International Soca Artist Machel Montano receives 'cultural welcome'



International Soca artist, Machel Montano, arrived at the VC Bird International Airport on Tuesday morning and was warmly greeted by members of the Festivals Commission, the Antigua and Barbuda Tourism Authority as well as a cultural display featuring the traditional iron band, moko jumbie and stilt walkers.

Machel emerged from the Customs area to the sound of the iron band with dancing from the moko jumbie and the stilt walkers. It was



easy to tell that the artist appreciated this traditional Antigua and Barbuda welcome and he broke out in a broad smile; a display of his appreciation.

Just outside the terminal building, Machel became immersed in the music to the extent that he took the drum sticks from one of the drummers and began laying himself; an impromptu performance that was appreciated by the official welcome party and by onlookers at the airport.

Following several minutes participating with the performers, Machel was driven away in an SUV provided by BYD, the official ground transportation provider for the overseas artists.

Chairman of the Festival Commission, Lisa Makhoul said she is looking forward to a 'fantastic' show featuring Machel Montano who is returning to Antigua and Barbuda to perform for the first time in eight years. Machel Montano is the featured act in the *Caribbean Melting Pot* show slated for Thursday night at Carnival City (ARG).

business and with Burning Flames, with whom he enjoys a longstanding relationship celebrating their 40th anniversary this year, we felt that it would be a nice touch to bring him back for Carnival this year," she stated.

Additionally, she noted that the artist spent much time in Antigua as a youth and he also enjoys a personal friendship with Prime Minister Gaston Browne as both have worked together on several regional initiatives.

"The performance will

feature Machel, his entire band and his dancers; patrons can expect the full set of high-energy, non-stop performance of Machel at his very best. It is going to be an amazing show," she predicted.



PM Browne warns against making the annual AFRI-Caribbean Investment Forum 'another talk-shop'



Prime Minister Gaston Browne urged participants at this week's Afri-Caribbean Trade and Investment Forum

Prime Minister Gaston Browne urged participants at this week's Afri-Caribbean Trade and Investment Forum in Grenada not to make the annual meeting of African and Caribbean leaders become another 'talk-shop'.

In his contribution to a panel discussion on the future of African-Caribbean relations, PM Browne noted that the process would require action from all parties involved.

"We cannot allow this initiative to die or to become another talk-shop. The proposal to establish a commission is in my view, an excellent idea and we should establish this commission as soon as possible. However, the commission should not be limited to technocrats and bureaucrats as I believe that there should be some political direction to make sure that we can get quick action to achieve some of the 'low hanging fruits' so that we can achieve this integration between Africa and the Caribbean," he stated.

According to the prime minister it is well-known what the problems are; these include the absence of infrastructure to move people and to move goods between both points, noting that he believes that the wherewithal to achieve these ambitions currently exists.

"I believe we can have a strong partnership between the public and private sectors where we can utilize not only the ideas but also the funding to create sustaining air and sea links between Africa and the Caribbean," he noted.

PM Browne observed that if the challenge of moving people and goods remains unresolved, then the efforts of all currently involved would be unsuccessful.

Looking ahead, the Antigua and Barbuda leader said he is looking forward to the Africa-Caribbean summit slated for Addis Ababa, Ethiopia later this year as he made the case for a 'full commitment' from the leaders to establish those air and sea links.

He suggested that a study should be done to determine how best to establish those air and sea links between the two regions and to seek about attracting the necessary investments. He is suggesting also that the Africa-Import-Export Bank could possible provide the 'seed money' for such ventures.





The sessions, the connections, and the energy were exactly what I needed. I'm grateful for the opportunity and the family I've found in Nolan Hue."



essential for the festival's future. The brass bands must look to this model, embracing and nurturing the next generation to ensure their own enduring legacy and the overall dynamism of Carnival. The future sounds like steel, vibrant and young.

"Carnival is bacchanal", a tired refrain oft repeated. We must vehemently resist this negative designation of our culture. It is a pejorative label we MUST NOT continue to internalize. Instead, we must take responsibility. Responsibility for its artistic development, for ensuring safety and respect within the revelry, for amplifying its global reach and most importantly, for proudly identifying with it. This vibrant, complex, historically-rooted celebration is after all, who we are. It is our story, our catharsis, our creativity unleashed.


Happy Carnival 2025! As you revel in

Australia complete 5-0 series sweep over West Indies

Shimron Hetmyer led the West Indies batting by hitting a half-century during the fifth and final T20 International against Australia at Warner Park in St. Kitts on Monday, July 28, 2025.

Australia put the hapless West Indies out of their misery with a three-wicket win in the fifth and final match to complete a 5-0 T20 International series sweep at Warner Park in St. Kitts on Monday evening.

The West Indies, after losing a fifth

consecutive toss, were put in to bat for the fifth time in the series.

The hosts were bowled out for 170 with two ball to spare in their innings with left-handers Shimron Hetmyer and Sherfane Rutherford doing the bulk of the scoring.

The top three of Brandon King (11), captain Shai Hope (9) and Keacy Carty (1) all fell early before Rutherford and Hetmyer added 32 for the fourth wicket. That partnership ended when Rutherford fell for a 17-ball 35, including six fours and a six.

Hetmyer went on to lead the scoring with 52 off 31 balls, including three fours and three sixes, while Jason Holder and Matthew Forde also chipped in late with 20 and 15, respectively.

Left-arm pacer Ben Dwarshuis picked up three for 41 from his four overs, while right-arm quick Nathan Ellis supported well with two for 32 from his 3.4 overs.

Australia then needed only 17 overs to achieve victory at 173 for seven and secure the series sweep.

After losing captain Mitchell Marsh (14), Glenn Maxwell (0) and Josh Inglis (10) early, Cameron Green and Tim David set out to punish the West Indian bowling.

David, returning to the line-up for the first time since his blistering hundred in the third game, was brutal again, needing just 12 balls to make 30, thanks to four towering sixes and one four, while Green hit five fours on his way to 32 off 18 balls.

Mitchell Owen led the scoring with 37 off 17 balls, including three fours and three sixes, while Aaron Hardie finished on 28 not out.

Akeal Hosein was excellent with ball in hand for the hosts with three for 17 from his four overs, while Alzarri Joseph and Jason Holder each picked up two wickets.

The West Indies will look to rebound quickly when they take on Pakistan in three T20Is and three ODIs from July 31 to August 12 in Lauderhill, Florida, and Tarouba in Trinidad and Tobago.

Hope looks ahead as Windies regroup after Aussie rout

Though still nursing the wounds of a bruising five-match T20 series whitewash at the hands of Australia, West Indies white-ball captain Shai Hope is urging his team to quickly reset, with another daunting challenge looming — a series against Pakistan.

While the sting of the 5-0 loss remains fresh, Hope isn't dwelling in disappointment. Instead, he's using the harsh lessons from the Australian onslaught as fuel, emphasizing that improved execution across all departments is the key to bouncing back.

"We've just got to be a little more consistent in all three areas," Hope admitted. "There were games where we started well with the bat and fell away at the back end, or vice versa. Against a team like Australia, you can't afford those lapses — you've got to put your best games together."

Australia's dominance was clinical and unrelenting, but Hope sees value in the exposure, particularly in observing how the opposition approached every moment with precision and purpose.

"I thought they executed really well, especially with the ball," he said. "They had clear plans, and you could see it. Whether it was a certain phase of the

innings or a specific match situation, they always knew what they wanted to do — and they did it."

What impressed the skipper even more was the Aussie aggression with the bat

"They never let up," Hope added. "Even when we picked up wickets in the powerplay, they just kept pressing. On a small ground and a good surface like Saint Kitts, they made it tough for our bowlers to settle."

Despite the series result, Hope was heartened by signs of fight from the West Indies, particularly in the final two games where the bowlers began to find their rhythm and purpose.

"There were definite signs of progress. The bowlers fought — that's something we can build on."

But if the Windies are to begin turning promise into performance, Hope knows it will take more than just glimpses of brilliance.

"We show we can compete with the best, but if we're not putting the full game together — batting, bowling, and fielding — we'll always be playing catch-up. It's about stringing those winning passages together more consistently."

As fans digest another tough series defeat, Hope

was quick to acknowledge their unwavering support, asking them to stay the course with the team.

"We feel it too," he said.
"We want to win, probably even more than they
do. So we just ask them to
keep supporting us. We're
working to get the formula right. Once we do, we'll
keep pressing that success
button."

With Pakistan next in line, there's no time to dwell. Preparation has already begun.

"It's a quick turnaround. We've got plans in place and we're locked in on execution. If we raise that level, I'm confident we'll come out on top this time."

Outgoing BCA president Riley reflects on tenure

After seven years at the helm of the Barbados Cricket Association (BCA), Conde Riley has formally announced that he will not seek re-election as president, a decision he described as difficult but necessary.

Riley, who has served since 2017, issued a reflective statement on his tenure, as he underscored both the accomplishments and challenges that defined his three terms in office.

"Over my tenure on the board, I would like to think that I have played a pivotal role in the growth, development, and success of the organisation, and the sport of cricket within Barbados, but also across the wider region," he said.

He noted that his presidency was shaped by a commitment to "strong governance, strategic innovation, and an enduring dedication to cricket at all levels, from grassroots initiatives to elite competition, including the women's game."


Riley recalled assuming leadership of the BCA at what he called "a critical juncture," but said he was proud of the strides made under his stewardship.

With the support of successive boards, he championed youth engagement and led efforts to improve infrastructure, moves he believes helped elevate the sport's local standard and regional standing.

"These efforts not only elevated the standard of cricket within the country but also enhanced its reputation nationally and regionally," Riley stated.

Looking back, Riley expressed pride in a legacy he hopes will be remembered for promoting inclusivity and prioritising the sport's long-term development.

As he steps aside, he extended his gratitude to those who supported him throughout his tenure and offered well wishes to his successor. He also urged the incoming leadership to remain focused on advancing Caribbean cricket both regionally and on the global stage.



Antiguans fail to advance at World Swimming Championships

Antigua and Barbuda's Bianca Mitchel and Naeem DeSouza have failed to advance from their first-round heats at the World Swimming Championships in Singapore.

Bianca Mitchell bowed out after her first-round heat in the women's 200-meter freestyle race on Monday evening.

The 24-year-old Bianca Mitchell missed out on qualifying for Tuesday's semi-finals after finishing in fourth place in the first of five opening round heats.

Bianca Mitchell clocked a time of two minutes and 11.40 seconds in Heat 1, which was won by Harper Barrowman of the Cayman Islands in a time of two minutes and 08.28 seconds.

Hiruki De Silva of Sri Lanka staved off a stiff challenge from Jehanara Nabi of Pakistan to clinch second place in two minutes and 09.23 seconds. Nabi finished in third place in two minutes and 09.88 seconds.

The final of the women's 200-meter freestyle event will take place on Wednesday.

DeSouza bowed out of the men's 50-meter butterfly event after clocking a personal best to finish third in Heat 2 on Sunday. DeSouza clocked 26.52 seconds in Heat 1, which was won by Jeno Heyns of Suriname.

The men's 50-meter butterfly event was won by 26-year-old Maxime Grousset of France. Grousset clocked 22.48 seconds to win the final. Noe Ponti of Switzerland took second place, and Thomas Ceccon of Italy finished in third place.

The 18-year-old DeSouza

will also compete in Heat 1 of the men's 100-meter butterfly event on Thursday.

Bianca Mitchell and Naeem DeSouza are part of a four-member team that is representing Antigua and Barbuda at the World Swimming Championships in Singapore from July 24 to August 1.

The other Antiguans at the event are male swimmer Stefano Mitchell and female swimmer Aunjelique Liddie.

The 25-year-old Stefano Mitchell was slated to launch his campaign by contesting Heat 5 of the men's 100-meter freestyle event on Tuesday night.

Stefano Mitchell will also compete in Heat 8 of the men's 50-meter freestyle event on Friday.

The 17-year-old Aunjelique Liddie is set to launch her campaign in Heat 5 of the women's 100-meter

freestyle races on Wednesday. Liddie is also slated to compete in the women's 50-meter freestyle event on Friday.

Leading the team into this international arena is Coach Wayne Mitchell, who brings years of experience and passion for the sport. Also accompanying the athletes is Anna Mitchell, who is serving as the team manager, ensuring smooth coordination and support throughout the competition.

Additionally, the president of the Antigua and Barbuda Swimming Federation (ABSF), Edith Clashing, represented the national federation at the World Swimming Congress on Tuesday, July 29.

Clashing will also take up an assignment with the World Masters Championships as a member of the World Masters Technical Committee from August 5 to 15.
