Caribbean CIP countries to meet in St. John's this month

The Eastern Caribbean countries which operate Citizenship by Investment Programmes (CIP's) are to gather in Antigua and Barbuda this month to discuss a wide range of issues related to the future of the industry.

The occasion is the annual Caribbean Investment Summit 2025 (CIS25) slated for April 22 to 26 at the American University of Antigua conference centre at Jabberwock Beach.

Chief Executive Officer of the Antigua and Barbuda CIU, Charmaine Donovan, told a news conference that CIS25 comes at an opportune time as the theme will be; *Integrity, Stability and Sustainability.* Prime ministers, heads of the respective CIP units in each of the territories – St. Kitts and Nevis, Dominica, Grenada and St. Lucia will travel to St. John's to participate in the conference.

The conference comes against the backdrop of increased scrutiny for these programmes coming from the European Union nations as well as from the United States. However, Donovan said the agreement signed by these countries a year ago seeks to strengthen their operations and that CIS25 is a bid to satisfy the international concerns.

"We are exceedingly pleased that this summit will provide a platform for all stakeholders to increase their awareness of the advancements made on the regional regulatory body for the Programmes, which is being spearheaded by the Eastern Caribbean Central Bank in collaboration with the OECS Commission. The Interim Regulatory Committee has been established and is well underway with developing the appropriate legislation and administrative framework. These Programmes are a very important revenue source for our economies and we continue to demonstrate individually and collectively our commitment to continuously improving our Programmes to secure long-term sustainability," she

explained.

According to the CEO...Antigua and Barbuda continues to focus on integrity and transparency in its processes and that these safeguards have made its programme to generally be considered the 'gold standard' for CIP's in the sub-region.

"This summit allows us to place a well-deserved spotlight on Antigua and Barbuda, not just as investment jurisdiction, but as an amazing place to live, work and vacation. With the eyes of the region and the wider international investment migration industry on us, we've made sure to infuse this summit with the best of who we are," she observed.

Also addressing the news conference was Chief Catalyst of OPEN Interactive Inc., a St. Kitts-based company that is working along with the CIU to organize the event, Stacio Williams. He noted that the summit was the brain child of Antigua and Barbuda's Prime Minister Gaston Browne who felt that it was important for these countries to meet regularly to review the operations of the programmes.

"Prime Minister Gaston Browne start-

ed this summit right here in 2016 and 2017. He didn't just create a conference - he created a movement for better citizenship programmes across the Caribbean. The Prime Minister understood before anyone else that we needed to work together rather than compete with each other," he stated.

Williams added that the Antigua and Barbuda CIP is the undisputable leader of these programmes in the OECS.

"The Antigua and Barbuda Citizenship by Investment Unit has become a model for the entire region:

• Their background checks are so thorough that other countries now copy our methods

• They process applications quickly while never cutting corners on security

• Every dollar is tracked and accounted for with complete transparency

• Their integrity has never been questioned by international organizations

"This is why our theme of "Integrity, Stability, Sustainability" isn't just words - it's exactly what Prime Minister Browne and CEO Donovan have already built," Williams declared.

Antigua and Barbuda will host the Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting (CHOGAM) in 2026 at a date to be announced and a theme to agree upon.

A ten-member delegation visiting from the Commonwealth, the Metropolitan Police, the Palace and Security and experts in various fields including cyber security were invited Cabinet on Wednesday.

Since the visiting team has had experience with previous Commonwealth Heads Meeting, the provided assurances to the Cabinet of Antigua and Barbuda that

every aspect of the meeting will be planned. The visiting Presidents, Prime Ministers', Foreign Ministers' and other heads will comprise six to seven thousand delegates who will descend upon Antigua and Barbuda that is the CHOGM. There will be several fora including Business Forum, Women Forum, Youth Forum and People Forum each attracting three to four hundred people from across the Commonwealth.

The Palace will dispatch special police who will spend two weeks this month preplanning for the inclusive of King Charles and his Queen in the events that have been scheduled. There will be spouses programme to be led by Minister Maria Browne that will include a trip to Barbuda. The King may also visit Barbuda. There are a number of activities planned including i. a concert featuring global artiste ii. T10 cricket match.

UPP operatives fail to prove wrong-doing in Alfa Nero sale

The Cabinet expressed disbelief that operatives of the UPP who collaborated with a Russian Lady are surprised that the Governments defense of the sale of the Alfa Nero Vessel confirms that transaction was correctly carried out.





Antigua and Barbuda wants a regional approach to tackle the impact of US tariffs

Antigua and Barbuda is again sounding the alarm about the likely impact of the recently announced US tariffs will have on the countries of Latin America and the Caribbean, who are members of CELAC.

Speaking at a CELAC meeting in Honduras, Foreign Affairs Minister, E.P Chet Greene, described the current international environment as an era marked by uncertainty and rapid change, noting that it is imperative that CELAC countries recognize the steps they are taking collectively to address these challenges and foster a resilient future for their nations.

"Antigua and Barbuda like all other member states are very concerned about the negative effects that unilateral sanctions, tariffication and other unilateral coercive measures have on some of our member states, the consequences these measures have on the economic and social development of the targeted countries and the entire Latin-American and Caribbean region," FM Greene stated.

According to the foreign minister, in recent years, the world has witnessed a shift in the global balance of power, characterized by complex trade relationships, climate change, migration crises, and shifting alliances.

These factors, he added, have prompted countries in the region to re-evaluate their strategies and enhance cooperation in a way that fortifies their collective interests.

Despite the challenges, Greene remains hopeful that working together through the several regional organisations can chart a pathway through the current crises.

"The Community of Latin American and Caribbean States (CELAC), the Union of South American Nations (UNASUR), and the Caribbean Community (CAR-ICOM) and Bolivarian Alliance (ALBA) provide platforms for dialogue and cooperation. By working together, we can amplify our voices on the international stage, ensuring that our concerns are heard and addressed by global powers," he observed.

FA Greene pointed out that the need for enhanced cooperation in trade is essential in order to foster economic integration. "By reducing trade barriers and promoting investment, we not only enhance our economies but also create a united front to address external pressures. It is vital that we build robust economic ties that benefit all member nations. enabling us to innovate and compete globally," he declared.

Dear Math Warriors,



Police constable collapses and dies in St Thomas

The St Thomas police are investigating the sudden death of a colleague who collapsed while walking in the parish on Tuesday night.

He has been identified as Constable Jason Beckford of the St Thomas police division.

Reports are that about 8:00 p.m., Beckford was walking along the Hampton Court main road in Golden Grove, St Thomas, when he collapsed.

He was taken to the Princess Margaret Hospital where he was pronounced dead. (*Ja-maica Gleaner*)



Dragon Gas deal dies: PM says US has revoked licence

Prime Minister Stuart Young has confirmed that the United States has revoked Trinidad and Tobago's licence to develop the Dragon Gas Field with Venezuela.

Speaking at a press conference in Port of Spain on Tuesday afternoon, Young said the revocation of the OFAC (Office of Foreign Assets Control) licence was not unexpected and that he has requested a bilateral meeting with Secretary Rubio.

According to Young Rubio had made it clear that US foreign policy is not aimed at harming Trinidad and Tobago, particularly in relation to its energy diplomacy and efforts to ensure regional energy security.

"We are not going to harm Trinidad and Tobago," Young quoted the Secretary of State as saying during their engagement.

Young had described the meeting as "frank and detailed," saying he outlined the strategic importance of the Dragon gas project, not only for Trinidad and Tobago but for CARICOM nations that depend on the country's downstream energy products.

Young said he brought the news to the population as soon as he was told and would now be taking it to BP and Shell.

BP, Shell, and the National Gas Company (NGC), had secured licences from the OFAC to explore and develop gas fields straddling the maritime boundary between Venezuela and Trinidad and Tobago.

BP, working on the Manakin-Coquina field, and Shell, with the Dragon field, were positioned to tap into substantial

gas reserves in the region, with the potential to bring significant natural gas resources to Trinidad for processing into LNG and petrochemicals.

The licences, granted for two years, had enabled the companies to negotiate with Venezuela and move forward with development plans.

Last May, Young said that T&T was already paying a portion of over US\$1 million per year in taxes to Venezuela as part of the deal.

He said the payments due to Venezuela consisted of royalty, a special commission of five per cent, surface tax and social contributions totalling US\$1 million, and a confidential signing bonus.

The gas was 15 kilometres of pipeline away from Trinidad. The deal now appears to be dead. (*Trinidad Express*)



Regional News PAGE 17 Death toll from roof collapse at Dominican club reaches 113

The legendary Jet Set club in Santo Domingo was packed with musicians, professional athletes and government officials when dust began falling from the ceiling and into people's drinks.

Minutes later, the entire roof collapsed. Concrete slabs killed more than 113 people and trapped dozens of others on a dancefloor where hundreds had been dancing to a lively merengue concert early Tuesday. More than 255 people were injured, authorities said.

The victims include merengue icon Rubby Pérez, who had been singing to the crowd before disaster struck. His body was found early Wednesday, said emergency operations director Juan Manuel Méndez.

Rescue crews were still searching for potential survivors more than 24 hours after the collapse.

"As long as they report that there is a missing person, we will be here," Méndez said.

Rescue crews from Puerto Rico and Israel arrived in the Dominican Republic on Wednesday to help local authorities with the search.

Late Tuesday night, those still looking for their fam-



ily and friends gathered around a man playing a guitar outside the club as they sang hymns.

So far, only 32 people have been identified in one of the worst disasters to hit the Dominican Republic. Local media reported that those who died include a cardiologist, a government architect, a retired police officer and the brother of the vice minister of the Ministry of Youth.

Also killed was MLB pitcher Octavio Dotel and Dominican player Tony Enrique Blanco Cabrera, Satosky Terrero, spokesman for the country's Professional Baseball League, told The Associated Press.

Nelsy Cruz, the governor of the northwestern province of Montecristi and sister of seven-time Major League Baseball All-Star Nelson Cruz, alerted President Luis Abinader about the disaster. She called

him from underneath the rubble but died later at a hospital.

Other victims include saxophonist Luis Solís, who was playing onstage when the roof fell, several Venezuelan bartenders and an Army captain who left behind four young girls. Grupo Popular, a financial services company, said three of its employees also died, including the president of AFP Popular Bank and his wife.

But countless more remained unidentified.

"I have been to many hospitals, and I have not found her," said Deysi Suriel of her friend, 61-year-old Milca Curiel. Suriel lives in North Carolina and was vacationing in the Dominican Republic.

Dozens of frantic relatives crowded at the country's National Institute of Forensic Pathology, scanning a list of the victim's names while others went from hospital to hospital looking for their loved ones, some clutching pictures of them.

"There's a lot of pain," said Senator Daniel Rivera, the country's former public health minister. "We need to have a lot of patience."

Among those searching for their relatives was Kimberly Jones, whose godson, 45-year-old artist Osiris Blanc, and his friends were missing.

"It was their favourite place, they went there almost every Monday," Jones said, adding that her niece also was missing.

It wasn't immediately clear what caused the roof to collapse, or when the Jet Set building was last inspected.

The club issued a statement saying it was cooperating with authorities. A spokeswoman for the familv who owns the club told The Associated Press that she passed along questions about potential inspections.

Meanwhile, a spokeswoman for the Ministry of Public Works referred questions to the mayor's office. A spokesperson for the mayor's office did not respond to a message for comment. (Jamaica *Gleaner*)

St Kitts Govt revokes citizenship of several foreign nationals under CBI programme



The St. Kitts-Nevis government says it has revoked the citizenship of 13 people and their dependents as part of the "decisive actions" taken to preserve the Citizenship by Investment (CBI) Programme through which foreign investors are granted citizenship of the twin island Federation in return for making a significant contribution to the socio-economic development of the country.

The CBI programme, which is also being undertaken by the governments in St. Lucia, Antigua and Barbuda, Grenada, and Dominica, has come under scrutiny by the United States and European governments, with some claiming that it provides an opportunity for shady characters to obtain foreign passports.

In a statement, the government said that together with the Citizenship by Investment Unit (CIU) "decisive actions" have been taken "to preserve the integrity and international reputation of the CBI Programme".

It said following a comprehensive investigation by the Ministry of National Security, Immigration, and Citizenship, the government has issued the Saint Christopher and Nevis Citizenship (Deprivation of Citizenship) Order, 2025, resulting in the revocation of citizenship from 13 individuals and their dependents who were found to have failed to pay the statutory minimum investment required under the CBI Programme, despite having indicated otherwise in their applications.

"The investigation stemmed from a review of 158 redacted applications and contracts with two International Marketing Agents linked to suspicious practices".

The government said it contacted 158 identified individuals and of these 32 individuals paid their outstanding investment balance, 13 admitted to non-payment of the required sums and took no corrective action, while one individual requested a hearing before a Commission of Inquiry.

It said the remaining individuals are in dialogue with the relevant authority to settle outstanding investment balances.

"After careful consideration, exercising powers under Sections 8 and 10 of the Citizenship Act to issue deprivation orders in March 2025, the Ministry issued the Saint Christopher and Nevis Citizenship (Deprivation of Citizenship) Order, 2025 on the basis of false representation and willful concealment of material facts, and in the interest of the public good".

It said in tandem with these efforts, the CIU has permanently blacklisted two International Marketing Agents – Latitude Consultancy and RIF Trust – for their role in marketing the CBI Programme "at investment amounts below the statutory minimum and misleading clients, clear violations of the laws governing the Programme.

"Clients of both companies confirmed receiving false assurances of 'special discounts'. Both entities are now prohibited from all CBI-related activities and cannot present themselves as agents or affiliates of the Programme," the government said.

It said additionally, it has terminated its investment agreement with MSR Media SKN Ltd and MSR Hotels & Co. Ltd, "following multiple breaches of their contractual obligations.

"These include failures to renovate and operate key hospitality and tourism infrastructure, employ agreed numbers of local citizens, and deliver promised film productions. "Compounding these breaches, the MSR Companies and their principals launched a coordinated international campaign to discredit the Saint Kitts and Nevis CBI Programme and falsely accuse Government officials of local and cross-jurisdictional unethical practices—actions wholly incompatible with a constructive partnership under the CBI framework."

The government said that it is reiterating "its zero-tolerance policy toward abuse of the CBI Programme and remains resolute in enforcing its regulations to ensure that only credible, compliant investors benefit from citizenship of Saint Kitts and Nevis". (Loop Caribbean)

Guyana: Two bandits, ages 15 & 22 shot dead during foiled supermarket robbery, two accomplices fled the scene

A15-year-old year old and 22-year-old were both shot dead last evening by a security guard as they attempted to rob a Chinese Supermarket the Guyana Police Force has reported.

Tyrese Adams, 15, and Orwin Garraway, 22 were accompanied by two other males who escaped during the foiled attempt at armed robbery at Jai Jai Supermarket on Hadfield in Georgetown.

The incident occurred about 7:30pm on Tuesday.

The bottom flat of the supermarket consists of two cashier booths (on the eastern and western sides) and is secured by one armed security guard on a 12-hour basis.

At the time of the robbery, a 35-year-old security guard was on duty armed with a 9mm pistol and 15 rounds of 9mm ammunition, when two of the suspects entered the supermarket, both dressed in dark clothing with black ski masks covering their faces and handguns, the police revealed.

Each of the suspects approached both cashiers at the supermarket at the time; one pointing their firearm and demanding money while the other ransacked the cashier's booth the police explained.

CCTV video footage shows the armed guard emerging from inside the supermarket and confronting the bandits, both of whom started running in an attempt to exit the supermarket.

"One of the suspects fell to the ground inside the supermarket, while the other ran out of the supermarket and fell onto the road about 15 feet west of the supermarket," the police reported.

The security guard said that as he exited the supermarket, he observed two other suspects who were standing outside but made good their escape.

"Two blue and black Haojue motorcycles, one without a number plate and the other bearing registration number CP 623, were observed parked in front of the supermarket with the keys in the ignition," the police informed.

The EMT was summoned to the scene and both suspects were pronounced dead by Dr Kellman of the GPHC.

The police noted that "one live 9mm round of ammunition, thirteen 9mm spent shells and three fragments were found inside the supermarket, while one 9mm spent shell and three fragments were found on the road in front of the supermarket."

The bodies of the deceased suspects were examined and

it was observed that Garraway sustained suspected gunshot wounds to his right and left side ribs, hands, nose and right shoulder, while Tyrese Adams sustained suspected gunshot wounds to his upper right shoulder, stomach, one to his lower back and left hip.

The firearm, along with the spent shells, were processed, placed in evidence bags, marked, sealed and lodged to be taken to the ballistics section for analysis while several persons were questioned about the incident.

The bodies of Orwin Garraway and Tyrese Adams were escorted to the Memorial Gardens Funeral Home, awaiting post-mortem examinations while investigations continue the police said. (*Loop Caribbean*)

China raises its retaliatory tariff on the US to 84% as it vows to 'fight to the end'

China again vowed to "fight to the end" Wednesday in an escalating trade war with the US as it announced it would raise tariffs on American goods to 84 per cent from Thursday.

Beijing also added an array of countermeasures after US President Donald Trump raised the total tariff on imports from China to 104 per cent. Beijing said it was launching an additional suit against the US at the World Trade Organization and placed further restrictions on American companies' trade with Chinese companies.

"If the US insists on further escalating its economic and trade restrictions, China has the firm will and abundant means to take necessary countermeasures and fight to the end," the Ministry of Commerce wrote in a statement introducing its white paper on trade with the US.

The government declined to say whether it would negotiate with the White House, as many other countries have started doing.

On Friday, China announced a 34 per cent tariff on all goods imported from the US, export controls on rare earth minerals, and a slew of other measures in response to Trump's "Liberation Day" tariffs. Trump then added an additional 50 per cent tariff on goods from China, saying negotiations with them were terminated.

Wednesday's newest measures include adding 11 American companies to a so-called "unreliable entities" list that would bar Chinese companies from selling them dual-use goods. Among the companies are American Photonics, and SYNEXXUS, both of whom work with the American military.

So far, China has not appeared inter-



ested in bargaining. "If the US truly wants to resolve issues through dialogue and negotiation, it should adopt an attitude of equality, respect and mutual benefit," said Ministry of Foreign Affairs spokesman Lin Jian Wednesday.

The paper says that the US has not honoured the promises it made in the phase 1 trade deal concluded during Trump's first term. As an example, it said that a US law that would ban TikTok unless it is sold by its Chinese parent company violates a promise that neither would "pressure the other party to transfer technology to its own individuals."

Trump signed an order to keep Tik-Tok running for another 75 days last week after a potential deal to sell the app to American owners was put on ice.

ByteDance representatives called the White House to indicate that China would no longer approve the deal until there could be negotiations about trade and tariffs. The paper also argued that taking into account trade in services and US companies' domestic Chinese branches, economic exchange between the two countries is "roughly in balance."

It says that China had a trade in services deficit with the US of \$26.57 billion in 2023, which is composed of industries like insurance, banking and accounting.

Trump's tariffs were designed to close trade deficits with foreign countries, but those were calculated only based on trades in physical, tangible goods.

"History and facts have proven that the United States' increase in tariffs will not solve its own problems," said the statement from the Chinese commerce ministry. "Instead, it will trigger sharp fluctuations in financial markets, push up US inflation pressure, weaken the US industrial base and increase the risk of a US economic recession, which will ultimately only backfire on itself. Nationwide strike for better pay brings **Greece to standstil**

A nationwide general strike Greece's financial crisis. disrupted public services across Greece, with ferries tied up in port, flights grounded and public transport running only part-time as labour unions press for higher wages to cope with rising living costs.

The 24-hour strike on Wednesday was called by the two main umbrella unions covering the public and private sectors, seeking a full return of collective bargaining rights which were scrapped as part of international bailouts during

Greece has emerged from a 2009-18 debt crisis, which saw rolling cuts in wages and pensions in turn for bailouts worth about 290 billion euros (\$319bn) and economic growth seen at 2.3 percent this year, outpacing other eurozone economies.

Tapping on the country's progress, the conservative government increased the monthly minimum wage by a cumulative 35 percent to 880 euros (\$970). But many households still struggle to make ends meet amid rising



food, power and housing costs, the labour unions say. The country braces for further global financial turmoil

triggered by US tariffs. (Al Jazeera English)

Immigration advocates condemn moves to share sensitive information on undocumented migrants

Immigration advocates have condemned an agreement between the United States Internal Revenue Service (IRS) and Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to share sensitive information on undocumented Caribbean and other taxpayers with removal

He said undocumented Caribbean nationals and others in New York contribute US\$6.7 billion in local, state, and federal taxes annually, while immigrants with status contribute US\$74.8 billion.

The move has already led to the resignation of Melanie Krause, the acting IRS commissioner, indicating that taxpayer information is among the most closely guarded data in the federal government.

"The IRS is mandated to guard tax information within its agencies, and, over the years, it has consistently assured undocumented taxpayers that their information is confidential and that it is safe for them to file tax returns," said Murad Awawdeh, president and chief executive officer of the New York Immigration Coalition (NYIC).

"The IRS's decision to share confidential information with the Department of Homeland Security threatens the safety of thousands of workers while forcing them further into the shadows, and discourages tax compliance," Awawdeh told the Caribbean Media "These dollars help fund our schools, maintain our infrastructure, and provide vital public resources that all New Yorkers depend on. The IRS sharing this information with DHS will have a devastating effect on our economy and lead to increased surveillance of immigrant communities.

"Instead of punishing people who contribute and comply with our tax laws, our government should be working to protect their rights and build trust. The federal government should be expanding pathways to legal status, not punishing people who are doing everything they can to contribute to our economy.

"We call on the federal government to stop targeting immigrant communities and Congress to exercise its oversight authority, demand clarification on the status of this implementation agreement, and uphold taxpayer privacy protections for every person in the

US," Awawdeh said.

The IRS and DHS agreement comes as President Donald Trump intensifies the deportation of Caribbean and other immigrants.

Under the agreement, agents from the US Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agency can ask the IRS for information about Caribbean and other immigrants who have final orders of removal or are under criminal investigation.

Last month, several congressional Democrats dispatched a joint letter to DHS Secretary Noem and the head of the IRS urging them not to pursue the agreement.

"If immigrants fear that filing taxes could expose them to deportation, many will choose not to file, reducing federal revenues that contribute to funding public schools, health care, and disaster relief for Americans while shifting resources to the informal economy," they wrote.

But a Department of the Treasury spokesperson said in a statement on Tuesday that, "the bases for this MOU are founded in longstanding authorities granted by Congress, which serve to protect the privacy of law-abiding Americans while streamlining the ability to pursue criminals."

However, Nandan Joshi, a lawyer with Public Citizen, which represents immigrant advocacy groups, said that, "the IRS has gone back on its duty to protect taxpayer information from improper disclosure.

"If allowed to stand, this agreement will provide a roadmap for federal law enforcement to gain access to confidential taxpayer information without obtaining court order as required by law," he said. (*Jamaica Gleaner*)


