Antigua and Barbuda Raises Concerns Over OECS Treatment Within CARICOM

Prime Minister of Antigua and Barbuda, the Hon. Gaston Browne, has voiced strong concerns regarding the treatment of Organisation of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) members within the broader Caribbean Community (CAR-ICOM), warning that the sub-regional group is being subjected to what he described as "benign neglect."

Speaking on the first full day of deliberations at the 49th Regular Meeting of the Conference of Heads of Government of CARICOM, Prime Minister Browne raised the issue during the plenary session under the agenda item concerning the CARICOM Single Market and Economy (CSME).

"We ought not to be treated with benign neglect, in the same way the international community treats us," Prime Minister Browne stated, highlighting long-standing grievances from OECS member states about disparities within CARICOM's integration framework.

The CSME, which facilitates the free movement of goods, skills, labour, and services across the region, has recently come under scrutiny. In addition to Prime Minister Browne, both St. Vincent and the Grenadines Prime Minister Dr. Ralph Gonsalves and St. Lucia's Opposition Leader

Allen Chastanet have also raised concerns over the inequitable treatment of OECS countries within the regional bloc.

Dr. Gonsalves reiterated his disappointment during Monday's session, stating that despite being sovereign, full members of CAR-ICOM, OECS nations have yet to see the benefits promised under Chapter 7 of the Revised Treaty of Chaguaramas, which speaks to disadvantaged countries, regions, and sectors.

"That hasn't happened," he said plainly.

Echoing that sentiment, Prime Minister Browne emphasized that the OECS continues to be a committed partner in regional integra-

"We do not wish to be the absolute losers in CAR-ICOM," Browne said. "There must be compensatory mechanisms to ensure that OECS states benefit meaningfully from integration and the Revised Treaty."

He further noted that repeated advocacy on this matter has been largely ignored over the years.

"The time has come for this issue to be addressed seriously, rather than continually overlooked," he asserted.

Among the key concerns raised was the failure to fully implement the Owen Arthur Study, which exposed structural imbalances and the unequal distribution of benefits within the CSME. Prime Minister Gonsalves specifically criticized the current tariff structure, which he argued disproportionately favours larger economies like Trinidad and Tobago, allowing them to dominate regional manufacturing, while leaving OECS states heavily dependent on imports.

Both Prime Ministers also expressed frustration at the failure of some larger CARICOM member states to meet their financial obligations to the CARICOM Development Fund (CDF), a mechanism intended to assist less developed countries within the community.

In closing, Prime Minister Browne lent his full support to Prime Minister Gonsalves' remarks, particularly regarding the long-standing CLICO/BA-ICO matter, and called for a formal meeting between the OECS and Trinidad and Tobago to address the unresolved issues. The collapse of CLICO and BAICO (British American Insurance Company) 2009 caused significant financial disruption across OECS territories, triggering prolonged economic and legal challenges.

Prime Minister Browne calls for CARICOM to embrace the Debt Sustainability Support Servicing (DSSS)



Prime Minister Gaston A. Browne is calling on CARICOM to enshrine the Debt Sustainability Support Servicing (DSSS) into its advocacy efforts which is contained within the Antigua and Barbuda Agenda for SIDS (ABAS) and which is supported by the Fourth International Conference on Finance for Development (FfD4).

PM Browne made the point during his contribution to the debate on Climate Change and the Climate Finance Agenda at the 49th Regular Meeting of the Conference of Heads of Government of CARICOM now underway in Jamaica.

The Prime Minister stated that the upcoming COP30 to be held in Belém, Brazil presented an opportunity for Small Island Developing States (SIDS) to increase climate advocacy efforts in climate adaptation, mitigation, and Loss and Damage to ensure that large polluting nations honour their commitments to preserve the wellbeing of the planet and its citizens.

He remarked that momentum must not be lost heading into COP30, as the survival of SIDS was dependent on the advocacy efforts of each CARICOM Member State. Moreover, Prime Minister Browne further called for the adequate revitalization and capitalization of the Loss and Damage Fund, which would greatly assist SIDS in their fight against climate change.

Given the high rate of debt amongst SIDS, the Prime Minister mentioned

that CARICOM should ensure that the DSSS is included in any advocacy efforts surrounding climate financing, as it is supported and contained within the UN framework regarding climate change. He stated that while the DSSS seeks to benefit all SIDS, CARICOM should continue to demonstrate strident leadership in the fight against climate change through the inclusion of this important initiative.

Furthermore, Prime Minister Browne urged his colleague Heads (of Government) to explore the establishment of a carbon pricing market to monetize on climate mitigation, due in particular to the region's large ocean space, to raise financing to mitigate against climate change.





MINISTER MATTHEW LEADS READINESS WALKTHROUGH OF CARNIVAL CITY





Antigua and Barbuda's iconic Antigua Recreation Grounds (ARG) is rapidly transforming into Carnival City, the epicenter for Antigua Carnival 2025. During an onsite inspection by Hon. Daryll S. Matthew, Minister of Education, Sports & Creative Industries, Ms. Petley O'Keiffe, Director of National Festivals, and Mr. Everton Barnes, Editor of Point Express, a firsthand look at the upgraded venue and its enhanced safety, accessibility and patronexperience features was done.

"Every adjustment we make, whether widening a gate or adjusting the position of the stage, is about enhancing the experience for patrons by providing a Carnival that is safer, more inclusive and absolutely unforgettable," said Minister Matthew during the walk-through.

Key Upgrades Unveiled and Noted during the Walkthrough

Streamlined Access and Traffic Flow: A newly widened gate will now serve as the primary backstage en*trance* for parking and service vehicles to enter the grounds. This move elim-



inates the need for vehicular traffic through the vendor's courtyard within ARG. Furthermore, during Panorama, where larger trucks require access to the backstage area, this gate will reduce the wear and tear on the outer field.

Protecting the Historic Cricket Stage Redesign for Superior Sound,

Pitch. all vehicular movement across the cricket square has been prohibited. Only foot traffic and select seating (e.g., for Queen of Carnival) will be permitted, ensuring ARG remains an internationalstandard practice venue postCarnival.

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the main stage has been adjusted, dramatically improving acoustics and expanding audience visibility. Lighting and sound installation will be completed by 10 July, ahead of "Aunty Claudette Kiddies Fete" opening, which will be our first Carnival City-sanctioned event on 13 July.

Modern Backstage Facilities, featuring a state-of-the-art change room facility and a redesigned backstage layout, will replace last year's individual change room facilities, which were separated by secure fencing to ensure performer privacy and efficient crowd management.

Zero-Tolerance Policy on Glass & Cans: To safeguard patrons and the playing surface, glass bottles and canned beverages are strictly prohibited. Vendors must serve drinks in paper cups; non-compliance will attract fines or removal.

Venue Operations Command Centre (VOCC), the former media building has been recommissioned as the command post staffed by Emergency Medical Services, Royal Police Force of Antigua and Barbuda, Antigua and Barbuda Defence Force, Security, Red Cross and the Central Board of Health,



providing realtime monitoring and rapidresponse capability.

Expanded Vendor's Courtyard & VIP Amenities, a carefully laid out Vendor Village complete with benches, a bigscreen for viewing, and all-day activities will keep Carnival City buzzing even on rehearsal days.

Title sponsors will host an upgraded VIP lounge, while décor teams drape

the Andy Roberts Stand in Carnival colours, and a 3D "Antigua Carnival 25" selfie spot will be the focal point for capturing the experience.

What's Next, Infrastructure works conclude in mid-July, after which focus shifts fully to final rehearsals and show production. Upcoming highlights include:




AT&LU celebrates the completion of training for its staff

General Secretary Alrick Daniel reflected on the long history of the An-




tigua and Barbuda Trades & Labour Union is educating workers, from its inception during the planation era through to present day.



Anderson sworn in as 4th CCJ president, calls on region to fulfil promise of judicial sovereignty



Fifteen years after joining the Caribbean Court of Justice (CCJ) as its youngest judge, Jamaica-born Justice Winston Anderson has reached a new milestone.

Anderson was sworn in as the court's fourth president on the cusp of CARICOM's 49th Regular Heads of Government Meeting in Montego Bay, St James on Sunday at the Jewel Grande Resort in Rose Hall, also in St James.

Delivering his inaugural address before regional leaders, including Jamaica's Prime Minister Dr Andrew Holness and Governor General Sir Patrick Allen, Anderson issued a direct and passionate appeal for CAR-ICOM states, particularly Jamaica, to fulfil their treaty obligations and accede to the CCJ's appellate jurisdiction.

"It was on the 15th of June 2010 that I was sworn in as a judge of the Caribbean Court of Justice at King's House in Kingston," Anderson recalled. "Today's event would not have been within the reach of my most active imagination."

Anderson paid tribute to his predecessors, presidents Michael de la Bastide, Sir Dennis Byron, and Adrian Saunders, crediting them with building the foundation of what he described as "an institution of excellence".

Anderson's own journey began in rural St Ann, Jamaica. Raised in modest circumstances, he credited his early community for instilling values of discipline, integrity, and perseverance. His legal career was shaped by regional institutions; first as a student at The University of the West Indies (UWI), then as a lecturer at Cave Hill, and later as general counsel to CARICOM.

"I entered the Faculty of Law at Mona in 1980. My first teachers were Dr Derek McCoy, now attorney general of Jamaica, and Mr Delroy Chuck, now minister of justice," he said.

Anderson used the platform to reaffirm the importance of the CCJ as a symbol of Caribbean maturity and independence.

"Beginning in the 1960s, we extracted our political independence from the United Kingdom. Forty years later, we created an institution worthy of our judicial sovereignty," he said.

In a poignant moment, he looked directly at the audience and added, "I am hopeful that during my tenure, other states will fulfil their treaty obligations and become full members of the appellate jurisdiction."

Jamaica, which hosts the CCJ's inauguration this year, remains one of the countries yet to join the court in its appellate capacity.

Anderson emphasised that the CCJ was not imposed on the Caribbean by any foreign power.

"It was conceived and established by the people of the Caribbean to serve Caribbean interests," he stated, noting that even beyond its five appellate states, Barbados, Belize, Guyana, Dominica, and St Lucia, its judgments are cited in nearly every common law Caribbean jurisdiction.

Promising to intensify the court's itinerant sittings, Anderson said he wanted "the people of the region to see us, interact with us, and realise that we are, in fact, their kith and kin".

Holness, in his remarks, described Anderson's appointment as a "moment of pride, not only for Jamaica, but for the entire region".

"You bring to this office a distinguished legal mind and decades of service grounded in scholarship and vision," the prime minister

said. He praised Anderson's work on the appellate and original jurisdictions and his role as founding chair of the CCJ Academy for Law.

Looking ahead, Holness affirmed Jamaica's continued commitment to regional legal cooperation, stating: "We believe that the Caribbean Court of Justice, under this new leadership, will continue to inspire confidence, protect rights, and shape a region where justice is accessible, relevant, and transformative."

Anderson's predecessor, Justice Adrian Saunders, who has worked alongside him for 15 years, described the occasion as very special.

"He is a brilliant and tireless jurist. He is ideally suited and extremely well prepared for the enhanced role he is set to play," he said, highlighting Anderson's deep involvement in the court's legal reasoning, strategic direction, and regional judicial reform.

Having written or co-authored more than 30 opinions and sat on every major case involving the Revised Treaty of Chaguaramas, Anderson has already shaped the legal fabric of the Caribbean. As chair of the CCJ's Strategic Planning Committee and the Academy for Law, he has led efforts that extended far beyond the bench, including the landmark Needham Point Declaration, a judicial blueprint to reduce crime and improve justice systems across the region. Mia Mottley pushes for regional sea, air cargo revolution at CARICOM summit



Barbados Prime Minister Mia Mottley has declared that the Caribbean is on the cusp of a long-overdue transportation breakthrough, urging regional leaders to demonstrate the political will needed to finally democratise movement across the region.

Speaking with conviction at Sunday's opening ceremony of the 49th Regular Meeting of the CARICOM Heads of Government, hosted at the Montego Bay Convention Centre, Mottley revealed that member states are now taking concrete steps to solve the chronic challenges of intra-regional transport.

The Heads of Government meeting, which is being chaired by Jamaica, under the leadership of Prime Minister Dr Andrew Holness is taking place under the theme 'People, Partnerships, Prosperity- Promoting a Secure, and Sustainable Future'.

"I am happy to report that there are at least two Caribbean member states that are now in the process of looking to acquire cargo planes to help us overcome the very difficult prospect of the movement of goods within this region," Mottley announced to rousing applause from delegates.

For decades, Caribbean nations have grappled with the high costs and logistical inefficiencies associated with transporting both goods and people between islands. Mottley's comments signalled a renewed effort to address those concerns with solutions driven by both governments and the private sector.

Equally, I anticipate that at this meeting at Montego Bay, we are going to have the presentation of the entire island regional ferry from the private sector," she added. "And at this point it is up to us to determine whether we have the political will to finally ensure that we democratise travel through ships, yet again in this region."

With her characteristic blend of his-

torical insight and forward-looking vision, Mottley, who has led CAR-ICOM as chairman over the last six months, reminded her colleagues of the region's legacy of maritime connection, one that has been neglected in favour of costly air travel.

"Knowing full well that the Federal Maple and the Federal Palm, these were examples of it many decades ago, and that we have allowed ourselves to become purely at the mercy of air travel — without recognising that as islands in the Caribbean Sea, we have the ability to reach each other in good time and cheaper fares than if we only use air to connect our region."

Her remarks struck a chord with regional stakeholders long frustrated by the collapse of air carriers such as LIAT, the limited affordability of commercial flights, and the impact of disrupted trade routes on food security.

Mottley's call was not just a logistical plea but a pointed challenge to the region's political leadership.

"At the heart of it all," she urged, "is the question of political will. The capacity to change our fortunes lies in our hands."

The 49th CARICOM Summit comes at a critical time, as the region seeks to deepen integration, strengthen economic resilience, and craft joint responses to global shocks, all of which hinge on improved connectivity.

The bold initiatives hinted at by Prime Minister Mottley now shift the spotlight onto the region's collective resolve: will Caribbean leaders rise to meet the moment? (*Jamaica Gleaner*)

Protesters urge CARICOM to cut ties with Israel amid Gaza crisis

Protesters gathered outside the Montego Bay Convention Centre in St James on Sunday afternoon, calling for regional leaders attending the 49th CARICOM Heads of Government Meeting to sever diplomatic ties with Israel over its ongoing military campaign in Gaza.

The peaceful demonstration, organised by members of the Palestinian Solidarity Action Group in Jamaica and the international Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions (BDS) movement, took place just ahead of the summit's opening ceremony.

"We are here to ask CAR-ICOM to cut all diplomatic ties with Israel," said Howard Simpson, a member of the local solidarity group.

"We want to see an end to the genocide in Gaza and the war crimes taking place in Palestine."

Simpson said the group has not had formal discussions with government officials but has sent letters to CAR-ICOM prime ministers and ministers of foreign affairs.



"Some of those letters are also available to the public," he told The Gleaner.

Maren Mantovani, from the BDS National Committee, said CARICOM countries must take a stand.

"Much of the military equipment shipped to Israel is moving under Caribbean flags. This must stop," she asserted. "Israeli soldiers are vacationing in the Caribbean before returning to the killing fields. The region must not be a safe haven for war criminals."

She outlined three demands: stop military shipping under Caribbean flags, end visa-free travel for Israeli citizens, and cut diplomatic ties while joining international sanctions efforts.

"We're asking CARICOM to take a stand, just as it did against South African apartheid," Mantovani said.

The protest remained peaceful under the watchful eyes of members of the security forces as leaders from across the region arrived for the high-level talks. (Jamaica Gleaner)

Suriname's parliament elects country's first female president amid economic turmoil



Suriname's parliament Sunday elected physician Jennifer Geerlings-Simons as the troubled country's first female president.

The South American country's National Assembly chooses the president by a two-thirds vote.

Geerlings-Simons, a congresswoman, ran unopposed after her party formed a coalition aimed at ousting the country's current leader following a May election with no clear winner.

The coalition was formed as the troubled country prepares for an influx of wealth following the discovery of major offshore oil deposits, with the first production expected by 2028.

Geerlings-Simons, who leads the National Democratic Party, will be inaugurated as president of the Dutch-speaking country of more than 646,000 people on July 16.

""I am aware that the heavy task I have taken on is further aggravated by the fact that I am the first woman to serve the country in this position," she said after the election.

The five-year term of President Chandrikapersad Santokhi has been riddled with corruption scandals, and he was forced to call on the International Monetary Fund to get Suriname's economy back on track.

As a result, the country's public debt was largely restructured and government subsidies were significantly reduced.

Macroeconomically, Santokhi achieved success, but people groaned under the austerity measures, which sparked violent protests.

Geerlings-Simons, 71, and her run-

ning mate, Gregory Rusland, on Sunday told reporters they will prioritise stabilising the country's finances.

She had previously indicated an interest in increasing state revenues by, among other things, improving tax collections, including in the small-scale gold-mining sector.

Winston Ramautarsingh, former chairman of Suriname's Association of Economists, said Geerlings-Simons will face serious challenges in the years before the country produces its first barrels of oil, in part because it must repay about \$400 million annually in loans and interest.

"Suriname does not have that money," he said. "The previous government rescheduled the debts, but that was only a postponement." (*Jamaica Gleaner*)

Musk said he's forming new political party after split with Trump over tax cuts law

Elon Musk said he's carrying out his threat to form a new political party after his fissure with President Donald Trump, announcing the America Party in response to the president's sweeping tax cuts law.

Musk, once an ever-present ally to Trump as he headed up the slashing agency known as the Department of Government Efficiency, broke with the Republican president over his signature legislation, which was signed into law Friday.

As the bill made its way through Congress, Musk threatened to form the "America Party" if "this insane spending bill passes."

"When it comes to bankrupting our country with waste & graft, we live in a one-party system, not a democracy," Musk said Saturday on X, the social media company he owns. "Today, the America Party is formed to give you back your freedom."

The formation of new political parties is not uncommon, but they typically struggle to pull any significant support away from the Republican and Democratic parties. But Musk, the world's richest man who spent at least \$250 million supporting Trump in the 2024 election, could impact the 2026 elections determining control of Congress if he is willing to spend significant amounts of money.

His reignited feud with the president could also be costly for Musk, whose businesses rely on billions of dollars in government contracts and publicly traded company Tesla has taken a hit in the market.

t wasn't clear whether Musk had taken steps to formally create the new political party. Spokespeople for Musk and his political action committee, America PAC, didn't immediately comment Sunday.

As of Sunday morning, there were multiple political parties listed in the



Federal Election Commission database that had been formed in the the hours since Musk's Saturday X post with versions of "America Party" of "DOGE" or "X" in the name, or Musk listed among people affiliated with the entity.

But none appeared to be authentic, listing contacts for the organization as email addresses such as "wentsnow-boarding@yahoo.com" or untraceable Protonmail addresses.

Musk on Sunday spent the morning on X taking feedback from users about the party and indicated he'd use the party to get involved in the 2026 midterm elections. (Jamaica Gleaner)

South Africa's police minister accused of links to criminal gangs



Police Minister Senzo Mchunu has been accused of having ties to criminal gangs and of meddling in police investigations into politically motivated murders.

These explosive allegations were made by KwaZulu-Natal police boss Nhlanhla Mkhwanazi at a press briefing on Sunday.

He said Mr Mchunu was receiving financial support from an allegedly corrupt businessman to fund his "political endeayours".

Mr Mchunu has since denied what he says are "wild allegations" while President Cyril Ramaphosa said they were of "grave national security concern" and "receiving the highest priority attention".

Gen Mkhwanazi detailed a sequence of events he claims led to the "orchestrated" disbandment of a task force set up in 2018 to investigate the killing of politicians, mainly in KwaZulu-Natal. Gen Mkhwanazi said the team's in-

vestigations had uncovered links to high-profile individuals — including politicians, police officials, and businesspeople tied to a drug cartel syndicate - and this is why the team was disbanded.

When he dissolved the unit earlier this year, Mchunu said it was not adding value in the province, despite many cases remaining unsolved.

According to Gen Mkhwanazi, a total of 121 case files were allegedly removed from the unit on the minister's instruction and without the authorisation of his boss, the national police commissioner General Fannie Masemola.

"These case dockets have, since March, been sitting at the head office ever since without any investigation work done on them. Five of these dockets already had instructions to [effect] arrests."

The provincial police chief also alleged Mr Mchunu had ties to a con-

troversial businessman who was "financially supporting" the minister's political career.

Vusimuzi Matlala had a lucrative contract with the police before it was abruptly cancelled when he was arrested for attempted murder in May. Gen Mkhwanazi shared copies of text messages and a payment allegedly made by Mr Matlala to prove this.

Gen Masemola, on his part, said he would address these allegations later in the week when he announces the appointment of the temporary crime intelligence boss.

Criminal intelligence chief Lt-Gen Dumisani Khumalo was arrested over fraud and corruption allegations last month.

Gen Khumalo and the other six had been linked to an ongoing investigation into alleged abuse of intelligence funds and potentially unlawful appointments within the South African Police Service (SAPS). (BBC News)

Owners of escaped pet lion arrested after it attacks three people

Police in Pakistan have arrested the owners of a pet lion that attacked a woman and her two young children after it escaped.

Dramatic CCTV footage from the eastern city of Lahore showed how the big cat leapt over a concrete wall and chased the woman down as terrified onlookers ran for safety.

The woman and her children, aged five and seven, sustained injuries to their arms and faces but are now in stable condition, authori-

ties said.

Police have accused the lion's owners of keeping a wild animal without a licence and negligence leading to its escape. The lion was captured and moved to a wildlife park.

Big cats as pets are a status symbol in Pakistan, where it is legal to keep lions, cheetahs, tigers, pumas and jaguars after registering them and paying a one-time fee of 50,000 rupees (\$176; £129) per animal.

However, such cats must be housed outside city limits. Lahore, located in Punjab province, is Pakistan's second-largest city.

The children's father claimed that the lion's owners stood by and watched as their pet clawed at his family on Wednesday. He said they did not do anything to restrain it.

The video showed the woman picking herself up then running back to seek help from onlookers, some of whom were seen running in panic.

Days after the incident, authorities in Punjab launched a crackdown on illegal wild-life possession. They have arrested five people and recovered 13 lions since.

In January, a Pakistani You-Tube star was ordered to create animal welfare videos as punishment for illegally owning a lion cub.

Rajab Butt, who has 5.6 million subscribers, was given the cub as a wedding gift. (BBC News)

Nairobi locked down as Kenya police clash with protesters, injuring one



Police in Kenya clashed with demonstrators Monday during anti-government protests as the authorities blocked major roads leading into the capital, Nairobi, and most businesses closed.

Protesters lit bonfires and hurled stones at police in roadblocks and police fired and hurled teargas canisters, injuring one demonstrator.

Associated Press journalists witnessed an injured person being carried by protesters who were chanting against police.

Kenyans had planned demonstrations on July 7 to protest police brutality, poor governance, and to demand President William Ruto's resignation over alleged corruption and the high cost of living.

July 7, known as Saba Saba, is a significant date in Kenya's recent history, marking the first major protests 35 years ago that called for a transition

from a one-party state to a multi-party democracy, which was realized in the 1992 elections. Saba Saba is Swahili for Seven Seven, representing July 7.

Police officers were stopping private and public vehicles from accessing the city centre. They were also blocking most pedestrians from entering the capital, only allowing through those deemed to have essential duties.

There is no reversing the Gen Z Saba Saba-like spirit," said Macharia Munene, professor of history and international relations at United States International University Africa in Nairobi. "Attempt to criminalize protests is reactive and will not work. It instead makes the government appear retrogressive and desperate enough to subvert the constitution."

Public Service Minister Geoffrey

Ruku had urged all government employees to report to work on Monday, insisting that the demonstrations would not disrupt public services.

Interior Minister Kipchumba Murkomen said on Sunday that the government would not tolerate violent protests and that police would be deployed to ensure public safety.

The roads leading to the country's parliament and the president's office were barricaded using razor wire.

In the outskirts of the city in Kitengela town, police fired tear gas Monday to disperse protesters who had lit bonfires on the road that connects to neighbouring Tanzania.

They have blocked the roads, blocking us from our work. I am a road-side vendor and I am supposed to get to town and buy merchandise to sell along the road," said protester Caleb Okoth. "What do they want us to eat? People are being beaten like dogs for protesting for their rights."

The country has recently experienced a wave of violent demonstrations, initially sparked by calls for police accountability following the death of a blogger in police custody.

During protests on June 17, a civilian was shot at close range by police officers, further angering the public and prompting plans for additional demonstrations.

On June 25, at least 16 people were killed and more than 400 injured during protests against police brutality, which were timed to coincide with the one-year anniversary of anti-tax protests where over 60 people lost their lives. (*Jamaica Gleaner*)

Leewards get first win in West Indies Under-19 Tournament

After losing their opening round encounter to the Windward Islands, the Leeward Islands rebounded to secure their first win in the 2025 West Indies Rising Stars Under-19 50-Over Tournament in St. Kitts on Sunday.

The Leeward Islands pulled off a three-wicket win against USA 2 in their second-round match at St. Mary's Park. The USA 2 made 141 all out in 31.1 overs. Ansh Bhoje scored 28. Captain Matthew Miller of Antigua bagged four for 23, and Isra-el Morton claimed three for 34.

Miller then slammed an unbeaten 52 to lead the Leewards to victory at 145 for seven in 40.3 overs. Rahul Basu took three for 24, Ritvik Appidi claimed two for 24, and Rayaan Taj captured two for 37.

The Leeward Islands made a disappointing start to their campaign in this year's tournament with a narrow five-run loss against the Windward Islands at Conaree Sports Club in one of four opening round matches.

The Windwards were bowled out for 124, with captain Stephan Pascal and Theo Edward each scoring 21.

Antiguan leg-spinner Micah McKenzie snapped up five for 36 in nine overs, and medium pacer Kunal Tilokani took three for 13.

Three wicket hauls from Kirt Murray, Kirsten Murray, and Davin Forde then helped the Windwards dismiss the Leewards for 119 in 35 overs.

De-Antre Drew (28), Devanand Singh (21), and Isra-el Morton (12) were the only batsmen to reach double figures for the Leewards.

In the other opening round

matches, defending champions Barbados launched their title defence with a dominant 140-run win over Guyana at the Elquemedo Willett Park in Nevis. The Bajans posted 287 for six from their 50 overs, and Guyana were then dismissed for just 147 in 31.3 overs.

Trinidad and Tobago defeat the USA 2 by one

wicket at St. Paul's Sports Complex. The USA 2 made 259 for seven from their 50 overs, and Trinidad & Tobago achieved victory at 263 for nine with five balls remaining.

The USA 1 snatched a 13-run victory against Jamaica at St. Mary's Park in Cayon. The USA 1 were dismissed for 209 in 47.4 overs. Jamaica then collapsed from 117 without loss in the 16th over to 196 all out in 43 overs.

In the other second-round matches on Sunday, Barbados, the Windward Islands, and USA 1 all claimed their second win in as many games.

Barbados recorded a dominant 144-run win over Trinidad and Tobago at the Conaree Sports Club. Barbados posted an imposing 295 for eight from their 50 overs, and Trinidad and Tobago were dismissed for 151 in 34 overs.

The Windward Islands pulled off a narrow four-run victory against Jamaica at the Elquemedo Willett Park in Nevis. The Windwards made 196 all out in 44 overs and dismissed Jamaica for 192 all out in 49 overs.

The USA 1 notched up a seven-wicket win against Guyana at St. Paul's Sports Complex. Guyana made 150 all out in 44.2 overs, and USA 1 achieved victory by scoring 151 for three in 32.5 overs.

The Blackhawks achieved victory by scoring 123 for three in 13 overs. Brent Jo-


seph slammed 69 not out, Wilden Cornwall Jr. scored 22, and Shamar Pereira made 20.

Twelfth-place finish for Antiguans at NORCECA Beach contest

Antigua and Barbuda's two-member female team finished in 12th place in the NORCECA (North, Central America and Caribbean Volleyball Confederation) Beach Championships in the Dominican Republic over the weekend.

The national female team comprising Jassania Joseph and Jaya Isaac Carr finished ahead of four of the 16 teams from four confederations at the July 3 to 7 NORCE-CA Championships in Juan Dolio, Dominican Republic, which serve as a qualifier for the International Volleyball Federation (FIVB) Under-21 World Championships later this year in Mexico.

The team of Joseph and Carr were beaten 2-0 (21-6, 21-10) by the duo

of Joanna Robinson and Brianna Delapenha of the Cayman Islands in the playoff for 11th place.

The Antiguans also suffered a 2-0 (21-17, 21-17) loss to the St. Lucian team of Isabelle Phillip and Ericka Gaspard in the classification round for 9th to 12th place.

Joseph and Carr, who were accompanied by coach Olsen "Karrat" Joseph, received a bye and lost their other two matches in Pool A during the opening rounds of the competition.

The Antiguans were beaten 2-0 (21-9, 21-11) by the Canadian pair of Ofure Odigie and Ruby Sorra and also suffered a 2-0 (21-8, 21-19) loss to the Dominican Repub-

lic team of Crismil Paniagua and Daneyi Arias.

The American duo of Zoey Henson and Sarah Wood claimed the gold medal at the NORCECA U21 Beach Volleyball Qualifier, defeating Puerto Rico's Miabella Musignac and Alanis Nieves in straight sets 2-0 (21-13, 21-11) in the final.

The bronze went to Canada's Ofure Odigie and Ruby Sorra, who beat Laura Molina and Sofia Vega of Costa Rica in straight sets, 21-15, 21-18, in the playoff for third place.

The fifth and final ticket to the 2025 FIVB Beach Volleyball World Championship was secured by Guatemala's Danna Aguilar and Naomi Monney, who overcame Nicaragua's Yuliana Chávez and Ella Resau in a tight battle for fifth place, winning 2-0 (24-22, 21-16).

The United States of America, Costa Rica, Canada, Puerto Rico, and Guatemala are the five women's teams that qualified for the 2025 FIVB Under-21 World Beach Championships, which will take place in Puebla, Mexico, from October 16 to 19.
