Parliament meets today...


The House of Representatives will convene a meeting at the Parliament Chambers this morning with all eyes focused on the debate on the government's plan to invest funds owed to the Social Security Scheme into the Jolly Beach Hotel.

According to Prime Minister Gaston Browne the move has many benefits for Antigua and Barbuda. Primarily it will help to secure the future of the scheme which in the past had faced difficulties in meeting its monthly obligations.

A 2011-12 actuarial report had indicated that the scheme requires ten contributors to every one beneficiary to make it financially sound. This has never been achieved in the life of the organisation and with life-expectancy increasing, the demands on the scheme will only grow as the gap widens between contributors and beneficiaries.

The government believes that the proposed investments by the Scheme into Jolly Beach hotel, which is a viable concern that is currently turning a profit, is a sound move that will ensure the long-term viability of the scheme and thus reduce the threat that one day beneficiaries will again be lining up at dawn to collect their pensions.

Additionally, by investing in the lucrative tourism sector, the move guarantees employment,

economic growth and most importantly, ownership. It will place a key tourism asset into the

hands of Antiguans and and Barbudans who are the owners of the Social Security Scheme.

The prime minister even added that another layer of security will be put in place; the guarantee by the government of the investments by the Scheme. It is therefore a 'win-win' for Social Security and the people of Antigua and Barbuda.

Other matters on the Order Paper is the amendments to the CIP Act to bring it in line with recommendations from both the US government and the European Union.

Government assures the public: safeguards will be in place for the SS Jolly Beach investment

Safeguards, Transparency, and Compounding Growth

Prime Minister Gaston Browne reiterated that the 'Jolly Beach–Social Security initiative' was not a speculative gamble but a carefully structured investment. He outlined the multiple safeguards that had been built into the plan:

- Professional fund managers would oversee operations.
- An escrow account would ensure independent custody of receipts.
- Parliamentary reporting would guarantee transparency.

Speaking on the *Browne and Browne* show on Saturday, PM Browne stressed that these mechanisms were already documented in detail and would provide the public with assurance that the project was being executed with full accountability.

Importantly, he described how reinvestment of profits into further ventures could create a compounding effect, generating returns of 40% annually or more. The plan also emphasized diversification across real estate, liquid assets, and securities—far from the speculative ventures of "options or Bitcoin" suggested by critics.

A Transformed Jolly Beach

Turning to the property itself, PM Browne highlighted that Jolly Beach was no longer the "relic" left behind by past administrations. Already, EC\$15 million had been invested, with another EC\$20+ million set aside for improvements. The resort, once in decline, was being revived as a cornerstone of Antigua and Barbuda's tourism and investment strategy.

The Forward: A Vision for National Transformation

The Prime Minister then read from the *Foreword* of the Jolly Beach project document, situating the initiative within a broader vision for Antigua



and Barbuda.

Back in 2014, his administration had embarked on a mission not merely of recovery, but of transformation—to build Antigua and Barbuda into a Caribbean economic powerhouse. This transformation required rejecting the colonial, extractive model of development and embracing what PM Browne termed 'entrepreneurial socialism' or 'empowerment capitalism'.

"Under this paradigm, the state partners with the private sector to generate profits, which are then redistributed through taxes and dividends to drive social and economic development. The government must itself be entrepreneurial—seeking out strategic investments that keep wealth circulating within the country," the prime minister argued

Building Ownership and Self-Reliance

The nation's leader stressed that Antigua and Barbuda's future required 'creativity, ownership, and self-reliance'. This philosophy had already borne fruit:

☐ West Indies Oil Company (WIOC), once foreign-owned, was now majority-owned by the government and people. Over the last decade, WIOC had contributed over EC\$160 million in retained profits and dividends to national development.

☐ Through government policy, Canadian banks exiting the country were required to sell branches to domestic banks, which collectively posted EC\$110 million in profits last year. These funds now remained in Antigua and Barbuda rather than being repatriated abroad.

The next logical step, PM Browne explained, was to apply the same empowerment model to Jolly Beach. By transferring the resort to Social Security, renovating it, and expanding operations, the scheme would generate sustainable profits, strengthen pensions, and ensure that wealth stayed within the nation.

Rejecting Dependency and Embracing Local Capacity

The prime minister expressed astonishment at opposition calls to sell Jolly Beach to foreign investors. Such a move, he argued, would perpetuate "mental slavery" and send profits overseas.

Instead, he insisted that Antiguans and Barbudans possessed the intellectual capital, creativity, and resilience to manage such assets successfully. With significant national investments already made in education and training, there was no reason to assume that only foreign "godfathers" could ensure success.

Antigua and Barbuda...marking an impact at CARIFESTA XV (15)



Just days into the Caribbean cultural exposition, CAR-IFESTA 15, the Antigua and Barbuda delegation is already making an impact at the 10-day cultural exposition that is being held in Barbados under the theme "Caribbean Roots; Global Excellence".

According to Cordice the Antigua and Barbuda the delegation was purposefully selected to showcase the very best of its culture, highlighting the nation's three pillars of representation: Legacy, Innovation, and Youth. He noted that from the iconic Burning Flames, celebrating 40 years of musical dominance, to the reigning Panorama champions CUB Hells Gate Steel Orchestra, and a dy-

namic mix of dancers, actors, writers, visual artists, culinary experts, and musicians, the team embodies the heartbeat of Antiguan and Barbudan creativity.

Piango Festival 2025...deemed a successful venture



The Ministry of Agriculture is expressing satisfaction with the Piango festival, 2025, which took place at the Cades Bay Agricultural Station on Sunday afternoon. It was the first such festival after a two-year hiatus.

"I am happy to see the rebirth of the Piango Festival and I am generally pleased with both the turn out and the level of participation in the festival this year," say Minister of Agriculture Anthony Smith Jnr.

Thousands turned out to participate in the festival which showcased the best the country has to offer in agro-processing. Scores of stalls were set up with vendors offering for sale from wine, to jams and sauces and a wide variety of sweets.

Minister Smith said he was pleased to welcome Prime Minister Gaston Browne to the festival which signals his support for agriculture as a matter of priority. Other Cabinet ministers

included Social and Urban Minister Rawdon Turner.

The government officials and the attendees were there to patronize the stalls as well as to enjoy the entertainment provided by the organisers.

Minister Smith said part of the decided to return to Cades Bay was to shine the spotlight on the government's efforts to revitalize the Antigua Black pineapple which is well on the way.

"Already we have propagated some 15 thousand pineapple slips with another 15 thousand slips soon to come. What we want to do is to raise the number of slips we distribute to two-hundred thousand which we hope to distribute

to local farmers," he revealed.

According to the minister the focus this year has been on agro-processing and he was quite impressed with the variety of end-products that were on display made from the two main fruits under consideration; the mango and the pineapple. "We have lots of innovative and creative ways that our people used the mangoes and the pineapples. Traditionally, we often think of planting and reaping of crops whenever we think about agriculture, but agriculture is quite a wide subject area and this includes the value-added items such as the several agro-processed items that are on sale here this afternoon," Smith told Point Express

from the Cades Bay festival.

For future iteration of the festival, the minister said he wants to see the focus expanded beyond mango and the pineapple and include other fruits that are available locally. Naturally, he believes that this will result in a demand for more booths for additional vendors thus ensuring that the festival continues to grow and to expand in years to come.

One of the attractions of the festival was the demonstration of a 10-pound drone which hopefully will soon become part of the tools of farmers as they adopt technology to apply pesticides and fertilisers to their crops.

We mourn the loss of our Comrade extrordinaire and elder, Ms. Ethlyn Winter, of Cassada Gardens. The good comrade transitioned earlier this moring, Saturday, 23 August 2025, at the Sir Lester Bird Medical Center, following a brief illness.

For seven decades, Comrade Winter demonstrated her undiminished love and fealty for the ABLP and the AT&LU by her membership, first as a Juvenile Supporter and, following adulthood, as a member of the Women's Action Group. The political defeat of the ABLP --especially following the 1968 debacle that led to the splitting of the institution of Labour and the 1971 electoral loss of the ABLP-- cemented Comrade Ethlyn Winter's place as a stalwart of this great institution. 




- •Verify information with credible evidence prior to publication

CARIFESTA XV sets off with a bang in Barbados

On Friday, August 22, Queen's Park in Bridgetown, Barbados, came alive with the spirit of Caribbean creativity during the Opening Ceremony of CARIFESTA XV. A CARICOM press release said it "marked the triumphant return of the Region's premier arts festival."

After a prolonged pause caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Caribbean Festival of Arts (CAR-IFESTA) has returned, uniting artists, cultural authorities, and fans from across the Caribbean and beyond.

The event kicked off with an impressive Parade of Countries, a vibrant display of music, dance, vivid colors, and talent that set the stage for ten days dedicated to cultural exploration and festivities. This year's festival theme, "Caribbean Roots, Global Excellence," highlights the rich cultural legacy of the Caribbean and its significant influence on worldwide artistic innovation. Over 2,500 delegates from 25 nations are expected to participate.

Leaders, ministers of culture, officials from CAR-



ICOM Member States and Associate Members, along with groups of artists, cultural specialists, entrepreneurs, and a large audience, gathered to celebrate the occasion.

CARICOM reports that in her speech, Secretary-General Dr. Carla Barnett praised Barbados as the host nation, commending Prime Minister Honourable Mia Mottley, the government, and the people of Barbados for their exceptional hospitality and thorough organization.

She highlighted that **CARIFESTA** hosting for the third time in Barbados demonstrates the

country's steadfast dedication to regional unity and its strategic focus on arts and culture development.

Dr. Barnett also mentioned the festival's expanding international ties, particularly its strengthening connection with the African Union, which includes debut theatrical showcases from Ghana, Nigeria, and Zimbabwe. Manchester police probing suspected drowning of toddler

The Manchester police are investigating the circumstances surrounding the suspected drowning of a 17-month-old boy in the parish on Friday night.

The deceased has been identified as Levonte Lewis from the community of Hollywood in Norwood, St James.

The infant is believed to have drowned in a swimming pool at Downs, Newport, Manchester about 11 p.m., reports say.

His body was retrieved and later removed to the morgue.

The matter was reported to the Alligator Pond police, and an investigation is now under way. (Jamaica Gleaner)



U.S. revokes visas of Grenada Finance Minister over Cuban Medical Brigade issue



Finance Minister Dennis Cornwall has become the first Grenadian government official to face direct action from the United States in connection with its stance on the Cuban medical brigade program. According to high-level sources cited by The New Today, the U.S. government under President Donald Trump has revoked

all three of Cornwall's U.S. visas—B1, B2, and A1.

The same sources confirmed that the U.S. also withdrew the visa of Cornwall's estranged wife, Ophelia Cornwall. The government of Prime Minister Dickon Mitchell has reportedly been officially notified of the revocations.

Minister Cornwall, who rep-

resents the St Patrick East constituency and studied in Cuba during the 1980s under the People's Revolutionary Government, publicly stated in Parliament that he was willing to lose his U.S. visa in order to stand in solidarity with Cuba on the medical brigade issue. Foreign Minister Joseph Andall, also a former student in Cuba, has expressed similar views.

The visa revocation prevents Cornwall from traveling to the United States for official duties, including attending meetings of the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and the World Bank.

The U.S. has accused Cuba and its partner governments in Latin America, Africa, and the Caribbean of participating in what it describes as a "forced labour" scheme involving Cuban medical personnel. While The New Today reports that Grenada may be paying 65% of the doctors' salaries directly to the Cuban government in U.S. currency, this claim has not been independently confirmed.

In response to Washington's actions, several Caribbean governments are reportedly in talks with Cuba to revise the terms of their medical cooperation agreements.

No official statement has yet been issued by the Grenadian Congress administration regarding the U.S. decision.

The U.S. embargo against Cuba has been in place since 1960, following the overthrow of the Batista regime by Fidel Castro and his revolutionary forces. (Dominica News Online)

Columbia University student among 5 victims identified in deadly New York tour bus crash



Police identified the five people who were killed in a tour bus crash in western New York on Friday.

New York State Police said in a news release on Saturday that Shankar Kumar Jha, 65, of Madhubani, India; Pinki Changrani, 60, of East Brunswick, New Jersey; Columbia University student Xie Hongzhuo, 22, of Beijing, China; Zhang Xiaolan, 55, of Jersey City, New Jersey; and Jian Mingli, 56, of Jersey City, died in the crash.

Columbia University said in a statement Saturday: "We are devastated by the death of one of our students, Xie Hongzhuo, in the tragic bus accident near Buffalo on Friday."

"This heartbreaking loss is felt deeply across our community. We are in close contact with her family and offering them our full support," the statement continued, noting counseling services are available to students. "Our thoughts and deepest sympathies are with her family, friends, and all who have been touched by this tragedy."

The tour bus, which was traveling from Niagara Falls to New York City, careened out of control and fell on its side along an interstate parkway near Buffalo around 12:45 p.m. Friday.

The bus was carrying 54 people, including the driver and a tour guide. Some of the occupants were ejected from and trapped under the bus, according to authorities.

Dozens of the occupants were hospitalized for their injuries, including several children.

Erie County Medical Center, where 21 passengers were hospitalized for injuries, said that 14 patients remained at the hospital as of Saturday afternoon, but were in stable condition.

Authorities are still investigating the cause of the crash, which did not involve any other vehicles.

However, they said Friday they believe the driver, Bin Shao, 55, of Flushing, New York, "became distracted, lost control, and overcorrected." Shao "had no signs of impairment and the tour bus had no mechanical failure," according to the news release.

Authorities added that the bus was at "full speed" during the crash, but did not specify how fast the vehicle was driving. Interstate 90 has a speed limit of 65 mph.

It does not appear that the driver has been accused of or charged with any crimes.

A National Transportation Safety Board team was dispatched Friday to investigate the crash. The scope of the investigation will include the crash site, the mechanical condition of the bus, highway design and the driver — including fatigue, distraction and qualifications.

At a Saturday news conference, the NTSB asked witnesses or anyone with video footage to contact the agency.

The tour company operating the vehicle, M&Y Tour Inc. of Staten Island, has not returned requests for comment. (NBC)

Nigerian military airstrikes free 76 hostages, including children



At least 76 hostages, including children, have been freed after Nigeria's military targeted militants with precision airstrikes in the country's northwest, local authorities said.

The airstrikes were launched on targets around Pauwa Hill, located in the Kankara area of Katsina state, in the early hours of Saturday, Nasir Mu'azu, the state's commissioner for internal security, said in a statement.

The air assault was launched in a manhunt for a notorious kidnapper.

The rescued hostages include some of those kidnapped during an attack on a mosque in Unguwan Mantau that led to the death of at least 50 people, the commissioner said.

"However, it was regrettably noted that one child tragically lost his life during the ordeal," Mu'azu said.

In recent months, there has been an uptick in attacks on communities in the northnorth-central west and regions of Africa's most populous country, where farmers often clash over limited access to land and

water. An attack last month in north-central Nigeria killed 150 people.

The conflict has become deadlier in recent years, with authorities and analysts warning that more herdsmen are taking up more sophisticated arms.

The commissioner the air assault is "part of a broader strategy to dismantle criminal hideouts, weaken their networks and put an end to the cycle of killings, kidnappings, and extortion that have plagued innocent citizens."

The West African country is

also dealing with an insurgency in its northeast region that has resulted in the death of around 35,000 civilians and the displacement of more than 2 million others, according to the United Nations.

Also on Saturday, separate airstrikes in the northwest of Nigeria killed 35 militants in a targeted attack.

Despite the efforts by the government of President Bola Tinubu to curb jihadi attacks, the militancy has persisted. (AP)

Zelensky vows to continue fighting as Ukraine marks independence day



President Volodymyr Zelensky said Ukraine would continue to fight for its freedom "while its calls for peace are not heard," in a defiant address to the nation on its independence day.

"We need a just peace, a peace where our future will be decided only by us," he said, adding that Ukraine was "not a victim, it is a fighter".

He continued: "Ukraine has not yet won, but it has certainly not lost."

Zelensky's remarks came after Moscow said Ukraine had attacked Russian power and energy facilities overnight, blaming drone attacks for a fire at a nuclear power plant in its western Kursk region.

The Ukraine government's Centre for Countering Disinformation said it had been reported that the shooting down of a drone allegedly caused the fire.

The centre blamed Russia for "spread-

ing manipulations" and said Russia accusing Ukraine of "allegedly carrying out targeted strikes" on the power plant "are typical methods" of Russian propaganda.

There were no injuries and the fire was quickly extinguished, the plant's press service said on messaging app Telegram. It said the attack had damaged a transformer, but radiation levels were within the normal range.

The United Nations' International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) said it was aware of reports regarding the fire, but could not independently confirm them. Its director general said "every nuclear facility must be protected at all times".

The IAEA has repeatedly called on both Russia and Ukraine to show maximum restraint around nuclear facilities in the war.

Also on Sunday, Russia and Ukraine

both confirmed a prisoner swap had taken place, with 146 soldiers on each side being exchanged.

Russia's defence ministry also said eight people from Russia's Kursk region, which was partially occupied by Ukraine for several months, had been handed over and would return home.

Zelensky said those returned by Russia included soldiers, border guards and civilians, most of whom have been in captivity since 2022.

He also said journalist Dmytro Khilyuk, who was "kidnapped in the Kyiv region" at the start of the war, was coming home.

Independence Day celebrations were held in Kyiv, as the country marked its declaration of independence from the Soviet Union in 1991.

Canada's Prime Minister Mark Carney took part in the celebrations, and stood

beside Zelensky at St Sophia's Cathedral as he addressed the crowd:

"I want to say something very simple and important: Canada will always stand shoulder to shoulder with Ukraine."

He said drones, ammunition and armoured vehicles, part of a \$2bn Canadian dollars (£1bn) military package, would be delivered to Ukraine as early as September, Ukrainian media reported. The deliveries would make up more than half of a support package he announced in July.

Also present was US envoy Keith Kellogg - whom Ukrainian media reported was awarded the Order of Merit, first degree by Zelensky during the ceremony.

After Zelensky thanked him and US President Donald Trump for their support, Kellogg could be heard telling Zelensky: "We're going to make this work".

Andriy Yermak, Zelensky's chief of staff, wrote on Telegram early on Sunday: "On this special day - Ukraine's Independence Day - it is especially important for us to feel the support of our friends. And Canada has always stood by us."

Meanwhile, Zelensky shared a letter from King Charles sending the people of Ukraine his "warmest and most sincere wishes".

"I keep feeling the greatest and deepest admiration for the unbreakable spirit of the Ukrainian people," the King writes. "I remain hopeful that our countries will be able to further work closely together to achieve a just and lasting peace."

Zelensky said the King's "kind words are a true inspiration for our people during the difficult time of war".

The UK government also said Ukrainian flags would appear above Downing Street in recognition of the anniversary.

The Ministry of Defence has confirmed that British military experts will continue to train Ukrainian soldiers until at least the end of 2026, with an extension to Operation Interflex - the codename given to the UK Armed Forces' training programme for Ukrainian recruits.

Norway announced on Sunday that it would contribute about 7 billion kroner (£514m; \$693m) of air defence systems to Ukraine.

"Together with Germany, we are now ensuring that Ukraine receives powerful air defence systems," Norwegian Prime Minister Jonas Gahr Store said in a statement.

The two nations are funding two Patriot systems, including missiles, with Norway also helping procure air defence radar.

Also on Sunday, Ukraine and Sweden announced they had agreed to joint defence production, with Sweden's defence minister saying it would "boost Swedish rearmament and meet the needs of Ukraine's armed forces".

Pål Jonson wrote on X: "Ukraine will share and provide technology for its factories in Sweden and defence materiel co-produced in Sweden will be exported to Ukraine."

On Saturday, Russia said its forces in eastern Ukraine had seized two villages in the Donetsk region.

Russian forces have been advancing very slowly, and at great cost, in eastern Ukraine and now control about 20% of Ukraine's territory.

A full-scale invasion of Ukraine was launched by Russia in February 2022.

There has been intense diplomacy over the war this month, with US President Donald Trump meeting his Russian counterpart President Vladimir Putin in Alaska on 15 August.

The summit was billed as a vital step towards peace in Ukraine. However, despite both leaders claiming the talks were a success, Trump has since shown growing frustration publicly over the lack of a peace deal between Russia and Ukraine.

The US president has said he is considering either hitting Russia with further economic sanctions or walking away from peace talks.

"I'm going to make a decision as to what we do and it's going to be, it's going to be a very important decision, and that's whether or not it's massive sanctions or massive tariffs or both, or we do nothing and say it's your fight," Trump said on Friday.

Zelensky has repeatedly called for an unconditional ceasefire and his European allies have also insisted on a halt in fighting.

He has accused Russia of "doing everything it can" to prevent a meeting with Putin to try to end the war.

Russia's Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov said Putin was ready to meet Ukraine's leader "when the agenda is ready for a summit, and this agenda is not ready at all", accusing Zelensky of saying "no to everything". (BBC)

Antigua and Barbuda finished in last place in the Americas Zone Group III of the 2025 Billie Jean King Cup in Santa Tecla, El Salvador.

Antigua and Barbuda, represented by a four-member squad at the August 18 to 23 women's team tournament, ended their campaign with a 2-1 loss to Suriname in their playoff for 10th place on Thursday.

Jill Ma-Ajong gave Suriname the lead with a 6-3, 6-3 victory over Antigua's Isoke Perry in the first singles. Jolie George-Alexander defeated Faith Bab 6-1, 6-0 in the second singles to draw Antigua level.

But the combination of Kayla Currie

and Anouk Ma-Ajong clinched the tie for Suriname by prevailing 6-1, 6-3 in the doubles against the Antiguan pair of Jolie George-Alexander and Ariel Naomi Kelsick.

Antigua and Barbuda also finished winless and last in their four-team Group C after suffering a 2-1 defeat against the United States (US) Virgin Islands in the final encounter in round-robin pool play.

Isoke Perry gave Antigua and Barbuda the lead with a 6-2, 6-3 victory against Stefani Catazano in the first singles. But the US Virgin Islands hit back to win the other two matches to clinch the tie.

Malena Del Olmo prevailed 2-6, 6-2, 6-1 against Antigua's Ariel Naomi Kelsick in the second singles. Del Olmo partnered with Lisa Messier to crush the Antiguan duo of Jolie George-Alexander and Janae George 6-1, 6-1 in the doubles.

The Antiguans lost their first two matches in Group C, suffering 3-0 losses to host El Salvador and Cuba.

Meanwhile, Group B winners, the Bahamas, and Group A winners, Uruguay, finished as the top two sides in the 11-team tournament and gained promotion to compete in Americas Group II of the Billie Jean King Cup in 2026. The remaining nine teams will remain in the Americas Zone Group III for next year.

The Bahamas finished as winners of the Americas Zone Group III tournament after winning the promotional playoffs among the three preliminary group winners.

The Bahamas recorded 2-1 wins against Uruguay and Group C winners El Salvador. Uruguay prevailed 2-1 against El Salvador, who finished overall in third place.

Cuba finished in fourth place by winning their two matches in their threeteam positional playoffs. The Cubans claimed 2-1 wins against Jamaica and St. Lucia.

Jamaica finished in fifth place by pulling off a 2-1 win against St. Lucia, who finished overall in sixth place.

Trinidad and Tobago finished in seventh place by virtue of winning their two matches in their three-team positional playoffs. The Trinidadians pulled off 2-1 wins against Panama and the US Virgin Islands. Panama secured eighth place with a crushing 3-0 victory over the US Virgin Islands, who finished overall in ninth place.

Windies women step up preparations at camp in Antigua

The West Indies Women's cricket team have just concluded an intensive high-performance training block at the Coolidge Cricket Ground (CCC), as Cricket West Indies (CWI) ramps up its investment in developing the women's game across the region.

The Antigua camp was designed in two phases to maximize opportunities for training. The first group of players concluded a two-week programme earlier this month, while the second group completed their training period this past week under the watchful eyes of their coaching staff, including Senior Women's Head Coach Shane Deitz, assistant Ryan Austin and pathway coach Ulric Batson.

The sessions were carefully designed to cover all aspects of the modern game, from refining technical skills and tactical awareness, to enhancing physical conditioning and sharpening mental aptitude.

With major international fixtures on the horizon, this training camp was seen as a crucial part of CWI's longterm strategy to consistently elevate the women's programme to worldclass levels.

The training push in Antigua runs in tandem with CWI's broader development initiatives, including a partnership with the Super Kings Academy in Chennai, India, where 15 promising players are currently honing their skills in a professional high-performance environment.

Senior Women's Head Coach Shane Deitz shared his rationale for hosting the developmental camp.

"We had a mixture of established players, new players and fringe players come to Antigua for the last 5 weeks. It's been great to be able to focus on some fundamental technical work and some strength and conditioning work. We were also able to conduct fitness testing and have already seen some improvements in a short space of time.

"Hector Martinez our Strength and Conditioning Coach has been pushing the players, and they are responding very positively. The girls will head to the WCPL now and after the end of that tournament we will have an intense few months of training which will prepare us for a very important 2026."

Looking ahead to next year, the West Indies Women face a demanding calendar headlined by the ICC Women's T20 World Cup in England, a home series against Sri Lanka and Australia, as well as an away assignment in Ireland.
