The Attorney General, Sir Steadroy Benjamin, has announced that the curfew that applies to young people in the country will be enforced by the police even as the Carnival festivities approach.

Sir Steadroy said this follows a meeting he held with the Acting Commissioner of Police, Everton Jeffers, and other senior officers of the Royal Police Force of Antigua and Barbuda when they discussed the matter.

"I was of the view that with the Carnival season right upon us that we would have relaxed the curfew for the festivities. However, following the discussions with the senior management of the RPFAB, it was strongly recommended that the curfew should remain in place," he reported.

The matter also came up in Wednesday's meeting of the Cabinet and following their deliberations, the members of the Cabinet agreed to have the curfew remain in force.

"The main reasons why the police in particular are against lifting the curfew has to do with the spate of crimes that have been committed in recent weeks many of which have been perpetrated by young people. Lifting the curfew at this time, it is felt, would not be advantageous to the entire country," he remarked.

law to take into custody any young people they feel may be a danger to the society if they are found on the street during the curfew hours, which run until 6:00 am.

The curfew was introduced as part of measures to curb rising criminal and gang related activities in the country.

Recently, an 18-year old and a 16-year old were arrested in the company of an adult who committed two armed robberies within the spate of 48 hours.

Antigua and Barbuda to assume chairmanship of ECCB Monetary Council

Prime Minister and Minister of Finance of Antigua and Barbuda, Gaston A. Browne, will assume the chairmanship of the Eastern Caribbean Central Bank Monetary Council during an official handing-over ceremony, which will take place at the Conference Center of the American University of Antigua in Osbourn, Antigua and Barbuda, on Thursday, 17 July.

Prime Minister Browne succeeds Cora Richardson-Hodge who chaired the Council from February 2025, effective upon her appointment as premier of Anguilla.

The Monetary Council is the highest decision-making authority of the ECCB and comprises the eight ministers for finance of the ECCB

member governments.

Chairmanship of the Council rotates alphabetically each year among the eight ECCB member countries: Anguilla, Antigua and Barbuda, the Commonwealth of Dominica, Grenada, Montserrat, Saint Christopher (St Kitts) and Nevis, Saint Lucia and Saint Vincent and the Grenadines.

The handing-over ceremony will feature a Ceremonial Parade with the Antigua and Barbuda National Cadet Corps; a Cultural Performance from the Antigua and Barbuda Dance Company; and addresses by Governor of the ECCB, Timothy N. J. Antoine; the outgoing chairman of the ECCB Monetary Council, Cora Richardson-Hodge; and incoming chairman, Prime Minister Gaston A. Browne.

The meeting of the ECCB Monetary Council will mark a significant first; while the opening exercises will take place here in Antigua, the Council members will travel to Barbuda on Friday where the business session will be held at the Barbuda Ocean Club (PLH Resort) from where Prime Minister Browne will deliver the end-of-meeting final communique.

Media representatives will pose questions to the prime minister via ZOOM connections.

Antigua and Barbuda joins SVG in calling for sharing of fees for Caribbean overflight

The prime ministers of Antigua and Barbuda and Saint Vincent and the Grenadines are calling on Trinidad and Tobago to share revenue generated from overflight fees collected within the Piarco Flight Information Region (PFIR), which they say includes parts of their sovereign airspace.

The PFIR, managed by Trinidad and Tobago under International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) guidelines, spans from Antigua and Barbuda in the north to Trinidad in the south, covering around 750,000 square miles of airspace.

Antiguan Prime Minister Gaston Browne told *Guardian Media* his government has acquired radar technology to monitor its own airspace and is seeking a share of the fees. He first raised the issue at a Cabinet press briefing.

Saint Vincent and the Grenadines Prime Minister Dr Ralph Gonsalves criticised the current arrangement as a colonial-era holdover, saying it lacks transparency and excludes other Eastern Caribbean states from both management and revenue.



Trinidad & Tobago, through the TTCAA, is responsible for the Piarco FIR (TTZP) and provides Air Navigation Services throughout the Eastern Caribbean (from Antigua in the north to Trinidad in the south) and east of Barbados, stretching across the Atlantic Ocean toward Africa. It should be noted that each country is responsible for ANS within their own airspaces which resides from the surface to its TMA which varies between 13,500 -24,500 feet over each country.

"Barbados and OECS countries are locked out... there's no transparency in the accounting," Dr Gonsalves said during his own press briefing. More than 108,000 flights entered the PFIR between October 2023 and September 2024, according to Trinidad and Tobago's Civil Aviation Authority.

ABFC to Proceed with Live Coverage of Soca Monarch Events Despite Request from Soca Fraternity

The Antigua and Barbuda Festivals Commission (ABFC) acknowledges receipt of a formal correspondence dated July 16, 2025, from Mr. Peetron Thomas and Ms. Tammisha Roberts, Chairman and Secretary of the National Soca Fraternity of Antigua and Barbuda.

In their letter, the Fraternity requested that there be no live media coverage of the upcoming Soca Monarch Semifinals on Friday, July 18, 2025, and Finals on Saturday, August 3, 2025. Specifically, the request sought to prohibit:

- Live streaming
- Live broadcasting
- Real-time social media feeds

The stated intention was to preserve the live event experience, protect the creative work of the artists, and encourage in-person attendance. While we respect the Fraternity's views and remain committed to engaging with all cultural stakeholders, the ABFC has reviewed the request and will proceed with its current media coverage plans, which include live broadcasting and digital streaming of the Semifinals and Finals.

Our mandate is to ensure that Antigua and Barbuda's premier cultural events are widely accessible both to our local audience and to our diaspora and global Carnival community. Live coverage plays a critical role in that mission, allowing us to expand our reach, promote our talent, and uphold transparency in national competitions.

We remain open to continued dialogue and collaboration with the Soca Fraternity as we work together to elevate the cultural landscape of Antigua and Barbuda.

The Festivals Commission Responds to Concerns Regarding Party Monarch Quarterfinals Results



The Antigua and Barbuda Festivals Commission (ABFC) acknowledges receipt of correspondence dated July 11, 2025, expressing concerns related to the quarterfinal results of the 2025 Party Monarch Competition, specifically regarding the placement of competitor Ms. Ebony Thomas, known professionally as "Ebony T."

Following a thorough review, the Commission confirms that the competition was conducted in full alignment with the established rules and procedures outlined for the Party Monarch Competition.

The following clarifications are provided:

1. Judging Panel Compliance

Contrary to claims that five judges were utilized in violation of Rule 15.1, the official records confirm that a panel of three judges adjudicated all performances. These same three judges evaluated every contestant, ensuring consistency and fairness. Score sheets from the judges are available to validate this process.

2. Ranking and Tie-Break Pro-

cedure

The primary rankings were determined by the sum of each competitor's individual rankings from the three judges. Both Ms. Thomas and another contestant, Dior, received a total rank score of 48. As per standard tie-breaking procedure, the competitor with the majority of lower (better) individual rankings is awarded the higher placement.

Judge 1: Dior (20) vs. Ebony T (21) – Dior placed higher

Judge 2: Dior (5) vs. Ebony T (17) – Dior placed higher

Judge 3: Ebony T (10) vs. Dior (23) – Ebony T placed higher

With two of the three judges awarding lower scores to Dior, Dior was rightfully awarded 15th place, and Ms. Thomas placed 16th.

3. Context for Run-Off Event

In addition to the explanation of the judging process, it is important to clarify that the situation involving two competitors who performed early due to prior international performance commitments was reviewed in consultation with the relevant stakeholders.

A resolution was proposed by the National Soca Fraternity to address the matter fairly and transparently. The Fraternity recommended a run-off event featuring the two early performers along with the next five placing artistes (positions 16–20) in each segment. The ABFC accepted and supported this proposal in full.

As Ms. Thomas officially placed 16th, she was eligible under this arrangement and was formally invited to participate in the runoff. However, Ms. Thomas chose not to attend or participate in the event.

The inauguration of direct flights to Colombia opens up huge potential for trade



Minister of Tourism and Investment, Charles Fernandez, welcomes the decision to begin direct flights from St. John's to Colombia stating that beyond tourism, it has much potential for increased trade with Colombia and the wider South American market.

Minister Fernandez said the direct air link now makes it possible for Antigua and Barbuda business people to travel to Colombia to establish trade relationships with their counterparts there.

"Colombia exports coffee, apparels (clothing), fruits, vegetables, cut flowers and petroleum products. There is therefore an opportunity for business to establish those ties that would bring those products into Antigua and Barbuda," he explained.

The minister noted that much of the goods traded between Colombia and other South American markets go through Miami and that a direct flight or a cargo ship operation between these two points would reduce the cost of these products significantly.

"If we can get a ship to operate a direct route to Colombia then goods arriving would be much cheaper and that would be good for all of us," the minister noted.

On the issue of tourism, the tourism minister said that Antigua and Barbuda is committed to new source markets whether it is Africa, the Middle East or South America. Regarding the weekly charters to Colombia, Fernandez suggested that filling the seats should be relatively easy even from the point of view of those individuals who travel there for medical purposes.

According to the tourism minister he is quite optimistic that over time the weekly flights to Colombia will attract large numbers of persons traveling both ways; Antiguans and Barbudans going to Colombia for health and business reasons mainly and for Colombians and others from neighbouring countries, the opportunity to experience a holiday in the destination.

• The planning and execution of the 50th Annual CSA Conference, a landmark event that will be hosted in Kingston, Jamaica, in June 2026.

The conference will be held under the theme 'Caribbean Vibes and Vibrations: Culture, Identity and Development in Transformative Times', and the CSA promised that it will be a dynamic space of reflection, scholarly innovation, and celebration of the Caribbean's intellectual, cultural, and social contributions.

The CSA's 50th Anniversary Conference will gather scholars, researchers, policymakers, artists, activists, and partners from across the region and worldwide, making Kingston the global capital of Caribbean thought from June 1-5, 2026.

The CSA says it is the leading independent professional organisation for scholars, students, and practitioners dedicated to the study about and advancement of the Caribbean region with members worldwide. The organisation is committed to fostering Caribbean research, dialogue, and collaboration across the humanities, social sciences, cultural and other sectors. (*Jamaica Gleaner*)

UN Security Council renews Haiti mission amid spiralling crises

The United Nations Security Council has unanimously extended the mandate of the UN's political mission in Haiti until the end of the year amid escalating gang violence, political paralysis, and a deepening humanitarian crisis threatening the French-speaking Caribbean country.

By adopting Resolution 2785 on Monday, the Security Council renewed the authorisation of the UN Integrated Office in Haiti (BINUH), reaffirming support for a Haitian-led solution to the country's overlapping crises.

The UN said the decision comes as armed gangs maintain their grip on most of the capital, Port-au-Prince, with over 1.3 million people displaced and more than 4,000 killed in the first half of 2025 alone.

"Conditions have deteriorated dramatically amid growing food insecurity and the erosion of public institutions. Of particular concern is the safety of women and girls, with a sharp rise in reports of sexual violence since the start of the year – including rape, gang rape, and sexual enslavement," the UN said.

The Security Council also "expressed its intention to consider, without delay" the recommendations by the UN secretary general on possible future roles for the UN in sustaining security and stability in Haiti.

The UN noted that, in February, Secretary General António Guterres presented the council with a range of



options.

"Each new wave of criminal attacks against the communities and institutions of Haiti is a distressing sign that time is running out," Guterres had said in a letter, urging member states to support the Kenya-led Multinational Security Support (MSS) mission, which the Council authorised in October 2023 to assist Haiti's national police in tackling gang violence and restoring order.

Guterres also said that international efforts to improve security must be matched by national progress towards resolving the political crisis. The UN said several council members voiced willingness to engage on the secretary general's proposals, with the Chinese representative, for instance, saying Beijing is open to working with others to chart a constructive way forward.

"With regard to how to improve the situation in Haiti, including how to respond to the secretary general's recommendations, we are ready to have candid communication with all parties, explore viable solutions and seek the broadest possible consensus," said Geng Shuang, deputy permanent representative of China to the UN.

Haiti's Permanent Representative to the UN, Pierre Ericq Pierre, welcomed the Security Council's action, underscoring the political and security stakes ahead of a critical 2026 transition timeline.

"This extension should help Haitian authorities undertake a real, genuine political dialogue to strengthen good governance, bolster security and bring about justice, and promote human rights," he said.

Pierre also expressed his government's expectation that the UN mission will support the implementation of the national road map, including constitutional reforms and elections.

"BINUH must work as part of a holistic plan to support Haitian authorities in confronting the grave crisis shaking the country to its core," he added.

The UN said the United States, which led negotiations on the resolution alongside Panama, stressed the urgency of political progress and called on international partners to increase support.

"Less than one year remains on the Transitional Presidential Council's planned road map for the restoration of democratic institutions," said Ambassador Dorothy Shea, US acting representative.

"Supporting the security of elections and the participation of all sectors of society is key to sustainable political progress in Haiti. Without BINUH, realising the vision of a stronger, more resilient society would be less likely."

The UN said Council members also welcomed Carlos G. Ruiz Massieu, appointed as the new special representative of the secretary general and head of BINUH, succeeding María Isabel Salvador.

Ruiz Massieu, who currently leads the UN Verification Mission in Colombia, brings decades of diplomatic and political experience, including in peace negotiations and institution-building.

The UN said BINUH, a special political mission, was established in 2019 to advise and support Haitian authorities on political dialogue, justice, human rights and governance.

BINUH succeeded in a series of UN peacekeeping and political missions in the Caribbean country, dating back to 1993, including the large-scale MINUSTAH operation, which wrapped up in 2017 after 13 years. (*CMC*)

Over 300 more Jamaican farm workers head overseas this week



Whatever impression you leave is the impression they will have of this entire country."

Between January 1 and June 30, 2025, the Ministry, through the Overseas Employment Programme, has facilitated the placement of 6,886 Jamaican workers in Canada, the United States, and Guantanamo Bay.

Of this total, approximately 63.7 per cent, 4,393 workers, were placed in Canada, while 2,482 individuals secured opportunities in the United States. Additionally, eleven workers were deployed to Guantanamo Bay. (*Jamaica Gleaner*)

Over 300 Jamaican farm workers are departing the island this week for Canada under the Government's Seasonal Agricultural Workers Programme.

An official send-off ceremony was held at the Ministry of Labour and Social Security's Overseas Employment Centre on East Street in Kingston on Tuesday.

On Tuesday, 103 workers left Jamaica with another 209 set to leave on Wednesday morning, bringing the total to 312 participants in this week's deployment.

Pearnel Charles Jr, Minister of Labour and Social Security, who addressed the workers, highlighted the strong rate of returning workers and the influence they have as ambassadors for Jamaica.

"We have almost 90 per cent that are returning, 10 per cent new, and many going back to the same farms because they have done a stellar job and they have been requested," he said.

He also reminded participants: "For many persons in North America, both in the US and Canada, the only thing they know about Jamaica is you...

A Jamaican man is among five foreign nationals described by the United States as "barbaric" criminals who have been sent to the small African nation of Eswatini in an expansion of the Trump administration's largely secretive third-country deportation programme, the US Department of Homeland Security said Tuesday.

In a late-night post on X, Homeland Security Assistant Secretary Tricia Mc-Laughlin said the men sent to Eswatini, who are citizens of Vietnam, Jamaica, Cuba, Yemen, and Laos, had arrived on a plane, but didn't say when or where.

In her post, she said the Jamaican man was convicted of murder, sentenced to 25 years confinement; convicted of robbery, sentenced to six years confinement; and convicted of possession of a weapon, sentenced to six months confinement.

She said the five are all convicted criminals and "individuals so uniquely barbaric that their home countries refused to take them back."

The men "have been terrorizing American communities" but were now "off of American soil," McLaughlin added.

McLaughlin said they had been convicted of crimes including murder and child rape, and one was a "confirmed" gang member.

Her social media posts included mug shots of the men and what she said were



their criminal records.

They were not named.

The US has already deported eight men to another African country, South Sudan, after the Supreme Court lifted restrictions on sending people to countries where they have no ties.

The South Sudanese government has declined to say where those men, also described as violent criminals, are after it took custody of them nearly two weeks ago.

Like in South Sudan, there was no immediate comment from Eswatini authorities over any deal to accept third-country deportees or what would happen to them in that country. Civic groups there raised concerns over the secrecy from a government long accused of clamping down on human rights.

Eswatini, previously called Swaziland, is a country of about 1.2 million people between South Africa and Mozambique. It is one of the world's last remaining absolute monarchies and the last in Africa. King Mswati III has ruled by decree since 1986.

The Trump administration has said it is seeking more deals with African nations to take deportees from the US.

Leaders from some of the five West African nations who met last week with President Donald Trump at the White House said the issue of migration and their countries possibly taking deportees from the US was discussed.

Some nations have pushed back. Nigeria, which wasn't part of that White House summit, said it has rejected pressure from the US to take deportees who are citizens of other countries. (*AP*)

Syrian government and leaders of the Druze minority announce new ceasefire



Syrian government officials and leaders in the Druze religious minority announced Wednesday a renewed ceasefire after days of clashes that have threatened to unravel the country's postwar political transition and have drawn intervention by Syria's powerful neighbor, Israel.

It was not immediately clear if the new agreement which was announced by the state-run SANA news agency and in a video message by a Druze religious leader — would hold. A previous ceasefire announced the day before quickly fell apart.

The announcement came after Israel launched a series of rare airstrikes in the heart of Damascus, part of a campaign that it said is intended to defend the Druze — who also form a substantial community in Israel — and to push Islamic militants away from its border.

The escalating violence has appeared to be the most serious threat yet to the ability of Syria's new rulers to consolidate control of the country after a rebel offensive led by Islamist insurgent groups ousted longtime despotic leader, Bashar Assad, in December, bringing an end to a nearly 14-year civil war.

"We are very worried about the violence in southern Syria," Secretary of State Marco Rubio told reporters. It is a direct threat to efforts to help build a peaceful and stable Syria. "We have been and remain in repeated and constant talks with the governments of Syria and Israel on this matter."

The Israeli army had struck near the entrance to the Syrian Ministry of Defense in Damascus and targeted the same site several hours later with a larger strike. Israel has also launched a series of airstrikes on convoys of government forces in southern Syria since the clashes erupted and has beefed up forces on the border.

Syria's Defense Ministry had earlier blamed militias in the Druze-majority area of Sweida for violating yesterday's ceasefire agreement, causing Syrian army soldiers to return fire. It said they were "adhering to rules of engagement to protect residents, prevent harm, and ensure the safe return of those who left the city back to their homes."

Meanwhile, reports of at-

tacks on civilians were surfacing, and Druze with family members in the conflict zone searched desperately for information about their fate amid communication blackouts.

The primarily Sunni Muslim leaders of the new Syrian government have faced suspicion from religious and ethnic minorities, whose fears increased after clashes between government forces and pro-Assad armed groups in March spiraled into sectarian revenge attacks. Hundreds of civilians from the Alawite religious minority, to which Assad belongs, were killed.

In Jaramana near the Syrian capital, Evelyn Azzam, 20, said she fears that her husband, Robert Kiwan, 23, is dead. The newlyweds live in the Damascus suburb, but Kiwan would commute to Sweida for work each morning and got trapped there when the clashes erupted.

Azzam said she was on the phone with Kiwan when security forces questioned him and a colleague about whether they were affiliated with Druze militias. When her husband's colleague raised his voice, she heard a gunshot. Kiwan was then shot while trying to appeal. "They shot my husband in the hip from what I could gather," she said, struggling to hold back tears. "The ambulance took him to the hospital. Since then, we have no idea what has happened."

A Syrian Druze from Sweida living in the United Arab Emirates said her mother, father, and sister were hiding in a basement in their home near the hospital, where they could hear the sound of shelling and bullets from outside. She spoke on condition of anonymity out of fear her family might be targeted.

She had struggled to get hold of them, but when she reached them, she said, "I heard them cry. I have never heard them this way before."

Another Druze woman living in the UAE with family members in Sweida, who also spoke on condition of anonymity, said a cousin told her that a house where their relatives lived had been burned down with everyone inside it.

It reminded her of when the Islamic State extremist group attacked Sweida in 2018, she said. Her uncle was among many civilians there who took arms to fight back while Assad's forces stood aside. He was killed in the fighting.

"It's the same right now," she told The Associated Press. The Druze fighters, she said, are "just people who are protecting their province and their families." The Druze religious sect began as a 10th-century offshoot of Ismailism, a branch of Shiite Islam. More than half of the roughly 1 million Druze worldwide live in Syria. Most of the other Druze live in Lebanon and Israel, including in the Golan Heights, which Israel captured from Syria in the 1967 Mideast War and annexed in 1981. (AP)

Thai police arrest woman who allegedly seduced and blackmailed Buddhist monks

Police in Thailand arrested a woman Tuesday who allegedly enticed a string of Buddhist monks into sexual relationships and then pressured them into making large payments to cover up their intimacy.

The possible violation of the celibacy rule for monks has rocked Buddhist institutions and gripped public attention in Thailand in recent weeks. At least nine abbots and senior monks involved in the scandal have been disrobed and cast out of the monkhood, the Royal Thai Police Central Investigation Bureau said.

Wilawan Emsawat, in her mid-30s, was arrested at her home in Nonthaburi province north of the capital Bangkok on charges including extortion, money laundering and receiving stolen goods. Police said they traced money transferred to her by a senior monk from a bank account belonging to his temple in northern Thailand.

Wilawan has not made a statement since her arrest and it was unclear if she has legal representation. Speaking to local media before her arrest, she acknowledged one relationship and said she had given money to that monk.

Scandals involving monks surface a few times a year in Thailand but usually don't involve senior members of the clergy. The case also puts a spotlight on the large sums of money donated to temples controlled by abbots, which is in marked contrast to the abstemious lives they are supposed to lead under their religion's precepts.

Wilawan deliberately targeted senior monks for financial gain, police said, noting they found several monks had transferred large amounts of money after Wilawan initiated romantic re-



lationships with them.

Wilawan's bank accounts received around 385 million baht (\$11.9 million) in the past three years, but most of the funds were spent on online gambling websites, police said.

Jaroonkiat Pankaew, a Central Investigation Bureau deputy commissioner, said the investigation began last month after an abbot of a famous temple in Bangkok abruptly left the monkhood.

Investigators found the abbot had allegedly been blackmailed by Wilawan over their romantic relationship. She told the monk that she was pregnant and asked him to pay 7.2 million baht (\$222,000) in financial assistance, Jaroonkiat said at a news conference in Bangkok Tuesday.

Police believed "this woman is dangerous and we needed to arrest her as soon as possible," Jaroonkiat said.

Thai media reported a search of her mobile phones revealed tens of thousands of photos and videos, as well as numerous chat logs indicating intimacy with several monks, many of which could be used for blackmail.

Thai monks are largely members of the Theravada sect, which requires them to be celibate and refrain from even touching a woman.

Acting Prime Minister Phumtham Wechayachai ordered authorities to review and consider tightening existing laws related to monks and temples, especially the transparency of temple finances, to restore faith in Buddhism, government spokesperson Jirayu Houngsub said Tuesday.

The Central Investigation Bureau has set up a Facebook page for people to report monks who misbehave, Jaroonkiat said.

"We will investigate monks across the country," he said. "I believe that the ripple effects of this investigation will lead to a lot of changes." (*AP*)

Trump to put tariffs of over 10 per cent on smaller nations, including those in Africa and the Caribbean

President Donald Trump told reporters Tuesday that he plans to place tariffs of over 10 per cent on smaller countries, including nations in Africa and the Caribbean.

"We'll probably set one tariff for all of them," Trump said, adding that it could be "a little over 10 per cent tariff" on goods from at least 100 nations.

Commerce Secretary Howard Lutnick interjected that the nations with goods being taxed at these rates would be in Africa and the Caribbean, places that generally do relatively modest levels of trade with the US and would be relatively insignificant for addressing Trump's goals of reducing trade imbalances with the rest of the world.

The president had this month been posting letters to roughly two dozen countries and the European



Union that simply levied a tariff rate to be charged starting August 1.

Those countries generally faced tax rates on the goods close to the April 2 rates announced by the US president, whose rollout of historically high import taxes for the US caused financial markets to panic and led to Trump setting a 90-day negotiating period that expired July 9.

Trump also said he would "probably" announce tariffs on pharmaceutical drugs at the "end of the month." The president said he would start out at a lower tariff rate and give companies a year to build domestic factories before they faced higher import tax rates. Trump said computer chips would face a similar style of tariffs. (AP)

Player development a hit with Rising Stars Women's U-19 participants

Players competing in this year's Cricket West Indies' Rising Stars Women's Under-19 Championship received comprehensive player development training through a specialized workshop designed to enhance both their on-field performance and life skills development to adapt to the demands of high-level sport.

The recent workshop held at the Hilton Hotel and Conference Centre in Trinidad & Tobago came as the tournament, now in its fifth year under the Rising Stars banner, represents one of the cornerstones of CWI's player development pathway and regional women's cricket growth strategy as a key talent identification platform for future West Indies players.

The Player Development Workshop covered areas including sports psychology, nutrition, personal branding, social media awareness, and the protection of children's rights.

Keele Lawrence-Chan opened the workshop with welcome remarks and introductions before introducing Dr. Nadine Sammy—mental skills coach for the West Indies senior women's team who led the sports psychology session with a particular focus on leadership both on and off the field.

Lawrence-Chan also presented on child protection rights, drawing from her

extensive experience in the field, while media personality Jason Williams and Samantha Best conducted sessions on managing social media. Safiya Beckford spoke on nutrition for athletes.

The workshop also featured a panel discussion with current West Indies player Karishma Ramharack, an off-spinner who made her international debut in 2019 and brings substantial experience with 90 international appearances and over 80 wickets in ODIs and T20Is.

"I think it was a good opportunity for the girls to have an open forum to ask questions now that they are making some decisions about going into serious cricket," Ramharack remarked.

"The session was very well received, flowed nicely, and gave the players the opportunity to ask some difficult questions. It allowed me and these young players to connect and have an honest discussion on life after under-19 cricket and some important dos and don'ts to look out for.

"I do believe that I utilized my experiences to answer the questions in a manner that benefits these girls and will help them in their careers. This was a truly enjoyable experience," she added.

Dr. Sammy detailed the comprehensive approach to her session on leadership.

"I described the different leadership styles with the idea to get players starting to think about which ones they might currently embody or a combination of the different styles with emphasis on which ones they thought were best or wanted to strive for.

"It was really about understanding what is required in different situations and how each player could take ownership, take charge, and make a meaningful difference within those situations," she said.

Reflecting on his session on social media awareness, Jason Williams emphasized the transformative potential of the media training component of the workshop.

"Being part of the development seminar was very profound. Media training and interview skills will assist with their confidence so that ultimately, they can represent themselves and the region with distinction. It was a joy to witness these young female cricketers unlock their limitless potential," Williams noted. POINLEXPRESS

Two of the region's most promising young talents, Jewel Andrew of Antigua and Jediah Blades of Barbados, have earned their maiden T20 International callups as part of a 16-member West Indies squad named to face Australia in a fivematch T20I series, starting at Sabina Park in Kingston, Jamaica, on Sunday, July 20.

Cricket West Indies (CWI) made the announcement on Wednesday, confirming that the core of the squad which recently secured a series win over Ireland has been retained, with the addition of the exciting newcomers set to inject fresh energy into the team.

Andrew, just 18 years old, is widely regarded as one of the region's brightest batting prospects. A stylish righthander who also serves as a back-up wicketkeeper, Andrew has impressed selectors with his aggressive intent and control against spin—a key asset as the team builds toward the 2026 ICC T20 World Cup in India and Sri Lanka.

Blades, a left-arm seamer who made his international debut in 2024 against Bangladesh, was a standout performer in the inaugural West Indies Breakout League.

Known for his effectiveness in the powerplay, the young pacer brings a new dimension to the bowling attack with his ability to swing the ball early and maintain pressure with the new ball.

Shai Hope will continue to lead the side, with experienced players such as Jason Holder, Rovman Powell, Andre Russell, Akeal Hosein, and Shimron Hetmyer all named in the squad.

The return of Evin Lewis and Sherfane Rutherford adds depth to the batting lineup, while the pace battery is strengthened by the likes of Alzarri Joseph, Ro-

mario Shepherd, and Matthew Forde.

Head Coach Daren Sammy said the series forms part of the team's long-term strategy leading into the next T20 World Cup.

"Our goals and strategic plans are aligned to winning the T20 World Cup in 2026," Sammy said.

"We have continuity in the squad from the previous series and as a unit we will continue to fine tune our style and brand ahead of the World Cup."

Sammy also emphasized the importance of re-establishing the team's dominance on home soil.

"Our previous two T20 series at home we were on the wrong end of the results, but starting against Australia, we want to regain our form at home as we build momentum into next year's World Cup with our exciting and dynamic group of players." The squad will be guided by a seasoned support team led by Head Coach Daren Sammy, with Floyd Reifer (batting), Ravi Rampaul (bowling), and Rayon Griffith (fielding) as assistant coaches. The team is managed by Rawl Lewis.

The series begins with backto-back matches at Sabina Park on July 20 and 22, before moving to Warner Park in St. Kitts for the remaining three fixtures on July 25, 26, and 28. All matches will bowl off at 7 pm local time.
