the strong collaboration between Antigua and Barbuda and Greece in multilateral settings such as the United Nations, particularly on climate change, human rights, international peace, and matters related to Small Island Developing States (SIDS). The Governor General also recognized Greece's global leadership in addressing environmental challenges, an area of mutual



interest for both countries as Antigua and Barbuda continues to prioritize climate resilience and sustainable development.

Additionally, opportunities for economic and trade cooperation were underscored, including:

- ☐ Tourism development: Greece's renowned expertise in tourism could serve as a foundation for enhanced partnerships in destination management, investment, and sustainable tourism practices.
- Maritime and shipping industries: With Greece's prominent role in global shipping and Antigua and Barbuda's strategic geographic location within the Caribbean, both nations could explore trade facilitation, port services, and shipping sector collaborations.
- ☐ Cultural and educational

exchanges: Strengthening cultural diplomacy through events and partnerships, as well as fostering higher education collaborations in fields such as diplomacy, maritime studies, and hospitality management.

Ambassador Tsakiris expressed his enthusiasm for expanding bilateral cooperation and assured that Greece remains committed to furthering ties with Antigua and Barbuda in meaningful ways.

As the newly appointed Non-Resident Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the Hellenic Republic (Greece) to Antigua and Barbuda, Ambassador Tsakiris will work closely with local authorities to deepen diplomatic, economic, and cultural engagements.

The ceremony concluded with expressions of mutual goodwill and a shared vision for enhancing Antigua and Barbuda–Greece relations in the years ahead.






Road works continue across the country

Over 1.2 million pounds of cocaine seized, two arrested

The National Directorate of Drug Control (DNCD) announced a major drug interdiction on Tuesday, reporting the seizure of 548 packages of cocaine through a joint operation with the Navy (ARD) and Air Force (FARD) along the coasts of Pedernales province.

Forensic analysis by the National Institute of Forensic Sciences (INACIF) confirmed the total weight of the seized cocaine at 564,665 kilograms or 1,245,175 lbs.

Two Dominican Republic nationals have been arrested and are currently in custody, having been caught aboard a speedboat south of Beata Island with the drug packages. (*Loop Caribbean*)



Emmalin Pierre officially appointed Grenada's opposition leader

Emmalin Pierre officially appointed Grenada's opposition leader succeeding Keith Mitchell.

Dr Keith Mitchell took on the role of Opposition Leader after the 2022 election and has now transitioned out of that position.

The New National Party's (NNP) was defeated in the June 2022 general election, where the party lost to Dickon Mitchell's National Democratic Congress (NDC) with a 9-6 margin.

Pierre received her instrument of appointment in a ceremony, which she briefly described on Facebook. "MY APOLOGIES to my family, close friends and supporters. I was presented this morning with my



instrument of appointment as Leader of his Majesty's

Opposition. Since I had no prior notice, I was unable to notify or invite you to the ceremony. Thank you sister Kate and sister Clarice who were there and shared the moment with me," she wrote.

This appointment marks a significant moment in Grenadian political history, as Pierre becomes only the second female Leader of the Opposition in the country's House of Representatives.

Both women who have held this position have represented the St Andrew South East constituency. The first was Winifred Strachan, who served in this role between 1991 and 1995. (Loop Caribbean)

Jamaica concerned over US visa policy targeting Cuban medical missions

Minister of Foreign Affairs and Foreign Trade, Senator Kamina Johnson Smith, says the Government is concerned about the United States' recent visa restriction policy targeting officials from countries that engage Cuban healthcare workers and is seeking clarification on the matter.

"Jamaica has had quite a long history of participation in the Cuban medical cooperation programme, and in fact, that is replicated throughout the Caribbean, so the statement has been received with some concern," Johnson Smith said.

Last week, US Secretary of State Marco Rubio announced an expansion of the US-Cuba visa restriction policy to include foreign government officials



and their families whose countries are involved in Cuba's overseas medical mission programme.

Rubio, who is Cuban American, described Cuba's overseas medical missions as an oppressive programme that enriches the Cuban government and deprives ordinary Cubans of optimum healthcare.

Speaking at this morning's post-Cabinet press briefing at Jamaica House, Johnson Smith said the Jamaican government, along with other Caribbean Community (CARICOM) members, has been seeking more

details from the US on the new policy.

"The Jamaican government is also examining the operation of our system. We have over 400 participants from the Cuban medical programme at different levels—doctors, nurses, biomedical engineers, and technicians—so their presence here is of importance to our healthcare system," she said.

The Minister also shared that a meeting is to be held shortly with CARICOM foreign affairs ministers, as they anticipate more information from US embassies across the region.

"At that time, we should be better able to navigate the potential impact and the way forward," she said. (Jamaica Gleaner)



Daniel revels in Leewards historic Women's Super50 victory

The Leeward Islands head coach Percy Daniel was beaming with pride and emotion as he reflected on his team's historic triumph in the CG United Women's Super50 Cup.

Daniel's side registered their first-ever victory in the 50-over format of the tournament when they edged defending champions Jamaica by a single wicket in a dramatic run chase at Warner Park in St. Kitts on Monday.

Jamaica posted a formidable total of 253 for nine, but Leeward Islands responded in emphatic fashion to get to 257 for nine and claim a stunning victory.

It was a performance defined by grit, teamwork, and individual brilliance, with several players stepping up in crucial moments to etch their names into the history books.

Along with those standout performances, Daniel also singled out Antiguan Chey-Anne Moses for her small but crucial 11-run contribution, which he felt exemplified the team's determination.

"One of the staff has been constantly asking me

For Daniel, what stood out most was how his team executed the game plan.

"In our team meetings, we've always said that a top-order batter must carry the innings deep. That was exactly what Amanda did. We've been asking for one of our players to step up, and she did it for the first time in this tournament. We are grateful for that," Daniel noted.

With the game going down to the wire, the mental strength and composure shown by his players in pressure moments were just as impressive as their physical skills.

Daniel also heaped praise on Anthony, who not only dismantled Jamaica's batting lineup with the ball but also played a crucial role with the bat in the chase.

"She decided that today (Monday) was going to be her day. She said it this morning, and I told her, 'All you need to do is prove to us that you can do what you've been promising over the years.' And she did just that," Daniel revealed.

"One thing I would say, though, is game awareness. She wasn't even aware that the fielder had come in from the long-on position. Had things gone differently, the outcome might have been different. But that's all part of the learning process, and we appreciate everything she did today. She said she was going to perform, and she did. We are grateful for that," he added.

The Leeward Islands will be hoping to add to their success when they challenge Barbados Women at St. Paul's Sports Complex in St. Kitts on Wednesday (today).
