Prime Minister Gaston Browne Champions SIDS Agenda at Global Finance Summit in Spain

Antigua and Barbuda's Prime Minister, Gaston Browne, delivered a powerful and resonant message on behalf of Small Island Developing States (SIDS) at the opening of the Fourth International Conference on Financing for Development (FfD4), commanding the attention of the global community.

The high-level conference, held in Seville, comes at a critical juncture for SIDS, which continue to bear the brunt of an inequitable international financial system that restricts access to essential climate finance and development resources. FfD4 brings together governments, UN agencies, multilateral financial institutions, and the private sector in an urgent effort to reshape global finance so that vulnerable nations are no longer excluded or left behind.

On the opening day, Prime Minister Browne engaged in a series of strategic meetings, diplomatic discussions, and a powerful national address that placed Antigua and Barbuda—and the broader SIDS agenda—firmly on the global stage.

During the General Debate, Prime Minister Browne delivered an impassioned statement, outlining the systemic barriers that continue to marginalize SIDS. With striking clarity, he warned:

"SIDS will remain trapped in a vicious cycle of costly borrowing, escalating debt, and rising vulnerability."

Calling for equity, not charity, Prime Minister Browne declared: "Let us be clear: we are not asking for charity. We are demanding fairness—a financial system that reflects our reality and supports our right to thrive."

He closed with a firm pledge to maintain unwavering advocacy on behalf of SIDS: "I will continue to speak loudly—for Antigua and Barbuda, and for all SIDS."

Later in the day, Prime Minister Browne participated in the high-level forum "South-South Synergies: Financing Devel-

opment in Latin America and the Caribbean through Strategic Partnerships with the Arab Coordination Group." The forum explored new opportunities for deepened collaboration between the Latin American and Caribbean region and the Arab world, with a focus on mobilizing innovative development finance.

That evening, Prime Minister Browne attended an official dinner hosted by the Prime Minister of Spain, H.E. Pedro Sánchez. He expressed appreciation for Spain's support of SIDS, particularly in areas such as climate resilience and sustainable development. In bilateral discussions, Prime Minister Browne highlighted three key areas where Antigua and Barbuda seeks Spain's partnership:

☐ Scholarships for capacity

- building and tourism development;
- ☐ Support for the SIDS Center of Excellence to strengthen institutional capabilities;
- ☐ Endorsement of the Debt Sustainability Support Service (DSSS), a mechanism aimed at enabling development-oriented debt management.

Prime Minister Browne's contributions on Day One of the Conference reaffirm Antigua and Barbuda's leadership in advocating for global financial reform and equitable development. The nation remains firmly committed to building a fairer, more resilient international economic system—one that includes and uplifts the world's most vulnerable nations.

US Government working to attract more joint venture partnerships in the Caribbean

The Trump Administration is looking to encourage more American investments in the Caribbean region to participate in joint partnerships with local private sector entities that have the support of the governments in the respective countries.

That's the word from Senior Bureau Official in the Bureau of Western Hemisphere Affairs, Ambassador Michael Kozak, who spoke with reporters in Antigua and Saturday following a tour of the LNG Power plant at Crabbes Peninsula, which is a joint undertaking of the American company, Eagle LNG and the Antigua Power Company Ltd.

"There is a lot of opportunities here; it is also something that we are working on in Washington, where from our side, we want to make it more viable for our investors to go and work on projects in smaller economies but there are plenty of opportunities," he stated.

Ambassador Kozak noted that in the past the focus was always on mega-projects while there are so many projects, similar to the Eagle LNG/


APCL project, that benefit the Amer-

ican investors as well as bring benefits to countries such as Antigua and Barbuda.

He commended the 'synergy' between Eagle LNG, APCL and the Antigua and Barbuda in executing the LNG Power plant project in Antigua and Barbuda.

"This is a case where the people who know the business figure out the most efficient way to implement the project with the government offering its support; that's the way it should be," he emphasized.

The new Caribbean LNG Inc. power plant is currently in operation utilizing diesel to produce power. However, the dredging of the Crabbes Harbour is slated to be completed by September

Prime Minister Gaston Browne Deepens Strategic Partnership with Global Citizen at FfD4 in Spain

Seville, Spain – 30 June 2025 – The Honourable Gaston Browne, Prime of Antigua Minister and Barbuda, met with Mr. Michael Sheldrick, Co-Founder and Chief Policy, Impact, and Government Relations Officer at Global Citizen, during a high-level bilateral engagement on the margins of the Fourth **International Conference** on Financing for Development (FfD4) in Seville, Spain.

The meeting reinforced the strong and growing partnership between Antigua and Barbuda and Global Citizen, focusing on expanding collaboration across critical global development and advocacy priorities.

Discussions centered on several joint initiatives, including the potential hosting of a global event dedicated to world peace.

Both leaders recognized the urgent need for international platforms that foster unity, dialogue, and multilateral cooperation amid rising geopolitical tensions.

Prime Minister Browne also highlighted the SIDS Center of Excellence, an Antigua and Barbuda-led initiative, as a key area for partnership. He welcomed the opportunity to leverage Global Citizen's extensive platform to enhance visibility, mobilize investment, and build capacity across Small Island Developing States (SIDS).

The bilateral dialogue included forward-looking conversations on youth empowerment and

education. Prime Minister Browne and Mr. Sheldrick explored pathways for Antigua and Barbuda to benefit from the FIFA Education Fund, established by Global Citizen in collaboration with the FIFA World Cup, to advance equitable access to education and support youth development across vulnerable communities.

Prime Minister Browne reaffirmed his government's commitment to sustained collaboration with Global Citizen and confirmed his continued advocacy role at the upcoming Global Citizen Festival in September. The Prime Minister also indicated that the possibility exist for him to potentially participate in Global Citizen's strategic events in Singapore later this year.

On the pressing issue of climate finance, both parties agreed to intensify cooperation around innovative and scalable financing mechanisms. This includes a joint exploration of solidarity levies and other creative funding solutions to support climate-vulnerable nations.

Prime Minister Browne emphasized the critical importance of multilateral engagement, civic activism, and public-private partnerships in addressing the world's most urgent challenges.

He reiterated Antigua and Barbuda's commitment to working closely with Global Citizen to drive measurable impact for both people and the planet. (Ends)

Ministry of Agriculture launches its internship programme, 2025

The Ministry of Agriculture officially launched its 2025 Internship Programme on Monday by welcoming a cohort of interns during an opening ceremony held at the Point Wharf Fisheries Complex Conference Room.

The programme, which runs for one month, offers participants hands-on exposure across key departments within the Ministry and in other related areas, including Extension, Fisheries, Veterinary & Livestock, Communications, Agro-processing, Beekeeping and Aquaponics/Hydroponics.

The ceremony opened with a prayer led by Carol-Faye Bynoe-George/Head of the Communications Unit and the MOA Internship Coordinator. Additionally, messages were delivered on behalf of Agriculture Minister,

Anthony Smith Jnr., and Director of Agriculture, Gregory Bailey as both were unable to attend due to other duties overseas.

Bynoe-George encouraged the interns to view the experience not just as a placement, but as an opportunity to shape their professional journey.

Education Officer for Agricultural Science at the Ministry of Education, Nicolette Francis, delivered brief remarks. She urged interns to remain curious, professional, and proactive. "Agriculture is evolving," she said, "and you are stepping into a space where your contribution can matter."

This internship is designed to give serious Agricultural Science students meaningful field experience, deepen their understanding of the agricultural sector, and introduce them to

Two men received jail-time for the possession of firearms and ammunition

Two men - a thirty-nine (39) year old and a twenty-five (25) year old were sentenced to prison terms when they appeared in the Magistrate's Court on Monday to answer separate charges for the possession of firearms and ammunition.

39 year Jamall Prince of Seatons was arrested and charged by the police on June 17, following an incident in the village on the said date. A police task force was in the village searching for an individual when they saw three men standing together. When one of the men recognized the police officers, he ran off and hid between two motor vehicles. The police became suspicious and gave chase. The man was held and identified as Jamall Prince. The police asked for person to search his person and after that was done there was nothing illegal found.

However, when the police searched the area where he hid between the vehicles, a black and silver pistol was found hidden underneath some dead bushes. At the police station the weapon was identified as a Smith and Wesson 9mm pistol.

When Prince appeared before the magistrate on Monday, he was sentenced to three-years-five-months in HM Prison for the possession the firearm and one year for possession of ammunition. Both sentences are to run concurrently.

Meanwhile, 25-year old Malique Challenger of Yorks also had to answer for possession of a Brown .45 Remington pistol and seven rounds of ammunition.



On June 21, 2025, the police executed a search warrant at a home occupied by Challenger and his live-in companion. During the search, the weapon and ammunition were found in the kitchen area of the home. Challenger admitted to the officers that the pistol belonged to him.

The court heard that this particu-

lar weapon has been described as 'extremely dangerous'. It was first used in World War 2 and the magazine can carry up to seven rounds. There were seven rounds in the ammunition in the magazine, three of which were 'hallow point'. These rounds expand on contact with human body causing severe damage and are said to be much more dangerous than regular rounds.

Challenger was sentenced to serve three years and eight months in HMP for firearm possession and one year for the possession of ammunition. Both sentences are to run concurrently.

Ireland and Antigua and Barbuda pledge to strengthen ties after 25 years of close relations




Ambassador Karen-Mae Hill, Antigua and Barbuda Non-Resident Ambassador to Ireland, has reaffirmed the deepening partnership between Antigua and Barbuda and Ireland, guided by Ireland's Small Island Developing States (SIDS) Strategy. Antigua and Barbuda remains a key partner in shaping and implementing this Strategy.

During a visit to Dublin on May 19th which marked the 25th anniversary of diplomatic relations between Antigua and Barbuda and Ireland, Ambassador Hill engaged in a series of meetings and activities focused on celebrating Irish-Antigua and Barbuda relations over the years as well as looking ahead to new aspects of this relationship in a fast-changing geopolitical landscape.

Meetings were held with the Global Programmes Unit of the Small Island Developing States (SIDS) Directorate of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade to discuss the SIDS Ireland Fellows Programme and the outcomes of the 2024 SIDS Conference. Ireland supported this conference both financially and technically. Ambassador Hill also met with the Climate Unit of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade to explore ongoing collaboration in the blue economy. She also engaged with representatives from the EU Presidency Policy Unit and the EU and Trade Policy Division of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade to discuss Ireland's upcoming 2026 Presidency of the Council of the European Union.

Ambassador Hill took the opportunity to engage with Ireland on its upcoming Presidency of the Council of the European Union scheduled for July to December 2026. She encouraged that special attention be given to the interests and priorities of SIDS during Ireland's presidency notwithstanding the many other global issues on the EU agenda. As such, she advocated for continued Irish leadership in amplifying the SIDS agenda at the European level.

Ireland reaffirmed its support for the operationalisation of the Antigua and Barbuda Agenda for SIDS ("ABAS") including the planned Centre of Excellence for Data and the Debt Sustainability Support Service, both to be

headquartered in Antigua and Barbuda. Ireland's engagement at the United Nations, European Union, and Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development also supports advocacy around improved access to funding, water security, and implementation of the Multi-Dimensional Vulnerability Index.

Among the discussions, particular attention was given to the Ireland-SIDS Programme, Fellows through which Antigua and Barbuda has continued to benefit. The Our Shared Ocean initiative, and training partnerships with institutions such as UNCTAD, the WTO, and University College Dublin were also highlighted. Three Antiguans and Barbudans to date have been beneficiaries of Irish-sponsored scholarships reflecting Ireland's commitment to building long-term skills

and leadership in SIDS.

Discussions also focused on Ireland's pledge of €225 million annually in climate finance to include €25 million for the Loss and Damage Fund. Joint priorities include advancing the blue economy through the ProBlue Trust Fund and Blue Action Fund, and supporting climate-resilient initiatives across the Caribbean. Ireland also funds the World Maritime University's BBNJ Clinic Programme, which supports Small Island Developing States (SIDS) and Least Developed Countries (LDCs) in addressing the complexities of ratifying and implementing the Agreement on Biodiversity Beyond National Jurisdiction (BBNJ).

Ambassador Hill met with senior leaders from the National Museum of Ireland, the National Library, and the Cross Border Orchestra

of Ireland, exploring avenues for cultural exchange and heritage collaboration. Continued advocacy for Aer Lingus to operate flights from Ireland to Antigua and Barbuda remains firmly on the agenda. In a previous visit in 2023, Ambassador Hill joined EPIC - The Irish Emigration Museum to launch the "Entangled Islands - Ireland and the Caribbean" exhibition which will be showcased in Antigua and Barbuda in 2026. This exhibition explores 400 years of Irish links to the Caribbean.


Looking ahead, Ambassador Hill shared details on planning for the 2026 Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting which will be hosted in Antigua and Barbuda. The meeting discussed possible areas of support including participation in side-events on ocean research and ma-

rine based economic development.

"Ireland remains one of our strongest partners committed, consistent, and collaborative. Together we are driving sustainable solutions that serve the real needs of Small Island Developing States," said Her Excellency Karen-Mae Hill.

"In Antigua and Barbuda, Ireland has a partner in the Caribbean with shared roots from the past, shared values in the present and a shared vision and ambition for the future. There is much we can do together, for the benefit of our economies, our peoples and our shared ocean", Sharon Lennon, Head of Ireland's Office for the Caribbean stated.

Ambassador Hill was joined by Brent Scotland, Political and Consular Officer, for this visit.

Kicking Off Year Three in Style: Good Humans 268's Sculptural World Record Attempt"

Every anniversary deserves to be memorable, but Good Humans 268 Inc. doesn't do ordinary celebrations. As the organization strides into year three of climate action and disability advocacy, it's doing so with an ambitious, unofficial Guinness World Record attempt: three days, three large plastic sculptures, thirty continuous hours of creative effort.

Set from Thursday, July 3rd to Saturday, July 5th, this event is more than an artistic feat. It's a living demonstration of the organization's mission to unite environmental sustainability with inclusive community action. The sculptures, created from thousands of bottle caps collected through school projects and community clean-ups, will rise as beacons of hope, creativity, and resilience.

The event intentionally ties the symbolism of the number three — marking the third anniversary — with three public messages: sustainability, inclusion, and hope. Across these three days, the unofficial Guinness World Record attempt is more than a race against time or numbers. It is a statement: that we can create art and action side by side; that environmental responsibility and inclusion are not separate struggles but shared missions.

Visitors will be invited not only to watch but to participate: adding bottle caps, helping assemble sections, or even joining workshops on upcycling and waste management. Through this, the record attempt becomes a living classroom




and a stage for storytelling.

Carib Cement's US\$42m expansion project ready to boost production in Jamaica



Caribbean Cement Company Limited (CCCL), a subsidiary of global building materials leader, Cemex, commissioned its US\$42 million Debottleneck Project at its Rockfort facility in east Kingston last week.

Less than three years after being announced, the multifaceted project, which forms part of the company's strategic initiative to strengthen the self-sufficiency of Jamaica's cement manufacturing sector and reduce dependency on cement imports, has been safely and successfully completed. In addition to enhancing operational efficiency, the project will advance CCCL's environmental sustainability objectives in line with Cemex's 'Future in Action' strategy.

The project underscores Ce-

mex's commitment to supporting national development and fostering growth within Jamaica's construction sector, as well as the wider Caribbean region.

During the ceremony, Alejandro Ramirez, regional president for Cemex South, Central America, and the Caribbean, reaffirmed Cemex's commitment to Jamaica and the region.

"With this project, we are not only increasing our production capacity, but are actively contributing to the long-term growth of Jamaica's construction and manufacturing sectors. We believe in the potential of this region and are proud to be a catalyst for its continued progress and development," he said.

Jorge Martinez, managing director of CCCL, acknowl-

edged the significant contributions made by the Jamaican workforce towards the project's successful completion.

"More than 200 local contractors contributed to the delivery of this project, demonstrating skill, innovation, and resilience. Their efforts facilitated the sharing of technical knowledge, thereby building long-term local capacity. This is a testament to the strength and potential of Jamaican talent," he remarked.

Martinez also extended his gratitude to the Government of Jamaica, particularly recognising Prime Minister Dr Andrew Holness, and Minister of Industry, Investment, and Commerce Senator Aubyn Hill for their leadership in fostering a policy environment condu-

cive to investment, sustainability, and productivity.

In response, Holness praised Cemex for its ongoing investments in Jamaica and its vital contributions to local manufacturing.

"To the management and team at Cemex and Carib Cement, I commend your vision and partnership. You are not just investing in equipment; you are investing in Jamaica's future. You have demonstrated that local capacity can meet global standards. That innovation can be married with sustainability. That business success can support national development," he said.

Meanwhile, Hill welcomed the investment as significant. He also lauded the role played by the employers.

The scope of work for the project included the installation of a new main baghouse, a solid fuel dosing system with storage silo, CO₂ fire suppression and inerting systems, upgraded process ducts, a new compressed air system, and a kiln chimney.

The Debottleneck Project is a key development for CCCL in its efforts to enhance efficiency and sustainability in cement production, contributing to the stability and growth of Jamaica's infrastructure and economy. (Jamaica Gleaner)

The Dominica Hotel and Tourism Association announces new United Airlines flight and increased American Airlines service



The Dominica Hotel and Tourism Association has announced what it calls "a significant enhancement to the island's

growing airlift capacity": the upcoming addition of a United Airlines flight to Dominica, scheduled to commence in October 2025.

The Association released a statement acknowledging that the development marks a notable enhancement to Dominica's airlift capacity, complementing the expansion of services from American Airlines and underscoring the island's growing appeal as a premier Caribbean destination. The increased air connectivity opens new opportunities for sustained tourism growth and solidifies Dominica's position on the regional and international tourism map, stated the DHTA.

United Airlines' new flight service builds upon the success of its existing weekly flights, to Dominica from the Tri-State area and other key U.S. markets. This

increased frequency is expected to facilitate shorter, more flexible getaways and attract a broader spectrum of visitors, including adventure enthusiasts, leisure tourists, and members of the diaspora. Notably, United Airlines' flights are now available for booking for the upcoming winter season, adding options for travelers to explore the island during peak periods.

In tandem with United Airlines' expanded service, American Airlines has also increased its flights to Dominica, further enhancing the island's connectivity to major international hubs.

Commenting on the development, Kitwani Ferreria, President of the DHTA, stated, "This is a positive step forward for Dominica's tourism industry. Reliable and frequent airlift is key to driving visitor arrivals, supporting our hotel and tourism businesses, and solidifying Dominica's place on the global tourism map. These additional

flights from both United Airlines and American Airlines not only make travel easier but also signal growing confidence in Dominica as a destination of choice."

The DHTA views these enhancements in airlift capacity as an opportunity to foster stronger collaborations with international travel advisors, tour operators, and diaspora communities.

It says that increased flights are expected to lead to higher visitor spending, more opportunities for local service providers, and overall economic growth that benefits communities across the island.

The association is urging actors across the tourism sector—hotel operators, tour providers, and others—to leverage this momentum by elevating service standards, intensifying marketing efforts, and creating memorable experiences that will encourage repeat visits. (Dominica News Online)

PNM 'ready for battle'



"Stand by. Get your marching shoes ready, Get your clothes ready. The battle has just begun. They touch one. They touch all," PNM chairman Marvin Gonzales said yesterday as he vowed that the PNM would take up the challenge of defending the rights of the retrenched and the vulnerable.

Speaking at the PNM convention at the Port of Spain City Hall, Gonzales said: "If it is one thing that is going to wake up the PNM fighting spirit is now that they are going after the CEPEP workers,...the URP workers...the reforestation workers. They have touched us and we are going to respond, and we are going to respond, and we are going to respond not only in the courts, but we are going to

respond politically as well."

"Today, more than ever, our country needs us, needs the PNM to be great again. In one week, we have lost our Central Bank governor. In one week, the chief executive officer of the Water and Sewerage Authority was similarly dismissed and nine executive officials. All the (300) CEPEP contractors and, by extension, the 10,000-plus workers. We are also hearing of job cuts at the Land Settlement Agency, more job cuts at WASA and the reforestation programme. And we know that it is only a matter of time before every CEO of every State enterprise, all employed under vigorous recruitment and selection criteria, will now face the acts of hurricane and brutal (Minister Barry) Padarath,"

he said.

"Only yesterday and a short while ago, we saw the UNC PRO launch a scathing attack on Her Excellency. She perhaps might be next on the chopping block. They have launched a scathing attack against Independent senators who dare to challenge what they perceive to be an excess of power. In the Parliament, too, we witnessed the unprecedented horror of an Attorney General declaring his intention to wage war on the Opposition, and then singling out and pointing to members of the Opposition, saying, 'I intend to wage war and I am coming for you and I am coming for you. I'm coming for you'," he added. "But today, I want to tell

"But today, I want to tell (AG) John Jeremie, 'no

weapon formed against us shall prosper'. And the PNM is going to respond to you. We will respond with our feet. We will respond with our fingers and we will beat you on every single angle. We are not afraid of you, sir. We are not afraid of you....You're a tyrant."

And while other boards are being appointed, the country's singular largest earner of foreign exchange, Trinidad Petroleum Holding Limited, remains without a board, leaving companies like Heritage Petroleum and Paria Fuel rudderless and open to the vagaries of ministerial oversight by none other than Roodal Moonilal, Gonzales stated.

"It was more important to address the boards under the ambit of Barry Padarath, none of which earn foreign exchange than those that earn precious and scarce foreign exchange. After her initial flurry, the Prime Minister has stopped attending post-Cabinet press conferences, and the ministers who attend refused to answer legitimate questions posed by the media.After only two months in office. The country is already on autopilot. The Prime Minister has retreated to her mansion in Phillipine, but will undoubtedly emerge for the visit of the Indian Prime Minister this coming week," he continued.

Gonzales also accused the UNC Government of offer-

ing "millions of dollars" to PNM councillors along the East-West Corridor to cross the floor.

"As I speak to you here today, they (the UNC) are not prepared to wait for the next local government election. They are offering bribes to some of our PNM councillors to cross the floor. They can't wait for the next local government election because they believe that the PNM will emerge stronger and those corporations that they intend to take, they may not take. And at this point in time, as I speak to you, they are offering millions in bribes to some of our councillors in the East-West Corridor to cross the floor. But you will hear more of that. We will fight them there, too, because they know that they're on a slippery slope and very soon, very, very soon, they will be an unpopular squatting government," he said to cheers.

Responding to Gonzales' claim that the UNC was offering millions of dollars to PNM councillors along the East-West Corridor to cross the floor, Minister of Rural Development and Local Government and UNC deputy political Leader Khadijah Ameen said last night: "He has to be delusional. That makes no sense. We have already won the election. We are focused on fixing the mismanagement of PNM.

"There are in fact a number of PNM party members

who voted against PNM because they lost their way. He's probably only now realising because he was so disconnected from reality and focused on giving friends and family last-minute contracts."


At the convention, Gonzales urged the 100,000-plus PNM voters who (didn't come out to vote) "shouted their disapproval on Election Day", to come back

home. "As your new chairman, I want to extend my sincere apologies to all our members and our supporters who felt hurt, who felt sidelined, who felt ostracised, who felt unheard or invisible because of our actions. This afternoon, I join with my colleagues and say, 'we are sorry'. There has been enough bloodletting in two months since April.

"The time has come for

healing, for forgiveness, and for reconciliation and truth. The citizens of Trinidad and Tobago deserve a PNM that recommits itself to listening, to collaboration and to respecting its own."

Two firefighters shot dead in Idaho ambush, police say

Two US firefighters have been killed and a third wounded after a man intentionally started a fire and began shooting at first responders in a "total ambush" which lasted several hours, authorities said.

The gunman, who investigators said acted alone, began shooting after crews responded to a fire at Canfield Mountain, just north of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, on Sunday afternoon.

Law enforcement officers and firefighters came under sniper fire during the incident and a Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) team later "located a deceased male" close to where the attack took place.

The fire grew to 20 acres after it was first reported and continued to burn into Sunday night, Sheriff Bob Norris said.

"We do believe that the suspect started the fire," Norris told a late night news conference.

"This was a total ambush. These firefighters did not have a chance.

"We did lose a Coeur d'Alene firefighter, and we did lose a firefighter from the Kootenai County Fire and Rescue."

A third was "fighting for his life, but is in stable condition", he said.

Firefighters received the first report of a fire in the mountainside community at around 13:21 PST (20:21 GMT) and reports that they were being shot at emerged



about 40 minutes later, Norris said.

More than 300 law enforcement officers from the city, county, state and federal levels responded to the scene of the shooting, including two helicopters with snipers on board.

Video showed smoke billowing from heavily wooded hillsides.

Norris said the shooter used a high-powered sporting rifle to fire rapidly at first responders, with officers initially unsure of the number of perpetrators involved.

After an hours-long barrage of gunfire, the suspect was found using mobile phone location information. It was unclear whether the suspect had killed himself or been hit by an officer, Norris said. Authorities would not provide more details on weapons recovered, but said that officers would likely find more guns at the scene on Monday, once the fire was extinguished.

The motive for the shooting was not known and Norris did not provide any details on the suspect.

The two firefighters killed

and the third wounded have not been identified.

A shelter-in-place notice which alerts people to stay inside their properties or in their current locations during an emergency, rather than evacuating to a different area - was lifted some seven hours later.

Canfield Mountain is an area popular with hikers about 260 miles (420 km) east of Seattle.

Norris said that a preliminary investigation had determined that there was only one gunman, after it was earlier thought that there could have been as many as four.

He said the gunman appeared to have run while shooting and may have stashed weapons in different places.

Helicopters with heat-seeking technology flew over the area in an attempt to pinpoint the suspect, but teams experienced difficulty because of smoke from the wildfire which was still burning, according to CBS News, the BBC's US partner.

Norris added that inves-

tigators had to search the scene quickly, due to the encroaching fire, and that the information they had was still "very, very preliminary".

"A fire was rapidly approaching that body. And we had to scoop up that body and transport that body to another location," he said. Officials have appealed to the public to stay away and

the public to stay away and not to fly drones over the site.

A firefighters' union boss confirmed two of its members had been killed in the attack.

Edward Kelly, president of the International Association of Fire Fighters (IAFF) union, posted on X: "While responding to a fire earlier today in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, IAFF members were ambushed in a heinous act of violence.

Local fire chief Pat Riley told TV station KHQ he was "heartbroken" by the attack. The case was a big shock to those living in Coeur d'Alene, a city of around 56,000 people that is near the border with Washington state.

Coeur d'Alene resident Linda Tiger, 80, told the BBC she was shocked by the shooting.

"This has never happened here," said Mrs Tiger, who has lived in the city for nearly 30 years.

"But it goes to show that that no-one is safe from this kind of mental sadness." (BBC News)

Canada drops tech tax to restart US trade talks



Canada will rescind a tax on big US technology firms, just hours before first payments were due, to allow trade talks between the two countries to restart.

On Friday, US President Donald Trump called off negotiations over a trade deal, describing the tax as a "blatant attack", and threatened higher tariffs on imports from Canada.

In response, Canada has said it will introduce legislation to remove the tax and would halt the collection of payments, which were due on Monday.

The digital services tax (DST) would have meant US tech giants including Amazon, Meta, Google and Apple, facing a 3% charge on Canadian revenue above \$20m.

Canada's finance minister, François-Philippe Champagne, issued a statement saying the tax would be rescinded. "The DST was announced in 2020 to address the fact that many large technology companies operating in Canada may not otherwise pay tax on revenues generated from Canadians," it said.

"Canada's preference has always been a multilateral agreement related to digital services taxation," the statement added.

Many countries, including the UK, are changing how they tax large multinational technology firms, which have millions of customers and advertisers around the world, but high corporation tax bills due to the way their businesses are structured.

It was estimated that Canada's tax would cost the tech giants more than C\$2bn in its first year as the tax was being applied retroactively to January 2022.

Last year's federal budget estimated the tax would bring in C\$5.9bn

in total over the next five years.

Trump, who has forged a close relationship with tech company owners in his second term in office, has pushed back against such taxes.

He described Canada's policy as "egregious" adding "economically we have such power over Canada".

In a social media post on Monday, US Commerce Secretary Howard Lutnick thanked Canada for removing the tax, saying it would have "been a deal breaker for any trade deal with America".

Three quarters of Canada's goods exports go to the US, worth more than \$400bn a year, while Canada takes just 17% of US production.

In a statement, the American Chamber of Commerce hailed the move to rescind the tax.

"This is a constructive decision that allows both countries to focus on strengthening their economic partnership," said chamber president Rick Tachuk.

Canada's climbdown comes after a rollercoaster few months for US-Canada relations.

Shortly after taking office Trump threatened to impose sweeping new tariffs and even to annex the US's northern neighbour.

The antagonism helped propel Canada's Liberal Party, led by former central banker, Mark Carney, back into power.

Since then, there appeared to be a rapprochement, with Canada and the US saying they aimed to agree new trade terms by 21 July. (BBC News)

'Unprecedented' alerts in France as blistering heat grips Europe



A record number of heat alerts are in place across France as the country, and other parts of southern and eastern Europe, remain in the grip of soaring temperatures.

Some 84 of 96 of France's mainland regions - known as departments - are currently under an orange alert - the country's second highest. France's Climate Minister Agnès Pannier-Runacher has called it an "unprecedented" situation.

Heat warnings are also in place for parts of Spain, Portugal, Italy, Germany, the UK and Balkan countries including Croatia.

Both Spain and Portugal had their hottest June days on record at the weekend.

El Granado in Andalucía saw a temperature of 46C on Saturday, while 46.6C was recorded in the town of

Mora in central Portugal on Sunday.

Many countries have emergency medical services on standby and are warning people to stay inside as much as possible.

Nearly 200 schools across France have been closed or partially closed as a result of the heatwave, which has gripped parts of Europe for more than a week now but is expected to peak mid-week.

Education Minister Elisabeth Borne said she was working with regional authorities over the best ways to look after schoolchildren or to allow parents who can to keep their children at home.

Several forest fires broke out in the southern Corbières mountain range on Sunday, leading to evacuations and the closure of a motorway. They have since been contained, fire authorities told French media on Monday.

Meanwhile, 21 Italian cities are also on the highest alert - including Rome, Milan and Venice, as is Sardinia.

Mario Guarino, vice president of the Italian Society of Emergency Medicine, told AFP news agency that hospital emergency departments across the country had reported a 10% increase in heatstroke cases.

Parts of the UK could see one of the hottest June days ever on Monday, with temperatures of 34C or higher possible in some parts of England.

Much of Spain, which is on course to record its hottest June on record, also continues to be under heat alerts.

"I can't sleep well and have insomnia. I also get heat strokes, I stop eating and I just can't focus," Anabel Sanchez, 21, told Reuters news agency in Seville.

It is a similar situation in Portugal, where seven districts, including the capital, Lisbon, are on the highest alert level.

Meanwhile, the German Meteorological Service has warned that temperatures could reach almost 38C on Tuesday and Wednesday - further potentially record-breaking temperatures.

The heatwave has lowered levels in the Rhine River - a major shipping route - limiting the amount cargo ships can transport and raising freighting costs.

Countries in and around the Balkans have also been struggling with the intense heat, although temperatures have begun to cool slightly.

In Turkey, firefighters continue their efforts to put out hundreds of wild-fires that have broken out in recent days.

A fire in the Seferihisar district, 50km (30 miles) south-west of the resort city of Izmir, is being fuelled by winds and has already destroyed around 20 homes and some residential areas have had to be evacuated.

Wildfires have also broken out in Croatia, where severe heat warnings are in place for coastal areas.

Temperatures in Greece have been approaching 40C for several days and coastal towns near the capital Athens last week erupted in flames that destroyed homes - forcing people to evacuate.

On Wednesday, Serbia reported its hottest day since records began, while a record 38.8C was recorded in Sarajevo, the capital of Bosnia and Herzegovina on Thursday. In Slovenia, the hottest-ever June temperature was recorded on Saturday.

The temperature in North Macedonia's capital, Skopje, reached 42C on Friday - and are expected to continue

in that range.

While the heatwave is a potential health issue, it is also impacting the climate. Higher temperatures in the Adriatic Sea are encouraging invasive species such as the poisonous lionfish, while also causing further stress on alpine glaciers that are already shrinking at record rates.

The UN's human rights chief, Volker Turk, warned on Monday that the heatwave highlighted the need for climate adaptation - moving away from practices and energy sources, such as fossil fuels, which contribute to climate change.

"Rising temperatures, rising seas, floods, droughts, and wildfires threaten our rights to life, to health, to a clean, healthy and sustainable environment, and much more," he told the


UN's Human Rights Council.

Heatwaves are becoming more common due to human-caused climate change, according to the UN's Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.

Extreme hot weather will happen more often – and become even more intense - as the planet continues to warm, it has said.

Richard Allan, Professor of Climate Science at the University of Reading in the UK, explained that rising greenhouse gas levels are making it harder for the planet to lose excess heat.

"The warmer, thirstier atmosphere is more effective at drying soils, meaning heatwaves are intensifying, with moderate heat events now becoming extreme." (BBC News)

Thousands set up street blockades in Serbia after crackdown on protesters

Thousands of people have set up street blockades in Serbia, where tensions are boiling over after the arrest of antigovernment protesters who clashed with police at a massive night-time rally a day earlier that demanded early elections, marking a crescendo of months-long public dissent.

Protesters put up metal fences and garbage containers at various locations in the capital Belgrade late on Sunday into early Monday, also blocking a key bridge over the Sava River. Protesters in the northern city of Novi Sad pelted the offices of the ruling populist Serbian Progressive Party with eggs.

Serbian media said similar protest blockades were organised in smaller cities across the country.

Protesters are demanding that authorities release dozens of university students and others at the demonstration who were jailed for allegedly attacking the police or purportedly plotting to overthrow the government at Saturday's student-led protest in Belgrade.

At a news conference earlier on Sunday, Serbia's embattled populist leader Aleksandar Vucic accused the organisers of the protest of inciting violence and attacks on police.

"There will be many more arrested for attacking police ... this is not the end," Vucic said, accusing the protesters of causing "terror".

Clashes erupted after the of-

ficial part of the rally ended. Police used pepper spray, batons and shields while protesters threw rocks, bottles and other objects.

Critics say Vucic has become increasingly authoritarian since coming to power more than a decade ago, having served as first deputy prime minister from 2012 to 2014 and prime minister from 2014 to 2017 before becoming president, stifling democratic freedoms while allowing corruption and organised crime to flourish. He denies the accusations.

Saturday's rally was one of the largest in eight sustained months of demonstrations triggered by the roof collapse at a train station in the city of Novi Sad in November that killed 16 people – a tragedy widely blamed on entrenched corruption.

Following the outcry over the disaster, Prime Minister Milos Vucevic resigned, but the governing party continued in power, with a reshuffled government and Vucic still in office.

Authorities put the crowd's size at 36,000 – well below an independent estimate by the Archive of Public Gatherings of about 140,000.

During his news conference, Vucic also criticised "terrorists and those who tried to bring down the state", singling out University of Belgrade's head dean, Vladan Djokic, who was among the protesters. (Al Jazeera English)

Alcaraz survives scare, Sabalenka serene at Wimbledon

LONDON (Reuters) - Carlos Alcaraz survived Wimbledon's hottest-ever opening day although the Spaniard was far from his sizzling best as he began his quest for a hat-trick of titles with a scare against Fabio Fognini at the All England Club on Monday.

With air temperatures soaring to 32 degrees Celsius, Alcaraz needed more than four hours to subdue veteran Fognini, winning 7-5, 6-7(5), 7-5, 2-6, 6-1 -- the last set interrupted after a spectator became unwell in the heat and required assistance.

Women's top seed Aryna Sabalenka, bidding to win Wimbledon for the first time, had no trouble as she dispatched Canadian qualifier Carson Branstine 6-1, 7-5 but last year's runner-up, fourth seed Jasmine Paolini, was pushed hard by Latvia's Anastasija Sevastova in a 2-6, 6-3, 6-2 win.

While five-times Grand Slam champion Alcaraz, who won the Queen's Club title in the build-up, lives to fight another day, several high-profile players departed the men's draw.

No arena at Wimbledon gets as hot as bowl-like Court Two and the conditions were clearly not to the liking of ex-world number one Daniil Medvedev as the ninth seed saw his hopes scorched by Frenchman Benjamin Bonzi, who won 7-6(2), 3-6, 7-6(3), 6-2.

Eighth seed Holger Rune of Denmark, yet to really make his mark at a Grand Slam, won the opening two sets against Chilean qualifier Nicolas Jarry but succumbed 4-6, 4-6, 7-5, 6-3, 6-4.

Greece's Stefanos Tsitsipas, twice a Grand Slam runner-up was left despondent after retiring with a back injury having fallen two sets behind against French qualifier Valentin Royer.

American fifth seed Taylor Fritz looked to be on his way out before battling back to force a fifth set against big-serving Frenchman Giovanni

Mpetshi Perricard before their match was suspended with the Grand Slam's 11 p.m. curfew looming.

German third seed Alexander Zverev summoned up similar fighting spirit to draw level at one set apiece with Arthur Rinderknech in another match scheduled to resume on Tuesday.

Next up for Alcaraz is British qualifier Oliver Tarvet, who marked his Grand Slam main draw debut with a superb 6-4, 6-4, 6-4 defeat of fellow qualifier Leandro Riedi of Switzerland.

Tarvet is one of 23 British players in the singles draw, the most since 1984. The home charge was led Sonay Kartal who upset 20th seed and former French Open champion Jelena Ostapenko 7-5, 2-6, 6-2.

She was joined in round two by British number one Emma Raducanu, who comfortably passed a tricky test against Mingge Xu, one of three British teenaged wild cards to play on Monday.

When Katie Boulter later knocked out Spanish ninth seed Paula Badosa 6-2, 3-6, 6-4 on Centre Court, seven British players had enjoyed victories, the most in a single day for the home nation in the professional era.

Home hope Jacob Fearnley could not follow suit though as he was outshone 6-4, 6-1, 7-6(5) by Brazilian teenager Joao Fonseca, who showed why he is creating such a stir with carnival tennis on a steamy Court One.

Several other women's contenders sparkled in the sunshine, none more than 13th seeded American Amanda Anisimova who served up a dreaded 'double-bagel' 6-0, 6-0 defeat to Yulia Putintseva.

Ukraine's Elina Svitolina beat Anna Boindar in straight sets, while 2023 champion Marketa Vondrousova continued her return to form by knocking out American 30th seed McCartney Kessler, setting up a second-round clash with Raducanu.

Australian Open champion Madison Keys, seeded sixth, battled for two hours and 41 minutes to beat Romania's Elena Ruse. Four-times Grand Slam champion Naomi Osaka overcame some first-round jitters to beat Australian qualifier Talia Gibson, prevailing 6-4, 7-6(4).

There was a sad end for Tunisia's twice runner-up Ons Jabeur though, as she retired against Viktoriya Tomova due to illness.

After Club World Cup heatwave in US, players' union issues warning

GENEVA (AP) — Extreme heat faced by soccer players at the Club World Cup in the United States will likely be an even bigger problem at the next two men's World Cups, their global union FIFPRO warned on Monday.

The monthlong club event is being played in a heatwave in 11 American cities and union officials praised FIFA for helping to better protect players with cooling measures at games.

Still, FIFA did not take FIFPRO's pre-tournament advice to look at postponing kickoff times by several hours on the hottest days — a move that would be even more complicated at a World Cup with more commercial pressures in play and more games scheduled each day.

Six of the 16 World Cup host cities next year in the U.S., Canada and Mexico are judged by FIFPRO as "extremely high risk" for heat stress injury to players among the 48 teams. The highest risk cities are Atlanta, Dallas, Houston, Kansas, Miami, and Monterrey though some have indoor, air-conditioned stadiums.

"We are anticipating that this problem is going to be even more crucial for the coming years," FIFPRO medical director Vincent Gouttebarge told reporters in a briefing call.

The 2030 World Cup will be co-hosted in June and July by Spain, Portugal and Morocco where fewer stadiums are enclosed and cooled, and temperatures in some cities on Monday were at or above 100 degrees F.

By 2030 the hot weather prospects for the tournament there "is even perhaps worse than what we have been facing so far," Gouttebarge cautioned.

FIFPRO said extra heat mitigation measures could include 20-minute halftime breaks instead of 15 to help lower players' core temperatures, and cooling breaks in play every 15 minutes. Currently, breaks are taken in the 30th minute of each half.

FIFA was approached for comment. FIFA has reacted during the Club World Cup to lower the threshold for insisting on cooling or water breaks, plus placing more water and towels around the edge of the field.

"We are partially happy because FIFA have been quite responsive once the tournament was underway," FIFPRO CEO-like general secretary Alex Phillips said.

Better shading benches for the substitutes and more hydration breaks are also preferred by the union, which has national affiliates representing players in about 70 countries.

"All these practical things is some-

thing that we must do better," said Alexander Bielefeld, FIFPRO strategy director, though adding "at some point that probably won't be enough."

The union gave its research to FIFA ahead of the Club World Cup opening on June 14, based on weather trends in the host cities since 2014. Seven of the 11 were judged high risk with Philadelphia and Washington, DC, at the top end.

"The past few weeks was also a confirmation of our worry," Goutte-barge said, "that the heat condition would play a negative role for the performance and health of the players."

Six Club World Cup games also were stopped because of forecast electric storms nearby. The delay was nearly two hours in Charlotte during Chelsea's win in the round of 16 against Benfica.

Bridges claims fourth consecutive National Cycling Championship

After rain forced the postponement of Saturday's Inet Individual Time Trial, which comprised the first part of the dual national cycling championships, Bridges won the Elite Men's Class to claim the overall title in the Antigua and Barbuda Cycling Federation's (ABCF) Top Ranking Individual Road Race on Sunday.

Bridges secured victory, winning the elite male division by completing the five-lap road race in a time of two hours, 41 minutes, and 49.97 seconds.
