Strengthening Social Security through Strategic Investment

Prime Minister Gaston Browne announced plans to publish a booklet detailing strategies for making Antigua and Barbuda's Social Security Scheme sustainable.

Speaking on the Browne and Browne show on Saturday, the Prime Minister explained that: (a) Social security schemes cannot rely solely on contribution income and (b) Investment portfolios—spanning short, medium, and longterm assets—are essential for generating sufficient returns.

He criticized past practices where Social Security funds were primarily kept in low-yield current and deposit accounts, leading to insolvency in 2010. PM Browne emphasized the need for diversified investments in stocks, bonds, and real estate.

Learning from Regional Examples

Drawing a comparison with St. Kitts and Nevis, Prime Minister Browne noted that their social security scheme now holds assets valued at approximately \$1.7 billion, almost double that of Antigua and Barbuda's, despite a smaller population.

According to the prime minister the key difference between the two schemes is quite simple; St. Kitts and Nevis actively invested their Social Security funds,

becoming one of the largest corporate investors in the country.

PM Browne argued that critics, including former opposition leader Harold Lovell, inadvertently made the case for investment-driven social security management through their comparisons. He rejected Lovell's characterization of investment strategies as "gambling" with pension funds.

"It is proven globally that social security schemes or pension schemes cannot survive exclusively on contribution income," he reiterated.

Through this comprehensive discussion on Point FM, Prime Minister Browne highlighted two central pillars of responsible governance:

1. Financial Transparen-

cy: Ensuring audited accounts are complete, accurate, and free from adverse opinions through institutional reforms and accountability systems.

2. *Social Security Sustainability*: Building a robust investment portfolio to safeguard long-term benefits for all Antiguans and Barbudans, drawing lessons from both local history and successful regional models.

"These initiatives align with the government's broader agenda to foster financial integrity, protect national institutions, and ensure long-term economic resilience for Antigua and Barbuda," PM Browne explained.

Prime Minister Browne revealed plans to release a detailed booklet titled:

"The Transfer of Jolly Beach to Social Security: A Strategic Imperative"

Authored by PM Browne himself, the booklet outlines his administration's financial rationale and analysis supporting the transfer of the Jolly Beach Resort to Antigua and Barbuda's Social Security Fund. He emphasized that this move aligns with the government's broader vision of: Entrepreneurial Socialism (Empowerment *Capitalism*): Where state and private sector partnerships generate wealth that benefits the nation as a whole and Strategic Investment Over Foreign Breaking **Dependence**: from old colonial economic models where key assets were owned and controlled by foreign investors.

The forward of the booklet spells out the government's commitment to building a self-reliant Antigua and Barbuda. It highlights examples of national assets reclaimed under Browne's leadership, such as: West Indies Oil Company: Now majority-owned by the government and people of Antigua and Barbuda. As well as Domestic Banking Sector: Following the purchase of Canadian-owned bank branches, local banks reported over EC\$110 million in combined profits last year, profits that now remain within the Antigua and Barbuda.





Ensuring Financial Transparency and Social Security Sustainability in Antigua and Barbuda

Prime Minister Gaston Browne has been providing detailed insights into challenges surrounding financial accountability and transparency within Antigua and Barbuda's public sector.

This as the Prime Minister, who is also the country Minister of Finance, raised significant concern involved recurring adverse audit opinions regarding the financial accounts of statutory organizations, including Social Security. According to the Prime Minister, these adverse opinions stem from incomplete or missing financial data-particularly concerning a bond valued at approximately \$330 million issued to Social Security. Rather than proactively resolving discrepancies through collaboration between auditors, social security officials, and central government, the matter has often been left unaddressed. Prime Minister Browne emphasized that this lack of resolution creates unnecessary public speculation about possible mismanagement or misuse of funds, even when the issues are technical and resolvable. He made clear his intention to implement systems ensuring all outstanding financial discrepancies are properly addressed, involving the Accountant General and the Treasury Department as necessary.

"They seem happy now to have completed accounts but with an adverse opin-

ion. I'm saying that is not acceptable," Browne stated firmly.

Understanding Audit Classifications

The Prime Minister also offered an educational breakdown of audit classifications:

Unqualified Opinion: Financial records are materially correct.

Qualified Opinion: Some material information is missing, preventing full validation.

□Adverse Opinion: Significant inaccuracies or missing data prevent auditors from confirming

The packed carnival schedule released by the Antigua and Barbuda Festivals Commission, offers an exciting line-up to include: the popular T-Shirt Mas on July 26, Burning Flames' 40th anniversary concert on July 30, Annual Watchnight Gathering and the Caribbean Melting Pot on July 31, the Panorama Steelband competition on August 2,

Party Monarch on August 3, and the traditional J'ouvert morning, Carnival Monday and Carnival Tuesday mas on August 4 and 5 respectively The carnival season draws to an end with Last Lap, that sees carnival goers take one last jump-up through the streets of St. John's on the night of August 5.

Airlines are responding to the demand for travel to the destination from visitors and diaspora all hoping to enjoy the festivities. American Airlines has added an additional flight from Miami for July 25 - July 28, while Caribbean Airlines is operating a special flight from Toronto to Antigua on July 31 to facilitate travel for Carnival.

Regional carrier LIAT 20 is also offering 25% off airfare to Antigua for travel between July 13 and August 12. The promotion, available when booked by August 4 with the code VIBE25, applies to all LIAT 20-operated routes including Trinidad, St. Kitts, Dominica, St. Lucia and St. Vincent.

In early July, the Antigua and Barbuda Tourism Authority, alongside LIAT 20, conducted a five-day promotional roadshow in Trinidad and Tobago aimed at inspiring last-minute bookings for Antigua Carnival and the general destination offerings. Trinidad and Tobago is Antigua and Barbuda's largest Caribbean source market.

The Antigua and Barbuda team included Antigua and Barbuda Tourism Authority Marketing Communications Manager Maria Blackman and Marketing Officer Alfonsina Olmos who was joined by LIAT 20 Marketing Supervisor Tito Thomas. The promotional activities included live media interviews with television and radio stations such as CNC3, TV6, Slam 100.5FM, Hott 93.5 FM, Vibe CT 105.1 FM and others, one-on-one travel agent meetings at Hyatt Regency, and a consumer pop-up at East Gates Mall.

"There was a real buzz in Trinidad. Antigua and Barbuda is a top Caribbean destination for the Trinidad traveller and mall-goers had numerous inquiries for the team. We saw a strong interest in Antigua Carnival, and the destination overall, with persons asking about places to stay, and special offers," said Blackman. "The campaign with LIAT 20 is providing our Caribbean family and friends even more of an incentive for them to travel for Antigua, be immersed in Antigua Carnival and then spend some time after relaxing on any one of our 365 beaches, for their summer vacation."

The Antigua and Barbuda Tourism Authority, Antigua and Barbuda Festivals Commission, and the Antigua and Barbuda Airport Authority are gearing up for increased arrivals into the destination within the coming weeks and have begun arrangements for a festive welcome of visitors.

AT&LU President to attend regional workshop on a proposed migration policy for CARICOM

President of the Antigua Trades and Labour Union (AT&LU), Bernard DeNully will join stakeholders from across the region who are meeting in Barbados this week to discuss a migration policy for CARICOM.

The occasion is the Bi-Partite consultation of Caribbean Workers' and Employers' organisations on the development of a regional Labour Migration Policy Framework and Action Programme that takes place on Tuesday and Wednesday in Bridgetown.

The literature for the consultation explained that in recognizing the importance of addressing migration comprehensively, CARICOM Heads of Government called for the development of a regional migration policy in February 2019. In response to this mandate, the Regional Approach to Migration Policy (RAMP) initiative was launched in 2022. Since then, a draft framework document has been prepared and subjected to several rounds of review and revision, benefitting from inputs of the CARICOM institutions and a UN Advisory body.

The current draft of the CARICOM Migration Policy Framework (CMPF)

addresses various aspects of migration, giving priority to border governance, justice and protection, migration and economic development, and labour migration, alongside cross-cutting issues like climate change.

Within the context of the development of the CMPF, the ILO is providing technical assistance at the request of the CARICOM Secretariat CARICOM Single Market & Economy (CSME) Unit, to develop a customised regional Labour Migration Policy Framework and Plan of Action/Work Programme, which will be aligned with and expand upon the labour aspects of the broader CMPF.

A crucial input for this policy development is the report of the CARICOM Labour Market Assessment, which is being conducted with ILO Technical Assistance. This assessment, launched in January 2025, is designed to provide evidence-based insights into economic, employment, labour, and migration dynamics, including the effects of climate change and patterns of labour mobility. It aims to analyse both the supply and demand sides of the labour market, equity aspects, and existing policy/institutional frameworks. The assessment report was expected to be finalized in June 2025.

Two Men Convicted in Magistrate's Court on Firearm and Drug Charges

Two men appeared in the St. John's Magistrate's Court on Thursday, July 10, and pleaded guilty to separate charges of unlawful possession of a firearm, ammunition, and cannabis.

Twenty-five-year-old Emerson Alexander of Villa appeared before Acting Chief Magistrate Wason on charges of unlawful possession of a (.380) Pistol, and possession of six (6) rounds of matching ammunition. He pleaded guilty to both charges and was remanded to His Majesty's Prison until July 23 for sentencing.

In a separate matter, 43-year-old Keiron Philip of Ottos Newtown appeared before the said magistrate on a charge of unlawful possession of 50 grams



of cannabis. He pleaded guilty, and was convicted and fined \$1,000 to be paid within 14 days. In default, he will

serve 90 days at His Majesty's Prison. The court also ordered the destruction of the cannabis.

OAS Chief Albert Ramdin makes Haiti his top priority

Finding lasting solutions to Haiti's deepening political, security, and governance crises is a top priority for Organisation of American States (OAS) Secretary General, Ambassador Albert Ramdin, during his 2025-2030 tenure.

"I have made Haiti a priority and we are working very hard on Haiti currently. That is an effort that goes to the heart of the OAS, in terms of its core principles, about democracy, human rights, security and about development. And in Haiti, regretfully, all these issues are challenged at the moment, in the absence of a legitimate government," he told The Sunday Gleaner in an interview last week.

Forced migration from Haiti to nearby Caribbean nations like Jamaica and The Bahamas underscores the regional impact of the crisis. Ramdin reiterated his commitment to re-establishing the 'Group of Friends of Haiti' within the OAS and collaborating closely with CARICOM and international stakeholders.

"I had good conversations in Jamaica about Haiti with the CARICOM leaders, with the Honourable Prime Minister Andrew Holness. And I want to make sure that we are clear about it," said Ramdin, who attended the CARICOM Heads of Government Meeting in Montego Bay, St James, last week.



He praised CARICOM for its work in the search for solutions.

CARICOM has done great work in facilitating a process of governance by bringing together stakeholders to form the Transitional Presidential Council as a form of governance in absence of elections of a parliament and a cabinet government. I know that we need to work towards that end. But I salute CARICOM's efforts of the Eminent Persons Group, the CARICOM chairpersons of Guyana and Suriname and also Barbados and now Jamaica," said Ramdin. The OAS, he added, will align its efforts with CAR-

ICOM's framework and contribute to a broader, long-term strategy under a five-pillar 'Haitian Road Map' developed with Haitian authorities. The first critical focus: restoring security, especially access to vulnerable communities.

"We need better security in Haiti. We need access roads to people who are in need of assistance to be free. We need the ports secure. And so security in different manifestations need to be addressed. Security and humanitarian assistance are to be provided, but they need to be well organised," he stated.

"Once this plan is developed and we are in the final stages of it, it will be presented to the Haitian authorities. It will be presented to other stakeholders, including the United Nations and CAR-ICOM. We want to showcase how much is already being done in terms of assisting Haiti," said Ramdin.

The OAS is also working on citizen identification projects to support future elections and democratic processes. Coordination meetings with CARICOM and the United Nations are expected by month-end to consolidate efforts and avoid duplication.

In addition to the OAS, other regional and international agencies – such as the Inter-American Development Bank, Pan American Health Organization, and Inter-American Institute for Cooperation on Agriculture – are engaged in Haiti's recovery.

Beyond food and water, Ramdin said there must be focus on education, healthcare, and getting children back in school.

"We need to get the political stakeholders which have been mobilised by CARICOM to develop a forward-looking agenda for Haiti, in terms of political and constitutional reform, as well as economic rebuilding. Key issues on health and education and security should lead us to elections," he explained.

Despite its unique challenges, Haiti shares common issues with other Caribbean nations – climate change, debt burdens, migration, and underdeveloped education systems – which demand a unified regional response. (*Jamaica Gleaner*)

Port Royal added to UNESCO World Heritage List



The United Nations cultural organisation has added Jamacia's famed Port Royal to its World Heritage List.

The decision to include "The Archaeological Ensemble of 17th Century Port Royal" was made during the ongoing meeting of the World Heritage Committee in Paris, France, Culture Minister Olivia Gange, has reported.

In a video statement following the announcement, Grange, said Jamaica was "proud that our nomination of this unique terrestrial and submerged site has been accepted....This inscription to the World Heritage List supports our national efforts to preserve this heritage for all humanity."

"In this regard, I express appreciation to the World Heritage Centre, the International Council of Monuments and Sites, the governments of Mexico, Canada, the Netherlands and Japan, as well as the people of Port Royal whose livelihood is inextricably linked to the preservation, promotion and sustainable development of the site," she said.

The site was inscribed based on two UNESCO's criteria - one that recognises "an outstanding example of a type of building, architectural or technological ensemble or landscape which illustrates significant stages in human history," and another that relates to sites "directly or tangibly associated with events or living traditions, with ideas, or with beliefs, with artistic and literary works of outstanding universal significance."

In recommending the inscription, the evaluation team noted: "The integrity of the property is based on the terrestrial and underwater evidence of the 17th-century town of Port Royal. The archaeological ensemble contains all the attributes necessary to convey the Outstanding Universal Value, including the entire town encircled by the six fortifications present at the time of the devastating earthquake in 1692, and its 17th-century urban plan....The underwater sections of the town are exceptionally well preserved under layers of sediments."

Port Royal now joins the Blue and John Crow Mountains as the second Jamaican site on the UNESCO World Heritage List.

Nestled at the entrance of Kingston Harbour, Port Royal wears its tumultuous past like a badge of honour. Once a bustling haven for pirates, buccaneers, and adventurers, this vibrant city earned the notorious reputation of being the "richest and wickedest city on Earth" during the 17th century. Founded by the Spanish in the late 15th century, Port Royal quickly became a hub of trade and debauchery. Its narrow streets were lined with taverns, brothels, and gambling dens, attracting characters like the infamous Henry Morgan and Calico Jack. However, Port Royal's prosperity was short-lived, as it was devastated by a catastrophic earthquake on June 7, 1692, sinking much of the city beneath the sea. Today, its remnants serve as a poignant reminder of its storied past, drawing visitors from around the world to explore its sunken treasures.

The forts in Port Royal hold profound historical significance, serving as tangible remnants of the city's strategic importance during the colonial era. Fort Charles, for instance, stands as a symbol of British naval power in the Caribbean, protecting the lucrative trade routes and defending against foreign incursions. Its imposing walls and strategic placement showcased British dominance in the region. It remains the only British fort completely standing in Jamaica today. In contrast, Fort Rocky, with its strategic position guarding the entrance to Kingston Harbour, exemplifies Jamaica's tumultuous history, witnessing battles and changing hands between colonial powers.

Port Royal had seven forts: Fort Carlisle, Fort James, Fort Charles, Fort Rocky, Fort Morgan, Fort Rupert and Fort Walker. These forts not only provided defence but also shaped the cultural and economic landscape of Port Royal, influencing trade, settlement patterns, and even the development of nearby towns. Today, they serve as poignant reminders of a bygone era, attracting tourists and historians alike, while also underscoring the enduring legacy of colonialism in the Caribbean. (*Jamaica Gleaner*)

Migrant boat capsizes off Dom Rep coast, killing 4

A boat carrying migrants capsized off the eastern coast of the Dominican Republic killing at least four people, authorities in the Caribbean nation said Saturday, as emergency personnel and the military searched for survivors.

Seventeen people who were rescued, including a girl, received medical attention and were in good health, Juan Salas, director of the country's Civil Defense, said. A survivor reported that about 40 people were on the boat before it capsized.

"That happened close to the coast; it's possible some people swam out," said Salas, who estimated the boat sank at a depth of 500 meters (1,640 feet) to 600 metres (1,970 feet). He added that the search was being hampered by strong waves and seabed conditions.

The boat included migrants from Haiti and the Dominican Republic.

The number of illegal journeys to Puerto Rico by sea in Dominican Republic waters has increased significantly in the last few years. The International Organization for Migration documented at least 321 deaths and disappearances of migrants in the Caribbean in 2022, the highest number since 2014. Haiti's once-illustrious Grand Hôtel Oloffson, a beloved Gothic gingerbread home that inspired books, hosted parties until dawn and attracted visitors from Mick Jagger to Haitian presidents, was burned down by gangs last weekend. Hundreds of Haitians and

foreigners mourned the news as it spread across social media, with the hotel manager on Monday confirming the fire on X. Even though gang violence had forced the hotel in Haiti's capital, Port-au-Prince, to close in recent years, many had hoped it would reopen. "It birthed so much culture and expression," said Riva Précil, a Haitian-American singer who lived in the hotel from age five to 15. In a tearful phone interview, Précil recalled how she learned to swim, dance and sing at the Oloffson.

Longtime hotel manager Richard Morse, who had been overseeing the property remotely from the United States since the hotel's closure in 2022, told The Associated Press last Monday that for several months, there were persistent rumors that the hotel had burned.

"So when I heard Sunday morning that it burned, I did what I usually do, which is call someone who has drones and have them go take a look," he said. "This time, when they called back, they said something like, 'take a seat.' I knew then that this wasn't like the other times."

The attack on the community where the hotel was located began late Saturday, according to James Jean-Louis, who lives in the hills above the Oloffson. He told The Associated Press over the phone on Sunday that he observed the flames as he and other residents were chased out while police and gangs exchanged heavy gunfire.

Journalists are currently unable to visit the site and verify the damage at the hotel because gangs control the area, which remains inaccessible. Patrick Durandis, director of the Institute for Safeguarding National Heritage, also confirmed the fire in a message to the AP.

Among those lamenting the fire was Michael Deibert, author of Notes From the Last Testament: The Struggle for Haiti and Haiti Will Not Perish: A Recent History. He landed in Miami on Sunday only to open his phone and see a flurry of messages from friends in Haiti.

"When you went to the Oloffson, you really felt you were being connected with Haiti's political and cultural history," he said. "You went to Haiti and were never the same. And the Oloffson really captured that."

The hotel attracted artists, intellectuals and politicians from Haiti and beyond, including Jacqueline Onassis and Tennessee Williams. It also survived coups, dictatorships and the devastating 2010 earthquake.

Isabelle Morse, daughter of Richard Morse, said he loved having writers, photographers and other artists at the Oloffson.

"His sense of community was very important to him," she said in a phone interview Monday, describing the hotel as "his whole life." "For him, it represented freedom, where people from all walks of life could come in and share that space," she said. (*Jamaica Gleaner*)

More flash flooding is forecast for central Texas, where more than 100 lives were claimed by devastating floods last week.

Flash flooding in Texas' Hill Country region materialized in the early hours of July 4, when the Guadalupe River surged over 20 feet. The aftermath was catastrophic, especially in Kerr County, where 103 people were killed. Over 100 people are still unaccounted for, but the search effort has been suspended due to more flash flooding expected Sunday, according to the Kerrville Police Department.

Approximately 3 to 6 inches of rain is expected to accumulate Sunday in areas that flooded last week, and create flooding in new areas as well, according to the NWS Weather Prediction Center.

Earlier Sunday morning, thunderstorms producing 2 to 4 inches of rain per hour drifted into northern Llano and Burnet counties, according to the National Weather Service, which warned that "flooding is now ongoing or is expected to begin soon."

"Significant rain has fallen and flooding is expected to develop shortly, particularly over Llano county," the weather service said.

The rain is expected to move southeast into the Hill Country region and the southern Edwards Plateau, the weather service said.

"Do not drive into flooded roads or around barricades," the weather service warned.

Flash flood warnings have been issued in Bertram, Llano, Cherry Spring, Watson and Briggs until 10:45 a.m. local time, according to the weather service.

In Williamson County, officials warned that flash flooding is occurring due to a surge in the San Gabriel River and advised residents not to drive in the floodwaters. The northwestern part of the county is under a flash flood warning until 10 a.m. local time.

Kerr County, which was hit especially hard in last week's floods, is also under a flash flood warning until 11:30 a.m. local time, the city of Kerrville announced on Facebook. Heavy rain has already begun falling in the city, according to the Kerrville Police Department.

Video posted to Instagram showed what appears to be floodwaters and downed trees near the Guadalupe River.

"This is a dangerous and life-threatening situation," the city warned. "Do not attempt to travel unless you are fleeing an area subject to flooding or under an evacuation order." (*NBC News*)

EU and Mexico criticise Trump's proposed 30% tariff

The European Union (EU) and Mexico have expressed disappointment at US President Donald Trump's threat to impose 30% tariffs on their imports from 1 August.

Mexico criticised what it called Trump's "unfair deal" and insisted its sovereignty was non-negotiable, while the EU's chief, Ursula von der Leyen threatened to take "proportionate countermeasures", if needed. Both said they wanted to keep negotiating with the US.

Trump has warned he will impose even higher import taxes if either of the US trading partners decide to retaliate.

This week Trump also announced new tariffs on goods from Japan, South Korea, Canada and Brazil from next month.

In the letter sent on Friday to European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen, Trump wrote: "We have had years to discuss our trading relationship with the European Union, and have concluded that we must move away from these long-term-large, and persistent, trade deficits, engendered by your tariff, and non-tariff, policies and trade barriers.

"Our relationship has been, unfortunately, far from reciprocal," the letter added.

In his letters to the EU and Mexico, Trump warned that if either trade partner retaliated with import duties of their own against the US, he would hit back by raising tariffs by a similar percentage over and above the 30%.

In a pre-recorded interview with Fox News which aired on Saturday night, President Trump said some countries were "very upset now" but he insisted the tariffs meant "hundreds of billions of dollars" were "pouring in".

The EU has been a frequent target of Trump's criticism. On 2 April, he proposed a 20% tariff for goods from the



bloc, as well as dozens of other trade partners. He then threatened to raise the EU import taxes to 50% as trade talks stalled.

Washington and Brussels had hoped to reach an agreement before a deadline of 9 July, but there have been no announcements on progress.

In 2024, the US trade deficit with the bloc was \$235.6bn (€202bn; £174bn), according to the office of the US trade representative.

Von der Leyen said the EU remained ready "to continue working towards an agreement by Aug 1".

"We will take all necessary steps to safeguard EU interests, including the adoption of proportionate countermeasures if required," von der Leyen said.

"Few economies in the world match the European Union's level of openness and adherence to fair trading practices," her statement added.

France's President Emmanuel Macron said he was in "very strong disapproval" of Trump's announcement.

If no agreement is reached, the French leader suggested the EU plan "speeding up the preparation of credible countermeasures".

Bernd Lange, the head of the European Parliament's trade committee, described Trump's move as "a slap in the face for the negotiations".

He said that it was "no way to deal with a key trading partner," adding said Brussels should enact countermeasures as soon as Monday.

Some EU leaders called for a deal with Trump. Italian Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni said in a statement she trusted "a fair agreement" could be reached, adding: "It would make no sense to trigger a trade war between the two sides of the Atlantic."

Dutch Prime Minister Dick Schoof said on social media that the EU "must remain united and resolute" in its aim to reach a "mutually beneficial" deal with the US.

Germany's Association of the Automotive Industry warned about the prospect of rising costs for German carmakers and suppliers, and said it was "regrettable that there is a threat of a further escalation of the trade conflict".

In his letter to Mexico's leader, Trump said the country had not done enough to stop North America becoming a "Narco-Trafficking Playground".

"Mexico has been helping me secure the border, BUT, what Mexico has

As of 1 May 2025, around 1,200 people were detained in the prison, which has capacity for 678 places, BFMTV had reported. (*BBC News*)

As of Saturday, the Trump administration has now proposed tariff conditions on 24 countries and the EU composed of 27 countries.

On 12 April, White House trade adviser Peter Navarro set a goal to secure "90 deals in 90 days".

So far, the president has announced the outlines of two such pacts with the United Kingdom and Vietnam as negotiations with others continue. (*BBC News*)

Sinner dethrones Alcaraz at Wimbledon

When Jannik Sinner arrived at three match points in the fourth set of his Wimbledon final against Carlos Alcaraz on Sunday, the memory of what happened five weeks ago in Paris was flashing through the minds of everyone inside Centre Court.

Everyone, perhaps, except world number one Sinner, who managed to banish any lurking demons from the darkest recesses of his brain to seal a 4-6, 6-4, 6-4, 6-4 victory and become the first Italian Wimbledon men's singles champion.

Just as on the Parisian clay, 23-yearold Sinner was the better player for long periods. Just as at Roland Garros he had the title in his hands.

But unlike that day when three consecutive match points vanished in the fourth set and Alcaraz roared back to win the longest French Open final ever, this time the ice-cool Sinner was never going to be denied. Alcaraz, whose bid to become only the fifth man in the professional era to win three successive Wimbledon titles was watched from the Royal Box by Spain's King Felipe, saved one match point. But this time there was no escape for Alcaraz as Sinner fired down an unreturnable serve.

There were no ecstatic celebrations. Sinner raised his arms to the sky, before consoling the man he de-throned and headed off in time-honoured fashion to embrace those in his box.

"Back in the days when I was young, this was only a dream, because it was so far away from where I'm from," the man from the Dolomites, who could have been a top skier, said on court.

"Emotionally I had a very tough loss in Paris. So I'm very happy that I held my nerves and yeah, it's an amazing feeling."

While Sunday's duel contained some

mind-boggling points, it lacked the twists of last month's Roland Garros roller-coaster. It did, though, underline why the Sinner-Alcaraz rivalry is set to dominate men's tennis for the foreseeable future.

Alcaraz had led their series 8-4 entering Sunday's final, including winning their last five showdowns. So while Sinner was fuelled by a shot at redemption, he also needed to make a statement.

He did so with a superlative display of craft and skill. He refused to be knocked off track by losing the last four games of the first set and went on to pick apart Alcaraz's game with a level of tennis his opponent could not match.

Meanwhile, Iga Swiatek took another stride towards tennis greatness by ruthlessly tearing apart American 13th seed Amanda Anisimova 6-0, 6-0 and lifting her first women's singles Wimbledon trophy on Saturday.

The big occasion turned into a nightmare for Anisimova who became the first woman to lose a Wimbledon final by that painful scoreline since 1911 and the first to do so at any major since Steffi Graf routed Natasha Zvereva at the 1988 French Open.

Already a US Open champion and a four-times French Open winner, Swiatek's demolition job at the All England Club meant that she became the youngest woman since a 20-year-old Serena Williams in 2002 to lift major titles on all three surfaces.

Her superb display on the sundrenched lawns of London also ensured that she emerged as the first player since Monica Seles in 1992 to win her first six major finals.
