

"We dodged the Bullet!"

"We dodged the bullet!" says Port CEO Telemaque

Antigua and Barbuda and the other countries of the Caribbean 'dodged the bullet' through activism and skillful negotiations to get the United States to provide the region with an exemption from new charges that go into effect on May 7 targeting Chinese built ships or shipping lines with these vessels in their fleets.

That's the word of Chief Executive Officer of the Antigua and Barbuda Port Authority, Darwin Telemaque, in explaining the significance of the announcement of the exemption and what it means for the economies of the region.

Telemaque explained that the powerful trade unions in the US pressured the Biden Administration to take action to return ship building to the US, once a leader in this industry but which has been eclipsed by China over the last twenty years.

He added that a study was commissioned, but when the recommendations were made it was the Trump Administration that was in office and it decided to adopt some of the recommendations from the US Trade Representative, the office that oversees all trade relations between the US and

other countries.

In essence, the US is proposing to add as much as US\$3 million extra on these Chinese built ships that call at US ports. This increase could translate into a doubling of shipping costs between Miami and the Caribbean, Telemaque noted.

"The results would have been devastating for Antigua and Barbuda and the rest of the region. It would have been worse than COVID-19. At least during the pandemic, none of the shipping lines that serve our region increased prices in any significant way. That was not the same for other regions such as the Pacific

where shipping costs rose by 25 percent in many cases. Shipping costs of up to US\$3,000.00 more per container would have had a crippling impact on our economies," Telemaque declared.

During negotiations with the USTR office, the Caribbean negotiators were able to get three of five of their requests accepted by the Americans. One of these provided a geographical space that included all of CARICOM.

"We literally got most of what we wanted from the recommendations that we pitched. That also meant that these recommendations would directly benefit the shipping lines serving the Caribbean. One of the key ones that we wanted to have was designing the space, the CARICOM space, from the US within a nautical miles range so we said let's exempt an area from the US to include the Bahamas all the way down to Suriname of over 2000 nautical miles; that was clearly in the document and that was accepted by the Americans," he stated.

The Caribbean negotiators also asked and received a waiver for vessels of certain as this would not affect the small volume on ships heading for Caribbean ports.

"We were heading into a situation where we were going to have freight rates that would have been extremely difficult for the Caribbean and Antigua and Barbuda and the impact would have been worse than COVID-19 in terms of shipping rates," he remarked.

Telemaque played a key role in the negotiations representing the Caribbean Port Managers Association as well as the Antigua and Barbuda Port Authority.

The exemption from the fees is permanent.

US Court sets strict guidelines for access to financial records in Alfa Nero case.



U.S. District Judge Jesse M. Furman on Tuesday issued a memo endorsement lifting the stay on subpoenas for the financial documents of individuals named in the Alfa Nero case

In a MEMO ENDORSEMENT on re: [38] Response in Opposition to Motion, filed by Yulia Guryeva-Motlokhov, the federal judge wrote; ENDORSEMENT : Upon review of the parties' letters, the Court concludes that the proper way to balance Applicant's interest in avoiding unnecessary delay and Movants' privacy interests is to lift the stay and require production subject to a protective order providing that any responses to the Subpoenas are to be held on an Attorneys-Eyes-Only basis until further order of the Court and are to be destroyed to the extent that the Court grants a motion to quash. Applicant and Movants shall confer and, no later than April 25, 2025, file a proposed protective order. SO ORDERED. (Signed by Judge Jesse M. Furman on 4/22/25) (yv)

What this means is that the lawyers representing Yulia Guryeva-Motlokhov, will have access to the financial records which they subpoenaed. However, this will only be done by the lawyers involved in the case and only under the direction of the court. Whatever information is gleaned from the search must be destroyed if after hearing the arguments the judge decides to quash the case.



The late UPP parliamentarian, Hon. Hilson Baptiste to receive official funeral



Former Member of Parliament for the St. Mary's South constituency, Hon. Hilson Baptiste, who died on Wednesday, will be accorded an official funeral. This as Prime Minister Gaston Browne has expressed condolences to the family, friends and supporters of

the late parliamentarian.

The prime minister's sentiments were conveyed via a public statement on behalf of the government and people of Antigua and Barbuda. The statement reads as follows;

On behalf of the people and Government of Antigua and Barbuda, Prime Minister Gaston Browne M.P. expresses his sympathy to the wife of Honourable Hilson Baptiste, Ethlaine, his family, friends, and his supporters. The Honourable Hilson Baptiste died Wednesday 23 April 2025.

The Honourable Member of Parliament from 1994 until 2014 was elected by the constituents of the St. Mary's South Constituency; his election on four occasions attest to the approval which his constituents conferred on him for 20 years. He had been an entrepreneur/businessman in his previous life, bringing that experience to

governance while his political party formed the majority.

The Honourable Member acquired lands that are still very useful for tourism investment in several areas of Antigua; he ensured that jobs and investment were generated by these holdings. Mr. Baptiste was a plain-speaking representative who would sprinkle his public pronouncements with rich Antiguan language and sayings.

The Honourable Hilson Baptiste fell ill and was infrequently seen in public. Nevertheless, he remained attached to his constituency and was embraced by many. An official funeral is being offered to show respect for this former parliamentarian. May his soul rest in perpetual peace.

Caribbean Scholar Proposes Bold New Economic Vision for Caribbean

Caribbean Scholar, Dr. Andrea Baldwin has proposed that the Caribbean must reimagine its response to the ruptures in today's society in light of the new global trends.

Baldwin, Associate Professor of Gender and Ethnic Studies at the University of Utah, delivered the Sir Arthur Lewis Distinguished Lecture this month, marking a highlight of the 26th Annual Sir Arthur Lewis Institute of Social and Economic Studies (SALISES) Conference at The University of the West Indies (UWI) Five Islands Campus.

In her lecture entitled "(Re) Imagining Caribbean Futures at a time of Imposed Epochal Rapture," Dr. Baldwin introduced the concept of "brackish economies," building upon Sir Arthur Lewis's dual sector model

to propose a new economic framework for the Caribbean.

"The Caribbean is not bound by history. It is a guide, a conductor of new frequencies through rituals, rebellions, and rhythms. Caribbean people have long practiced futurity. We know how to cultivate possibility from contradiction," Baldwin told the audience of academic leaders, government officials, and conference delegates.

Baldwin's lecture examined three major "ruptures" in Caribbean history: colonialism, post-World War II global economic restructuring, and current climate collapse. She argued that Caribbean societies have consistently responded to these challenges with creativity and resilience.

"Each rupture is also a portal, a chance to build something new," Baldwin said. "As Sir Arthur Lewis taught, people, not profits, drive transformation. Equity is as important as efficiency, and sustainable futures must center justice."

Baldwin, a Barbadian scholar, developed the "brackish economies" model by drawing inspiration from the unique ecological systems of the Caribbean. The model envisions economies not based solely on traditional metrics like GDP, but centered on care, community, and environmental stewardship.

"What if instead of growth at all costs, we modeled our economies on the mangrove — flexible, rooted, cooperative?" Baldwin asked, challenging conventional economic thinking.

Professor Justin Robinson, Pro-Vice Chancellor and Principal of UWI Five Islands Campus, praised Baldwin's lecture as "thought-provoking and insightful," highlighting how it connected economic theory with Caribbean realities especially in this turbulent time with shifting geo-political boundaries and trends.

The lecture was attended by distinguished guests including Sir Rodney Williams, Governor General of Antigua and Barbuda and Lady Williams as well as other government officials, academics, policymakers, and cultural leaders. SALISES also recognized Antiguan Soca band Burning Flames for their outstanding contribution to Caribbean music and culture.

Police reassure the public regarding the legitimacy of the Gun Amnesty

The Administration of the Royal Police Force of Antigua and Barbuda is reaffirming its full commitment to the ongoing National Gun Amnesty, assuring the public that the initiative remains a legitimate, transparent, and vital step towards enhancing public safety.

This reassurance is in response to recent attempts to misrepresent the amnesty program and undermine public trust, while discouraging participation, in light of a court conviction earlier in the month.

Based on the facts of evidence, the accused in question had several options and reasonable time to voluntarily surrender the illegal weapon; however, he chose not to do so. The Police Administration is urging the public not to be swayed by these misleading narratives. From its inception on April 7, 2025, the National Gun Amnesty has been guided by clear and consistent protocols. The public was advised that individuals in possession of illegal firearms and ammunition can voluntarily surrender them to any police station without fear of arrest or prosecution. Residents also have the option to contact the police station nearest them to make the necessary arrangements when surrendering a weapon.

To date, two illegal firearms and several rounds of ammunition have been safely surrendered under this ini-




tiative, with no arrests or prosecutions resulting from these submissions.

The Police Administration

remains resolute in its commitment to public safety and urges all citizens to support the National Gun Amnesty.

Additionally, this program offers residents an opportunity to do the right thing and contribute to a safer Antigua and Barbuda, free from the threats posed by criminals armed with illegal weapons. The public is further reminded that all submissions are handled discreetly and with the highest level of confidentiality. Tattoo artist pleads guilty to gun and ammunition charges

A tattoo artist - 40-yearold Oszie Kelvin Russell, aka Mongoose, of Lightfoot - has pleaded guilty to charges involving the illegal possession of a firearm, matching ammunition and a silencer. He is returning to court on Thursday to be sentenced. The case is being heard before Senior Magistrate responsible for District 'B', Ngaio Emanuel who heard from the prosecution that the police, acting on certain intelligence, executed a search warrant at Russell's home at approximately 6:55 a.m. on Tuesday April 22.

The report stated that the police knocked on his door and shouted 'Police' and after there was no answer they entered through an unlocked door. As they approached the bedroom, the police again shouted 'Police' and there was still no answer. However, Russell proceeded to throw an object outside through the bedroom window. An officer was posted there for such eventuality and when he saw the object he shouted to his colleagues, 'gun'.

A further search of the house discovered 10 rounds

of ammunition along with a silencer. Russell claimed he knew nothing of the items and he was arrested and charged with unlawful possession of one Glock 80 Pistol and 10 matching rounds of ammunition, along with a firearm compressor (silencer).

During his court appearance on Wednesday, Russel pleaded guilty to the charges and sentencing was postponed until Thursday.

The Royal Police Force of Antigua and Barbuda says it remains committed to the safety and security of all residents and continues to actively pursue all individuals involved in criminal activities.





Remembering Brother B

Champion of Food, Farmer, and Fighter for the People

In the life of Hilson Baptiste, affectionately known across Antigua and Barbuda as Brother B, food was far more than nourishment—it was culture, conviction, and a calling. Whether presiding over a steaming pot in his spirited kitchen on Long Street, sharing stories thick with humour and wisdom, or representing his nation abroad, Brother B's passion always began and ended with food.

His kitchen was legendary a gathering place for meals, ideas, laughter, and love. Yet, in his public life as Minister of Agriculture, his culinary compass found national direction. He was tireless in his mission to place food production and food security at the heart of the development agenda. For Brother B, it wasn't policy it was personal.

He believed fervently that no food should be wasted. He was known to chide diners who left their meat untouched, sometimes even reclaiming it himself, asserting that every bit of nourishment should be respected. For him, food waste represented a moral failure.

But Brother B was more than a culinary crusader. He was a voice bold, clear, and unflinching in defence of those he called "poor people". He fought hard, with heart and heat, for fairness, always siding with those he believed were treated unjustly. And though passionate in debate, he always sought agreement, believing that shared understanding was the true measure of leadership.

Even when health challenges arose later in life, Brother B faced them with the same resolute spirit that defined his political and personal journey. He remained active, sharp, and determined a fighter.

He didn't just urge people to eat what they grew; he also fought for the farmers, encouraged backyard gardening, mentored young people, and built partnerships with local and international allies. He viewed those who worked the soil as stewards of Antigua and Barbuda's dwindling breadbasket and honoured their labour with his words and actions.

Brother B's legacy is deeply rooted in the soil and soul of this nation. His vision lives on in every local dish served with pride, every school garden planted with purpose, and every policy shaped with the people in mind. He was, in every way, a man of the people rooted, resilient, and real.

May Antigua and Barbuda always remember Brother B not just as a Minister and advocate, but as a man who transformed food into a language of love, a platform for justice, and a rallying cry for national pride.



Crisis in Mathematics

The question of poor outcomes in Mathematics across the Caribbean, and what to do in order to improve the results has been discussed many times in the past.

Last year, the Caribbean Examinations Council (CXC) reported that the pass rate for Mathematics was 36 per cent. While those numbers are considered as unacceptable, Antigua and Barbuda's pass rate continues to fall below the regional benchmark.

Part of the problem is that students are not reading enough - not just for Mathematics, but all subject areas. It therefore calls into question the students' ability to read and understand. This inability to read and seemingly understand what is being asked is a real and present danger.

It is a real and present danger because it means that students are not employing any critical thinking in their work. Inasmuch as we are focusing on Mathematics, this inability to apply critical thinking extends to other subjects.

Another part of the problem is that quite a number of students are lacking in the knowledge or understanding of foundational skills in Mathematics. It therefore means that they are unable to master more advanced topics.

Even more shocking is the dual problem of (i) the lack of mental math in schools, and (ii) the over reliance on calculators. This over reliance on the calculator is robbing students of the ability to develop their mental capacity to solve problems without the use of a device.

Of course, another result of this lack of mental math and the over reliance on a calculator is the ability to apply any critical thinking to their work. It is this (critical thinking) that Mathematics is meant to foster and develop. Ironically, with the Ministry of Education 'sanctioning' the use of calculators in primary schools, they are inadvertently producing students who cannot think critically or function ordinarily without the aid of a device. In other words, it has created an unintended consequence.

If there is to be a turnaround in the poor outcomes, urgent and immediate interventions are required. Those interventions of necessity must include the teachers and students, if they are to be successful. The question therefore that should be asked "is there an appetite to turn around these poor outcomes in Mathematics?"

The first such intervention **must** be with the teachers so that their approach to teaching Math can be addressed, and the students so they are taught to *understand* concepts rather than to *memorize* them. It may even require reteaching for some students, who did not learn after the initial instruction.

The intervention must also include the use of real-world connections. These concepts must be taught in a logical way, as some topics are prerequisites for other topics.

Finally, the quality of the teachers who will deliver these lessons must also be addressed. There are teachers in the 'system' who proudly confess that they are only teaching the subject because their principal asked them to do so. No intervention would be complete without the involvement of supportive parents. Parental involvement must be encouraged both at school, and by the Ministry of Education.


If we adopt and embrace the above measures, we could start to see better results in Mathematics for Antigua and Barbuda. The time is therefore right to stop playing lip service and do what is right for our students. If we are to move forward as a nation, we need far better outcomes in Mathematics. We need to continue to nurture and encourage critical thinking among our students. It is *that* intangible thing called 'critical thinking' that would propel us as a nation.

RSS completes probe into death of man shot and killed by Guyana police



Investigators from the Barbados-based Regional Security System (RSS) have completed their investigations into the police shooting death of Ronaldo Peters, 21, earlier this month.

Peters was shot and killed on April 7, when police, acting on information, went in search of him. Police claimed that Peters was wanted for a rape that occurred sometime between December 1, 2024 and January 31, 2025.

President Irfaan Ali had said that the RSS would assist local police in their probe of the deaths of Peters and Keon Fogenay, 26, who was killed during protests of the police killing on April 8.

In a statement, the Guyana Police Force (GPF) said that its Office of Professional Responsibility and the Regional Security System "have completed their investigation into the alleged fatal shooting of Ronaldo Peters."

"The case file is expected to be forwarded to the Director of Public Prosecution by April 23rd, 2025, to obtain legal advice."

However, the GPF said that additional witnesses into the fatal shooting of Fogenay are expected to be interviewed on Monday "to complete the case before the file is submitted".

It said that the RSS "is also expected to submit a report

containing findings and recommendations".

Both Peters and Fogenay were buried last weekend as families and friends gathered, cried and eulogized their lives. There was also a collective call for justice.

"One of the most important things for us to do, is to fight for justice for all of us, because the government has the tendency of compensating, but let us be clear, you cannot compensate for life," Opposition Leader, Aubrey Norton, said, noting that there is a worrying trend that has developed in Guyana with the police killing of unarmed young men. He said it is a trend that must stop.

The funeral service was conducted by Pastor Morris McKinnon, who in offering comfort to the families and the community of Linden said that though the situation is painful and hurting, the families and the community can overcome.

"It wouldn't be easy of course because your mind will always reflect and you will always thing about this scene and the other scenes some of you saw, but I want to direct you and direct your minds to Jesus and I want you to know that Jesus ain't done with this world," he added. (Loop Caribbean)

Haiti could face 'total chaos' without more international support, UN envoy warns

The top UN official in Haiti sounded an alarm to the UN Security Council on Monday that escalating gang violence is liable to lead the Caribbean nation to "a point of no return."

María Isabel Salvador warned that "Haiti could face total chaos" without increased funding and support for the operation of the Kenya-led multinational force helping Haiti's police to tackle the gangs' expanding violence into areas beyond the capital, Port-Au-Prince.

Most recently, she said, gangs seized the city of Mirebalais in central Haiti, and during the attack, over 500 prisoners were freed. It was the fifth prison break in under a year, "part of a deliberate effort to entrench dominance, dismantle institutions and instil fear."

Haiti's police, supported by the armed forces and the Kenya-led force, were overwhelmed by the scale and duration of the violence, the UN special representative said.

The gangs have grown in power since the July 7, 2021, assassination of President Jovenel Moïse and are now estimated to control 85% of the capital and are moving into surrounding areas. Haiti has not had a president since then.

The UN-backed mission led by Kenyan police arrived in Haiti last year to help local authorities quell gang violence, but the mission remains understaffed and underfunded, with only about 40% of the 2,500 personnel originally envisioned.

Salvador said that in February and March alone, 1,086 people were killed and 383 injured. In addition, according to the UN migration office, over 60,000 Haitians were displaced in the past two months, adding to 1 million already displaced by Decem-



ber. "These figures are expected to rise," she said.

Earlier this month, the leader of Haiti's transitional presidential council, Fritz Alphonse Jean, tried to allay surging alarm among Haitians over the rampant gang violence by acknowledging that the country has "become hell for everyone." He promised new measures to stop the bloodshed.

But Salvador, who heads the UN political mission in the country, said the Haitian government's efforts alone will be insufficient to significantly reduce the intensity of the violence perpetrated by criminal groups.

In February, UN Secretary-General António Guterres said he would ask the Security Council to authorize funding for the structural and logistical expenses of the Kenya-led mission from the UN budget.

But there are no signs that the 15-member council plans to address this request any time soon.

"Without timely, decisive and concrete international assistance, the security situation in Haiti may not change," Salvador warned. "Haiti could face total chaos."

Kenya's national security adviser,

Monica Juma, told the council in a video briefing from Nairobi that the force has entered "a decisive phase of its operation" where gangs are coordinating operations and attacking people and strategic installations, and targeting the political establishment.

While the Haitian police and the multinational force have launched intensive anti-gang operations and achieved some notable progress, especially in securing critical infrastructure, she said a significant gap exists.

Juma said 261 Kenyan police officers are trained and ready to deploy to Haiti, but they can't get there because of a lack of equipment and logistical support.

She urged the council to take a "more assertive and proactive role" in helping to stabilize Haiti, saying time is of the essence.

Juma said critical to stabilizing the country is stopping the flow of guns and ammunition to the gangs and implementing sanctions against gang leaders. UN experts say most arms come from the United States, specifically the Miami area. (Loop Caribbean)

The police in St Elizabeth are investigating the death of a woman who died after a gate fell on her.


She has been identified as 49-year-old housekeeper Donna Ebanks of Round Hill in Pedro Plain in the parish.

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Jury convicts California judge of second-degree murder in wife's death, prosecutor's office says



Jurors have convicted a Southern California judge of second-degree murder for fatally shooting his wife while the couple argued and watched television at home, a prosecutor's office says.

Orange County Superior Court Judge Jeffrey Ferguson, 74, was on trial for the 2023 death of his wife Sheryl.

Kimberly Edds, a spokesperson for Orange County District Attorney Todd Spitzer, said jurors reached the decision on the murder charge after receiving the case earlier in the day.

Authorities said Ferguson had been drinking when he and his wife began squabbling over family finances during dinner at a Mexican restaurant with their adult son. Prosecutors said the couple continued arguing after returning home and Ferguson reached for a gun he carried regularly in his ankle holster and shot his wife. Ferguson did not deny shooting her, but had said it was an accident.

The verdict comes after a previous jury deadlocked in March and Los Angeles Superior Court Judge Eleanor J Hunter declared a mistrial. Hunter has overseen the case to avoid a conflict of interest with the Superior Court in Orange County, where Ferguson presided over criminal cases until the shooting. (Jamaica Gleaner)

Public mourning begins as pope's coffin arrives in St Peter's Basilica



Pope Francis's coffin has been taken to Saint Peter's Basilica, where it will remain for three days of public viewing.

The coffin of the Argentinian pontiff, who died Monday at 88, left the Casa Santa Marta residence on Wednesday morning surrounded by dozens of cardinals and Swiss Guards, carried towards the main entrance of the basilica in the Vatican City.

Masses of the Catholic faithful are gathered at St Peter's Square, which leads up to the basilica, to pay their respects to Francis, who is remembered for his humble style, concern for the poor and insistent prayers for peace.

"A service is ongoing" inside the basilica, reports Al Jazeera's Jonah Hull from Vatican City. "The faithful

are waiting for their opportunity to enter the central doors a little later to be able to file past [Francis's] coffin."

The public will be able to see Francis's body lie in state for three days, ahead of his funeral on Saturday. The basilica will be open until midnight on Wednesday and Thursday, with public mourning ending on Friday at 7pm [17:00 GMT].

Cardinal Kevin Farrell, who is running the Vatican temporarily until a new pope is elected, led the procession, with clouds of incense preceding him as the church choir began chanting the Litany of the Saints hymn.

Inside the basilica, Francis's casket is not being put on an elevated bier — as was the case with past popes — but is to be placed on the main al-

tar of the 16th-century basilica, simply facing the pews.

Italian police have tightened security for the viewing and the funeral, carrying out foot and horse patrols around the Vatican, where pilgrims continued to arrive for the Holy Year celebrations that Francis opened in December. The faithful who walk through St Peter's Holy Door are granted indulgences, a way to help atone for sins.

"For me, Pope Francis represents a great pastor, as well as a great friend to all of us," said Micale Sales, visiting St Peter's Basilica from Brazil.

"I think he spread a positive message around the world, saying there shouldn't be any violence, there should be peace around the world," said Amit Kukreja, from Australia.

The funeral, set for Saturday at 10am [8:00 GMT] in St Peter's Square, will be attended by numerous world leaders, including US President Donald Trump and Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy.

Cardinals are continuing their meetings this week to plan the conclave to elect Francis's successor and make other decisions about running the Catholic Church as world leaders and the faithful grieve his death.

History's first Latin American pontiff charmed the world with his humble style and concern for the poor but alienated many conservatives with critiques of capitalism and climate change. He last appeared in public on Sunday with an Easter blessing and a popemobile tour through a cheering crowd in St Peter's Square.

He had some reservations about looping through the square packed with 50,000 faithful, Vatican News reported on Tuesday, but overcame them, and was thankful that he had greeted the crowd. He died the next morning.

"The death of a pope is not a small thing, because we've lost our leader," said Julio Henrique from Brazil. "But still, in a few days, we will have a new leader. So ... the thing of hope remains. Who will assume Peter's throne?" (Al Jazeera English)

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Costa Rica will give migrants deported from US permits to stay in the country for 3 months

Costa Rica announced Tuesday it will allow some of the approximately 200 migrants deported from the United States and held in detention in the Central American country to stay and move about freely for three months.

The move comes just days after human rights lawyers sued Costa Rica, alleging the government violated the rights of 81 migrant children by detaining them in a rural camp without any legal recourse, access to education or psychological services.

There was no immediate word how many migrants — who are mostly from Afghanistan, Russia, China, Pakistan, India and other countries — would be given the permits but the children are expected to be among those allowed to stay.

The government said the permits would be given "for humanitarian reasons" and would last for three months while the migrants seek asylum in Costa Rica or look for ways to leave the country.

The migrants were deported to Panama and Costa Rica this year as the Trump administration sought to ramp up deportations. What was once said to be a temporary stay in Central America stretched on



for months, fuelling criticisms by rights groups as many of the deportees expressed fear over returning to their own countries.

Critics warned the US was exporting its deportation process and that Panama and Costa Rica were becoming a "black hole" for deportees.

Migrants, whose passports were previously confiscated and who were detained in a former factory turned migrant camp along the Panama-Costa Rica border, were told they could have their passports returned upon signing a document accepting the government's conditions, said Silvia Serna Roman, one of the attorneys that filed the lawsuit at the United

Nations.

"It's a step in the right direction," the lawyer said.

The Associated Press has repeatedly been denied access to the camp since the deportees arrived.

In the past, when reporters in 2023 visited the camp — where migrants once sought shelter during their migration north to the US — families were sleeping on cardboard or in tents on the ground with little food. Costa Rica's move follows similar steps taken by Panama, which last month released deportees from detention amid lawsuits and criticism. However, Panamanian authorities bussed the migrants from detention facilities and dropped most of them off on the streets of Panama City to fend for themselves. Some were told they wouldn't be able to seek asylum in the country, effectively leaving them in limbo.

Serna Roman said the group of lawyers with Global Strategic Litigation Council, who filed the lawsuit still have concerns. She said the migrants, despite the permits to move around, are prohibited from seeking work in Costa Rica, which would complicate their efforts to find a path forward.

"If you have children and you're not allowed to work," how can you survive, she said. (*Jamaica Gleaner*)

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Antiguan swimmers finish 8th at CARIFTA Aquatics Championships

Antigua and Barbuda finished in eighth place among a field of 20 islands at the 38th CARIFTA Aquatics Championships, which ended at the National Aquatics Centre in Couva, Trinidad and Tobago, on Tuesday evening.

Antigua and Barbuda won three more medals on the final night to finish with a total of 20 medals and an overall points tally of 217 points.

Alessandro Bazzoni capped an outstanding championship with a haul of six medals, securing his third gold when he produced a personal best to retain his title to win the 400-meter freestyle final in the Boys 11-12 age group.

Ellie Shaw won her third medal of the games, grabbing silver in a second-place finish in the 100-meter breaststroke. in the girls 15-17 age-group category.

The girls 15-17 relay team, comprising Aungelique Liddie, Ellie Shaw, Selah Wiltshire, and Alandra Dublin, fought with everything they had to win a bronze medal on the final night. The Antiguan swimmers returned home on Wednesday.

The Bahamas continued to reign supreme in Caribbean youth swimming, as they claimed a seventh consecutive Carifta Swimming Championships title and their ninth in the past 10 editions, as the curtain came down on the 38th staging of the event at the National Aquatics Centre on Tuesday.

The defending champions were relentless in the pool over four days of high-in-

tensity competition, topping both the medal table and overall points standings to further solidify their status as the region's aquatic powerhouse.

They ended the meet with a commanding 74-medal haul — including 27 gold, 23 silver, and 24 bronze. Perennial rivals Jamaica finished in second place with 56 medals, including 21 gold, 19 silver, and 16 bronze, while host nation Trinidad and Tobago came in third with 23 gold, 17 silver, and 17 bronze in their 57-medal haul.

The Bahamas amassed 979 points, well clear of Jamaica's 795.50, and Trinidad and Tobago's 735. Interestingly, the top three nations in swimming mirrored the standout trio from the track and field edition of the Carifta Games — albeit in reverse order — showcasing the region's balanced dominance across disciplines.

The Bahamas' strength lay in depth and consistency across age groups, particularly in the 11–12 and 15–17 boys' divisions. In the 11–12 boys, Dexter Russell emerged as a standout performer with 56 individual points, earning victories

in the 50m freestyle, 100m freestyle, 50m backstroke, 50m butterfly, and 100m butterfly.

Meanwhile, David Singh, representing the 13–14 boys, picked up 43 points with strong podium finishes in breaststroke and IM events. But it was the older boys where the Bahamians truly shone.

In the 15–17 category, Liam Carrington dominated with 79 points, Bahamas remained highly competitive with a string of top-five finishes that kept their medal count rising.


The girls' division also delivered standout performances across several age categories. In the 11–12 girls' division, Sapphire Parks of St. Lucia topped the age group with 65 points, claiming victories in multiple events including the 100m and 200m backstroke, 200m butterfly, and 400m IM.

Right behind her was Kaija Eastmond of Barbados with 62 points, making her mark in the sprint backstroke and butterfly events. Jamaica's own Kai Lawson wasn't far off with 58 points, earning medals in freestyle, backstroke, and butterfly. In the 13–14 girls' division, Reagan Uszenski of the Virgin Islands put on a freestyle clinic, dominating mid- and long-distance events to rack up 64 points.

However, Skyelar Richards of Jamaica was arguably one of the most electric performers of the meet— earning 61 points and smashing the Championship record in the 50m backstroke with a time of 29.87s, breaking her own record from prelims. She also led the pack in 50m and 100m events across strokes and finished as one of Jamaica's top medal contributors.

Meanwhile, in the 15–17 girls' division, Cayman Islands' Sierrah Broadbelt ruled the pool with 56 points, shining in butterfly, backstroke, and IM events. Her technical prowess and race management were a key part of Cayman's strong fourth-place finish overall.

Heidi Stoute of Barbados impressed with 51 points, dominating the distance freestyle events, while Zuri Ferguson of Trinidad and Tobago tallied 45 points behind strong record breaking backstroke wins.

The Pelicans will be led by all-rounder Nyeem Young, a familiar name in regional cricket and one Clarke believes is up to the task.

"Nyeem is a good leader, great thinker. I have no doubt that he will lead the team well," Clarke said, pointing to Young's ability to inspire and guide both with his performance and leader-


ship.
