# PM Browne makes the case for continued visa free access to the European Union

#### PM Browne makes the case for continued visa free access to the European Union

Prime Minister Gaston Browne is hoping Antigua and Barbuda would be able to persuade the European Union, through negotiations, not to implement its decision to discontinue visa-free access to holders of the country's passports.

The prime minister made known his preference during a courtesy call by two members of the European Union's delegation attending this week's 55<sup>th</sup> Regular Session of the Organisation of American States (OAS) General Assembly being hosted by the Antigua and Barbuda government.

"We recognize that the European Union has agreed to certain protocol's now to discontinue visa-free access. We are hoping, though, that through our negotiations that we can come to some 'happy medium' in which we can maintain the visa-free access but at the same time providing the EU with all of the assurances that our programmes do not represent a risk to the European Union. As you are aware, the programmes are very important to the OECS countries. In fact, even more so to the other OECS countries than Antigua and Barbuda because in our case, it's about 10 percent of overall revenues, but for the other islands, it's up to 50 to 60 percent," he observed. He underscored the importance of the CIP programmes to the OECS states noting that should they be forced out of operation, then the results would be 'devastating'.

"As you know, we have a consultative mechanism in which we are cooperating with the North Americans and the Europeans to strengthen our programmes," he stated.

PM Browne revealed that the government is going to parliament next month to make the recommended changes citing this as an example of full cooperation 'on the sense that these programmes are very important to us'.

The prime minister added that if the European Union feels that it must introduce new measures, then these would not go beyond ETA's.

"I mean, an ETA does give the EU some level of control in the sense that you know who is coming into your country and you can accept or deny. But as it stands now, we enjoy duty free access and we are appreciative of it, and we think that it is important to continue the visa-free access," PM Browne urged.

#### US is reviewing its membership of organisations such as the OAS

The United States, a major contributor to the finances of the Organisation of American States (OAS), now convening the 55th Regular Session of its General Assembly in Antigua and Barbuda, has announced that it is currently reviewing its membership of several international organisations, including the OAS.

The announcement was made by the US Deputy Secretary of States, Christopher Landau, as he addressed the OAS Plenary session on Thursday.

"As you may be aware, President Trump issued an executive order in the first days of this administration directing the Secretary of State within six months to review all international organizations of which the United States is a member to determine whether such membership is in the interests of the United States and whether such organizations can be reformed. Upon the conclusion of that review, the Secretary must report his findings to the President and recommend whether the U.S. should withdraw from any such organization. That review remains ongoing, and the OAS is obviously one of the organizations we're reviewing," he revealed.

Deputy Secretary of State, Landau, speaking frankly, said he was not sure that he is able to predict how that review will turn out. "That's certainly something I'm open to discussing at this meeting so no one can say they're surprised," he added.

The Senior US government official raised several concerns noting that members must ask themselves 'how the organization remains relevant to-day, and whether its achieving its lofty and noble goals'.

He questioned the legitimacy of the recent elections in Venezuela and that country's ongoing dispute with Guyana as well as the near total control that gangs have over parts of Haiti as areas of concern for both he and Sec-

retary and State, Marco Rubio. He did not indicate just how soon that review will be concluded.

#### Sir Ronald Sanders to Deliver 2024 Commonwealth Lecture Honouring the Legacy of Sir Shridath Ramphal



The Commonwealth Association has announced that Sir Ronald Sanders will deliver this year's Commonwealth Lecture on Monday, July 1, at Marlborough House, the seat of the Commonwealth Secretariat in London.

This year's lecture will reflect on the legacy and enduring lessons from the life and leadership of the late Sir Shridath "Sonny" Ramphal, who served as the Commonwealth's second and longest-serving Secretary-General from 1975 to 1990. Sir Shridath passed away on August 30, 2024, and the lecture will be preceded by a memorial service in his honour at The Queen's Chapel, St James's Palace, earlier in the day.

The lecture will take place in the presence of the current Commonwealth Secretary-General, Shirley Ayorkor Botchwey, and will be attended by distinguished guests from across the Commonwealth.

"The event is fully booked," the Commonwealth Association noted, "with overflow space lined up for those who aren't able to get into Marlborough House."

Sir Ronald Sanders, who is Sir Shridath Ramphal's son-in-law, brings deep personal insight and decades of professional engagement with the Commonwealth to the occasion. He served on the governing Board of the Commonwealth Secretariat, was a member and rapporteur of the 2010-2011 Eminent Persons Group (EPG) commissioned by Commonwealth Heads of Government to propose reforms for the association, and has twice served as High Commissioner of Antigua and Barbuda to the United Kingdom. He is Antigua and Barbuda's Ambassador to the United States and High Commissioner to Canada.

A widely published commentator on international and Commonwealth affairs, Sir Ronald is expected to draw on his close relationship with Sir Shridath and his experiences in diplomacy and Commonwealth reform to deliver a timely and reflective address.

## Ambassador Dwight Gardiner Calls for the 'political will' to tackle the ocean crisis

Antigua and Barbuda's Permanent Representative to the International Seabed Authority, Ambassador Dwight Gardiner, delivered cogent arguments before the United Nations on this week urging states to demonstrate *political will* and firm action in addressing the ocean crisis.

Ambassador Gardiner, who is also Director/Registrar General of the Antigua and Barbuda Department of Marine Services (ADOMS) is in New York to attend the 35<sup>th</sup> meeting of the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS). The United Nations body sets out the fundamental rules by which countries make use of the world's oceans. Some of these rules govern fishing rights, shipping lanes and territorial boundaries.

Recognising Antigua and Barbuda's leadership role as a member of the community of Small Island Developing States, Ambassador Gardiner zeroed in on that section of the Secretary General's report that confirmed a harsh reality affecting these nations – the oceans are in crisis.



"Climate change, overfishing, marine pollution, and habitat destruction continue to place our marine ecosystems under increasing stress. For SIDS, these impacts are especially severe. We are among the least responsible for these global challenges, yet we bear their harshest consequences, often with the least access to the necessary tools, technology, and finance to respond," Ambassador Gardiner pleaded before the United Nations body.

Siezing on the momentum created by the Oceans Conference in France earlier this month, Ambassador Gardiner expressed grave concern about the process of implementation in addressing the widening gap between commitment and concrete action.

"For SIDS, implementing UNCLOS provisions on capacity-building, marine science, and technology transfer is not a lofty ambition but a matter of survival. We call on all States Parties to match their legal commitments with political will and resources, ensuring no state, especially no small island state, is left behind," he urged.

Ambassador Gardiner also reflected positively on the advisory opinion of the International Tribunal of the Law of the Sea in the fight for climate justice, noting its call for urgent financial and technical support to enable SIDS to adapt, build resilience, and to safeguard our marine environment for generations to come.

He further advised that the 33 member UN grouping of countries known as the Group of Latin America and the Caribbean (GRULAC) has named Antigua and Barbuda its candidate to serve as President of the 30th Session of the International Seabed Authority Assembly, to be held this July in Kingston, Jamaica. "We would be honoured to serve in this important role, having been consistent, active participants in the work of the Assembly," Ambassador Gardiner noted.

Ambassador Gardiner was joined at the meeting by Executive Director of the Centre for Excellence for Oceanography & the Blue Economy Dr Branson Belle and First Secretary at the Antigua and Barbuda Mission to the United Nations Asha Challenger. During his visit, he also engaged in discussions on a range of matters with Antigua and Barbuda's Permanent Representative to the United Nations Ambassador Walton Webson.



#### PAHO launches Birth Defects Repository in the Americas



The Pan American Health Organization (PAHO) has launched the Birth Defects Repository in the Americas, an interactive platform that consolidates real-time data on congenital anomalies reported by national epidemiological surveillance systems in Latin America and the Caribbean.

PAHO said this new tool aims to strengthen evidence-based decision-making and support the development of policies and strategies to improve maternal and child health.

"Each year, approximately 15 million children are born in the Region of the Americas, with 10 million of them

in Latin America and the Caribbean. More than half of all deaths among children under five occur during the first month of life, mainly due to prematurity, birth defects, sepsis, or asphyxia. Congenital anomalies are among the leading causes of neonatal mortality and childhood disability, affecting thousands of families.

"These conditions are associated with genetic and hereditary factors, chromosomal abnormalities, environmental exposures, nutritional deficiencies, toxic substances, or chronic and infectious diseases during pregnancy."

James Fitzgerald, Director

of PAHO's Department of Health Systems and Services, said:

"The Zika virus emergency in 2016 — which can be transmitted from mother to child — and recent evidence of vertical transmission of the Oropouche virus have underscored the urgent need for timely and comparable data to prevent and address these anomalies."


To address this challenge, the repository offers interactive dashboards displaying trends, geographic distribution, and demographic patterns of birth defects, supporting the design of prevention strategies and health interventions.

Although the platform currently presents preliminary data from a few countries, its coverage will expand as more national authorities contribute their records, with technical support from PAHO.

PAHO said currently, 14 countries in the region have national birth defect surveillance programs at various stages of development.

During the virtual launch seminar of the new tool, four countries — Argentina, Brazil, Costa Rica, and Cuba — shared their experiences, as well as key challenges in implementing these systems.

Jointly developed by PA-HO's Departments of Health Systems and Services and Evidence and Intelligence for Action in Health, PAHO said this initiative reaffirms the Organization's commitment to more inclusive and effective health systems. By identifying disparities in surveillance, the repository also promotes health equity. PAHO said it invites countries across the Region to join this collaborative platform, strengthening epidemiological surveillance and advancing toward a future where every child has the opportunity for a healthy start in life. #### Bahamas: 64 migrants apprehended near Abaco



Sixty-four migrants were apprehended Sunday in a joint interdiction operation near Hole in the Wall Lighthouse, Abaco, following a four-day surveillance operation by Bahamian and United States authorities.

The operation involved the Royal Bahamas Defence Force (RBDF), Royal Bahamas Police Force (RBPF), Bahamas Department of Immigration, and United States partners working together to intercept the vessel.

Aerial surveillance first detected the vessel of interest in the South Abaco area, leading to the successful interception of a cabin cruiser-type motor vessel that had been under active surveillance for four days.

The apprehension was carried out with assistance from HMBS LIGNUM VITAE, commanded by Lieutenant Sanchez Davis, and the RBDF Drone Team.

Of the 64 migrants apprehended, 50 were males and 14 were females, according to the Royal Bahamas Defence Force.

The migrants were initially transported to Marsh Harbour for preliminary processing by the Bahamas Department of Immigration. They are now being transported by HMBS LIGNUM VITAE, along with the captured

vessel, to New Providence for further processing. (Loop Caribbean)

## PNP optimistic it can win 10 of 15 seats in Kingston and St Andrew

The People's National Party (PNP) will sweep the five constituencies in the eastern end of Kingston and St Andrew, the party's Region Three chairman, Dennis Gordon, has predicted.

Three of those constituencies, St Andrew East Central; St Andrew South East; and East Kingston and Port Royal, are already represented by PNP members of parliament (MP).

The other two, St Andrew Eastern and St Andrew East Rural, are represented by the Jamaica Labour Party's Fayval Williams and Juliet Holness, respectively.

However, Gordon said he is confident the PNP's Patricia Duncan Sutherland will unseat Williams, who is also Finance Minister, and that Patrick Peterkin will defeat Holness, the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Gordon will be the PNP representative in St Andrew East Central, currently represented by outgoing MP and former PNP president, Dr Peter Phillips.

"I can account for East Central St Andrew," he said during a PNP rally in Papine, St Andrew, on Wednes-



day.

"I am now accounting for East Rural St Andrew and I have checked the box for Eastern St Andrew," he said to wild applause from party supporters.

Gordon also predicted that Kingston Central will return to the column of the PNP, bringing to nine the number of constituencies he said the PNP will win in Kingston and St Andrew.

Retired Senior Superintendent of Police Steve McGregor is the PNP's representative in Kingston Central.

He is expected to face incumbent, the JLP's Donovan Williams, who pulled off a surprise victory in the 2020 general election in a constituency dominated by the PNP.

The other Corporate Area constituencies held by the PNP are St Andrew South, represented by the party's President Mark Golding; St Andrew South West, represented by PNP chairman Dr Angela Brown Burke; and St Andrew Western, represented by Anthony Hylton.

General elections are due in

September.

"We now have six and we have captured East Rural (St Andrew), Eastern (St Andrew) and Central Kingston so we are now at nine," Gordon said.

"But I have more good news for you because I am optimistic that I can get 10 because West Rural St Andrew is also on the list," he said.

West Rural St Andrew is represented by the JLP's Juliet Cuthbert-Flynn, who is also junior minister for National Security. (*Jamaica Gleaner*)

#### Cop allegedly kills spouse then attempts suicide

A policeman reportedly shot and killed his spouse before turning the gun on himself in a suicide attempt in St Mary last night.

The incident occurred about 10:20 p.m. in the Essex community.

Reports are that the constable, who is assigned to the St Andrew North police division, used his Glock service pistol to fatally shoot 21-year-old teaching assistant D'Johnnay Peta-Gaye Graham.

He then allegedly inflicted a gunshot

wound to his own head.

The constable remains under police guard at a hospital.

## US issues warning to nationals living or wanting to travel to Haiti



The United States says while routine domestic commercial air travel has resumed between several airports in Haiti, US citizens should only seek to leave the French-speaking Caribbean Community (CARICOM) country "when they feel it is safe to do so."

In a statement, the US embassy here said that Americans should also seek to leave the country by commercial or other privately available transportation and that they "should monitor local news and check regularly with travel agencies and commercial transportation providers' offices and webpages to find departure options that suit their needs."

"We are aware of US citizens traveling to Cap-Haïtien via helicopter from sites other than commercial airports; those flights involve potential risks citizens should assess before flying," the Embassy said.

Criminal gangs in Haiti seeking to overthrow the government have been targeting the various airports here and the Embassy said that US government personnel are not authorized to travel on commercial flights into or out of Port-au-Prince because of Federal Aviation Administration restrictions and potential risks to air traffic.

"The US government does not endorse private nor commercial carriers," the Embassy said, urging Americans not to travel to the troubled country. "If you are a US citizen in Haiti, depart Haiti as soon as possible by commercial or other privately available transportation options. Avoid crowds and monitor local media for updates and avoid areas where violence, demonstrations, or disruptions are reported to be happening."

The Embassy is also urging Americans in Haiti to keep a low profile and that they should be "prepared to shelter in place for an extended time period," and avoid being out after dark.

Earlier this week, the United Nations said that violence against children in war zones surged to "unprecedented levels" in 2024, with the report documenting 41,370 grave violations, the highest since global monitoring began nearly 30 years ago, in several countries including Haiti.

The UN also reported that powerful gangs that control much of Haiti are increasingly ruthless and better armed despite a weapons embargo.

"With the absence of an effective government response, gangs continue to have free rein to conduct attacks with impunity and expand their territorial control," the report said. (*Loop Caribbean*)

#### An explosion and ensuing stampede kill 29 children in a Central African Republic school

An explosion and the stampede that followed killed at least 29 schoolchildren and injured more than 250 at a high school in Central African Republic's capital city, authorities said Thursday.

The explosion occurred Wednesday at the Barthelemy Boganda High School in Bangui when power was being restored to an electrical transformer within the school premises after it malfunctioned, according to the country's Ministry of National Education.

Most of the victims – including 16 girls – died at the scene after the explosion resulted in a stampede while others were confirmed dead at the hospital, the Ministry of Health said in a statement. At least 260 students were injured and being treated in various hospitals, the ministry said.

An estimated 5,000 students were at the school for higher-education exams at the time. Survivors recounted hearing a loud explosion from the transformer midway into the examination.

"The building shook and we were all terrified. It was everyone man for himself," said Alvin Yaligao, one of the students.

Some of the victims died after jumping out of the building while others were killed in the stampede at the crowded entrance to the upper floors in an attempt to escape.

Many other students fainted amid the chaos and were rushed to the hospital, some of them transported on motorcycles.

Many people in the area

were angered, accusing the government of negligence for not handling the problems with the electrical transformer. Government officials and workers who arrived at the scene were pelted with different objects by angry residents.

"We deplore this incident which was caused by a lack of maintenance," Gédéon Cyr Ngaïssé, president of the school's parents' association, told reporters. He called for an investigation into the tragedy. (Jamaica Gleaner)

## Pope Leo XIV affirms celibacy for priests, demands 'firm' action on sex abuse



Pope Leo XIV affirmed Wednesday that priests must be celibate and insisted that bishops take "firm and decisive" action to deal with sex abusers, as he gave marching orders Wednesday to the world's Catholic hierarchy.

Leo met in St Peter's Basilica with about 400 bishops and cardinals from 38 countries attending this week's special Holy Year celebrations for clergy. A day after he gave an uplifting message of encouragement to young seminarians, Leo offered a more comprehensive outline of what bishops must do to lead their flocks.

It's an issue the former Cardinal Robert Prevost would have long pondered given his role as the prefect of the Vatican Dicastery for Bishops. In that job from 2023 until his election in May, the Chicago-born Prevost vetted bishop nominations for Pope Francis, identifying the type of leader who would further Francis' view of a church where all are welcome and dialogue is the decisive form of governance.

History's first American pope reaffirmed Wednesday that the primary role of bishops is to forge unity in his diocese among clergy and to be close to his flock in word and deed. Bishops must live in poverty and simplicity, generously opening their homes to all and acting as a father figure and brother to his priests, Leo said.

"In his personal life, he must be detached from the pursuit of wealth and from forms of favoritism based on money or power," he said.

Bishops must remain celibate "and present to all the authentic image of the church, holy and chaste in her members as in her head," he said.

Referring to cases of abuse, he said bishops "must be firm and decisive in dealing with situations that can cause scandal and with every case of abuse, especially involving minors, and fully respect the legislation currently in force."

It was the second time in a week that Leo has commented publicly on the abuse scandal. On Friday night, in a written statement to a crusading Peruvian journalist who documented gross abuses in a Peruvian Catholic movement, Leo said there should be no tolerance in the Catholic Church for any type of abuse. He identified sexual and spiritual abuses, as well as abuses of authority and power in calling for "transparent processes" to create a culture of prevention across the church.

Francis, who in many ways placed Leo in position to succeed him, had also reaffirmed celibacy for Latin rite priests while acknowledging it was a discipline of the church, not doctrine, and therefore could change. But he refused appeals from Amazonian bishops to allow married priests to address the priest shortage in the region.

Prevost spent two decades as a missionary and bishop in Peru and would know well those arguments. But on Wednesday he reaffirmed the celibate priesthood as the "authentic image" of the church. (Loop Caribbean)

## Ecuador's most wanted drug lord captured in 'underground bunker'

Police in Ecuador have recaptured the country's most wanted fugitive, drug lord Adolfo Macías Villamar.

Macías, also known by the alias "Fito", is the leader of Los Choneros, a powerful criminal gang which is blamed for Ecuador's transformation from a tourist haven to a country with one of the highest murder rates in the region.

He is also suspected of having ordered the assassination of presidential candidate Fernando Villavicencio in 2023.

Police tracked him down to what they described as an underground bunker below a luxury home in the city of Manta.

A police spokesman said no shots were fired in the 10-hour joint operation by police and the military.

A large number of officers first monitored and surrounded the three-storey home in the Monterrey neighbourhood of Manta, on the Ecuadorian coast.

When they stormed the building, they found a sliding trap door, disguised to look like part of the stone floor, from which metal stairs led to Fito's underground hideout.

The "bunker" was fitted out with air conditioning,



a bed, a fan and a fridge.

The house itself boasted a gym with a punching bag and a games room where he could play pool and table football.

Fito reportedly put up no resistance and was transferred by air to the port city of Guayaquil, where several of Ecuador's largest prisons are located.

Footage of his arrival in Guayaquil shows him wearing shorts, a T-shirt and flip flops while being led by armed security officers to a parked SUV before being transfered to the La Roca maximum-security prison.

Ecuadorean President Daniel Noboa praised the security forces for capturing Fito and said that he would be extradited to the US, where he has been charged with cocaine smuggling.

Fito escaped from La Regional prison in Guayaquil in January 2024 with the help of at least two guards,

prompting global media attention.

It triggered a wave of deadly prison riots, in which guards were taken hostage and which prompted Noboa to declare a state of emergency.

But Fito was already notorious prior to his escape. During his time in prison - while serving a 34-year sentence for murder and drug trafficking - he rose to the top of the Los Choneros gang after its previous leader was killed.

From behind bars, he co-ordinated the gang's activities, which include drug trafficking and extortion.

He is also suspected of having ordered the murder of politician Fernando Villavicencio, who was gunned down at a campaign rally just days before the 2023 election.

Under Fito's leadership, Los Choneros forged links with Mexico's powerful Sinaloa cartel, an alliance which experts say has led to the gruesome tactics commonly used by Mexican cartels - such as decapitations and mutilations spreading to Ecuador.

Shortly before his prison escape, he also appeared in a narcocorrido - a slick music video in which his daughter glorifies her father's criminal exploits.

The video, which was partly recorded inside the prison, shows him caressing a fighting cockerel and freely chatting to fellow inmates.

The gang leader's escape in 2024 was a blow to Noboa's government. The Ecuadorian leader had assumed office in November 2023 after being elected on a promise to combat the growing power of the gangs.

On Wednesday, Noboa said that the drug lord's capture was proof his approach - which includes bringing in laws giving him sweeping powers to declare an "armed internal conflict", and which allows police to conduct searches without a warrant - was working.

"More [drug lords] will fall, we will regain [control of] the country," he posted on X. (BBC News)



#### ABCF to stage national championships this weekend

The Antigua and Barbuda Cycling Federation (ABCF) will be staging its two-day 2025 national championships this weekend.

The event comprised the Inet Nationals Individual Time Trial on Saturday and the Top Ranking Nationals Individual Road Race the following day.

The Inet National Individual Time Trial, which is also being supported by Gatorade, Subway Restaurant, and Paradiso Water, will commence at the Police Recreation Grounds at 8 am on Saturday.

The cyclists will proceed eastward on the Sir Sydney Walling Highway. They will travel through Gunthorpes and continue eastward past the Sir Vivian Richards Stadium.

The cyclists will continue their eastward journey by travelling past Parham's Corner, Vermont, and the Mount Joy Service Station.

They will move onto the Pares Vil-

lage Main Road, the Glanvilles Main Road and the Willikies Main Road before turning around and travelling back along the same route to the finish line at the Police Recreation Grounds.

The Top Ranking Nationals Road Race, which is also being supported by Subway, Gatorade, and Paradiso Water, will start in front of the Top Ranking Store on Old Parham Road on Sunday at 8 am.

The cyclists will proceed eastward until they reach the intersection at Dee's Service Station, the Sir George Walter Highway, and the Pigotts Main Road.

They will make a left turn onto the Sir George Walter Highway and proceed through Coolidge until they reach the intersection with Jabberwock Road and Hospitality Drive.

They will make a left turn onto the Jabberwock Road, past the American University of Antigua and Jabberwock Beach. The cyclists will travel through

Hodges Bay and proceed along the Hodges Bay Main Road into Cedar Grove Village.

They will then make a left turn onto Friar's Hill Road, passing Longfords, Cedar Valley, and Marble Hill. They will proceed along Friar's Hill Road past the Woods Shopping Center and the St. John's Public Cemetery.

The cyclists will proceed to the intersection with Old Parham Road near the YMCA Sports Complex. They will make a left turn onto the Old Parham Road and proceed eastwards past the YASCO Sports Complex before finishing back in front of the Top Ranking Store.

Cyclists from all the major clubs affiliated with the ABCF are expected to once again compete for top honours in several categories, including elite male, women, cadets, sports, and masters class.

One lap of the route consists of 11 miles, and the elite riders will have to complete six laps, totaling 66 miles, to win their class.

The cyclists in the masters' class will be required to complete five laps, or 55 miles; the females will complete three laps, or 33 miles; the sports class will complete four laps, or 44 miles; and the cadets will only be required to complete one lap, or 11 miles.

Tahje Browne is the current champion of the ABCF's Inet National Individual Time Trial. Reigning champion Jyme Bridges, who has won the road race for the past three years, will be going for his fourth consecutive Top Ranking National Cycling Championship.
