A new Sailing Regatta is coming in 2027

With falling participation in the annual Antigua Sailing Week (ASW) over the last several years, the Ministry of Tourism is following industry advice by introducing a second sailing regatta in March, 2027.

Tourism Minister, Charles Max Fernandez, said the ministry brought in industry experts to undertake a study of the reasons behind the declining participation by the large maxi yachts in Antigua Sailing Week.


According to Fernandez, this trend became apparent since 2019, however, the government did not just sit on its laurels; it quickly took steps to not only understand the root causes of the lowering numbers, but what could be done to reverse it.

He disclosed that the study found that many of the large yachts leave the region in mid-April to travel to the Mediterranean to participate in a series of races in that part of the world.

"We have less of these vessels sticking around in the Caribbean by the time AWS comes around at the end of April as the vessels leave for Europe. Then, twenty years ago, Antigua and Barbuda was clearly the leader in regattas in the region. Now practically every island has a regatta of its own so there is much more competition for the remaining yachts," he explained.

The minister noted that the new regatta will cater for the larger maxi yachts as they have a larger crew who are expected to spend significant sums in the country during the regatta.

Fernandez noted that ASW will continue as its original idea was to extend the tourist season. However,

there are several suggestions on the table on how best to maximize the benefits from this event that is now more than 50 years old and to rebrand it for the future.

Meanwhile, the tourism minister noted that while the number of yachts taking art in ASW has dropped to 56 this year, down from over 300 at the height of its popularity, there are now more yachts that are coming to the country than before. This is because of the several regattas such as the RORC races with which the government has signed a four-year deal this year.

Fernandez said the new regatta will take place in 2027 as the ministry and its partners will need the extra time to identify a major sponsor and to undertake a massive marketing campaign.

CIU head calls for a rethink of attitudes towards CBI programmes

Against the backdrop of strengthening oversight of the Citizenship By Inprogrammes, vestment Chief Executive Officer of the Citizenship by Investment Unit (CIU), Charmaine Donovan, calls for a change in attitudes towards these programmes operated by Antigua and Barbuda and four other OECS territories.

Delivering the keynote address at the start of Day 2 of last week's Caribbean Investment Summit (CIS'25), Donovan is inviting members of the public to take a closer look at these programmes with the expectation that minds will be changed.

"While these prooften grammes have faced criticism — portrayed as mere passport sales schemes, facilitators of identity changes, or even avenues for illicit actors — a closer, more informed look reveals a very different story. For small island developing states, CBI revenues have been transformative, delivering tangible benefits in infrastructure, public health, education, agriculture, and economic support," she observed.

Donovan added that these





funds have enabled governments to make critical investments that directly improve the lives of their citizens.

The CEO wants the five CBI programmes, or investment migration programmes as they are now being referred to, to undertake strategic global positioning as a priority. "It is time to move beyond the outdated and overly simplistic perception of Caribbean Citizenship by Investment programmes as merely transactional. Instead, we must present the Caribbean as a region anchored in stability, democratic governance, the rule of law, and forward-looking opportunity," she suggested. According to Donovan... the OECS programmes offer more than alternative citizenship or enhanced global mobility—they represent an invitation to enter into a long-term, values-driven partnership with nations committed to sustainable development and shared prosperity.

"Through comprehensive strengthened reforms, due diligence practices, and greater transparency in how revenues are allocated, Caribbean countries are actively redefining the concept of global citizenship. The imminent regional regulatory framework, provides us with a unique opportunity to set the global benchmark for integrity, innovation, and 6 impact in the investment migration industry. The Caribbean is not just participating in this space—we are shaping its future."

Following the success of this year's CIS, the administrators of the programmes in the five states – St. Lucia, Grenada, Dominica, St. Kitts-Nevis and Antigua and Barbuda – will gather in St. Lucia next year for CIS'26.

Sir Molwyn Joseph calls for immediate action to protect the environment for current and future generations

Antigua and Barbuda's Minister of Health and the Environment, Sir Molwyn Joseph, has underscored the importance of preserving the environment in the OECS for future generations as he welcomed regional colleagues to a Ministerial Roundtable on the OECS 30x30 Transformation Program taking place here in St. John's.

In his remarks, Sir Molwyn emphasized the need for current leaders to take steps to protect and preserve the environment for the benefit of not only today's generations, but also for the generations in the future.

Sir Molwyn welcomed the proposal to establish a Regional Conservation Center within the OECS framework. However, he said the sub-region needs to do more than just setting up institutions

"Beyond institutions and programs, let us be clear: this is about our people, and about the generations who will inherit these islands after us. We have a profound obligation to ensure that future generations are not disadvantaged by the decisions—or indecisions—we make today.

the governments of this region are not only acting decisively but are including and empowering them as true partners in the work of conservation and sustainable management," he emphasized.

The Environment Minister also made the point that conservation is not a peripheral issue but central to protecting economies and lives. "It is central to protecting our economies, our resilience, and our identity as Caribbean peoples. It must be at the very heart of our efforts to defend and nurture the natural systems upon which all life in our region depends," he stated.

Sir Molwyn reminded his colleagues that they were no longer

"They must have confidence that in a position to debate whether nature-based solutions are worthwhile—they are indispensable. "Without healthy ecosystems, there can be no climate resilience. Without biodiversity, there can be no sustainable development.

> "So let this roundtable mark a point of convergence—where we unify our efforts, clarify our priorities, and commit to concrete, measurable next steps," he declared.

> The Ministerial Roundtable seeks to bring the OECS territories to commit to regional collaboration, solidarity, and institutional commitment in order to achieve the conservation of at least 30% of region's territorial, freshwater, and marine ecosystems by 2030.

Search for missing 21-yr old Trinidadian man continues



A Trinidad and Tobago national who arrived in Antigua and Barbuda two weeks ago and who went missing immediately after has not been located despite efforts by local volunteers and law enforcement to locate him.

The police have confirmed that Thomas 'Tommy' Vasquez arrived in Antigua on April 14 and was believed to have been staying with someone in Pares Village. He apparently went missing the next day, April 15, but no reports were made to the police until April 20, five days after.

The police say Vasquez was dropped off at a dwelling house in Pares and has not been heard from since. He was last seen in a black t-shirt, a pair of long black jeans and wearing a pair of white Nike Air Force sneakers. There has been

no known contact from Vasquez to anyone, as far as the police can determine.

The police undertook a search for the missing man without success and by last

group, Concerned Citizens, got involved and began mobilizing search efforts to locate him.

On Monday, the group with the assistance of the Antigua and Barbuda Defence Force carried out an extensive search beginning at the Willikies Police Station.

According to President Dr. Jacqui Quinn: "We have been in touch with Candy Jageshar Vasquez and we have put her in touch with Commissioner of Police Everton Jeffers. She is distraught and desperate to find her son."

"We have given her the assurance that all efforts will be combined with the Antigua and Barbuda Defence Force, the Royal Police Force of Antigua and Bar-

Two men who pleaded guilty on separate firearms and ammunition charges are returning to Court on Wednesday

Two men who appeared before a magistrate on separate firearms and ammunition charges on Monday and who entered guilty pleas have been ordered to return to court on Wednesday for sentencing.

32-year-old Neil Guye of Clare Hall who was arrested and charged on Saturday with unlawful possession of a firearm and ammunition following the discovery of one (1) 9mm Colt pistol and ninety-five (95) rounds of matching ammunition in his possession. The discovery was made after the police executed a search warrant of Guye's home.

He pleaded guilty when he appeared Monday before Senior Magistrate, Ngaio Emanuel. The magistrate ordered that he returns to court on Wednesday when she will announce her decision.

In a separate matter, the 33-year-old Ridge Turner of Parham was arrested by the police on Saturday when police who were on patrol in the Grays Farm area, saw him acting suspicious and conducted a search on his person where he was found with an illegal firearm and ammunition.

Meanwhile, in a separate but related incident, Turner was further charged, along with 34-year-old Tristan Armstrong of Golden Grove and 31-year-old Kasey Wendrick of Crosbies, for Unlawful Possession of one



(.32mm) round of ammunition. The charge stems from an investigation where officers found the ammunition inside a vehicle occupied

by the trio in Grays Farm on the same morning.

The trio appeared before Magistrate Emanuel on Monday where Turner pleaded guilty while the charges were withdrawn from the other two. Turner is due back in court on Wednesday to learn his fate.



Beyond the Plate: "What Eating Local Really Means in Antigua and Barbuda"

For decades, we've shouted it from rooftops, plastered it on market walls, stitched it into the fabric of our food festivals: "Eat Local." It's a cultural call-to-arms and every vendor balling fungee and ladling pepperpot at the Independence Food Fair, stands as a quiet warrior for it.

But after all these years—what's actually changed?

Step into any Antiguan and Barbudan kitchen, school, hotel buffet line, or roadside cook shop, and you'll see it plain as day: our plates are globalized, our supply chains stretched thin, and our food security hanging by a thread. Yes, we've made gains. Egg production is up, and the Caribbean Agricultural Research and Development Institute (CARDI) and the Inter-American Institute for Cooperation in Agriculture (IICA) are putting in the work. However, our grains, oils, dairy, and even salted fish still come stamped with foreign barcodes. Saltfish pollock from the North Atlantic, cornmeal and smoked herring from who knows where. Our youths' lunch bags

are filled with imports. Our supermarkets read like a catalog of international brands while local and regional brands fight for space on the shelf.

"Eat Local" became a slogan. But not yet a strategy

It's easy to celebrate local food in theory—much harder to build the systems that make it practical. Because this isn't just about what's on your plate for Sunday lunch. It's about what's served at the hotel buffet or tucked into a lunch box. It's about what products carry the Antiguan and Barbudan name abroad. And it's about ensuring those products exist in the first place. We have the soil. The sun. The talent. The stories. But those alone don't feed a nation. In order for our local food economy to thrive, we need more than nostalgia—we need investment. Spaces where raw ingredients can be transformed into shelf-ready goods that actually reach the market. Look at our internationally acclaimed Suzie's Hot Sauce. Once a staple in homes here and overseas, now barely seen. Not because the flavour disappeared—but because the systems around it failed to keep up. That's what happens when passion isn't matched with policy. Still, there's fire in the coals. And right now, it's burning brightest during May for Culinary Month in Antigua and Barbuda. It is more than just fancy restaurant menus and gourmet photo ops. Culinary Month is a love letter to our food culture.

Spanning steaming Ital soup served by the roadside to upscale kitchens reinventing tradition with flair.

You'll find barbecue smoke drafting from beach grills, and maybe even enjoy a postcard-perfect local amuse bouche on a breezy patio overlooking the sea. If you pay attention, you might find gems like a Caribbean-Asian fusion ducana offering that somehow works, teaching old roots new tricks. Meanwhile, your favorite cook shop still holds it down. Sometimes with no menu and no measuring cups, just

bold flavours and vibes. One day it's pepperpot, the next, goat water which hits like a warm punch—rich, greasy, and unapologetic—leaving your lips slick and shining like you'd just kissed the face of the islands. A place where the food tastes different every week, but somehow it always hits. Cooking without recipes but in rhythm and feel. Culinary Month reminds us that local cuisine isn't a relic. It's evolving and breathing because in Antigua and Barbuda there's no single definition of "local" here. There's only what's loved, cooked, and shared.


But it should also make us think, because "eating like a local" in 2025 shouldn't just be an Instagram caption, it should be a blueprint. A living system that shapes what ends up in school lunches, on hotel plates, and on export lists. It means putting our money where our mouth is—literally.

As Chef Anika Samuel puts it, "We can't just celebrate our cuisine during festivals; we need to integrate it into our daily lives and economies."

She's right. According to the World Bank, Antigua and Barbuda imported over US\$628 million in goods in 2022—much of that, food. So, while we praise the maw and rice pudding and post the grilled lobster, our shopping carts still tell a different story.

So maybe the slogan needs an upgrade. Not just "Eat Local." But "Grow local. Process local. Value local. Eat local." Not just because it tastes better but because it makes us stronger. And as other nations look inwardly, protecting their farmers, securing their economies—why shouldn't we?

Dominica: One Dead, one injured in Roseau shooting

One man is dead and another injured following a shooting incident in Roseau on Sunday afternoon.

According to the Commonwealth of Dominica Police Force (CDPF), the incident is being treated as a homicide and attempted murder, and an active investigation is underway.

Police reports indicate that the shooting occurred around 6:30 p.m. in an area known as Washington Block. Two young men

were shot and transported to the Dominica China Friendship Hospital (DCFH), where they were treated for injuries to the upper torso.

One of the victims, identified as Kimmon Emmanuel, succumbed to his injuries at

approximately 9:06 p.m.

Authorities are urging anyone with information to come forward as investigations continue. (Loop Caribbean)

Haiti repatriates its nationals from neighbouring Dominican Republic



Haiti says it has conducted a voluntary repatriation operation for 720 of its nationals after the Dominican Republic government ordered the complete demolition of the houses in the illegal Haitian ghetto of Mata Mosquito, better known there as "Pequeño Haiti".

The Haitians, who had taken refuge in rugged terrain and ravines to escape harassment by Dominican immigration agents, were able to travel on buses for their voluntary return to the French-speaking Caribbean Community (CARICOM) country.

The operations had been supervised by Haitian Consul in Higüey, Wenceslas Lambert, who coordinated the details on the ground until the nine buses departed along Boulevard de l'Est, heading towards the official border crossings of Dajabón, Comendador, and Pedernales.

The operation benefited from the support of the Zilé Foundation through former ambassador Edwin Paraison and Dr Joseph Chérubin and his team from the Social Movement for Sociocultural and Environmental Work (Mostha).

Nearly 300 agents from the Directorate General of Migration (DGM) were deployed to "facilitate" the departure of the Haitians. A DGM unit also headed the bus convoy.

On Sunday, several Dominicans protested the presence of illegal Haitians in the country as they backed President Luis Abinader's decision to demand ID documents from those seeking hospital or maternity care.

Protesters carried signs reading "Expel them already," "The Dominican Republic is for Dominicans," and "We're fed up" at the demonstration near the presidential palace.

President Abinader has taken a tough line on migration from Haiti since coming to power in 2020. Earlier this month, he unveiled a new protocol requiring medical staff to ask foreigners for identification documents, a letter from an employer, proof of residence and payment for their care.

Last Monday, 87 women and 48 children were arrested in hospitals and maternity wards across the Dominican Republic, with more than half of those women pregnant, according to official figures.

The rest had recently given birth. (*Loop Caribbean*)

Guyana: Senior police officer dies in early morning car crash

Authorities in Regional Division 4'C' are investigating a fatal accident that claimed the life of a senior officer of the Guyana Police Force in the early hours of Sunday, April 27, 2025.

Deputy Superintendent Dexter Brown, 37, of Toucan Drive, South Ruimveldt Gardens, Georgetown, died following a car crash along the Montrose Public Road, East Coast Demerara, around 1:20am.

According to police reports, Brown was driving motorcar PAG 6458, which is owned by a 30-year-old businesswoman from Ann's Grove, E.C.D, when he lost control of the vehicle while reportedly speeding west-



ward on the roadway.

The vehicle collided with a concrete bridge, flipped,


and became submerged in a nearby trench.

Members of the public and

the police worked together to retrieve Brown from the submerged car. He was found unconscious and rushed to the Georgetown Public Hospital Corporation, where he was pronounced dead by a medical doctor.

The vehicle involved in the accident has been taken to the Sparendaam Police Station for inspection by a licensing and certifying officer. Brown's body is currently at the Georgetown Public Hospital Mortuary awaiting a post-mortem examination.

Police say investigations into the circumstances surrounding the crash are ongoing. (Loop Caribbean)

Killed by cops: Family in anguish



The family of Visham Ryan Lochan, who was fatally shot by police along with Shumba James last Friday, has called for an independent investigation into the incident.

Fazool Mohammed, a relative of the wife of Lochan, who said he considered Lochan "a brother", would like the Police Complaints Authority (PCA) to investigate the shooting which claimed the two lives.

Mohammed told the Express yester-day that the Lochan family was in anguish over the death of Lochan, who was the father to a three-year-old boy. James, 40, and Visham Ryan Lochan, 34, were sitting in Lochan's Nissa Ti-ida near B's Sports Bar in their village of St Mary's, Moruga, when they were approached around 10 a.m. by Southern Division Task Force officers.

Assistant Commissioner of Police for the Southern and Southwestern Police Division Wayne Mystar said there was an exchange of gunfire and police recovered two pistols in the car.

James and Lochan were struck several times, placed in the police vehicle, and taken to the Princes Town District Health Facility where they were

pronounced dead.

James was the first person against whom a detention order was made during the recent state of emergency (SoE) and who police said was linked to several murders, extortion, and gun-running.

"We are looking for justice," said Mohammed. "I want to reach the PCA on this. Whoever did the shooting and killed them, it wasn't right."

Mohammed said that hours after the fatal shootings, a team of police officers came to Lochan's house.

"The police came in the afternoon and said they were going to search but they did not do it. Another jeep pulled up with more senior officers and told that first one to leave. They didn't stay long. I don't know what they are trying to cook up. My two brothers are gone. Somebody has to answer for that. I want justice for their deaths," said Mohammed.

The relative said that Lochan's son has been asking for his father, but other relatives are comforting him.

"His son does not know too much. He is asking for him but we are keeping him distracted as he has a lot of people around. He is not getting the feeling yet," said Mohammed.

The post-mortems are expected to be done this week at the Forensic Science Centre in Federation Park.

The Trinidad and Tobago Police Service (TTPS) in a media release last Friday said the three separate incidents in which four men were shot dead by officers on Friday will be fully and independently investigated.

ly and independently investigated. James, 40, and Lochan, 34, were two of four people fatally shot by the police on Friday. Also shot dead were Ronnel Marcelle during a confrontation in Egypt, Bethel, Tobago, and Devon Sotio, 44, of Clifton Street, East Dry River, Port of Spain, in Longdenville, in unrelated incidents.

Police have killed 30 people for the year so far.

DCP Intelligence and Investigations Suzette Martin said that the TTPS acknowledged the public concern surrounding three fatal police-involved shootings that occurred on Friday, and extended condolences to the families affected.

"At the same time, the TTPS reaffirms our duty to maintain law and order, often in rapidly evolving and dangerous situations. We assure the public that each incident will be subject to a full, transparent and independent investigation to ensure accountability and to maintain trust in the police service," the release stated.

The media statement gave information regarding the St Mary's Village, Moruga, shooting, stating that officers of the Southern Division Task Force responded to information concerning two armed men in a vehicle at St Mary's Village, Moruga.

"Upon approaching the vehicle, officers instructed the driver and passenger to turn the window glass down. The passenger allegedly exited the vehicle, pointed a firearm at the officers, and fired in their direction. Officers, seeing the immediate threat to their lives, discharged their service firearms, injuring the man. The driver subsequently exited the vehicle and also allegedly fired at the officers, resulting in officers returning fire. Both assailants were transported to the Princes Town Health Facility, where they were pronounced dead. One of the deceased was Shumba James, who was known to the police. The other man killed by police was Visham Ryan Lochan, the driver of the car James was in. Two firearms—a pistol and a revolver-were recovered at the scene,' the police statement said. Spain, Portugal and southwestern France hit by massive power outage

Spain, Portugal and parts of southwestern France have been hit by a wide-spread power blackout that paralysed public transport, caused large traffic jams, delayed flights, and left residents unable to access cash from ATMs, as utility operators scrambled to restore the grid.

Investigations into the causes of the outage are ongoing and no cyberattack has been so far reported. The entity responsible for transmitting electricity in Portugal, REN, said a rare atmospheric phenomenon in Spain due to extreme temperature variations in the country's interior caused the power outages across the Iberian

Peninsula.

The Spanish and Portuguese governments convened emergency cabinet meetings after the outage on Monday, which also briefly affected a part of France bordering northeastern Spain.

The head of operations of Spain's grid operator REE, Eduardo Prieto, told a news conference that restoring power to the Spanish electric grid could take six to 10 hours.

The Spanish government urged residents to stay put to avoid traffic chaos. "The government is working to identify the origin of this incident and dedicating all possible resources to re-



solve it as quickly as possible," Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez's office said.

The European Commission said it was "in contact" with local authorities "to understand the underlying cause" of the blackout. "The commission will keep monitoring the situation and make sure that there is smooth information exchange amongst all relevant parties," a spokesperson for the EU's executive arm said. Conclave to elect a new pope will start on May 7 as cardinals get to know one another



Catholic cardinals on Monday set May 7 as the start date for the conclave to elect Pope Francis' successor, delaying the secret voting for two days so they can get to know one another better and find consensus on a candidate before they are sequestered in the Sistine Chapel. The cardinals set the date

The cardinals set the date after arriving for the first day of informal meetings following Pope Francis' funeral Saturday. In a chaotic scene, journalists shouted questions about the mood inside and whether there was unity. A reporter for a satirical Italian television program asked whether an Italian cardinal who has been convicted by the Vatican criminal court on finance-related charges would be allowed to vote.

The conclave could have opened as early as May 5, but the cardinals gave themselves extra time to speak in more informal sessions that include cardinals over age 80, who will not be allowed into the Sistine Chapel once the conclave begins. They will next meet on Tuesday morning.

"There is the hope of unity," said Argentine Cardinal Angel Sixto Rossi, the 66-year-old archbishop of Cordoba who Francis made a cardinal in 2023.

Many cardinals cited the desire to continue Francis' pastoral focus on people who are marginalized and against war. But conservatives may be more focused on forging unity and refocusing the church back on core doctrines emphasized by St. John Paul II and Pope Benedict XVI, rather than continuing Francis' social justice focus and outreach to women and gays.

British Cardinal Vincent Nichols, the 79-year-old archbishop of Westminster, was adamant that the church must strive for unity, and he downplayed divisions.

"The role of the pope is to essentially hold us together and that's the grace we've been given from God," Nichols said.

Venezuelan Cardinal Baltazar Enrique Porras Cardozo expressed confidence that once the conclave begins, a decision would be quick, "between two and three days."

The College of Cardinals that will elect a new pope includes members from far-flung corners of the globe whom Francis named over his 12-year papacy to bring in new points of view — often at the expense of traditional centers of Catholicism.

Many have spent little or no time in Rome getting to know colleagues, injecting some uncertainty into a process that requires two-thirds of the voting-age cardinals to coalesce behind a single candidate.

Nichols acknowledged that the 135 cardinal electors — 108 of whom were appointed by Francis — don't know each other very well. The last 20 were appointed in early December.

"We've got all week," Nichols said as he arrived.

Only cardinals under 80 are eligible to vote, and it is not clear how many of the 135 will participate. A Spanish cardinal has said he won't come to Rome for health reasons.

A big uncertainty is whether Cardinal Angelo Becciu, once one of the most powerful cardinals in the Vatican, will be allowed in the Sistine Chapel.

Francis in 2020 forced Becciu to resign as head of the Vatican's saint-making office and renounce his rights as a cardinal because of allegations of embezzlement and financial fraud. Becciu denied any wrongdoing but was put on trial in the Vatican criminal court and convicted of finance-related

charges in December, 2023. He is appealing the conviction and has participated in the pre-conclave meetings, but there is a lingering question about whether he is entitled to vote. The Vatican's official statistics list him as a "non-elector." When he was ousted in 2020, Becciu told a hastily arranged press conference that he wouldn't be voting in any future conclave, but recently he has insisted he is entitled to vote, and canon lawyers have been poring over the Vatican document regulating the conclave to determine if he's right.

The case was discussed Monday by cardinals but there was "no resolution," the Vatican said.

While Francis stacked the ranks with his cardinals, it is not necessarily the case that all of them will want to see the church continue in his image.

On Monday, any glimpse of a red cap appearing along St Peter's Square's stately colonnade set journalists running with cameras and voice recorders aloft to capture the mood inside.

Italian Cardinal Matteo Zuppi, considered a contender to be the next pope, navigated the scrum of journalists with humour, joking that he was "holding his breath" as the microphones and cameras surrounded him all the way to the Vatican gate.

Nigerian Cardinal John Olorunfemi Onaiyekan, the emeritus archbishop of Abuja, was asked if the African cardinals were co-

Russia declares 72-hour unilateral ceasefire in Ukraine from May 8

Russia has declared a 72-hour unilateral ceasefire in Ukraine to coincide with its most sacrosanct national holiday marking the World War II defeat of Nazi Germany, Victory Day, calling on Kyiv to agree to the pause.

Ukraine was quick in its response, which came soon after the Russian proposal on Monday.

"If Russia truly wants peace, it must cease fire immediately," Foreign Minister Andrii Sybiha said, according to his ministry. He reiterated that Ukraine is ready for a "lasting, reliable, and complete ceasefire" for at least 30 full days.

"Why wait for May 8? If we can cease fire now from any date and for 30 days – so that it is real, and not just for a parade," he said, without confirming whether Kyiv would accept the truce proposal.

Earlier, President Vladimir Putin said Russian forces would halt fighting from midnight on May 7-8 to midnight on May 10-11. The announcement came amid



rising pressure from the United States to agree to a full ceasefire in the conflict.

Russia will mark the 80th anniversary of the end of the Great Patriotic War, the term it uses for its war with the Third Reich from 1942 to 1945, commonly known as World War II, on May 9.

"During this period, all hostilities will cease," the Kremlin said in a

statement. Putin made the decision on "humanitarian grounds", it added.

The Kremlin statement called on Kyiv to join the ceasefire, but pledged that in the event of any violations by the Ukrainians, Russia's armed forces would give an "adequate and effective response". (Al Jazeera English)

alescing around a particular candidate.

African bishops had made a remarkably united stand last year against Francis' outreach to LGBTQ+ people, refusing to implement his declaration allowing priests to offer blessings to same-sex couples. Given such a stand, there is some speculation that the 18 African cardinal electors could help block

a progressive candidate from emerging.

"We have not come here for a political rally. We have come to get a pope out," said Onaiyekan, who at 81 is too old to vote but can have a role in influencing how younger electors might.

Indian Cardinal Anthony Poola, the 61-year-old archbishop of Hyderabad, said he had experienced a sense of unity among

his fellow cardinals but allowed that "anything could happen." As a relatively young cardinal, Poola is one of four Indian electors who will participate in the conclave, three of whom, including Poola, were named by Francis.

"Anyone who is coming up must be the successor of St. Peter, and we all hope that he will be a good pope," he said.

Rossi, the Argentine car-

dinal, said he hoped that Francis' message of "mercy, closeness, charity, tenderness and faith," would accompany them in finding a successor.

But he acknowledged the job was daunting. Asked how he felt about participating in his first conclave, he responded with a laugh: "Afraid." (*Jamaica Gleaner*)

The Lions defeated the Pigotts Crushers by 19 runs in their opening encounter at the Pigotts playing field.


